




Florida State University, founded in 1857, is in the process of making new and important responses to the needs of its 19,500 students and to the problems which confront the state and nation.

A major change in the academic structure of the University is in progress and will continue throughout the year ahead. The decision to reorganize and redistribute colleges, schools and departments into six major academic divisions is the result of a year-long self study made last year by faculty, staff, students and administrators. The primary conclusions called for a regrouping of academic disciplines to meet the demands of new social, economic, scientific and environmental problems of the nation.

That such change is possible is one of the key factors in the University's reputation as a nationally competitive pacesetter in graduate research and undergraduate instruction.

Currently graduating more than 5,000 students each year, Florida State offers more than 50 doctoral programs and more than 80 master's and baccalaureate fields of study. These are encompassed within the schools and colleges of Arts and Sciences, Business, Education, Home Economics, Social Work, Social Sciences, Library Science, Communications, Law, Music, Nursing, and the Fine and Performing Arts, which comprise four of the six new divisions. The other two divisions–Educational Services and Graduate Studies and Research—provide leadership for the University's libraries, continuing education, overseas and instructional research and service programs; and the University's major research centers, institutes and facilities, and the Graduate School.

A CAMPUS "ON THE GROW"



Florida State's constant growth means a changing skyline on the campus as its boundaries continue to expand westward from Westcott Gate. Going up on the sunset side is a new apartment residence hall for undergraduates (see picture at right) at a cost of \$2.4



million. It will be some time before the landmark towers of Westcott are filled in, but workmen are busy with a \$2.2 million project of re-building the insides of the south wing, while preserving the traditional brick towers and walls (left) which hold so much of the University's history. Future construction plans include the first phase of an education complex that will eventually cost some \$9 million, a new school of nursing and expansion of intercollegiate athletic facilities.






JOHN HEGERT

College Football "Plays It Again" Sunday by GRAYLE HOWLETT, NCAA Promotion Director

As it is popularly conceived, the instant replay is a split-screened, isolated, slo-mo, stop-action piece of art which lets you see the play you didn't see a few seconds earlier.

But popular conceptions are far too

confining. An instant replay—in every sense of the term-takes place every Sunday morning on most ABC stations. It even has a name—ABC College Football Highlights Show.

Putting the Sunday morning highlights show together is a game in itself; and when you consider that the "working day" in Chicago for the show is 11 p.m. Saturday until 11 a.m. Sunday, you can bet it's the only game

For at least three members of the Highlights Show team, it's an away game. Dick Snider, director of NCAA Films and executive producer of the show, checks into Chicago Saturday night from his home in Wichita, Kan. Kemper Peacock, the producer-director, journeys from New York; and Bill Flemming, the host, comes from his assignment on ABC's college football telecast of the week.

Snider minimizes his role in the production, but the five-year reign of the show is to his credit. "You know, the whole thing's impossible," he confesses. "The good thing is that we never have time to stop and think about that when we are putting the show together."

Snider's involvement with the show really begins the Monday before. That's when he huddles with ABC executives to determine what games will be fea-

tured.
"We'll film on the average of 12 games a weekend, and then pick the five or six top games. Those games are determined on the importance of the contest, logistics or even if one of the teams has a player everybody would like to see.

"The most important thing about the now," Snider continued, "is getting show," Snider continued, "is getting the film into Chicago. When I get there Saturday night, I contact the cameramen and find out what flights the film's going to be on. Then I make sure that our messengers—who race to O'Hare and Midway airports on motorcycles-get out there and get the film.

Important Motorcycles

"Kemper Peacock has been all over the world and has to be one of the best in the business, Bill Flemming has covered every major sporting event in the world, and I've been around a little, too; but we all are helpless if one of those guys in a helmet and leather jacket can't get his bike started.

