Florida State's football program bids goodbye today to 15 seniors who have contributed more than their share the last few years to the Tribe's success. That group consisting of Tom Bran-

That group consisting of Tom Brannon, Sam Childers, Jarvis Coursey, Garry Futch, James Gilbert, James Harris, Ron Hester, Scott McLean, Mark Rodrique, Ernie Sims, Rohn Stark, Rick Stockstill, Barry Voltapetti, Michael Whiting and Phil Williams will be playing their final game in Doak Campbell Stadium.

It will be a structure they will never forget. It has been the scene of both good and bad times, mostly good, for this group that in the last four seasons has participated in a 35-9 showing on the gridiron. Many of those victories came right here, but there have also been memorable wins on the road. They won't forget the win at Nebraska in '80, or the back-to-back victories this fall at Ohio State and Notre Dame.

Also filed away in the memory bank are the successive trips to Miami's Orange Bowl.

Today, however, for at least three hours those memories will be taking a back seat. Quite possibly this test with Southern Mississippi will be one the Class of '81 will remember forever.

The setting is perfect for the final game of the seniors' career. They couldn't ask for a better matchup. This promises to be one of the finest games played here in the last four seasons.

It can't be anything but a headliner. Iust consider the facts—

(1) The teams are ranked in the Top 20 of both wire service polls. USM is 10th according to United Press International and 14th by Association Press. FSU has a 19th place showing on the UPI listing and is 20th according to the AP.

(2) The match up has been selected for broadcast by ABC-TV. It will go to a regional network that will blanket the southeast. The Seminoles will be trying to make up for their showing on regional TV last week when they lost a 27-19 verdict to Miami before the ABC-TV

cameras. Southern Mississippi in its first appearance of the season, will be trying to impress the viewers and show that the 13-13 deadlock with Alabama and the 7-6 victory over Mississippi State were not flukes.

(3) A bowl bid hangs in the balance for the Garnet and Gold. A victory will assuredly send the Tribe somewhere in the post-season. A loss could mean these seniors will be playing their last college game against arch-rival Florida in two weeks. It can be assumed that the Golden Eagles have already clinched a post-season visit with their sparkling record. The only question seems to be where they will spend the holidays.

What is the story with this band of Golden Eagles, who will attempt to deal the Seminoles their second consecutive home loss? If it happens it would be the first time since the '76 campaign FSU has lost two straight at Doak Campbell.

USM head coach Bobby Collins has copied the method of success this season from FSU mentor Bobby Bowden. The Golden Eagles have done their winning behind a solid defense, the same blueprint that boosted FSU to its Orange Bowl dates.

In fact, the USM defensive unit is threatening to replace the Seminoles as the NCAA's defense-against-scoring champion. The honor fell to the Tribe defenders last fall, but current statistics show the Golden Eagles are leading the country, yielding just 6.0 points per contest.

When that figure is broken down it becomes even more impressive. Through eight games Southern Mississippi has given up just 48 points. Only 10 of those markers have come in the second half—seven in the third quarter and three in the fourth.

Remember the 1980 season when the Seminole defenders didn't allow a point in the fourth quarter during the entire regular season? Southern Mississippi



Rohn Stark, All-American man with a plan

He's Rohn Stark, whose specialty is kicking the football for the Florida State

University Seminoles.

He's also the Rohn Stark who dispels the myth that athletes are dumb jocks. He is taking a 15-semester-hour full course load. His grade point average for the past three years is a healthy B-plus and he is working to improve that in this, his final year at Florida State.

Almost sure to be drafted quickly by the pros and with prospects of a lucrative contract in the near future, why should Stark worry about "statistics" or "finance"? Let him tell it: "Sure I hope to play pro ball but I'm looking ahead to the time when I can't play. I figure these four years in college are to get ready for the other 60 years I have to live."

