

Tribe Tonight

the Florida State football team and its fans tonight as the Mississippi State Bulldogs invade for the Tribe's third home game of the season.

The "10" represents the number of consecutive victories Florida State will have registered over the last two seasons if it can knock off Mississippi State. Four of those wins came at the close of last season and five more have come this year for the nationally-ranked Seminoles, who are off to their fastest start since 1971.

Mississippi State, however, is not going to be a willing victim. The Bulldogs are expected to give the Tribe their sternest test of the season which tonight goes beyond the midway point.

"Mississippi State seems to have gotten it all together," said head coach Bobby Bowden after viewing film of the Bulldogs' upset 28-9 victory over Tennessee last Saturday.

The Bulldogs had their problems early, bowing to Memphis State and Maryland, before taking Florida in the Southeastern Conference opener.

"You would have to expect Mississippi State to have some early-season problems," Bowden continued. "After all, the players are adjusting to a new coaching staff and offense."

The Bulldog offense is also going to be new to the Seminoles. Emory Bellard, the new head coach at Mississippi State, has installed the wishbone which features the ground game. It has been nearly two seasons since the FSU defense was confronted with a wishbone attack.

"We will need to make some adjustments quickly this week," Bowden said. "What makes the Mississippi State offense so tough to defend against is that it also features one of the country's outstanding receivers, Mardye McDole."

Last year McDole was a featured segment of the Bulldog offense. He caught 48 passes for 1,035 yards and seven touchdowns. He was a major nemesis to Florida State, catching nine passes — two touchdowns — for 175 yards. The yardage total is the best ever recorded for a Florida State opponent.

This year McDole has just six catches in four games. But, the yardage total is a neat 181, or 30.3 yards



per grab. And, get this—McDole's last three catches one vs. Florida and two vs. Tennessee have all been for touchdowns.

Florida State's defense is contending with the wishbone and McDole will be hard-pressed to match its effort of last week when it limited Louisville to 93 total yards, including seven along the ground.

That defensive gem was the best the Seminoles have put forth in the 39 games Bowden has been head coach. In fact, there are very few defensive efforts that can come close to matching last Saturday. The lowest previous total for an opponent's total offense was the 148 gained by Syracuse in the 1978 opener.

FSU's offense underwent a face-lift last week. The Tribe gained 275 yards

along the ground and a mere 60 through the air. No, the Seminoles did

not plan to go totally with the ground game at Louisville.

"The way our offense is designed we attempt to take what the defense is giving us," Bowden said. "Louisville apparently decided to give us the run and stop the pass."

Thus it will be interesting for Tribe fans tonight to see what Mississippi State attempts to do in defending against the Seminole attack. Prior to last Saturday most teams were trying to guard against the pass, but after the fine rushing performance it's doubtful any future team on the Seminole schedule will not respect the running



The Luck of the Italians

Defensive Back Monk Bonasorte Is Lucky and Good


ho ever heard of an Italian running around with a four-leaf clover stuck in his hip pocket?

Nobody.

But many believe that's got to be the case with Monk Bonasorte, Florida State's transplanted Pennsylvanian who might just feast on Irish corned beef and cabbage (in addition to wide receivers and running backs) rather than pasta pazzul.

The junior safety with the Seminoles is lucky. He admits it, though he does not admit to the totin' clover in his pocket. Coach Bobby Bowden feels it, just as he feels he's a little lucky, too.

But Bonasorte, who grabbed off five errant enemy aerials in the first five games this season, has a little more than luck on his side. There's some-

thing called talent. And something else called intuition. Maybe he should have been born a female, with all that intuition, but luckily for Florida State and Seminole football, Bonasorte was born a male, with just a touch of luck and intuition on his side.

Bowden put it rather succinctly when he talks about luck. "I think luck has to have a lot to do with football, with a player or a team or a coach. I think I am lucky. We have to be to win some of the games we've won. And I think Monk is lucky, too. He's certainly not the biggest, fastest or quickest defensive back we've ever had, but he has been in the right place at the right time. Now, listen, all that isn't luck. Bonasorte is a smart football player, and a player with the smarts doesn't have to be as quick or as fast as the others."