In the five years the show has been on the air, only one shipment of film has been lost in transit. "I know the plane schedules into Chicago better than the airlines," says Snider, "but sometimes things go wrong. We had an important game coming in from the South on Piedmont Airlines. It arrived on time, but the messenger didn't, and Piedmont closed down its baggage counter. We had to call Piedmont's home office, get the manager's name

in Chicago, get him out of bed and down to O'Hare."

Kemper Peacock is the head of a production company by the same name. "I know I'm good with deadlines but this is ridiculous," Peacock said as he sat at a desk surrounded by some of his own photography. "It's tough, but we get it done. I work with three editors in Chicago on the show. I'll edit the main game—the one we spotlight-and the rest of the work is parcelled out to the others. We have roughly four hours to do the work . . . and we do it. That's all."

Each cameraman provides a playby-play account of the game with the film. It's up to Peacock to edit the footage into an exciting, five-minute piece. "At 4:30 a.m. we transfer the mate-

rial from film to video-tape and have our first run through. Bill Flemming arrives on the scene between 5:30 and 6 a.m.; and we must have the show completed by 10 a.m. We have roughly three hours to get everything right. We have the edited film and any other features that I might have worked on in New York that we have to get into the show. But, Bill's got to get his nar-ration in; and we have late scores to include. You know, it just might be impossible."

WLS, the ABC affiliate in Chicago, has to have the show by 10 a.m. to insure at least one run through. But, the station has been persuaded to take the show later.

Show Must Go On

"Our record is 10:57," Peacock admitted. "WLS had 'Water Skiing from Cypress Garden' all racked up, ready to run. But, we made it. We've made every show."

The "interior linemen" of the show are the writers. Jeff Elliott, who doubles as the assistant director of the Big Ten Service Bureau, and Kay Schultz, Chicago journalist, spend their time looking over shoulders and getting people out of bed.

"I just try to compile as much information as possible," Elliott explains, "and when you work through the night, that means disturbing some people."

Flemming is the man up front. According to Snider, "He is super. He's one of the few sportscasters who could do this show. He knows the game, and

you can't shake him up."

Flemming smiled at this comment Flemming smiled at this confinent and said, "They do call me 'one-shot Flemming.' Let's face it, that's my strength. I can get the thing done in one take. And fifty per cent of the time, that's all we have time for."

Flemming is on the college football scene every Saturday afternoon working a game for ABC. After the game he hops into his own plane and heads for Chicago.

"Flying my own plane is the only way to do it," says Flemming, "Even so, sometimes I have to leave at halftime, or before, to make it. It's amazing, but I've never been weathered out. I've had some bumpy flights, but Chicago has always been open for me."

Upon arrival in Chicago, Flemming reads the first edition of the Tribune to get a bead on some of the games. Preparation is his hallmark. He compiles information throughout the week on the games which will probably be used then adlibs this information during the taping of the show.

After getting a wake-up call at 4:30 a.m., Flemming heads over to begin the taping. He gets the script outline then the cameras roll. Often the nar-ration is material Flemming is seeing

for the first time.
"I think this is an advantage," he says. "I put everything into the present tense. It's like I'm announcing the game for the first time. To us, the game isn't in the past."

Flemming Cares

Flemming is a perfectionist. "With Bill you have to be prepared," says Elliott. "If he sees a name he's never seen before, he wants to know how to pronounce it. His standard line is 'Are you sure?' I'd hate to tell you how many times we've run to a phone at 6 a.m. to check out a pronunciation, a statistic, a record or even a home town."

Peacock rolls the cameras at 6 a.m., and Flemming begins reading. If he makes a mistake, the film is still rolled because the important item is to get all the film onto video-tape. After that is accomplished, then the backtracking is done. When Flemming is happy with the script and is sure that everything is correct, he proceeds in his one-shot fashion.

The result is an exciting football show, which provides information-an

entertaining news show.
"The show is good," Flemming claims, "and I can tell you why. We have a great team, and we all 'dig' college football."

