NINE WOULD BE FINE--Florida State (8-1) bids for its ninth victory of the season when it hosts Virginia Tech (7-2) Saturday.

SITE--Doak Campbell Stadium (51,094), Tallahassee, Fla.

KICKOFF--7:00 p.m. EST.

EXPECTED ATTENDANCE--Somewhere in the neighborhood of 50,000. More than 3,000 tickets remained at the start of the week.

RADIO & TV--Florida State's extensive (59 stations) radio network will carry the game throughout most of the southeast. Gene Deckerhoff does the play-by-play with former FSU head coach Bill Peterson (1960-70, 62-42-11) supplying the analytical commentary. Virginia Tech's radio network includes more than 60 stations. Play-by-play is done by Don Lloyd with Rich Haney providing the color.

THE SEASONS--Florida State began the campaign with three straight wins before bowing 10-9 at Miami on September 27. Since the loss, FSU has won five in a row starting with Nebraska (18-14). At the time, Nebraska was ranked third in the country. The following week the Seminoles dumped Pittsburgh (36-22) which was also ranked third at the time. Other teams to fall in the current streak are Boston College (41-7), Memphis State (24-3) and Tulsa (45-2).

Virginia Tech started the season with four consecutive wins. Head coach Bill Dooley watched his club dump Wake Forest (16-7), East Tennessee (35-7), William & Mary (7-3) and James Madison (38-6). The Gobblers then lost a 13-10 verdict at Clemson before pounding Rhode Island (34-7) and Virginia (30-0). Richmond shocked the Hokies, 18-7, two weeks ago but last Saturday Tech rebounded with a 34-11 win over West Virginia.

LAST WEEK--Florida State, with the knowledge that two of the four teams ahead of it in the top 20 had been beaten, smashed Tulsa, 45-2, thanks to an offense that accumulated 444 yards and a defense that yielded just 160. Junior quarterback Rick Stockstill led the Tribe to a 21-2 halftime advantage with a 13 of 16 passing performance in the first 30 minutes. Overall, he completed 14 of 18 for 171 yards while tailback Sam Platt was rushing for 113, the fifth time this season he has gained more than 100 in a game. Linebacker Reggie Herring spearheaded the defensive effort with 11 tackles, including two for loss.

Virginia Tech trailed 3-0 before Mike Scharnus intercepted a Mountaineer pass and returned the ball 44 yards for a TD. It was the first time since 1975 Tech has returned an interception for a score. Tech then built up a 27-3 lead before West Virginia could score again. Tailback Cyrus Lawrence rushed 30 times for 173 yards and a TD against WVU while quarterback Steve Casey was completing 15 of 22 passes for 126 yards. Two of his passes resulted in interceptions, but three were for TDs.

THE SERIES--Florida State has played Virginia Tech more times than any other school in the country. The Seminoles and Gobblers have met 24 times with FSU currently holding a 13-10-1 series advantage. FSU has been the winner in each of the last four meetings starting in 1976 with a 28-21 win. In 1977 the Tribe won 23-21, the following season it was 24-14 and last year before a regional TV audience the Garnet and Gold escaped Blacksburg with a 17-10 win.

THE LAST TIME--In a battle of unbeaten independents, Florida State overcame a 7-0 deficit to trip Virginia Tech, 17-10, in a game televised regionally by ABC-TV from Blacksburg. Tech went ahead 7-0 in the first quarter but FSU tied the count early in the second on a 16-yard run by tailback Greg Ramsey and a Davey Cappelen PAT. Later in the quarter, the Seminoles put together an 80-yard scoring march that took 14 plays. Four times in the drive FSU converted on third down plays and the last time it produced six points--an 18-yard pass from QB Jimmy Jordan to receiver Jackie Flowers. The second half produced nothing but a pair of field goals. Florida State's three points came on a 20-yard field goal by Cappelen with 1:07 remaining in the third quarter.

THE COACHES--Since Bobby Bowden (Samford '52) has taken command of the Florida State football program, the Tribe has rolled to a 42-13. That is quite a feat when one realizes that in the first season, FSU was 5-6 and started the campaign 0-3. The Tribe has lost just twice in its last 24 games. In the last three years, Bowden has taken FSU to two bowl appearances (1977 Tangerine and 1980 Orange). Bowden last year was cited by ABC-TV and Chevrolet as its Division I-A Coach of the Year for the second time in three seasons. This is the third head coaching stop for the Birmingham, Ala., native. He was previously at Samford (31-6) and West Virginia (42-26). His overall coaching mark is now 115-45 through last week's Tulsa win. The victory total at the start of the current season (107-44) ranked 10th among active head coaches in I-A. The percentage (.709) was 11th among I-A and I-AA head coaches.

