



# Tribe Tonight

So, you figured Oktoberfest was important.

Forget about what has happened in the last eight games for your 6-2 Seminoles.

This afternoon's game with Miami (5-2) is just as important as those five trips the Tribe made during the famed Oktoberfest.

This date with Miami shapes up as the most important of the year for head coach Bobby Bowden and his Seminoles.

This date with Miami shapes up as the most important of the year for head coach Bobby Bowden and his Seminoles. It's a Top 20—Miami is 13 and Florida State 14 in this week's Associated Press poll—matchup with national significance. The winner will have an opportunity to move higher in the polls while the loser will probably drop out.

The outcome is also important in shaping the post-season bowl picture. The winner will have an outside chance to play in a major bowl while the loser will have no chance at a New Year's Day appointment.

"We have not played a more important game this season," said Bowden.

Evidently more folks than just Bowden, who last week secured his 50th victory at FSU, realize the importance of this intrastate struggle. ABC-TV will be showing the game to a regional audience that should cover most of the south.

The performance in front of the ABC cameras will be the first of the fall for Seminoles, who had six appearances during the 1979 and 1980 seasons. This will be the second straight week Miami has performed before the cameras. The Hurricanes

were viewed across the nation last week when they stopped Penn State, the nation's top-ranked team at the time, 17-14.

Don't however, think that result can be termed a "major" upset. In fact, the Hurricanes fully deserve their lofty national ranking.

"Miami could just as easily be ranked No. 1 this week as Pitt, except for two plays," Bowden said. "In both of the Hurricanes losses the potential winning touchdown for Miami was called back because of a penalty. A 7-0 record would put these Hurricanes right at the top because they are that good."

Bowden has grown extremely leary of the down-state contingent. Since coming here in 1976, the Tribe mentor, who will celebrate his 53rd birthday tomorrow, has only won two of five meetings against the Hurricanes. Miami and Oklahoma are the only two schools in the last 66 games that have managed a winning record against the Garnet and Gold.

Miami's credentials are better than any team that has appeared in Doak Campbell Stadium since the visit by third-ranked Pittsburgh last season.

"The two toughest things about Miami are its defense and quarter-back Jim Kelly," Bowden said. "The defense is absolutely outstanding. Any team that can limit Penn State, one of the nation's finest running teams, to just 69 yards is doing a lot of things right.

"Kelly is a tremendous quarterback. He's a lot like Dan Marino of Pittsburgh because he has the ability to disect the opposition defense at the life of scrimmage and then attack that defense at its weakest point with an audible."

History doesn't favor the Seminoles in this struggle. Not only does Bowden have negative figures in his missions against Miami, but the Tribe doesn't even enjoy the home field advantage in this series that dates back to 1951 when Miami won a 35-13 decision.

Incredibly, FSU has just one win in games played here in Tallahassee. Miami has returned to its home base with five wins in the previous six games played here.

Remember, too, that momentum favors the visitors. They took that impressive 10-9 victory in the Orange Bowl last September 27, that was the only blemish on the Seminole regular season report card.

That game probably ranks as one of the most thrilling in the previous 24. Everyone now knows how the Seminoles rallied from a 10-3 deficit late in the game to within one point and then saw the potential winning two-point conversion pass batted down at the line of scrimmage.

"Except for the last drive our offense was totally frustrated," Bowden recalls. "We can't afford another offensive performance like that this week or Miami will have an easy victory."

"We can't allow Miami to get the easy score," Bowden said. "If that happens they could run us right out of the stadium."

Miami and most observes feel FSU points today will be tough to tally. It will put the burden on the Seminole defense that is yielding an average of 20.8 points per game in the first eight outings.

The big play has been the downfall of the FSU defense.

Over the 30 years since the Hurricanes and Seminoles first met in 1951, the two schools have played 24 football games. Miami has won 13 of those contests and Florida State has won 11, and only one in Doak Campbell Stadium. There have been many close finishes and many performances worthy of mention. We take a look at some of the more memorable moments in the series.

First Victory for Florida State

1958, Florida State 17, Miami 6 ... before 31,980 in the Orange Bowl, Florida State won its first game against the Hurricanes after five losses despite statistics domination by the home team (the 'Canes had 389 yards in total offense to FSU's 176). Florida State took an early lead on a 42-yard interception return by Joe Majors. After a Miami score, Vic Prinzi (ves. it's the same Vic Prinzi who serves as the color commentator on the Seminole TV package) connected on a 8-yard pass to Fred Pickard. Johnny Sheppard added a field goal from 32 yards out to pad the FSU lead.

First Victory for Florida State in Doak Campbell Stadium

1979, Florida State 40, Miami 23 ...Florida State grabbed its third victory of the season and its first over its down-state rival in Tallahassee. FSU trailed after a quarter, 7-3, but the Tribe put 16 points on the board in the second period and another 14 in the third. FSU, praised throughout most of the preseason for its pass offense, picked up 205 yards on the ground with Mark Lyle's 85 leading the way. Florida State went on to finish the season with a perfect 11-0 slate.

**Most Exciting Finishes** 

We have two that are worthy of mention in that they both ended with two point conversion tries.

1959. Miami 7, Florida State 6... Miami led in the final quarter of this one, 7-0, before Fred Pickard scored from eight yards out, capping a 52-yard drive. Behind 7-6 with 2:52 left, Coach Peterson opted to go for the win instead of kicking the extra point to tie. Campbell Stadium's 18,600 fans shouted "go for it" and Pickard, 165 pounds, ran wide and met

225 pound guard Jim Crawford and was stopped six inches short of the goal line.

