



Notes & Quotes

- Florida State has now won six straight football games, 13 of its last 14 and 18 of 20. Since the 1986 All-American Bowl, the Seminoles have lost only to Miami.
- Speaking of streaks, Bobby Bowden's longest at Florida State was 15 straight victories spanning the last four games of 1978 and 11 in 1979. Aside from that, Bowden teams have won seven in a row three times. A victory over Louisiana Tech would tie those seven-game strings.
- This week's Associated Press poll will have Florida State in the Top 10 for the 22nd consecutive week. That is the longest stay in FSU history.
- In four home games this season Florida State has drawn 230,386 fans for an average of 57,597. That average is up 3,921 fans per game. The Seminoles ranked 29th in college football attendance in 1987, but on the present pace, the 1988 Seminoles would finish 25th nationally.
- Heisman candidate and Thorpe frontrunner Deion Sanders picked up right where he left off. After missing two games with a knee sprain, Sanders returned three punts for 41 yards and had his third interception of the year against East Carolina. Sanders' 19.8 punt return average should keep him near the top of the heap nationally.
- Ironically, Florida State has an 0-2 record against Louisiana Tech, losing 32-13 in 1952 and 32-21 in 1953. The two schools have not met in 35 years.
- Although Louisiana Tech is a Division I-AA team this year, it won't last long. Next year, the Bulldogs may make the leap to I-A. It may as well have been this year since they have eight I-A teams on the 1988 schedule.
- Florida State, playing its eighth game of the season this week, will enjoy its first off-week on October 29. The Seminoles travel to South Carolina on November 5 before closing with home games against Virginia Tech (Nov. 12) and Florida (Nov. 26).
- In keeping with a longstanding tradition of spreading playing time around, the 1988 Seminoles have had 14 different players catch a pass, 14 collect rushing stats and an incredible 16 different players have scored points.
- Florida State continues to face ball-control football teams. FSU opponents have run more plays than the Seminoles (503-458) an oddity for a team with a 6-1 record.





Hadley Handles Senior Switch

John Hadley is a fifth-year senior at Florida State. While not common, Hadley's seniority is certainly not unusual. What is unusual about John Hadley is while most fifth-year players rely on experience, he is in the process of changing positions and finds himself learning, developing and adapting to it — starting all over, in a sense.

An outstanding free safety prospect and one of Florida State's premiere special teams performers over his first four years, Hadley's move to outside linebacker has proven to be a good one for the team, but it has been a difficult switch for the individual.

While Hadley stops short of calling the early part of his career frustrating, he concedes things did not go as planned.

"It has been a good experience playing at Florida State and I'm glad I chose to come here," Hadley said. "But there were times I thought things might have worked

out better had I gone somewhere else."

The tough times are easy to spot.

A third team 4A all-state selection out of Evans High in Orlando, Hadley seemed destined for college stardom. At 6-4, 200 pounds, Hadley's abilities had college scouts from Georgia, Pittsburgh and Florida drooling. Circumstances, and a growth spurt, slowed his path to a starting position at Florida State.

"When I first got here and did not see playing time in my first two years, it was a real depressing time," Hadley said. "I was a three-year starter in high school and was not accustomed to not playing the whole game. It was an adjustment period and the two who helped me most were God and Coach (Dave) Van Halanger (Seminole strength coach)."

Hadley did find a way to contribute in his sophomore and junior seasons. He found a niche on the special teams and on those specialized units. Hadley excelled.

"John has been just outstanding with our special teams since his arrival," outside linebacker coach Jim Gladden said. "He's a big, tall, rangy type of player who can contain runners and has

good speed. His performances have been excellent, and he has been a big contributor since he's been with us at FSU."

While Hadley was able to take satisfaction in his performance on the special teams, he yearned for the chance to play in regular defensive situations.

"I kind of grew into enjoying special teams," Hadley said. "That was all I had at the time. I had not played them much in high school, but that was my chance to get on the field and I tried to make the most of it." His progress put him on schedule to become one of Florida State's top defensive backs, but something unusual happened along the way. John Hadley just kept growing. He put on 30 pounds since his days as a high school senior and basically grew himself right out of an opportunity.


"With his increased size, John became one of those players who struggled to find a position," Gladden said. "He was not quite as agile and quick as you need to be at safety because of the increased weight, but he was also not big and bulky enough to play linebacker. He was between positions and I know it was frustrating."

Hadley's break came prior to the 1987 season. Close friend and teammate John Eaford was involved in a serious car accident and his loss left a hole at inside linebacker. Coaches were forced to move outside linebackers to the inside, which made for an opening on the outside.