Bill Dooley (Mississippi State '54) is in his third season of rebuilding the Virginia Tech football program. He took the Hokies to a 9-13 record in the first two years, but has assured Virginia Tech of its first winning season since 1976 with the Hokies' 7-2 start this year. Dooley went to Virginia Tech after serving as head coach at North Carolina for 11 seasons. He transformed the Tarheel program from doormat of the Atlantic Coast Conference to a national power. His Tarheel teams went to bowl games six of his last eight years there and in the time that Dooley had four classes of his own players at Carolina, his teams won 59 games, lost 33 and tied two. At the start of the current season, his overall record was 78-66-2 and placed him among the top 20 active coaches in the country.

PERFECT BOWDEN--Saturday will mark the eighth time a Bobby Bowden coached-team has matched up vs. Virginia Tech and the Seminole mentor has yet to suffer defeat. He had a 3-0 mark at West Virginia and is 4-0 with FSU, winning 28-21 in 1976, 23-21 in 1977, 24-14 in 1978 and 17-10 last season.

THE CAPTAINS--The Seminoles, at start of the season, elected captains for the year. Offensively the honor goes to guard Greg Futch (70) and tackle Ken Lanier (72). Nose-guard Ron Simmons (50) and linebacker Reggie Herring (39) are in charge of the defense. Virginia Tech elects game captains.

TRIBE, HOKIES IN TALLAHASSEE--FSU and Virginia Tech will be playing in Tallahassee for the 15th time since the 1955 season. FSU has a 10-4 advantage in games played in the Florida state capital and has won the last two--1976 and 1978. The last Tech victory here came in 1974--56-21. That was the season FSU won just one of its 11 starts.

SEMINOLES AT HOME--FSU has now won 14 consecutive home games. The Tribe winning streak dates back to the 1978 season when Houston took a 27-21 victory on September 30. The home win streak includes five games this season.

BOWDEN IN DOAK--Doak Campbell Stadium has served Seminole head coach Bobby Bowden well since he took over the FSU program. The Tribe mentor has a 22-4 record at home in that time with two of the losses coming in the first year--33-26 to Florida and 15-12 to Clemson. Miami won 23-17 in 1977 and Houston had its win in '78.

BREAKING DOAK DOWN MORE--Here are more tidbits about how friendly Doak Campbell Stadium has been to the Seminoles. Dating back to the last two homes games of the '76 season the Seminoles have won 21 of 23 games. And, taking it another step, wins have come in 15 of the last 16 home dates.

NO PLACE LIKE HOME--For Florida State, there is really no better place to play than Tallahassee. The Tribe has won impressively in its last six home starts. In fact, the scoring margin is 303-55, or an average of 50.5 to 9.2. For the record, the scores have been: Memphis State (final game of 1978 at home, 66-17), Louisville (52-0), East Carolina (63-7), Pittsburgh (36-22), Boston College (41-7) and Tulsa (45-2).

PLATT TOPS 100 AGAIN--Sam Platt, for the fifth time this season has rushed for more than 100 yards. His final totals vs. Tulsa showed 23 carries for 113 yards, raising his season totals to 846 yards in 191 carries. Platt has now matched Larry Key's five 100-yard performances of 1977.

MORE ABOUT PLATT--Just in case you wondered. Platt's present rushing total (846) is the fourth best ever for a Seminole in a single season. The all-time high is held by Larry Key, 1,117 yards in 1977. Key is trailed by Mark Lyles (1,011 in 1979) and Hodges Mitchell (944 in 1972). The total carries also ranks fourth behind the same three individuals--Key (239), Lyles (225) and Mitchell (192).

TIED FOR 10th--One more Platt item. His five touchdowns this season bring him to 14 on the career list. That ties him with Fred Pickard (1957-59) for the 10th spot on the all-time listing.

