third. Dominguez is called out on strikes. Trujillo lays down a bunt down the first  
base line and Little picks up the ball and throws to first but the first baseman can't  
catch the ball (E-3). Howard scores (no-RBI) and Duloms stops at second. Nelson lines  
out to short.  
One run, one hit, two errors, two left. (the run is unearned)

Florida State: Mangham walks. Mangham is caught stealing, 1-3-4. Saxner flies out to  
the left fielder on the warning track. Fulton lines a stand up double down the right field  
line. Blackwell grounds to the third baseman who throws past the first baseman (E-5).  
Fulton scores from second and Blackwell stops at second. (no-RBI). Clayborne reaches first  
when the third baseman can't come up with his bouncer (E-5), Blackwell advances to third.  
Marzan lays down a bunt single down the third baseline scoring Blackwell from third (RBI)  
and advancing Clayborne to second. Sorrento goes down swinging.  
Two runs, two hits, two errors, two left. (both runs are unearned).

Two runs, two hits, no errors, none left.

Florida State: Bob O'Brien replaces Davies on the mound. Blackwell grounds out 5-3. Clayborne pops out to the second baseman behind the bag. Marzan reaches first on the third baseman's over throw at first when Howard is pulled off the bag and doesn't make the tag (E-5). Sorrento lines out to the right fielder in right center. No runs, no hits, one error, one left.

## COLLEGE WORLD SERIES NOTES FOR SUNDAY, JUNE 8

### LATE-INNING DRAMATICS

Eight of the first 13 games this year have seen the winning run scored in the seventh inning or later.

All three Florida State victories have been won in late innings. The Seminoles won Game 4 against Indiana State with three runs in the bottom of the seventh; in Game 8 against Miami, FSU scored five in the top of the seventh; and yesterday they pushed across a run in the bottom of the eighth to eliminate Oklahoma State.

Miami's first CWS game this year featured ninth-inning excitement when the Hurricanes scored four in the top of the ninth for the victory over OSU.

Arizona, awaiting today's winner for the championship game tomorrow, has produced the most dramatic late-inning win. The Wildcats fought back from a 7-0 deficit in Game 2, capped by Dave Shermet's two-out, two-run homer on a 3-2 pitch in the bottom of the ninth against Maine.

In Game 7 against Loyola Marymount, the Wildcats scored two in the eighth and one in the ninth to overcome a 5-4 Loyola lead. And in Game 11, Arizona survived a grand slam home run by Florida State and 5-0 deficit to defeat the Seminoles, 9-5.

### ONE-RUN GAMES

Despite the dramatics, only four games this year have been decided by one run and no game has gone extra innings. Each of the three survivors has won a one-run game, as did Loyola Marymount. The hard-luck team was Louisiana State, which lost both of its games by 4-3 counts.

The record for one-run games is eight, set in the 1972 championship. Last year seven games were decided by one run, as was the 1968 CWS.

### ATTENDANCE RECORD IN SITE

With two session-record crowds in the last three days, the 1986 CWS is easily within striking distance for an all-time attendance record. The count is currently 100,719, compared with 102,965 for the record year in 1985. The key should be Monday's championship game. Last year's Texas-Miami championship game drew just 9,830 fans on a gloomy Tuesday night (two days were rained out last year). This year's final two games need to draw 25,252 total to break the record 125,970 total of last year.

Last night's attendance of 14,039 (a Session 8 record), pushed the total attendance over 100,000 for the sixth straight year.

### TRENDS AND STOLEN BASES

Through 13 games, the 1986 CWS has produced an average of 9.9 runs per game (both teams combined) and a .260 batting average. Average game time is now 2:55.

The chances of successfully stealing a base this year are only 61%. There have been 51 steal attempts and 20 runners have been thrown out. Toss out the first five games, when base stealers were 14 for 16, and the past eight games have produced 18 caught stealing in 35 attempts.

MIAMI HEAD COACH RON FRASER:

"I think our pitching did a great job tonight. They took advantage of some of our errors and they found a soft spot in our defense--basically they did what they had to do to win the thing.

"The double play by Alicea is just what you need to do to win this thing. You have to come up with the big plays like that. That could have been our inning with runners at first and third and no one out, but it took some of the starch out of our sails. I've said all along that Florida State is the most talented team in this tournament, and I hope they go on to win it all and bring the championship back to Florida.

"We really weren't in a position to do the things we like to do offensively, because we didn't get a whole lot of hitting. We tried to get something going with a hit and run at the end, but we didn't get the right pitch.

"I thought our team last year displayed the finest team effort of any I've ever been associated with, but this year's club did more things to win ballgames--in different ways--than any I've ever seen. We didn't have the pitching all year long and we didn't have the batting averages, but they scratched and scrambled for every single game. I think we had two blow-outs all year long. I'm very proud of this group.

"We finished the year a couple of runs away from being in the championship game and that's quite a credit to this group of young men."

FLORIDASTATE COACH MIKE MARTIN \_\_

"Nobody deserved the success tonight more than Doug Little. He's been a key part of our ballclub for four years. I can't say enough about the job Richie Lewis did. It was just a great ballgame. This is what we've been working for for years. Tomorrow night we are going to play for the national championship. Sure, tomorrow's game is a big game. But these guys know that there are about 2 million people in New York that don't really care. We are going to go out and play a baseball game, we are going to play our guts out, but we're not going to put in extra pressure on ourselves.

"On the pitchout in the ninth, it was just a gamble. We would have hit and run in that situation ourselves and we are very similar to them in that respect. It was a gamble and we were lucky enough to hit."

DOUG LITTLE --

"I'm just so happy to be here in this situation. When I came out here they told me that I would be used in a relief role. If it weren't for the guys playing so well Doug Little would have never gotten this chance. I'm just happy for all the guys.

RICHIE LEWIS --

"This is a once in a lifetime situation so you do what you have to do. Doug Little has been saying he is happy for the team. Hey, we wouldn't be here if it weren't for Doug, either. When I come in I've got one job to do. It doesn't matter who I face. I've got to get a strikeout of a popup or a groundout. I just get them any way I can."
