Tribe Tonight

The uniforms are the same . . .

The numbers are, too . . .

But, many of the players who wore those uniforms and carried those numbers to Florida State's most successful season ever in 1980 are gone.

Therein lies the story of the 1981 Seminole football season. Many would call it a rebuilding campaign. Bobby Bowden hopes that at the end of the season observers will be using a word other than rebuild, instead he's hoping the Tribe can just reload for this fall.

Whatever, the task facing the Garnet and Gold starting tonight isn't an easy one. Consider that no longer are the names Simmons, Macek, Scott, Herring, Piurowski, Jones, Bonasorte and Butler associated with the defense. Gone, too, from the offense are Madden, Futch, Adams, Lanier, Johnson, Platt and Unglaub. Also missing is the leading scorer in Seminole history, place-kicker Bill Capece.

"You only have them for four or five years and they move on," says Bowden, who is starting his sixth season at the Tribe helm. "That is one of the good things about college football—a coach always has the opportunity to teach new faces."

Although he doesn't say it much, Bowden will also admit that one of the plus factors in being a college football coach is success. That the Seminoles have had a lot of in the last two seasons, 21-3 the ledger

reads with a national ranking that reached No. 2 in both wire service polls at the close of the regular '80 campaign.

"Today, anywhere you go in the country they know about the Florida State football program," Bowden says. "Right now I would compare our program to that of Arizona State six years ago. The Sun Devils had a good reputation around the country but were not in the class of Oklahoma, Southern Cal and Notre Dame.

"Our players know their task tonight is a tough one . . ."

"We've identified ourselves. This university has the potential to be in the class of those schools I've mentioned, but we need to keep winning."

That's where the "reloading" part comes.

"Schools like Oklahoma don't rebuild, they reload," Bowden says. "The first Oklahoma team we played in the Orange Bowl lost 14 starters yet those Sooners were right back there the next year and I thought with just as good a football team.

"Now we're in the same sort of situation with so many folks having finished their eligibility. This year we will find out how well we can reload."

The process begins tonight against a much-improved Louisville Cardinal team that already has FSU beaten in the numbers game—the visitors return to Tallahassee with nine starters back on offense and nine more on defense compared to the Seminoles' five and three.

Bowden has cautioned his team not to expect the same Louisville team that the Seminoles handled 52-0 before a capacity crowd in the

'80 season opener.

"That Louisville team gave us the ball game," Bowden recalls. "We took advantage of three interceptions and two fumbles to score some rather easy touchdowns."

The Cards recovered from that game to score a 5-4 record in their remaining games. Two weeks after the loss to FSU, Louisville went to Kansas and upset the Jayhawks. Later in the season the Cards led Pittsburgh 9-0 before bowing and Florida only won by a 13-0 count in its Homecoming Game. Louisville then closed its campaign with an impressive 6-3 victory over Southern Mississippi in Hattiesburg.

"Our players know their task tonight is a tough one," Bowden says. It's a young club (FSU) going against a bunch of veterans (Louisville) and if we get behind early and panic it could present a bunch of problems."

TRIBE TIDBITS: FSU begins tonight with a 16-game Doak Campbell Stadium win streak. . .final figures won't be released until next week, but prior to tonight's game Seminole faithful had already bought a record number of non-student season tickets. . .plenty of individual tickets are available for the remaining home games—Memphis State (next Saturday), Western Carolina (Oct. 31—homecoming), Miami (Nov. 7) and Southern Mississippi (Nov. 14) . . .six more victories will give the Seminoles 200 wins since they began playing football in 1947. . . Bobby Bowden needs six victories to reach the 50 mark since coming to FSU. . . his overall mark at FSU prior to tonight is 44-14 with a career total of 117-46. . . the Tribe has five consecutive wins vs. Louisville and is 5-1 overall vs. the Cards, who last beat the Seminoles in 1952, 41-14. . .

Great Moments with the Seminoles

To sit and think of great moments in Florida State football history is a pleasant task. The Seminoles' great moments bring back visions of warm September afternoons, crystal clear October evenings with an orange moon in the Tallahassee sky and even a few very cold November nights. Memories of cheering fans, sensational catches, brilliant runs and goal line stands crowd our thoughts as they span the thirty-four years of Seminole football.

To begin with, there was that night in 1947 when FSU began college football and Don Grant's pass to Charles McMillan gave the Tribe its first touchdown. In 1948 Don Veller's Seminoles whipped Cumberland 30-0 and the garnet and gold had its first win.

Ten years later the '58 Tribe gave us two great moments. On October 25, FSU won its first victory over an SEC team, the Tennessee Volunteers. Fred Pickard, a diminutive Tennes-

sean playing for FSU, outgained the entire Vol squad. Two games later the Florida Gators kicked off to FSU to begin the series the Tribe had sought for so long. Bobby Renn caught the kick, broke into the open and raced all the way to the Gator 15. Four plays later FSU scored. Though the Gators won that opener, it was a great moment for the Seminoles; the Gators could no longer avoid them.

In 1964 one of FSU's truly great moments arrived. Steve Tensi and Fred Biletnikoff put Florida State ahead of the Gators on a glorious November afternoon and the Tribe stayed there to win their first over Florida, 16-7.

Two other '64 contests were great ones. Perhaps the most perfect game FSU ever played was a startling 48-6 homecoming massacre of the 5th ranked Kentucky Wildcats. And the final game of 1964 took Bill Peterson's Tribe to the Gator Bowl where Tensi and Biletnikoff led a 36-19

Rick Stockstill: The Seminoles' Elder Statesman

Early in the spring of 1977 a young football player walked into the Florida State football dining room where he was surrounded by the likes of Tom Rushing, Doug Dane, Mark Messeroll and Ed Beckman.

Seminole football followers will recall that all four were mighty big fellows.

"I was shakin' in my shoes," that player recalls today. "Those boys could intimidate you in a hurry and make you feel real small."

That young football player is now a veteran of the Seminoles. In fact, he'll be one of the four co-captains for 1981.

His name: Rick Stockstill, the Tribe quarterback.

And, tonight, because of his role as captain and his age (23) many of the young football players who will play such a vital role for the Seminoles in the season opener will look to Stockstill for leadership and a calm voice in the heat of battle.

Yes, Rick Stockstill has come full circle—from a peach-fuzzed rookie to grizzly veteran, who can be surprised by little that happens on the gridiron. And don't think for one minute that Stockstill will be afraid to grab the reigns tonight in his role of elder statesman when things get tough.

After all, he's been through the hard times.