1980, Miami 10, Florida State 9...Florida State's 18-game regular season win streak came to a halt in the Orange Bowl with the Hurricanes holding off a late Seminole rally to win 10-9. Miami had a 7-0 intermission lead and after both teams exchanged third quarter field goals, FSU made a valiant comeback in the fourth period. Quarterback Rick Stockstill drove the Tribe 55 yards in 11 plays and ended it with an 11-yard scoring loss to tight end Sam Childers with 0:39 remaining. At that point, head coach Bobby Bowden elected to go for the win. The play was to be a pass from Stockstill to wide receiver Phil Williams across the middle but it hit Miami noseguard Jim Burt's helmet and fell to the ground.

#### **Best Florida State** Come-From-Behind Victory

1969, Florida State 16, Miami 14 ... although FSU led at halftime in this game (13-7), Miami scored in the fourth quarter on a David Teal to Lee Strawbridge pass and the 'Canes had themselves a 14-13 lead. With less than nine minutes remaining in the game, the Seminoles started from their own 10-yard line. Seventeen plays later they had a fourth and 12 at Miami's 17. Bill Peterson motioned Grant Guthrie onto the field with 1:55 left and Guthrie responded with a 31-yard field goal to win it. Guthrie was responsible for 10 Tribe points on the night (3 FG's and a PAT) and one of his field goals went 53-yards, still an FSU record.

#### Dennis Best Miami Come-From-Behind Victory

1975, Miami 24, Florida State 22... Florida State trailed 21-6 going into the fourth quarter but came back with 16 straight points. Rudy Thomas scored on a two yard run and FSU added a two point conversion to make it 21-14. On the Seminole's next possession. Larry Key went 31 yards for the touchdown. Coach Darrell Mudra elected to go for the win with another two point conversion

and a Clyde Walker to Mike Shumann pass clicked to give FSU the 22-21 lead. But Miami was not done. Chris Dennis kicked a 29-yard field goal with 0:13 left to win this contest.

Biggest Upset

1963, Florida State 24, Miami 0... on this September afternoon, the crowd had gathered to see Miami's All-American quarterback George Mira destroy the Seminoles. What they got was a dose of Florida State quarterback Steve Tensi who led his team to an upset victory over

heavily favored Miami. The 6-5 Tensi hit wide receiver Fred Biletnikoff with passes of 23 and 17 yards for touchdowns as FSU grabbed a 14-0 halftime lead. After a 22-yard field goal by Doug Messer in the third period, the flashy Biletnikoff dealt Mira his most embarrassing blow of the night by picking off one of his passes and returning it 99 yards.

**Longest Winning Streak** 

1963-1972, seven games, all won by Florida State in the Orange Bowl ...when Florida State upset Miami in 1963 with a 24-0 shutout, it marked the first of seven times the Seminoles would travel to the Orange Bowl and come away with a win. FSU shut out Miami again in 1964 (14-0), won a two point decision in 1969 (16-14) and three point decisions in 1966 (23-20) and 1971 (20-17). The other scores were 27-3 in 1970 and 17-14 in 1972.

The Biggest Blowout

1976, Miami 46, Florida State 0... Miami scored on nine of its first 10 possessions and it was never a contest as the Seminoles lost their second game in as many starts under first year coach Bobby Bowden. Three fumble recoveries and two interceptions helped Miami roll up 17 points in the first 15 minutes of play. The Hurricanes used every player on the roster, including 11 runningbacks, three quarterbacks and six receivers.

# Childers and Williams Big for Seminoles

Both players look like they are playing out of position. One is regarded as too small to be on the line. The other is too slow to play wide receiver. But despite the obvious physical drawbacks of these two players, one thing is for certain—when the Seminoles need a critical first down or need to make up a lot of yards in a short period of time. Florida State quarterback Rick Stockstill will look for either tight end Sam Childers or wide receiver Phil Williams on a passing situation.

Recruited out of Tallahassee Leon High School, Childers was regarded as a tight end with good hands but an obvious lack of size. It's a severe disadvantage when you weigh only 195 and are asked to block a defensive player who will often go 240 or more.

Despite his size disadvantage, Childers was not one to give up. Through determination and hard work, he worked his way into the FSU starting lineup despite surgery for bone chips and a host of other physical problems.


Sharing time with Zeke Mowatt, Childers was the third leading receiver for the Seminoles in 1980. He caught 20 passes for 236 yards and a pair of touchdowns, including one in the Tribe's 36-22 upset of Pittsburgh.

Childers was the third leading receiver for the Seminoles in 1980. His totals rank fourth in catches and fifth in receiving yards on the squad.

For the second consecutive year, Childers finds himself sharing time with Mowatt at tight end. Despite his part-time status, Childers continues to be productive in the receiving department.

Through the Western Carolina game this year. Childers has caught 14 passes for 137 yards and a pair of scores. His totals rank fourth in catches and fifth in receiving yards on the squad.

Despite his productivity, the senior


has no complaints about not being used more. "Naturally you try to work as hard as possible to secure a starting spot." Childers says. "The coaches believe that Zeke's the better blocker (Mowatt is 6-4, 235) and I'm the better pass receiver and they use us accordingly. As long as I can continue to contribute to the team I don't really care how I'm used."

Phil Williams is another story. At 5-10 and 170, the Warner Robins, Ga. native was not even recruited out of high school. When he enrolled at Florida State in 1978, Williams went to the FSU coaching staff and asked for a chance to play football.

After a less than stunning freshman year, Williams came back to share starting assignments in both his sophomore and junior years. During those two seasons, he caught 28 passes for a total of 406 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

After his sophomore year, he earned first team Academic All-American honors for excellence on the field and in the classroom.

But his senior year has been something else. Despite being "too slow" and smaller than most of the defensive backs he has played against, Williams is having a banner season in 1981. Through eight games, he has

pulled down 19 aerials for 372 yards, the highest total on the squad.

