
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
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


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# Alabama must find andidote for the 'seven-year itch' against ailing Florida State

Alabama is 4-0 and rated among the nation's finest college football teams. Florida State is 0-4 and working on a 16game losing streak. But when the two teams kick off today in Denny Stadium the score will be tied, 0-0. Anything that happens after that will have to be earned. The last time the Crimson Tide and Seminoles kicked it off, a little over seven years ago, both earned a tie. Alabama head coach Paul Bryant is hoping that the FSU football team is not like a case of the seven-year itch. The teams were much as they are today, Alabama highly regarded and FSU barely regarded, when they fought to the infamous 37-37 tie in 1967.

"I know Florida State hasn't beaten anybody, but neither have those other teams that have been knocking off the top folk each week," Coach Bryant warns.


The first break of the game, certainly, has gone to Florida State. Richard Todd was not expected to be able to play today. A leg injury suffered in the Ole Miss game has thrust Robert Fraley and Jack O'Rear into the quarterback picture. When Alabama was preparing for the 1974 season Fraley was considered No. 3 and O'Rear was expected to be redshirted. But now the men who made Bama go in 1973 are both on the sidelines with injuries. Part of the reason, almost certainly, that Todd is hurt is that Gary Rutledge is not around to share the quarterback burden. Rutledge, who has a separated shoulder, is not expected to be ready for at least another month.

Although Florida State has yet to win this year, the Seminoles have had some bright moments. Last week they led Baylor 17-0 at halftime, only to miscue While Alabama has lost Todd and Rutledge (not to mention former first teamers Charles Hannah at defensive tackle, Joe Dale Harris at split end, and Neil Callaway at offensive tackle) to injuries, the Tide may have found one who had been gone. "Old Woodrow (Lowe) was back against Ole Miss," Coach Bryant said following last week's victory over the Rebels. Lowe was the cornerstone of last year's Bama defense. Bryant said that he hadn't been his former self on stopping opponents prior to Saturday. That good news for Alabama is bad news for others.

Florida State is a passing team with top receivers (particularly Mike Shumann) and a strong-armed junior college transfer quarterback (Ron Coppess). But it is perhaps the defensive secondary of Alabama that has been the strongest point of the Tide this year.

The Alabama faithful appear somewhat restless because victories are coming with great difficulty this year. But at least they are coming, along with a good measure of scoring and total offense. Bama is averaging 32.8 points per game, 451 yards per outing.

Alabama's passing attack, which had been coming along splendidly prior to the Ole Miss game (Bama hit only two of five tries for 19 yards in that one after having gone into the fray with a league-leading 123.7 yards per game), has been almost completely wiped out with Todd's injury. Richard had figured in all but one completion and four yards of Alabama passing offense. He had completed 21 of 36 passes for 370 yards and caught one pass (from halfback Mike Stock) for 16



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
Although Florida State has yet to win this year, the Seminoles have had some bright moments. Last week they led Baylor 17-0 at halftime, only to miscue themselves into a 17-21 loss. They were the first college team to hold Pittsburgh's All-American Tony Dorsett under 100 yards rushing, but alas, lost the war, 6-9. They also lost by a touchdown, 7-14, to Colorado State. Only Kansas, at Kansas, has had an easy time of it against FSU.

Alabama leads this little-played series, 1-0-1. The Tide took a 21-0 victory here in 1965, the year of a national championship, and the two battled to their famous tie (still the highest scoring tie game in NCAA history) in 1967 in Birmingham.

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Todd has also been used as a punter in "short" situations. Rod Nelson, who recently won the punting job with a promotion from the junior varsity tryout ranks, will now handle all punting duties. He's averaging 40 yards per kick on his nine boots.

Upset Saturday didn't end three weeks ago, nor two weeks ago, nor last week. Top Twenty teams are still falling. Alabama needs that like it needs the seven year itch.



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### Even the scoreboard gave out in 1967

Remember when. It was the opening football game of 1967 in Legion Field, Alabama "warming up" for another run at the national championship. The Tide had the nation's longest winning streak, 17 games (21 without a defeat), and was coming off an 11-0 season that included a convincing Sugar Bowl victory over Nebraska and which had been preceded by back-to-back national championships.

Florida State, formerly an all-female institution, was to be the 1967 Tide's first test, but no one outside of the Alabama coaching staff expected it to be too much of a test. The Seminoles had been decisively defeated the week before, 31-13, by Houston.