At Florida State, outside linebacker is a position that can vary with each play and each formation. Sometimes, the OLBs fill the role of an extra defensive back, sometimes they play like a lineman. It takes a player with diverse talent to handle the challenges of outside linebacker; someone who can effectively play the pass on one play and the run on the next. The position has become home for John Hadley.

"Outside linebacker is a tough position to play in our scheme," Gladden admitted. "We adjust our defense according to position on the field and a great many times teams will decide to run right at our bandit (outside linebacker). In those situations, he must play like a lineman. He may also have pass coverage responsibilities. You may have to take on a 240-pound fullback, or a 270-pound pulling guard, or drop back and cover. It is a position that requires a lot."

While still adjusting to the new responsibilities of outside



linebacker, Hadley is obviously happy to be playing more in his final season.

"I made the move (to outside linebacker) because I thought it would be a quicker path to playing more," Hadley said. "I prefer to play the passing teams, because that's the situation best suited to me, but I have improved on run support."

BOBBY BOWDEN - THE



ne hundred and one wins! It took Florida State University 20 seasons before it registered its 100th victory. Bill Peterson was the man who secured that milestone during the 1966 season with a 10-0 shutout of Missis-

sippi State.

Yes, 101 college football wins don't come overnight. When you think that in 41 years of playing the sport, Florida State - - a darned successful football institution by any standards - - has just 250 total scalps.

Then Bobby Bowden steps onto the scene. In three seasons prior to his 1976 arrival in Tallahassee, Florida State had rolled up a whopping four victories. At that rate, it would have taken Bowden 75 years to get 100 wins for the Seminoles, and that would have come in the year 2051.

Smart man, this Birmingham cracker. Realizing that he would have been 122 years old by that time, he revised the timetable. Instead of four wins every three years, he sug-

gested something like 25 wins every three years.

Now this scenario seemed more to the liking of a whole lot of people. After turning 58 last November 8, Bowden has already knocked off a quick hundred. Nothing to it but a little planning. Twelve seasons: 101-37-3. Twelve seasons: nine bowls (more than half of the 17 in FSU history). Twelve seasons: three trips to New Year's Day Bowls. It is fitting that Bowden got his 100th win in 1988 against instate rival Florida and started on his next 100 with his third win in five tries against Nebraska in the Fiesta Bowl.

What this man has done in just 12 short years is nothing short of a miracle. Taking a program mired in mediocrity literally on the verge of dropping the sport - he has built one of the very best programs in the nation. He has taken Florida State to the doorstep of the national championship three times and he got the runner-up title in 1988. There are those who think that the man who patrols the sidelines for FSU with "Seminoles" scripted across the front of his sweatshirt will get

that national championship before he retires.

Bowden, you see, is Florida State through and through. Oh heck, Bobby Bowden IS Florida State. Florida State University is certainly a respectable institution of higher education. It has got a quaint steel-structured stadium where the fans make a lot of noise. It has the nice locker room, the weight room and even Burt Reynolds Hall. But really, Florida State has nothing that dozens of other schools can't offer. Except one thing. Bobby Bowden is the Florida State advantage.

Slowly but surely over these 12 years, America has come to recognize his qualities as well. Of course, America would rather talk of how it loves to watch his teams play. Uh-oh, here comes the reverse. Holy cow, there's the fake punt. Jeez, did he throw the bomb on fourth-and-one? That's Bobby Bowden


for you. A riverboat gambler of the first degree.

Bowden continues to climb the ladder among the active coaches nationally. His 174-69-3 career mark is topped only by Michigan's Bo Schembechler, Penn State's Joe Paterno and Georgia's Vince Dooley. His 101 wins at FSU came after he posted a 42-26 mark at West Virginia (1970-75) and a 31-6 record at alma mater Samford (1959-62).

Bowden's 101 wins have not come the easy way. Saddled with the nation's toughest schedule three of his 12 years, he has managed to beat the nation's best teams on the road. "King of the Road" he was once dubbed and his 48-24-2 record away from Tallahassee includes victories at Auburn, Michigan State, Florida and Nebraska in 1987 and previously a Who's Who of college football.

If there's any question about the national impact he's made at Florida State, gander this little fact. In 29 years of football prior to Bowden, Florida State had made the weekly AP Top 20 just 13 times. In Bowden's 12 years, FSU could be found on that list in 118 of 169 weekly polls. Only 31 times since he first got the '77 Seminoles into the Top 20 has he spent a week out of that group. An incredible 48 times under Bowden FSU has been in the Top 10 on any given week. And what about a finish in the Top 20 - eight times in 12 seasons!

A polished speaker, Bowden is in demand. A busy schedule curtails many speaking engagements, but many times he can be found in a Baptist church pulpit on a Sunday morning.