Averaging over 19 yards per reception, Williams has turned into the Seminoles big play man in 1981. Against LSU, he pulled in a touchdown that put the game away for the Seminoles after LSU had rallied to within 10 points.

"Phil is the type of player you love to coach," FSU receiver coach John Eason says. "He isn't blessed with great size or speed, but he makes use of the tools he does have, namely a great set of hands and intelligence.

"Phil will often come in at night on his own time and re-examine film of our opponents just to see if he can pick up any of the defensive backs' tendencies. He'll watch the films over and over again just hoping to find something that will help him in a game. If you could have a whole



## Bowden & FSU: A Perfect Match

What is the reason for Bobby Bowden's Florida State success?

Perhaps retired Dr. Coyle Moore, who was dean for Florida State's School of Welfare and a long-time observer of the Seminole sports program, gives the best insight with the below quotation.

"Bobby Bowden is a Southern Cracker, to the manor born, perfectly adapted to us Southern Crackers and Rednecks in Northern Florida. He speaks our language, adheres to our religious faith, and fits our needs like a glove."

Bowden, who was raised in Alabama, has been able to tie together the loose ends of a major college football program with his downhome, country, folksy way of getting things done. A city slicker he ain't.

He has the ways of a southern cracker yet the polish of a sophisticated head coach from the eastern establishment thanks to a six-year head coaching stint at West Virginia. Bowden has been able to find the right blend that makes him the second most popular head coach in the deep south today. Only Paul "Bear" Bryant of Alabama draws more attention.

At various times in the last two years, Bowden has been described by the media as a "savior" and "St. Bobby." Indeed, he has fit the needs of the Florida State football program like a glove. Bowden has taken a program that was in ashes and turned it into one of the most respected in the country.

In case you disagree, consider . . .

- (1) A 44-14 record in five seasons compared to a 19-38 in five years B.B. (Before Bowden);
- (2) Back-to-back Orange Bowl appearances when the school had never previously appeared in a New Year's Day post-season contest;
- (3) Second place spots in both the Associated Press and United Press International Top 20 polls at the close of the 1980 regular season;



(4) Consecutive Top 10 finishes in the final wire service polls the last two years when FSU only once previously since 1947 had finished in the Top 20.

Yes, the Florida State football program has turned around with Bobby Bowden at the helm. In fact, it can even be described as amazing. That first year (1976) the Tribe went 5-6—not a good mark by many standards, but when one remembers the previous year was 3-8, 1976, was considered a plus. Since then FSU has reeled off regular season marks of 9-2, 8-3, 11-0 and 10-1.

There have been three bowl appearances—the 1977 Tangerine and 1980 and 1981 Orange Bowls. The Tribe has

consistently ranked in the Top 20 each of the last two years and there have been eight national or regional television appearances—more than any other school in the country.

Bowden is the first to recognize the work of his staff for bringing the Seminole program to the point where it exists today. But, others direct the credit to the 51-year old Bowden.

This was quite evident during and after the 1979 season when Bowden's name was mentioned for every head coaching position that opened. But, FSU President Bernie Sliger managed to get Bowden's name on a contract that should make him a permanent fixture in Tallahassee and Doak Campbell Stadium for many years to come.

Bowden signed an automatically renewing five year contract that contains a clause unique to college athletics—if Bowden elects to resign from his current employer for another coaching position, he must pay FSU for the time remaining on the contract.

"It means we are married and nobody's going to put our marriage asunder," Bowden explained. "I didn't want to go anywhere. I wanted to stay here. I love it here. Florida State and its fans are not spoiled yet."

Bowden realizes there is room for the program to grow.

"We haven't won the national championship," Bowden says. "We were close last year—a pair of two point conversion plays kept us from winning the title. No, we still have some growing room. It ain't the time for 'ole Bobby and his players to sit back. There's still work to be done."

Still, Bowden can fondly recall the pleasant memories of the last five seasons. Twice he has been named National Coach of the Year. First the honor was given by ABC-TV and Chevrolet after the 1979 season and at the close of the 1980 campaign, the American Sportsmanship Council named him

mind on FSU's staff in the 1960's, when Bill Peterson was head coach and the Seminoles were first making waves in the polls with a celebrated passing game that featured wide receiver Fred Biletnikoff.

Bowden left to be offensive coordinator under Jim Carlen at West Virginia. When Carlen checked out, going to his current job at South Carolina, Bowden became head coach of the Mountaineers. He was doing well in a tough situation and, when Florida State called Bowden had to give it some thought.

asm in everything you do in life," Bowden says," and you coach what you believe. If we can be enthusiastic in the little things we do, it will carry over to a winning season.

"But don't get me wrong about discipline. I believe in letting the players know who is boss, and I believe in some sacrifice and devotion. But discipline can only go so far.

"Heck, I've always said that if short hair and perfect manners won football games, the Army-Navy game would be played every year for the national championship."

its "Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year." And twice he has been the Associated Press Southern Independent Coach of the Year.

Success fits Bowden. He has been just as successful at his previous head coaching stops—Samford and West Virginia.

His Samford record was 31-6 over four seasons. In six years at West Virginia, he piloted the Mountaineers to a 42-26 record and two Peach Bowl appearances. His 44-14 FSU log gives him a career mark of 117-46, a .717 winning percentage.

Bowden is no Tallhassee stranger. He had been an offensive coaching "I'm a southern boy who wants to be in the Deep South," he said. "I slipped on ice once too often, got bogged down in the snow one time too many. I didn't want to act anxious, but I was eager to come to Florida State."

Bowden doesn't follow a complicated coaching philosophy. In fact, it's quite simple.

