

Teepee Talk

Suppose you walked into a room full of people at a party and were introduced to Bobby Bowden and Howard Schnellenberger. You don't know either man nor do you know what kind of football teams they field. Then you were asked to make your best guess as to the style of play that each one professes.

Based on personality and first impression, you'd have to say that Bowden's team would be an outgoing, gambling, happy-go-lucky outfit that's likely to do almost anything at any time. Schnellenberger's club would be tough and hardnosed. A kind of conservative outfit that beats you by lining up eye-to-eye and stopping you.

As all of us know by now, those conclusions would be painfully correct. You could watch college football for decades before you could find a pair of teams squaring off that so perfectly fit the character and personality of their respective head coaches. It's a story in contrast. A story of two men and two teams that are as different as night and day. But somehow they seem to be a perfect match.

The result should be one of the finest games played on this field in a while. And well it should be with the stakes as high as they are. A win by Miami tonight would send the Hurricanes to the Orange Bowl for the first time since 1951. There, they would have a shot at a possible national championship. A win by Florida State, on the other hand, would thrust the Seminoles clearly into the middle of the bowl picture and give the Seminoles a chance to salvage a fine season after having to overcome that wicked three-game losing streak of early October.

What we have here tonight is a pair of success stories. Bobby Bowden's Seminoles doing it with a flashy, high-scoring offensive attack that has been among the nation's best for two seasons running. And Schnellenberger's Hurricanes, winners of nine straight games, with a rock-hard defensive unit which has slammed the door of one opponent after another. Let's take a look at what has brought these two teams to this crossroad.

Miami started the season with not much hoopla. Florida State and Florida received much of the pre-season hype. UM had proclaimed a year ago that they were going to "Go For It." "It" being the national championship. They may very well have challenged had star quarter-back Jim Kelley not gone down early with an injury. The 'Canes' hopes were dashed, though, last year, and they were sent back to the drawing board.

When Miami opened the season with a freshman quarterback and Florida rolled to a 28–3 victory in Gainesville, many were ready to write UM off in 1983. No one in their right mind would have ever expected the Hurricanes to win their next nine games and have a shot at the Orange Bowl. But Miami's defense came together. It started putting enough of a crunch on the opposing teams to give young Bernie Kosar the time to mature as the quarterback. And mature he did.

Tauted as one of the state's finest freshman quarterbacks ever, Kosar has grown by leaps and bounds. In leading the nine-game winning streak, he has completed 180 of 292 passes for 2,086 yards and 14 touchdowns. My goodness! A 6-4 quarterback with all the tools and Miami opponents can look forward to three more years of this.

When Bernie throws tonight it's a good chance he'll be looking for the rangey Glenn Dennison. The Beaver Falls, Pa., senior has snagged 51 passes already for 561 yards and three touchdowns. The dangerous man, though, is Stanley Shakespeare—a first-teamer on anybody's allname team. Shakespeare has 30 catches for 409 yards and four touchdowns. Kosar throws to his backs a lot, too. Bentley has 28 receptions on the year.

With Kosar in the backfield tonight you'll see much of senior Albert Bentley. He has 698 yards in just 133 carries and averaged 5.3 a pop. He's had to carry much of the weight the last two weeks, what with trustworthy senior Speedy Neal being lost for the season with an injured shoulder.

On the other side of the ball, the injury bug has taken something away, but apparently it hasn't been devastating. Sensational noseguard Tony Fitzpatrick is out for the year with a torn bicep. His backup, Dallas Cameron, was hurt in last Saturday's East Carolina game and is not expected to play. But don't be fooled. There is still plenty of talent as evidenced by the fact the 'Canes held East Carolina to a mere seven points a week ago.

Two senior linebackers, Ken Sisk and Jay Brophy, do most of the damage. They are in a heck of a battle for team tackle leadership and right now Sisk holds the lead. He's made 57 solo tackles, had 59 assists for a total of 116 hits. Brophy has been in on 107 tackles, 55 unassisted.



Roosevelt Snipes has four 100-yard games this year and has scored four times in the last two games.

All in all the Miami defense represents a stern test for a Seminole offense that is a bit banged up as well. Last week the Tribe had to break in a new starting quarterback in Bob Davis and play without steady fullback Cedric Jones. The same will be the case tonight. Amazingly, the offense sputtered a bit though nobody would know, looking at the 45 points and 496 yards. Suffice to say they'll have to be hitting on all cylinders to move the ball against the 'Canes tonight.

Last week Florida State stayed on the ground, relying on Greg Allen and Rosie Snipes to grind it out. In fact, the Seminoles threw just 15 passes in the game. I think we can look for a few more balls in the air tonight.

When Mr. Davis goes to the air, he has a corps of talented receivers. Weegie "747" Thompson leads the group with 31 catches for 502 yards

and three touchdowns. Jessie "the jet" Hester is a burner who has caught 27 balls this year good for five TD's, including the game-winner in the thriller at Arizona State. Hassan Jones, Tony Johnson or tight end Tom Wheeler are also targets to be worried about.

Remember the opener? Miami faced the same East Carolina Pirates last week and escaped with a narrow victory too. Expect a barn-burner here tonight.

Allen and Snipes are just about splitting the ballcarrying duties right down the middle. Allen needs just 12 more yards to become the third FSŪ back in history to rush for 1,000 yards in a single şeason. He should get that tonight. Snipes, the sensational sophomore, has gone over 100 yards in four different games this season and averages 7.1 yards on every carry.

The Seminoles have the horses on offense, but whether they'll meet and immovable object tonight remains to be seen.

Perhaps the biggest challenge will be put on the FSU defense. Maligned off and on all year, they may have the fate of the game in their hands tonight. Last year the Seminole defenders rose up and played their finest game against Miami. It may take that kind of an effort if the Tribe is to pull off the upset.

People to watch here are linebackers Ken Roe and Henry Taylor and the man who's become the enforcer on the FSU defense, tackle Alphonso Carreker. Brian McCrary leads a young secondary who will be charged with putting the stop on Kosar—no easy task.