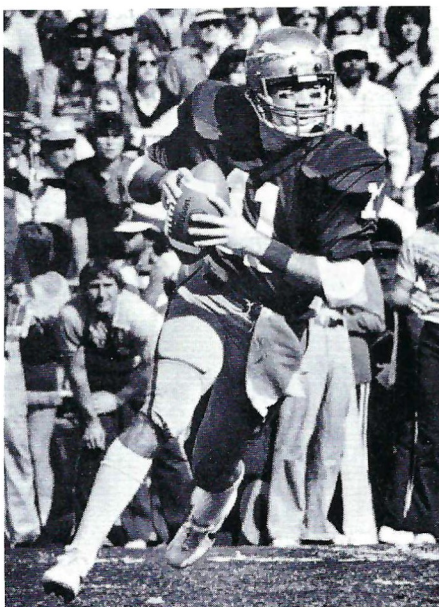
Most Seminole faithful can easily recall the story. Rick sat on the bench for three seasons as the shadow for the two-headed signal caller that went by the name(s) of Jimmy Jordan and Wally Woodham. His playing time was limited, although in 1979 he was a member of the special teams. It was a frustrating experience knowing that if either Jordan or Woodham failed the other would be around to take over and Rick's chance would come later.

Many others would have quit or moved to another school under the

circumstances. Quit, however, is not part of the Stockstill vocabulary.

"I never even thought about quitting," Rick now recalls. "Heck, I wouldn't have had anywhere else to go. Wherever you go in life things are going to be complicated."

His complicated puzzle began to unscramble in the 10th game of the 1979 season.



Head Coach Bobby Bowden gave Rick control of the offense in the fourth quarter and he led the Tribe to a pair of touchdowns while completing seven of eight passes.

During a statewide press conference the next day, Bowden announced

Stockstill would be his quarterback of the future.

"It gave me confidence that Coach Bowden liked me that much to say that," Stockstill said. "But I knew myself that I had to prove to the coaches and the other quarterbacks that I was the quarterback. I knew I couldn't mess around for 20 days and expect to start."

There was no messing around and on a muggy September 6, 1980 along the Mississippi River, Stockstill drew the starting call for the first time ever in college against the Tigers of LSU.

It wasn't an easy assignment. The Tigers were still upset over a 24-19 defeat administered by the Seminoles the previous year in the LSU Homecoming game. There were also 77,535 Cajun fans in the stands hoping to watch the Seminole demise. It was—and still is—the largest crowd to ever watch FSU play football. Still the Tribe cruised to a 16-0 victory.

"At the time it was the most exciting moment of my college career," Stockstill says. "Ever since I was a kid my dream had been to start for a major college. Throughout the game I kept telling myself that if I made a mistake to just keep going and not worry about it. I wasn't nervous."

Later in the year Stockstill would have more thrills. There was the impressive win at Nebraska and the

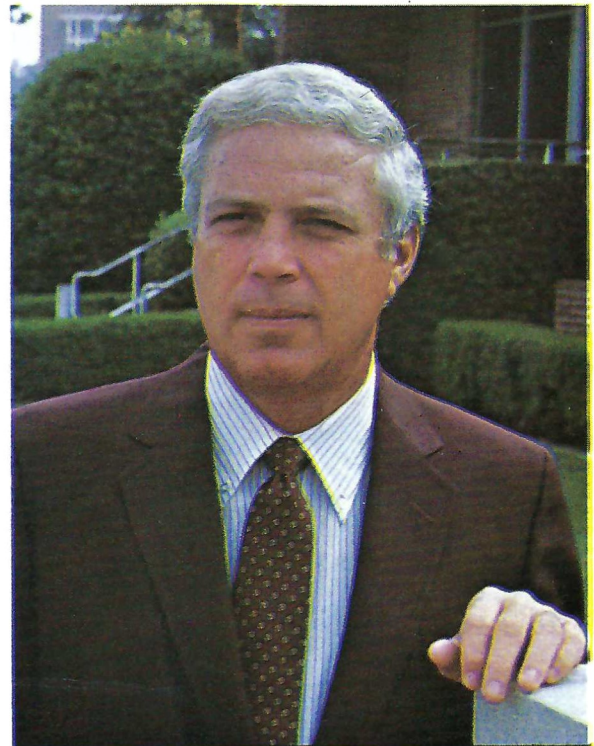

Bowden & FSU: A Perfect Match

What is the reason for Bobby Bowden's Florida State success?

Perhaps retired Dr. Coyle Moore, who was dean for Florida State's School of Welfare and a long-time observer of the Seminole sports program, gives the best insight with the below quotation.

"Bobby Bowden is a Southern Cracker, to the manor born, perfectly adapted to us Southern Crackers and Rednecks in Northern Florida. He speaks our language, adheres to our religious faith, and fits our needs like a glove."

Bowden, who was raised in Alabama, has been able to tie together the loose ends of a major college football program with his downhome, country, folksy way of getting things done. A city slicker he ain't.

He has the ways of a southern cracker yet the polish of a sophisticated head coach from the eastern establishment thanks to a six-year head coaching stint at West Virginia. Bowden has been able to find the right blend that makes him the second most popular head coach in the deep south today. Only Paul "Bear" Bryant of Alabama draws more attention.

At various times in the last two years, Bowden has been described by the media as a "savior" and "St. Bobby." Indeed, he has fit the needs of the Florida State football program like a glove. Bowden has taken a program that was in ashes and turned it into one of the most respected in the country.

In case you disagree, consider . . .

(1) A 44-14 record in five seasons compared to a 19-38 in five years B.B. (Before Bowden);

(2) Back-to-back Orange Bowl appearances when the school had never previously appeared in a New Year's Day post-season contest;

(3) Second place spots in both the Associated Press and United Press International Top 20 polls at the close of the 1980 regular season;



(4) Consecutive Top 10 finishes in the final wire service polls the last two years when FSU only once previously since 1947 had finished in the Top 20.

Yes, the Florida State football program has turned around with Bobby Bowden at the helm. In fact, it can even be described as amazing. That first year (1976) the Tribe went 5-6—not a good mark by many standards, but when one remembers the previous year was 3-8, 1976, was considered a plus. Since then FSU has reeled off regular season marks of 9-2, 8-3, 11-0 and 10-1.

There have been three bowl appearances—the 1977 Tangerine and 1980 and 1981 Orange Bowls. The Tribe has

consistently ranked in the Top 20 each of the last two years and there have been eight national or regional television appearances—more than any other school in the country.