What advice would
Stark give to young people? "Be sure you go to
college and study hard...an
education is your most important
asset...set high standards and
goals for yourself and try to
accomplish them...you can't take it
day by day, you to have a game
plan for life."

Why Florida State instead of a bigger name school he could have chosen after high graduation?

"I'm an independent cuss. I wanted to do my thing. I wanted to go where I wanted to go, not were someone else wanted me to go."

The "where" turned out to be a far piece from his hometown of Fifty Lakes, Minn. He made a trip by way of a visit to Colorado, then back to Fifty Lakes, then to Tallahassee.

"I didn't even know where Florida State was at the time," Stark said. "Since I've been here I have learned that the College of Business is one of the best. I wasn't even thinking of business three years ago. In fact, I had planned to major in physics."

What does he like best about Florida State and Tallahassee?

"The atmosphere on campus and in town keeps you happy. That's where you do a lot of learning. Classes usually last just an hour, but there's a whole lifetime of learning and experience outside the classrooms. Also, the people of Tallahassee are very friendly."

Here is a typical day for Stark this fall: Sleep "late"—till 7 a.m. or so—take his wife (yes, he's very happily married) to work at a downtown law office and be in his first class by 9. After a short break for lunch at the sumptuous team training table, he's in class until 2 p.m. Then it's time to suit up and hit the practice field at 3. Practice usually lasts until 5:30 or 6, then it is time for a shower and dinner, again with his teammates.

He gets home about 6:30 or 7 and all he has to do then is study for these tough courses: Statistics, Real Estate, Financial Investment, Problems in Finance, and Accounting. No crip courses there.

"I usually get to bed about 12 or 12:30. I'm a continued on page 85

night person and can concentrate on my studies best at night.

So, where does that leave time for social life?

There isn't much, especially during football season. but I figure that will come later. It does make for a hectic family life—very unstable—but that will get better with

Almost every comment Stark makes displays his foresight and planning. Hit the books now and be prepared for the "next 60 years." Give up part of his family and social life now to be better prepared and have more time to enjoy it later.

That's the Rohn Stark "game plan" for his future life which he hopes will include having a family.

With the kind of schedule he has, you might think Stark

does nothing during the off season.

Think again! Stark is a decathlete with an average point total of 7,600. An average of 8,000 is world-class and Stark now ranks among the top 10 decathletes in the nation.

He runs the 100 meters in 10.72 seconds (translated to a 9.75 100-yard dash), long jumps 22 feet, shot-puts 51 feet, throws the javelin 190 feet and the discus 155 feet. He high jumps 6-feet-10.5 inches, pole vaults 16-feet-9 inches, runs the 400 meters in 52.2 seconds and the 1500 meters in 4:52 minutes.

For recreation he bowls in the 175 range and plays a respectable game of tennis, when he's not swimming or


water skiing. And, one more thing—he has been a licensed airplane pilot since he was 17. His father is a TWA pilot.


One sport which has evaded him is golf, for lack of time. He did play once, however, and shot a 94!

Although he likely could succeed in football as a widereceiver, in baseball or basketball—he excelled in all three in high school—Stark enjoys his role as the team punter. His three-year average is 41.5 yards and that includes many shorts ones punted out of bounds, including 23 inside the 20 and five inside the 10-yard lines. He punts an average of 60 times a season; his longest was 72 yards against Miami in 1978 in a regional TV game.

Asked what he would change about his life if he had it to do all over again, Stark hardly hesitated before replying: "I believe I've made all the best choices, including coming to Florida State. I can't think of any other place I'd rather be." For now, that is. Rohn Stark is a young man with a star-studded game plan for the future which

begins with a good education.





James Harris: From Student to Teacher

Last year he was the student. With a solid backfield consisting of Keith Jones, Monk Bonasorte and Bobby Butler—James Harris was the rookie. Harris, a junior in 1980, earned a starting job in a defensive backfield that was considered the best Florida State ever fielded.