So what you'll see tonight is two fine teams and a bunch of fine athletes no matter which way you slice it. It's a high-stakes poker game that'll be played out right before your eyes. At least you won't have any problem telling one team, or one coach, from the other. They are as different as night and day. Or Hurricanes and Seminoles.

Tribe Tidbits: Eighteen Florida State seniors will play their last home game here at Doak Campbell Stadium tonight. Eight of these young men received a redshirt year and came to the Tribe program in 1979. They leave with a combined record of 42–14 up until today's game. The remaining ten players who finished their eligibility in just four years have a 31–13 record entering tonight's game. 



Two Of A Kind

It was the fall of 1980. The exact date isn't important, but something unusual was happening on a Sunday at the University of Miami Athletic Department. The ticket office phone lines were ringing, lit up like a frenzied pinball machine the day after the hometown Hurricanes had raised their record to three-and-oh.

Fans were trying to call in with ticket requests for the FSU-Miami game at the Orange Bowl which lay just six days away, and Howard Schnellenberger, the head coach, was the only one home at 7:30 a.m. "Hurricane ticket office," he barked into the phone with his grizzlied baratone. "Yes, there will be tickets," he reassured the caller. "If you could call back later on today I'll see that..."

The scene said a lot about where University of Miami football has been and to what lengths Schnellenberger has gone to make it what it is today, ranked among America's Top-5 and vying for an Orange Bowl appearance this evening.

Bobby Bowden is familiar with the position Schnellenberger is wading in tonight. In only four years he had his Florida State Seminoles in Miami's New Year's spectacle, inches from the summit of a national championship after inheriting a program which had gone 4–29 the three seasons prior to his arrival.

Schnellenberger and Bowden parallel each other in many ways. Each took over independent football programs on the brink of starvation and have since beefed them up into national contenders.

Both paths to success began with mediocre 5–6 records and blossomed into bowl appearances the second season before reaching a point of on-field parity with the Penn State, Ohio State and Notre Dame.

In a word, Schnellenberger and Bowden have brought "stability" to their respective programs. But they have seen days when such was hardly the case.

The year 1974 did not bring the best of times for these two coaches. That was the season Bowden's sure-shot West Virginia team went 4–7 and the Mountaineer coach was hung in effigy by WVU students.


And it was the year that Schnellenberger, in his second season as head coach of the Baltimore Colts, was fired half way through the season by owner Robert Irsay when the coach refused the owner's mid-game demand to insert at quarterback young Bert Jones over veteran Marty Domres.

It was times like this in 1974 when Bowden drew on the virtues he learned from the game.

"When I was playing the game I didn't know what virtue was, that was a new word," Bowden says today. "It wasn't really until I got through playing football that I realized there were a lot of things I learned that have helped me since. And one of them is don't quit. Don't quit something. Because there were quite a few times in football that I started to quit. It was too tough.

"At West Virginia there were a couple of times where I wasn't sure

if I wanted to stay in coaching. But after I sat down and analyzed it, I found there wasn't anything else I wanted to do."



Schnellenberger's young Hurricanes this year have been uncanny. Few thought the fifth year coach could coax much out of this squad which had nine seniors drafted from last year's unit. Miami made no one's preseason Top-20.

"In our first meeting with the squad I told them that there was more talent present than any other time before," says Schnellenberger, whose team has since won more single season games than any other squad in UM history. "But I also told them that there was as much inexperience as any time before. It's been amazing how quickly this young team has learned to play."

Things at UM nowadays are light years ahead from my sophomore year there when Schnellenberger approached me in the hall of the athletic department complex and asked me to play junior varsity quarterback. Three signal callers were assigned to the varsity, one sophomore was being redshirted and the only guy available to play for the jayvee was a defensive back who went both ways in high school. Schnellenberger needed a back-up and, since I played the position in high school, was asked to fill the post. I went three for three and a touchdown in my first appearance. Lucky call on his part.

Later on that year the Hurricanes earned a berth and subsequent win in Atlanta's Peach Bowl. After the game I caught the last team bus from Fulton County Stadium, the same bus the head coach was on, as we headed for a victory party at the Atlanta Peachtree Plaza.

Schnellenberger was trading jabs with members of the press when he cut off a sentence in mid-stride. He glanced to the now-familiar pipe he unconsciously still had wedged in his jaw.

"What am I doing with this," he said, as he removed the pipe and produced a long, thick cigar. "It's not good for a coach's image to be seen smoking one of these," he said as he lit the stogie, "makes it look as though he thinks he has it made. But I guess it'll be OK tonight."

Born and raised in Louisville, Ky., Schnellenberger often will speak in horse racing analogies. Churchill Downs, after all, was just down the street from Flaget High where he played football with Paul Hornung. Poker Lingo, too, is common in the Schnellenberger vocabulary ("It's kind of like doubling the pot each time," he has said of this year's UM winning streak) and Schnellenberger has been known to burn late night oil while playing poker with state newspapermen during off-





Florida State Leaders



Dr. Bernard F. Sliger President

His name is Bernard but almost everybody calls him "Bernie", and that's really the name he prefers. He is Dr. Bernard F. Sliger, president of Florida State University.

Bernie is probably the most down-to-earth president Florida State has ever had. He prefers sportshirts to a coat and tie. He's more at home shooting pool than attending a banquet. He does more walking than riding around campus and off-campus.

Throughout it all, however, President Bernie Sliger is almost fanatically loyal to the faculty. He keeps reminding you that he was, is and always will be a member of the faculty.

Sliger, an economist, came to Florida State in the early 1970s as executive vice president. After the resignation of former President Stanley Marshall, he was named president in 1977.

Sliger has the reputation of listening to the problems of others, students, staff or faculty, and, if warranted, trying to do something about it.

He listened to students and went to bat for an enlarged student union and the 1983 Legislature targeted \$9 million for it. Though parking spaces are still at a premium, students today have more paved parking areas than ever before.

He listened to faculty and today a new library science building, business building annex, music building, law library, conference center, education building and numerous renovations and expansions have been completed or are under construction. On the planning board is a long-sought science library.

When he first became president he started beating the drums for the addition of an engineering program and last year the first students enrolled in the FAMU/FSU Institute for Engineering. Bernie also successfully fought for increased library funding, quality improvement funds and an early retirement plan for faculty.

