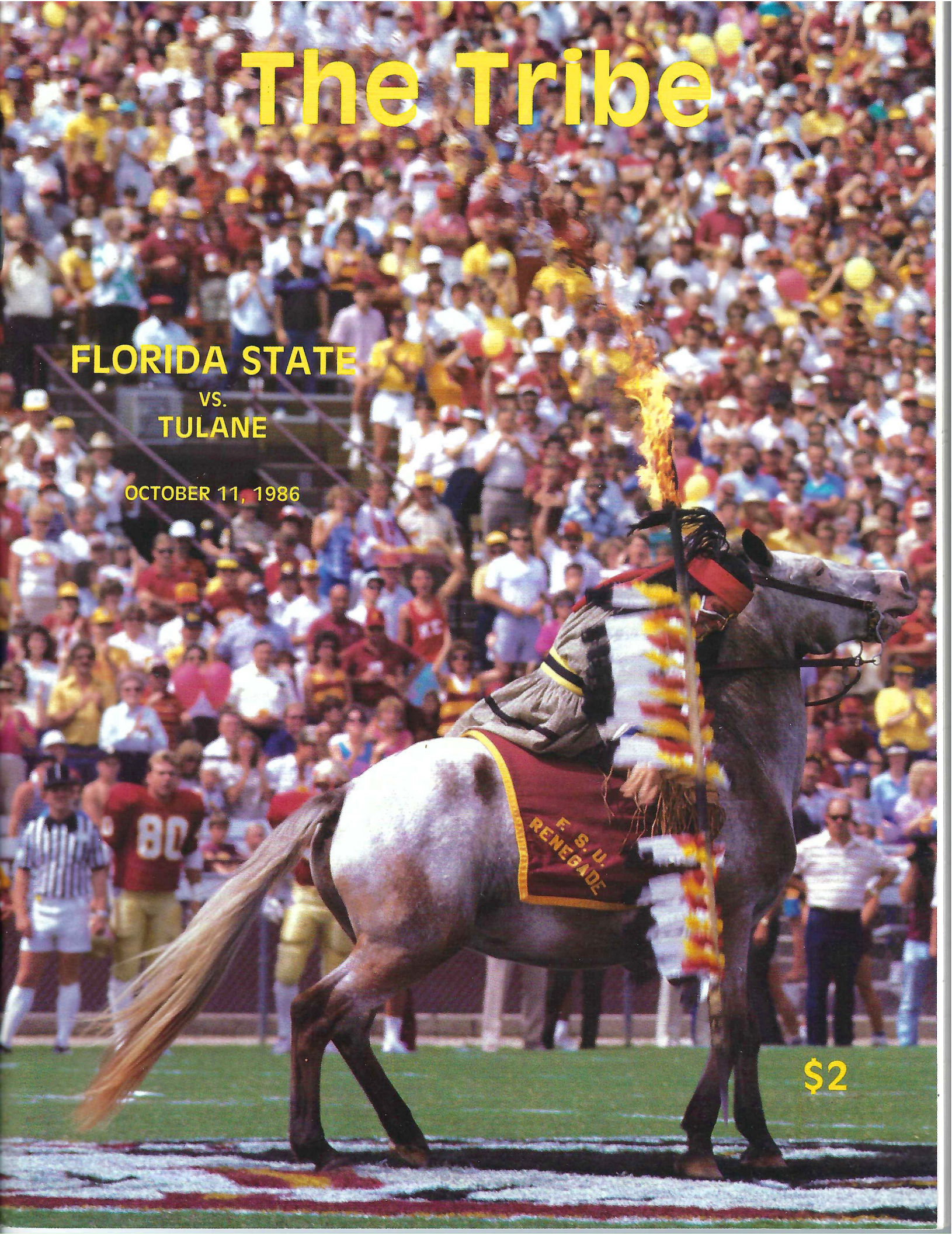

Teepee Talk

FSU VS Tulane

*** There's a lot of talk going around about the collective early-season records of FSU and Florida in this strange 1986 season. Keep in mind the Seminoles and the Gators between them have already tackled the top four teams in last week's polls. The Gators have lost to No. 1 Miami and No. 2 Alabama, while FSU has been whipped by No. 3 Nebraska and No. 4 Michigan. That's enough to get anybody off to a shaky start. . .

*** Have you noticed that Coach Bobby Bowden is sporting a hat on the sidelines this year for the first time? A manufacturer in Birmingham is producing the new line of hats and they seem to be catching on. . .

*** Every time Florida State plays Tulane I am reminded of that fiasco in New Orleans in 1983. It was the first meeting ever between the two schools and Florida State was ranked ninth in the nation and was a prohibitive favorite. Never have so many bad things happened to a football team on one trip.

(1) The police escort awaiting the team's arrival at the New Orleans airport mistakenly went with the University of Central Florida's football team which arrived an hour before FSU. "Are you guys the team from Florida?" the cops asked. "Sure are," said UCF Athletic Director Bill Peterson, the former Seminole coach. Off they went, with the wrong team. Peterson still tells the story with a smile.

(2) Enroute from the airport to the hotel on that Friday afternoon near rush hour there was a highway accident. A semi-trailer had jack-knifed and blocked all four lanes of incoming traffic. The team buses sat motionless on I-10 for more than two hours.

(3) Once at the hotel the nightmare continued. A computer malfunction made it impossible for the management to assign the players rooms. Without the computer they had no idea which of the hotel's 1,400 rooms were occupied and which were not. Hotel workers literally were walking down the halls with master keys looking into rooms to see which ones were empty and ready for occupancy. This task was complicated by the fact the hotel was 100 percent booked. One thousand rooms were occupied by people attending the State Farm Insurance Convention.

(4) Although the hotel had promised to put the team on two or three of the lower floors and all together, players ended up scattered throughout the 40-story structure. Two players were assigned the honeymoon suite, complete with heart-shaped bed and mirrors everywhere.

(5) For the entire 24-hour period, elevators were next to impossible to catch. Many FSU folks waited 20 minutes for an elevator. Players were late for meetings on an occasion or two for that reason.

(6) Meeting, dining and film rooms were intermingled with those rooms used by the State Farm people. Insurance agents were found sitting in on film sessions and chalk talks.

(7) Once at the Superdome the nightmare was magnified. The ninth-ranked Seminoles didn't have one of their better days. Tulane quarterback Jon English, playing under a court restraining order, played like Dan Marino. The fact that English was ineligible and later the game was forfeited to FSU was little consolation to the Seminoles. Tulane won the game 34-28.

(8) Final nail in the coffin came after the game. Coach Bobby Bowden, not in the best of moods to begin with, had a valuable ring with significant sentimental attachment stolen from his personal belongings while he showered in the visitor's locker-room.

(Oh, by the way, last year's return trip to New Orleans went without a hitch. FSU won 38-12 after staying at a different hotel.)

***Speaking of rings, Tulane defensive coordinator Bill Shaw is wearing a couple of Garnet and Gold Orange Bowl momentos. Shaw, you see, was on Bobby Bowden's staff from 1979-81. He along with the Green Wave Head Coach Mack Brown are former FSU players and graduates. Brown is a 1974 FSU graduate in Education while Shaw got his FSU degree in 1972.

***While this FSU-Tulane series is just three games old, it has produced some tight games. While the '83 game goes down as the all-time weirdest, don't forget in 1984 the Green Wave and Seminoles were tied 6-6 at halftime before FSU blocked two second-half punts to win 27-6. And last year it was 14-12 at the half. It took the Seminoles nearly three full quarters to pull away and win 38-12.

***Tulane quarterback Terrence Jones was used as a halfback as well as a quarterback during the 1985 season. Following Tulane's loss to Georgia last season Bulldog coach Vince Dooley had this comment: "Jones is the most talented, versatile freshmen I've seen. He went to Tulane as a quarterback and they moved him to tailback, where he acted like he was at home there all his life."

***In going 1-10 a year ago Tulane didn't have to look far to find its problem. The Green Wave was outrushed 2,728 yards to 823. It averaged just 74 yards a game on the ground in 1985 and had a per-carry average of 2.35.

***Florida State's 1-2-1 record represents the worst start since Bobby Bowden's first season with the Seminoles back in 1976. In that season, the Tribe was 1-3 through its first four. The second worst start was in 1983 when FSU was 2-2 at this point. Five times the Seminoles were 3-1 under B.B. and three times they were 4-0.

***This week marks the first time Florida State had not been among the nation's Top Twenty since the 1983 season. The Seminoles dropped out of the rankings after season-ending losses to Miami and Florida but finished that season at No. 20 after a Peach Bowl win over North Carolina. FSU has been ranked every week since then.

***Following this game, the Green Wave plays its next five games at home in the Superdome before finishing the season at LSU. Tulane won't win the scenic travel award this year. Its only road trips are Nashville, TN., Oxford, MS., and Tallahassee.

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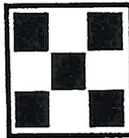


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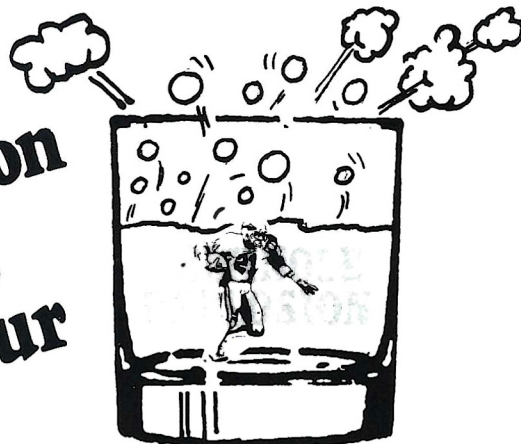


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SEMINOLE EXPLOSION

Renegade: Win, Place and Show

In the highly competitive, hard-hitting world of college football, once in a while fans, coaches and players take time out to reflect on other aspects of their athletic program. At Florida State a very important aspect of the football program is the Seminole mascot Renegade. At every home game fans are thrilled at the sight of feathers, flaming spears and Renegade, as he charges toward the 50-yard line mounted by a Seminole warrior who has become known as Chief Osceola.

Renegade has been ranked as one of the top three collegiate mascots in the country by *Pro Review '86 Magazine*. In the *Bests/Worsts* section of the magazine, Renegade is listed behind "Traveler" of Southern Cal and the "War Eagle" of Auburn. Obviously lofty company for FSU's trusty steed to run among! According to the magazine, "The most important feature of a mascot is whether it can pass the 'looks' test. Renegade does its school proud."

The original idea for the existence of Renegade was born during the early Bowden years at Florida State. Remembers Ann Bowden, "It took us a long time to get the support to pull the act off."

Actually, Ann had approached then-athletic director John Bridgers about the idea of a mascot, but no ideas had been firmed up. At the time Bill Durham, an insurance man who handled the athletic department's account, had mentioned to Coach Bowden about his idea of a horse. Bowden suggested that his wife and Durham get together, and the stage was set for the show we view today. "Bill Durham really took charge after that," says Ann. "I remember Kathy Chenoweth used to do all the painting and dressing up of Chief Osceola. One night we all went out to the farm and used loud speakers and a record player to see how the horse would react."

The rest is history. "It was an IMMEDIATE success," says Ann.

As the idea of Renegade became accepted, the Marching Chiefs' flamboyant pre-game ceremonies were incorporated, and the 50-yard line spear-throwing ritual completed one of the most impressive opening shows in all of football. Balloons were later added to add to the color and pageantry.

Mike Parsons, then an assistant sports information director at FSU, has borrowed the Seminoles' balloons' idea for West Virginia, where he is a director of promotions and marketing today. He

remembers playing Texas Tech in the late 70s and thinking that their mascot, a black stallion, was intimidating for the opponents to see. Once the Seminoles' Renegade was introduced, Parsons says "the pictures, colors and excitement caught on big."

Renegade and his supporting cast took hold of Tallahassee in record time, but the question of what the opposition's opinion was raised quickly. Former Seminole punter Rohn Stark has first hand knowledge of the opinion that is held by most. "There is no place more exciting to play than Doak Campbell Stadium—in professional or college football," says the NFL veteran. "I've talked to players in the pros and no one wants to play there because it is such a tough place for an opponent to play."

Says University of Miami sports information director Karl Schmidt, "Renegade and the whole show makes a great setting for college football. It sets

the atmosphere for college football. The coaches and players all enjoy it."

A comment from the other end of the spectrum came from a member of the Toledo entourage. "We all feel pretty indifferent about it (Renegade); coaches and staff alike. It's something nice for the crowd," said the staff member.

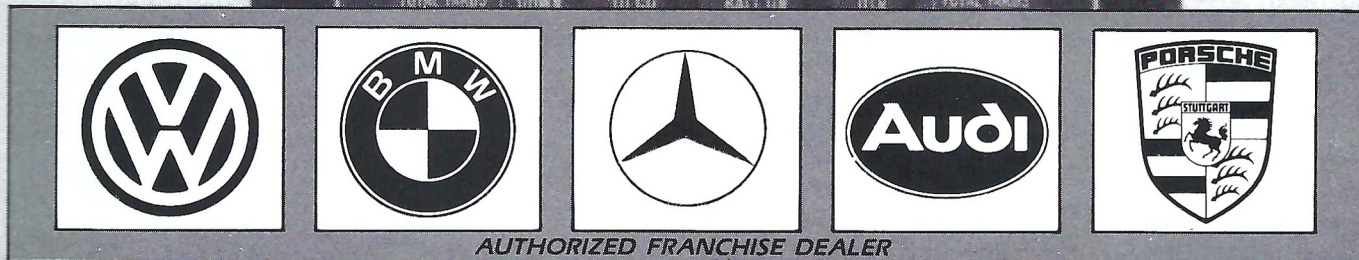
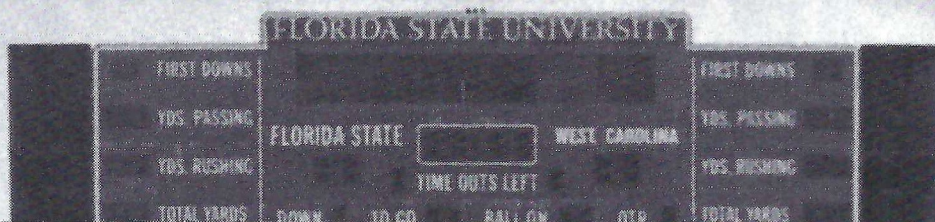
The Seminole players are some of Renegade's biggest boosters. "It's the best pre-game show in America," says junior linebacker Paul McGowan. "There's nothing like our mascot — it's great!"

Eric Williams agrees. "The pre-game show is very exciting; I get pumped up for the game. I wouldn't know how to act without it because it's a tradition."

While Florida State has become famous for its road victories, the Renegade tradition proves that the best show isn't always on the road, and tonight once again, it's in Tallahassee's Doak Campbell Stadium.



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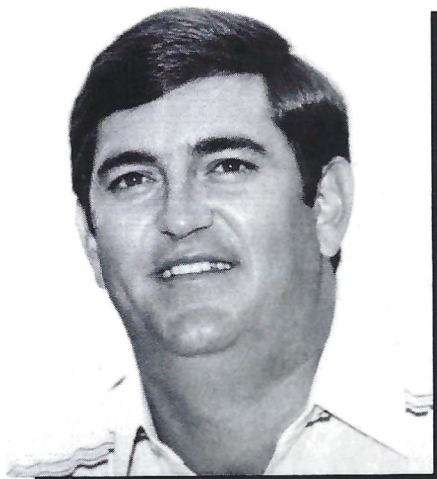

Recruiting Rigors

"Recruiting class football talent today—that is those players athletically superior and academically sound—is a year round, highly organized and demanding job," says Brad Scott, Florida State's football recruiting coordinator.