Seminole fans might well recall another defensive back or two that used to wear Garnet and Gold who were not all that fast but who had the alertness and smarts to make them the best. Remember Walt Sumner who toiled back in the winning years of the late sixties, and J. T. Thomas who scourged opposing backs for FSU in the early 70's?

Both went on to be top draft choices in the NFL and had fine careers, Sumner with the Cleveland Browns and J. T. still with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Both were good, neither was exceptionally fast, but they both had lots of moxie. So does Monk Bonasorte.


And speaking of luck, the Seminoles are just plain lucky that Bonasorte is


even here in the first place. When he played high school and sand-lot football in Pittsburgh, he was a somewhat short (if you call 6 feet short) and chubby tight end. Most recruiters wouldn't even give him the time of day, much less offer a scholarship.

But somebody up there liked him, and when the time came for Monk to find a place to play in college, a call was made to defensive coordinator Jack Stanton, who also is from the Pittsburgh area. "Well," Stanton responded, "tell the kid to give me a call. I've never seen him play, so how can I judge?"

Monk called. They had a little talk and Stanton urged the youngster to get to Tallahassee somehow and they would see what he could do.

Bonasorte was interested enough to follow up on that conversation. He came to FSU on his own and came out continued on page 7

for practice when drills opened in the spring of '77 as a walk-on.

He had ideas of playing tight end, just like he did back home in Pittsburgh. "But when I got on that practice field and saw all those 6-6 and 6-5 tight ends, I knew I had better look around for somewhere else to play, so it was strong safety or nothing."

It was in that very first spring drill that Lady Luck smiled on the young Italian from Pennsylvania. He was running somewhere on the third or fourth string defensive back slot and they were defending on the two-yard line.

Suddenly, there was a fumble and the ball bounced into the air instead of on the ground. And guess who was standing right there?


Bonasorte grabbed the errant pigskin and scampered 98 yards for a touchdown.

"Who was THAT?" queried a suddenly interested Bobby Bowden. They had to look him up on the roster sheet, but from then on, Monk Bonasorte caught the coach's eye.

In that first season in 1977, the youngster played some on defense, but it wasn't until he played before the home town folks in Pittsburgh in 1978 that Bonasorte came into his own. He was the defensive star of the show in the Seminoles 9-7 loss, but it was then the staff discovered that Bonasorte had a little more than luck riding in his hip pocket.

He was all over the field in that one, making tackle after tackle and in general harassing the Panthers to a near point of frustration. Now comes the 1979 season, and Bonasorte has established himself as a mainstay in the Seminole defensive backfield. Lady Luck came calling again in the very first contest.

On Southern Mississippi's first



seven punts of the game, Bonasorte was not on the punt return team. The eighth time he was.

The Southern Mississippi blocking back looked over the FSU defense and saw the power lineup to the right, led by Ron Simmons and Bobby Butler, two Tribesmen who have a high percentage mark in blocking punts.

"They're coming!" he shouted, and the shift was towards Simmons and Butler. Bonasorte had just come into the lineup and nobody paid any attention to him at all.

Mistake.

"I had a straight run at the kicker, and just blocked it, that's all," he said. "Guess I was lucky again."

The Lady was also with Monk in

the second game of the season against Arizona State in Tampa. He intercepted two passes, and on the first one he again said he was lucky. "The quarterback simply overthrew the ball right into my hands. Now that's lucky.

"On the second interception I could read what they were going to do. I watched the quarterback's eyes, and when I saw the swing man in motion my way, I just went towards him when the quarterback cocked his arm. I stepped in front and had it."

No luck there . . . just plain ol' good football playing. That kind of action has something to do with Bonasorte having the smarts.

Then, against Miami, li'l ol' Monk did it again, grabbing off two errant Hurricane tosses, and getting himself in on several tackles in the Seminole secondary.

Such is the lot, in many cases, with walk-on football players. Maybe it all started back in the 20's or early 30's with guys like George Gipp. He hated football and didn't want any part in it 'til Knute Rockne spoke with him a few times.

Bonasorte loves the game, and he has to be proud of the way he has come into his own after finding his way down from the mountains of Pennsylvania to the hills of Tallahassee.

He came here with a lot of hope, enthusiasm and trepidation. He had no scholarship or other financial aid. "I was hoping I could play well enough to get somebody's attention," he said.

He has.

