

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
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Welcome to the Orange Bowl on behalf of the City and the University of Miami

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Dr. Henry King Stanford

HENRY KING STANFORD, one of the most highly respected leaders in the academic world, became third president of the University of Miami July 1, 1962. A native of Atlanta, Ga., Dr. Stanford has won national and international recognition as an educator with integrity, imagination, vision, high scholarship and courage.

To his office as President he brings a philosophy of education which he summarizes briefly as a "responsibility to maintain an atmosphere in which ideas may flourish—where students may become acquainted with the accumulated knowledge of the ages, where they will be intellectually challenged and inspired to make a contribution toward preserving and extending the finest that is bequeathed to us."

Dr. Stanford holds his Baccalaureate and Master's degrees from Emory University where he majored in German and international relations. In between these degrees, he received a Certificate for studies at the University of Heidelberg, Germany. He earned a second Master's degree in government management from the University of Denver where he was an Alfred P. Sloan Foundation Fellow, and his Doctor of Philosophy degree in political science and public administration from New York University, where he was a Tax Foundation Fellow.

Before becoming president of the University of Miami, Dr. Stanford was for five years president of Birmingham-Southern College. He was a member of the faculties of Emory, the Georgia Institute of Technology and the University of Denver, whose School of Public Administration he directed. For New York University, he was director of its Air-Supported technical assistance program to the University of Ankara and to the Turkish Ministry of Education. His administrative responsibilities include eight years as an administrator with the Board of Regents of the

University of Georgia. During this period, he held the posts of President of Georgia Southwestern College, Director of the University Center in Georgia, Assistant Chancellor of the University System of Georgia and President of Georgia College at Milledgeville.

Dr. Stanford has been a member of major committees of the Association of American Colleges and the Southern Association of Colleges which he served as president last year and holds membership in six academic honorary societies, including Phi Beta Kappa. In recognition, he has been awarded eight honorary degrees by universities in this country and abroad. He has also been a recipient of the Eleanor Roosevelt—Israel Humanitarian Award.

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"UM Bowl History"...

New Wording This Year?

The University of Miami has not appeared in a post-season bowl game since 1967 and that delights Bill Forbess. It makes his job a little easier.

Forbess is the printer who puts out Miami's football press guide. Each year, despite all the alterations, there is one constant — Forbess always uses last year's material on "U-M Bowl History."


These five pages haven't really differed since the 1968 guide. Type size may change, the printing might be blue or black, the order reversed, but the wording is exactly the same. Devote a page to bowl records, then a four-page history of U-M's 12 bowl appearances:

The 1933-34 Palm Festivals; the first Orange Bowl in 1935, played in a wooden stadium on the site; the 1946 and '51 Orange Bowls; a 1952 Gator Bowl victory over Clemson, avenging the '51 Orange Bowl; the Name Games of the sixties—the 1961 Liberty Bowl in Philadelphia; a frozen Gotham Bowl in Yankee Stadium in 1962; Memphis Liberty in 1966; and a Houston Bluebonnet in '67.

But nothing since. The Hurricanes have not had a winning season since '67, much less a post-season. Three defeats destroyed a 5-2 start in 1968. A 4-2 dream in 1951 became a 4-7 nightmare. Again last season, the Hurricanes stormed out to 4-2. They crawled home 5-6,

eating apples and watching Oranges, Peaches and Tangerines on television.

But this year, Bill Forbess may finally have more typesetting to do. After last week's 14-7 victory over Virginia Tech, the Hurricanes are 5-2. They are

favored to beat Florida State tonight and Syracuse in two weeks. They'll be underdogs against Alabama next Saturday and Florida.

But unlike the past, Miami has won the little ones this year, the games it should, and must, win. And a victory over FSU may make the Syracuse game academic. Few teams will be 6-2 next weekend, when major bowl bids are traditionally presented.

And while Miami may not spend New Year's Eve in New Orleans' French Quarter or the next afternoon in Dallas, the Sun in El Paso is nice. Or an Atlanta Peach, a little more Liberty, an Astro-Bluebonnet this time, and why not a Fiesta in Arizona?

Certainly, U-M is bowl-conscious. Since fall camp, the talk has constantly been of a bowl, the 12-game season. Defensive coordinator Bob Herndon remembers sitting helplessly at home on New Year's Day, while an assistant at Oregon State, watching Southern Cal or Stanford in the Rose Bowl. That only the PAC 8 champion could go to a bowl was frustrating to other conference members.


For an independent like Miami, though, there is not even the pseudo-satisfaction of a second-place finish. Bowl games are the essence. They are for winners. And what the University of Miami needs, and can have, is a winner.