FLORIDA STATE ADVANTAGE



Bowden is adored by the media. You'd be hard pressed to find a better one with the press. Open and candid, he has no secrets from them. His style makes Florida State a dream beat for the reporter.

Bowden was born in Birmingham and was a dandy player at the famed Woodlawn High School there. He went on to Alabama as a freshman quarterback, the fulfillment of a childhood dream after growing up in the shadows of Legion Field. During that one semester at Alabama, he found the true love of his life was back in Birmingham. Ann Estock soon became Bobby's wife and he was soon a transfer student at Samford University there, then Howard College.

Bowden was a "Little All-American" at Samford and would soon start a long Bowden tradition at the school. He returned there to take his first head coaching position in 1959.

THIS IS FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY


Florida State University, home of the world's fastest supercomputer, is setting the pace as higher education in the state prepares to enter the 21st century. The FSU Supercomputer Computations Research Institute attracts international attention with scientists from many nations using the University's two powerful supercomputers in their research.


The Department of Physics' Tandem Van de Graaff Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory, ranked in the top four in the nation by the National Science Foundation, houses two powerful atom smashers which also provide unique research opportunities.

Located in Tallahassee, the capital of Florida, FSU is a public, coeducational university and a senior member of the State University System. More than 24,000 students are enrolled, representing all 50 states and 100 foreign countries. The University offers more than 250 graduate and undergraduate degrees in its 15 schools and colleges. Outstanding programs in the colleges of arts and sciences, business, communication, education, engineering, home economics, law and social sciences combine with the schools of criminology, library and information studies, music, nursing, social work, theater and visual arts to make Florida State a nationally acclaimed university.

The Florida State campus, located just blocks away from the state capitol, is beautiful in all seasons. Its 347 acres mirror the picturesque features of the surrounding North Florida region. The buildings are nestled among evergreen live oaks, pines and palms, as well as hardwoods that provide fall color, and dogwoods and azaleas that are covered with a profusion of springtime blossoms.

As an institution, FSU began as coeducational Seminary West of the Suwannee River, approved by the Florida Legislature in 1851 and assigned to Tallahassee in 1857. Name changes over the years included Florida State College in 1901; then in 1905, Florida Female College and, in 1909, Florida State College for Women. Gov. Millard Caldwell signed a bill in 1947 which again made the institution coeducational and changed the name to Florida State University.





The University's location affords excellent research and internship opportunities in government, law and the social sciences. The reputation of Florida State's research programs and the expertise of its more than 1,500 faculty members—including four members of the National Academy of Sciences and four members of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences—represent major strengths of the University. FSU prides itself on pursuing academic quality while maintaining a friendly, welcoming atmosphere.

Programs in music, dance and theater at Florida State have earned well-deserved national recognition. The visual and performing arts exhibited and produced on campus offer students and the community a wealth of enrichment opportunities.

Student activities at FSU create an important balance between the classroom experience and the personal life of the individual scholar. Honors programs, student government, intramural sports and more than 200 organizations are available for student involvement. Furthermore, the Flying High Circus, the world's only all-collegiate circus, makes its home here.

Florida State academic programs extend well beyond Tallahassee. The FSU Marine Laboratory is located on the Gulf of Mexico, 45 miles away. Students participate in professional training programs at the Asolo State Theater in Sarasota and the Burt Reynolds Institute for Theatre Training in Jupiter. The Panama City Campus of Florida State offers upper-level courses which lead to bachelor's and master's degrees. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Florida State Conference Center on the edge of the main campus, manages educational outreach activities from Pensacola to Miami.

The physical growth of the University during the 11-year administration of President Bernard Sliger represents new construction expenditures of more than \$100 million. It includes such additions as the University Union expansion project, the new Paul A.M. Dirac Science Library Building, the Jeffersonian-style Village Green project at the College of Law, the new wing of the Rovetta Business Building, and the new FAMU/FSU College of Engineering at Innovation Park.

It is not only the academic programs and facilities of Florida State, but also its people—students, faculty, alumni, administrators and staff—who make this University such a proud monument to learning.

UNIVERSITY ADMINISTRATION



DR. BERNARD F. SLIGEFPresident, Florida State
University

Dr. Bernard F. Sliger was named the 10th president of Florida State University February 7, 1977, following six months as the University's interim president.

After joining the administration in May 1972 as executive vice president, he assumed the addi-

tional duties of chief academic officer, and served as director of the University's London Study Center during the fall quarter, 1975.