He probably got that scholarship about three seconds after he ran that 98 yard fumble back for a TD in practice. He didn't take long to get noticed.

BOWDEN!

ow does one describe Florida State head football coach Bobby Bowden?

Bobby Bowden may be one of the original down-home, good old boys, and to hear him tell it he's been a Seminole all his life. He wears a garnet and gold stripe shirt, hits golf balls with an official FSU driver and, if properly motivated, might tell you he bleeds garnet and gold.

He truly enjoys being the head football coach at Florida State University.

And, why shouldn't he?

After all, in three seasons, the Seminoles have compiled a 23-11 record under the guidance of Bowden, who currently ranks 15th on the active list of college coaches in winning percentage (.691).

But, for Bowden it's more than just winning. Being a head football coach at a major university allows him to be out and around, meeting the people. During the month of May, for instance, he normally speaks to a minimum of 25 Seminole Booster Clubs around the state.

Why?

There are two obvious answers: recruiting and fund raising.

But there's more to this man who has turned the fortunes of the Florida

State football program from ashes to a rising star on the national scene. He is more than just a football coach. He is also a deeply religious individual, who when he's not on the road recruiting and raising funds, can often be found at a church podium in Tallahassee or one of the surrounding communities on Sunday mornings.

"I enjoy meeting and talking with people," Bowden explains. "I'm not a preacher. I'm not qualified to preach. I do like to share my experiences with God, though, especially with young people."

"I want to add something to their lives . . . to make them aware of what's going on around them."

"Kids enjoy listening to coaches speak. I know I did when I was growing up. Kind of looked up to them, you know what I mean?"

Bowden certainly has the football buffs of the southeastern United States attention after what has happened in three seasons at Florida State.

Consider these facts . . .


- (1) After going 4-29 in three seasons B.B. (Before Bowden), the Seminoles have now compiled a 23-11 mark with him captaining the ship;
 - (2) The 1977 Seminoles won 10

games enroute to a 10-2 record. Those 10 victories represent the most ever registered by any major (Division I-A) college team now playing football in Florida;

- (3) Florida State's '77 Seminoles finished the season ranked 11th and 14th in the individual wire service polls;
- (4) Bowden took the Seminoles '77 to their first bowl appearance since the 1971 Fiesta Bowl;
- (5) Despite the fact that there were just five seniors on the 1978 squad, it survived a mid-season slump, to manage an 8-3 record. That ledger was not good enough for national ranking or a bowl appearance at the conclusion of the season but it provided momentum for 1979;
- (6) Early in the 1978 campaign, FSU managed to rank ninth and 10th in the wire service polls after three consecutive victories. Those were the highest rankings EVER for a Seminole football squad.
- So... Seminole fans look forward to 1979. It should be an especially pleasing campaign for Bowden, a Birmingham, Ala., native, because unless the Garnet and Gold suffers a complete collapse Bowden will notch his 100th coaching victory at the major college level.

Bowden begins 1979 just four wins shy of the 100 victory plateau. His overall report card is 96-43 and includes marks of 31-6 at Samford and 42-26 at West Virginia before joining the Seminole camp.

Bowden began at Florida State with a 5-6 record. But, since that time everything has been on the upward



trend. And, despite the disappointment of not receiving a bowl berth or finishing in the prestigious Top 20 Semnole fans remain excited.

That is because of the pass happy

offense Bowden has installed since taking over. Last year the Seminoles displayed the 11th best offense (411.1 yards per game) in the country and the third best passing attack (249.9). And, the team averaged 28.4 points a game. The point average included 38 point efforts in three of the final four games.

What is the reason for the Bowden coaching success?

Enthusiasm and discipline are key words which exemplify Bowden's overall attitude, both on and off the field.

"I believe in discipline and enthusiasm in everything you do in life," Bowden says, "and you coach what you believe. If we can be enthusiastic in the little things we do, it will carry over to a winning season."

"But don't get me wrong about discipline. I believe in letting the players know who is boss, and I believe in some sacrifice and devotion. But discipline can only go so far."

"If short hair and perfect manners won football games, the Army-Navy game would be played every year for the national championship."

Bowden's coaching philosophy is quite simple.

"I believe in blocking and tackling," he says. "Everything else in this game is secondary; blocking and tackling will cause wins."

Winning means a lot to Bowden, an avid golfer, who since moving to Tallahassee has improved his game steadily.