An avid sports fan, Sliger believes that an athletic program, in perspective, is an asset to a good university. He believes that students should be scholars first and athletes second but he also believes they can make A pluses in both.

Bernie resisted moving into the president's official home when he was first appointed but, under some pressure to conform, he reluctantly gave in. A plus factor is that the location enables him walk to stores and movies and to and from his office in the Westcott Administration Building. He spends a lot of time in the comfortable, white-columned house relaxing with his wife, Greta, younger son, Sten, his daughters, Greta Lee and Nan, and son Paul and his wife and baby.

A native of Trout Creek (pronounced "Crick"), Mich., Bernie still spends several weeks a year there in his "cabin" where he mostly catches up on his reading.



C.W. "Hootie" Ingram Athletic Director

"Hootie" Ingram is in his third year as Florida State's athletic director. He came to the post in 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeastern Conference.

Since his arrival Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities. Included is a new athletic center that houses all administration, coaches and ticket personnel. Fully equipped with locker rooms, weight rooms and a cafeteria, the

complex will also serve as a home for the Seminole football team. A new baseball stadium was completed last April, while further improvements to Doak Campbell Stadium and renovations to the pool area have also been completed.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., Ingram played football for Alabama from 1951 through 1954. After an Army stint and several high school coaching assignments, he moved into college coaching. His assistant coaching stops came at Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas and his only head coaching job began in 1970 at Clemson. Three years later he joined the SEC as assistant commissioner.



Dr. James P. JonesFaculty Athletic
Committee Chairman

Dr. James P. Jones, a member of the Florida State University History Department, is the chairman of the FSU Faculty Athletic Committee.

Jones has served on the Athletic Board since 1973. He was first chairman of the Board's Academic Sub-Committee until 1980 when he was named Board Chairman. In this capacity, he is the University's representative to the NCAA.

Jones received his B.A., M.A.

and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Florida. He accepted a post in the FSU History Department in 1957 and was named to chair the Department in 1980.

Jones is a historian of the American Civil War and has published five books and thirty-five articles on the history of 19th century America. He has also written on such sports subjects as minor league baseball, Hank Aaron and the Gator Bowl. Among Seminole fans, Jones' best-known work is FSU One Time! A History of Seminole Football, published in 1973 and updated in 1974, 75 and 76. He is presently working on a fifth edition.

Head Goach

Breeding Success

Some say Bobby Bowden was born to football. "From my back door," he once recalled, "you could kick a ball right through the goalposts straight into the middle of the field there at Woodlawn High."

Florida State's head football coach was born in that house flush by that playing field back in Birmingham. And ever since, it seems he has been little more than a short punt away from a game that he

After he started playing that game—he was a tailback in the old single wing—Bowden developed rheumatic fever and was out of high school for a full year, flat on his back. The family doctor said he never again could play football.

"And that is why we changed doctors," Bowden said.

Remarkably, he returned to the game and has since had no ill effects. The year,

1949, found him at the University of Alabama.

"It was the only time I ever quit anything in my life," said Bowden, no pride in his voice. "There were 100 freshmen there out for the team, and I thought I could not play. I'd get to run one play, and then 13 plays later be in for another."

There was more. Back in Birmingham was the lovely Ann, his childhood sweetheart. They

decided to get married, and there was a rule against married players on Alabama's team. The two were wed the following April, and Bowden decided to transfer to Howard University (now Samford) in his native Birmingham. He was chosen All-Dixie through three seasons at Howard.

"There was an uncle who gave me my first football when I was five," said Bowden. "It was one of the best presents ever."

Quickly, Bowden moved into coaching—first at Howard as an assistant, then to South Georgia Junior College as head coach, back to Howard as head coach, to Florida State in '63 as an assistant, on to West Virginia as an assistant and then head coach, and finally back to Florida State in '76 as head coach.

His overall record as a head coach was a remarkable 132-54 following the conclusion of the 1982 season. His record with the Seminoles: 59-22. Most remarkable of all, perhaps, is his record at FSU on the road: 29-14.

Bowden's enthusiasm seems both boundless and highly contagious. "Big thing about our coach," said one Florida State fan, "is he always sees the blue in the sky and the green in the grass."

Little things—or big things—do not bother Bowden for long. Soon he's laughing. He laughs a lot, and finds humor in almost everything. He seems to get along with all people. There are no known enemies.

"I think people are good, before I think they are bad," Bowden once said. "Too many people the first time they see somebody don't

like 'em right away. My first reaction is to like 'em.


"I don't know of a person in this world that I detest."

Exceptionally considerate of all people, Bowden does not exclude sportswriters. It may be accurate to say that Bowden enjoys the "best press" of any sports figure in State of Florida history. Bowden makes a hard effort to give writers the time they feel they need.

'We are in the selling business," he said. "We need the press. I don't agree with everything writers write, but a guy walks in here and I nearly feel like I owe him a story. He does not owe me."

One of the best short descriptions of Bowden came from Dr. Coyle Moore, retired dean of FSU's School of Social Welfare.

'Bobby Bowden is a Southern Cracker, to the manner born," he said. "He is perfectly adapted to us Southern Crackers and rednecks in northern Florida.



"He speaks our language, adheres to our religious faith, and fits our needs like a glove."

A lay preacher in the Baptist faith, Bowden speaks often of religious groups.

"When I was young, people used to tell me I ought to be a minister," he said. "But I never felt like I was called. It was more like I was called to coaching."

Bowden is most tolerant. "I really think God loves the

sinners as much as he does the upright," he said. "Ain't nobody perfect."

Bowden's worst vice is perhaps food.

"I love to eat," he said, laughing. "Gotta do something! I've got no prejudices about what I eat. I'll eat anything."

On a busy November day last season Bowden was having a late lunch in his office of fried squirrel and biscuits. An assistant coach had brought that from home hours before. Now the food was cold, but Bowden was obviously relishing that unusual late lunch.

Chocolate is the great temptation of his life.

"I keep waiting for the terrible moment they tell me if I don't quit eating chocolate I'm gonna die," said Bowden.