"Here we are in the middle of the '86 football season, but we are also in the middle of what we call Phase I of our recruitment program," continues Scott. "After August 1, the NCAA prohibits college recruiters from making personal contact with any high school players. We can telephone them and carry on a mail campaign, but that is all the NCAA allows. Sometimes it's like trying to walk on egg shells while making sure we understand and follow every NCAA rule."

FSU's—and every other school's—mailing campaign is even regulated by the NCAA. Currently four items, in addition to letters, are allowed to end up in the hands of prospective student-athletes. They include a schedule card, a media guide, a game program from each home game and a recruiting guide.

FSU also keeps in weekly touch with its prospects by letter. During the season, an estimated 200-250 young men are on FSU's mailing list, according to recruiting secretary Juanita Duncan. Duncan is in charge of a weekly mailout from Coach Bowden as well as a bi-weekly letter from the Seminole coach who recruits the area of each pro-

spect. By the time the season winds down and signing day approaches, that list has been pared down to around 100 addresses.

Phase I is very important because it is the time that coaches evaluate prospective recruits. Much travel is involved as there are literally hundreds of high school prospects who coaches want to scout. While recruiters are allowed by the NCAA to watch potential prospects play, they are prohibited from making any personal contacts with players or the parents of players.

There is one exception to the no-contact rule. Athletes may visit the FSU campus on their own during this time and may talk to coaches on the campus. Many FSU prospects come to Tallahassee for games in the fall—and the Seminoles are allowed to provide the student with tickets to the game.

Approximately 80 percent of FSU's football recruits come from Florida high schools. Scott says, "Florida has proven to be one of the richest football talent states in the country." Other FSU recruiting hot beds are South Georgia and Alabama. Most out-of-state recruiting, though, has to do with certain positional needs of the team.

Currently there are 34 out-of-state football players on FSU's roster. They come from such states as Alabama, Georgia, Pennsylvania, New York, Connecticut, Virginia and South Carolina. Three of FSU's four scholarshiped quarterbacks are from out of state; Chip Ferguson is from North Carolina, Peter Tom Willis hails from Alabama and Georgia is represented by freshman Wes Hardin.

The real recruitment war begins with what Scott refers to as Phase II. This begins on December 1. From that date until the second week in February, the NCAA allows recruiting coaches to visit with high school players and their families. Between the end of the season and bowl preparation, all nine eligible recruiters at FSU are on the road five to six days a week.

A map of the state of Florida occupies much of one wall of Scott's office. The map is strategically marked to best round up the high school talent of the state. For instance, offensive coordinator Wayne McDuffie covers the panhandle with his efforts while outside linebacker coach Jim Gladden, one of FSU's most ardent recruiters, covers

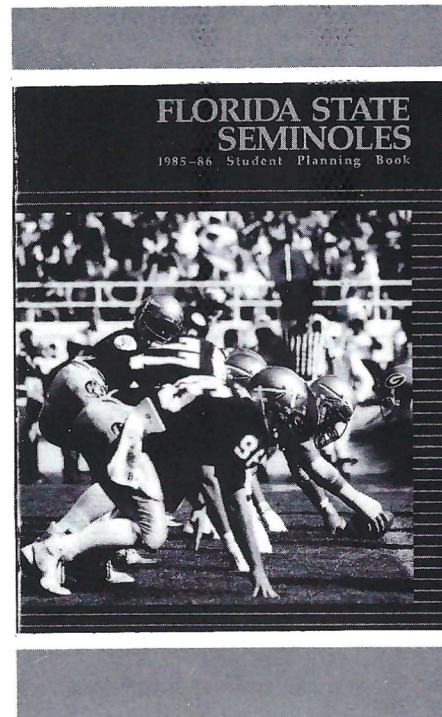
the central part of the state from Orlando to Daytona Beach. Most coaches are responsible for out of state areas, too. While Wally Burnham recruits parts of central Florida, he also canvasses the North Alabama countryside for players.

"It's a hectic time," Scott explains, "but it is probably the most important period in the whole recruitment process."

It is also a time when FSU can bring the prospective student-athlete to its campus for an official visit. Each athlete is allowed five official visits—but they must all be to different schools.

D-Day, or the day prospects sign letters of intent, is the middle of February. This is what all the contacts, mailings, evaluations and hard work is all about. And sometimes a top recruit who may appear interested in FSU might jump ship at the last minute, signing with someone else. The days before the signings are anxious days for the whole athletic staff. But those who have been directly involved in recruiting are the most concerned.

FSU's 1985-1986 Recruiting Guide—one of four specialty items that the Seminoles were allowed to mail out according to NCAA guidelines.

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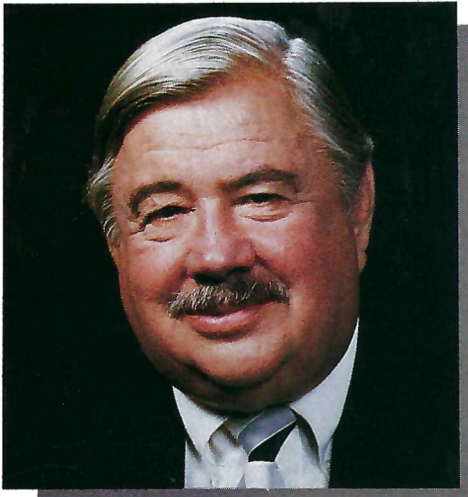
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University Leaders



Dr. Bernard F. Sliger University President

Dr. Bernard F. Sliger has served as the 10th president of Florida State University since February 7, 1977, following a six-month stint as the University's interim president.

After he joined the administration in 1972 as executive vice president, he assumed the additional duties of chief academic officer, and further served as director of the University's London Study Center during the fall quarter, 1975.

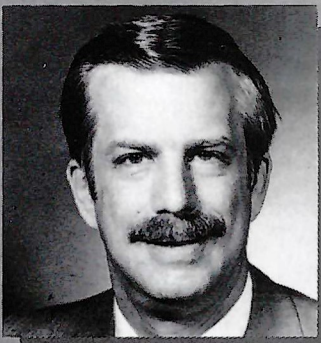
Sliger, a native of Trout Creek, Mich., was born Sept. 30, 1924. He holds three degrees, the B.A. ('49), M.A. ('50) and Ph.D. ('55), from Michigan State University, all in economics. He also has done postdoctoral study in mathematical economics at the University of Minnesota. Sliger has taught at Florida State, Michigan State, Louisiana State and at Southern University in Baton Rouge, La.

Sliger began his educational career as an instructor in Michigan's Interior Township Schools in 1947. Prior to joining Florida State, he worked for 19 years as a professor and administrator at Louisiana State University. During that time, he served LSU as head of the economics department, member and chairman of the graduate council, dean of academic affairs and vice chancellor. In 1969, he organized the Louisiana Coordinating Council for Higher Education,

which is similar to the Florida Board of Regents, and became its executive director.

Sliger holds memberships in a number of professional, scholastic and honor societies, including Omicron Delta Kappa, Phi Kappa Phi and Alpha Kappa Psi. Since 1983, he has been a member of the board of directors of the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta and presently serves as chairman of the Board of Trustees of the American College Testing Corporation in Iowa City, Iowa. He also is a member of the Council of Presidents for the Southeastern Universities Research Association, based in Newport News, Va. He is active in a number of other civic and academic organizations.

Sliger and his wife, Greta, have two sons, Paul and Sten, and two daughters, Nan and Greta.



Charles W. Ehrhardt Faculty Athletic Committee Chairman

A professor of Law at Florida State University since 1967, Charles W. Ehrhardt is beginning his third year as Chairman of the FSU Athletic Committee.

Ehrhardt served on the committee from 1969-71, and was reappointed to the board in 1983. He succeeded Dr. James Jones as chairman in 1984, and became Florida State's representative to the NCAA with the appointment.

A native of Elkader, Iowa, Ehrhardt received a bachelor's degree from Iowa State University in 1962. Two years later he earned his law degree from the University of Iowa and went on to become an Assistant United States Attorney in that state before coming to Tallahassee.

A widely-respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt holds the Florida State position as the Ladd Professor of

Evidence. He wrote the Florida Evidence Code, passed by the state legislature in 1976, which deals with the admissibility of evidence in court trials. Ehrhardt is also the author of a book on evidence, first published in 1977 and scheduled for a second edition soon.

In the spring of 1984, he was voted President of the Metro Conference, a position which makes him chief representative of the league in dealings with the NCAA.

Ehrhardt and his wife, the former Judy Sutton, have three children.

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Athletic Director C.W. "Hootie" Ingram

On one wall of his office at the Coyle E. Moore Athletic Center, Hootie Ingram proudly displays an array of photographs of FSU's facilities. Those pictures hardly resemble those that might have been found when he first occupied FSU's athletic director's chair in 1981.

Needless to say, there's been quite a change.

Following a legislative appropriation in 1981 providing money for state schools to improve athletic facilities, Ingram assembled a committee of staff and boosters to line up the changes needed to be made at Florida State. "We had just come off the good football year of 1980 and we wanted the other sports to prosper as well," Ingram said.

Florida State was able to combine money provided by the state government and a supplement from the Seminole Boosters, Inc. Ingram and the committee went to work. They initiated a total renovation of the Bim Stults Aquatic Center, which Ingram described as being in "horrible shape" before the improvement; built

Seminole Stadium, one of the finest collegiate baseball stadiums in the southeast; installed a rekortan surface at Mike Long Track and added vast improvements to the spectator areas; built a new softball facility; renovated Tully Gym offices; expanded and made much-needed improvements to Doak Campbell Stadium; and provided Florida State athletics with a home in the form of Coyle E. Moore Athletic Center, which Ingram calls "the heart and soul of Seminole Athletics."

"We had been putting band-aids on all the facilities before and just getting by," Ingram said. He also said that just five years ago Florida State had been at a recruiting disadvantage with the facilities that existed. "When prospective student-athletes come to visit Florida State now, they see nice facilities where they will play and practice. That appeals to them and it helps bring in better athletes," said Ingram.

As overseer of the athletic department operating budget, Ingram took a budget that had been steadily rising and made cuts necessary to keep it in check. But he is quick to share the credit. "To make the cuts we did without losing any sports is a credit to our coaches," he said.

Ingram also said that the success of the football team (four consecutive bowl games) and its many recent television appearances has played a big part in the balancing of the operating budget.

The importance of having reserves to fall back on is another area Ingram has stressed. "We are approaching a sound financial operation, but we need another year like last year and we must continue to monitor all phases of our program," he said. His philosophy recently paid off as FSU finished with a surplus in the athletic fund for last year.

Aside from his accomplishments at Florida State, Ingram also serves the University on a national level as a

representative on the College Football Association Television Committee and as a representative on the NCAA Council. "It's a great experience and hard work, but I'm pleased that our University can contribute answers to national problems," he said.

Ingram's duties on the CFA television committee, where he represents southern independent schools, center around negotiating television contracts with ABC and ESPN.

As a member of the 44-member NCAA Council, Ingram is the chairman of the nominating committee which nominates the major officers of the NCAA and makes decisions on new council members when nominated. Being on the Council helps him keep up with rules and regulations that need to be known. "It's like the Supreme Court of the NCAA," he said.

During his college athletic career, which spans a period of 25 years, Ingram has seen how it works from all sides. He played at the University of Alabama from 1951 to 1954 and was named all-SEC as a sophomore when he led the nation in pass interceptions. He has coached on the high school level as an assistant at Bradenton (FL) Manatee High School and served as head coach at Tuscaloosa (AL) Brookwood High School. He then moved into the college coaching arena as an assistant at Wake Forest and later worked at Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas before accepting the head coach job at Clemson in 1970, where he served for three years.

Ingram then moved into administration, accepting a job with the Southeastern Conference as Assistant Commissioner in 1973. His duties included supervision of football and basketball officials, rules interpretation and eligibility. After five years as assistant commissioner, he was named associate commissioner in 1978 until 1981 when FSU called upon him to lead its department.

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Head Coach Bobby Bowden

Underneath it all, there can be no question that Bowden is a great football coach. In a day and time when success is measured by wins and losses, just take a look at his yardstick. Only five of America's division I head coaches have won more football games. Only nine division I coaches have a better winning percentage.

Since he set foot in Seminole territory in 1976, Bowden's Florida State teams have played 117 games. He has won 83 of those. And nobody, but nobody, has played a consistently tougher schedule. But this isn't a story of wins and losses. Those figures are well-documented. This is the story of Bobby Bowden the man.

What Bobby Bowden gives Florida

State goes much deeper than just a football coach. Encompassed in this 56-year-old fireball is the very essence of Florida State football. He is the spokesman, the personality, the heart and soul of the program he has built into a national power. Never assuming that he is bigger than the program itself, Bowden has been able to mold it into a family that reflects his philosophy.

Quite simply, what he does on the football field is only a small portion of what makes this man tick. With a never-ending supply of energy, Bowden, it seems, has never slowed down since the family doctor whacked him on the fanny on Nov. 8, 1929 in Birmingham, Ala.

As good as Bowden has become at winning football games, he just may have missed his true calling in life. He would be an absolute gem as a (1) public relations man; (2) salesman; (3) motivational speaker; (4) golf pro; (5) politician; (6) teacher; (7) minister; or (8) comedian. It just might be that the right combination of all of those Bowden traits is what makes great football coaches.

Bobby Bowden loves people. He thrives on public contact. He loves to talk and he's darn good at it. Most of all, he loves to talk with whomever will listen. There are no status lines with this man. President Reagan may very well have a 15-minute wait outside the coach's office while he finishes his interview with the *Gadsden County Times*. But even Ronnie would find it worth the wait. From the moment Bobby stands up from his chair with the familiar "Hey, buddy," you feel like you're the first human he's seen in weeks. It's a rare man indeed who can make everyone seem just a little bit special.

How about this revelation: Bobby Bowden gets along fantastically with the media. Let's take it a step further. Bobby Bowden likes the media. He studies and understands the media and its function. He is, very possibly, as comfortable in a room full of sportswriters as in a coaches' meeting. In some ways, talking to the press has become therapy for him—a way to unwind after a big game or relax before one.

His magic has touched the press. He is painfully sincere with them. He goes out of his way to accommodate them. And he does it in a way that is not phony. You can't fool these people over a long haul. Journalists are perhaps the most skeptical of all breeds and yet those who have dealt with Bowden not only respect him,



but many times marvel at his openness and honesty. A vast majority even count him as a friend.

It would be hard to imagine any other coach as aware of the media and in tune with its business. He reads newspaper clips from throughout the South on a daily basis. One day without clips puts him on edge. He studies the writers, knows their styles and remembers what they write and when. Invariably he will make a written or verbal comment about a story that was particularly well done. Writers are continually amazed by his attentiveness and retention of their respective work.

And he shows no favoritism to the "print" side either. Once he came out of the locker room 30 minutes before kickoff in Lincoln, Nebraska, to do a live sideline interview with an Omaha TV station. Most coaches would be tough to corral anytime inside 24 hours before kickoff, much less 30 minutes.