"I believe in blocking and tackling," he says. "Everything else in this game is irrelevant, blocking and tackling will cause wins."

Enthusiasm and discipline are key words which exemplify Bowden's overall attitude, both on and off the field.

"I believe in discipline and enthusi-

coach. He is also a deeply religious individual, who speaks often to church groups throughout the state.

"God is an integral part of my life," Bowden says. "I look to God for guidance but firmly believe God helps those who help themselves. Man must help himself, but also seek guidance."

Born on November 8, 1929, Bowden attended Woodlawn High School in Birmingham, Ala., and was a Little All-American quarterback at Samford University. He holds a bachelor's degree from Samford and master's from Peabody College. He married his childhood sweetheart, the former Julia Ann Estock and they have six children.

A native of Springfield, Mo., Gladden graduated from William Jewell College in Liberty, Mo., where he was an all-conference end.



Stanton is the veteran of the assistant coaches. He began his coaching career in the high school ranks in Kentucky, West Virginia and Virginia. He later moved to George Washington University and then spent five seasons at North Carolina State, his alma mater.

Stanton was the defensive backfield coach for FSU in 1974 but returned to N.C. State for two seasons to join Bill Dooley's staff. Bowden brought him back to FSU in 1976.

McDowell, a native of Quincy, lettered three years at linebacker for FSU. He was selected third team Associated Press All-America following his senior season. Gene is a bachelor.







### **Basketball Tipoff Ready For Young Team**

A new 12,500 seat arena, a difficult schedule and one of the youngest teams ever in Florida State history highlight the beginning of the 1981-82 version of the Florida State basketball team.

The Tribe began workouts October 15 with 11 freshmen or sophomores among the 15 players. Head coach Joe Williams has signed four freshmen and two junior college standouts to add to the existing nine man FSU roster.

"We're enthused about our youth," Williams said. "We'll be spending time on fundamentals. We want the players to do things the way we want them to be done. They are going to be indoctrinated into our system at Florida State."

The Seminoles, 17-12 last year, will begin the new campaign November 29, against Florida A & M at the Tallahassee Leon County Civic Center.

Among the returnees for FSU is converted guard James Bozeman. A forward last season, Bozeman (6-5. 200) averaged 10.2 points and 3.8 rebounds, third on the team in both categories. This year the Tallahassee native will play the second guard position. Also back for FSU are center Oren Gilmore, forward Pernell Tookes and guard Ed Young. Gilmore (6-9, 190) returns to the team for his sophomore season, while Tookes (6-6, 185) returns for his senior year and Young (6-3, 175) his junior. Both Gilmore and Tookes are possible starters.

In the off season, the Tribe signed several of the top players in Florida and Tennessee. Locally, Williams signed Marianna's David Speights and Maurice Myrick. Speights (6-6, 205) averaged 18.4 points and 11.5 rebounds his senior season and was named to the All Big Bend team in 1980-81. His floormate Myrick (6-5, 175) tallied 13.0 points and seven rebounds and was Marianna's team captain in 1981. Joining the freshmen recruits are Kissimmee's Raphael Phillip and Kingsport Tennessee's Booney Crawford. Phillip (6-8, 220) played for Osceola High School where he averaged 20.0 and 17.0 rebounds his junior year before a vertebra injury limited his playing

time to 11 games his senior year. Crawford (6-1, 165) joins the team after leading Sullivan North High School to a 27-6 record and averaging 14.0 per game. At Sullivan he earned all-state, all-district, all-conference and all-regional honors.

From the junior college ranks, the Seminoles signed guards Tony William from Illinois and Ronnie Watson from Cocoa, Fla. William (6-1, 175) was the top junior college guard in Illinois last season, averaging 18.0 points and 8.5 assists and was the only freshman named to Illinois' allstate team. A former player under FSU assistant coach Steve Williams at Pensacola Washington High School, Watson (6-0, 160) helped guide Brevard Junior College to the runner-up slot at the Florida junior college tournament, averaging 11.0 points and 7.6 assists his freshman year.

Florida State also gains the eligibility of transfer players. Wearing the Garnet and Gold this winter will be Mitchell Wiggins, Michael Johnson, Scott Wilkes and Bobby Miles. Wiggins (6-4, 185) is a junior and is expected to start at wing. He is a former junior college All-American leading his team in scoring, rebounds and steals. Johnson (6-5, 180) will also have a chance at a starting


berth. He, too, played under Steve Williams and led Washington High School to the AAAA Florida crown.

Wilkes (6-5, 175), who can play point or second guard, also gained eligibility this year. Miles (6-8, 225) returns to his hometown where he led Maclay High School to the Florida A crown three consecutive years. The team also features walk-on freshman Cedric Andrew.

If FSU hit the hardtop today it would line up William, Watson, Crawford, Young, Wilkes and Andrew at the point guard; Bozeman, Myrick and Wilkes at the second guard; Wiggins, Myrick and Johnson at the wing; Speights, Tookes, Miles and Johnson at the high post and Gilmore, Phillip and Miles at the low post.

"In the pre-season we had tremendous effort," Joe Williams said. "Everyone has done well on the weights, sprints and distance running. Our players and coaches are all excited to get going."

This will mark the first time in 26 years the team will not open at Tully Gym. The team will play its 13 home games at the 12,500 seat Civic Center. Home dates include Georgia, Florida, Jacksonville, South Carolina and a complete Metro Conference schedule.








Gene Deckerhoff, "Voice of Seminoles"

# Seminole Signs \*\*





**Greg Allen**Freshman/Milton, Fla.
Tailback

By now, everyone in the stadium should know about Greg Allen. Not only has the 18-year old run for back-to-back games of 202 and 322 yards, but he established three NCAA records along the way.