With the tutelage of Butler, Jones and Bonasorte, Harris learned how to play defensive back. Although he wasn't spectacular, he did the job. Harris and his teachers held FSU opponents to a paltry 118 yards per game passing and just six touchdown strikes all season in leading the Seminoles to a 10-1 record and a second straight Orange Bowl appearance.

Harris picked off one pass and recorded 47 tackles in his first season as a starter and was called "not great but extremely steady" by FSU defensive back coach lack Stanton.

But that was 1980 and when the Semi-

noles returned to fall camp this August, everything had changed. The names of Butler, Jones and Bonasorte were replaced by the names of Larry Harris, Eric Riley and Harvey Clayton on the Florida State depth chart.

James Harris, with only one full year of experience, was no longer considered the student, he was now the teacher—an awesome responsibility when one considers that his pupils had no varsity experience and would be facing the likes of All-American quarterback candidates Art Schlichter, Dan Marino and Jim Kelly in 1981.

And all through fall training when reporters would ask FSU head coach Bobby Bowden what areas of the 1981 Seminoles concerned him, the first thing mentioned was the lack of experience in the secondary.

Nightmares of being slaughtered by the passing attacks of Ohio State, Pitt, Notre Dame and Miami danced through fans' minds as the season opener with Louisville approached.

But through all the talk about how bad the secondary was going to be, James Harris kept quiet. "Deep down inside I felt we could be a decent secondary," Harris said. "It was just going to be a matter of time. You can't take four guys with a total of one year experience among them, throw them together against our schedule and expect a secondary like the one we had last year to emerge. It was going to take some time."

And although the secondary has experienced some problems, it does deserve some in-depth analysis. Schlichter burned the Seminoles for 458 yards in the Ohio State game...Marino threw for 251 yards in the Pitt game...Alan Risher bombed


away for 312 yards in the LSU game and an unheralded guy by the name of Ronnie Mixon hit for 402 yards in the Western Carolina game.

One look says the FSU secondary has been anything but air tight this year. But wait a minute. Didn't FSU beat Ohio State 36-27 on the road? Wasn't the LSU game a blowout in favor of the Seminoles? Didn't Florida State win the Western Carolina game handily and wasn't Notre Dame held to 38 passing yards on 19 attempts in another big road win?

Under Harris' guidance, FSU's secondary has accounted for nine pass interceptions, 27 broken up passes and six fumble recoveries. The top five defensive backs have also accounted for 199 tackles this season.


Through all of 1981's adversity the leader of the defensive secondary has been Harris. A Gainesville, Fla. native, Harris has decided to lead by example rather than by the vocal cords. From his cornerback spot, Harris has made 49 tackles, broken up six passes, recovered two fumbles, and made one interception. He has also sacked the opponent's quarterback three times for a negative 28 yards.

How valuable is Harris to the FSU secondary? From the results through FSU's nine games, most would call him invaluable. He earned defensive player of the game honors on more than one occasion this season and he was voted as a team captain in the preseason because of the respect his teammates had in his abilities and leadership potential. Harris has responded by laying down the framework for the future of what must be considered a not-so-bad defensive backfield.

Barry Voltapetti Senior/Miami, Fla. Offensive Tackle

Although we've listed Barry Voltapetti as a junior all season long, he is actually a senior and playing his last home game for the Garnet and Gold.

At a press conference earlier this week, a writer asked head coach Bobby Bowden if there were any players who they (the writers) had overlooked in giving publicity to

deserving individuals. It took Bowden only a few seconds before he replied, "Barry Voltapetti".

It's amazing that folks have missed him. At 6-7 and 260 pounds, he stands out on the team, especially when he lines up at offensive tackle. "Barry has had an outstanding season for us," said Bowden. "He has graded out higher than any lineman week in and week out. He's playing better than the guy who played his position last year." Bowden didn't mention who that "guy" happened to be, but it is Ken Lanier, a rookie with the Denver Broncos who was a fourth round pick of that club.