Bowden is the first to recognize the work of his staff for bringing the Seminole program to the point where it exists today. But, others direct the credit to the 51-year old Bowden.

This was quite evident during and after the 1979 season when Bowden's name was mentioned for every head coaching position that opened. But, FSU President Bernie Sliger managed to get Bowden's name on a contract that should make him a permanent fixture in Tallahassee and Doak Campbell Stadium for many years to come.

Bowden signed an automatically renewing five year contract that contains a clause unique to college athletics—if Bowden elects to resign from his current employer for another coaching position, he must pay FSU for the time remaining on the contract.

"It means we are married and nobody's going to put our marriage asunder," Bowden explained. "I didn't want to go anywhere. I wanted to stay here. I love it here. Florida State and its fans are not spoiled yet."

Bowden realizes there is room for the program to grow.

"We haven't won the national championship," Bowden says. "We were close last year—a pair of two point conversion plays kept us from winning the title. No, we still have some growing room. It ain't the time for 'ole Bobby and his players to sit back. There's still work to be done."

Still, Bowden can fondly recall the pleasant memories of the last five seasons. Twice he has been named National Coach of the Year. First the honor was given by ABC-TV and Chevrolet after the 1979 season and at the close of the 1980 campaign, the American Sportsmanship Council named him

mind on FSU's staff in the 1960's, when Bill Peterson was head coach and the Seminoles were first making waves in the polls with a celebrated passing game that featured wide receiver Fred Biletnikoff.

Bowden left to be offensive coordinator under Jim Carlen at West Virginia. When Carlen checked out, going to his current job at South Carolina, Bowden became head coach of the Mountaineers. He was doing well in a tough situation and, when Florida State called Bowden had to give it some thought.

After two minutes, he accepted.

asm in everything you do in life," Bowden says, "and you coach what you believe. If we can be enthusiastic in the little things we do, it will carry over to a winning season.

"But don't get me wrong about discipline. I believe in letting the players know who is boss, and I believe in some sacrifice and devotion. But discipline can only go so far.

"Heck, I've always said that if short hair and perfect manners won football games, the Army-Navy game would be played every year for the national championship."

Bowden is more than just a football

his "Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year." And twice he has been the Associated Press Southern Independent Coach of the Year.

Success fits Bowden. He has been just as successful at his previous head coaching stops—Samford and West Virginia.

His Samford record was 31-6 over four seasons. In six years at West Virginia, he piloted the Mountaineers to a 42-26 record and two Peach Bowl appearances. His 44-14 FSU log gives him a career mark of 117-46, a .717 winning percentage.

Bowden is no Tallahassee stranger. He had been an offensive coaching

"I'm a southern boy who wants to be in the Deep South," he said. "I slipped on ice once too often, got bogged down in the snow one time too many. I didn't want to act anxious, but I was eager to come to Florida State."

Bowden doesn't follow a complicated coaching philosophy. In fact, it's quite simple.

"I believe in blocking and tackling," he says. "Everything else in this game is irrelevant, blocking and tackling will cause wins."

Enthusiasm and discipline are key words which exemplify Bowden's overall attitude, both on and off the field.

"I believe in discipline and enthusi-

coach. He is also a deeply religious individual, who speaks often to church groups throughout the state.

"God is an integral part of my life," Bowden says. "I look to God for guidance but firmly believe God helps those who help themselves. Man must help himself, but also seek guidance."

Born on November 8, 1929, Bowden attended Woodlawn High School in Birmingham, Ala., and was a Little All-American quarterback at Samford University. He holds a bachelor's degree from Samford and master's from Peabody College. He married his childhood sweetheart, the former Julia Ann Estock and they have six children.

Jim Gladden, Defensive Ends

Jim has been with the Seminole coaching staff since 1975, when he first was a graduate assistant. He was promoted to full-time status a year later and has tutored the defensive ends ever since. He also schedules FSU's junior varsity games.

Gladden came to Florida State after 15 years of coaching the prep ranks. He coached high school teams in Kansas, Missouri, Kentucky, Tennessee and Florida before entering the collegiate ranks.

A native of Springfield, Mo., Gladden graduated from William Jewell College in Liberty, Mo., where he was an all-conference end.

Jack Stanton, Defensive Coordinator

Jack is in his sixth year of heading up the Seminole's defensive strategies. He also serves as the Tribe's defensive secondary coach. Stanton is the veteran of the assistant coaches. He began his coaching career in the high school ranks in Kentucky, West Virginia and Virginia. He later moved to George Washington University and then spent five seasons at North Carolina State, his alma mater.

Stanton was the defensive backfield coach for FSU in 1974 but returned to N.C. State for two seasons to join Bill Dooley's staff. Bowden brought him back to FSU in 1976.

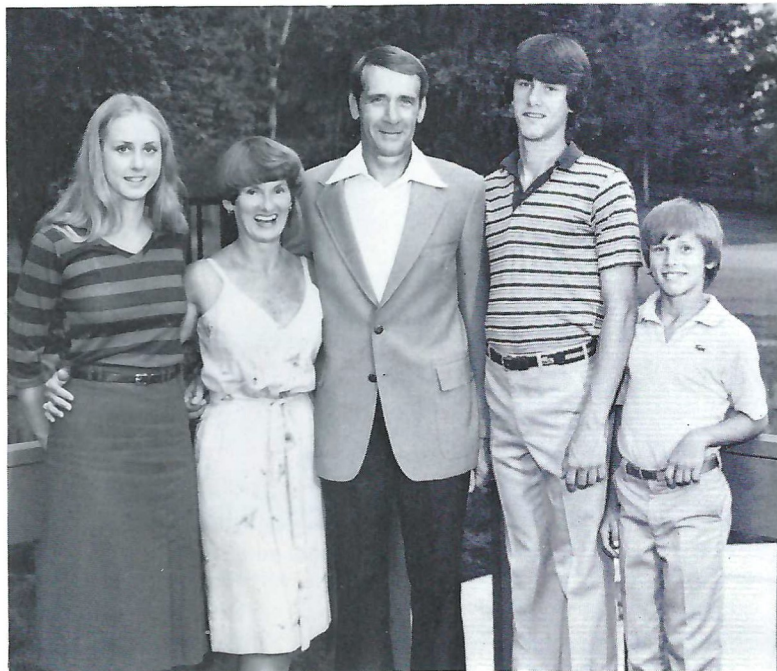


John Eason, Receivers

John is the newest Seminole coach. This will be his first campaign as the Garnet and Gold receiver coach. Eason came to FSU from Tallahassee's Leon High School, where he was assistant principal since 1979. He was an assistant football coach at Leon between 1973 and 75, and had also coached in Ocala two years.