The 322 yards vs. Western Carolina were the most for a freshman, break-

ing the old record of 286 set by North Carolina's Amos Lawrence vs. Virginia on Nov. 12, 1977. Add Allen's 95 yard kickoff return and his all-purpose yardage of 417 yards is another record, surpassing Michigan State's Eric Allen who had 397 vs. Purdue on Oct. 30, 1971. That all-purpose total will also be put in the NCAA books as a freshman record.

Of course, all of Allen's records become FSU records and his total carries (32) tied Larry Key's existing record that has stood since the Oklahoma State game in 1977.

Another Allen, Marcus of Southern California, had the high running game in the nation this year when he exploded for 289 yards vs. Washington State last week. But two hours later, FSU's Greg also grabbed that distinction.

Allen was honored by Associated Press as its Southeastern Back of the Week following his record performance.

This week, as FSU prepares to meet its down-state rival with the tough defense, Greg Allen may prove very valuable to the Seminoles.

### **Harvey Clayton** Junior/Florida City, Fla. Cornerback

Very quietly, Harvey Clayton has become Florida State's big play man in the defensive secondary.


A year ago, he was being groomed as Bobby Butler's replacement. When Butler became a first round pick of the Atlanta Falcons, Clayton was ready to fill his big shoes.

He's responded with big plays for the Seminoles. Not only is Clayton the team's leader in interceptions (5), but he's broken up a team-high nine passes and recovered a fumble. His tackle totals show 29 stops and six assists.

"Harvey has been our big play man all year," says defensive secondary coach Jack Stanton. "When the going gets rough, it always seems that he comes up with the big play--whether it's a pass interception, a fumble recovery or a broken up pass. Our secondary is young and will make some mistakes but I'm glad we have Harvey back there."

Clayton, who runs a 4.4 40 yard dash, intercepted a pass in the Memphis State game but was shut out for two weeks at Nebraska and Ohio State. Since then, the 5-10, 170 pound junior has a string of interceptions going, with one in each of the last four games.

Perhaps his biggest theft was against Notre Dame. With the Irish on their own 20-yard line with a minute left and six points down, quarterback Tim Koegel fired a pass downfield intended for Tim Tripp. Clayton was there to pick it off and preserve Florida State's greatest victory yet.

# **Spotlight on FSU Sports Stars**

### Barb Mellen—Volleyball

Athlete goes to college, becomes a star and then loses position to younger player during junior year. The story may be common in college athletics but there is nothing common about FSU volleyball senior Barb Mellen.

A 5-6 setter from New York City, Mellen transferred to Florida State from West Chester Community College in 1979 and immediately entered the starting lineup. During that season, Mellen led the squad with 492 assists.

But entering her junior season, Mellen lost her starting position to another gifted player, Marie Sanders.

Although she played in 34 of the teams 58 matches and recorded 113 assists on the season (second highest on team), Mellen found herself in a position she was not used to -- that of sitting on the bench.

The 1981 season looked like another frustrating season for Mellen. Sanders had clearly established herself as the team's number one setter at the end of 1980 and was expected to hold that position.

But a series of misfortunes for Sanders, including a bout with mononucleosis, put Mellen back into the FSU starting lineup early in the season. Mellen made the most of her chances and has been the spark plug of the 1981 Lady Seminoles.

Through accurate passing and pinpoint sets, Mellen has paced the Lady Seminoles to a 33-5 record. She again is

leading the team in assists.

Playing from FSU's 5-1 offense, which utilizes only one setter, Mellen is now regarded as the team's primary setter. In the two tournaments in which FSU has played this year and an all-tournament team was selected, Mellen made both teams. "Barb is what I like to call my triple threat weapon because she keeps the defense unsure," FSU head coach Cecile Reynaud says. "When Barb has the ball close to the net she can either set the ball, dump it over the net or spike it. She is also lefthanded which really throws the defense off. When you have a player who can do all three, it's a big advantage."

With Sanders now healthy, Reynaud again is faced with the problem of two good players for one position. It's a problem she is not overly concerned with. "We can do a number of things, including going to a two setter offense (5-2 offense)," Reynaud says. "Both players are good and will see a lot of playing time. I'm just real glad that Barb is having such an outstand-

ing senior year."

### Herb Wills—Cross Country

It takes a special kind of person to be a successful cross country runner. A person must be dedicated, ambitious and willing to work hard to achieve a high level of performance that often goes unnoticed by the media and sports fans. Herb Wills, a senior from Tallahassee, is one that has been willing to go through those sacrifices.

Wills, who along with fellow senior Larry Greene give the Seminoles a powerful one-two attack, spent the 1980 cross country season running a step behind Greene.

In most races last season, including the prestigious Metro Conference Championships, the two generally finished one-two for the Seminoles -- with Greene taking first in all but one race.

A knee injury to Greene early this season has forced Wills to assume the leadership role on the team -- a job he performed with style. Through three meets, Wills has won all three races, including victories in the Seminole

Invitational, the Florida Invitational and a victory in a dual meet with Notre Dame that led the Seminoles to a clean sweep of the Fighting Irish.

Wills is the runner that cross country coach John Brogle credits most with the Seminoles 8-0 record. "Without a doubt, Herb has been our most

consistent runner this season," Brogle says. "He is having an outstanding season and I hope he can carry it right through to nationals."

Cross Country is not the only sport Wills excels in. He is an outstanding marathon runner and was a 1979 and 1980 NCAA All-American in track at the 10,000-meter distance. He finished fourth in that event in 1980 and 11th last year. Wills is also an accomplished miler and 1500-meter runner.

"Herb's versatility is really a big plus for us, especially in track," Brogle, who also serves as the assistant track coach, says. "He is able to score points in several different events."