"Anyone can get his team up for the good teams," Alabama coach Paul Bryant warned. "Our players may not think that Florida State 37-37

has a good team after what happened last week, but their coach (Bill Peterson) says they have the best personnel they have ever had and I have to believe him."

There were several more believers following Bama's 1967 opener. The game is still a part of the NCAA Record Book, the highest scoring tie game in over 100 years of college football play. When it finally ended at 37-37 everyone had to be exhausted — players and coaches, certainly, but also fans and members of the press. Even the Legion Field scoreboard had to give up, the lights going out long before the eight changes in lead had been completed and the final extra point kicked with less than two minutes remaining.

Coach Bryant would say the next day that "They probably should have won."

Florida State fans, who had little reason to expect victory, were somewhat disgruntled that their team had played for a tie, but that was Coach Peterson's decision. He figured that a tie was almost the same as a win against the naton's second-ranked team. Alabama fans booed the decision at the time, but they were probably a little relieved, too.

And the next morning even Alabama fans probably had to chuckle if they happened upon a suburb billboard. "Great Pair Says the Bear" was supposed to be touting cola and chips, but someone had altered it. "Hammond and Sellers" read the handpainted substitution.

In those days Alabama sometimes had one or more games at which tickets went for \$1 less than others. Florida State was one such game. Following the opener Tide officials must have wondered if they hadn't picked out the wrong bargain. Any pure football fans in the sellout crowd of over 70,000 would probably have been happy to pay the extra \$1; but most were not just football fans. Some 5,000 were FSU fans and the rest for the most part were disappointed Bama followers.

One who watched and must have loved it was a former Alabama All-America. Vaughn Mancha, who had

## Throw out the records; FSU has played well and will play best against Alabama

The first thing that we absolutely must do is forget Florida State's record (0-4) this year, for two reasons. One, upsets have almost been the rule this year. It's happening to everyone and it could happen to us. And, two, they have lost three games by a total of just 14 points. This means that they are playing well, just making the little mistakes, things that can be corrected. One of their losses was 6-9 to Pittsburgh and in that game they became the first team ever to hold Tony Dorsett to under 100 yards.

Florida State is a very young team, only five seniors playing. As is often the case with a young team they play with a great deal of enthusiasm and when you have that you can

make things happen.

Start with their kicking game. Ahmet Askin, a soccer style kicker, does their placekicking and he's a very good one. He's hit two of three attempts over 40 yards this year and has missed only one extra point. He kicks off consistently to the goalline and Florida State coverage has been excellent on kickoffs. Their punter, Joe Downey, is averaging 39.5 yards per punt. He kicks the ball very high and gets it off quickly, about 2.1 seconds. He's an athlete, too, the kind you can't rush because he might pass or run on you. They use three freshmen speedsters for returns, Robert Jackson, Leon Bright and Nat Terry.

FSU is young on defense, but they have two of the best line-backers we'll face this year. Bert Cooper on the weakside is a senior, 6-1 and 236; and Brian Schmidt on the strongside is

the team's strongest player and best tackler.

Joe Camp is the strong safety and Florida State coaches feel he's the most competitive man on the team. He has a

knack of getting to the ball and he's a hard hitter.

As most teams that have done well against triple option offenses, FSU has a five-man defensive front. They average about 222 pounds per man and they are led by Greg Johnson, 6-4 and 236.

The defense has played well all year. They have a great deal of enthusiasm and really get after people.

Offensively, they are a Veer team, but they will show us up

to a dozen different looks.

They have three good receivers. Mike Schumann, who led the team in receiving last year as a freshman, and Mike Allen, a senior who was the second leading receiver in 1973, are the wide outs. The tight end is Joe Goldsmith, who was converted from split end because of his blocking ability and who is one of the fastest tight ends we'll play against. Schumann is already rated among the finest FSU receivers ever, such as Ron Sellers. He's a threat to score every time he catches the ball and he's already caught 18 passes this year.

The quarterback is Ron Coppess, a junior college transfer with a strong, accurate arm. He's completed over 50 per cent of his passes against defenses that know Florida State is going to be passing. Coppess can give them a quick score.

The running backs are Rudy Thomas, a sophomore with 4.6 speed in the 40 who was voted most improved player last spring, and Larry Key, 5-9 and 181 and a 9,8 100-yard dash man. Florida State feels they are the best running backs in years.

Senior Bob Jones anchors the offensive line, which does a good job on pass protection. When they need clutch yardage

they'll go over Jones.


Florida State will put the football in the air. They have traditionally had a fine passing attack and this year is cer-

tainly no exception.