Bowden is said to complain that the only time he gets his favorite chocolate pie at home is on his birthday, and once—with characteristic humor—he pronounced himself henpecked.

"Yeah, sometimes, I'd have to say so—definitely," he said. "Now, she will let me make the big decisions, like whether to let China in the United Nations.

"Yeah, I will have to say Big Ann runs the show."

When it comes to football, Bowden insists he is a fundamentalist. "I believe in blocking and tackling," he said. "Everything else is

games, Army and Navy would be playing for the national championship every year," he said.

The last two years Florida State's schedule was rated the nation's toughest by the NCAA going into each of those seasons—based solely on the record of teams the Seminoles were playing.

But Bowden seems to have relished the opportunity to play teams like Notre Dame, Nebraska and Ohio State—even if games could be arranged only in their stadiums.

Whatever is out there, whatever develops, Bowden tries to minimize the worry factor in football. He says that he does not want his players worrying.

Rapport with those players seems to be one of the most significant keys for Bowden.

Few teams have received a bigger contribution from walk-on candidates than the Seminoles. Apparently, that's because in Bowden's system these non-scholarship players remain motivated to stay with the program.

Place-kicker Philip Hall is a prize example. Two seasons ago, with the junior varsity, he missed every field goal he attempted. Yet last season, still minus a scholarship, Hall was practically flawless on what he was asked to do.

Now 53, Bowden himself seems a happy and acutely motivated man.

"The greatest, most satisfying time is to get all the children together with Ann and go to the beach for a week," said Bowden. "We've always managed to do that, but every year it becomes tougher and tougher."

There are six Bowden children.

"Sometimes when I'm sitting in the chair out on the beach with my feet in the water, I can't imagine anything better," said Bowden. But soon the zest for the quest returns.


"Some nights I go home, and I just can't wait for sleep to be over," said Bowden. "Just so I can go out and begin the next day."

Always there are bigger goals.

"I want to win every game and have the best football team in the United States," he said. "I want to have a perfect season. We came close a couple of times, but they were not perfect.


"If I ever accomplish that, I'll set something bigger and go after that."

Wheeler Saves BEST For Last

A positive mental attitude is what senior tight end Tom Wheeler feels is the key to a successful football player.

"I never have looked at practice as work," says Wheeler. "I don't think you can be successful if you look at things as drudgery. I just think of practice as another opportunity to get better and that makes things a lot easier."

Without the air of optimism that Wheeler surrounds himself with, he very easily may have given up.

He, along with seven other hopefuls, entered Florida State as a freshman quarterback in the fall of 1979. Some of those players managed to remain at quarterback; Blair Williams, who graduated last year, and Kelly Lowrey were two who did. Other potential QB's found different positions which suited their talents. Weegie Thompson is FSU's leading receiver this year and Ken Burnett, who graduated with Williams, was a fullback. Two others never played a down for Florida State.

Even with the inevitable strong competition between the quarter-backs, Wheeler remained optimistic. He was confident he would play and why not? He had thrown for over 1,500 yards during his senior year at Spruce Creek High School (Port Orange). He was a thrower and Florida State had long been known as a passing team.

However, Wheeler's first setback occurred before he even set foot on the FSU practice field. During the summer before he was to report as a freshman, he injured his throwing hand. His injury was serious enough that doctors told him the hand would require surgery, but the operation would not be performed until February. So, the FSU coaches suggested Wheeler play tight end until the hand got better.

"I liked tight end a lot, even though it was scout team," confessed Wheeler. "Catching the ball came naturally and I enjoyed the contact, but I always felt I would return to quarterback."

Unfortunately or maybe fortunately, Tom never regained his throwing form. Consequently, he was red-shirted during his sophomore season.

"I knew when they red-shirted me that they wanted me to stay at tight end," said Wheeler. "Then came the message that Coach Bowden wanted to see me. I was sure he was going to ask me to change positions and I thought I had a good argument for returning to quarterback. But Coach Bowden is a great persuader and he really convinced me that I should be a tight end. He left the decision completely up to me and I decided to agree to the change."

So Wheeler leaned on his positive outlook and worked hard on the new position.

"His ability as a receiver was never a question," said tight end coach Brad Scott. "He'd just had so many injuries that we wondered if he would remain healthy."

Wheeler spent the 1981 season as the third string tight end backing up Sam Childers.

During the '83 campaign, Tom grew more familiar with his position and felt like he would contend for starting time with Zeke Mowatt. He did see action until an injury to his foot in the Ohio State game slowed his progress.

"I was pretty disappointed with that injury," said Wheeler. "I thought I was about to get a lot of playing time and then I got hurt again. It was frustrating."

But the 6-2, 225 lb. senior picked himself up for his last year and it has proven to be worthwhile. He has caught 19 passes for 200 yards and three touchdowns. Considering he had only accumulated four receptions prior to this year, Wheeler's statistics become even more impressive.

"I've thought a lot about this being my last season," admitted Wheeler. "I know from the past that if I had done something for the last time and not put all my effort into it, I would regret it. So, I've put everything I've got into every practice and game so that I won't second guess myself after it's over."


Tom Wheeler's efforts paid off two Saturdays ago against Arizona State when he caught a career-high five passes for 72 yards. Three of those receptions came in the crucial last minute drive that won the game for Florida State.

"I treat every ball the same," said Wheeler. "I really didn't think of it as being such a pressure situation. I just used total concentration on each catch and the ball just fell right in there."


Since Florida State is letting the second string offense play almost half the time, Wheeler has been sharing his position with Pete Panton. Wheeler said that he feels this practice gives FSU a real advantage over other teams because, he says, "it's like 22 of us going after 11 of them. We always have a fresh player in the game and that's a big plus. Also, Pete and I have become close friends and try and help one another."


With perseverence foremost in his mind, Wheeler has achieved goals that most people just dream about. Since he plans to take the lessons he's learned on the gridiron into his daily life, count on Tom Wheeler being a most successful man.


The Seminole Sports Network, a regional radio network, brings Seminole football and basketball games to Florida State enthusiasts throughout the Southeast.





scout team and since we didn't have a lot of individual coaching I picked up some bad habits.




