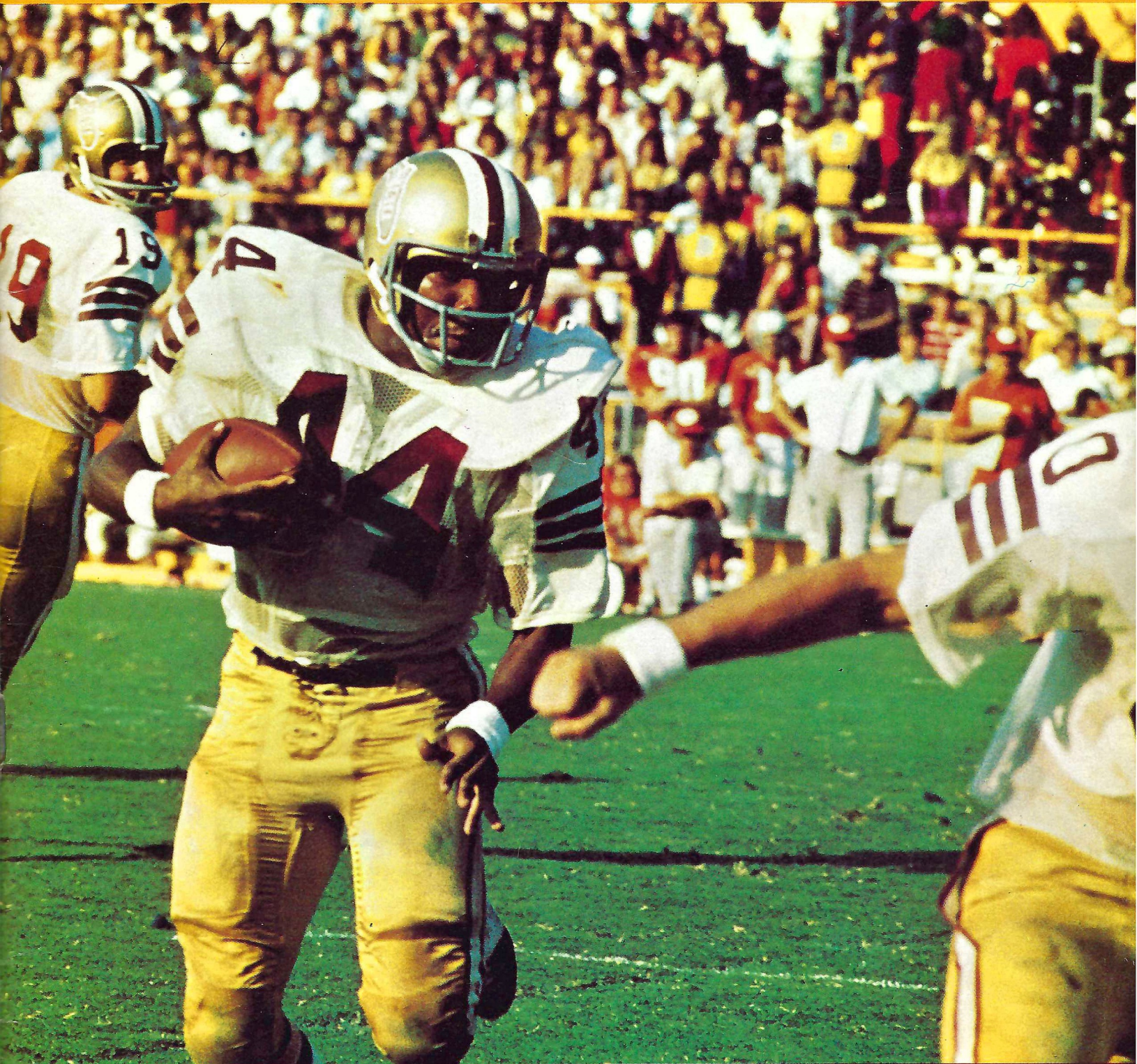

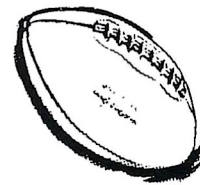

Florida State University

Welcome to the South's Friendliest Campus...