Formerly executive director of the Louisiana Coordinating Council for Higher Education, Dr. Sliger's background as an educator includes 19 years as a faculty member and administrator at Louisiana State University. During that time, he served LSU as head of the economics department, member and chairman of the graduate council, dean of academic affairs and vice chancellor. Taking leave of absence from LSU in 1969, he organized the Louisiana Coordinating Council for Higher Education, and became its executive director, a position equivalent to the chancellorship of the State University System of Florida.


An economist and scholar in the special fields of economic theory and public finance, he frequently has served as a consultant to private and public commissions and organizations. Dr. Sliger also served a year as Louisiana Commissioner of Administration and Chief Budget Officer.

Dr. Sliger's administrative and consulting experience extends beyond the states of Florida and Louisiana. In 1987, he was appointed to a four-year term on the NCAA President's Commission. Since 1983, he has been a member of the board of directors of the Federal Bank of Atlanta, Ga. and is also a member of the Council of Presidents for the Southeastern

Universities Research Association and the Executive Committee of the University Research Association, Washington, D.C.

Born September 30, 1924, the native of Trout Creek, Mich., holds three degrees—the B.A. ('49), M.A. ('50) and Ph.D. ('55)—from Michigan State University, all in economics. He has taught at Florida State, Michigan State, Louisiana State and at Southern University at Baton Rouge, La. He holds memberships in 10 professional, scholastic and honor societies including Omicron Delta Kappa, Phi Kappa Phi, Omicron Delta Epsilon and Alpha Kappa Psi.

Dr. Sliger and his wife, Greta, have four children, Nan, Paul, Greta and Sten.



CHARLES W. EHRHARDTFaculty Athletic Committee
Chairman

A professor of Law at Florida State University since 1967, Charles W. Ehrhardt is beginning his fifth year as Chairman of the FSU Athletic Committee.

Ehrharus served on the committee from 1969-71, and was reappointed to the board in 1983. He succeeded Dr. James Jones as chairman in 1984, and became Florida State's representative to the NCAA with the appointment.

A native of Elkader, Iowa, Ehrhardt received a bachelor's degree from Iowa State University in 1962. Two years later he earned his law degree from the University of Iowa and went on to become an Assistant United States Attorney in that state before coming to

Tallahassee.

A widely-respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt holds the Florida State position as the Ladd Professor of Evidence. He wrote the Florida Evidence Code, passed by the state legislature in 1976, which deals with the admissibility of evidence in court trials. Ehrhardt is also the author of a book on evidence, first published in 1977 with a second edition published in 1984.

Ehrhardt is frequently called on for lectures and speaking engagements. He is also asked to do private consultations with lawyers and judges nationwide on evidence matters.

From 1984-86, he was president of the Metro Conference which made him the league's chief representative to the NCAA. He is still active in conference administration, serving on the editorial budget committee.



ATHLETIC DIRECTOR, HOOTIE INGRAM

Cecil Ingram, known to his friends and associates as "Hootie," has headed Florida State's athletic department for the past eight years. He came to FSU in January of 1981 after eight years with the Southeastern Conference

Upon arriving in Tallahassee, Ingram initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities. The building program included construction of the Moore Athletic Center, and completion of Dick Howser Stadium as well as renovations to Doak Campbell Stadium, the Bim Stults Aquatic Center and Mike Long Track.


Ingram is in his third year of a four-year term on the prestigious NCAA Council. As an elected member of that body, he is one of 22 representatives from Division I schools. Ingram is also a member of the College Football Association (CFA) television committee, chairman of the NCAA nominating committee and chairman of the major independents.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., Ingram played football for the hometown Crimson Tide from 1951 to 1954. He was named All-SEC as a sophomore when he led the nation in pass interceptions. He was a member of both the 1953 Orange and 1954 Cotton Bowl squads, and also lettered for the Alabama baseball team as an infielder.

After graduation and an Army stint, Ingram began his coaching career in 1956 as an assistant football coach at Bradenton (Fla.) Manatee High School. The next year, he became head coach at Tuscaloosa Brookwood High School.

Ingram moved into the college coaching arena in 1960 as an assistant at Wake Forest. He also made coaching stops at Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas before accepting the head coaching job at Clemson in 1970, the only collegiate head coaching job he held. Three years after taking the position, Ingram left Clemson to join the SEC as assistant commissioner.

Ingram and his wife, Toni, have a son and two daughters.





Ferguson Finally Has His Day, Again

Chip Ferguson stood outside the Florida State lockerroom talking to his parents. The beaming smile on his still boyish face told the outcome of Florida State's 24-21 win over Clemson better than the scoreboard. As Ferguson and his parents talked following his 18 of 28 day passing, Tiger Head Coach Danny Ford quickly made his way to a highway patrol car and began to speed away. Then Ford, still fuming over the loss, spotted Ferguson and signaled the car to stop. Rolling down his window,

Ford gestured to Ferguson.