Winning does wonders for public sentiment. It puts people into the Orange Bowl on Friday nights, not just Sunday afternoons. It makes local and long-distance recruiting that much easier. And it makes money.

Bowling for dollars is much more profitable in the stadium than on the television screen. Miami has already received two nice checks for regional television appearances against Houston and Notre Dame. Nothing would be nicer than a third.

Even if it did make Bill Forbess' job a little tougher.

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"A University, like its football team, must call its signals on the basis of teamwork and tested strategies, and yet be unafraid to try a new approach when — or even before — an old one fails," says Florida State's President Stanley Marshall.

Thus, Florida State is an ever-changing institution — proud of its past, influential in its present form, confident in its future — and, above all, actively concerned about each of the 20,000 students it is serving in 1974.

As one of nine institutions in the State University System, and the second oldest, Florida State's traditions date back to its founding in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee. Yet its vision encompasses the needs of mankind in the 21st Century. The University's faculty and administrators are alert to both the immediate and long-range problems of society which require solution and educational assistance.

Academically and athletically, Florida State continues to be a contender for top ranking among the nation's leading universities.

Although Seminole athletics can be traced back to the first decade of the 20th Century, the University's history includes a number of years when it was known as the Florida State College for Women (1905-47). The dynamic growth of intercollegiate athletics, since co-education and university status came to the campus in 1947, has paralleled the phenomenal physical and enrollment growth of the institution in the last two and one-half decades.

Supported by major grants from the National Science Foundation, the University has attained national prominence in physics, statistics, chemistry, and psychobiology. In athletics, the last decade has seen Seminole teams earn major bowl and tournament appearances and several bona fide All-America titles. In academics, the same period of time has seen two Nobel Laureates added to the faculty — one on a full time, the other on an annual winter quarter basis.

A pioneer in the field of oceanography for many years, Florida State is making marine studies (including the U.S. Sea Grant Program) one of its strong points of emphasis in the decade ahead. Facilities for oceanographic research are located both on the campus and in the Ed Ball Marine Laboratories on the Gulf of Mexico, south of Tallahassee.

Balancing its prestige in the sciences with academic achievements in the arts and humanities as well, Florida State is the home base for the State Theater, State Opera and State Symphony of Florida. Its role as an artistic and cultural pacesetter is long-standing and international in scope in art, music and theater.

Artists-in-residence this year will include two international known composers, Australian Malcolm Williamson and the Polish composer Kryzysztof Penderecki. In recent years students have had an opportunity to study under such talents as composer Carlos Menotti and writer-in-residence, Dr. E.R. Braithwaite, author of the best selling, "To Sir, With Love."

The John MacArthur Center for American Theatre, a \$19.4 million project, announced last year is envisioned as a home for American theatre, a focal point for the development of the art at both the educational and professional levels. Though still in the planning stages, the Center has already attracted major donations and promises to establish Florida State's preeminence in collegiate theatre.

At the undergraduate level, Florida State students have a choice of more than 87 different baccalaureate fields of study; and at the graduate level, a choice of more than 85 master's degree areas and 58 doctoral programs.


Rounding out the University's research resources are two nuclear accelerators, million-book library and special research facilities in geophysical fluid dynamics, educational research and technology, moleular biophysics, social research, political research, psyhobiology and psyhology.



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Tonight!

Close, wild struggles in most games have resulted for University of Miami's football team this fall—and tonight's rival battle with the Seminoles of Florida State should be no exception.

It's the 18th renewal of relations between the school.

It could be a wilder than ever game, despite FSU's non-winning status over the past couple of years. While dropping 20 in a row, the Darrell Mudra coached North Floridians have shown they can give nightmares to the greatest of them — and could become a giant-killer.

Not so long ago, the Alabama-Florida State scoreboard was unbelievable when it read FSU 7, Alabama 3 late in the fourth quarter. The Seminole lead was no fluke. They had outgained and outplayed the highly favored, high ranked and unbeaten Tide. They had narrowly missed a field goal which would have padded the lead.

A costly penalty forced Coach Mudra to make a quick decision. The penalty pushed his Seminoles so close to their goal line, that, rather than take a chance on getting a kick blocked in the end zone, he chose to take a deliberate safety, narrowing the gap to 7-5 — but forcing his team to give up the ball on a free kick from the 20.

Given that last tiny break, the Tide, aided by one brilliant pass reception, was able to move down the field and kick a field

goal with only seconds to play. The Seminoles, who outgained their rivals by a decisive margin, were nosed out 8-7.

One week later, far from disheartened by the loss, Florida State fought tooth and nail against mighty Florida and trailed only 10-7 before succumbing in the final period.