"I don't believe in playing without a scorecard," says Bowden. "I don't feel there is any accomplishment with a tie. I think if one of my teams was playing Notre Dame for the national title and I had the choice of winning or losing or going for the tie, I would go for the win."

National championship was not a term mentioned with a great deal of frequency at Florida State until the last two years. Bowden explains it cautiously.

"A national championship is the ultimate in coaching, but I must be realistic," says Bowden. "Every year we set new goals with our team. In 1977 our first objective was landing a spot in the Top 20. Then we wanted a bowl bid."

"Last year we fell short of our goal—gaining a spot in the final Top 10 and going to our second consecutive bowl game. But, that may not have been all that bad. Our players know that to achieve those goals they must do more than step on the field. They realize Florida State needs a consistent winning record to be a legiti-

mate contender each year for national honors."

Born on November 8, 1929, Bowden attended Woodlawn High School in Birmingham, Ala., and was a Little All-American quarterback at Samford University. He holds a bachelor's degree from Samford and master's from Peabody College. He married his childhood sweetheart, the former Julia Ann Estock, and they have six children.

Mrs. Bowden is active in the Tallahassee community and recently helped establish the Extra Point Club, a group of women working towards the betterment of FSU football. Steve is studying for the ministry in Louisville, Robyn teaches at Fairmont State College, Tommy is a graduate assistant on the FSU staff, Terry manages the Coble Terrace residence hall which houses many of the Seminole football players, Jeff is a walkon wide receiver at Florida State and Ginger is a freshman at FSU.



In Quest of Gold

hree athletes, three events and three separate roads to success. But, what Florida State track stars Mike Roberson, Walter McCoy and Brad Cooper all have in common is the desire to win and the ability to satisfy that desire.

The trio of Roberson, McCoy and Cooper all achieved great notoriety last spring and summer with impressive victories on the national and international level. While bringing great acclaim to themselves as athletes, the three thinclads also helped put Florida State on the 'track map' of world competition.

For Roberson, a senior this year with only outdoor eligibility, the road to success began after the regular season was over. Injured all year, the swift-footed Winter Park native qualified for the AAU Championships in Atlanta with a time of 10.40 for the 100. With only three meets and a month of training behind him Roberson ran a blistering 10.24 in the semifinal round placing him against the best in the U.S. in the finals of the 100 meter dash. Backing off at the end, Roberson earned a sixth place finish, but more importantly placed his name on the list of alternates for the 4x100 race at the Pan Am Games.

Between the AAU's and the Pan Am Games Roberson tested his injury running in the Jacques Courer Relays at Bourges, France. Roberson led off the 4x100 squad and picked up a gold medal — his first of many. A combination of injuries and his impressive performance at the Courer Relays placed him in the leadoff position at the Pan Am Games where he and the U.S. squad earned yet another gold medal. Roberson's next excursion took him to Colorado Springs for the American Sports Festival. It was here more than anywhere else that the world took notice of Florida State's Mike Roberson.

In a leg that track experts are still talking about, the now well conditioned athlete ran an incredible 9.98 split and gave his Southern team, a commanding lead that led to gold once again.

Continuing the torrid pace, Roberson was next invited to participate at the World University Games in the 4x100, but this time also in the 100 meter dash. Hungry for competition he reported to Colorado Springs to begin training when a phone call came. The call was from the U.S. team at the World Cup Games in Montreal and another invitation was extended to the FSU sprinter for the 4x100. Injuries and a poor lane assignment cost the team the gold, but a silver medal and Roberson's fourth consecutive su-

perlative performance kept the eyes of the track world on the senior. Roberson returned to the World University Games at Mexico City and began to do his thing. In a practice run, this time in the 200, he ran a 20.1, one of the ten best times of the year and an FSU record. Returning to the events that he was invited for, Roberson was not disappointing. He set a World University Games record of 10.7 in the open 100 (tieing him with UCLA's James Sanford for the fastest time in the world that year) qualifying round and captured the gold medal one day later with a clocking of 10.19.


"Mike Roberson has the physical and mental ability to make the Olympic team," said FSU track coach Dick Roberts. "You reach a point in your career when you're 'right' and things are going your way. Mike has an excellent chance of being heard from in 1980."