Teams lose football games they are not supposed to for a number of reasons, among them not being mentally prepared, not being physically prepared and looking past the immediate opponent to a future opponent. The last time Alabama and Florida State played, in 1967, a team that wasn't supposed to stay with Alabama did. And that, or worse, could happen Saturday if we're not ready to play.

# Meet Tide head coach Paul Bryant

Paul William (Bear) Bryant, head football coach and athletic director at the University of Alabama, is synonomous with college football.

A statesman in his profession, he has received virtually every honor that can be bestowed. He has been voted the Coach of the Year honors by his peers three times, a feat unmatched in the history of football.

He was president of the American Football Coaches Association in 1972 and has worked diligently on behalf of college football both in that position and as a member of the board. Last was named he University Administrator of the Year in Alabama by the American Association of University Administrators. In an unprecedented action in 1973, he made a personal gift of \$100,000 to the University of Alabama to be academic for used scholarships. He also is the immediate past president of the Southeastern Conference and Athletic Coaches Directors Association.


A legend in his own time, he has coached teams to 235 victories in 29 years, an average of eight wins per season. Twenty teams have seven SEC championships at Alabama, including the last three in a row, and also won one at Kentucky, a total of eight crowns, again more than any coach in history. His 111 SEC football victories also ranks as the most by any coach in history.

In eight of Bryant's 29 years as a head coach his teams have won 10 or more games in a season, with undefeated seasons in 1961 and 1966.

The TV networks clamor for Alabama because they know Bryant will provide an interesting team with fast-paced action. Alabama has been on television 37 times in Bryant's 16 years as the coach.

Thirty-one of his players have made All-America at Alabama, plus he had eight All-Americans at Kentucky and four (including Heisman Trophy winner John David Crow) at Texas A&M for a total of 43 in 29 years.

Bryant is a native of Fordyce, Ark. He came to Alabama in 1931, recruited by Coach Hank Crisp. He played right end for the Tide and was a member of the famous 1934 Bama team which went undefeated and defeated Stanford, 29-13, in the Rose Bowl game of 1935.

scholarships. He also is the immediate past president of the Southeastern Conference Coaches and Athletic Directors Association.

A legend in his own time, he has coached teams to 235 victories in 29 years, an average of eight wins per season. Twenty teams have gone to bowl games under his leadership. He ranks third on the list of all-time coaching victories, with only Amos Alonzo Stagg and Glenn (Pop) Warner ahead of him in total wins. And none of them approach him on a per season win average.

In 16 seasons at Alabama he has seen his teams carve out 144 victories, lose just 31 and tie seven games. That's a winning percentage of .807 He has directed 15 consecutive bowl trips for Bama teams and has taken part in 22 post-season classics — more than any person in the history of football — including one as a player, one as an assistant coach, and 20 as a head coach.

Three times he has won National Coach of the Year honors, in 1961, 1971 and 1973. He was voted Coach of the Decade by the American Football Coaches Association in the 1960s. Four times — including the 1973 season - he was named SEC Coach of the Year, with the other titles in 1961, 1964 and coached 1971. Brvant Championship National teams in 1961, 1964, 1965 and the 1973 team won the United Press International title, based on regular season competition. He has won Bryant is a native of Fordyce, Ark. He came to Alabama in 1931, recruited by Coach Hank Crisp. He started his coaching career as an assistant at Alabama under Coach Frank Thomas. He moved to Vanderbilt in 1940 as an assistant under Red Sanders, serving two years and then enlisting in the Navy during World War II. He attained the rank of Lieutenant Commander in the Navy.

In 1945, he returned to civilian life and became head coach at Maryland. His first job as a head coach saw his Terrapins go 6-2-1. He went to Kentucky in 1946, staying eight seasons and rolling up a 60-23-5 record, winning the SEC title once and going to four bowl games.


Texas A&M was his next stop in 1954 and he promptly went from a 1-9 season his first year to an unbeaten season in 1956. In four season he was 25-14-2, including a Southwest Conference title and a bowl bid.

His return to Alabama in 1958 was his most successful rebuilding job.

Bryant is married to the former Mary Harmon Black and they have two children. Son Paul Bryant Jr. is married and has three children and daughter Mae Martin is Mrs. John Tyson III with two children.



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### Tide football beginnings

"Mr. W. G. Little, of Livingston, Ala., was the first man to introduce football at the University. Mr. Little had been a student at Andover, Mass., and went to the University Alabama) carrying his uniform and a great bag of enthusiasm for the game in 1892. A number of students joined in with him in the season beginning in October of that year." -Crimson White (Student Paper), Nov. 25, 1926.