For Coach Bowden

Well, I'd really like to give it a try. I guess I'm what you'd call a late bloomer. I feel I have the ability to play but all professional sports are


games of numbers. I just hope I get a fair chance to make a pro team and if I get a chance, I guess I'll be happy no matter what happens.





For the last 18 years, Seminole fans have heard that announcement, or something quite similar to it. After tonight's game, when the light's have been turned out and the last play already entered into the local newspaper's computer, Charlie Barnes will walk down the galleys of Doak Campbell Stadium for one last time. Next year, a new announcer will be aiding the fans with player names, yardage information and scores from around the country.

The year was 1959 and Charlie Barnes had just arrived in Tallahassee from his homeland of West Virginia. Then-Athletic Business Manager Eddie Cubbon—his brother-in-law—introduced him to Jack Haskin. Haskin, at the time, operated the public address system at Doak Campbell Stadium in his spare time. With a surplus of Navy binoculars, Jack's rather primitive method was to see what was going on and then announce it over the microphone. Sometimes he would recruit a helper from the student body. If he was lucky enough to have two other helpers, the information output would widen.

"Soon after I came here, Jack invited me to share his booth and help in the spotting duty," says Barnes. "Although we rotated a third person now and then, the two of us did all the Seminole home games and freshman games until Jack retired from Florida State and left for Ohio."

It wasn't long before Charlie received a call asking him to take Jack's place as the voice in the booth. "For the next 18 years, 'they' would call me at the beginning of football season and I'd signal my co-workers and alert them for another season," Charlie says.

Over the years, the job evolved from the primitive two-man crew to a group of six. The crew occupies a booth on the fourth level of the press box. Barnes sits in the middle of the booth, looking out the open window at the 50 yard line. Two seats to his left sits Richard Shook, whose duty is to supervise all microphones. To Shook's right sits Buddy Stewart, owner of University Rexall Pharmacy. It is Stewart who "spots", or follows, the home team as he has done for more than a decade, identifying player's numbers through a set of high powered binoculars.

To Barnes' right sits Walter Phillips, a seven year veteran in charge of enemy spotting. John Spell, a long-time high school football official, sits on the elevated back row and calls out the penalties when he spots a yellow flag. The remaining man in the booth is Haskin, since returned to Tallahassee. Haskin handles telephone calls or problems needing personal contact during the game.

"It may be reasonable to assume that with a full crew of adults, four of whom have powerful field glasses, that there would be no errors in information coming from our microphone," says Barnes. "But from experience, I know that we, or rather I, will make at least five major errors during the game. Success, to me, has been not exceeding my average."

Errors? There are plenty of ways miscues can develop. "Sometimes a spotter will look at an 89 and call it a 98," says Barnes. "In the early days when we had different helpers each game we'd get someone who just couldn't see and would guess at the numbers. We had one young fellow who insisted that his eyes were good enough to spot the players without using the glasses, and I believed him. After the third play I announced the name and number of the player making the tackle and that player rose from the Seminole bench, right in front of the stands, and bowed and waved to me."

Every morning at precisely 10:00 a.m. Charlie Barnes arrived in the dining room of the Hilton Hotel for what he terms as his "coffee club meeting." In addition to Barnes, those present include many retired Tallahassee residents who have known him from his 20-year career as a public relations man for Tallahassee Federal Savings and Loan, or from his involvement in the Lions, the Masons, Goodwill Industries or perhaps the Chamber of Commerce.

During these one-hour meetings, the stories and happenings of the past often are brought out for one more laugh . . . one more remembrance. From his years as the PA announcer, Charlie has a well-stocked library.

For instance, there was the one about the dog. In earlier days, the fence surrounding the playing field at Doak Campbell Stadium was not very high. On this particular day it was the end of half-time and the field had been cleared for play although the players had not yet returned from their dressing quarters. About that time the dog trotted onto the field. Sensing his importance and reveling in it, he provided the post-half-time entertainment.

"One man was dispatched to remove the dog but it was a mismatch from the beginning," says Barnes. "The crowd cheered and more catchers were sent. There was a fine demonstration of broken-field running by the dog, who was very obviously enjoying every minute of it. The crowd kept cheering while the players came out, waiting to play. Finally they trapped the dog and lifted him over the fence. I think the crowd was a little disappointed that he had finally given up, but they watched as he was handed over the fence to another man, a uniformed guard, whom the dog promptly bit. He wrestled himself free and disappeared into the crowd."

Then there was the night the lights went out. "No lights at all," says Barnes, a volunteer whose only reward for his announcing has been a pair of tickets in the stands for each game. "The crowd giggled a bit at first, expecting everything to be bright in a moment. In less than a minute there was a hum of apprehension beginning to sound. When you spend a lot of time listening to crowds, you'll find that they will tell you what's happening . . . whether there's a fight in the stands or a foul on the field that the official has missed. That night, the murmur was low but continuous. Then the band began to play. Someone in the horn section found some flashlights and they did their round-in-acircle-like-elephants trick that everyone loves. I will always feel that on that night the Marching Chiefs gave their best performance."

Some time ago, the Governor of the State of Florida decided to come to an FSU game as the guest of the University and his aides had indicated that an introduction over the public address system would probably be a neighborly thing to do. Trouble was that he had visited

Miami Plays For All The Oranges Tonight

There's something magical about this year's Hurricane football team. Something too good to be real, then again, too real to be believed.

Since taking a lesson in football futility in Gainesville on opening night, the Hurricanes have been unstoppable, bordering on boring and have won a team record nine games in a row. Spanning the current winning streak, UM has outscored the opposition 262–62. Ho hum... better to be boring than ... say, 4–5.

Head coach Howard Schnellenberger has his fifth Miami team as finely honed as a team can get. They've faced every challenge with equal intensity and have posted a school record national ranking of five. What is left? Simple. The one thing Schnellenberger set out to accomplish when he came to Miami from the pro coaching ranks—win the NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP. Period.

It was evident a few weeks ago that Miami had a shot at the title. But then even the most supportive of UM roosters scoffed at the thought.

But now, on the brink of history, the entire Miami area is rallying around the 'Canes. They're even throwing oranges on the field. Nothing new, in the past, they threw them for bad play. Now the joint is jumping with the cheer—"Orange Bowl, Orange Bowl!!!"