Florida State University, founded in 1857, is in the process of making new and important responses to the needs of its 19,500 students and to the problems which confront the state and nation.

A major change in the academic structure of the University is in progress and will continue throughout the year ahead. The decision to reorganize and redistribute colleges, schools and departments into six major academic divisions is the result of a year-long self study made last year by faculty, staff, students and administrators. The primary conclusions called for a regrouping of academic disciplines to meet the demands of new social, economic, scientific and environmental problems of the nation.

That such change is possible is one of the key factors in the University's reputation as a nationally competitive pacesetter in graduate research and undergraduate instruction.

Currently graduating more than 5,000 students each year, Florida State offers more than 50 doctoral programs and more than 80 master's and baccalaureate fields of study. These are encompassed within the schools and colleges of Arts and Sciences, Business, Education, Home Economics, Social Work, Social Sciences, Library Science, Communications, Law, Music, Nursing, and the Fine and Performing Arts, which comprise four of the six new divisions. The other two divisions—Educational Services and Graduate Studies and Research—provide leadership for the University's libraries, continuing education, overseas and instructional research and service programs; and the University's major research centers, institutes and facilities, and the Graduate School.

Florida State University is but one of many public agencies working hard to make this year's United Way drive an outstanding success.

United Way campaign leaders on the campus include President Stanley Marshall, who is president of the entire Leon County campaign this year, and Dr. Homer Ooten, chairman of the campus drive.

The campus has a minimum goal of \$44,300, but Dr. Ooten has challenged faculty, staff and students to meet a "Seminole Effort Goal" of \$66,450. Last year, the campus raised \$42,217—a figure that represented 122 percent of the basic goal.

The entire Leon County goal is \$401,448; but President Marshall has asked all units to give the "little bit extra" that would bring the campaign to a level of \$500,000.

Fans in the stands at today's game can help the campus and the community to score big, the United Way, by writing their checks and filling in their pledge cards as soon as they get home today.



From One Seminole Fan to Another...

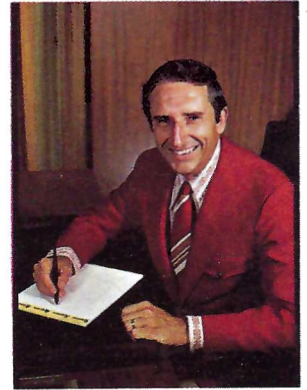
The 1973 Seminoles are a young but vigorous team that may be a little lean in terms of prior collegiate competition, but one which is definitely hungry for success.

NCAA Reorganizes Itself into Three Divisions

Some folks think the National Collegiate Athletic Association's reorganization into three divisions is much like ordering from a menu in a Chinese restaurant—with One you get football; or with Two you may choose one from Division I.

Actually, the NCAA remains the same—only the names have been changed.

The Constitution remains a single document, applicable to all members. The reorganization allows for each division to adopt amendments to the Bylaws applicable only to that specific division without the approval of any other division.

Each NCAA member institution will select its division through self-determination, except in the sport of football, in which Division I membership will consist of those 126 institutions currently classified as "major" by the Football Statistics and Classification Committee.

Self-determination is a key phrase. Many think that Division I membership is restricted to those 126 "major" teams. However, an institution may classify itself Division I in all sports other than football. Fordham University would be a prime example. Its program, except football, is Division I. Its football team is classified Division III.

To Each His Own

The members of each division may establish criteria for membership in that division subsequent to self-determination.

An institution in Division II or III may elect to participate in Division I in one sport, other than football or basketball, and must abide by the Division I Bylaws which govern the sport in question, even though the institution's membership rests in another division. An example could be Pan American University, which could have an overall Division II program, but could elect to participate in Division I in baseball, its strongest program.

* * * * *

Under this new reclassification plan, Florida State will be competing in Division I in all sports. The Seminoles have eight NCAA sanctioned sports in Men's Intercollegiate: Baseball, Basketball, Cross-country, Football, Golf, Swimming, Tennis and Track.