The 12-hour period which spawns the Sunday Morning College Football Highlights Show is summed up by Flemming: "Physically exhausting."

SEMINOLE SEEKERS

Seminole Seekers is a service organization at Florida State dedicated to helping the University and especially the Athletic Department whenever and wherever it can. The Seekers are 30-40 Florida State coeds and they serve in various capacities throughout the year. During football season they have two major functions, serving as hostesses in the President's Box of the Press Box and as escorts to prospective Seminoles visiting the campus. Later in the year they will serve as scorers at tennis and track meets and as timers at swimming meets. During the basketball season, the Seekers handle program sales at all home games.



In two seasons as head football coach at Florida State, Larry Jones has directed the Seminoles to 15 victories against eight defeats.

The personable Arkansas native guided the Seminoles to an 8-3 and a Fiesta Bowl bid in his first year and last season Florida State had a 7-4 mark despite numerous injuries.

Since coming to Florida State from South Carolina, Jones has continued the Seminole tradition of wide-open football. "When I came here, I knew Florida State was a passing football team," said Jones. "I believe in the passing game and we will continue in that direction. That certainly doesn't mean I'm against a sound running attack. They compliment each other. To have a successful offense you have to do both."

When the Seminoles won eight games in 1971, it was only the fifth time in Florida State's 26-year football history that a coach had been able to match that figure.

Jones, 39, is not totally offense oriented. "No team can win consistently without a sound defense," said the former LSU player. "Offense is the more glamorous side of football but I think defensive players take just as much pride in stopping the opposition."

A native of Little Rock, Ark., Jones was a three-spot performer at Little Rock High School. He attended LSU from 1951-54 where he was center-linebacker for the Tigers. He joined the LSU coaching staff under Paul Dietzel the day he graduated in 1954.


After one year of coaching at LSU, he entered the Air Force for a two-year tour and then returned to LSU for the 1958-61 seasons. He moved with Dietzel to West Point for the 1962-65 seasons and then to South Carolina for the 1966-69 campaigns. Jones was named first assistant and defensive coordinator at the University of Tennessee in 1970.


At LSU, Jones coached the offensive receivers and was in charge of the passing game.

After receiving his bachelor of science degree at LSU, Jones continued his studies and received a master's degree in education from LSU in 1961.

In 16 seasons of college coaching, Jones has served on coaching staffs whose teams have played in the Orange Bowl, Peach Bowl, Sugar Bowl three times and the Fiesta Bowl.

The Florida State coach was born Dec. 18, 1933. He and his wife, the former Judy Bianchi of Dallas, Tes., have three children, Burce, 12; Kevin, 9; and Laura, 8.







Despite the fact Kansas has one of the nation's finest passers in quarterback Dave Jaynes, the Jayhawks used defense and a running attack last Saturday when they scored a major upset by knocking off 18th-ranked Washington State 29-8.

Jaynes, who the Seminoles remember from last season, threw only nine times while completing four for 93 yards and one score. While Washington State was playing pass, Delvin Williams ran the ball extremely well, gaining 94 yards in 18 carries.

However, it is the Jayhawk defense which showed tremendous improvement over last season. Defensive end Dean Zook, younger brother of the Atlanta Falcons' John Zook, was a stickout last Staurday. He had nine tackles and four assists. Three times the 6-2, 201 pounder threw enemy runners for losses.

Kansas has 16 starters returning from last season's disappointing 4-7 season. If the Jayhawks' first victory is any indication, Kansas could cause trouble in the Big 8 Conference this season.

Florida State, a 9-7 loser last week to Wake Forest on a field goal in the final three seconds, will be trying to gain some offensive consistancy. This was lacking against the Deacons with the exception of the Seminoles' one touchdown drive.

The Seminoles' young secondary will get a test with Jaynes throwing. Bruce Adams is his quarterback's favorite target.

This will be the third meeting between Florida State and Kansas with the Seminoles winning the two previous contests. The Tribe won 30-7 here in 1971 and was a 44-22 victor in Lawrence last season.