Freshman Greg Allen has come alive with games of back-to-back games of 202, 322 and 109 yards. Much of the credit is due the offensive line. It's a position where there are no stats for the fan to compare performances. But it's an important position and the Seminole's Barry Voltapetti plays it well.

Senior/Clermont, Fla. Defensive End


There's hardly a Saturday that goes by when Scott McLean, #60, hasn't provided the defense with outstanding play. "He's big, he's fast, he's smart and he's a good one," says his coach Jim Gladden, who doesn't have enough superlatives in his vocabulary to describe how he feels about the play of McLean. "He's one of the better

technique players on the team and as good a defensive end as I've coached. That includes Willie Jones (now with the Oakland Raiders)."

McLean had a great game against Miami, despite the Tribe's loss. He was named Tomahawk Player of the Week, an award that goes to the top defensive player each game. McLean was credited with four solo tackles and six assists for a total of 10. More importantly, perhaps, were two solid blocks he threw on punt returns. One of those vicious hits cut down a would-betackler and allowed punt returner Cedric Jones to gain 14 yards. ABC-TV thought enough of the hit to run the replay twice.

On the season, McLean has recorded 53 tackles, fifth on the squad. Three have been behind the line of scrimmage, including a quarterback sack. He has also broken up two passes.

Although this will be Scott McLean's last home game in a Seminole uniform, he leaves a younger brother, John, who may step in to fill his big shoes next year.



Women's Basketball now Fields Veteran Team

After a 14-15 record a year ago, Florida State Head Coach Janice Dykehouse has her top ten players back. While the Seminoles lacked experience last year, that area should be a plus this time around when the squad opens its season Nov. 23 against Stetson in the Leon County Civic Center.


"This is the first time we have more upperclassmen and returning players since I've been here," she says. "Last year we had eight new players on our roster and we fell short of expectations. I attribute a lot of that to the youth of that team. We have the talent, now we just need things to fall in place for us. Each game will be challenging since every team in the nation is now recruiting aggressively and the talent is more widespread."

Sophomore forward Sue Galkantas is the most talked about returning player, and with good reason. As a freshman, the six footer scored at a 21.6 clip—among the nation's top 20 in the category, pulled down almost 10 rebounds a game and found time to hand out 64 assists. She led the Seminoles in scoring in 22 of 29 games and was below double figures in scoring just once. She was named freshman All-America and honorable mention All-America.

Also returning to starting positions are 6-0 senior Laine Lasseter and junior guard Lisa Foglio. Lasseter is the second all-time leading scorer for FSU and returns with averages of 13.1 and 5.6. She was the squad's top shooter, canning 52 percent of her attempts.

Foglio is out 4-6 weeks with torn ligaments in her ankle, but she'll be ready when Florida State gets into the meat of its schedule. She was named all-state after averaging 12.7 points and just over 3.5 assists a year ago.

Three others will be counted on heavily in starting roles or first-off-the-bench roles. LeeVayn Oliver, a sophomore, has won a job at the forward slot. She aver-

aged five points and five rebounds as a freshman. Center Glenda Stokes, the squad's best defensive player, returns with averages of six points and 6.4 rebounds. And guard Sunnie O'Neal will see a lot of action in the backcourt.

Two other letterwinners, Linda Gray and Lynn Marnie, will also be important in the Seminole's depth, while transfers Meg Fahey and Nancy Galkantas will be battling for floor time.

Dykehouse's lone freshman is Joye Burroughs, an all-state player from Belle Glade High School. As soon as Burroughs becomes familiar with the FSU system, her speed and quickness will lend help to the Seminoles in full court pressure situations. Offensively, her penetrating ability adds a new dimension to the Tribe's attack.