While Florida State battles Miamitoday in football, Herb Wills and his teammates will be in New Orleans trying to win the Metro Conference Championship in cross country. You may not hear if Wills wins or not, but one thing is important. He will be there giving 100 percent.

### For Pat Milligan

Q Is it harder for a walk-on to earn playing time than a recruited athlete?

Rich Logue, Jacksonville

A It is at first because you start at the very bottom and have to prove that you deserve a chance. Once that part is over, you just have to do your best and hope the coaches notice



you. I really like Florida State because they always seem to give the walk-ons a fair chance to prove themselves and you really can't ask for more than a shot.

### For Tom McCormick

**Q** Does the lack of publicity that an offensive lineman generally receives bother you? Dale Woods, Orlando

A Not really. When you give the quarterback time to throw or make the right blocks to spring a runner, it is usually reward enough. Our main job is to do the blocking and no team can



win without it. When Stock (quarterback Rick Stockstill) or one of the runningbacks comes over after a good touchdown drive and says, "nice job", I am satisfied.

### For Blair Williams

As the backup quarterback, how do you keep mentally prepared during the game?

Steve Simon, Tallahassee

**A** Just knowing that something could happen to the quarterback, which is a vulnerable position, is enough to keep you mentally ready. I also like to visualize the play from



the sidelines and ask myself what I'd do in the same situation. There are other little things you can do to keep yourself ready, like watching the defenses tendencies.

### For Ron Hester

O FSU has not been successful this season in setting up a punt return. Why?

Steve Rosette, Miami

A We have not set up the punt return because we go for the block and think our results have been justified so far. We scored a TD and set up a few others on blocked kicks. I



believe one blocked kick is more valuable than two or three returns of 10 or 15 yards. But blocked kicks are only half the story. A number of times this year a punter has only got off a 25 or 30 yard kick because of the pressure we've put on. So it was as good as a decent return. If or when our opponents stop our rush, we may go to setting up the return. We practice that and are not afraid to use it.

### For Rohn Stark

If you had to select between pro football and training for the decathlon for the 1984 Olympics, which would you pick?

Dave Petty, Tallahassee


A I've always dreamed about the Olympics and I always thought about a shot at competing in them. Two or three

### This is Florida State

Florida State University— the home of more than 22,500 Seminoles—has a campus that starts at the top of one of Tallahassee's famed seven hills, and rolls gently downward and westward across 340-odd acres.

Founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, its heritage is evidenced in the wide range of architectural struggles to preserve history and keep up with modern times and air conditioning. Yet it still ranks as one of the South's last, few bastions of campus greenery—the kind that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with moss-hung oaks that are, in some cases, as old as the University itself, if not older.


From the Gothic towers of Westcott at the eastern entrance to the campus, to the modern glass and steel structures of its Science Complex on the west, Florida State University has moved forward in time and growth more rapidly than many of its newer counterparts in the State University System. Its enrollment has quadrupled since it became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as the Florida State College for Women.

Today, its 14 schools and colleges offer students the opportunity to pick and choose from more than 100 career options offered in arts and sciences, business communication, criminology, dance, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts programs.

The University is a member of the Academic Common Market and has overseas study centers in Florence, London and the Panama Canal Zone. Summer programs of study are offered in law at Oxford, in hotel and restaurant administration in Switzerland, and in comparative studies of economic and social systems in Yugoslavia.

The location of Florida State in the Capital City of Florida offers unusual opportunities for study and research in the social and policy sciences, and an opti-





mum environment for internships and on-the-job learning experiences for students in many fields of study.

One such program at Florida State is the Policy Sciences Center. It combines teaching and research in politics, economics and other social sciences to provide information and analysis for state government leaders, including the Governor, the Legislature and agency staff members. Already achieving national prominence, the Center studies and evaluates such topics as taxation, economic development, population, land use, family planning and human resources. Surveys conducted by the Center help legislators and others assess trends and changes in public opinion.

The University operates major laboratory facilities for nuclear, marine and computer research. The Florida State nuclear physics laboratory is ranked one of the top four in the nation by the National Science Foundation. Because of this ranking, it has been recommended for higher funding.

Florida State is also the home of the Flying High Circus, the only collegiate circus in the United States. The Circus has delighted audiences the world over with breathtaking, highly-skilled performances that rival professional circuses. The student performers have earned a national reputation as a high-caliber student troupe. Their traveling show is primarily an aerial and stage presentation with approximately 90 students performing during a two-hour show.



Best Example of Fumbling Away a Game

1962, Miami 7, Florida State 6...the unbeaten (3-0) and unscored upon Seminoles invaded Miami's Orange Bowl in hopes of upsetting the ninth-ranked Hurricanes. But the Seminoles fumbled six times in Miami territory, including second half fumbles on the Miami 19, 15 and 10 yard lines. The last fumble came with a minute to play on what could have been the winning drive for the Seminoles. It was recovered by UM's Jim O'Mahoney, who had three recoveries on the night. Florida State outrushed the home team 144-104 and outpassed it 178 to 122.

The Most Unusual Play

1966. Florida State 23, Miami 20... with Miami holding a 13-7 lead and kicking off, the Tribe's Bill Moremen took the boot at his six yard line and ran it to the 17 where he threw a cross-field lateral to T. K. Wetherell. The Daytona Beach speedster was credited with an 83-yard touchdown run when he crossed the goal line. The Seminoles went on to upset Miami.

#### Florida State Records from the Series that Still Stand

1963, Florida State 24, Miami 3... Fred Biletnikoff, playing both offense and defense, picked off a George Mira pass and returned it 99 yards for a touchdown.