Yes sir, Florida State is a favorite stop for those folks. It's a dream "beat" thanks to Bobby.

Bowden has another ingredient that projects a positive image for Florida State. He is a truly great speaker. He is an absolute smash on the banquet circuit. His talks are informative, inspirational, entertaining and funny. Through the years Bowden has become increasingly quick-witted. His off-the-cuff remarks have become legendary—many of them printed in various publications. He is an outstanding joke-teller, as well, and has the art that keeps his audiences rolling in the aisles.

Most importantly, he has not lost the ability to laugh at himself. This man who many place on a pedestal is only human and he goes out of his way to admit it. Many of his funniest stories come from true every-day-life human situations. Bobby's wife, Ann, many times takes some ribbing. A

polished speaker herself, she never hesitates to give it back to the coach. Never were two people so perfectly matched.



The Bowdens are extremely family conscious. Parents of six children and an ever-increasing number of grandchildren, they can't seem to find enough time to get together. At least once a year they try to rally the clan and that is a very special time.

With three sons and a son-in-law in the coaching profession Bowden tells of how Ann now lives and dies by the scores of all her son's teams. Saturday night phone calls of each of them signals a happy weekend or a sad one around the Bowden household. Tommy Bowden is the offensive coordinator at Duke and Terry is an assistant coach at Akron. Son-in-law Jack Hines—married to daughter Robin—is on Bowden's staff at FSU, as is Bowden's youngest, Jeff. All four played college football under Bobby.

A fourth Bowden son, Steve, is a Baptist minister in Alabama, and Ginger, the youngest daughter, lives in Ft. Walton Beach, Fla., with her husband, former FSU player John Madden. Football is in the blood of this family!

There is one thing that sits atop of this with The Coach. God. Bobby Bowden is a very religious man. He

does not curse, does not smoke or drink. He is around those who do much of the time. But he is the kind who teaches by quiet example, not loud talk. Bobby saves his preaching for the pulpit.

He is called on to preach to congregations throughout the area. He does so as often as he can, many times sacrificing precious free time he could spend at home.

Through all of the demands on his time, Bobby Bowden, maintains a strong control over his football team. He does not sidestep the problems that arise when 100 young men are involved. He has his set rules and they are adhered to completely. Players who don't follow the rules are dealt with by the Coach himself. All players are treated alike in his area. Bowden has suspended or dismissed players with great athletic ability as well as those without.

He is a man who is too good to be true. Solid citizen, family man, optimistic, enthusiastic, energetic, God-fearing Bobby Bowden. There is just one other thing. Bobby Bowden hates to lose. He is a fierce competitor whose drive to succeed has led him to where he is today. If his football record isn't a case in point, try him on the golf course.

"I'd play 36 holes a day if I had the time," he says. "I really would. It gives me a chance to compete—and I love to compete. I don't even have to have an opponent. I can compete by myself—for low score—and have a great time."

Bowden claims golf is a way to let off steam—his one recreational outlet. "When I go after something, I go after it hard," he says. "It has always been that way. I don't know—it's in my blood."

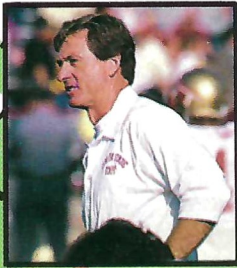

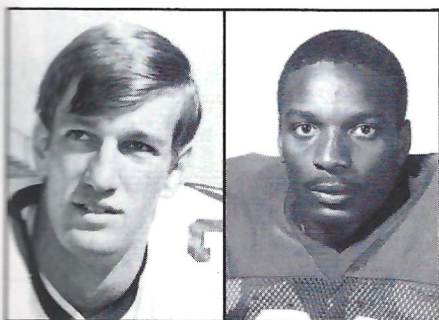
Playing the Numbers Game

From row 60 of Doak Campbell Stadium, a young Seminole fan peers through his binoculars to notice a familiar sight trot onto the field. He turns to his father seated next to him and says enthusiastically, "it's number 33, that's Sammie Smith." Dad nods and turns to watch Smith run for a Seminole first down.

While the young fan immediately knows Smith by the large 33 adorning his garnet jersey, what he doesn't know is the story behind the number as well as other numbers worn by his favorite Seminoles.

Out of Apopka, Florida, Smith came to FSU as the most heralded running back in the state as well as all of the United States. In Florida State's recruitment of him, Coach Jim Gladden promised that Smith would wear his high school number of 34 for the Seminoles since no one was wearing it at the time. But Gladden didn't realize that 34 was the retired number of former Seminole All-American Ron Sellers.



Sellers' (left) #34 was retired, so Smith (right) settled for #33.

"Back then we did not have the beautiful display case of retired numbers in the Athletic Center lobby," said Gladden. "I had forgotten that 34 was a retired number at FSU." The Florida State football team presently has only two numbers in retirement. Sellers' number 34 was retired at the end of his senior season, 1968, and Fred Biletnikoff's 25 was retired in 1965.

When Sellers learned of the possible dispute concerning his number, he called Florida State and offered to bring it out of retirement. "I called Coach Bowden and gave him the option of bringing 34 out of retirement since I knew what a talented athlete Sammie Smith was," Sellers said. "I know that Coach Bowden is a man of his word and if my old number was promised to Smith, I wanted him to be able to keep his word."

But Sellers' number 34 stayed retired

and Smith agreed with that decision, choosing number 33 instead. He said that after wearing number 34 for four years of high school football it seemed like it was something that was supposed to be. Smith showed confidence in his new number at FSU when he said, "numbers don't make players; players make the numbers."

Some players on the field don't have much to choose from when selecting their numbers. According to the NCAA Football Rules and Interpretations guide, there are "mandatory and recommended" numbers. On the offensive line, the five linemen from tackle to tackle must wear numbers between 50 and 79. This is to distinguish linemen from receivers. An exception to this rule is on punts and kickoffs since specialty teams are usually brought in with players who have an assortment of numbers. The NCAA also "recommends" that centers wear numbers between 50 and 59, guards between 60 and 69, tackles between 70 and 79 and ends between 80 and 99.

The NCAA does not place the same restrictions on the defensive line because in some defensive strategies there could be as many as all 11 players on the line.

Freshman offensive guard Joe Jordan found himself in the NCAA restrictive squeeze earlier this season. He had been assigned 96 upon arrival at FSU, since graduated tight end Pete Panton had vacated the number. But once coaches switched him to the offensive line, his number also had to switch. He now wears 67. However, all of Jordan's pre-season pictures that will be sent to hang on the wall at his alma mater, River-view High School in Sarasota, will bear number 96.

At FSU, the process of issuing numbers to incoming freshmen is not taken lightly. If a player specifically requests a certain number, every effort is made in securing that number for the player. "It is not a hap-hazard process," said Gladden. "The recruiting coordinator sits down with the equipment manager to place the numbers and try to make everyone happy." But in many cases, freshmen are issued numbers made available by graduated or non-returning players.

Some players have been known to change their number after a year. Shelton Thompson, a redshirt freshman linebacker, went from 89 in 1985 to his present number of 93. "I didn't really have a reason for wearing number 89,"

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Making the Program Work

On a typical Saturday in any stadium in the country, you can find them if you look hard at the team bench area. They will either be wearing head sets, signaling players in or will have a group of players on the bench instructing them on the recently completed series of downs.

They are specialists—each with a specific area of responsibility. Although anonymous for most part, there's not a program in the country that can win without a good group of them. They are the assistant coaches.

Bobby Bowden believes he has one of the best group of assistants in the country. In this two-part article, *Tribe Magazine* takes an in-depth look at Florida State's assistant coaches — how they got started, the ups and downs of coaching, the rewards and their personal aspirations for the future.

Chuck Amato

As a player at North Carolina State, Chuck Amato decided that coaching would be his life's profession. His break into the business came shortly after he used his eligibility. "I had to return for a fifth year like most players to get my degree," Amato says. "Since I used up my four years, I was asked to help coach the inside linebackers. I figured at first that if I couldn't play I might as well coach. It was during that fifth year that I really got interested in it."

After spending one season at that level, Amato was promoted to full-time status in 1971 and stayed at his alma mater through 1980. During that time he worked under some excellent football coaches in Al Michaels, Lou Holtz and Bo Rein.

Amato became defensive coordinator at Arizona for three years, before accepting a similar position with Florida State in 1982. He was elevated to assistant head coach in 1985.

As with many assistant coaches, Amato would like eventually to become a head coach someday. "I think most younger coaches want to become head coaches," Amato says. "From that standpoint, I'm no different. However, as you get older you realize that on every major college staff you're going to have 10 assistants and just one head coach. That means that for every 10 guys who want a head job, chances are only one or two will ever get one. It would have to be the right situation."

If the right situation in college football doesn't come along, Amato has some interest in eventually getting into the pro game. "There are plus and minus points to both, but the pro game is interesting. From an assistant's stand



point, the money is better in the pros. With no recruiting, you become just that—a coach."

Amato did have an opportunity to join the professional ranks back when former boss Lou Holtz took the head job with the New York Jets.

"I was 27 at the time and Lou asked me to go with him," Amato says. "I turned down the offer for the simple reason that I didn't feel like I was ready. I thought it would be hard to coach a guy who might be five or six years older than I was. I think I made the right decision."

As for the positives and negatives of coaching college football, Amato says that the amount of time away from his family is the biggest drawback. "It's the biggest problem of being a coach. Because of recruiting and in-season work, you're going to spend a lot of time away from your family. Unfortunately, there's no answer to that. I know of no other way. I love to recruit, but after a couple of months it gets to be a drain on you. It becomes tougher as you grow older."

Despite that, Amato says that the positives far outweigh the negatives. "We're teachers, just like any other member of the faculty. The main difference is that we get judged on our performance every Saturday in front of 50,000 fans. I like that. There is no greater satisfaction in the world than taking a raw talent, and then watching him improve. Along the way, you like to think you've had something to do with helping that young person develop values that will make him a good person, as well as a good football player."

Amato adds that Florida State is one of the best coaching opportunities available anywhere. "You see Coach Bowden retain his assistants longer than most programs because he's a super guy to work for. He lets his assistants actually coach. He gives you the responsibilities and expects them to be carried out."

Support from his family is the key ingredient needed for an assistant coach to be successful. "Although I'm sure Peggy and my daughters wish I could be home more, I think they understand why I'm not," says Amato. "I really don't think I could be doing what I'm doing without their love and support. It's during the summer when you have a little time off that you realize how much you miss being around your family. My idea of the perfect vacation is to get everybody together and visit my family and my wife's family, before taking off for a week at the beach."



Mickey Andrews

Defensive coordinator Mickey Andrews has also coached at the high school, college and professional ranks. He's been both an assistant and head coach on the college level.

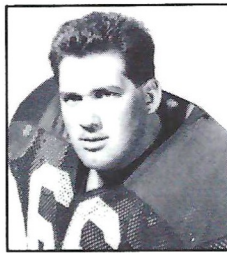
An athletic-minded person who loves a challenge, Andrews knew at an early age that coaching would be his career. Out of high school, he enrolled at the University of Alabama where he played on two national championship teams.

After graduation, he coached one year of high school before joining Roy Kidd's staff at Eastern Kentucky. Andrews then was head coach at North Alabama from 1972-76. Other coaching stops including the Clemson Tigers, Florida Gators and the Arizona Wranglers of the USFL.

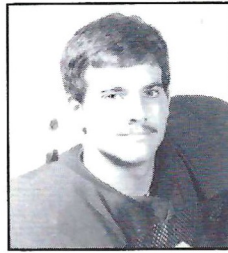
For Andrews, the competition between two teams is what excites him about coaching. "When I was at Alabama, I was fortunate enough to play on two national championship teams. Nothing can beat that excitement and that's what I like about coaching. It's the challenge of trying to mold a bunch of youngsters into a team and competing against the best in the nation that makes coaching worthwhile."

Garnet and Gold balloons fill the stands at Doak Campbell Stadium as 60,000 fans await another action-packed Saturday night of Seminole Football.

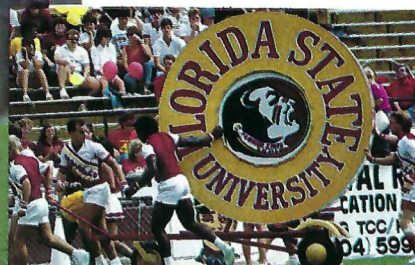

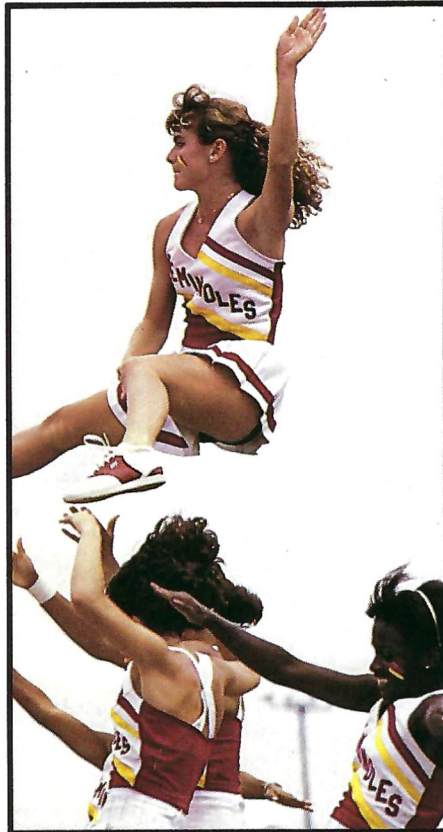
The game captains and referees leave midfield. The excitement of the crowd is

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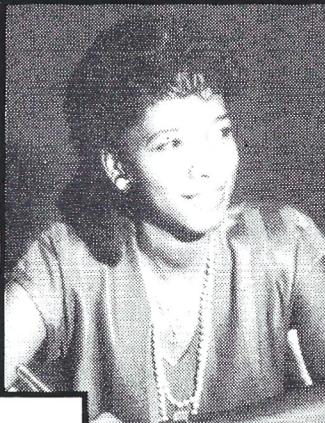
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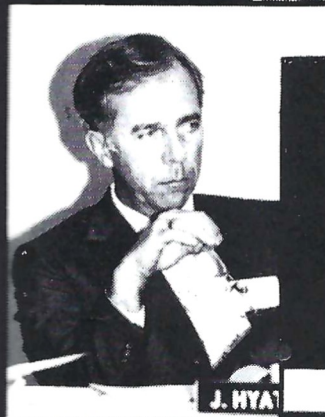
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Henke Shoots for Top of Collegiate Golf

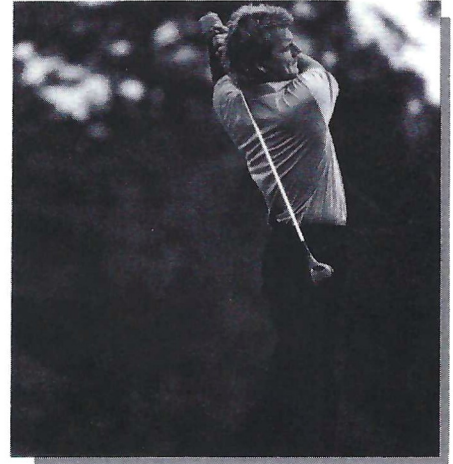
Excuse Nolan Henke, Florida State's two-time All-American golfer, if he's a little tired, but it's been a long summer for the Ft. Myers senior. While most FSU students spent the summer working part-time or heading for the beaches, Henke hit the amateur tournament circuit in hopes of improving his game prior to his final campaign as a Seminole.

