COLLEGE WORLD SERIES NOTES FOR TUESDAY, JUNE 3

ESPN RATINGS RELEASED FOR FIRST SIX GAMES

orida State's 5-3 win over Indiana State on Saturday produced the biggest television ratings for ESPN through the first six games.

According to John Domino of ESPN's communications staff, Game Four of the CWS received a 2.0 rating Saturday night.

Other games with ratings in parenthesis follow: Lousiana State vs. Loyola Marymount (1.5); Maine vs. Arizona (0.5); Miami vs. Oklahoma State (1.4); Louisiana State vs. Maine (1.2); Oklahoma State vs. Indiana State (1.9).

Overall, the 1986 CWS has produced a 1.4 rating, down slightly from 1985. By eliminating the only tape delayed game, however, the overall ratings increase to 1.6, a slight increase over last year. Arizona's dramatic ninth-inning win over Maine on Friday will be the only game not telecast live.

The best single-game rating for a College World Series game was last year's Game 14 (Texas vs. Miami) which produced a 3.7 (1.3 million homes tuned in). Each rating point is equal to 369,000 households this year. Last year the number was 357,000.

ATTENDANCE, TRENDS THROUGH SEVEN GAMES

Attendance through the first seven games is down 3,581 fans over last year's record pace. After four sessions, the 1986 CWS has a total attendance of 47,201 (11,800 per session) compared with 50,782 (12,696) last year.

CWS participants are currently scoring 9.4 runs per game (both teams combined), while hitting .256. Last year's 15-game averages were 11.9 runs per game and .267 batting. Average game time this year is 2:53, compared with 3:02 last year.

FIRST CWS MEETING EVER FOR MIAMI-FSU

Although this is Miami's ninth trip to Omaha and Florida State's eighth, tonight will be the first time the state rivals have ever met in CWS play. The only other year the two teams appeared in the same CWS was 1980 when Florida State lost two straight and Miami finished fourth.

ELIAS SPORTS BUREAU SUPPORTS LAST NIGHT'S RULING ON ROHDE'S STRIKEOUT

The most unusual play of the 1986 College World Series took place last night in the eighth inning of the Arizona-Loyola Marymount game.

With two out, Arizona's Dave Rohde struck out swinging but ran to first base assuming the pitch had hit the dirt, thus requiring Loyola catcher Jim McAnany to make a throw to first. McAnany assumed the ball did not go in the dirt and did not make a throw. First-base umpire Hank Rountree ruled the ball had touched the ground and Rohde was safe at first.

What's the official scoring ruling?

CWS Official Scorer Lou Spry could ponder a number of possibilities (wild pitch, passed ball, error on the catcher) but ruled the play a strikeout and fielder's choice. Rohde later stole second and scored the Wildcats's eventh run on a single by Tommy Hinzo.

Although no one in the press box last night offered a better scoring decision on the play, we consulted one of the experts today, the Elias Sports Bureau in New York.

According to Steve Hirdt of Elias, "there is no clear cut answer but a fielder's choice is as logical as anything."

"I've never heard of a play like that before and I'm glad it didn't happen in a major league game," said Hirdt.

POST GAME QUOTES FROM MIAMI HEAD COACH RON FRASER:

"I had no afterthoughts on starting Vespe. We felt that if we could get two or maybe three innings out of him then we could go to Dan (Davies) and then Raether.

"I think the story of this game was just Lewis. He had us on the ropes the whole game. Even when we were in the meat of our order, he'd come through and strike us out. Tonight he did a great job of getting his breaking pitch over to go along with his fastball, and that's why he was so effective. ON FACING HIS FORMER ASSOCIATE SKIP BERTMAN IN THE NEXT GAME:

"You've got to win in this series to stay alive, so it really doesn't matter who we play. Tomorrow night is just going to be another ballgame. We've got to win it to keep playing.

"I talked to our guys after the game and reminded them that this was the same situation we were in last year—after losing to Texas in the second game. Still, most of the guys who played in last year's World Series aren't around anymore.

"We've got to hit the ball better in order to win. Everyone has to do an excellent job for us to continue to win." CHRIS MAGNO ON HIS CONTACT AT THIRD BASE:

"I knew that if I ran into someone that was in the baseline, I'd be awarded the base I was heading to. I tried to make contact, but I guess it was a little too blatant. I thought he was in the baseline."

Quotes from FloridaState Coach Mike Martin --

"This is exactly where we want to be. We've got Mike Loynd going against Arizona on Thursday. I wouldn't even be surprised if old Richie comes in a tell s me he wants to work in relief. Arizona is a fine team. It isn't going to be easy.

"I thought the play in the sixth inning on the rundown was a real key. I think they made exactly the right call there. You've got to call the guy out, but it's a very excitable play and you don't want to run (eject) a guy on soemthing like that. To tell you the truth I think that got the Indians blood a little riled up."

FROM RICHIE LEWIS =-

"I have pitched some of the best baseball of my life against Miami and come up empty. Sooner or later the dice had to come up sevens. I threw everything but the kitchen sink at them. I've never thrown sidearm in my life untill tonight. They will battle you on every pitch. It was just a good overall game for me.