"Chip, you played a great game today. Congratulations," the Tiger boss said.

No one, not even Ford, could mistake this as anything less than Chip Ferguson's day. A day to offset the last two years, when Ferguson wore a maroon FSU baseball cap on the sideline, charting plays and watching someone else lead the Seminole offense. On this day, he silenced critics who had questioned his ability to lead, and gained new respect.

For Ferguson, the win was his seventh over a team from North or South Carolina, the two states he calls home. But the Clemson victory was especially

satisfying.

"It's really a special feeling to go back home to a place like North Carolina and Clemson and play in front of your friends," Ferguson said. "There's no way to describe the feeling of winning a game against Clemson or North Carolina. That win against Clemson




Chip Ferguson

was the highlight of my career.' With the Clemson victory, Ferguson was back. Back to the starting line-up for good; completing a cycle that saw him go from stardom as a freshman, to obscurity his sophomore and junior seasons as a backup, and back to stardom in his final campaign. Even with the down moments, Ferguson's 3,336 career passing yards ranks with the school's best quarterbacks. Soon he will move into fourth place on the FSU all-time list, joining Seminole greats Jimmy Jordan, Gary Huff and Bill Cappleman in the top four.

Ferguson's fate has been a quarterback odyssey like no other, beginning four years ago in a game most fans can never forget.

With three seniors ahead of him on the depth chart, the 18-year-old, fourth-string quarterback was an unlikely candidate to lead FSU to a major bowl game in 1985. After all, Bowden approached Ferguson and Peter Tom Willis over the summer, hinting both would be redshirted to preserve a year of eligibility.

But on a humid September night

in Doak Campbell Stadium, fourth-ranked Florida State trailed Kansas 20-10 in the fourth quarter. FSU Head Coach Bobby Bowden called on the highly-touted freshman who had thrown his last touchdown pass nine months earlier in the South Carolina high school championship game for Spartanburg High.

Little did Bowden know Ferguson would throw his next touchdown in his second attempt of the game, finding Phillip Bryant streaking down the field on a post pattern for a 68-yard score that broke the game open and gave FSU a 24-20 come-from-behind win. Following the game, dozens of reporters crowded around the young freshman who sat on the wooden stool by his locker, trying to realize what he had just done.

"Hey Chip," one reporter asked. "What play was called on the 68-yard touchdown to Bryant?"

Ferguson, nervous about revealing a page from the FSU playbook, replied, "Sir, I really don't think I'm allowed to tell you our plays."

His performance ignited a quarterback controversy that raged for four games. For the veteran head coach, the decision suddenly was not a simple one. Should he go with seniors Eric Thomas or Kirk Coker, or Danny McManus, the preseason starter who still suffered the effects of a severe concussion, or should he give the nod to

Ferguson, an obviously inexperienced freshman who had both luck and talent on his side.

The decision was made a little easier three games later against North Carolina when Ferguson once again came off the bench to rally a sputtering offense, completing 15 of 23 passes for 124 yards and a TD to lift FSU to a 20-10 victory. Bowden officially named Chip the starter the week leading up to a showdown with Miami.

Despite a 35-27 loss to the Hurricanes, Ferguson and the Seminoles plodded on, winning three of their last four to earn a trip to Jacksonville in the Gator Bowl. With numerous injuries to the wide receiving corps, FSU was not expected to defeat a loaded Oklahoma State team. But Ferguson called on untested wideouts, passed for 338 yards, and earned the Gator Bowl Most Valuable Player Trophy while leading FSU to a 34-23 win.

The pattern was set. Ferguson finished the year as the premiere first-year quarterback in the nation, leading many to compare him to Florida's Kerwin Bell and Miami's Bernie Kosar.

The success that followed Bell and Kosar would not come to Ferguson, however. His 338 yards passing in the Gator Bowl represented three yards more than he would throw for during the entire 1987 season, and equal nearly a fourth of the yardage during the next two years.

"If I had never played again after my freshman year because of a career-ending injury, I would have been satisfied," Ferguson said. "Most people don't even play as much as I did as a freshman."

But over the next two seasons, even without an injury, Ferguson would see little playing time. He began his sophomore year as the incumbent starter, hitting 17 of 28 passes in

a season-opening win over Toledo. After that, he seemed to lose the zip on his passes and his mobility in the pocket. Ferguson experienced the kind of slump every quarterback dreads. Sacked 12 times and completing less than 50 percent of his passes, Ferguson was benched in favor of Danny McManus and Peter Tom Willis after losses to Michigan and Nebraska.