His first stop at the prestigious Porter Cup in mid-July proved to be a major breakthrough in his game—other players such as Bob Tway and Scott Verplank had used this tournament as a springboard to their current successes on the P.G.A. Tour. After firing blistering rounds of 66-73-66 at the Niagara Falls Country Club, Henke found himself tied with Oklahoma State's Scott Bradley atop the leaderboard going into Saturday's final round. Henke was hot while opening up a four stroke lead on the front nine, only to have Bradley cut the lead to one stroke after he birdied holes 10-14. Henke, however, held on to shoot a 68 while gaining a one-shot victory with a seven-under-par 273.

"I had no idea that I could win the tournament," Henke says. "The win at the Porter Cup has given my game much more confidence and has gotten me invitations to participate in many amateur tournaments all over the country."

One invitation that Henke had always hoped for and received following the Porter Cup victory was the United States Amateur, the grand daddy of amateur golf.

"I played as well as I could at the U.S. Amateur to see how far I could advance," he says. Henke played well enough during the first two days at the Shoal Creek Country Club course and he qualified for match play. He went on to fall one victory short of advancing to the semi-final round which was beamed nationally by ABC television. Advancing to the semi-final would have guaranteed him a place on the Walker Cup team which each year matches the top eight from the United States against the top eight players from Great Britain. But FSU's 21-year-old's showing should be lauded considering the winner of the tournament was LSU coach Buddy Alexander. Henke will have a chance to avenge his finish when FSU battles it out with LSU for top team honors in the South this season.



Henke culminated his busy summer by easily winning an Amateur Tournament Players Series event which earned him an automatic berth in the A.T.P.S. Tournament of Champions on October 25 in Jupiter Hills, FL.

The economics major hopes that the tournament experience gained this summer will improve his game at the collegiate level.

"I'd like to win some tournaments and at least make the second team All-American team," Henke says.

FSU's Sports Information department is touting Henke for first team All-American honors which would be quite an accomplishment since several successful PGA Tour players like Kenny Knox, Hubert Green, Paul Azinger and Jeff Sluman all played for the Seminoles and never made that prestigious team.

Golf analysts like *Golfweek Magazine*, are beginning to take notice of Henke's abilities. That publication recently selected him as one of 12 first-team preseason All-Americans.

"I look at other schools and I don't know of any other players who could knock him out of the number one spot in the nation," FSU head coach Verlyn Giles says. "We're talking about a first team All-America."

Henke will enter this season trying to improve on a year with many highlights. He added six top 10 finishes to the nine he had during his first two years. In one of his top performances last season, Henke shot rounds of 70-72-72 to finish seventh at the Sun Bowl Invitational in El Paso, Texas which featured only the top golfers in collegiate golf. The three-time All-Metro selection also placed third at the Conference Championships and helped

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Special Players on the Special Teams

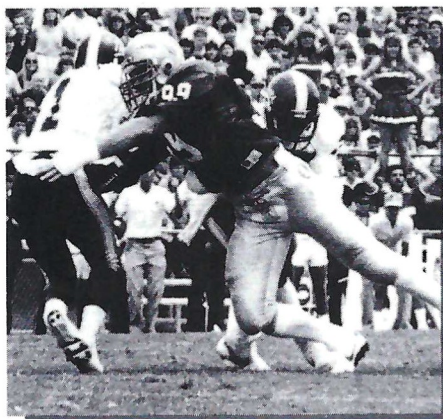
The specialty teams player. He's taken for granted by the fans and media. But to the Florida State coaching staff, he's among the most valuable of performers on the team.

There are especially two specialty teams players on the FSU sidelines who have been patrolling the field for FSU in punt, field goal and kick-off situations for the last three years. They haven't seen much playing time at their outside linebacking positions, but senior Bruce Heggie and junior Eric Stiehl are indeed special performers.

Heggie came out of high school in St. Louis, Mo. as a first team all-state player in 1983. Knowing that FSU had already recruited several All-Americans and all-state players at his position, he still chose Seminole Country as his home for the next four years. At first, Heggie had some difficult times adjusting from a high school standout to a special performer. "It took me a long time to cope with that, but then I noticed that I wasn't the only guy in that situation," he says.

Adds position coach Jim Gladden, "Bruce got caught up in the in-between situation. He's not quite fluid enough for the outside linebacking position, and he's not big enough to play as a down lineman."

Although the 6-5, 243 lb. senior adapted quickly to his new role, his philosophy of the game has not changed. "As a special team player I try to capture my goals, just like back in high school," he says. "I try each and every game to get at least three solo tackles on the kickoffs. I guess when I give it my best, I feel like I really have contributed to our team."

Many people think a guy is just on the special teams and not really contributing, but that's not the kind of attitude I have. I think games can be won or lost on the special teams. It's just a matter of taking pride in everything you do."

That kind of frame of mind is probably why Heggie scored a touchdown two years ago as a sophomore. The score came at the best possible time in his college football career—when his parents were in the stands. Because Heggie hails from St. Louis, his parents were able to be at the Kansas game that year. "It just so happened that was one of the few games that they were able to see me play," he says. The play occurred when perhaps the most heralded specialty team player in FSU history—Joe Wessel—blocked the punt and Heggie, being at the right place at the right time, picked up the loose ball and ran it in for a 7-yard score. Says Heggie, "now I know what Sammie Smith and Victor Floyd feel like when they score."

Even in 1986 Heggie still gets questions on the matter of a starting position on defense. "Sometimes I start getting that sick feeling, and then I say 'gee have I done enough?' At times it can be difficult, but as long as I'm happy with myself, everything is fine. For one, I'm getting an education and for two, I'm playing Division I football. I realize that God gives everyone limitations and it just happens so that I have been able to accept mine," he explains.

Heggie, tall and handsome, is a young man who is known for his honesty and integrity. He's outgoing and has a friendly temperament. Gladden even goes as far to say, "I'd like for a son of mine to be like a Bruce Heggie."

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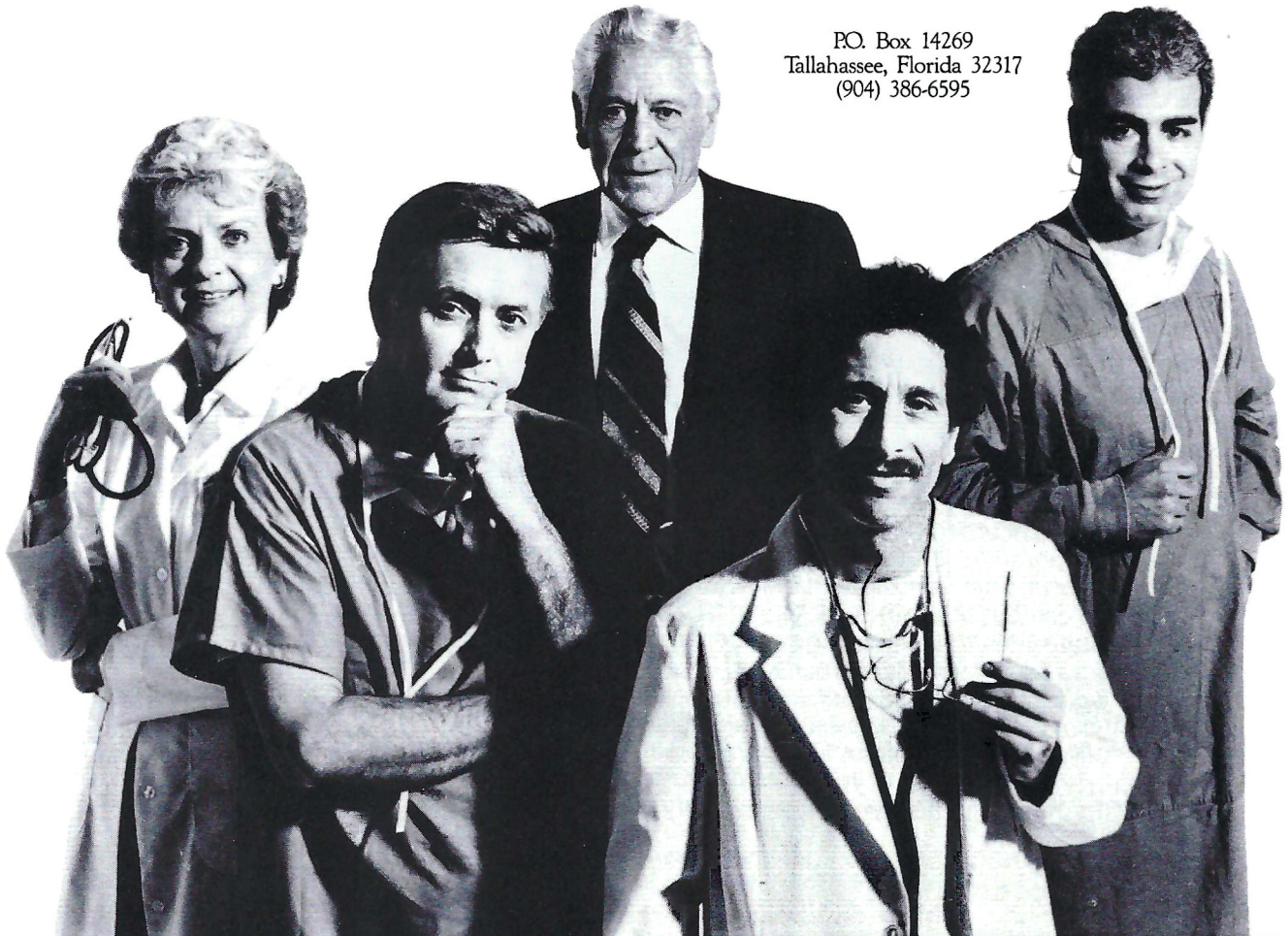
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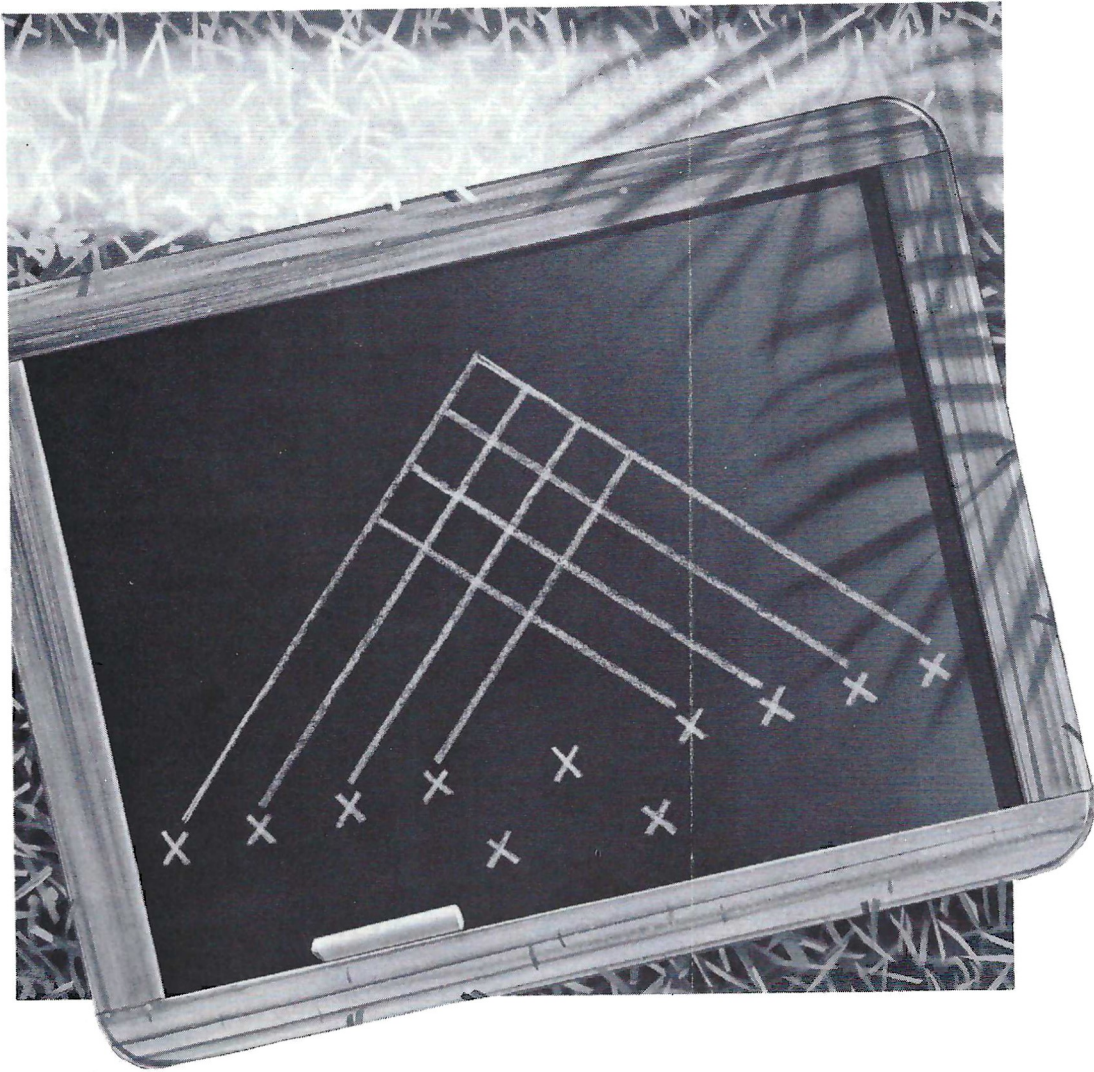


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But more than winning championships, Andrews enjoys watching players develop. "Personally the biggest thrill in coaching is watching a young man become a successful student-athlete. I'm not talking about the guy with the most ability either. I'm talking about the player who over achieves. The one who tries to reach up to or past the level that anyone expects him to reach."

With experience in both college and professional ball, Andrews likes both, but for different reasons, "Pro football is nothing more or nothing less than a business. Players and coaches treat it as such and I think that takes some of the fun out of the game. College is a bit different, as far as the coaches and players are concerned. In college, we're dealing with students who also are football players. As teachers, we need to recognize that and deal with it accordingly."

Although tiring, recruiting to Andrews is one of the fun parts of college football. "It goes back to my competitive nature," he says. "It's part of the battle. You're selling your University to a young man, knowing full well that your competition is trying to do the same thing. I personally enjoy those battles."

In the future, Andrews would love a shot at a major college head job. "The situation would have to be right," Andrews said. "I've been a head coach at a small college and would never want to be in that situation again. I've fought all the financial battles I want to fight — it would have to be a job where I would worry about coaching. If that opportunity doesn't come, I wouldn't mind getting a shot at the NFL. The possibilities of a professional coaching job in that league intrigues me."

As to the negative side of coaching, Andrews, like his colleagues, points to time away from his family. "It's not just a sacrifice I have to make, but it's one my wife and family has to make," Andrews says. "I'm not sure this is the toughest job in terms of amount of time, but it has to be one of the toughest. A big responsibility falls on a coach's wife—she has to be both mother and father when he's away. The Lord has blessed me tremendously with my wife Diane, because in a lot of ways she's stronger than I am."