NEW POINT MARK--With his fourth extra point vs. Tulsa last Saturday, Seminole kicker Bill Capece set a new single season scoring record for FSU. The old mark of 86 was held by wide receiver Barry Smith since the 1972 season. Capece, with two regular season games still remaining, has now scored 92 this season. Those totals include 20 of 26 field goals and 32 of 32 PATs. In the extra point category, he is now 34 of 34 for his career. In addition to his total this year, he booted two in last season's game vs. Florida.

MORE ABOUT CAPECE--Seminole kicker Bill Capece is still taking aim at several NCAA records. He needs three more field goals to set a new NCAA record--the old mark is 22 held by Penn State's Matt Bahr since the 1978 season. Capece is also within six points of establishing a new NCAA record for points scored by a kicker. Bahr set the record (97) during the 1977 season when he kicked 22 field goals and 31 PATs.

FOR COMPARISON--This is how Platt has five times gone over the 100-yard rushing mark this season: Louisville (107), East Carolina (130), Pittsburgh (123), Memphis State (188) and Tulsa (113). And this is the way Key did it in 1977: Kansas State (120), Oklahoma State (127), Auburn (170), Memphis State (110) and Florida (143). The 170 Key yards vs. Auburn was the school single game record until it was broken with Platt's 188-yard effort vs. Memphis State. Both Key's Auburn game and Platt's Memphis State effort were road games for the Seminoles.

FOURTH QUARTER WHITEWASH--FSU has enjoyed a tremendous effort in the fourth quarter this season, especially on defense where the opponents are yet to score. In those final 15 minutes, the Seminoles have a 79-0 scoring advantage through the first nine games.

ABOUT STOCKSTILL--When this season started, one of the major question marks for the FSU coaching staff surrounded the quarterback situation. Gone were Jimmy Jordan and Wally Woodham, who had shared the starting duties for three years. But, junior Rick Stockstill from Fernandina Beach has certainly eased the worry. Through nine games, Stockstill has now completed 102 of 167 passes, a completion rate of 61 percent. Eleven (11) of those tosses have been for TDs and five have been intercepted. Overall, the 102 completions have gone for 1,119 yards. Now, to make a comparison--the throwing percentage for Jordan and Woodham last season was 58.3 and 52.6, respectively. Jordan had 87 completions and Woodham 80. Combined, they threw for 18 touchdowns--13 Jordan and five Woodham but they were also picked off 17 times--14 Jordan and three Woodham. Jordan threw for 1,173 yards in 11 games while Woodham picked up 940 through the air in 10.

TOUGH TECH DEFENSE--Florida State's offense will need to deal with one of the nation's outstanding defenses when Virginia Tech invades Doak Campbell. Prior to its game with West Virginia last week, the Gobblers ranked third (216.2 yards per game) in total defense, third in scoring defense (7.6 ppg.), ninth in passing defense (96.9 yards per game) and ninth in rushing defense (105.5 yards per game).

TOUGH TWO--Florida State's remaining two opponents in the '80 regular season are sporting impressive credentials. Virginia Tech is checking in this week with a 7-2 mark while state rival Florida has gone 6-1 and is a contender for the Southeastern Conference championship.

MORE ABOUT FOES--Florida State's 11 opponents this season are sporting a glossy cumulative report card. Overall, the foes have compiled a 54-33 mark, but when you subtract the 1-8 mark vs. the Seminoles it becomes a shiny 53-26. Only two of the opponents this season have a record that is less than .500. Nebraska, Pittsburgh and Florida each have just one loss.

SCORING RECORD IN SIGHT--Through nine games this fall, the Tribe has already scored 304 points. That puts FSU just 16 points shy of establishing a new team scoring record for a single season. The present standard is 319 set by last year's 11-0 Orange Bowl squad.

MORE ABOUT SEMINOLE WINS--Over its last 47 games, dating back to the final three games of the 1976 season, Florida State has compiled a record of 40-7. The mark over the last 34 games is 29-5 and includes the final game of the 1977 season and the Tangerine Bowl victory over Texas Tech, 40-17.

WHAT THE PLAYERS SAY...

DB JAMES HARRIS--"We were ready to play, but when the Alabama and UCLA scores were announced last Saturday it gave our entire team a lift. I looked at Coach Stanton (Jack, defensive coordinator) when the scores were announced and he just shook his head. He's always preaching to the defense that any team can beat another and this weekend that was sure true.

"I think we can stay away from the upset. Our seniors are giving this team great leadership.