While FSU's talent and experience have improved, so has the schedule. Working towards an eventual round robin series within the Metro Conference, FSU has scheduled every Metro school but Cincinnati. Add those games to three major tournaments, the Lady Sunshine Classic, the Purdue Boilermaker Classic and the Hurricane Tourney and Dykehouse's crew has a tough road ahead. We haven't even mentioned the single games with Top 20's Old Dominion and South Carolina.

"We've scheduled more home games with more of a range of talent involved," says Dykehouse. "We have seven double-headers in the new Leon County Civic Center and another six games in Tully Gym."

When Dykehouse took over the program at Florida State, folks considered the Seminoles to be in the top 200 teams around the country. Last year, the top 100 list included Florida State. And this year, in a preseason Street and Smith outloook, FSU is now mentioned in the top 50. This is the direction Janice Dykehouse has in mind for the Florida State program.

Florida State to Hold AIAW Women's Volleyball Nationals

Florida State will host its first women's national championship Dec. 10-12 when the AIAW Volleyball Nationals are held in Tully Gymnasium. The tournament will be a 12-team affair made up of nine region winners and three at-large teams.

"We're very proud to have been chosen to host this championship," said Barbara Palmer, director of women's athletics at Florida State. "We're going to have a great tournament and show our visitors what southern hospitality is." The FSU team, coached by Cecile Reynaud, receives an automatic bid as the host team. This will be the squad's first appearance at the national meet since 1979, when it finished 18th in the nation.

Tickets for the three-day event can be purchased as a tournament package (\$7.00 for adults, \$5.00 for students). Day passes (\$4.00 for adults, \$3.00 for students) are also available as are single game tickets (\$3.00 for adults, \$2.00 for students). Each day will have a morning and afternoon session. Tradition rides high with Renegate

The Marching Chiefs have just departed the field. The crowd is squirming in its seats, balloons poised. All at once, 52,000 people see the Florida State mascot enter the field from the north side. The noise is unbearable from ground level. Responding from a signal no one in the stands sees, the horse and rider, with flaming spear in hand charge onto the field followed by the entire football team. The horse gallops to the far end zone, retreats and returns to the center of the playing surface. Somehow the noise increases. Still on his steed, the rider raises his firebreathing spear to the heavens and plunges it into the Seminole head in front of him. The balloons are released, the crowd is in a frenzy and still another opponent shakes its head, wondering what's going on.

Renegade and Chief Osceola. A horse and an Indian. A mascot. No, much more. Born in 1977 over objections from the FSU administration and ground crew alike, this pregame ritual has made its mark across the nation.

"People identify with animals," said Bill Durham, one of Renegade's founders. "A lot of people have a horse and rider as a mascot, but no one throws a flaming spear. I believe in notoriety and that s what we're selling."

A Florida State graduate, Durham was appointed to the 1962 Homecoming committee his sophomore year and thought the Renegade idea was just what the festivities needed. The FSU administration didn't quite see it that way. When Bobby Bowden arrived on campus in 1976, Durham, along with Kathy Chenoweth and Ed Blanton, approached the new head coach with their scheme.

"FSU needed something besides Sammy Seminole," Durham explained. "Once we lost gymnastics that mascot just died out. We approached Coach Bowden and he thought it would be a neat idea. If it weren't for him and Ann (Bowden), we'd never have the mascot today."

After borrowing a horse in 1977, the group, now with the aid of FRM's Bill Smith and veterinarian Dr. John Freeman, purchased a steed in 1978 and the Renegade lore was born.



While the glamour is certainly part of Renegade's mystique, hard work and hay make the horse ride. The horse is moved every week or so to ensure security, and numerous checks are performed during the week for complete success.

"We have a checklist we go over before each game," Smith said. "We make sure there is feed, hay, a bridle, a saddle, a summer blanket and other odds and ends to make the horse happy. We also need to be sure we have materials for the spear—kerosene, wire, a torch, fire extinguishers and matches. And of course we can't forget the rider."