A chance to be with his family in the summer is a favorite time for Andrews "When I was younger, I used to take my free time to hunt, fish and play golf with my buddies—I wasn't smart enough in those early years to realize that I was missing something special. It didn't take long to realize that the best time was family time. I look forward to

the summers now. We usually go to the mountains or beach. I still like to play golf, but I like to play it with my son."

Wally Burnham

Inside linebacker coach Wally Burnham has coached at all levels of football—high school, college and professional. He credits his high school coach with getting him interested in the profession. From 10th grade on, he knew he would be a football coach.

"I remember my high school coach calling me into his office when I was 15," Burnham says. "He asked me if I wanted to go to college, because he said I might have enough talent to play. I told him I did and he asked if there was anything I might be interested in career-wise. I thought for a second and told him I wanted to be a football coach just like him."

After playing at Alabama and Samford, Burnham coached several seasons of high school ball before moving into the collegiate ranks. Coaching stops at North Alabama, East Tennessee State, Richmond, Memphis State and Lamar were followed by a two-year stop with the Arizona Wranglers of the USFL. He accepted a job on Coach Bowden's staff in 1985.

He sees the basic difference between the college and pro game on the mental level. "In college, you're a teacher," he



says. "Out of high school, most players have to be taught proper technique because the offensive and defensive schemes are so much more complex than high school. Once you get to the pros, it's different. The veterans basically know what they are supposed to do in a given situation—you are more or less guiding them through. It's mostly mental preparation in the pros; we didn't spend a lot of time with the fundamentals in practices."

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Tulane Scouting Report

The stats over the years are overwhelming. The team that scores first and leads at halftime wins in football a very high percentage of the time.

Well, throw that statistic out the window for the early part of Tulane's 1986 season.

The Green Wave has scored first and led at the intermission in each of its first four games this year. But its record is only 1-3.

The latest of those losses came last Saturday in the Superdome when Wichita State rallied from 10-0 halftime and 20-14 fourth quarter deficits to defeat the Wave 21-20.

Previously, Ole Miss came from 10 points down to defeat the Wave 35-10 in a game Tulane led 10-7 at the half, and TCU used a one-man show named Tony Jeffery to rally from down 17-10 at the break to win 48-13.

The 'trend' has not held true once, however, as the Wave extended a 14-10 halftime lead on its first possession of the third quarter and went on to a 35-17 road victory over Vanderbilt as Tulane coach Mack Brown defeated brother Watson, who was on the other sideline as head coach of the Commodores.

Brown is a 1974 graduate of Florida State.

"I'll always have a warm spot for Florida State," Brown said before his first return visit to Tallahassee as a head coach. "I have good friends and good memories from there but this is a business trip.

"I've been doing this (coaching) for 15 years and the emotional part of the game is we need a win. We need to keep improving and play better."

Brown brings to town an explosive offense and a defense which plays under the "bend-but-not-break" philosophy.

The Green Wave has been able to build up those first-half leads with an offense which was ranked No. 1 in the nation just two weeks ago. But that ranking has dipped to 16th as the per-game average has fallen from over 525 yards to 422.8.

The conductor of Tulane's offense is sophomore quarterback Terrence Jones, who led the nation individually in total offense earlier in the year. Jones has completed 55.5 percent of his passes for 852 yards and three touchdowns, and is the Wave's second-leading rusher with 212 yards and three more scores.

It all adds up to 1,064 yards of total offense, or 266 per game, which ranks eighth nationally.

Jones' favorite target is junior split end and All-America candidate Marc Zeno, who has picked up where he left off last year when he led the nation in receiving yards. Zeno easily leads the Wave with 23 receptions for 370 yards and a touchdown.

Jones has three talented running backs to work with in the Wave's option-oriented attack. Sophomore fullback Rodney Hunter leads the way with 395 yards on 55 carries and three touchdowns.

Hunter, who started his first college game last year against Florida State at tailback, already has two 100-yard games this season, the first time since 1981 a Tulane back has had more than one game over the century mark in the same year.

The other starting back is junior college transfer Marvin Allen, who has rushed for 161 yards and one score on only 25 carries. Allen is also a threat to catch the ball out of the backfield. He is the team's second leading receiver with

13 receptions for 149 yards.

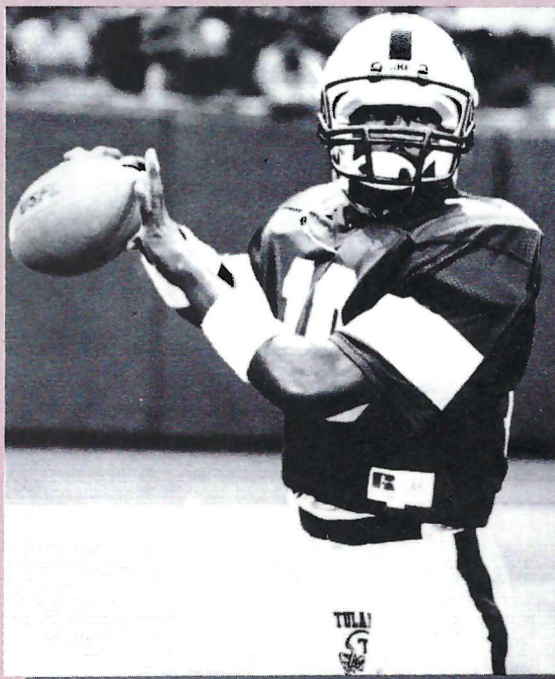
Sophomore Melvin Adams, who has 107 yards on 29 carries and a touchdown will also see time at fullback.

Jones probably won't go the whole way at quarterback, either. Redshirt freshman Jerome McIntosh of Niceville, Fla., has played in each of the first four games, and has usually come in on either the third or fourth series.

On defense, Tulane has relied mostly on making the big play, and not allowing the opposition to make the big play. The Wave is seventh nationally in turnover margin, with 16 takeaways against nine turnovers.

Twelve of those 16 takeaways have been interceptions, three more than the team had all last season. Leading the pickoff parade are linebackers Richard Harvey and Tookie Spann and free safety Thurston Harrison, each with three.

Harvey and Harrison are also Tulane's top tacklers with 39 and 33 total stops, respectively.

***Tulane's victory over Vanderbilt earlier this season gave Green Wave coach Mack Brown a head-to-head win over his brother. Watson Brown is the head coach at Vandy. Also, Mack Brown attended Vanderbilt for a brief time before transferring to Florida State in 1971.

***Again this year junior linebacker Paul McGowan's statistics are phenomenal. He's been in on 59 tackles in four games—an average of 14.75 hits per outing. He's caused two fumbles, recovered one and had five tackles for loss.

***Tulane's roster shows 14 players from the state of Florida. Florida State has no players from Louisiana. Green Wave tight end Don McCully, of St. Petersburg, has a sister, Meg, who is a former member of the FSU women's swim team.

***This will actually be Mack Brown's fourth shot at his alma mater. He faced the Seminoles twice as an assistant coach, losing 30-27 as the receiver coach at Southern Mississippi in 1977 and winning 55-21 as the offensive coordinator at LSU in 1982. Last year's 38-12 loss was his first chance at the Seminoles since he became the head man at Tulane.

***Florida State came into the 1986 season as a team that had averaged 34 points and 450 yards per game during the '80's. This year has been a stark contrast as the Seminoles have managed just 17.3 points and 315 yards through it first four contests.

***On the other hand, the FSU defense has done its own switch. Opponent points allowed (16.0) and yards allowed (294) are the lowest totals since the 1980 season.

***Florida State's junior kicker Derek Schmidt was 1-for-2 in field goals vs. Michigan after missing all three attempts against North Carolina. He is off to a 3-for-8 start and is just 1-of-5 outside of 40 yards. In his career though, he is an excellent 38-or-57, including 20-of-34 from 40-plus. Schmidt's string of consecutive extra points now stands at 92. He's never missed a PAT.

***Danny McManus, starting at quarterback for FSU this week, ironically got his first collegiate start against this Tulane team in 1985. McManus hasn't started a game since October 12, 1985 vs. Auburn. Dizzy spells and inner ear problems forced him out of action last year after he was knocked unconscious in games against Nebraska and Memphis State.

***Florida State Coach Bobby Bowden on McManus: "Don't forget last year as a starter he was 4-0 and we were ahead of Auburn when he went out for the last time. That ought to tell you something about him."



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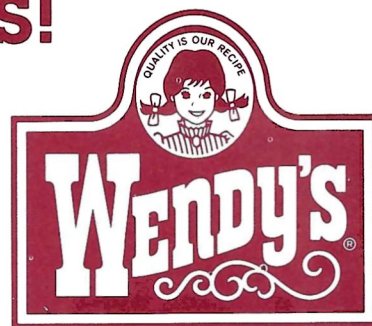
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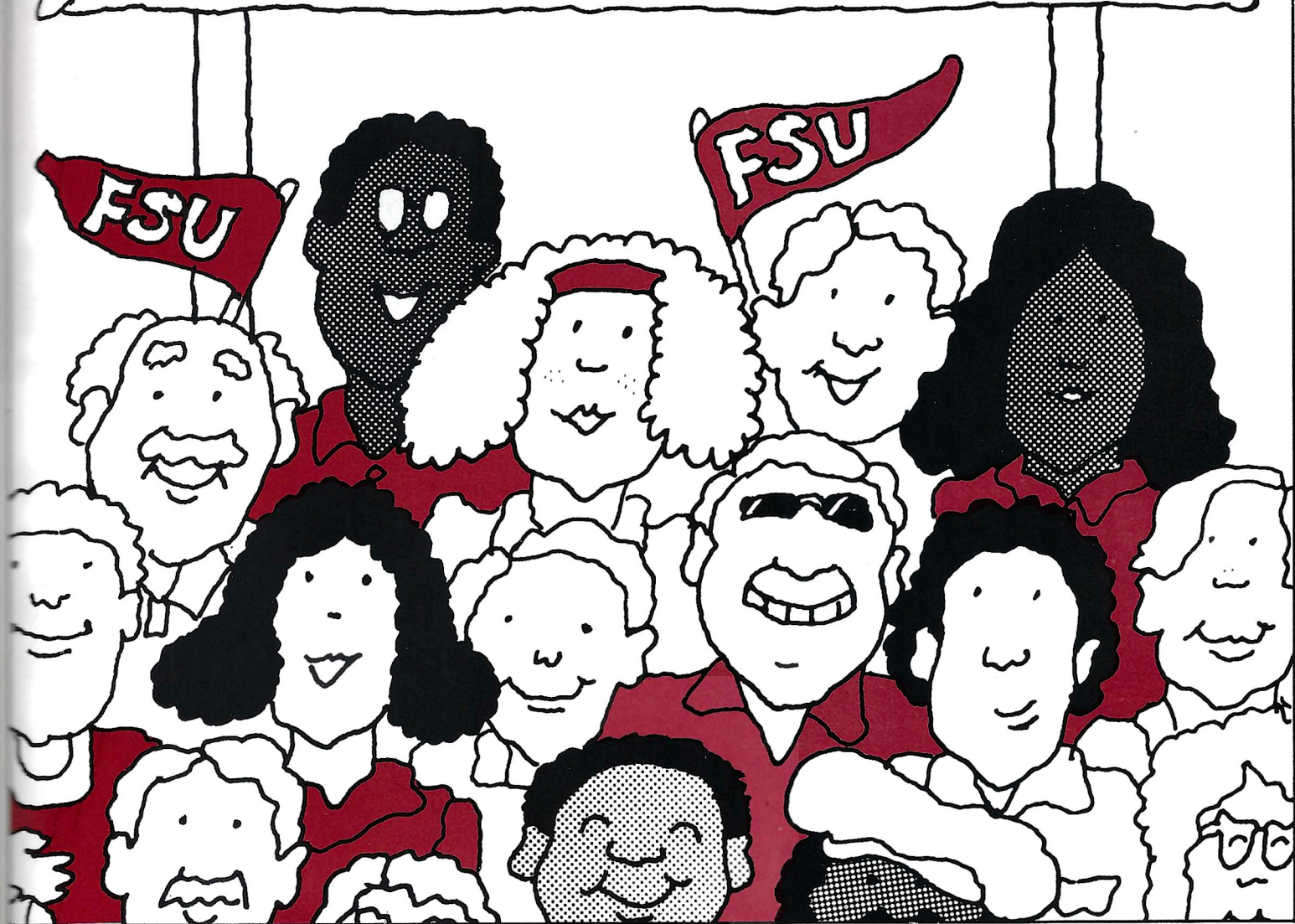

On the college level, he lists recruiting as the toughest job of an assistant. "I like to recruit, it's a challenge and a battle. But it takes so much of your time and keeps you away from you family. That's the toughest part. Fortunately my wife Barbara and my kids are great. They understand my situation and are very supportive. I try to keep them involved in what I do as much as possible and that helps. I take them on recruiting trips whenever possible and the kids will come out to practice when it doesn't interfere with school or other activities. That helps to keep us together."

Watching players progress is what makes it worthwhile, according to Burnham. "As a coach, we influence these young men both on the field and off. Watching a player grow as an athlete and as a person is the most enjoyable thing about college coaching."

As for the future, Burnham would like a shot at a head coaching job or possibly the NFL. "Because I love my job here, I don't think I would leave to become a head coach just to become one. It would have to be right," Burnham says. "Once all of my kids are in college, I would like to find an opportunity in the NFL—there is just something about the professional game that I like."

But for now, Burnham is extremely happy at Florida State. "In a lot of jobs, the head coach worries too much about every phase—he won't let his assistants coach. That's why I like Florida State and Coach Bowden, he's a great man to work for. He gives you a job to do and let's you do it. On top of that, Tallahassee is a great town to live in and raise a family. I can't believe there's too many better places to be an assistant than at Florida State."

When not busy coaching, Burnham lists time with his family as the most important priority with him. We take two weeks vacation, one that Barbara and I decide where to go and one where the kids decide. The rest of the time off I like to play golf with the kids and visit relatives and friends."

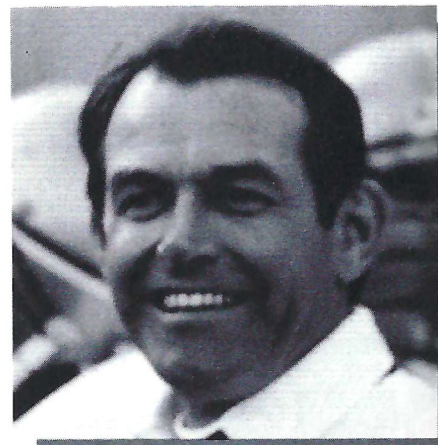
Jim Gladden

Of Bobby Bowden's full-time assistants, Jim Gladden has been with him the longest — joining his staff in Bowden's first year at FSU. The son of a football coach, Gladden grew up around the game and always knew he would be a coach.

After graduating from William Jewell College where he was a defensive end, Gladden spent 12 years in the high school ranks. Former FSU head coach

Darrell Mudra brought him in as a part-time assistant. He coached the junior varsity team to a 3-1 record and because part-timers were allowed at that time to recruit, Gladden had his own territory and signed several outstanding players. When Coach Bowden took over in 1976, he retained Gladden as a full-time assistant.

"I guess I'm a little different than most coaches," Gladden says about the fact that he has been with the FSU program 12 years. "I think most coaches at the college level are always looking for a better job—an opportunity to move up. Someday I would like to be a head coach or defensive coordinator just like they would—but I'm not going to pull up my family's roots and just move from one whistle stop to the next just because it may get me the opportunity sooner."