Most forgot about Ferguson until late in his sophomore season when the Seminoles ventured to his home state of South Carolina to play the Gamecocks. Once again, Ferguson emerged from the bullpen, ready to resurrect the offense from a nearly insurmountable deficit. Subbing for Willis, Ferguson came in and erased USC's 21-6 lead. Playing in front of the

same fans who saw him break all of Clemson and later Chicago Bears quarterback Steve Fuller's records at nearby Spartanburg High, Ferguson completed 15 of 22 passes for 228 yards and a TD in leading FSU to a wild 45-28 victory.

Throughout his sophomore season, Ferguson continued to stand on the sidelines, donning an FSU cap and carrying a clip board. He tried to make the transition from starter to back-up as smoothly as possible.

"I've always said you can't learn sitting on the bench," Ferguson said. "I don't agree you can get better watching the game."

Ferguson tried to make the

most of the situation, diversifying his interests into areas beyond the football field. A child development major, he made considerable strides in his classwork, raising his grade point average nearly every semester. Ferguson also turned to his family and close friend Willis to help him cope with his new role.

"It could have been a frustrating experience," Ferguson said. "I didn't let it bother me. I put other things ahead of football. Earlier I thought sports would be my life. I learned life is far more important than football. It kept me from being frustrated."

Perhaps no one helped him though the trials more than roommate Willis. The two came to FSU together, and while Ferguson received the chance to play early in his career, the two have battled for the number one spot for the last three seasons. Off the field, the competition ends and their close friendship begins.

"I don't know of two other people who have had the ups and downs we have had together," Ferguson said. "We do everything together, whether we play golf or go to a movie."

The pair, who say they are 10 handicappers, regularly play golf during the off-season, and are as adept at hitting greens as they are at hitting open receivers.

Ferguson spent last season spelling McManus in blowouts during FSU's magnificent 11-1 season. Even in the mopup situations, Ferguson made the most of his opportunities. He was a new and improved model of quarterback who read defenses and avoided sacks in completing 59 percent of his passes. He was a capable back-up and heir apparent to the job that was once his own.

With the constant challenge of Willis and emergence of




Jennifer Fitzgerald

Tech Tackles Seminoles Looking for Fourth Straight Win

Louisiana Tech University's football team is right where it wants to be going into today's showdown against Florida State.

The Bulldogs have a 3-3 record and are on a three-game winning streak. Sure, head coach Joe Raymond Peace and his troops would love to be 6-0 right now.

"But before the season, we said if we could come away with at least a 3-3 record before playing Florida State, we would be satisfied," said the first-year boss. "That's a goal we set for ourselves during the first half of the season and we've been able to do it."

And the 'Dogs have done it with two dramatic come-frombehind victories during their last two

games.

Comeback Victory No. 1 – Oct. 1, at Kansas State; Tech is trailing 28-7 at halftime. "We were almost ready to pack our bags and hop on the plane right then," Peace admitted. "But I told our players at halftime if we could hold them without a point in the second half, I would promise them we could win this game." Sure enough, they did. In maybe the greatest comeback in the school's history, the Bulldogs went on to win behind an 11th hour 44-yard field goal by Matt Stover.

Comeback Victory No. 2 – Oct. 8, at Ruston, versus previously undefeated Southwestern Louisiana. The Bulldogs found themselves down 16-9 early in the fourth quarter and had missed several opportunities in the first half to punch it into the end zone. Outstanding play by the specialty teams, which came up with an amazing five blocked kicks, and aggressive pressure on talented Cajun quarterback Brian Mitchell helped bring the 'Dogs back. That, plus the quarterbacking of Conrov Hines, who used running back Derrick Douglas 10 times for completions totalling 68 yards.

Once again, it was Stover who was the last minute hero, this time booting a 42-yard field goal that proved to be the winning margin

"The extraordinary thing about this team is they've been able to come back from adversity," Peace said. "The true mark of a championship team is to come from behind when

things are going rough, and that's what this young team has been able to do."

When Peace speaks about a young team, he means it. Of Tech's 86 roster players, 50 are either redshirt freshmen or true freshmen.

"You would never know it by the way they've been playing ever since the last half of that Wyoming game," Peace said. "They've played like veterans."

Tech was, of course, thrashed by national top 20 team Wyoming 38-6, but might've grown up more in that game than in any other. After allowing 31 points in the first half, the Bulldogs issued only seven points in the final two quarters.

The loss came a week after Tech had been thumped by Houston's high-powered attack, 60-0.

"Naturally, I wouldn't want to go through that again," said Peace of those two setbacks, "but I think they really did us a world of good. We found out where we are and what we have to do to play with those types of programs.

"I believe by playing the Wyomings and the Houstons and the Florida States, we can find out what it takes to have such a great program as those schools. It's a tremendous challenge to play these teams."