The rider—Chief Osceola—for the past two seasons has been David Mays. Prior to Mays, Jim Kidder served in the saddle for two seasons. When Mays graduates this year, David Williams of Tallahassee will wear the war paint. Kidder was selected from over 180 applicants who answered an ad in the Flam-

beau, and Mays and Williams were chosen from among the five handlers that accompany Renegade wherever he goes.

"It's a lot of fun—the crowd, the noise, people screaming," Mays said. "But its still a lot of work. I ride Renegade twice a week prior to the game, then on Saturday we have our pre-game set-up about 5 p.m. on the field. We have to get the spear and horse ready and get my makeup on. I don't think people understand the work that's involved. I do love it. Every game is different for me. It's like the first time out on the field. Sometimes I don't even believe it's me riding out there."

Along with his Saturday activities, Mays and Renegade perform at alumni events and social functions.


"People ask us why we don't take Renegade to away games," Durham

said. "First, It's not that easy to transport a horse and all the equipment needed. Second, opposing teams don't want anything there that will help FSU. We always need to ask their permission."

Every action taken in the preparation and execution of the Renegade event are not haphazard, but done according to a specific plan.

"David's makeup is always put on the same way," Durham said. "He never gets off the horse except at the Florida game and he always rides down to the end of the field. He always thrusts his spear into the Seminole head saying, 'this is our turf and we're staking out our territory.' We're building a tradition and tradition comes from doing the same thing."

Tradition. Perfection. Well, not always. In 1978 in an ABC nationally televised game, Kidder was caught in traffic and just barely made it to the stadium on time. To make matters worse, Renegade, "who has a great personality, almost like a dog," reared up for the first time ever at the beginning of a game and took off. Galloping down the field with the team in hot pursuit all appeared fine, except for one detail—the spear was not lighted. Sizing up the situation, Durham raced on the field, passed the team, and reached Renegade at the 30-yard line. The spear was ignited and the show went on. Well, traditions aren't born overnight.

LAST WEEK--Florida State saw Miami destroy the Seminoles' hopes for a major bowl opportunity when the Hurricanes escaped Tallahassee with a 27-19 victory before a crowd of 52,685, the fourth largest in the history of Doak Campbell Stadium. Many of the Seminoles' woes came from the failure of their own kicking game. Two field goal opportunities and an extra point were blocked by Miami, which had two field goals, including a school record 57-yarder from its kicker Dan Miller. The Seminoles had a 13-10 halftime advantage, but saw Miller kick his record-breaker midway through the third quarter. The Hurricanes then came up with a pair of quick touchdowns in the fourth quarter before FSU closed the scorping on a seven-yard pass from quarterback Rick Stockstill to tight end Sam Childers.

Southern Mississippi bounced back from a 6-0 deficit to trip Mississippi State,

7-6. It was the fifth straight win for the Golden Eagles against their in-state rival. The lone Southern Mississippi score came after the Eagles recovered a fumbled punt at the Mississippi State 14-yard line. Sammy Winder, who led the nation in scoring last season, plunged over from the one for the TD and Steve Clark booted the PAT that made the difference.

THE SERIES--FSU and Southern Mississippi met for the first time in 1952. This will be the 16th meeting between the two and the Seminoles enjoy an 8-6-1 advantage and have won the last six games, dating back to the 1964 season.

LAST METING--The two southern independents last met in the opening game of the 1979 season when the Seminoles pulled out a last quarter 17-14 victory. USM started the final quarter with a 14-3 advantage but the Seminole speciality teams came to the rescue. FSU got its first break with slightly more than 11 minutes remaining when defensive back Monk Bonasorte blocked a punt and the Tribe took possession at the visitors' 15. Three plays later, Jimmy Jordan tossed an eight-yard scoring pass to Jackie Flowers. A two-point conversion pass failed. USM stalled in its next drive and was forced to punt. Seminole safety Gary Henry fielded the kick at his 35 and returned it for the winning TD.