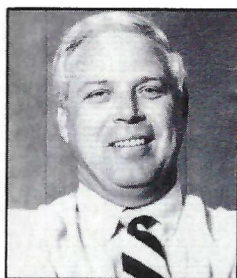
"I wouldn't do that at the expense of my family. One of the things I'm proud of is that my kids are going to be able to grow up in one town. Tallahassee is a great town to raise a family and that stability is one reason why I haven't actively pursued other jobs."

Gladden adds that Bowden's coaching style has played a big influence on his life. "He's a great person to work for in that he let's you coach, but he let's you be a person too," Gladden says. "So many head coaches expect their assistants to make football the Lord of their lives. Bobby's different. He's a family man and wants you to be one too. He wants us to be active in different things."

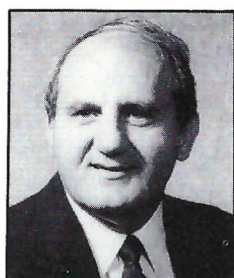
Watching a player reach his potential is one of Gladden's biggest rewards in the game. "The main thing for me is seeing each one of my players both graduate and be the best player he can become. When he does both, it's the

Seminole Boosters, Inc., the University's athletic fundraising arm, is the financial cornerstone of the Tribe's athletic program. Raising over **three and a half million dollars** in 1986, and setting new fundraising records, Seminole Boosters continues to rank among the top six college athletic fundraising organizations in the country.

Bill Parker is 1986 National President of the Boosters. He is President of Crest Products, headquartered in Clearwater, and is the first ever Booster president to come from outside Leon County.

"It is appropriate that in this first year of having an "out-of-town" president, the greatest portion of our contributions—for the first year in our history—has come from outside the Tallahassee area. This is especially exciting because contributions from Tallahassee and Leon County are their highest ever. Our **other** big areas—Jacksonville, Orlando, Palm Beach, Pinellas, Tampa, Pensacola, etc.— are just beginning to show what they can do. **Seminole Boosters is becoming a truly state-wide and nation-wide organization of Seminole supporters.**"

Parker has been particularly impressed with the Seminoles' vast network of volunteer fundraisers and booster club officers who lead the ten-thousand-member organization. "Our volunteers are the most important element of our operation. We employ superior professional fundraisers, and they are able to gather around them and organize the most loyal and enthusiastic alumni who devote generous amounts of their time to the program."

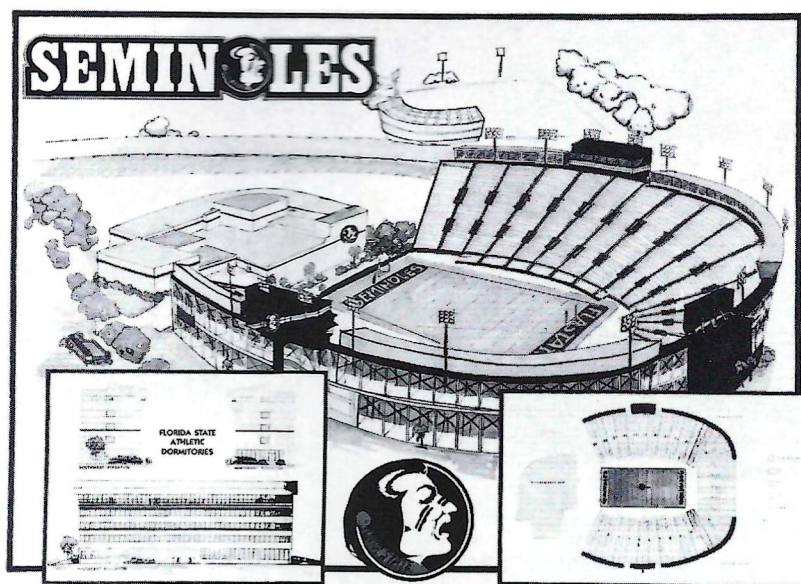
Seminole Booster funds have financed four stadium expansions in the last decade, and the construction of the Seminole Boosters' SKYBOX in 1982 has already generated hundreds of thousands of dollars in support of the athletic program.

A multitude of Seminole Booster Clubs now cover the three state area, and our Jacksonville Seminole Booster Club is the largest such club representing any school in any city in Florida. New Booster Clubs are being chartered in Newport Beach, Virginia; Dallas; Houston; and even in California.

In addition to raising annual cash contributions and maintaining the stadium gift shop and concessions operations, the Boosters are aggressively pursuing three main goals for the foreseeable future: the endowment of all athletic scholarships; the completion of a first class athletic apartments complex; and the eventual bowling-in of Doak Campbell Stadium.

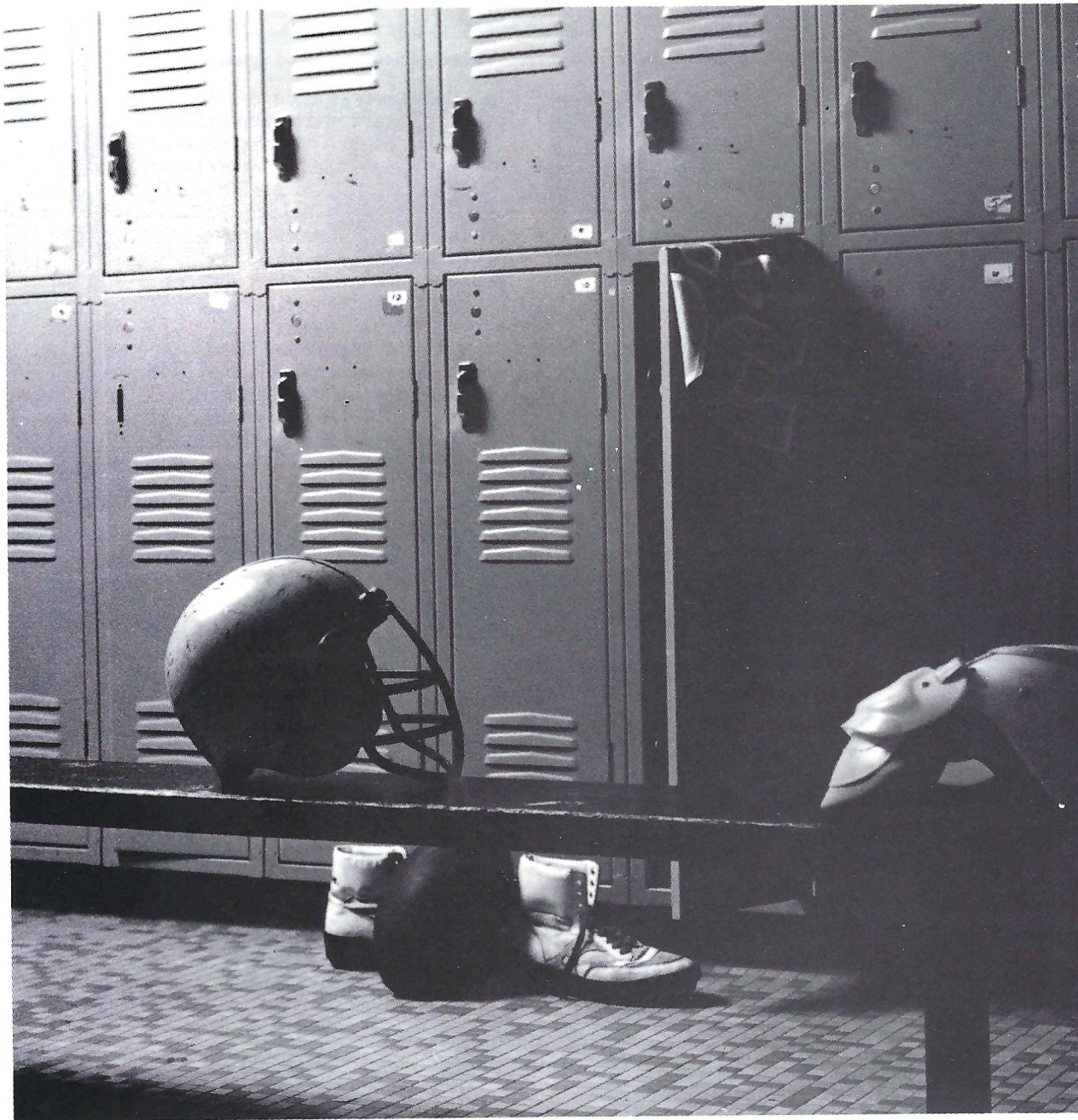

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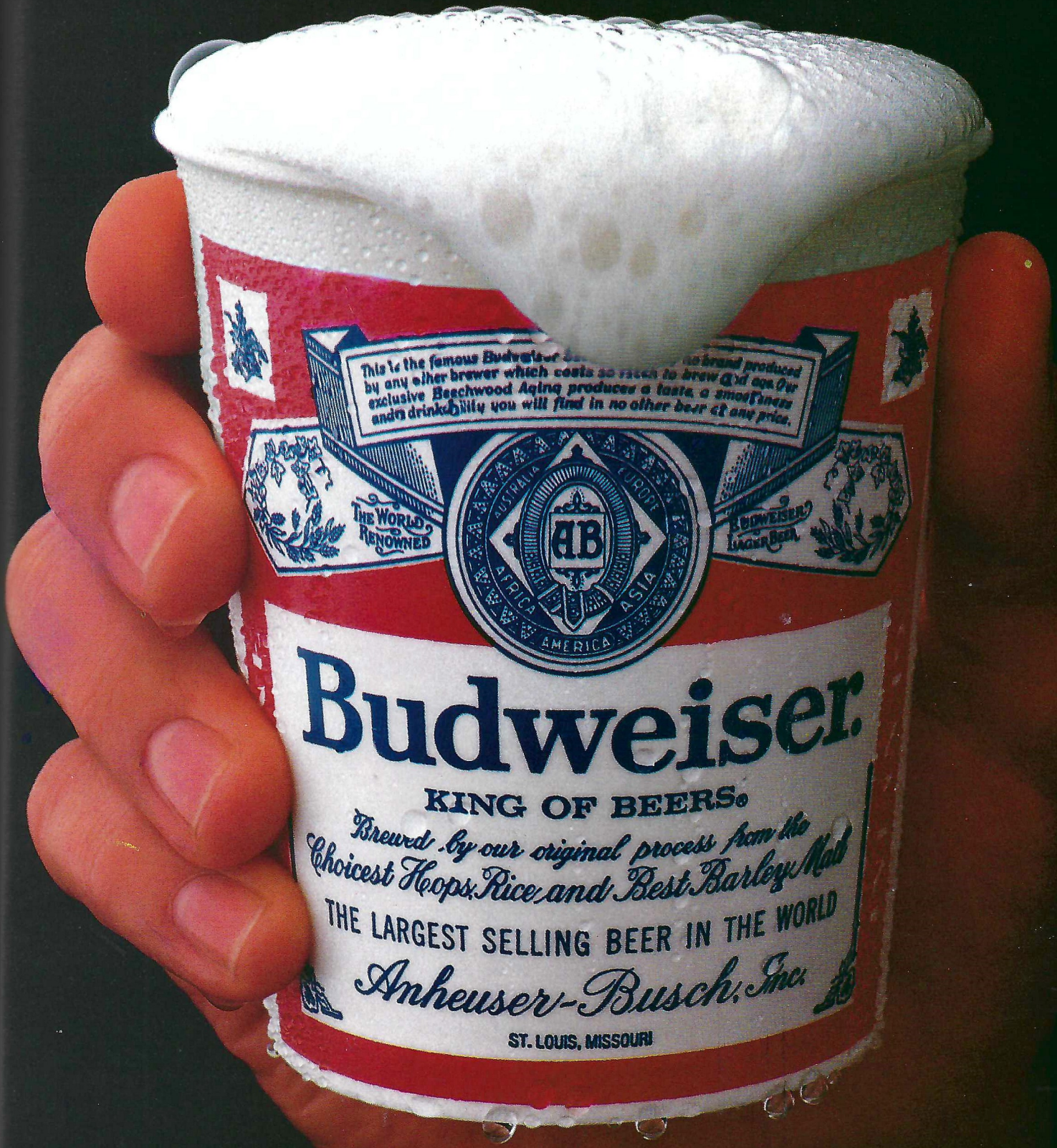
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Florida State University...

Home of the Seminoles

Florida State University, a coeducational institution and a senior member of the nine universities in the state system, is in Tallahassee, Florida, the state's capital.

Located just a few blocks from the Capitol, the Florida State campus is considered to be one of the most beautiful in the Southeast. The 347-acre campus is covered with hardwoods, pines and palms as well as springtime greenery that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods.

The approximately 22,500 students currently enrolled at Florida State learn from a faculty of over 1,500, which includes four members of the National Academy of Sciences.

FSU was established in 1857, when the governor of Florida, James E. Broom, signed a bill establishing the Seminary West of the Suwannee River in Tallahassee. The school consisted of one building located on 10 acres of land.

By 1860, the school, not yet a college, had an enrollment of 250. The president of the seminary organized the school into a four-year liberal arts college in 1887. At its first commencement in June 1891, degrees were conferred on two women and five men. Ten years later, the institution was renamed Florida State College. In 1905, it became Florida Female College, and in 1909 the name was changed to Florida State College for Women.

In 1945, FSCW took on the additional title, Tallahassee Branch of the University of Florida (TBUF), due to the fact that GIs stationed nearby were attending classes at the women's school, but, as men, couldn't legally enroll.

Gov. Millard Caldwell signed a bill in 1947 making both the University of Florida and FSCW coeducational. FSCW became Florida State University.

Florida State now offers students the opportunity to choose from more than 100 career options in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, education, engineering, home economics, law, library and information studies, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts. Honors programs are available for top students.

The University has been recognized by the Board of Regents for its continuing leadership at the graduate levels of education.



Overseas study programs in fields ranging from law to hotel and restaurant administration are offered in Florence, Italy; Oxford and London, England; Switzerland, Yugoslavia, Costa Rica and the Panama Canal Zone.

The University's location in the state capital affords excellent study, research and internship opportunities in the areas of government, social sciences, law and policy sciences.

Florida State is setting the pace as higher education in Florida prepares to enter the 21st century. One of the few institutions of learning in the United States with its own supercomputer, FSU is attracting researchers from around the globe.

The Bay County Commission purchased 21 acres, 16 of which make up Phase I of the new campus. The remaining acreage will be available for expansion into technical degree programs such as engineering and science.

Social life for many students in Tallahassee centers around 24 fraternities and 20 sororities. Wind surfing, swimming and sunning are among the activities to be enjoyed at FSU's lakeside "Reservation" or along the sandy beaches of nearby coasts. In the fall, the campus goes wild for football, supporting the Seminoles both at home and away.

When it comes to intercollegiate athletics, Florida State has established a winning tradition. Both the men's and women's athletic programs are among the nation's best.

A unique extracurricular activity is the Flying High Circus, the nation's only all-collegiate circus. Students from every academic major can become stars on the flying trapeze or highwire, or in clown acts.