Eason was an All-American receiver and punter for crosstown Florida A&M, graduating in 1969 with his degree. He played professional football three years, two with the Oakland Raiders and a third with the Montreal Alouettes of the CFL.

Gene McDowell, Linebackers

Gene McDowell is one of three Seminole coaches who now coach at their alma mater. McDowell has spent the last 18 years coaching football and most recently, directing the Seminole linebackers.

McDowell spent his early coaching years with the Seminoles but moved to Kansas State briefly. He returned to Tallahassee in 1974 to coach the defensive ends and took the linebacking duties when Bowden became head coach.

McDowell, a native of Quincy, lettered three years at linebacker for FSU. He was selected third team Associated Press All-America following his senior season. Gene is a bachelor.





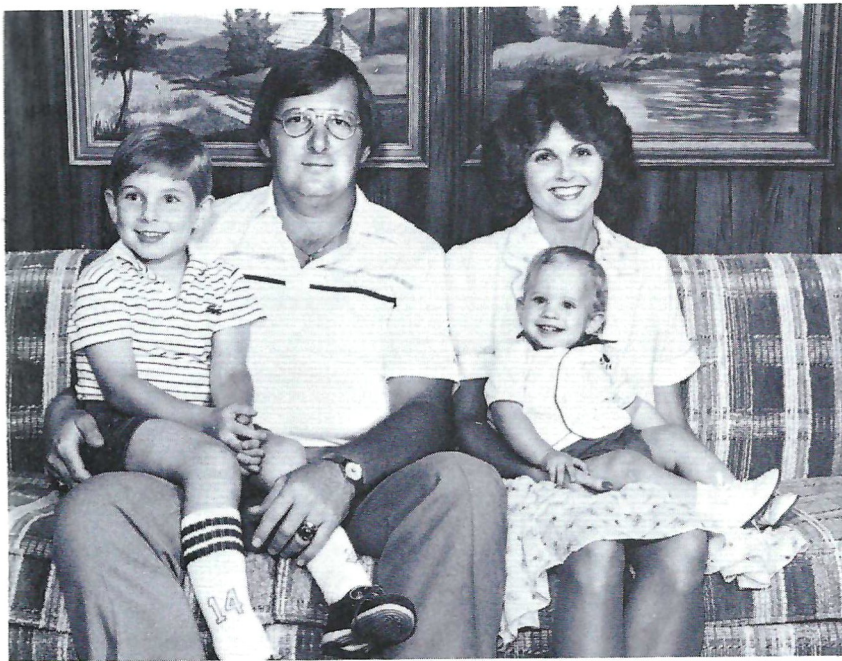

Punter

Rohn Stark may be the finest athlete on the Florida State campus. Not only is he a first-team All-American punter, but an All-American in track and field as well. Stark's 45.1 punting average gave him a spot on three All-American teams last season in football. Then he hung up his football spikes, donned track spikes and finished eighth in the NCAA decathlon, earning more All-American accolades.

Rohn's performance against Pittsburgh last year—he punted for a 48.1 average and his longest sailed 67 yards—was largely responsible for giving the Panther's offense poor field position. FSU went on to win the game and Stark received United Press International Defensive Player of the Week honors, the first kicker ever so honored.

At the NCAA track and field championships, Stark competed in only his sixth decathlon ever—the first place finisher had competed in 30—and set a personal high for the two-day event.

Rohn just missed out on being a three-way All-American. A fine student, he was nominated for Academic All-American honors following the 1980 season.

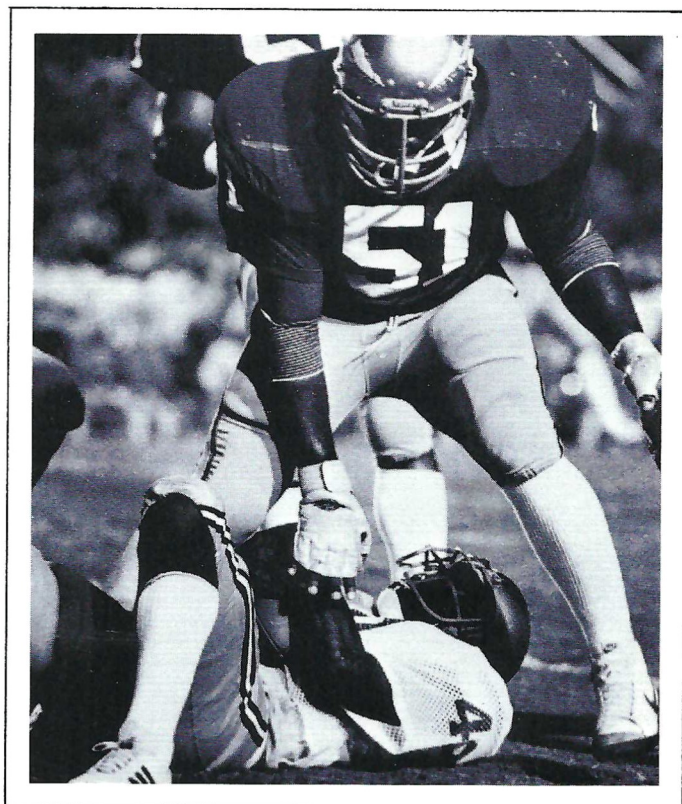
James Gilbert

Although James was not listed as a starter last season, he saw considerable playing time. When All-American noseguard Ron Simmons went down early in the season opener against LSU, Gilbert was called to duty. Seminole fans cheered the defense as it didn't yield a point in its first two games. Yet when fans looked closely, it wasn't Simmons clogging up the middle, it was Gilbert. He performed above and beyond expectations of the coaching staff and finished the season with 45 tackles, seven of those quarterback sacks and another seven tackles for losses.

His best game came vs. Louisville when he was credited with eight tackles, three of those for losses.

Gilbert's attributes are strength, speed and quickness, according to defensive line coach Bill Shaw. "He could be one of the best noseguards in the country this fall," he says. "He's not a rah-rah player but we're looking for him to be the quiet leader of our defensive football team this fall."