They gave Pitt a scare before losing 9-6. They were in the ball game all the way before losing to Colorado State 14-7, and led a strong Baylor team 17 to 0 at half time before losing 21-17.

Miami goes into tonight's 18th battle leading FSU 9-8 in the win-loss column. However, the Seminoles have dominated the series since 1962. When Pete Elliott took Miami to Tallahassee land last year and scored a close triumph, it was the first win UM had tallied over the Seminoles since 1962. Miami has lost to FSU the last seven times the teams have met in the Orange Bowl.

Tonight, FSU would like nothing better than to upset Miami and lose that bitter-pill-of-defeat taste.

There's no doubt about it, you can look for the Seminoles to come at us like a bunch of wild Indians, throwing everything they have toward the upset bucket.

Like most FSU teams of bygone years, the Seminoles are dangerous through the air. But they can run, too, as they exhibited against Alabama and some of the other teams. They outrushed Alabama 207 yards to 157 and outpassed the unbeaten Crimson Tide, 138 to 72. Mudra's gang outpassed Florida 149 yards to 112.


Key man in the rushing phase at FSU is freshman Larry Key. Another dangerous back is Rudy Thomas, a sophomore from Quincy.


FSU has good receivers in Joe Goldsmith, Ed Beckman and Mike Shuman.

The Seminoles, so far this year, have completed more than 55 per cent of their passes with Ron Coppess and Steve Mathieson on the pitching end.

Tonight's battle is a big one for Miami, just as it is a real biggie for the Seminoles. A victory would give Miami its first winning season since 1967, when the UMers went to the Bluebonnet Bowl. A win also would strengthen Miami's chances for a 1974 bowl bid.
















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
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
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PETE ELLIOTT

Head Football Coach and Athletic Director

PETE ELLIOTT serves in a dual role at the University of Miami. He's now in his second year as head coach of football, while he became Director of Athletics—moving up from the associate position—with the retirement of Ernie McCoy June 1, 1974.

A year ago, Coach Elliott's first UM team turned in one of the most stunning upsets in the history of the school, astoundingly knocking off University of Texas, which was ranked as high as No. 1 in the nation in one national pre-season poll. The victory brought Pete United Press International National Coach-Of-The-Week honors.

Elliott's first Hurricane team also gave mighty Oklahoma its toughest battle of the year. Pete's Hurricanes led the Sooners 20 to 7 in the third quarter before finally losing a 24 to 20 cliff-hanger thriller.

Down through the years, Elliott has been associated with many of the nation's great universities. When taking over the helm of UM football in 1973, he carried with him the class which goes from having served as head coach at University of Illinois, University of California, and University of Nebraska, and as an assistant under the famed Bud Wilkinson at University of Oklahoma during the Sooners' greatest years.

Pete took both Illinois and California to the Rose Bowl, while he helped mold two national championship teams at Oklahoma. He was once runnerup as Coach-Of-The-Year.

As a player, Elliott was an All-American quarterback at the University of Michigan. He played on two undefeated Wolverine teams, the 1947 eleven which crushed Southern California 49 to 0 in the Rose Bowl, and the national championship team of 1948. He became an All-American in the latter year. Pete's 12 varsity letter winning career at Michigan (four each in football, basketball and golf) is without precedent. In the cage sport, he played under Ernie McCoy.

Following graduation, Elliott entered coaching at Oregon State (handled ends for two years 1949-50), and followed this with a five-year assistantship, 1951 through 1955, under Wilkinson at Oklahoma.

Pete moved on as head coach at Nebraska in 1956, then in 1957 he went to California as head coach for three years, taking his 1958 Golden Bears to the Rose Bowl.

Seven years as head football coach at Illinois followed. Elliott's 1963 Illini gridmen won the Big Ten championship and defeated Washington in the Rose Bowl. Pete's great feats of '63 brought him runnerup honors to Darrell Royal of Texas for Coach-Of-The-Year.

That's the wealth of experience and broad knowledge Pete Elliott brought to the University of Miami.




But glittering as are these credentials, they tell only a part of the story. They fail to give a true measure of the man who has won his way into the confidence and hearts of those with whom he has come in contact, of the athletes and of the community. After assuming the reins as head football coach, Elliott in record time assembled a coaching staff which stacks up as one of the most impressive in the entire nation. It is a staff which measures at the top in ability, in experience and in building confidence—it's the most distinguished staff in the school's history.