* * * * *

There are numerous other examples, also, and it's possible that some institutions could compete in all three divisions in different sports. An institution's football team could be classified Division III, it could self-determine Division II for its overall program, and still choose Division I for one sport.

No matter what division an institution competes in, it will have a much

better opportunity to compete in a National Collegiate Championship event.

The NCAA will sponsor a minimum of 39 National Championships by the 1975-76 year with at least 10 Championships in each of the three divisions.

Only one National Championship will be conducted in the sports of fencing, hockey, skiing, indoor track, volleyball and water polo. All member institutions are eligible to compete in the above Championships under eligibility rules of the division they elect for their overall program through 1975-76. After that, the member institution and its individual athletes must be eligible under the governing legislation for the division conducting the championship.

Each of the three divisions will have National Championship competition in the sports of baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, swimming, tennis, outdoor track and field and wrestling.

In addition, Divisions II and III will have a National Championship tournament in football.

Gymnastics and lacrosse championships will be sponsored in Divisions I and II and members of Division III will be eligible for the Division II championship in these sports.

In individual events, certain place winners from Division II and III championships who meet the qualifying standards will be eligible to compete in Division I competition, providing such individuals have met all academic and eligibility requirements of Division I, including academic standards for initial participation. For example, the top five finishers in the Division II and Division III cross country championships will be eligible to compete in the Division I championship.

Movement Possible

An institution may change its division membership by petitioning the NCAA Council if it meets the established criteria for membership in the division it wishes to be transferred to.

The Council itself will be restructured to give each division representation.

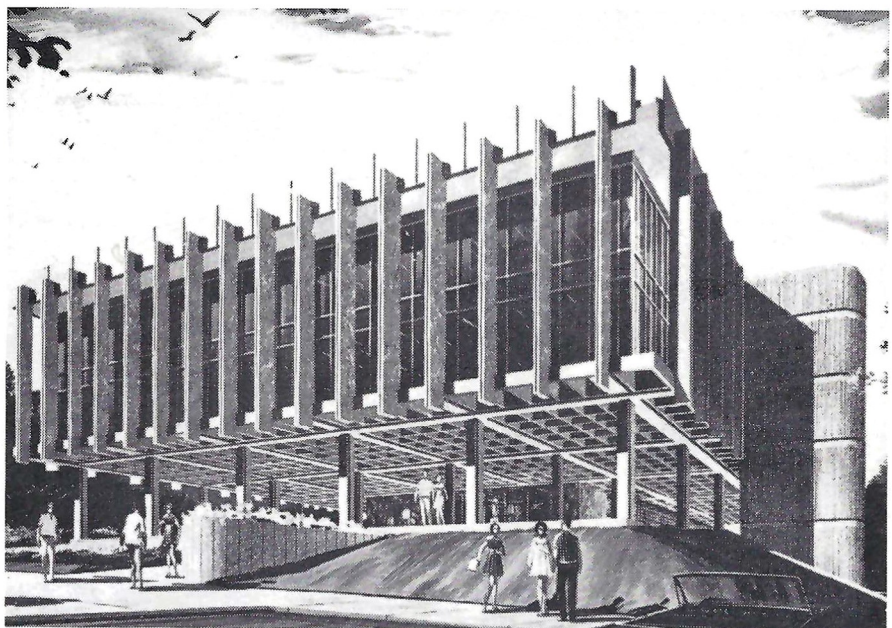
The Council will retain its 16-member make-up, but each NCAA District shall have a vice-president and eight vice-presidents will be elected at-large.

Among the 16 vice-presidents, eight will be from Division I members and four each will come from Divisions II and III. The president and secretary-treasurer will be ex officio members of the Council, as they currently are, and they may be elected from any division.

The Executive Committee will also be restructured with five members being elected from Division I and three from Divisions II and III with each division being represented by at least one member.

All standing committees of the NCAA will be evaluated with a view towards providing representation to each division where appropriate. Specifically, each of the three divisions shall be represented on all rules committees. This will be accomplished after the Association's 68th annual Convention in January in San Francisco, where the implementing legislation will be presented.

