Gators net 6-3 victory over FSU at Tully Gym

Florida State's tennis team grabbed two of the three "key matches," coach Randy Jobson said it must win for a victory o v e r Florida, but the more experienced Gators prevailed 6-3 over their hosts at Tully courts Saturday afternoon.

No. 2 Seminole Clive Rothwell, winner of last week's Garnet and Gold Tournament, took Dave Pressly apart 6-4, 6-2 in one "must match" to the point that his Gator foe was helpless much of the second set.

Already down 4-1 in team points, Florida State received a big lift from sophomore Dave Calvert at No. 5. when the lanky netter pounced on Mike Borling's every shot in a deciding third set. Knowing that Jobson is counting on his singles point each time for a successful FSU season. Calvert went for winners only with his topspin forehand, scoring time and again for the 6-3, 4-6, 6-2 win.

in the second set, but the Seminole freshman from Brazil couldn't keep Chap Brown from running around his booming forehand and dropped a 6-2, 7-5 decision that was needed to knot the

The featured match between FSU's Gordon Jones and Florida's Juan Diaz had both encouraging and discouraging moments for Seminole fans, who packed the stands. Behind 7-5, 5-3 with Diaz serving, Jones gutted out a long game for a break and a chance to tie the score with his own serve. However, following the pattern of the match, Jones failed to force his opponent with volleyed, low service returns. Diaz easily passed Jones, who appeared cautious and lacking the aggressiveness of several weeks ago, several times to break back for the match.

John Kunnen defeated Enrique Andrade of FSU in two close sets at No. 4 and Gator Jim Oescher blasted Andre Cantin 6-2, 6-0 in less than 45 minutes.

The Gators were almost assured of

turning his No. 3 singles match around stretching their early season mark to 2-0 as they went into the doubles with a 4-2 lead. Chances of a Seminole sweep in doubles were slim, but Schmidt and Calvert, who have never lost to Jones and Rothwell, their one and two teammates in singles, made Pressly-Diaz play a rubber set before succumbing 7-5, 4-6, 6-3,