The Orange Bowl has in itself been nice to the Hurricanes over the past five years. In 26 games under Schnellenberger, the 'Canes have won 24. The place has become UM's 19th man

There is good reason for the fans to be excited. They know the stats of Miami in the OB and know if things go right and it comes down to Miami and Nebraska in the Orange Bowl January 1, there may be a lot of absenteeism at a lot of jobs in Miami on January 2.

Convincing the hometowners has been a touch sell though. After the loss to Florida, many were shaking their heads asking "Gosh is this going to be a long year or what?" Or What!?! The loss of UF was ten weeks ago and time does dull the pain. It seems like a lifetime since that goofy night in Gainesville.

It has been a long season and a season to be long remembered. It has been a year when freshman quarterback Bernie Kosar has given the phrase "cool, calm and collected" a new meaning. It was a rocky road at the start, there were many questions to be answered. Who would be the starting quarterback? What about the offensive line? When will the receivers arrive? But Schnellenberger stuck with his youngsters and they delivered.

Kosar would emerge as the quarterback in a competition that went right down to the final 10 days of pre-season practice. The offensive line, young and inexperienced, panned out and have given Kosar time to do his magic.

Destiny had prepared this Miami team well for an 11 straight game schedule. The questions were answered early and a higher authority has taken measures as to assure Miami's good health for the year. As Schnellenberger stresses, "It takes everyone to be number one."

As far as good health is concerned, it wasn't until the ninth game against West Virginia did a serious injury strike the surging Hurricanes. Starting middle guard Tony Fitzpatrick and first team fullback Robert "Speedy" Neal were lost for the season with injuries. There is an outside possibility of the two returning if Miami were to be invited to a January 1 bowl game.


Even without the two, things in the Miami camp haven't changed all that drastically. UM still boasts a powerful offense with big play capability and a defense that stacks up as the second best in the nation, according to the latest NCAA polls.

Kosar is the catalyst to the offense. The 6-4 freshman from Boardman, Ohio is quickly forcing Miami fans to say Jim Who? when it comes to Miami quarterbacking.

The cool righthander has continually shown the poise of a veteran. Last week, with four minutes left against East Carolina and the 'Canes down 7–6, Kosar drove the team 80 yards in 10 plays for the winning score. The previous week he rattled a tough West Virginia defense to the tune of 211 yards and two TDs. The week before that, he completed 65 percent of his passes in a driving rain storm in Cincinnati, the week before that . . . the picture should be clear.

Kosar's ability is amplified by the Glenn Dennisons, the Eddie Browns and the Stanley Shakespeares on the receiving end.

Dennison is the big reason for Kosar's success. The senior from Beaver Falls. Pa. has yanked in 51 passes for 561 yards and three scores. His big hands and good speed make

him a threat anytime he's on the field. That's part of the offensive game plan—make the opponent aware of Dennison and then sneak the long one to Brown and Shakespeare. Thus far Brown and Shakes have combined for 899 yards and eight scores or 43 percent of Kosar's 2,086 yards.

A balanced running game sparked by Albert Bentley has helped Kosar's bid for passing excellence. The fleet fullback has rambled for 698 yards and four TDs. He is followed by the ever-dependable Keith Griffin who's pitched in 373 yards.

Miami's offensive success can not be attributed to one facet of its pro-style game but rather to a masterful blend of passing to backs and receivers mixed in with some hard nosed running.

It was feared at the start the offensive line might not grade out, and when three year starter Mike Moore went down with a knee injury more concern was inevitable.

But, as the season wore on, the worrying became less as the make-shift line got game experience.

UM's defensive ranking of second in the nation almost speaks for itself, but to look at them would be another shock altogether.

First there's defensive captain Jay Brophy. Balding and bearded, he's nicknamed "the Bionic Man", and for good reason. Last year nagging injuries failed to knock him out as he went on to lead the team in tackles with 135.

Looking further at the defense, they are as experienced as they are young. Five seniors rule this hard-hitting 5–2 alignment. They're known for their nastiness and clutch play.

As an opposing ball carrier if you get by the line of Danny Brown, Julio Cortes, Kevin Fagan and Fred Robinson, it was good effort. If you slip by linebackers Brophy and Ken Sisk, tremendous play. If you make it to the secondary and survive, you deserve it.

Cornerbacks Rodney Bellinger and Reggie Sutton and safties Ken Calhoun and Eddie Williams are the final line of defense. Calhoun is the authority on INT's; he leads the team with three and returned one for 92 yards and a touchdown against Louisville. In all the Miami defense has 15 thefts and has held opponents to just over 153 yards a game.

On special teams, placekicker Jeff Davis and punter Rick Tuten hold their own. Davis a right footed sidewinder has hit on 10 of 17 field goal tries, 29 of 30 PAT's and leads the team in scoring with 59 points.


Tuten has apparently gotten over the freshman jitters and, of late has been the savior on fourth down. He's averaging 40.0 per punt.



another campus at another school in the state and had been booed with enthusiasm. Since the state official in question had his residence in Tallahassee, the problem became to introduce him at a time to discourage booing. Someone suggested doing it during the national anthem but that was quickly dismissed. Finally a solution was reached by Barnes. "You know how our coaches always line up the players before they run onto the field, waiting until the band has cleared and everything is ready?" he asked. "Well, I waited until the first Seminole had headed to the field and the crowd arose in one mighty swoop and cheer . . . and in the middle of it, I introduced the Governor." It was impressive.

Charlie Barnes has seen over 100 home games from his perch in Doak Campbell Stadium. He has watched and admired the talents of the superstars who have passed through Tallahassee as well as the games that have highlighted those athletes.

"It would seem a fact that Fred Biletnikoff is, to date, the best offensive player to emerge from Florida State," he offers. "I remember Fred as what (Tallahassee Sports Editor) Bill McGrotha termed a high-strung and finely-trained thoroughbred at the starting gate, and with a grace and style making him easy to follow on the field, even without his identifying number. Had there been some way to set Biletnikoff's passcatching to music and slowed the action a bit . . . not much, because he wasn't that fast . . . it would have seemed as polished and elegant as any ballet."