The reorganization plan was considered to be a vital course of action for the NCAA. "It will enable our members to enact rules which pertain to their own competition," said NCAA President Alan J. Chapman. "It will make the NCAA an even more valuable force in intercollegiate athletics."

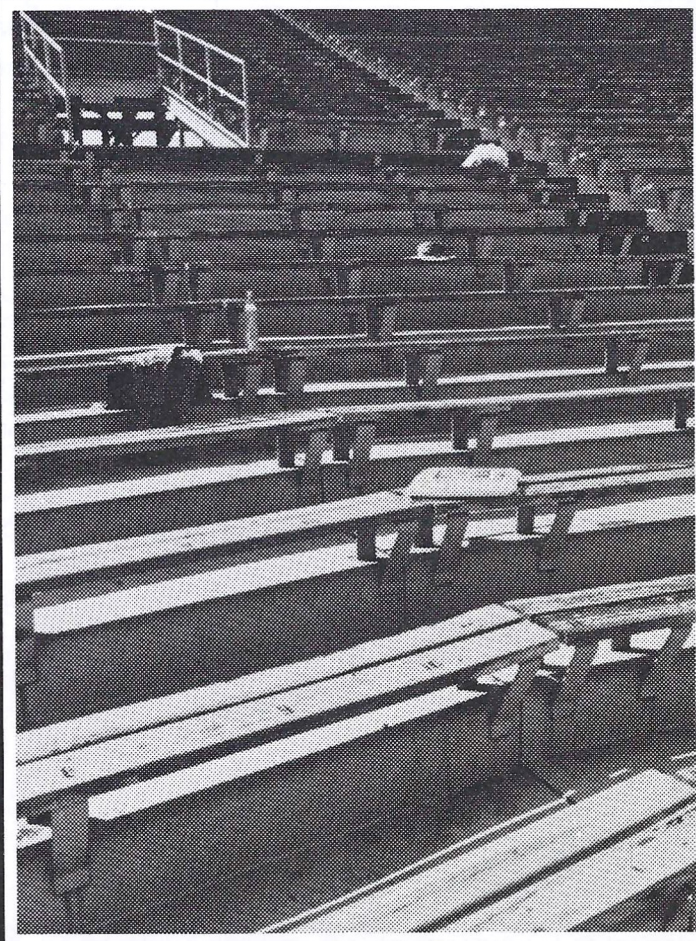

Head Coach Larry Jones

In two seasons as head football coach at Florida State, Larry Jones has directed the Seminoles to 15 victories against eight defeats.

The personable Arkansas native guided the Seminoles to an 8-3 and a Fiesta Bowl bid in his first year and last season Florida State had a 7-4 mark despite numerous injuries.

Since coming to Florida State from Tennessee, Jones has continued the Seminole tradition of wide-open football. "When I came here, I knew Florida State was a passing football team," said Jones. "I believe in the passing game and we will continue in that direction. That certainly doesn't mean I'm against a sound running attack. They compliment each other. To have a successful offense you have to do both."

When the Seminoles won eight games in 1971, it was only the fifth time in Florida State's 26-year football history that a coach had been able to match that figure.

Jones, 39, is not totally offense oriented. "No team can win consistently without a sound defense," said the former LSU player. "Offense is the more glamorous side of football but I think defensive players take just as much pride in stopping the opposition."

A native of Little Rock, Ark., Jones was a three-spot performer at Little Rock High School. He attended LSU from 1951-54 where he was center-linebacker for the Tigers. He joined the LSU coaching staff under Paul Dietzel the day he graduated in 1954.

After one year of coaching at LSU, he entered the Air Force for a two-year tour and then returned to LSU for the 1958-61 seasons. He moved with Dietzel to West Point for the 1962-65 seasons and then to South Carolina for the 1966-69 campaigns. Jones was named first assistant and defensive coordinator at the University of Tennessee in 1970.

At LSU, Jones coached the offensive receivers and was in charge of the passing game.