Florida State is growing. Construction has begun on the Florida A&M

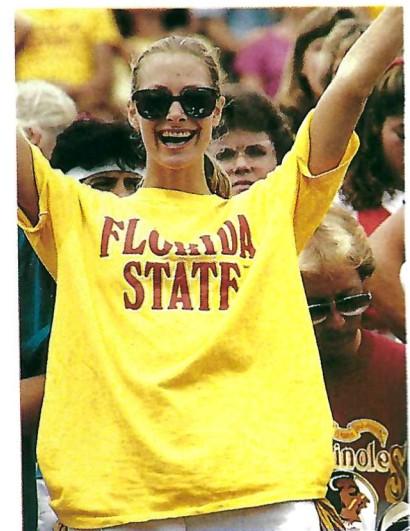
University/FSU College of Engineering Building, located adjacent to Innovation Park, two miles southwest of the FSU campus. It is expected to be completed by October 1987.

Construction began last fall on the new student union complex and construction is expected to be completed in 1987 on the Science Center Library.

Plans are also underway for a \$12.1 million multipurpose student gym, approved by the 1986 Legislature, as well as improvements to the central utility plant and renovation of the old Music Building (Music School South).

The College of Law's Village Green project has begun. When completed, the \$3.8 million project will feature four restored historic homes to be used as study, meeting and reception areas.

FSU President Bernard P. Sliger takes pride not only in the programs, but also in the people—students, faculty, administrators and staff—who make Florida State a successful monument to learning.



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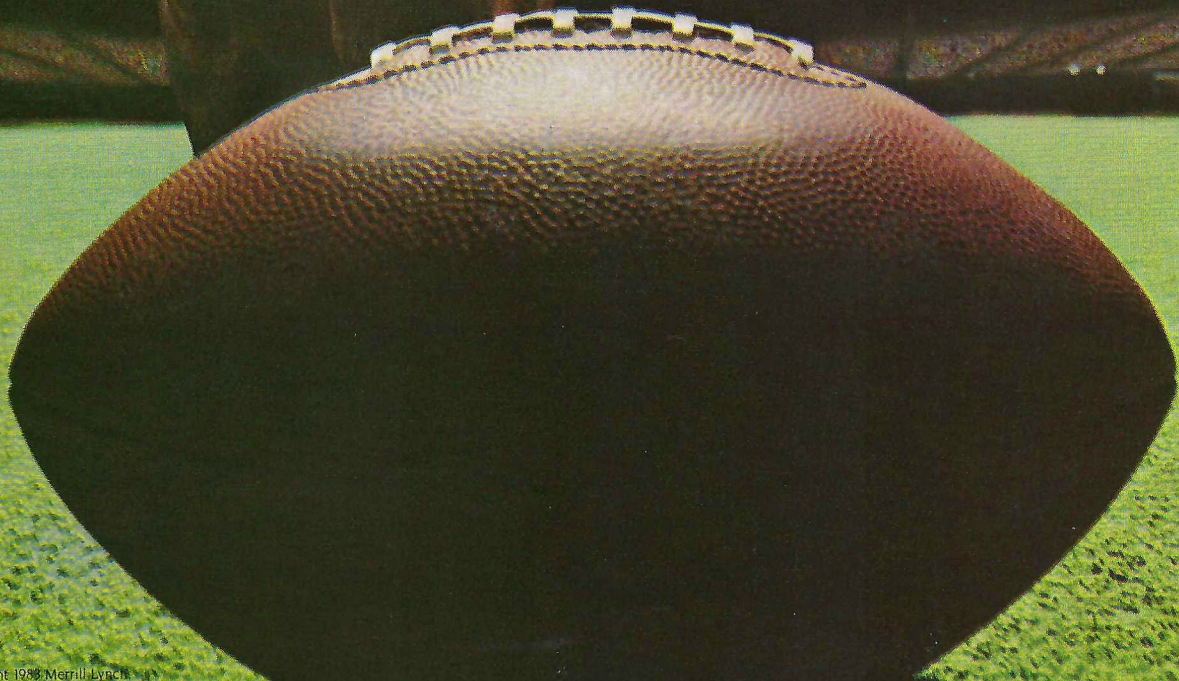
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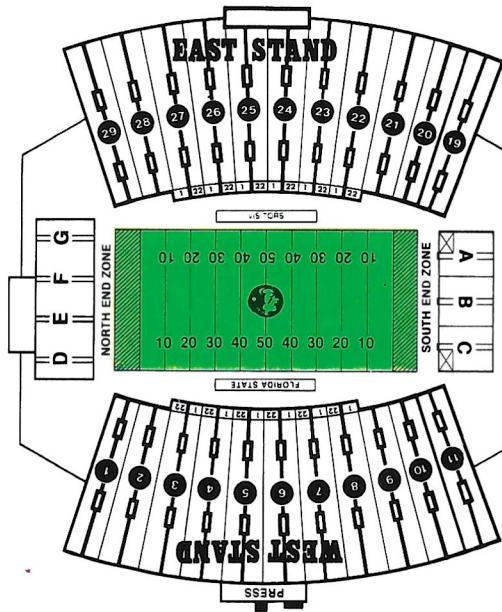
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Doak Campbell Stadium

PUBLIC TELEPHONES: Public telephones are located on the ground levels of both the east and west stands.

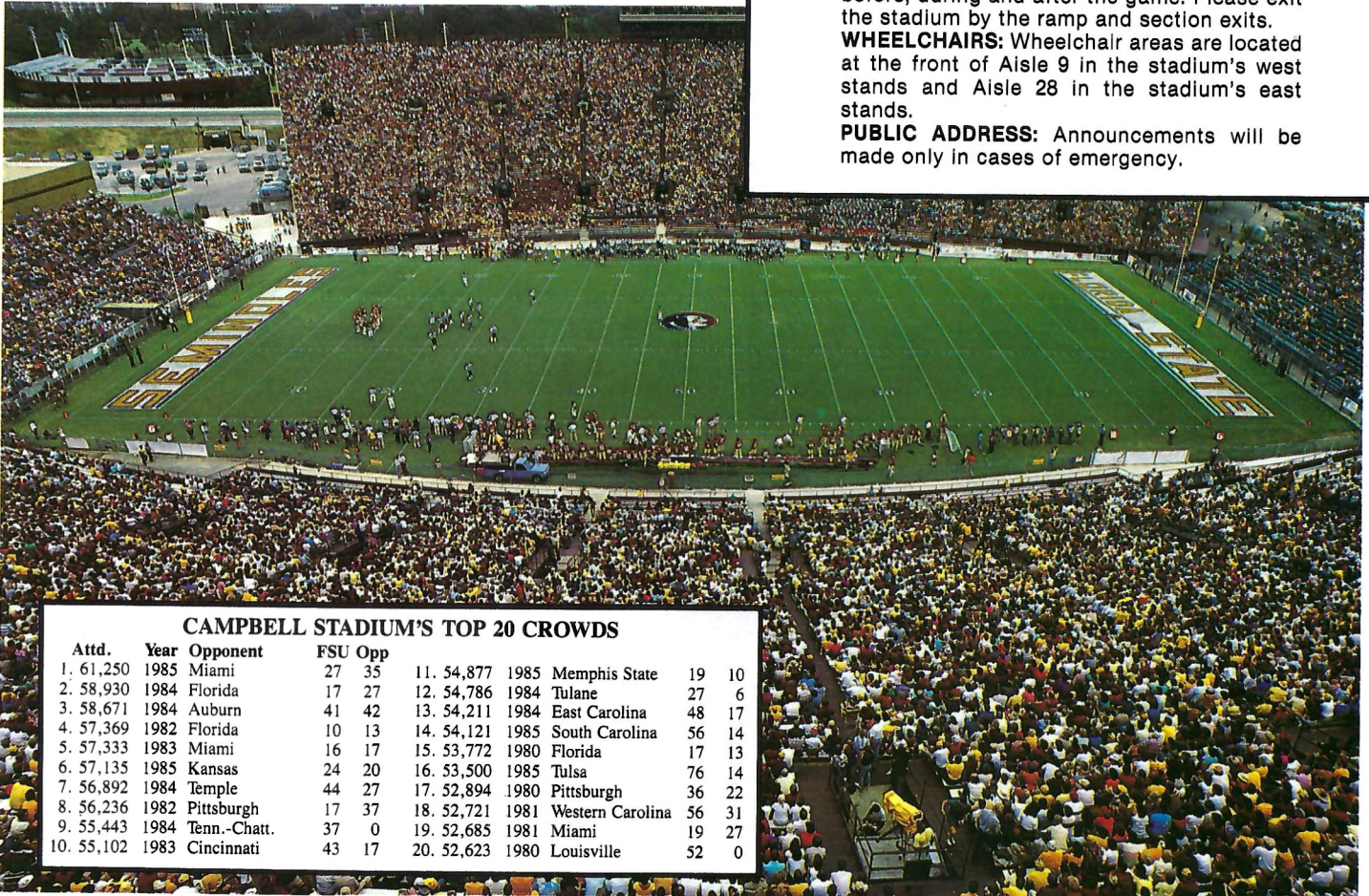
LOST AND FOUND: Items may be turned in or claimed at the police station, which is in the stadium's southeast corner.

WHEELCHAIRS: Wheelchair areas are located at the front of Aisle 9 in the stadium's west stands and Aisle 28 in the stadium's east stands.

PUBLIC ADDRESS: Announcements will be made only in cases of emergency.

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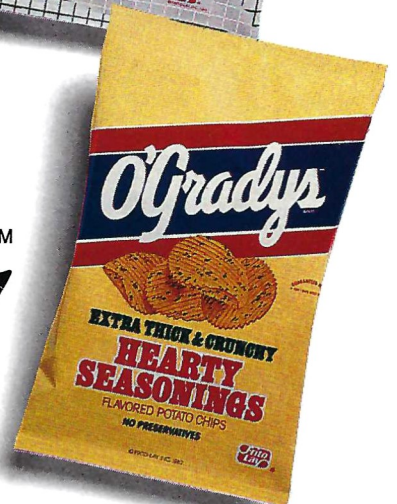

BRITISH ACTOR ROGER REES TO TEACH AT FLORIDA STATE

British actor Roger Rees, a 20-year member of the Royal Shakespeare Company, is the current visiting artist occupying the Florida State University Hoffman Eminent Scholar Chair in Theatre.

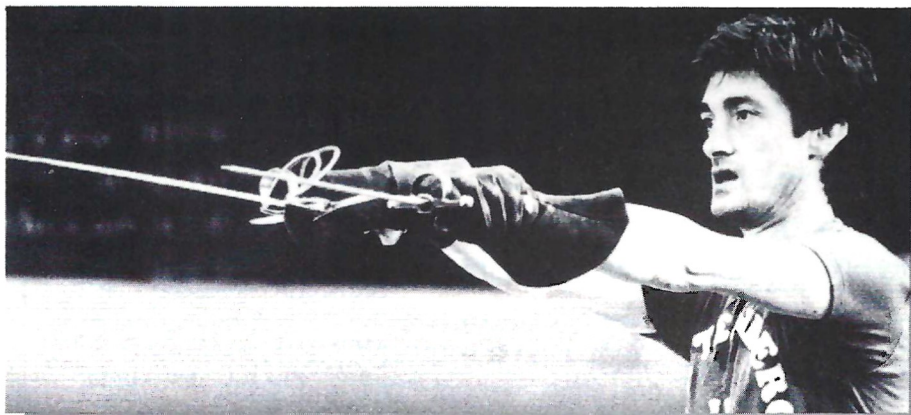
Rees is teaching in the FSU School of Theatre for four weeks during October and is scheduled to teach at the Asolo Conservatory for two weeks in December.

Rees, 42, is probably best known to American audiences for his Tony-Award winning performance in the title role of the Broadway and Public Broadcasting production of "Nicholas Nickleby."

He is one of only a few actors to be honored with a lifetime membership in the Royal Shakespeare Company as an associate artist. Rees has appeared with such noted actors as Lord Laurence Olivier, Ben Kingsley and Ian McKellen, and was acclaimed for his 1985 performance as Hamlet.

An accomplished visual artist, lithographer, scenic designer, stage designer, playwright and anthologist, Rees also won praise for his leading role in the original London production of Tom Stoppard's "The Real Thing," and as actor and co-author of the current British hit "Double Double." He has appeared in Bob Fosse's 1983 film, "Star 80," and in George C. Scott's version of Charles Dickens' "A Christmas Carol."

Rees follows Broadway theater producer and New York Shakespeare Festival founder Joseph Papp as the second internationally respected artist to occupy the endowed chair.

The Hoffman Eminent Scholar Chair was established in 1985 following a \$600,000 bequest from the estate of Marion O. Hoffman and her husband Maximilian.

Known as the "Baron of Park Avenue," he escaped penniless from Austria during World War II to make his fortune in America as the driving force behind the development of an American market for Jaguar, Volkswagen, Porsche, Mercedes-Benz, Alfa Romeo, Lancia, Fiat and BMW

automobiles. The Hoffmans' gift was matched by a \$400,000 challenge grant from the Florida Legislature.

ROBERT SHAW SELECTED FOR HOUSEWRIGHT EMINENT SCHOLAR CHAIR

One of the nation's foremost music conductors will be the first occupant of the Wiley and Lucilla Housewright Eminent Scholar Chair in Music at Florida State University.

Robert Shaw, music director and conductor of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra and a regular guest conductor of other major orchestras, will be on the Florida State campus for three weeks beginning Nov. 17. He will work with faculty and students and rehearse the FSU Symphony and Chorus for a Dec. 5 performance which will feature Stravinsky's "Symphony of Psalms" and the Symphony No. 4 by Brahms. Shaw will return for a second teaching stint Berlioz's "Requiem," Op. 5.

Shaw is the founder and director of the famed Robert Shaw Chorale, builder of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra and its acclaimed chorus, and protege of Arturo Toscanini and George Szell. His ongoing relationships with Philadelphia, Los Angeles, Dallas, St. Louis, Pittsburgh and National Symphony orchestras attest to the national recognition of Shaw's musicianship.

Shaw's honors have included seven Grammy Awards, three ASCAP awards for service to contemporary music and honorary degrees from more than 30 U.S. colleges, universities and foundations. He received the first Guggenheim Fellowship ever awarded to a conductor and also received Columbia University's Alice M. Ditson Award for Service to American Music.

The eminent scholar chair was made possible through a 1986 contribution of \$600,000 to Florida State made by the Housewrights, which was matched by a \$400,000 challenge grant from the Florida Legislature. Dr. Wiley L. Housewright joined the faculty of the FSU School of Music in 1947 and was appointed dean in 1966, a position he held until his retirement in 1979. His wife, Lucilla, has been a confidante to many FSU music students over the years.