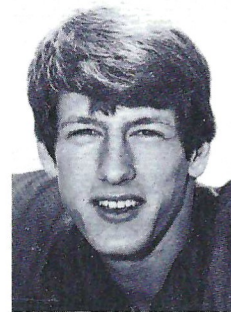


For Weegie Thompson

Kathy Keith, Tallahassee

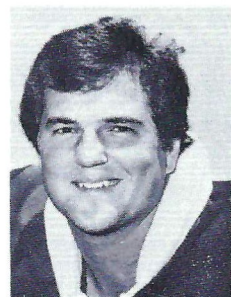

Q What do you think about right before you hit an offensive player?

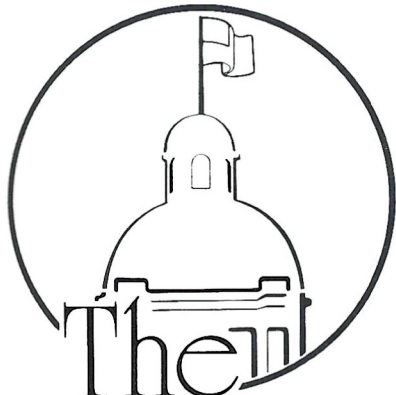
Paul Bouchard, Daytona Beach

This is Florida State

Florida State University—the home of more than 22,500 Seminoles—has a campus that starts at the top of one of Tallahassee's famed seven hills, and rolls gently downward and westward across 340-odd acres.

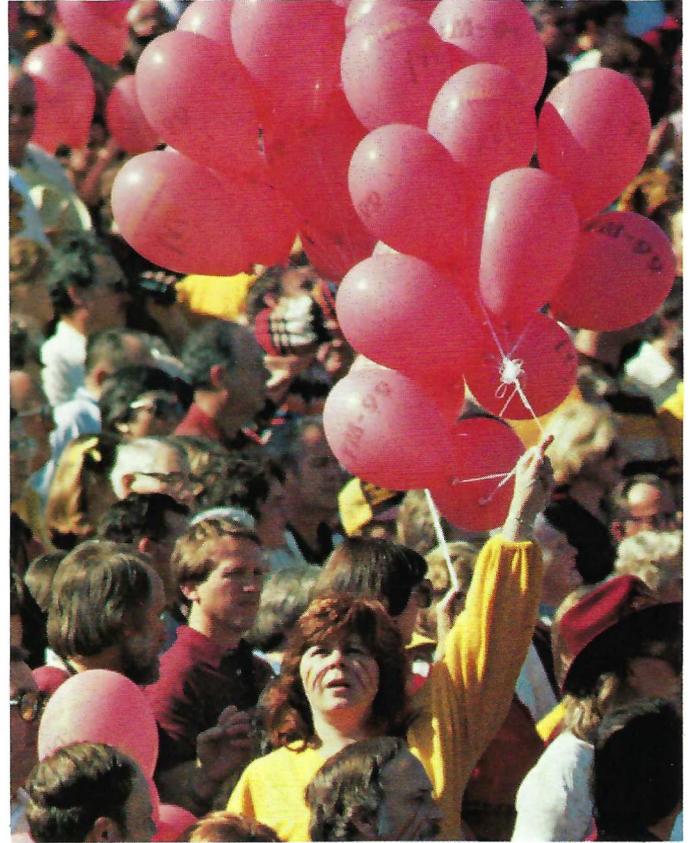
Founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, its heritage is evidenced in the wide range of architectural struggles to preserve history and keep up with modern times and air conditioning. Yet it still ranks as one of the South's last, few bastions of campus greenery—the kind that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with moss-hung oaks that are, in some cases, as old as the University itself, if not older.

From the Gothic towers of Westcott at the eastern entrance to the campus, to the modern glass and steel structures of its Science Complex on the west, Florida State University has moved forward in time and growth more rapidly than many of its newer counterparts in the State University System. Its enrollment has quadrupled since it became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as the Florida State College for Women.

Today, its 14 schools and colleges offer students the opportunity to pick and choose from more than 100 career options offered in arts and sciences, business communication, criminology, dance, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts programs.

The University is a member of the Academic Common Market and has overseas study centers in Florence, London and the Panama Canal Zone. Summer programs of study are offered in law at Oxford, in hotel and restaurant administration in Switzerland, and in comparative studies of economic and social systems in Yugoslavia.

The location of Florida State in the Capital City of Florida offers unusual opportunities for study and research in the social and policy sciences, and an opti-



imum environment for internships and on-the-job learning experiences for students in many fields of study.

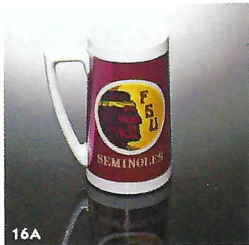
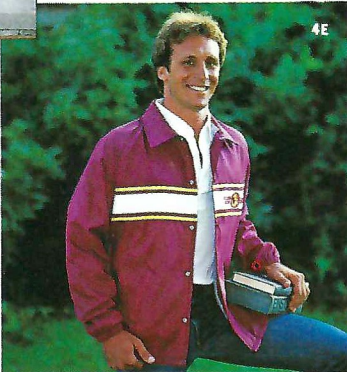
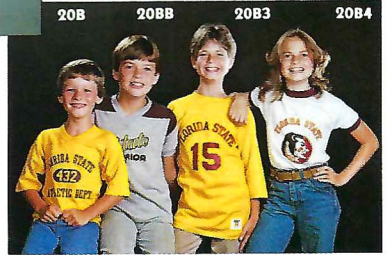
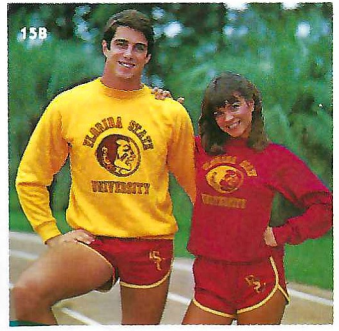
One such program at Florida State is the Policy Sciences Center. It combines teaching and research in politics, economics and other social sciences to provide information and analysis for state government leaders, including the Governor, the Legislature and agency staff members. Already achieving national prominence, the Center studies and evaluates such topics as taxation, economic development, population, land use, family planning and human resources. Surveys conducted by the Center help legislators and others assess trends and changes in public opinion.

The University operates major laboratory facilities for nuclear, marine and computer research. The Florida State nuclear physics laboratory is ranked one of the top four in the nation by the National Science Foundation. Because of this ranking, it has been recommended for higher funding.

Florida State is also the home of the Flying High Circus, the only collegiate circus in the United States. The Circus has delighted audiences the world over with breathtaking, highly-skilled performances that rival professional circuses. The student performers have earned a national reputation as a high-caliber student troupe. Their traveling show is primarily an aerial and stage presentation with approximately 90 students performing during a two-hour show.