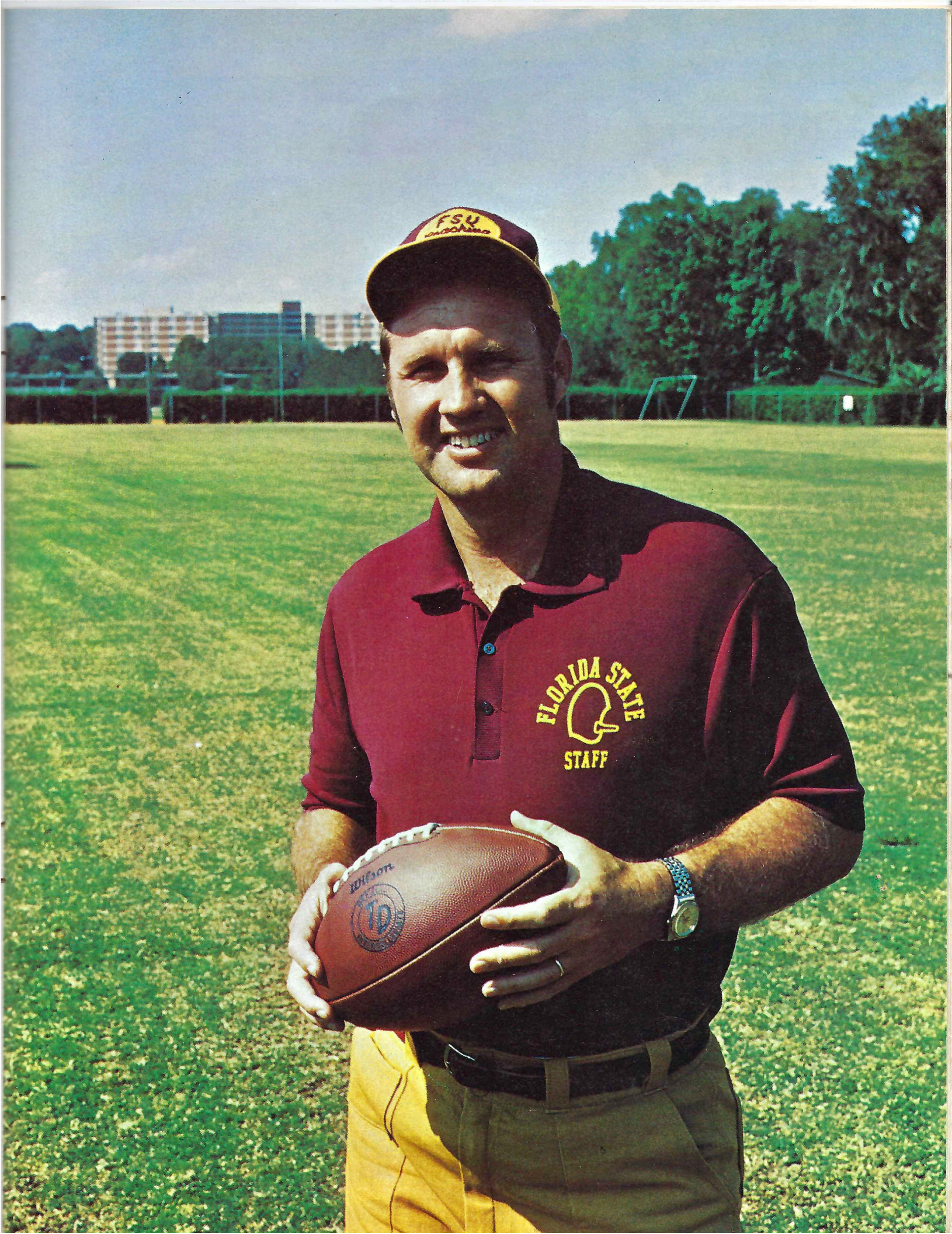
After receiving his bachelor of science degree at LSU, Jones continued his studies and received a master's degree in education from LSU in 1961.