The second thinclad that brought fame to Tallahassee is junior Walter McCoy. Like Roberson, McCoy was injured all season, but unlike his teammate he was able to run in pain.

"Walt simply gutted it out all year," Roberts said. "We tried everything we could but nothing worked — he still wanted to run."

What did finally work was an alien continued on page 51

Six simple ways to get better mileage.



1. REMOVE EXCESS WEIGHT.

Your trunk is an expensive storeroom. Because a loaded trunk will hurt your mileage. In fact, for every 100 pounds removed, the average person can improve mileage enough to drive an extra 200 miles a year.



2. CHECK YOUR TIRES.

Air can save you gas, because too little air in your tires usually means less mileage. Check your owner's manual or tire dealer for the maximum recommended pressure. And always check pressures when your tires are cold. Early morning is best.

If you're buying tires, consider radials. They can be worth an extra mile per gallon.




3. USE A MULTIGRADE OIL.

A 10W/30 or 10W/40 oil causes less drag inside your engine than a regular 30 or 40 weight. This can mean better mileage. So if you're using a single grade oil now, consider switching next time you get an oil change.



4. CHECK YOUR AIR CLEANER.

A dirty air cleaner hurts mileage, because it prevents your engine from breathing properly. Remember that in dusty or polluted areas, air cleaners should be checked more frequently, and replaced when they're dirty.



5. KEEP YOUR WHEELS IN LINE.

When a wheel is out of line, it hurts both your tires and your mileage. So take a look at your tires. If there is more wear on one side, you should have your alignment checked.



6. CHECK SPARK PLUGS.

Worn or fouled plugs cause hard starting, loss of power, and poor mileage. Plugs should have no rounded electrodes, and the inside should be a light brown to tan color.

Also, check the plug wires. Worn or cracked plug wires can short out and cause missing and fouled plugs.

sounding Sportthotic insert that was designed by Dr. Bornstein and casted by the Langer Institute of New York. What the contraption did was ease the pain of a bone spur and allowed McCoy to run pain free for the first time all year. The results were incredible.


McCoy journeyed to the NCAA Championships and finished fourth in the 400 with a time of 45.83 surpassing both his best time and finish of Walt's freshman year at the championships. The Daytona Beach native also anchored the Seminole third place finishing 4x400 relay team helping set a school record of 3:05.7.

On the basis of his NCAA performance he was invited to the Courer Relays with teammate Roberson and picked up his first gold medal in the 4x400. Leaving France, McCoy joined the South team at Colorado Springs and picked up a bronze medal in the 400 open and anchored the South to victory in the 4x400. Concluding the summer's competition, McCoy joined the U.S. team at the World University Games and earned a bronze medal in the 400 open and once again anchored his team to a gold in the 4x400.

The final athlete to gain world recognition was discus thrower Cooper. A winner in every meet except one last season for FSU, Cooper journeyed to Champaign for the NCAA Championships rated second best in the U.S. From the first throw, however, there was no doubt who was the man to beat. In the preliminary rounds Cooper set a new NCAA record with a toss of 212-6 and captured the title the following day with a throw of 209-6.

Bradley, a team leader like McCoy, continued to compete for his homeland of the Bahamas. In the finals of the Americas at Guadalajara he finished second. Amazing, Cooper also qualified for the shot put with a toss of 60-2, making him only the second FSU competitor to toss the sphere 60 feet plus. Cooper's next competition came at the Pan American games where he earned the silver medal behind America's Mac Wilkins.

For Roberson, McCoy and Cooper the next stop is hopefully the Olympics. But if that should never occur it really wouldn't matter — they've already brought back gold for themselves, America and Florida State.

THE NATIONAL FOOTBALL FOUNDATIONS'S COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

Since the College Football Hall of Fame opened in August, 1978, more than 100,000 people have visited the shrine. It has appealed to people of all ages with just about every interest imaginable...people who like movies, sports, computer games, American history, modern museums, great athletes, colorful displays, nostalgia, pep rallies, memorabilia, stirring speeches, college bands, cheerleaders, Saturday afternoons in the fall and college football.