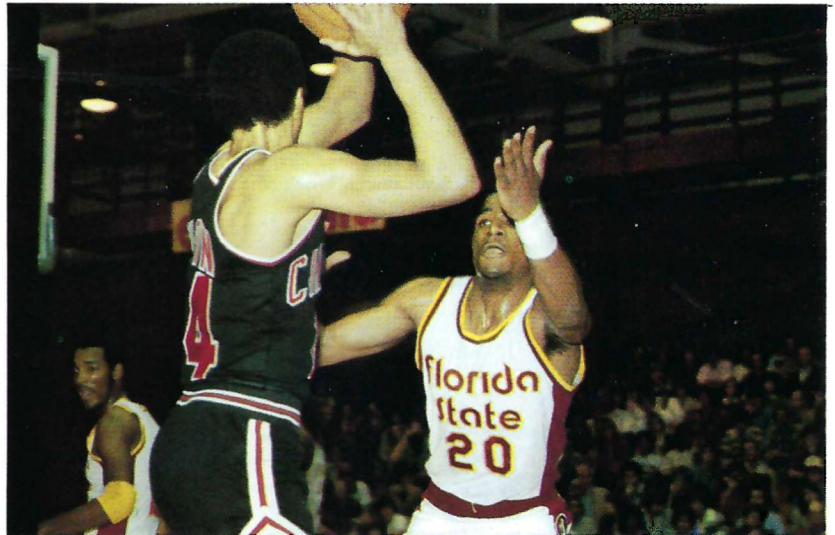

Two National Crowns for Women's Athletics

Head Coach JoAnne Graf's 1981 softball team wrote a new page in the Florida State history books last May by capturing FSU's first women's national championship.

Outside the 1951 and '52 men's gymnastics teams, which won national championships, no existing sport at FSU had ever won a national title — men's or women's.

Very simply put, JoAnne Graf's squad was the first.

The quickness of that rise to the top is amazing in itself, especially when one considers the youth of Florida State's women's program (softball records have only been kept since 1978). Credit that rise to women's athletic director Barbara Palmer, who has built the program from the bottom up.

Softball isn't the only successful sport on the women's side — golf (which we'll speak about later) won the school's second national championship a month after softball — before dust had time to settle on softball's trophy. The track team finished third in its national meet in 1981, the swimming team was 14th and cross country was 21st.

But, let's get back to the record setting softball team. It was a banner season indeed. The women finished with a 54-7 record, a whopping winning percentage of .899. Included in those school record wins were 22 shutouts and victories in the last 16 games.

Florida State finished first in its state and regional tournaments before attending nationals. The national championship games were played in Raleigh, N.C., on the N.C. State campus.

From the start, it was obvious that it wouldn't be easy for the Seminoles. In the second round, Florida State squeaked by North Carolina 4-3. Third round foe East Carolina took its game into extra innings before FSU scored an onslaught of runs in the overtime period to win 12-3.

The championship game was one for the fans. It was a 1-0 affair going into the final inning when FSU scored four runs to put it out of reach. The final score: North Carolina 1, Florida State 4, and its first national championship.

Shortstop Darby Cottle was the Tribe's most outstanding player in the tourney, batting .600 with six RBI's, two doubles and a homerun. She was named to the 12-player all-tournament team along with teammates Charlotte Cates (first base), Natalie Drouin (right field), Carol O'Domski (third base) and Susan Painter (pitcher).

"We're proud to represent Florida State and do so well," said Graf. "We had pressure on us after being seeded number one in the state, regional and national tournaments. We just went out and played up to it all."

Once the dust had settled on the softball diamond, the Seminoles wasted little time in capturing their second national crown, winning the 1981 AIAW golf championship, June 20, at Athens, Georgia.

The victory was the culmination of the best season ever for the Lady Seminole golfers. The Tribe opened the year with the biggest win in FSU women's golf history — a come-from-

behind triumph at the Dick McGuire Invitational in Albuquerque, New Mexico. The additional regular season first place trophies followed the McGuire win — victories at the Lady Gator, the South Florida Invitational and the Lady Paladin. In ten tournaments during the season, the team never finished lower than fourth earning one second, four thirds and the lone fourth.

At nationals, the women did what they had done all year, coming through at the end. After day two, the Tribe was stalled in third place, having shot identical 307's behind host Georgia and defending AIAW champion Tulsa. On day three, the tide changed when the Lady Seminoles carded a 298 — the low round of the tournament — to take the lead. Georgia rallied the final day to take the lead going into the 17th hole, but a combination of FSU birdies and Bulldog bogies opened the door to the Seminole win.

"We did it all year and we did it when it counted," said FSU head coach Verlyn Giles. "When the chips were down and it was getting late we did it as a team. We could have never won the tournament had we all not been pul-

ling together. It was a sight — everybody cheering for everybody else."

Individually, the Lady Seminoles collected honors as easily as they collected tournament wins. Michele Guilbault and Lisa Young both earned All-America honors to top the list. Guilbault was also the medalist in the Dick McGuire and Lady Paladin, tying the tournament or course record in both. Young was also a multiple winner, setting the course record at the Lady Gator, finishing second at Beacon Woods and ending AIAW national competition in third place, one shot behind the champion. Also for the Tribe, Jane Geddes was second at the Lady Seminole, Barbara Bunkowsky was 14th at nationals and Marla Anderson was the recipient of the Jim Rochelle Memorial Trophy awarded to the top amateur golfer in Florida.

"It certainly was a successful year," Giles said. "It's all behind us now and we have to look to the future. We have everyone returning so there's no reason we cannot repeat as national champions. It should be a very exciting year."

Once just a fledgling, the FSU women's athletics program is now a veteran of success.

Please accompany all mail orders with a self-addressed stamped envelope. Season tickets will be mailed to purchasers well before the first event.

On completion of the season ticket sale, remaining tickets will be sold individually, two weeks prior to each event. However, tickets to the Sarah Vaughan performance in the Civic Center may be purchased from now through Oct. 30. Individual Sarah Vaughan tickets are \$12 and \$8 (student).