The Bulldogs are a vastly different team than the one that suffered setbacks in their first three challenges of this season, beginning with a 21-14 loss to Mississippi State and then those one-sided whippings by Wyoming and Houston.

With Hines (94-of-195 for 1,073 yards, five touchdowns) directing the way in his first full season as a starter, the offense is playing with much more confidence.

Lifford Jackson, a senior wide receiver, is the team's No. 1 receiver with 30 receptions for 401 yards and two touchdowns, 17 of those catches and 251 of those yards coming in that thrilling win against Kansas State; Ruston native Bobby Slaughter has 24 catches for 322 yards.

Junior Derrick Douglas leads the rushing corps with 321 yards and a touchdown on 74 carries and has doubled as a consistent receiver (20 for 227 yards, two touchdowns).


On defense, which has been a Tech trademark in recent years, the marquee names belong to a pair of All-America candidates at linebacker: juniors Eldonta Osborne and Glenell Sanders.

Between them, they've been in on 153 stops, Sanders already having recorded 90. Osborne has 63 tackles.

"We're getting better and we're gaining more confidence every game," Peace said. "But we've still got a long ways to go. We've got to be more consistent. We've got to be able to put four quarters of good football together."

Peace certainly wouldn't mind if the Bulldogs started doing that against Florida State today.





Earlier this season, life was not kind to Jason Kuipers. Following a stellar junior campaign in which he started every

game at tight guard, Kuipers began 1988 at center for the first time in his collegiate The season began disas-

trously for the Seminoles with a 31-0 loss to Miami, and the offensive line, including Kuipers, took much of the blame. It was easy for fans and media, uneducated in the world of blocking schemes and blitzes, to criticize.

But Florida State coaches saw a slightly different story on film. They saw Miami use entirely new defensive sets which had even the coaches confused. They saw Kuipers



defense than the one they had studied on film. "Physically, Kuipers can block as good as anybody we've

had at the position (center)," FSU Head Coach Bobby Bowden said after the game. If Miami does as we thought it'd do, he's okay."

Kuipers switched to center the previous spring after the graduation of Mark Salva. Although all positions on the offensive line might seem the same, the differences between guard and center are dramatic.

"The center comes up to the line and calls the defense, the blocking scheme, snaps the ball, and handles the noseguard," Kuipers explained.

After starting the first four games of the season at center, the emergence of Michael Tanks at that position allowed Kuipers to return to tight guard in the Tulane game. He and Joey Ionata are the only offensive linemen to start every game this season. Now, Kuipers and tight tackle Pat Tomberlin, who is also his roommate, form a formidable wall on the tight end side of the ball. Kuipers admitted he was glad to make the switch back to guard.

"I feel a little more comfortable at guard," he said. "The big difference is that guard is a little more physical. You get a lot more speed going when you have collisions. That's the thing about guard. You take on a safety one play, a tackle the next play, and then maybe a linebacker the next. Working next to Pat doesn't hurt."

In Kuipers first game back at tight guard, Florida State gained 434 yards on the ground, including 212 by tailback Sammie Smith. That showing reminded FSU coaches and fans of some of the offensive performances of a year ago when the Seminoles racked up 2,995 yards rushing and 2,366 yards passing en route to an 11-1 season and number two national ranking. Highlights of the season for the offensive line were Smith's 244 yards on 19 carries against East Carolina, and Dayne Williams' 15 touchdowns on the famous "Wham" play during the season.


Following the season, Kuipers was an honorable mention All-America choice by the Associated Press. The previous season, he was a third-team All-America selection by The Sporting News. In both years, the FSU running game was extremely effective, but so far in 1988 the passing aspect has excelled.

"Most people think of pass blocking as passive, but (Offensive Line Coach Wayne) McDuffie teaches an aggressive pass-blocking scheme," Kuipers explained. "Besides, a good passing attack makes it easier to run. Michigan State had a great rushing defense, which is a good reason to have a balanced offense. Why beat your head against a wall when vou can pass over it?"

It's become almost cliche to say offensive linemen are overlooked because they do not have statistics to back up their performances. But it's also true. At Florida State, coaches have their own statistics for offensive linemen — it's called Coach McDuffie's grading system. Kuipers explained the somewhat complicated system.

"For each offensive play, you judge technique and you judge whether the job was accomplished," he said. "From that you get either a plus grade or a minus grade. A normal good performance would be a double plus. Then you can get



Athletes command a unique position in American society and in societies throughout the world. Many view the athlete as a hero who strives for perfection. The public expects excellence, and to achieve these high standards and thereby maintain public favor, the athlete must maintain peak alertness, responsiveness, efficiency and coordination.