1969, Florida State 16, Miami 14... Grant Guthrie connected on a 53-yard field goal in the second stanza of the game, the longest three-pointer in the Seminoles' 35-year history.

#### Best Regionally Televised Contest

1971, Florida State 20, Miami 17... the Orange Bowl was the setting for this brilliant come-from-behind victory effort by Florida State in a regionally televised contest. The Seminoles struck first when Eddie McMillan gathered in the Miami kickoff at the 10 and went 90 yards for the early lead. Miami came back with Chuck Foreman tying it up on a five yard run. Foreman added a seven yard run and a field goal as time ran out

gave the southern team a 17-7 halftime advantage. Frank Fontes put three on the board for FSU in the third quarter and Gary Huff flipped a five yard pass to Rhett Dawson early in the fourth frame to knot the score. With less than five minutes remaining, Fontes put FSU on top with a 25-yard field goal. Miami threatened twice in the waning moments but could not get into the end zone.

#### Best Performances by a Florida State Player


You pick 'em in order:

1963, Florida State 24, Miami 0...in the all-time biggest upset over Miami, Fred Biletnikoff was spectacular. He scored on touchdown passes of 17 and 23 yards from Steve Tensi and then, playing defensive back, intercepted a George Mira pass and returned it 99 yards, a record that still stands.

1964, Florida State 14, Miami 0... Fred Biletnikoff put together another great game for the Seminoles, helping to shut out the 'Canes for the second straight year. In this contest, he caught nine passes for 165 yards, breaking a 10-year old school record. He topped that mark several times during the season and won All-America honors.

1966, Florida State 23, Miami 20... the Seminoles were down 7-0 before sophomore quarterback Gary Pajcic came off the bench in the second quarter to spark Florida State in another upset of the Hurricanes. Before the period had ended, Pajcic had helped put 17 points on the board for FSU. For the evening, he connected on 10 of 18 passes for 146 yards and two touchdowns. His tosses included a 27-yarder to flanker Ron Sellers and a 28-yard pass to Thurston Taylor.

1972, Florida State 37, Miami 14... Gary Huff helped lead the Tribe to its seventh straight win over the Hurricanes. After UM jumped into the lead, Huff threw for 129 yards, completing 22 of 34 passes to lead FSU to win. He was named Back of the Week by Sports Illustrated and was featured the next week in the magazine.



#### **Tickets: A Big Operation at FSU**

Look around. The seating of the capacity crowd for this Florida State game is not the work of a large group of individuals, but it is the result of a small number of people who take their work very seriously.

"On Saturday when you sit up in the stands and see a full crowd and you know they're there for one reason -- to watch Seminole football --it's a great feeling to know you had something to do with it."

So says ticket manager Jackie Ross, who along with Assistant to the Athletic Director Claude Thigpen and Administrative Assistant Marian Lee are responsible for placing you in your Doak Campbell Stadium seat.

"It's been fun adjusting to the big demand for tickets," said Thigpen, who has been in the athletic department for 27 years. "We've got a new seating priority plan that has worked very well. It's our goal to make seating as equitable as possible."

The system Thigpen alluded to allows small contributors who have been Seminole supporters for years to be on the same level as the 'big boosters' who contribute to the multi-million dollar program.

The way the system operates is a season ticket holder will recieve a certain number of points for the number of years they have purchased tickets and supported the program. Points may also be obtained for specific dollar amounts contributed to the athletic department.

"We have one of the best ticket plans in the country," Thigpen said. "It credits people for what they have done for the University and yet does not alienate our old supporters. It allows not only the large donors to get good seats but it protects our faithful fans."

"The system we've developed has worked and worked well," Lee agreed. "It doesn't exclude the little people, and believe me they're not little people -- they're the big people. They attended FSU games when you could sit anywhere in the stadium because there were so many empty seats."

Not only has the innovative idea benefited alumni, it has assisted the Florida State student population.

"The students have coupon booklets for the home games and during the week they exchange them for a reserved seat selected on a random basis," Thigpen explained. "The first student in line could get the worst seat in the house. It was inaugurated this year and has worked better than we had even expected. It eliminated the problem of students camping out all night which had become a

serious matter."

"This is a great system," Ross said. "Before we started it, a fan could have a seat five years and someone could still bump them. Now with the priority point system we get less complaints."

The ticket office is divided into two sections, the one Lee operates under Thigpen's supervision (it deals directly with the public) and the ticket bank that Ross oversees that views the ticket office simply as a ticket agent. Working with Thigpen and Lee are Jodie Lafferty, Mary Lee Rouse and Bonnie Timmons. Assisting Ross is Sharon Turner.

"If you didn't enjoy working here you wouldn't stay," laughed Lee. "The work is very interesting and you meet a lot of people. There are people I've never met in person who I've spoken to over the phone that it seems I've known for years."

Ross agreed. "I enjoy working with the public and Saturday we see everybody."

"The job is very satisfying," Thigpen emphasized. "I get enjoyment in helping people any way I can."

What happens when the people aren't very nice and complaints arise about tickets and seating?

"I try to talk to them personally and explain the priority seating system," Thigpen said. "No matter what system we use, people won't think it's fair."

"We try to convince them that what they have is the best seat possible, and it

is," Lee said. "You might not believe it, but we have very little problems with the public."

The days at the Florida State ticket office when the culmination of football season marked the end of the ticket rush ended years ago. Once one season ends, the preparation for the next sport has already begun.

"It's a year-round operation," explained Thigpen. "There's more pressure during the week of a game with the walk-up traffic, but we're hustling all the time. Our work load is distributed during every season. When we're not selling football tickets, we're selling basketball tickets. When its not basketball, its baseball. And, during all this we're reordering football tickets."