In an early interview following his appointment as head coach of the Hurricanes, Pete asserted: "We want to make football at the University of Miami important to the players, yet fun. Much of the fun comes in being with a team that you're proud to be with. A player should enjoy being around the squad. A good player and even a poor player deserves that. And that I owe to the squad. We know that year after year we face the toughest schedules in the country. We go in with our eyes open. I think players enjoy playing great teams—they remember them most."


Coach Elliott was born in Bloomington, Illinois, Sept. 29, 1926. He and Joan Elliott are the parents of two sons, both of whom lettered as defensive backs for University of Michigan Rose Bowl teams. Bruce completed his playing days in 1971 after playing in two Rose Bowl games, while David, a member of the 1973 Michigan team, played in the 1971 Rose Bowl game with the Wolverines.

Do-It-Yourself Stats

Every football fan knows that the score doesn't always give a good picture of a game. A few statistics, like those that can be kept on this page can make the picture clearer, show what the individual stars contribute and help to win post-game "debates." Besides, it can be fun to second guess the official scorers whose statistics will appear in tomorrow's papers. But before you start, here are some pointers on being a statistician:

1. Keep cumulative totals to be informed "up to the minute" and to simplify your figuring of team totals. Example: Jones gains 3, 6, 9, 2 yards and you write 3, 9,

18, 20 on his line.

2. On plays involving penalties measured from the point of the foul, credit the rusher or pass receiver with yardage only to the point of the infraction.

3. Charge gains and losses on fumbles to the player who, in your judgment, con-

tributed most to the error.

4. Don't score two-point conversion attempts after touchdowns as rushing or

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


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In The Enemy Camp

And so next week it is Alabama, then Syracuse and finally, that Florida date in Gainesville. The Syracuse game is on Friday night; the others are on Saturdays.

Alabama is always impressive and that 35-0 pasting they handed Mississippi State was a near perfect performance, both offensively and defensively.

Mississippi State went into the game with the best total offense yardage of any team in the Southeastern conference and came out with a puny 120 rushing yards on 45 tries. They had only three pass completions in 16 attempts for just 47 yards. That was just about the worst day ever for Rocky Felker, State's passer.

Richard Todd of Alabama was back after missing three games and the Tide offense went just as planned, chalking up five touchdowns and a field goal.

This week, Alabama entertains LSU in Birmingham. The Baton Rouge Tigers are below par this year and after Saturday, they will be off a few more points.

Syracuse is another Miami foe with a new coach and a team which has shown steady progress. The Orange plays West Virginia this week and Boston College next, and has a chance in each game. West Virginia hasn't come out of the shock of that 21-20 Miami victory and last week was annihilated by Boston College 35-3.

Syracuse has one of the nation's better runners in Jeff Kinsey, back in shape after a midseason injury which sidelined him several weeks. In Bernie Ruoff, they have a field goal kicker. He hit for 42 and 45 yards in the Pitt game. Syracuse, using the I formation better and better each week, has the attack which can get him within his long range.

Miami's last foe, Florida, showed once again in downing Auburn that it is a team which makes very few mistakes—and is quick to cash in on opponent bobbles. The Tigers set up the first Gator TD with a fumble, lost one on their own with an unbelievable pass muff by a man in the open on the one-yard line. Otherwise, they showed just enough lack of poise to be buried at the finish.

The Gators are deeper in running backs than ever before. Against Auburn, they unleashed a tremendous offense capable of running inside or out—of picking up the big gains on passes to the sure-handed McGriff.

Next year's foes are churning right along. Navy, which plays UM in the Orange Bowl, had Notre Dame whipped for more than three periods before bowing 14-6. That follows a 13-11 loss to Pitt and a 19-16 setback from Air Force. The Middies have been playing everybody close and tough.

Oklahoma won No. 7 over Iowa State and faces Missouri this week. No one really doubts who will win that one. Nebraska. now 6-2, should stay in the Big Eight race at the expense of Iowa State, while Colorado, fighting defensive problems, should break out big against Kansas. Boston College, which will entertain Miami next year, has won four of its last five games big and isn't likely to bow to Tulane this week. The Greenies have had unexpected troubles. Georgia Tech, Miami's 1975 opening opponent in Atlanta, took an unexpected loss to Duke but rests a week before tackling Navy. After scoring two to five TDs against everyone — and 22 points on Auburn, the Tech offense died against Duke. But this is a rebuilding year and everyone around Atlanta says things will be different in 1975. After all, the Engineers trounced North Carolina, Tulane, Virginia, and South Carolina and only defensive lapses have cost as many as three other wins.

Since playing Miami, Houston has reeled off five victories in a row. The Cougars are looking for bowl attention. They rest this week and then face Memphis State in a game in which the winner is almost sure to get a post season invitation.

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