THE COACHES--Bobby Bowden (Samford '52) is two games short of completing his sixth regular season at FSU. In that time, he has posted a 50-17 record. With his previous stops at Samford (1959-62) where he was 31-6 and West Virginia, (1970-75) where the Mountaineers went 42-26, he now has a career log of 123-49 at the major college level. Bowden has taken the Seminoles to three bowl appearances since coming to FSU. The Tribe beat Texas Tech, 40-17, in the 1977 Tangerine Bowl and has lost to Oklahoma in the 1930 and 1981 Orange Bowls by scores of 24-7 and 18-17, respectively. Last season the Seminoles advanced to second in both wire service polls at the conclusion of the regular season and finished fifth after the bowl games were played. FSU is 31-6 in its last 37 games with Bowden. He has twice won National Coach of the Year honors--1979 ABC-TV/Chevrolet and 1980 Bobby Dodd. In two of his five years, he was the Associated Press Southern Independent Coach of the Year. Prior to the start of the current season, Bowden ranked sixth among active coaches with a minimum 10 years as a Division I-A coach for winning percentage. The total victories was ninth among active coaches in Division I-A.

total victories was ninth among active coaches in Division I-A.

Bobby Collins (Mississippi State '55) is in his seventh year at Southern
Mississippi and currently shows a record of 46-28-2. The Southern Mississippi post
is the first for Collins as a head coach, but he went to USM after eight seasons at
North Carolina where he headed up the offense for five and defense for three. The
former Mississippi State quarterback was an assistant at four other schools before
going to UNC. Last season he ushered USM to its first post-season bowl invitation
in nearly a quarter of a century and the school's first-ever post-season victory.

BOWDEN VS. COLLINS--Seminole mentor Bobby Bowden sports a perfect 4-0 mark in meetings against Bobby Collins. Bowden has guided his teams to wins in 1976 (30-27), 1977 (35-6), 1978 (38-16) and 1979 (17-14).

FSU VS. USM IN TALLY--This marks the eighth meeting between the schools in Tallahassee. The Seminoles enjoy a 5-2 winning margin in these games and have won the last three--(1964, 34-0), 1976 (30-27) and 1979 (17-14).

CLOSE GAMES COMMON IN TALLY--The Seminoles and Golden Eagles seem to make a habit of playing close games in Tallahassee. Four of the previous six games have been decided by three points or less. These include a pair of one point verdicts for FSU--19-18 in 1954 and 20-19 in 1956--and three point decisions in the last two games, 30-27 in 1976 and 17-14 in 1979.

TIGHT SERIES--The results of the previous 15 games--an 8-6-1 advantage for FSU, indicate a tight series and so does the combined score for the games. FSU holds a 257-248 scoring advantage after the first 15 games--a difference of less than a point per contest.

BOWDEN CLOSE AND EASY--In his four meetings with USM since coming to FSU, Tribe mentor Bobby Bowden has had close and easy victories. The first and fourth had three point differences while the second and third were decided by 29 and 22 points. In the 1976 game, the Seminoles trailed 27-10 at the start of the fourth quarter and came back with 20 points in a span of 7:23 to capture a 30-27 victory.

HOVE STREAK ENDS--Miami's win in Doak Campbell Stadium last Saturday ended a 19-game home winning streak for the Seminoles. Until the Hurricanes win, there had not been a visiting team win at the Tribe's home facility since September 30, 1978, when Houston captured a 27-21 verdict.

CREC CAN BE FIRST--Seminole freshman tailback Greg Allen of Milton, Fla., can become the first FSU back to ever rush in four consecutive games for 100 yards if he can accomplish the feat against Southern Mississippi. Sam Platt had three straight 100-yard efforts last season--Memphis State (188), Tulsa (113) and Virginia Tech (103). Allen went for 109 yards last Saturday against Miami to go over 100 for the third consecutive game. In his first collegiate start vs. LSU on Oct. 24, he went for 202 and the following Saturday (Oct. 31) vs. Western Carolina he raced for 322, an NCAA record for a freshman.