In 16 seasons of college coaching, Jones has served on coaching staffs whose teams have played in the Orange Bowl, Peach Bowl, Sugar Bowl three times and the Fiesta Bowl.

The Florida State coach was born Dec. 18, 1933. He and his wife, the former Judy Bianchi of Dallas, Tex., have three children, Bruce, 12; Kevin, 9; and Laura, 8.

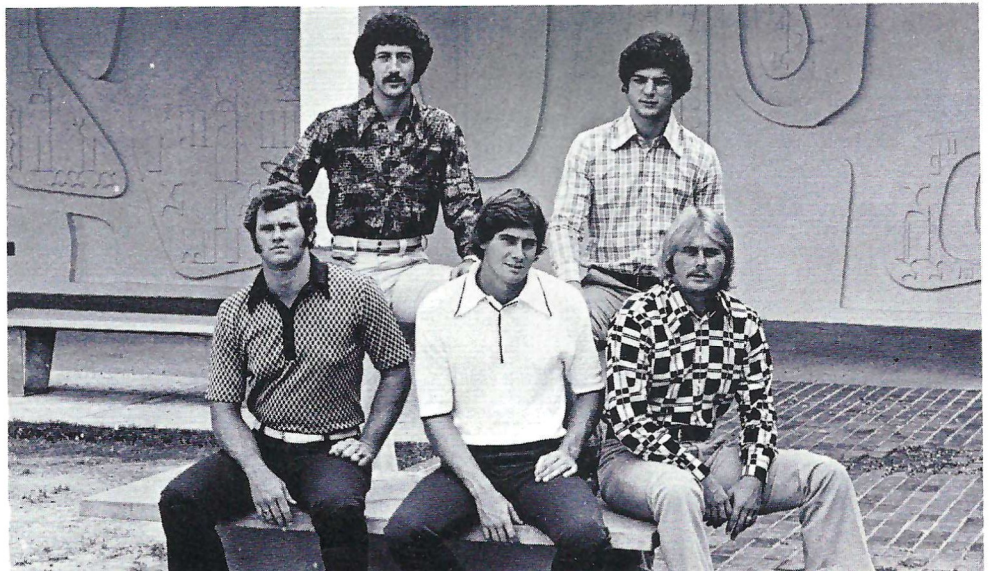



Mississippi State, Florida State's opponent today, appears to be the most improved club in the Southeastern Conference.

The Bulldogs come into this contest with a 2-1-1 record including a pair of SEC victories which include a 33-13 decision over Florida. The other conference win was at the expense of Vanderbilt, 52-21, while Northeastern Louisiana pulled a 21-21 surprise in the Bulldog opener.

Last Saturday night, Kentucky stunned Mississippi State 42-14 as the Wildcats rolled over what had been a stout Bulldog defense.

In quarterback Rockey Felker, the 'Dogs own the SEC total offense leader. The six-foot junior has passed for 615 yards and rushed for 200 more. So in four games he has accounted for an average of about 204 yards per contest while passing for seven scores and rushing for three more.

It was Felker who entered the game late last season and almost pulled it out for the Bulldogs as Florida State hung on for a 25-21 victory.

The top Mississippi State rusher is 210-pound fullback Wayne Jones who has gained 414 yards in 70 carries for a 5.9 average. All-Conference receiver Bill Buckley has 20 receptions for 280 yards and four TDs.

In defensive end Jimmy Webb, a 6-5, 245-pound junior, the Bulldogs think they have at least an all-conference performer.

This will be the seventh meeting between Florida State and the Bulldogs with Mississippi looking for its first triumph.

HEY, FANS!

Do You Know These Football Terms?

AUDIBLE — A vocal signal by the quarterback changing the play called in the huddle.

BLITZ — Commitment by defensive backs and/or linebackers to rush the passer.

BLOCKING — Legally hindering the progress of an opponent by contacting him with any part of the blocker's body.

BOMB — A long pass attempt for a touchdown.

BUTTONHOOK — A pass pattern in which the receiver goes downfield and U-turns back sharply to receive the ball.

CLIPPING — Running or diving into the back of an opponent, or throwing the body across the back of the leg or legs of an opponent other than the ball carrier.