"Since I've started here the ticket demand has tripled," Ross said. "We're very busy during football. I remember when we never had any problems, when there were always tickets left. Now we've been out of Miami tickets for a month. It even sold out faster than a Florida game. We've also sold out of all our away games this year. That shows we have great supporters and people who are interested in every aspect of the Florida State athletic program."

"How does it feel when someone calls and says they enjoyed their seats and that you did a good job?" "Ah, now that's great," repeated Lee.

#### **Basketball Tickets**

A new arena and new team await Florida State basketball fans this season when head coach Joe Williams and Company will play their first game in the Tallahassee Leon County Civic Center November 29 at 3:00 p.m., against Florida A & M.

A large demand for tickets are expected and sales have already increased dramatically from last season. Season tickets may be purchased for \$65 which includes admission to all women's games. Individual game tickets are \$6, \$5 and \$3, depending on location. Special ticket prices are also available for the Florida State-Florida game at Jacksonville, Decmeber 12, and for the inaugural Florida Four Tournament, December 4-5 at Tampa. Tickets for all home and special away games may be purchased at the Tully Gym ticket office 8:00-4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

The 12,500 seat coliseum is considered one of the best in the south, if not the country. It provides an unobstructed view, easy access to concession facilities and ample parking.

#### Why Do They Run?

They can be seen throughout the year ... at just about any time, day or night.

Over hills, on busy streets and in parks... in the rain, sleet, snow or the noon day sun. Their numbers increase with each new dawn.

They're not postmen. They are runners.

And they're running in nearly every city in the country.

Why do they do it?

Dr. David Pargman, Florida State University professor of sport psychology (Department of Movement Science and Physical Education)—and a runner himself—has tried to find out.

"First of all," Pargman said, "we aren't talking about the occasional runner who runs around the block once or twice a week. When we say runner, we mean a committed runner—one who runs frequently on a regular basis and who runs a minimum of four miles a run."

Pargman and his graduate students interviewed and tested hundreds of dedicated runners in order to determine motivation and possible personality traits. Unfortunately, results to those ends were, on the whole, inconclusive.

However, a distinction was made between committed and addicted runners and their reasons for the exercise.

"The committed runner will run as far, as fast, as frequently and as long as the addicted runner," Pargman said. "But he drives himself. He is well-disciplined. If you ask him why he does it he'll probably answer 'it's good for me,' or 'I need to stay in shape.'

"The addicted runner, on the other hand, runs because he has to. Running satisfies a need. The addicted runner actually will experience withdrawal symptoms if he misses a run. He can't concentrate. He might become belligerent. Before he runs, the addicted runner may become fidgity. Then, as he prepares for his run — when he gets into the locker room or puts on his shoes — he will begin to feel relief from his anxiety. In other words, rather than driving himself, the addicted runner is driven to run."

Pargman adds that these symptoms aren't confined just to runners. They also can be found in distance swimmers and cyclists — those involved in sports which have rhythmic, sustained, vigorous movements.

One phenomenon Pargman discovered while researching runners' motivation was the "runner's high" — a natural "high" some runners get while running.

"When the runner's high occurs," Pargman said, "a runner actually experiences an altered state. It's not just feeling good. It's a feeling of omnipotence, or all-powerfulness. The runner thinks, 'I can run forever,' or 'I can do anything.'"

According to Pargman, in a study of runners, one interviewee even had a head-on collision with a truck while experiencing this altered state. While the runner was aware that a truck was approaching in his path, he kept on running because he felt he could run right through it.

Other runners interviewed at Florida State have said they experienced perceptual changes — they saw and perceived colors in a new and different way. Others stated they had transcended their physical bodies — hovering overhead while their bodies continued running.

According to Pargman, a few

conditions are necessary for the runner's high to occur. Runners who experience the phenomenon have been running for at least six months to a year, or more. They run on a regular basis — from four to six days each week and for at least 45 minutes to an hour each stretch. Additionally internal and environmental conditions must be ideal and the course should be relatively easy.


In 1980, Pargman tried, unsuccessfully, to induce the high in runners. He also found it impossible to accurately predict when a runner would experience the state.

This suggested to him a pharmacological basis for the phenomenon. In other words, at some point during a run, the runner's brain produces a hormone which acts much like opium.

Recent research conducted at Massachusetts General Hospital has shown that vigorous excercise will result in increased levels of the body's endorphins, proteins released by the brain which, among other things, help the body control pain. Pargman was on the right track.

One thing is certain. On or off the track, David Pargman will continue to make strides in the running area of sport psychology.

team that shared Phil Williams' desire and dedication, it would be a joy to coach," Eason concludes.

Both players have something in common, other than both being receivers. When FSU needs the first down on a passing situation, the ball will probably be thrown to either Childers or Williams.


And for good reason. In the first eight games, whenever the Seminoles have been in a third and long or fourth and long situations, FSU quarterbacks have gone to either Williams or Childers fifty percent of the time.


In 24 passes to the two players in the above situations, 14 were completed for 13 first downs and three touchdowns. In addition, three passes to the two receivers (two intended for Childers) have resulted in pass interference calls and first downs.

When you consider that the Seminoles have converted only 36 percent of all third down situations, Childers and Williams dependability becomes even more apparent and appreciated.

"I like throwing to both of them for the same reason." Stockstill said. "You know that both are going to run a good pattern and be where they are supposed to be. If you get the ball there, it will be caught."

Although they are too small and too slow, Childers and Williams get the job done.

#### Stadium Information

**LOST AND FOUND:** Items may be turned in or claimed at the ticket booth at Gate 3 under the west stands near the press box elevator.


**ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES:** Alcoholic beverages are prohibited in Campbell Stadium. Violators will be asked to leave the stadium.