TAKING A FIFTH--The loss to Miami marked only the fifth time in Bobby Bowden's FSU coaching tenure the Seminoles have led at intermission and been beaten. With the exception of 1979, it has happened once each season.

TRIBE IN DOAK CAMPBELL--Florida State enjoys a healthy advantage when it plays in Doak Campbell Stadium. Records show that since Bobby Bowden took over the program in '76, the Seminoles sport a 27-5 record with two of the losses coming in the first season. Dating back to the final two games of the first Bowden season, FSU has won 25 of its last 26 games and 19 of the last 21.

THREE'S IMPOSSIBLE--Florida State's season has run in cycles. The Seminoles have managed to win two straight three times, but have been unable to get the third win. The Tribe opened the season with two wins--Louisville and Memphis State-before bowing to Nebraska. Wins over Ohio State and Notre Dame followed before the loss to Pitt. Then came wins against LSU and Western Carolina before last week's defeat to Miami.

USM TRYING TO REPLACE SEMINOLES—Last season Florida State led the nation in scoring defense, yielding just 7.7 points per game. Southern Mississippi has a good chance to replace FSU in that category since they are giving up just 6.0 points per game through their first eight. They lead the nation in the category and have better than a one point edge on the second place school.

MORE ABOUT USM DEFENSE--The Golden Eagle defense resembles the '80 Seminoles in other ways. USM has given up just three points in the fourth quarter this season. Last year FSU during the regular season didn't yield a point in the final 15 minutes. USM has given up seven points in the third quarter where FSU gave up 21 last season. Overall, the Golden Eagles have a 60-10 scoring advantage in the second half.

SEMINOLE CONTRAST--Now, if you want to draw a comparison. In the fourth quarter this season, FSU has given up 64 points, more than Southern Mississippi has given up for the entire year, four quarters combined.

SEMINOLES DRAWING CROWDS—With a capacity crowd expected again Saturday, FSU seems assured of establishing a new average attendance record for Doak Campbell Stadium. The best per game average is the 51,628 for seven home games last fall. But in four games this season, FSU is averaging 51,899, more than 200 better than last year. The Western Carolina and Miami attendance figures rank as the third and fourth best in the history of Doak Campbell Stadium.

STOCK NEARING '80 FIGURES--FSU's senior quarterback Rick Stockstill is nearing his passing yardage figures for the 1980 season. Rick needs just 115 yards in two games to equal his junior year output of 1,377. He has thrown for 1,262 this fall with 117 completions in 212 attempts. He needs just four more completions to match last year's total and four more TD passes this season would equal his '80 figures in that category.

SCORING CONSISTENCY--FSU has been a model of consistency in scoring by quarters this fall. The Tribe has scored no less than 50 points (first quarter) and no more than 58 (third) in each period. In the second and fourth quarter, the Garnet and Gold has scored the same, 57.

WHAT BOBBY SAYS...

"WE got the heck beat out of us. They beat us in every phase—offense defense and kicking game. I don't know what's wrong with us. We got beat in every aspect of the game. They're a heck of a football club. They ran harder, passed better, beat us up front. I didn't see anything good out hhere. I haven't sat through a game like this in a long time. Right now I'm embasrassed. And I was embarrassed in the first quarter. They're good but we're a lot better than we played tonight. This game reminded me of the Miami game in 1976. We couldn't stop them. You can't stop somebody when XXXXXX your offense has to match them. After their third TD, we were out of our game plan."

Head Coach-Southern Mississippi Bobby Collins

"This was with out a doubt the finest performance of any team since I've been coaching. We had exceptional play on both sides of the ball and out kicking game was also excellent. If there's a better quarterback in the country than Reggie Collier, I'd pay money to see him. He can run KX like no one can.