CORNER BACK — Defensive back who usually lines up across from wide receiver.

DIVE-TACKLE PLAY — A quick-handoff running play over tackle.

DRAW-PLAY — Quarterback drops back as if to pass but instead hands ball to running back, after quarterback's teammates have assumed pass-blocking positions.

FAIR CATCH — The opportunity for a player of the receiving team to catch a kicked ball that has crossed the scrimmage line without being tackled or blocked by an opponent, after signaling his intention by completely extending one arm above his head.

NEUTRAL ZONE — The space between the scrimmage lines of the offense and defense, approximately 11 inches

NOSE GUARD — Defensive lineman who lines up directly in front of opposing center on line of scrimmage. In Florida State's defensive scheme, middle linebacker sometimes becomes nose guard.

ON-SIDE KICK — A kickoff that travels 10 yards or more is anybody's ball. The so-called "onside kick" is an effort by the kicking team to kick the ball barely beyond 10 yards and recover it before the receiving team can do so.

POCKET — Area of protection for the passer formed by blockers. Passer drops straight back from scrimmage behind the blocking shield into what resembles a "cup" or pocket.

POST — A pass pattern in which the receiver goes downfield to pre-determined depth then cuts at an angle toward the goalposts.

PREVENT DEFENSE — A strategem replacing linebackers with additional backfield pass defenders, sacrificing strength against short gainers in order to prevent a long pass completion. Most often employed by a team protecting a lead late in either half.

PULLING GUARD — Guard who pulls out behind scrimmage line for a trap block or to lead sweep blocking for ball carrier.

QUICK GUARD — See weak guard.

SPLIT END — Offensive lineman deployed as a wide receiver. Must line up on line of scrimmage.

STRONG LINEBACKER — So designated because he usually lines up across from the strong side of the offensive line.

STRONG GUARD — Offensive guard playing on the strong side of the line.

STRONG SAFETY — Defensive back who usually lines up deeper than corner backs and across from strong side of offensive line.

STRONG SIDE — The side of the offensive line where the tight end lines up.

STRONG TACKLE — Offensive tackle playing on the strong side of the line.

STUNTING — Defensive players changing positions as the ball is snapped, to confuse offensive strategy.

SWEEP — End run with wave of blockers leading the ball carrier.

TACKLING — Grasping or encircling an opponent with hands or arms.

TAILBACK — A running back who usually lines up behind the weak side of the line.

TIGHT END — Offensive end who lines up in close formation (as opposed to Split End's wide set) where he can either block for a ball carrier or be employed as a pass receiver.

FLANKER — Offensive back deployed as a wide receiver. Must line up one yard behind line of scrimmage.

FREE SAFETY — Same as weak safety.

FULLBACK — A running back who usually lines up behind strong side of the offensive line.

KICKOFF — A free kick with which each half is opened, and which is employed also following each try-for-point or Field Goal. A kickoff must be either a Placekick or a Dropkick.

LATERAL PASS — A live ball thrown toward or parallel with the passer's own goal line.

LINEBACKER — A defensive player operating immediately behind his line where he can either aid linemen in stopping a running play or cover an opponent's receiver if a pass develops.

LOOK-IN PASS — Receiver runs straight pattern and looks for the ball immediately over his inside shoulder.

MAN-TO-MAN COVERAGE — Pass defense plan wherein defensive backs cover receivers wherever they go, rather than field areas.

MIDDLE LINEBACKER — So designated because he usually lines up across from the opposing center.

MIKE — Nickname for middle linebacker.

MONSTER — Same as strong safety.

QUICK TACKLE — See weak tackle.

REVERSE PLAY — A running play with backfield action suggesting one direction while ball carrier goes in opposite direction.

ROLL-OUT PASS — Quarterback runs laterally with blockers before throwing, instead of dropping straight back to pass.

ROVER — Same as strong safety.

RUNNING BACK — Member of the offensive backfield who primarily carries the ball. Also used as a receiver and blocker. Can be either tailback or fullback.