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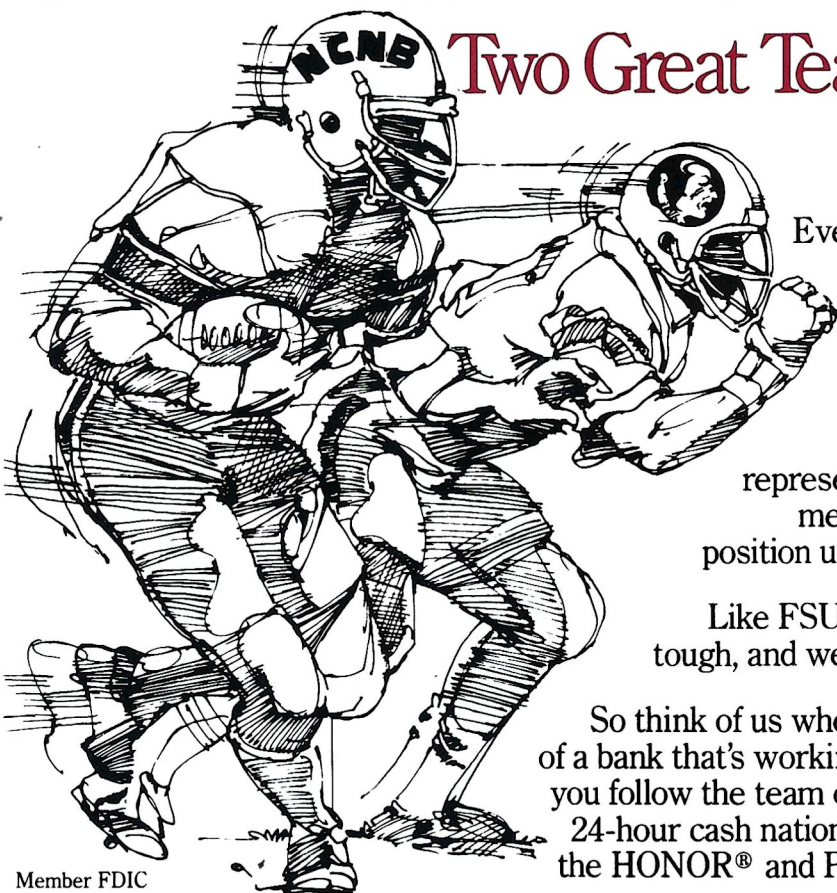
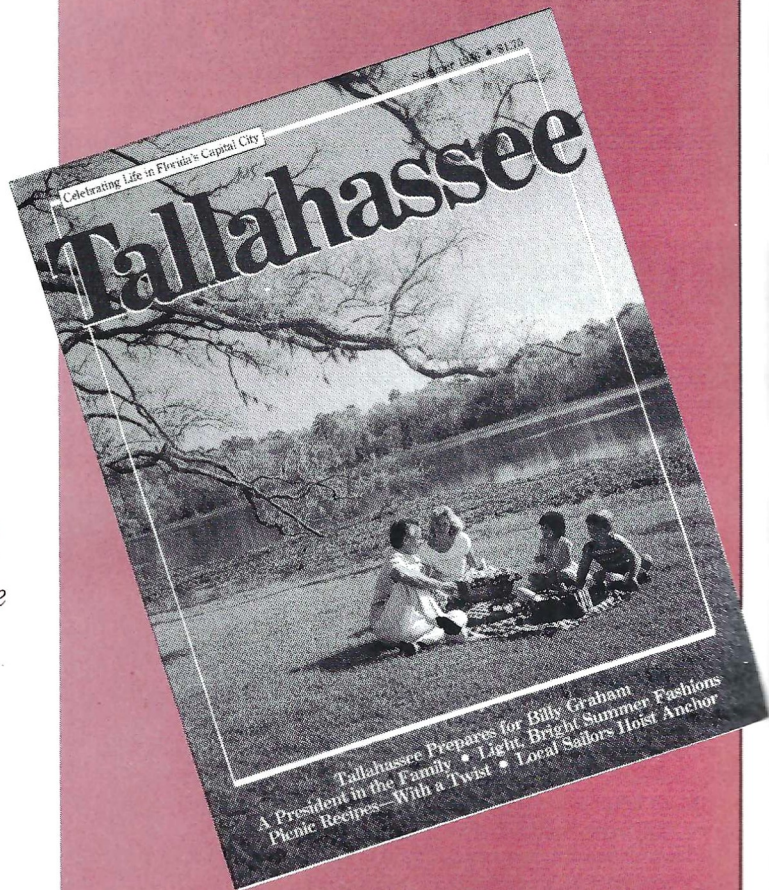
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After the end of February, recruiters are not allowed on the road until May.

But when May rolls around, recruiters can comb the state for a list of juniors who will become potential recruits their senior year. But here again the NCAA disallows any personal contacts.

"I feel good about our overall program at FSU," Scott remarks. "We have an excellent and dedicated staff and we have a lot of things going for us at FSU that help to attract top athletes who are also academically sound."

Florida State's outstanding academic program and excellent faculty are not the least of these, and of course FSU's athletic facilities are exceptional. Furthermore, many athletes are attracted to the Seminoles because of broad TV exposure.

But perhaps the prime reason is Coach Bowden. "He is not only one of the winningest coaches in the country, but Coach Bowden has the type of reputation and character that attracts a student athlete," says Scott. "He also establishes a good relationship with their families."

Bowden's recruiting trails take him over much of the state. His popularity stems from his down-home warmth and has attracted many players to his program. The combination of Bowden's charisma and Scott's effective organization resulted in FSU having what was

judged the nation's best recruiting crop in 1984. In 1985, recruiting prognosticators deemed the Seminole catch the third best in the Southeast.

One of the helpful additions to FSU's football recruiting efforts in 1986 is former player Jimmy Heggins, who joined the staff in August. Heggins is similar to a pro personal scout. He is frequently on the road as much as three and four days a week.

But Scott stresses that it takes more than just one or two guys to recruit. It takes an overall recruiting effort by the position coaches and head coach to sign 30 high school seniors each year. "TEAMWORK is the name of the game," says Scott. "You win with good players. If you recruit good talent you have won half the battle."

greatest feeling in the world," Gladden says. "it's maximum potential that's important to me. Take a kid like Garth Jax. Nice guy who worked hard. But four years ago, I couldn't look a scout in the face and tell him Garth had NFL potential. But Garth was the overachiever type. He was smart enough to realize that intensity and technique were as important as ability. Watching a guy like that graduate and then beat the odds to make an NFL team—that's what it's all about."

Secondly, Gladden enjoys the level of competition FSU has faced. "We've arrived in that on any given day we can line up with the best in the country and not worry about being blown out. I've been here for practically every big game Florida State has played in. Lining up with the Michigans, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Notre Dames. It's something that hundreds upon hundreds of college coaches only dream about."

Of the most difficult parts of college coaching, Gladden says, is when hard work doesn't pay off. "You go into a week with a good plan and you work hard at it. You think you're ready and for some reason the players don't do what their supposed to do. That to me is the most frustrating thing about the game and it's mostly caused by immaturity. More than anything else, an immature player will kill you."

Although Gladden says time away from home is tough on his wife Patty and his kids, he enjoys recruiting. "It's the one area where an assistant can get a lot of credit if he does a good job. When you sign the player that everybody in the country wanted—it's a big plus for you," he says. "The road is tough, but my family understands it. One thing I make sure I do is be with them every minute I can, because when it gets right down to it, they are the only people who really care about you."

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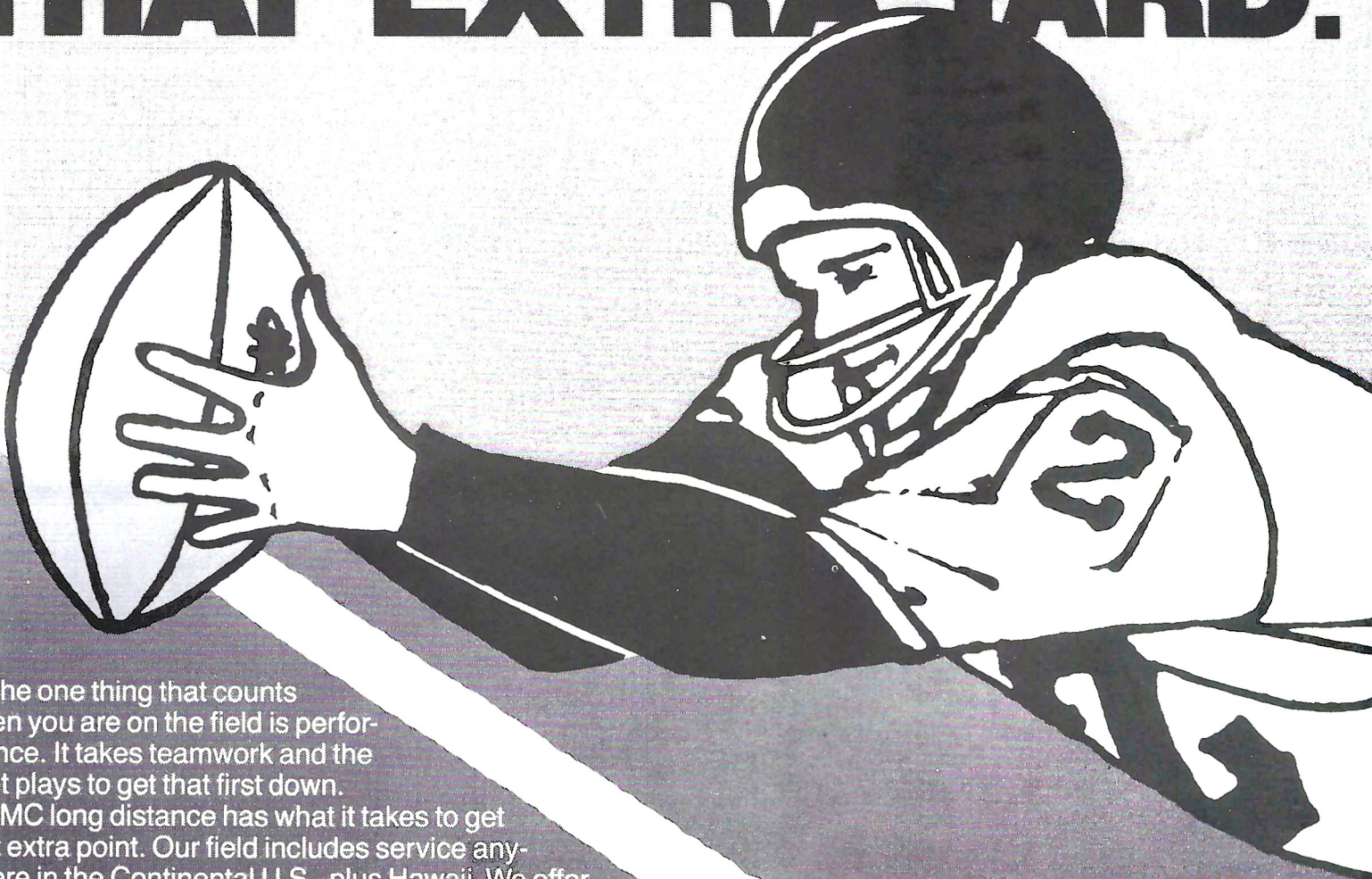

Thompson said. "That's the one they gave me when I first came here. After my first year I thought that 89 was a number for a receiver or tight end. So I switched to 93 because it seemed like a number for a defensive player."

Also wearing a number non-characteristic to his position is freshman linebacker Anthony Moss. Moss was issued his high school number of 88 with the departure of Hassan Jones to the Minnesota Vikings. But he is looking to change that number, hopefully by next year.

Personally, number 88 is not a favorite number of mine since I'm a linebacker," said Moss. "I'm in the process of getting it changed for next year. I'm looking at number 99 since Bruce Heggie is graduating and I think numbers in the 90's are intimidating." Anthony's older brother Winston, a linebacker at Miami, must think along the same line because he wears number 92.

To change a number, a player must secure his preferred number with the equipment manager or his position coach in advance. That was the case with redshirt freshman fullback Reno Fells. "Last year I asked Coach (Billy) Sexton not to promise anyone number 42," Fells said. "I knew Cletis Jones

would not be back this year and since I wore it in high school, I wanted to take it over."

At some home games, it is not out of the ordinary to see duplicate numbers. In most of these cases, the second number is being worn by a freshman who will most likely be redshirted. The number he is duplicating is usually worn by a senior. When the freshman returns the next year, he inherits the number.

Sometimes, one of those freshmen will need to play, thus requiring an immediate number change. Such was the case of freshman tailback Dexter Carter. He was assigned #30 in August because there were no "running back" numbers available and it was originally thought that he may be redshirted. Senior Tanner Holloman also wears 30 and it was a natural to assign Carter a number that he could inherit next year. But a series of injuries to FSU runners shifted Carter into action. Number 13 was found, sending sports information personnel scurrying to change all rosters, game programs and mentions of Carter.

In today's world where people complain about being nothing but a number in a computer, think twice; because to players on the field it is a way of being recognized by fans and it just might have a significant story behind it!

FSU to its ninth straight team title. Although he moved as high as third through the tournament's first two days, Henke concluded the season with a 24th place finish at the NCAA Championships, just 11 strokes behind the leader.

Henke, who remembers wanting to play golf since the time he hit marbles on the floor with a yardstick as a two year old will test the prospects of professional golf following FSU's spring season.

"I'm going to see how things go," Henke says. "If I'm ready to qualify for the tour, I'll try."

Henke, however, is realistic about his chances. "There are so many good players out there," he says. "Normally it takes a couple of years to get your tour card and a couple of years to make money."

If looks have anything to do with it, Henke will be a success. At 5-11, he possesses the handsome looks and fluent swing that has made the new breed of players like Greg Norman and Payne Stewart fixtures in the game.

But to become a fixture on tour, there will be many more long trips ahead for Henke. It's the birdies and eagles that will be important in his hunt for his niche among golf's elite.



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His real dream in life is to receive his master's in physical rehabilitation. He says it is something that he has been striving for for the last six years. "Bruce is a guy who has his priorities right," says Gladden. "He wants his degree and that's what he came to college at Florida State for. He's done everything here we've asked him to. He's a team man all the way and his effort is excellent. But academics are first."

Going into the 1986 season, Eric Stiehl had been hoping that he would be seeing a lot of playing time. But due to unfortunate circumstances, his progress has been hampered in the early going. The junior has encountered both a concussion and an automobile accident. Luckily he escaped the accident with only a broken hand and fingers. "It really hasn't affected me that much not seeing that much playing time on the first unit defense—because of the injuries," says Stiehl.

"Eric CAN compete for a starting position but his injuries have hurt," says Gladden. "Every time I get him ready to go, something happens and he goes out."

But for now, it's the specialty teams where Stiehl contributes, and where he has contributed for the past two years. "Eric Stiehl is an excellent specialty teams player," says Gladden, as he emphasizes the word excellent.

A fun-loving type guy who doesn't have much of a streak of seriousness to his personality, Stiehl looks at the specialty teams as a way to have fun while achieving. "A lot of people don't realize how fun it is," he says. "Believe me, I do take the game itself seriously but basically all I do everytime I hit the field is have fun and do the right things to win."

Striving for consistency is part of Stiehl's quest for perfection. "I always try to tackle the runner on the kickoff returns," he says. "Also, when I'm playing on the line on the punt team, I try to make successful contact and contain my opponent from getting to our punter. That's my job and I try to be the best I can at it."

In 1985, Stiehl was cited for his work on the specialty teams during the Western Carolina game. "Those kind of performances just motivate me to do better," says the 6-5, 228 lb. junior. "It's like you're competing against yourself."

When his playing days are over, the economics major will head to graduate school or perhaps help his father with the family business. "After that, and once I get my feet on the ground, my plans are to get into sales or the banking system," says the Neptune Beach native.

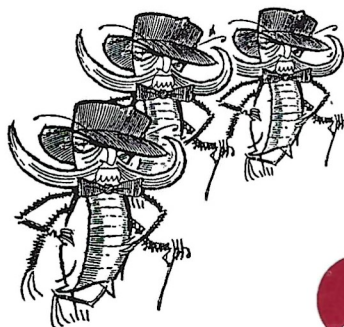
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