Among the most enthusiastic visitors have been some of the great names in college football and in America. They include: former President Gerald Ford, General James A. Van Fleet, Army's legendary coach and Hall of Famer Colonel Earl "Red" Blaik and other coaches such as Ripp Engle, Jake Gaither and Wallace Wade. Outstanding college players who have visited are Jim Crowley and Creighton Miller, the two living members of Notre Dame's Four Horsemen, Reds Bagnell, Ziggie Czarobski, Rear Admiral Thomas J. Hamilton, Elroy "Crazy Legs" Hirsch, Leslie Horvath, Tom Harmon, George Sauer, Claude "Buddy" Young, John Ferraro and Benny Friedman, to name only a few.

ABC sportscasters Chris Schenkel, Keith Jackson and Bill Flemming have also visited the shrine and openly praised its attributes, as did Heisman trophy winners Jay Berwanger, Larry Kelley, Joe Bellino, Leon Hart, John Huarte and Dick Kazmaier.

When the Hall of Fame was dedicated in August, 1978, "Red" Blaik was the keynote speaker. He spoke to the crowd on behalf of all Hall of Famers and said, "This is the best happening in college football since the legalization of the forward pass." His comment exemplifies the excitement that awaits college football fans who visit the shrine and the experience that has already been enjoyed by thousands.

One of the most famous visitors was former President Gerald Ford, winner of the Football Foundation's highest award, The Gold Medal, in 1972, and Michigan's MVP in 1934.

Ford spent his time in the Hall of Fame much as any other visitor, enjoying all the attractions and re-living his college football days. He saw films in the four theaters, including rare footage of himself that he'd never seen before as he practiced for the 1935 College All-Star game. He saw the Coaches Locker Room and the animated figure of Knute Rockne delivering his "Win One For The Gipper" speech. He traced the history of football through the Time Tunnel, briefly pausing to remember his varsity days at Michigan. He tackled the computer football trivia quiz and answered every question correctly, scoring a touchdown. He even attempted to make a field goal at the All-Star Kicker, but missed in his one try.

Upon leaving the building, Ford said, "No question, it is a very special place. I am extremely impressed." He continued, "The Hall of Fame has made the history of college football come to life with a meaning and purpose for the young people of today. I am happy I had the time to visit and definitely plan to return."

Dan Devine, Notre Dame Head Football Coach, was another first-year visitor to the Hall of Fame.

His experience at the shrine proved to be a personal scrapbook of football memories since many of the players and coaches enshrined at the Hall were old friends or rivals — men he had coached, coaches he had worked for, coaches he had opposed.

Coach Devine played the computer strategy game at its most difficult level, "Coach," and scored 100. One question involved a 1953 Michigan State game when he was the spotter in the press box and had, in fact, called the play and remembered the exact game situation. He, of course, answered the question correctly.

Devine fared much better at the All-Star Kicker than President Ford did. He made a field goal on his first try.

"I am extremely impressed with the quality and excitement of this building," said Devine. "It gives credence to the history of college football and embodies the spirit of the game as we know it today. I want my entire family to visit this unique museum, including my grandchildren."

Arkansas' Lou Holtz was one of the many notables who enjoyed the distinction of being a Dedication Week guest. He toured the entire building, becoming involved in the shrine's complete re-creation of the sights and sounds of college football. He ultimately ended up at the computer terminals, playing the strategy quiz at its most difficult level, and made a perfect score. He went 0 for 5.

Coach Holtz, like President Ford, Coach Devine and the thousands of other people who have visited, was impressed by the total experience of the building and its contemporary blending of the old with the new. He said, "The atmosphere inside the Hall of Fame is overwhelming. It is a place that not only honors football's great past, but forges ahead to the future. Anyone who has ever put on a pair of spikes should visit."

The College Football Hall of Fame is not only a place to see, learn and participate in the history of football, but a place to get to know the game as it is today. From its 1/8 mile long Time Tunnel which traces the 2,000-year development of the game from ancient Greece to the present in more than 30 time capsules, to the Hall of Fame Room where each of the 467 Hall of Famers are honored, to its futuristic use of computer terminals that allow the visitor to match wits with the great coaches or to call-up the biographies of every Hall of Famer, the museum can and does bring the total college football experience to life. Its personalized approach and action-oriented attractions have intrigued all who have visited. As "Sleepy"Jim Crowley, one of the Notre Dame Four Horsemen simply said, "This Hall of Fame is not in the telling or talking about, it's in the seeing."