"VPI seems to have a good football team. I know their running game is sound and apparently the quarterback (Steve Casey) improves each week as a passer.

"This defense always has room for improvement, but we played very well against Tulsa. Tulsa was a good football team but we were ready to play."

LB RON HESTER--"Tulsa was quick, but not very big. That quarterback (Kenny Jackson) had to be the best athlete on the team.

"I feel the loss to Miami opened our eyes--we now know we can be beat. When we lost to Miami we came back to earth. We now play with the thought that anyone can beat us. We know that no team will lay down against us.

"When I'm sitting the bench, I know I'll get in sooner or later, hopefully sooner. As long as I get to play it doesn't really matter if I'm starting. I don't want to take for granted that I'll start next season, but I think I have a good chance. I'm more at ease now playing linebacker. Things are starting to fall in place. Each week I learn more and more about the position."

WR HARDIS JOHNSON--"When I heard those scores from the Alabama and UCLA games it got me going. I knew we could be at least third in the nation. Something just came over everybody. We wanted to win by a big margin.

"The touchdown pass I caught we call 88. I run straight to the outside while the defender is inside of me and Stock (QB Rick Stockstill) just lays the ball in my hands.

"I think I've been improving as a receiver in every game. I've been playing more lately and I'm getting a better feeling. We've established a better running game this year which doesn't bother me. In fact, I think it has probably opened up our passing game.

"Rick Stockstill is a very good quarterback. He's smart and will do the things it takes to win.

"This team is better than last year's team that lost to Oklahoma. Twice we've beaten the third ranked team. That tells me something."

WHAT BOBBY SAYS...

ABOUT TULSA WIN--"Everything seemed to jell. The offense had one of its better games of the season and the defense played like it has all season--very well. I don't know where we would be without the defense playing as well as it has.

"I know that our offense played well when I look at that stat sheet and see we only punted one time. That is a pretty good indication that your offense has control of the football game. Our offensive line for the second straight week did a good job. They seem to be coming around. We aren't always in need of a big play any more."

ABOUT DEFENSE--"In some ways, I'm getting a little scared. You know these guys haven't played a bad game the entire season. We're due for something to happen. I just hope we can get through this week okay and then we've got the open date. They will then get some time to rest."

ABOUT QB RICK STOCKSTILL--"Rick has become a good college quarterback. He doesn't get us in trouble with mistakes. Wasn't it something the way he guided the team in the first half last Saturday? Rick is a take charge player and is smart enough to do just what we practice during the week. He isn't one to try and improvise in the middle of the ball game."

ABOUT VIRGINIA TECH--"Anyone can look at the series between these two schools and know they play us tough. Heck, the last four times we've played the difference has been just 10 points. One time the game was decided by two and twice by seven."

"Our players know they will need to play another good game. If not we will go the way Alabama, UCLA, North Carolina and Baylor went last Saturday. Hopefully we won't have to get another first-hand less in the word upset."

"I can't tell you why Virginia Tech always plays well against us. But, for some reason, it appears this is always the biggest game on their schedule."

"One thing I know about a Bill Dooley-coached team. It will not beat itself. They make very few mistakes because the offense is designed for them to keep the ball. Our defense is going to have a rough time of it."

ABOUT POLLS--"I'll let the writers (AP) and coaches who vote in the UPI poll decide where we should be. I do believe we must move up. Remember, we paid our dues early with Miami, Nebraska and Pitt. Now some of those other folks are having to pay their dues and they're not coming out very well. It should be very tough for those pollsters to overlook those wins over Nebraska and Pitt."

ABOUT BOWLS--"With the type of wins we've been getting the last couple of weeks I wouldn't think we've hurt ourselves. I know it's going to be a difficult thing for those bowl committees to pick the proper teams on November 15. Getting into a major bowl is always tougher for an independent like FSU because we don't have the league affiliation that carries political clout. Still we must be in good shape."

ABOUT INJURIES--"I kind of wish we had the week off now, but it doesn't work out that way. Our kids will need to play with some pain and the bumps and bruises they've picked up over the last several weeks. You know I don't like talking about injuries. It only looks like you're looking for an excuse when the team gets beat. Every team gets injuries, the ones with a winning record are ones with depth. I would like to think this team has pretty good depth."