SAM — Nickname for strong linebacker.

SCREEN PASS — Pass to a receiver behind a wall of blockers, who have permitted defenders to penetrate.

SCRIMMAGE LINE — The yard line (marked or unmarked) that passes through point of the ball nearest a team's own goal line.

SLOT BACK — Back stationed in slot between interior linemen and end. Must be one yard behind the line of scrimmage.

SNAP — A quick, continuous motion by which the ball is handed or snapped back with the ball leaving the hands of the snapper on the motion. The snap normally is made by the center.

SPEARING — Illegal use of the head and helmet to ram an opponent after his momentum has stopped.

TRAP BLOCK — Tactic whereby offensive lineman pulls out of position at the snap allowing man he would usually block to come through line and be blocked (or "trapped") by another blocker.

UNBALANCED LINE — Offensive line deployment whereby more blocking linemen are lined up on one side of the center than on the other.

WEAK GUARD — Offensive guard playing on the weak side of the line.

WEAK LINEBACKER — So designated because he usually lines up across from the weak side of the Offensive line.

WEAK SAFETY — Defensive back who usually lines up deeper than corner backs and across from weak side of offensive line.

WEAK SIDE — The side of the offensive line where the split end lines up.

WEAK TACKLE — Offensive tackle playing on the weak side of the line.

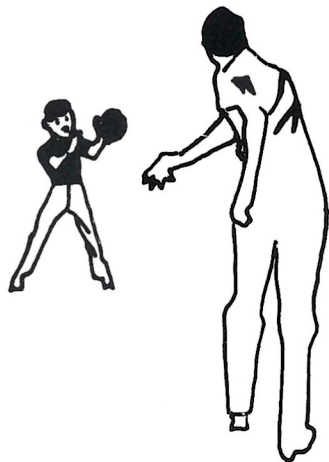
WIDE RECEIVER — A lineman and/or a back who is set wide for pass receiving purposes. Also called Split End, Flanker or Wideout.

WIDEOUT — Can be either split end or flanker.

WILLIE — Nickname for weak linebacker.

ZONE COVERAGE — Plan of pass defense wherein areas are covered rather than individual receivers. Opposite of Man-To-Man.

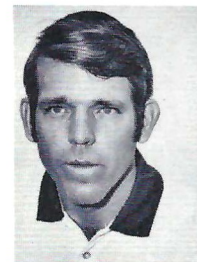

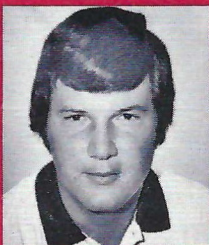


JIM DONNAN

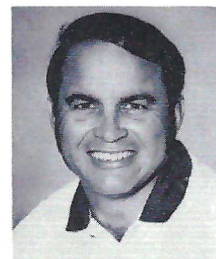

Freshman

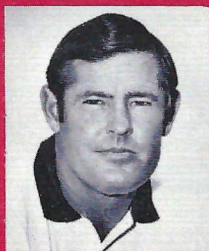

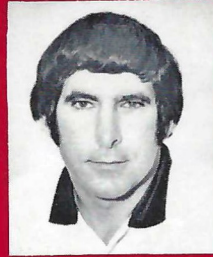
JIM PHILLIPS

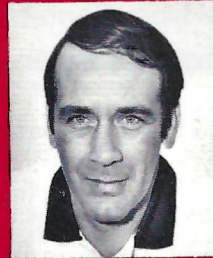

Trainer

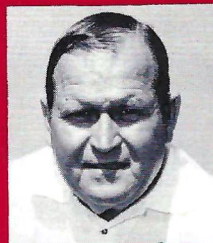

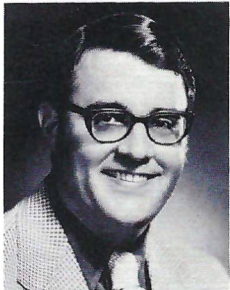


Seminole Radio Network

The show finale features the themes of the current movies as the Chiefs play from concert position, *One Tin Soldier* and *Brian's Song*.


