What lies ahead is most important . . . as the future always is. But the Gator Bowl past will indeed be a hard act to follow.



THE MAGNIFICENT SEMINOLES


After watching Florida State's last 101 games, I consider the Gator Bowl Seminoles not only the finest team in the school's history, but also one of the best and most exciting in 1964 college football.

Florida State parlayed a most exciting "bomb," a bruising running game and "The Seven Magnificents" to post its totally unexpected 8-1-1 record and become one of the most talked-about teams in sports. FSU's offense ranks among the most exciting and paralyzing in bowl game action because a touchdown can come with breath-taking suddenness. Quarterback Steve Tensi, a national back of the week in the 1964 season, can throw a football an unbelievable distance and flanker back Fred Biletnikoff, an All-American, ranks as probably the best receiver in college ranks.

The "Seven," a line which specialized in wrecking the other team's offense, is led by a middle guard Jack Shinholser, one of football's quickest and most aggressive linemen.

Veteran observers of Florida State football had no inkling the 1964 team would turn into one of the best in the sport. The Seminoles figured to be good, but not among the nation's best. But, it did not take long to see the handwriting on the wall as FSU jumped off to five straight triumphs and the team's followers knew they had a winner.


Florida State is exciting both on offense and defense. This post season attraction is the Seminoles' big moment, and the team is most dangerous at such times.



An aerial view taken of Florida State's Doak S. Campbell Stadium seating approximately 40,500 people.




Florida State's Phil Spooner (27) stopped after a 6 yard pickup. Florida State lost to V.P.I. 20-11.

Oklahoma's Sooners overcame a slow start, losing three of their first four games, to finish the regular season with a 6-3-1 record. Most of OU's veteran players were inconsistent in the early rugged tests against Southern California, Texas and Kansas. The Sooners muffed nine of their 23 lost fumbles in those games and gained only 170 yards rushing, normally Oklahoma's strong point, in only one of the contests.

But the Sooners changed to the two-platoon system after the second game, overcame some minor injuries and weaker foes to gain some confidence.

OU coaches decided to use Bobby Page, 1963 quarterback starter who did not play until the second half of the fifth game this season, and the offense began to move.

The Sooners hit a season peak by beating Big Eight Conference champion and fourth-ranked Nebraska, 17-7. Oklahoma has played in ten bowls, won seven.