KEEP YOUR OWN STATISTICS

Every football fan knows that the score doesn't always give a good picture of a hame. A few statistics, like those that can be kept on this page, can make the picture clearer, show what the individual stars contribute and help to win post-game "debates." Besides, it can be fun to second guess the official scores whose statistics will appear in tomorrow's papers. But before you start, here are some pointers on being a statistician:

- 1. Keep cumulative totals to be informed "up to the minute" and to implify your figuring of team totals. Example: Jones gains 3, 6, 9, 2 yards and you write 3, 9, 18, 20 on his line.
- 2. Be satisfied if you come within 10-15 yards of the official team totals. Individual judgments as to the line of scrimmage can make quite a difference in the totals.

- 3. Remember that it takes 10 yards to make a first down—that last inch can be as important as a yard and must be scored as one. Wait until the official places the ball and then go by the official down/yard marker on the sidelines.
- 4. Be sure to credit first downs on scoring plays originating from lines of scrimmage beyond the 10-yard line.
- 5. On plays involving penalties measured from the point of the foul, credit the rusher or pass receiver with yardage only to the point of the infraction.
- 6. Charge gains and losses on fumbles to the player who, in your judgment, contributed most to the error.
- 7. Don't score two-point conversion attempts after touchdowns as rushing or passing plays.

HEY, FANS! Do You Know These Football Terms?

AUDIBLE - A vocal signal by the quarterback changing the play called in the huddle.

BLITZ - Commitment by defensive backs and/or linebackers to rush the passer.

BLOCKING - Legally hindering the progress of an opponent by contacting him with any part of the blocker's body.

BOMB - A long pass attempt for a touchdown. BUTTONHOOK - A pass pattern in which the receiver goes downfield and U-turns back sharply to receive the ball.

CLIPPING - Running or diving into the back of an opponent, or throwing the body across the back of the leg or legs of an opponent other than the ball carrier.

CORNER BACK - Defensive back who usually lines up across from wide receiver.

 ${f DIVE-TACKLE\ PLAY-A\ quick-handoff\ run-}$ ning play over tackle.

DRAW-PLAY - Quarterback drops back as if to pass but instead hands ball to running back, after quarterback's teammates have assumed pass-blocking positions.

FAIR CATCH - The opportunity for a player of the receiving team to catch a kicked ball that has crossed the scrimmage line without being tackled or blocked by an opponent, after signaling his intention by completely extending one arm above his head.

NEUTRAL ZONE - The space between the scrimmage lines of the offense and defense. approximately 11 inches

NOSE GUARD - Defensive lineman who lines up directly in front of opposing center on line of scrimmage. In Florida State's defensive scheme, middle linebacker sometimes becomes nose guard.

ONSIDE KICK - A kickoff that travels 10 yards or more is anybody's ball. The so-called "onside kick" is an effort by the kicking team to kick the ball barely beyond 10 yards and recover it before the receiving team can do so.

POCKET - Area of protection for the passer formed by blockers. Passer drops straight back from scrimmage behind the blocking shield into what resembles a "cup" or pocket.

POST - A pass pattern in which the receiver goes downfield to pre-determined depth then cuts at an angle toward the goalposts.

PREVENT DEFENSE - A strategem replacing linebackers with additional backfield pass defenders, sacrificing strength against short gainers in order to prevent a long pass completion. Most often employed by a team protecting a lead late in either half.

PULLING GUARD - Guard who pulls out behind scrimmage line for a trap block or to lead sweep blocking for ball carrier.

QUICK GUARD - See weak guard.

SPLIT END - Offensive lineman deployed as a wide receiver. Must line up on line of scrimmage.

STRONG LINEBACKER - So designated because he usually lines up across from the strong side of the offensive line.

STRONG GUARD - Offensive guard playing on the strong side of the line.