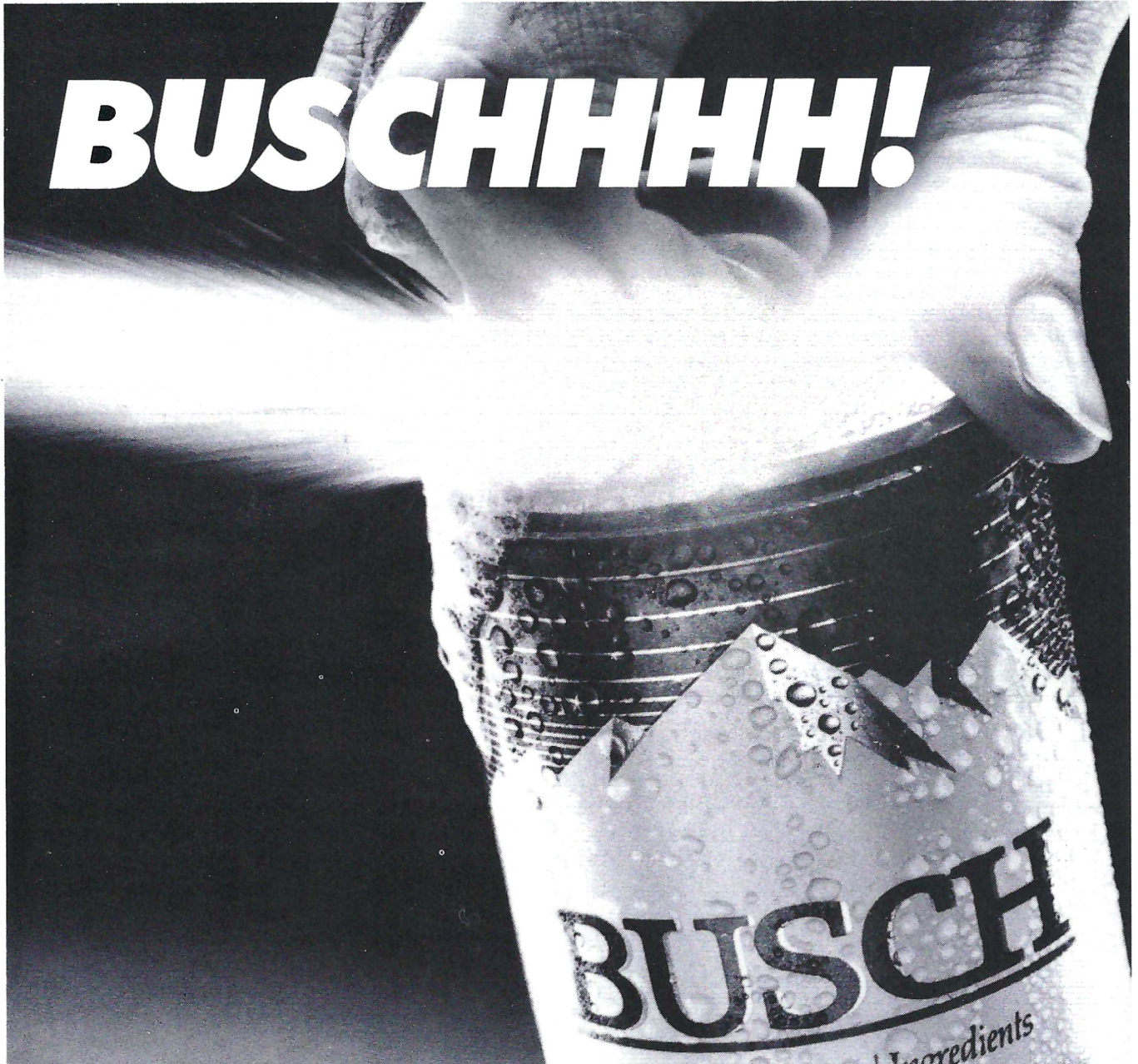

massacre of Oklahoma.

In '66 a great Gary Pajcic pass, a brilliant Lane Fenner catch and a near-sighted and out of position official gave FSU fans their most controversial great moment. This October will mark the 15th anniversary of the game—and Lane Fenner is still in bounds!

One year later, FSU played college football's most fabulous tie, 37-37 with Bear Bryant's Crimson Tide. As FSU raced ahead 14-0 in the first quarter, a sideline camera caught a bewildered Bear as he yelled, "What the hell is going on?" In Gainesville that year FSU whipped the Gators again. After an injury forced him from the game, Kim Hammond returned in the second half to courageously move FSU down the field to victory. The clincher was a 38 yard heave to the great Ron Sellers who

outleaped a defender for the score.

The Bowden era has had more than its share of great moments. Indeed, perhaps the Seminoles' greatest football moment came off the field. It may have been the moment Bobby Bowden signed his first contract.

In '76 the Tribe put on one of its greatest rallies. Down 27-10 to Southern Miss, Bowden's men rolled for three last quarter tds, all by Rudy Thomas, the last on a 95 yard pass from Jimmy Black.

FSU went 10-2 a year later and a key to that season was a great road victory over tough Oklahoma State. It was the Tribe defense that saved that day by shutting down the explosive Cowboys in the final stanza. But it was 1977's last game that was the most memorable. Wally Woodham and Jimmy Jordan threw and Kurt Unglaub and Roger Overby caught and the Aaron Carter-Jimmy Heggins led defense stopped the Gators. The picture that best symbolizes the

joys of Seminole football is that of Overby holding the ball aloft as he raced into the end zone.

In '78 the Tribe defeated UF again and the back-to-back wins provided another great moment. An explosive aerial circus and a second half defense keyed by Ron Simmons and Willie Jones got the job done.

A year later everything came together and the garnet and the gold went 11-0. Two last quarters against lightly regarded foes held the key to that undefeated year. If Gary Henry had not dashed 65 yards with a punt against Southern Mississippi and if the Wally Woodham-Ron Simmons led Tribe offensive and defensive squads had not put it all together in the final quarter against Cincinnati, there would have been no perfect season.

That brings us to 1980 and the Seminoles' greatest back-to-back victories—over Nebraska and Pitt. While the Pitt victory was a great one, there has never been anything quite like the Seminoles' battle in that sea of red in Lincoln. By night-fall on October 4 Tribe fans had seen Florida State's most significant single game victory, and witnessed a moment that would live in Tribe legend alongside Fred Biletnikoff's leaping catches, Kim Hammond's epic heave to Ron Sellers, Roger Overby's 1977 heroics in the north end zone in Gainesville, Ron Simmons' bull-like explosions and Lane Fenner in the northeast corner of the Campbell Stadium end zone. With the Tribe ahead 18-14 and seconds left, Nebraska set at the FSU 2. Cornhusker QB Jeff Quinn took the snap, rolled left and met Paul Piurowski. The rest, as they say, is history.

following week the surprisingly easy win over the Pitt Panthers. The regular season closed with Rick piloting FSU to its fourth consecutive win over Florida.