Alabama's first game was played in Birmingham on Friday afternoon, Nov. 11, 1892, at the old Lakeview Park. Opposition was furnished by a picked team from Professor Taylor's school and Birmingham high schools, with Alabama winning, 56-0. Early teams were a bit tougher than current squads, it seems, as the following afternoon Alabama played the Birmingham Athletic Club, losing 5-4 when Ross, of B. A. C., kicked a 65 yard field goal. Impossible though it may seem, this field goal was listed as a collegiate record at one time and Birmingham papers of the day featured its distance in writeups of the game.

been a star at Birmingham's Ramsay High School before earning honors as the Tide's center in the 1940s, was athletic director of FSU at the time and had a great homecoming.

One knew quickly that it was going to be an unusual night. Florida State broke in front 7-0 on a punt return for a touchdown and soon went to 14-0 as quarterback Kim Hammond (the son of an Alabama alumnus, Bill Hammond) began a passing blitz that would finally end at 23 completes in 40 attempts for 280 yards and three touchdowns.

The first of eight lead changes came when Alabama came from behind on two Ken Stabler engineered touchdowns to go in front 15-14.

Most of the passing that night (Stabler hit 11 of 20 for 192 yards and two touchdowns) involved the receiving of Ron Sellers for Florida State and Dennis Homan for Alabama. Sellers pulled in 13 for 165 yards and a touchdown while Homan grabbed six for 159 yards and two scores.

Florida State had the better of the statistics that night, including 407 yards of

total offense to Alabama's 287.

The 37 points that the Seminoles scored that night were at that time the most points ever scored on a Paul Bryant - coached Alabama team. And the 37 points was also the same total that Alabama had surrendered to 10 regular season opponents the year before.

As if anything was needed to make it a memorable game, a television crew filmed Alabama sideline action and dressing room activities at halftime (through a one-way glass) for a nationally televised program on Coach Bryant.

And the collapse of Alabama's defense was not the only new thing that night.

Alabama press credentials had always carried the notation that women and children were prohibited in the press box, a measure designed to keep nonworkers out. Actually, women had been in the press boxes for years, primarily as Western Union operators. Walker, a reporter for the Associated Press in Birmingham, took exception to the prohibition and asked for credentials. It was not really clear if Ms. Walker was particularly interested in pioneering women in the working press areas, but she probably enjoyed the game since she was an FSU alumna. Alabama head football coach said following last week's Alabama victory over Ole Miss that "Old Woodrow was back."

Everyone knows that Woodrow Lowe, All -America linebacker as a sophomore, Alabama's leading tackler and a unanimous pre - season All -Southeastern Conference selection. "I hadn't said anything about it," said the Alabama coach, "but Woodrow hadn't been looking like his old self until Saturday." Against the Rebels, Woodrow was in on 12 tackles, broke up a pass and made three tackles behind the line of scrimmage. And now he's right back in his accustomed place as Bama's leading tackler. He's been in on 25 primary stops and 10 assists this year, including four tackles behind the opponents' line of scrimmage for losses totaling 21 yards.

Another Bama defender who had an outstanding game was safetyman Ricky Davis, who had two interceptions, returning one 67 yards. Alabama touchdowns followed both thefts in the come - from - behind Crimson Tide victory. Davis now has a team - leading

three interceptions on the year. Ronny Robertson, Mike Washington and Alan Pizzitola have one pass interception each and Steve Ford picked off a fumble in midair.

Other fumble recoveries have been made by Mike Dubose, Mark Prudhomme, Wayne Rhodes and Colenzo Hubbard. Fumbles have been caused by Leroy Cook, Conley Duncan, Willie McCray, Gary Yelvington, James Taylor and Dubose.

Another Tider who is back in his leading role is Dubose. A big man on pass rush, Mike has now made three tackles behind the opponents' line of scrimmage for a team leading 31 yards in losses. Others, in addition to Dubose and Lowe, who have made tackles for losses are: Three each, Mike Washington (for 12 yards) and Pizzitola (11 yards); two each, Bob Baumhower (13 yards), Robertson (five yards) and Charles Hannah (three yards); and one each, Greg Montgomery (eight yards), Cook (eight yards), Gus White (seven yards), Rhodes (two yards), Hubbard (five yards), Paul Harris (three vards), Bobby Mikel (three yards) and Dick Turpin (two yards).



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



# Seminoles do have talent

Last time Florida State played Alabama, it was one of the more memorable games in collegiate history, a 37-37 tie at Birmingham in 1967.