Barnes remembers the Kentucky game of 1964—the Homecoming Day which brought more than 20,000 fans to the stadium to see the floats and festivities before the game. "If I had the power to refer one game, this would be the one," says Barnes. "The score mounted to 48 points and we sat in our booth and chuckled and chortled and admired every Kentucky mistake to its fullest.'

Charlie Barnes is a man who seems to enjoy life immensely. describes himself almost in poetic language, a throwback from his days as a writer following graduation from West Virginia University's Jour nalism School in 1938. "My putts don't always reach the hole, I look my car and look in the back seats before I get back in and I pay the IRS what I think I owe them," is the way that he characterizes himself

'He's done a lot for Florida State,'' says Vaughn Mancha, the school first full-time athletic director. "He's always given his complete set He used to help out on booster fund drives. Heck, he'd bake a case for us. I don't think we ever gave him a dime for all the things he He's just a wonderful man.'

No longer will Charlie Barnes voice boom across Doak Campbell microphone. But all Seminole fans can be sure of one thing: instead that very voice will blend in with 50,000 Seminole fans as he continue to cheer his team as the years go by.


What is Brad Foitik's favorite way to spend an evening?

How was Florida State's football program changed in the four years that you have been here?




Going into the 27th meeting between Florida State and Miami, the series brings back memories to many fans of close, hard fought battles that were often decided in the final minutes of the fourth quarter. Miami leads the all-time series 14–12, after winning eight of the first nine games played in the series. FSU has won 11 of the last 17, including a 24–7 win in the Orange Bowl last year. This edition of Bits and Pieces will look at select games from years gone by and the heroes who led their team to victory.

1962

The year was 1962 and a 2-0-1 FSU team which had not given up a point all season invaded the Orange Bowl to face 2–0 and ninth ranked Miami, coached by Andy Gustafson. FSU dominated the game offensively, but **Jim O'Mahoney** recovered three fumbles to help Miami pull out a 7–6 win, on the strength of George Mira's 39-yard TD pass to Nick Spinella.


1963, 1964

Games played these two years are grouped together because of the fact that two men were mainly responsible for back-to-back FSU wins. **Fred Biletnikoff** and **Steve Tensi** combined to lead the Seminoles to 24–0 and 14–0 wins. In 1963, Biletnikoff caught two touchdowns from Tensi and also returned an interception 99 yards for another score. The following year, Biletnikoff caught nine of Tensi's passes for 165 yards and both scores in the victory.



1970

Tom Bailey broke open a tight 6-3 game in the third quarter by breaking free on a 57-yard run on Halloween night to lead Bill Peterson's last team to a 27-3 win in the Orange Bowl.



1972

Gary Huff earned *Sports Illustrated* Back of the Week award by completing 22 of 34 passes for 329 yards and four scores in FSU's 37–14 win over the Hurricanes. Barry Smith accounted for three scores on two touchdown passes and a one yard scoring run.

1975, 1977


These games are grouped together again to spotlight the play of one individual. Leading 22-21, Florida State saw **Chris Dennis** connect on 29-yard field goal to give the Canes a 23-21 win. In 1977, Dennis hit back-to-back 47 yard efforts in the fourth quarter to give Miami a 23-17 win.

1980

FSU's 18-game regular season winning streak came to an end when noseguard **Jim Burt** batted down Rick Stockstill's 2-point conversion in the fourth quarter to give Miami a 10–9 upset win.

Florida State shares an Institute for Engineering with Florida A&M University. The Flying High Crcus of Florida State carries an international reputation for professional quality aerial accand acrobatic entertainment. The circus delights audiences with performances under the "big top" on campus, in touring shows and on national television programs.

In intercollegiate athletics Florida State has established a winning tradition in both men's and women's sports, with teams which are among the top 20 in the nation.

Florida State offers students many opportunities to participate in social activities career and academic counseling and recreational programs. And even though the University is big enough to provide the basin educational resources, it is small enough to be able to reach out to the needs of even individual student.





Stadium Information

RESTROOMS: Restrooms are located on the concourse and ground levels in both the east and west stands. Portable restrooms are also available at either endzone area.

FIRST AID: The first aid station is located at the southeast corner of the stadium, adjacent to Gate 9. The station is operated by the Tallahassee Chapter of the American Red Cross. A nurse is on duty at all times and emergency service is available. There will be charge for ambulance service if transportation is required from the stadium to the hospital.


LOST AND FOUND: Items may be turned in or claimed at the police station, which is in the stadium's southeast corner.



His best year was his second, 1979–80, when the Tribe went 22–9 and participated in the Mideast Regional. Williams has led two other teams—Jacksonville and Furman—to the NCAA playoffs. His 1970 Jacksonville team played in the NCAA finals against UCLA. In a 19-year career, Williams is 317-209.

They include: 6–0 senior point guard Ronnie Watson (1.2 ppg/0.5 rpg), 6–5 senior forward Michael Johnson (8.5 ppg/4.4 rpg), 6–6 junior forward David Speights (3.7 ppg/2.5 rpg) and 6–8 senior center Bobby Miles (2.6 ppg/2.3 rpg).





Head Coach: Janice Dykehouse begins her fifth season as the head coach of the Lady Seminole program. During her first four seasons, her combined record stands at 79–51. Over the past two years, Florida State has gone 52–16 and made back-to-back appearances in national tournaments (NWIT, 1982; NCAA, 1983). This is Dykehouse's first head coaching job on the NCAA Division-1 level.

Assistant Coaches: Three new assistants will aid Dykehouse this season. Cherry Rivers, a part-time coach for the last two years, has been elevated to full time assistant. Buz Narbut, who coached Southeast High School to a 140-14 record since 1977, has been appointed assistant coach and Michele Lent, a former college head coach and an assistant at Yale University, joins Florida State as a graduate assistant coach.

Returning Starters: Two players that were full-time starters last year return. LeeVayn Oliver and threetime starter Sue Galkantas

return for their senior seasons. Oliver averaged 11.7 points and 8.3 rebounds last year; while Galkantas led the team with a 16.9 average and contributed 7.6 rebounds per game.