Then came a major disappointment — the 18-17 loss to Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl.

"That loss hurt because we were so close," Stockstill recalls. "I honestly believed going into that game if we played well we would win the national championship. There wasn't any doubt in my mind. I knew the win would have to be impressive, but I thought it was ours to take."

Now comes the new season—one that many feel will be a rebuilding campaign for the Tribe. Don't mention the word "rebuilding" around Stockstill.

"People say we're rebuilding," he says, "but that sounds to me like nothing but an excuse to lose. We lost

a lot of starters, but we also have a lot of people back who played a lot last year against schools like Nebraska and Pittsburgh." This season, the already well-documented schedule becomes even more difficult.

"We're going to all those places to win, not to play them close. To me, that is too much like quitting."

Yes, the task for the Seminoles in '81 is challenging. And, Stockstill knows too that his football playing days are numbered. If he doesn't find a spot on the National Football League roster next fall, he may try Canada. So, Rick, what if that fails?

"Then I would want to coach," says Stockstill, who will be 24-years-old if he guides the Seminoles in a bowl game this fall.

Don't expect to find Rick on the high school sidelines, however.

"At first I thought I wanted to be a high school coach, but that has changed since I've had a chance to watch my father (Joel Stockstill recently resigned as head coach at

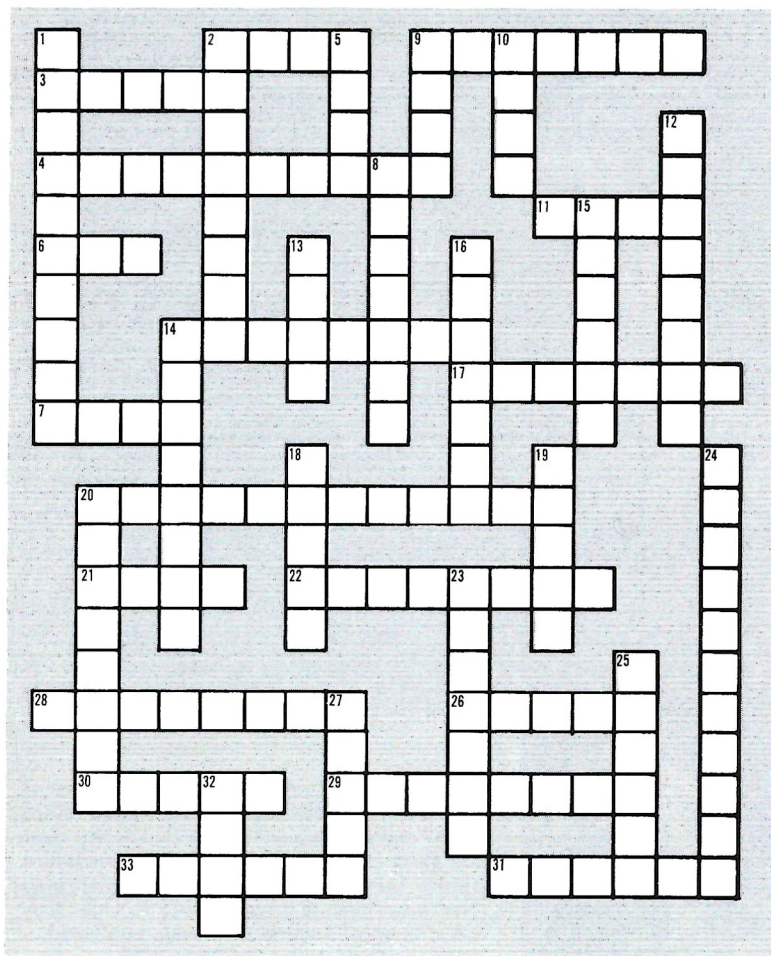
Fernandina Beach High School)," Rick says. "He put in all sorts of time and seeing what he went through really turned me off. Many of his kids weren't willing to pay the price at the high school level. I think that really hurt my father because he was so devoted to the program yet others were not.

"His experiences really turned me off."

Rick, on the other hand, has been "turned on" by watching his college coaches.

"They are working with men who want to really make something out of their football experience," Rick says. "I think that makes coaching much easier. College coaches get a positive response from their players."

Whatever the future years hold, don't expect him to change from the very easy going, laid back individual he now is. He admits "not much bothers me," but you can expect he'll be giving 100 percent in every game he plays this fall.

LOST AND FOUND: Items may be turned in or claimed at the ticket booth at Gate 3 under the west stands near the press box elevator.

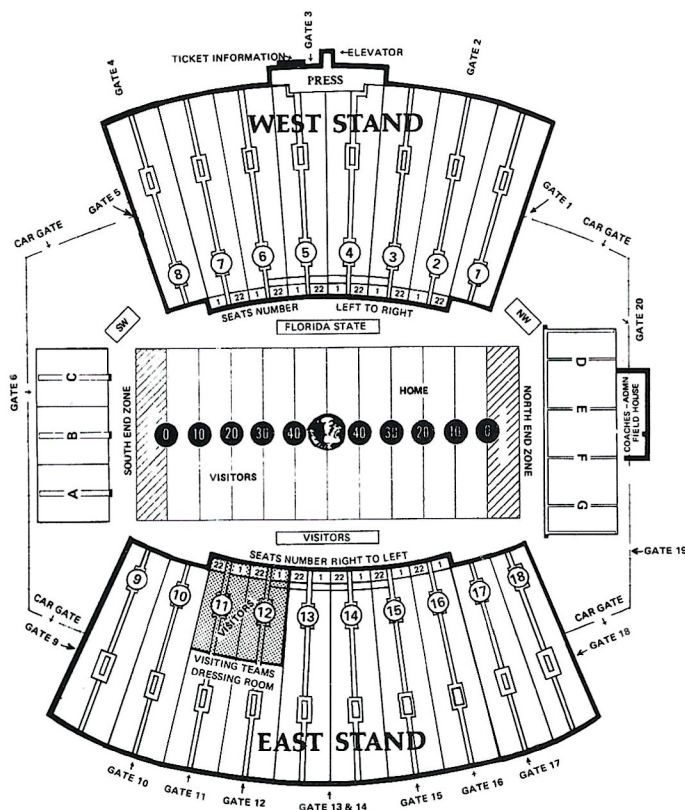
ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES: Alcoholic beverages are prohibited in Campbell Stadium. Violators will be asked to leave the stadium.