That was one of the good years of pass-oriented Florida State. That team went on to win its last seven of regular season and tie Penn State 17-17 in the Gator Bowl. Several Seminoles of that era were high draft choices with the pros.

Lately, of course, hard times have fallen upon Florida State. It has lost 16 straight now, its last victory over Tulsa 23-21 on Nov. 11, 1972.

In losing its first four of this season, Florida State has not been without some bright spots under Darrell Mudra, the new coach. Three of the four losses — all in Tallahassee — were close: Pittsburgh 9-6, Colorado State 14-7, Baylor 21-17. A good Kansas team, playing on its home field, ran up a 40-9 score.

This is a team that has

Mike Shumann is a sophomore who appears somewhat in the mould of some of Florida State's better wide receivers of the past.

Rudy Maloy, a sophomore defensive end, has considerable potential.


The Seminoles are not totally without some upperclassmen of quality.

Larry Key, a freshman, has the stamp of an extraordinary running back, and Rudy Thomas, a sophomore, is much in the same category. Both are quick, and altogether willing.

The kicking game has been sound, with Joe Downey's


punting a key.

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

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


state university such as ours. There are so many people who do not have such an opportunity."



"The NCAA no longer overlooks or condones the slighting of scholastics, but now stresses equal academic and athletic achievement — and rightfully so because increased media exposure

has demolished the athlete's private shelter. He is scrutinized both on and off the field and is evaluated in both dimensions.

"Consequently, each player must come to realize that academics assumes equal importance with participation. One without the other becomes impossible. I am more than grateful for my experience at Notre Dame - from embarrassment in the Orange Bowl to the capturing of the 1973 National Championship. The winning, the losing, the education and the discipline can be nothing beneficial."

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


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

#### School of social work includes practical experience

Theory may be good. But combining the theory learned from textbooks and classroom lectures with working with real people in real situations is much better.

Administrators and faculty members of the School of Social Work at The University of Alabama recognize the importance of practical work experience in addition to classroom instruction.

Each senior in the undergraduate program and every graduate student spend one semester gaining this practical experience by working with an agency. Whatever the student's interest — whether it be in the area of children, juvenile delinquency, mental health or the elderly — there is almost certain to be a field education placement available.

Agencies in Birmingham, Huntsville, Tuskegee, Montgomery, Mobile, and Tuscaloosa cooperate with the University by providing placement opportunities.

According to Gerald Eure, director of Field Education, and Mrs. Sara Bell Allen, assistant director, the students work with the agencies four days and attend classes one day each week.

Faculty members are available to counsel the students who have problems with their placements or the clients assigned to them by the agencies "The students

Faculty members are available to counsel the students who have problems with their placements or the clients assigned to them by the agencies. "The students learn a great deal just by listening to their clients,' said Eure. "When they finish school they will continue to learn from their clients."

Much of the work done by the students involves working with entire families. Mrs. Allen gave as an example a student placed with the Boys Club of Tuscaloosa and who was asked to help with a child with behavior problems.

"The first step was to talk to the child, to find out how he felt about himself and his behavior," said Mrs. Allen.

She said it is not unusual for such an initial interview to reveal that the child is jealous of one or more of his brothers and sisters — that he feels his parents show favoritism for them. One or both parents may have a drinking problem or they argue or fight with each other, causing the youngster to lose sleep and become nervous and rebellious.

"In order to help the child correct his behavior, it is necessary for the student to work with the entire family in such cases," said Mrs. Allen. "Family counseling, Alcoholics Anonymous, or another agency may be recommended and the

student maintains close contact with both the individual and the family

group."

For the student assigned to a school system, a third dimension is added — the teacher. Children with learning difficulties may well have the same problems with their home environments as the children with behavioral problems. Close cooperation with the classroom teacher essential to the helping of the child.

Families also play an important role in the recovery of patients released from Veterans ministration hospitals. "Our students work with 'followup' teams who visit expatients in their home communities," said Mrs. Allen. "A good home environment is necessary for the patient's recovery."

Social work students spend their field education placement semesters with such agencies as family court, mental health clinics. Department of Pensions and Security offices, hospitals, schools and agencies concerned with the aging.

"Probably the most difficult thing the student has to face is coping with failure" said Eure. "The students want so much to be 100 percent successful working with their clients that it is hard for them to admit an occasional defeat. This is a reality they must learn to accept.'

According to Eure, their success rate is very high and the agencies have expressed appreciation for their services and continue to work closely with this facet of the education of social work students.