ABOUT RON SIMMONS--"Ole Ron played pretty dad gum good on Saturday against Tulsa. This has been a tough season for him, but when Ron has been in the game we've had nothing less than 100 percent from him. He seemed to be quicker than he has been all year in the Tulsa game. We need to have Ron Simmons in the lineup. The defense has proven it can play without Ron, but that defense is so much better with him in the lineup."

ANOTHER VIRGINIA TECH PLAYER TO WATCH...

QB STEVE CASEY--(No. 7, 5-10, 198, Jr., Towanda, Pa.)--was a part-time starter as a freshman and took over full-time during the '79 season. This season he has carried the ball 58 times for 113 yards and one score. His completion percentage is 58.3 with 88 connections in 151 attempts for 1,022 yards. He has thrown for an equal number of interceptions and touchdowns--11. Already in his career he has passed for 3,119 yards.

SEMINOLE TOP 20 RANKING--With Alabama and UCLA both losing last weekend, there is an outstanding possibility Florida State will advance in both the Associated Press and United Press International polls this week. The Tribe was fifth in both of the Top 20s last week. The highest ranking ever for an FSU team has been fourth. That came in both polls prior to last season's Orange Bowl. The Seminoles finished sixth (Associated Press) and eighth (United Press International) in last season's final polls.

TECH TRAVEL PLANS--The Gobblers' team and official party will arrive in Tallahassee at mid-afternoon Friday. During the Tallahassee stay, they will headquarter at the Holiday Inn, Apalachee Parkway (904/877-3141).

PLAYERS TO WATCH...

FLORIDA STATE

NG RON SIMMONS--(No. 50, 6-1, 240, Sr., Warner Robins, Ga.)--has been slowed by an ankle injury the entire season, but opponents still are double-teaming him on nearly every play. The 1979 Consensus All-American sprained his ankle during the first quarter at LSU and missed the remainder of that game plus the entire Louisville and East Carolina contests. He was a member of every pre-season All-America team and is a leading candidate for consensus honors again this season. Ron, who still has two more regular season games left in his college career, is the most honored player in FSU history. He's only the third player to ever earn Consensus A-A honors at FSU. Last year he finished higher than any other lineman in the Heisman Trophy voting, placing ninth. He was also a semifinalist for the Lombardi Award.

CB BOBBY BUTLER--(No. 21, 5-11, 185, Sr., Delray Beach, Fla.)--following the Pittsburgh victory, the Panther coaching staff called Butler "the best cornerback in America." Normally the opposing coaching staff will throw to the side opposite Butler, who usually draws the other team's best receiver in man-to-man coverage. Butler has developed a speciality for blocking kicks, already coming up with two this season to run his career total to seven.

OT KEN LANIER--(No. 72, 6-4, 260, Sr., Columbus, Ohio)--is the veteran of the Seminoles' offensive line. He has been a starter since the second game of his freshman season. Many observers--pro scouts--seem to think he will be among the first 12 players selected in this year's draft. Like punter Rohn Stark, he's also a member of Florida State's track and field team. Ken holds the school record in the shot put and has been the Metro Conference champion the last two years in the event.

P ROHN STARK--(No. 3, 6-3, 195, Jr., Fifty Lakes, Minn.)--with placekicker Bill Capece, he forms what many believe is the country's top kicking tandem this season. Through nine games, he has kicked 44 times for a 45.8 average, second best in the country last week. His longest punt was for 67 yards vs. Pittsburgh. A two-sport athlete, he also participates with the track and field team where he is a decathlon competitor. Rohn has hopes of making the next Olympic team in that event.

VIRGINIA TECH

TB CYRUS LAWRENCE--(No. 45, 5-9, 198, So., Franklin, Va.)--started last week's play ranked ninth in the nation for rushing with an average of 121.6 yards per game. He has now carried 212 times for 1,024 yards while missing the Rhode Island game and portions of the Clemson and Richmond contests. Seven of his carries have resulted in touchdowns. Already his name is in the Virginia Tech record book with most attempts (40) vs. Virginia this season and a new total yardage figure for a freshman last year (791).

DT PADRO PHILLIPS (No. 94, 6-4, 233, So., Hampton, Va.)--is the Gobblers leading tackler with 71 for the season--44 solo and 27 more assists. Included in those totals are 11 tackles for loss. His baptism for college football came last fall when the Hokies visited No. 1 Alabama.