Other Returnees: Jill Baker (1.2 ppg, Sr.) and Lahna Wood (2.9 ppg, So.) also return. Baker is a guard, who also has seen action at small forward. Wood started seven games last year at point guard when departed senior Lynn Marnie was injured last year and may challenge for the starting job there this season.

Newcomers: Celia Slater (G, 5–9, Jr.) transferred to FSU from Clemson in 1982 and is now eligible. An excellent all around player, Slater has nailed down the starting job at the shooting forward position.



season press gatherings.

He has been the perfect match for the needs of Miami's cosmopolitan personality and major market media.

"Who ever picked him out was a genius," Bowden says. "There they were, back at square one when Saban left, and they go right across town (from the Miami Dolphins) and bring in a guy like Schnellenberger and there couldn't have been a better guy in the world to fit the situation."



Football was literally part of Bobby Bowden's life from Day One. His backyard in Birmingham, Ala., joined up next to the football field at Woodlawn High School, where he would grow up to become quarterback.

"They had a lot of All-Americans in those days who went on to Alabama and Auburn," Bowden recalls. "They had a great tradition of football and I think living here since I was five years of age, and watching them practice and hearing the band and the footballs and seeing the crowds probably got me interested in football at an early age."

That background fostered the man who today stands as FSU's alltime winningest coach. The milestone was reached this year against Louisville when Bowden's 63rd career win surpassed the mark of Bill Peterson who held the distinction since 1966.

Success, Bowden says, is derived from many resources.

"No. 1, we've got a great school in a great town. But we have been successful here because of the administration at Florida State, which begins with the president, who believed that you need a successful athletic program to sell and advertise your program. And the fact is, we've had some good assistant coaches who have dedicated themselves to make winners out of these young men. We haven't been tops yet, but we've been close. And I hope we can be tops one day."


Bowden is a salesman as much as he is a brilliant teacher of the game. He always has time for media types, whether he is on the practice field or in the middle of watching film. He almost will sense their presense at an FSU practice; anticipating, maybe even hoping that they will let him spread the gospel of Seminole football.

He has been as good with promotion as he has been with winning. Of course, those two could go hand in hand. Success at Florida State has come more often than not for Bowden, who turned 54 last Tuesday. Fact is, he's been pretty successful at each stop along his coaching career. By nature, though, the truly great never stop to pat themselves on the back.

"I'm still striving for what I would say is successful in my profession, football," Bowden explains. "The success I'm most happy to be associated with is the fact that I've got a good family. My children have all graduated from college and have married good people and are trying to lead good lives.

"And I have a good, peaceful feeling about my future after death.

That's what I feel success is. Religion to me is what life is all about. And everything else is just a play. A play going on. The final is the destination after you die."



Tonight's game marks the fifth meeting between Schnellenberger and Bowden as opposing head coaches. Each have won two of the previous four.

Last Monday, Schnellenberger flew up to Tallahassee to speak at Bowden's weekly booster luncheon, reciprocating the trip the Seminole coach made to Miami a year ago to talk up the FSU-UM game in the Orange Bowl. "I'd like to see you ask Charlie Pell to do this," Bowden quipped at the press conference, which was held in the Hurricane locker room.

They truly share a unique relationship.

"I've known Howard since 1960," Bowden says. "He was coaching at Alabama and I was coaching at Samford in Birmingham. While he was helping coach all of those national championships, I would go down to Tuscaloosa, which was only 50 miles away, and Howard would give me some information on how to coach this or how to coach that. That was always a big help.

"I have a good relationship with him because I think we both appreciate each other," Bowden continues. "I appreciate the way he goes about things and I think he appreciates the way I try to go about things. And our families are fairly close."


Because the trek he pursues is so similar to the path taken by Bowden with his Seminole program, Schnellenberger has kept a close eye on things in Tallahassee.

"I've respected and admired him for the job he's done," Schnellenberger says. "I've taken a lot of examples of what he's been able to do with their program and use it as a blueprint for ours."

So here they stand tonight, nose to nose, ace to ace, two men who have accomplished much in a short time, and continue to seek a similar fate. Both Schnellenberger and Bowden have said they would like to end their coaching careers at the jobs they currently hold. That would mean stability, continuity, success and, most likely, a national championship somewhere along the line. The first of these three are on the way to being in the bag. Hay in the barn.

So, who holds the winning hand tonight? From the personal experience of having worked with both men, I suggest that it is the football fans of the State of Florida, and you here this evening. On either sideline of Doak Campbell Stadium tonight, aces are wild.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Scott Atwell came to know Howard Schnellenberger at the University of Miami when he worked in the Hurricane Sports Information Office. During that period of time Schnellenberger also recruited Atwell, a 5–7, 160 pounder, to play quarterback for the JV squad because of some injuries that Miami had experienced. 

High School Students Weathered Summer in FSU Laboratories

This past summer, while most high school students were enjoying a vacation, a group of Tallahassee teenagers spent their time studying the weather in the Indian Ocean

They were in a special research program sponsored by the Office of Naval Research, the National Science Foundation and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Each summer for the past three years, these agencies have spon-

sored a program for minority high school students who are trained in meteorology, computer programming and other computer skills.

Of course, the students didn't really go to the Indian Ocean, or any of the other water bodies they studied, but used simulated currents and winds and computer applications in the Florida State laboratories.

Dr. C. L. Jordon, Florida State meteorologist, supervised the activities of the seven students. He was assisted by other faculty, graduate students and staff. Jordon said the students were required to work 30 hours a week for 10 weeks but most students worked many more volunteer hours.

While working with computers was a major function of the summer activities, each student took a six-week college level introductory meteorology course. Although no college credit was given, they were encouraged to participate in all class activities, including homework and tests. Jordon said some of the students made the highest grades in the class while competing with older, college-age students.

The students were given access to Florida State's reather station, which acts as a miniature national weather service to the University. The station is fully equipped with facsimile machines, satellite receiver and color weather radar.

The students in the program were Karen Barkley, Serona Blair and June McKinney from Leon; Tim Brantley from FAMU High School; David Hunter from Lincoln; Arlecia Lewis and Carlton Perry from Rickards; and Simmule Turner from Godby.