STRONG SAFETY - Defensive back who usually lines up deeper than corner backs and across from strong side of offensive line.

STRONG SIDE - The side of the offensive line where the tight end lines up.

STRONG TACKLE - Offensive tackle playing on the strong side of the line.

STUNTING - Defensive players changing positions as the ball is snapped, to confuse offensive

SWEEP - End run with wave of blockers leading the ball carrier.

TACKLING - Grasping or encircling an opponent with hands or arms.

TAILBACK - A running back who usually lines up behind the weak side of the line.

TIGHT END - Offensive end who lines up in close formation (as opposed to Split End's wide set) where he can either block for a ball carrier or be employed as a pass receiver.

FLANKER - Offensive back deployed as a wide receiver. Must line up one yard behind line of scrimmage.

FREE SAFETY - Same as weak safety.

FULLBACK - A running back who usually lines up behind strong side of the offensive line.

KICKOFF - A free kick with which each half is opened, and which is employed also following each try-for-point or Field Goal. A kickoff must be either a Placekick or a Dropkick.

LATERAL PASS - A live ball thrown toward or parallel with the passer's own goal line.

LINEBACKER - A defensive player operating immediately behind his line where he can either aid linemen in stopping a running play or cover an opponent's receiver if a pass develops.

LOOK-IN PASS - Receiver runs straight pattern and looks for the ball immediately over his inside shoulder.

MAN-TO-MAN COVERAGE - Pass defense plan wherein defensive backs cover receivers wherever they go, rather than field areas.

MIDDLE LINEBACKER - So designated because he usually lines up across from the opposing center.

MIKE - Nickname for middle linebacker.

MONSTER - Same as strong safety.

QUICK TACKLE - See weak tackle.

REVERSE PLAY - A running play with backfield action suggesting one direction while ball carrier goes in opposite direction.

ROLL-OUT PASS - Quarterback runs laterally with blockers before throwing, instead of dropping straight back to pass.

ROVER - Same as strong safety.

RUNNING BACK - Member of the offensive backfield who primarily carries the ball. Also used as a receiver and blocker. Can be either tailback or fullback.

SAM - Nickname for strong linebacker.

SCREEN PASS - Pass to a receiver behind a wall of blockers, who have permitted defenders to penetrate.

SCRIMMAGE LINE - The yard line (marked or unmarked) that passes through point of the ball nearest a team's own goal line.

SLOT BACK - Back stationed in slot between interior linemen and end. Must be one yard behind the line of scrimmage.

 ${\sf SNAP}-{\sf A}$ quick, continuous motion by which the ball is handed or snapped back with the ball leaving the hands of the snapper on the motion. The snap normally is made by the center.

SPEARING - Illegal use of the head and helmet to ram an opponent after his momentum has stopped.

TRAP BLOCK - Tactic whereby offensive lineman pulls out of position at the snap allowing man he would usually block to come through line and be blocked (or "trapped") by another blocker.

UNBALANCED LINE - Offensive line deployment whereby more blocking linemen are lined up on one side of the center than on the other.

WEAK GUARD - Offensive guard playing on the weak side of the line.

WEAK LINEBACKER - So designated because he usually lines up across from the weak side of the Offensive line.

WEAK SAFETY - Defensive back who usually lines up deeper than corner backs and across from weak side of offensive line.

WEAK SIDE - The side of the offensive line where the split end lines up.

WEAK TACKLE - Offensive tackle playing on the weak side of the line.


WIDE RECEIVER - A lineman and/or a back who is set wide for pass receiving purposes.

Also called Split End, Flanker or Wideout. WIDEOUT - Can be either split end or flanker.

WILLIE - Nickname for weak linebacker.

ZONE COVERAGE - Plan of pass defense wherein areas are covered rather than individual receivers. Opposite of Man-To-Man.


JIM DONNAN Running Backs


JIM PHILLIPS

Mike and his wife Lee, have no children.


MOYER SMITH Defensive Line