The College Football Hall of Fame is located at Kings Island, a 1600-acre family entertainment center situated on Interstate-71, Just 20 miles north of Cincinnati. The Hall of Fame is open daily except Christmas. Operating hours are from 9:00 am to 7:00 pm from Memorial Day to Labor Day and 10:00 am to 5:00 pm the rest of the year.


he Marching Chiefs popularity has been growing in leaps and bounds as its reputation as one of the nation's finest collegiate marching bands continues to grow.

It's Not Only Rock 'n Roll

usic hath charms" that can be a definite boost to overcoming all sorts of problems, ranging from deafness to juvenile delinquency.

Students of music therapy at Florida State University are using the universal language of music to teach groups of elderly people and children with these problems and others, such as learning disabilities, emotional disturbances and mental retardation.

Dr. Jayne Alley, associate professor of music, heads the Florida State music therapy programs at several locations in Tallahassee.

Groups at the Senior Living Center are moving around to music, stimulating their blood flow and exercising muscles in the process. It's not unusual to see wheelchairs moving to a disco beat.

A young girl who is retarded was taught to wear and care for her much-needed eyeglasses through an original song composed by one of Dr. Alley's students. Deaf preschoolers and older children at W. T. Moore School are learning sign language through musical games.

"A music therapist can compose songs to teach whatever the teacher needs help with," Alley said.

She told of an elderly lady in a nursing home who couldn't remember her own daughter's name when she came to visit. A therapist composed and taught the woman a simple song which included the elusive name, and now the patient takes pride in greeting her daughter properly.

This method of learning can be compared to those people who use a rhyme to remember how may days April, June and November have.

Dr. Alley recalled a woman in one mental health program who was not only unable to communicate with others, she was tense to the point of being rigid. She offered no spontaneous responses to questions, nor did she make any voluntary moves.

The therapist got her to exercise to music by rewarding her with piano lessons which she enjoyed. She was given "responsibility targets" to achieve at home on her own, such as practicing original exercises to music which she would then teach her instructor.

Alley explained that the therapists first decide what a person needs to do to solve a particular problem. Then that action is either done to music or music is used as a reinforcement. For example, juveniles with problems are rewarded with guitar lessons when

they complete homework assignments or follow directions.

This past summer the therapists started a new program, teaching music — just for the fun of it — to handicapped children. The lessons were free for youngsters between three and 18 years of age. They included folk dancing, rhythm and singing activities and private lessons on musical instruments. Sixty children came to campus each week to participate in the program.

Often a student must be "diagnosed" for the best instrument to play, considering the particular handicap of the child. One youngster — the victim of cerebral palsy—was provided with a guitar which had been strung backwards to accommodate her strengths and abilities. That was all it took to start her on the road to an enjoyable musical hobby.

One group of children was "mainstreamed" with students from a local preschool. It was impossible to tell who was handicapped and who was not through casual observation of the four- and five-year-old children playing musical games.

Many college students studying music therapy take courses in sign language for the deaf. Dr. Alley indicated that this may become a requirement for all students majoring in the field. There has been a large demand for those who can work with deaf children.

A graduate student began a program this quarter which will bring together the parents and siblings of deaf children to learn sign language with the handicapped child, making it a real family affair and giving them a lifelong means of communication.

Since there is a need for after school social activities for handicapped teenagers, the FSU program is now offering music lessons and other events designed especially for this age group.

The headquarters for the music therapy program recently moved into the basement level of the Music School South, the old music building. Now they look forward to the day when money is available to renovate it to make it more accessible to the handicapped clients served.

Dr. Alley knows that the music therapy program is a service to the community, but she is quick to point out that the university students also benefit greatly from their work with those who are handicapped.

"We feel that our students are getting the best possible training in their work with local schools and agencies," Alley said. She added, "The job market is excellent for these students. In fact many people from distant states are beginning to call and ask for Florida State music therapy graduates to fill crucial positions."

Approximately 25 local organizations participate in music therapy programs including the Senior Citizens Center, Sunland, the Leon Association for Retarded Citizens, the day care program of the Apalachee Mental Health Center, United Cerebral Palsy and Leon County Schools with special education programs.

Alcoholic because are prohibited in Campbell Stadium. Violators may be asked to vacate the stadium.