A small segment of the athlete population has resorted to the use of drugs (e.g., anabolic steroids, amphetamines and various "street drugs") purported to improve physical performance. The decision to use drugs to improve physical performance, for the most part, has not been based on sound information and could have dire physical consequences for involved individuals. Further, such usage violates NCAA ethical principles.

The ethics of sport need to be emphasized, particularly in that taking drugs to improve performance constitutes cheating. There is need to reemphasize the fact that the important thing in sport is to compete honorably; to win at all costs is a contradiction to the meaning of sport.

The athlete should not carry all the blame for the situation. Coaches, trainers and the medical profession need to share some of this burden, as does the public, for expecting and frequently demanding a winning effort every time.

Society has placed a number of demands upon the athlete. If one believes that athletes and the general public will make sound judgments most of the time when provided with the necessary information, educating athletes and others about drug effects, appropriate drug use and the skills needed to cope with such problems could have substantial benefits to the individual and to society.

88-89 Lady Seminoles Making Bold Impression

On the verge of her third season at Florida State University, head women's basketball coach Marynell Meadors is using the word **BOLD** when speaking of her team.

She says it is a **bold** new team, and by the looks of their **bold** new gold uniforms, that's certainly true of their attire on the court. She also says this team will make a bold statement about the future of women's basketball at Florida State.

Although Meadors has struggled through two frustrating years, the Lady Seminoles are right where they want to be. All 16 players on the current roster are products of the Meadors recruiting process. They are the kind of players who have totalled 381 victories in an 18-year career for the soft-spoken, sandy-haired native of Nashville. Tenn.

Looking down the roster of her 1988-89 club, Meadors has a problem, though. She can't decide on a starting five for the opening Lady Sunshine Classic to be played or Orlando, beginning November 26. To Meadors, that's not a problem.

"When you can't name a starting five," Meadors said we. The team is 10 or 11 deep right now and that's just


"That's a good problem to have. The team is 10 or 11 deep right now and that's just sophomores and up. Our freshmen are untested, but have great credentials."

Two banner recruiting years have bolstered the Lady Seminole lineup into one which Meadors claims will be a running and defensive club.

"Florida State will have speed in the open court this season," she said. "We are going to press and we are going to run. With the excellent depth we possess, we will be able to utilize this type of game."

Last year's newcomers saw a considerable amount of playing time with four first-year players playing in 20 or more games each. Senior captain Bev Burnett, the leading scorer in the Metro Conference with 21.3 ppg last season, returns to anchor the Lady Seminoles. Burnett, who has been accustomed to handling a majority of the scoring chores for FSU, will not feel quite as heavy a burden this season, according to Meadors.

"This will be a balanced scoring team with the ability to average more than 73 points a game," she said. "We will be able to score points from all around the court. We won't have to look for Bev or Chris Davis (sopho-

more who averaged 12.7 ppg last season) to do all the scoring for us this year."

Burnett has no queries about relinquishing the scoring

duties to some of her teammates this season.

"When you look at most championship teams," Burnett said. "They have scoring coming from all around the court. Everyone has to chip in for this team to do well."

To round out the scoring duties, Meadors brought in four newcomers along with the nine which arrived at FSU last season. The 1987-88 list of recruits was strong on quick guards and shooters, while the 1988-89 class consists of dominant post players.

The number one prize of the current recruiting haul was 6-3 junior center Maria Lardie, a transfer from Cuyahoga Community College in Cleveland, Ohio. Toss her into the middle with experienced 6-4 sophomore Sarah Grimes, and they form quite a team under the basket.

Lardie's speed will help the FSU defensive press with her track experience. At Cuyahoga, she advanced to the National Junior College Championships in track, competing in the 200 meter dash, 4x100 relay and the 4x400 relay. Grimes accumulated a considerable amount of playing time near

the end of the 1987-88 season and has added much-needed bulk to her lanky frame to suit her for under-the-basket play.

Team captain Bev Burnett led the Metro Conference in scoring in 1987-88, averaging 21.3 points per game. She returns to lead the Seminole offensive

The guard position is loaded. Meadors has even talked of running an offensive scheme at times which features four guards and a post player. As freshmen, Chris Davis and Robin Corn were perhaps the only rookie guard tandem in the Division I collegiate ranks. Davis, who fell to injury in midseason and missed eight games, came back to form near the end of the season, earning Metro Conference Player of the Week honors.

In the season's last game, in the Metro Tournament against Cincinnati, Davis led a furious come-from-behind effort to bring FSU from a 15-point deficit with 10 minutes left in the game, only to lose at the buzzer. Corn, surely one of the most dedicated and all-out players in FSU women's basketball history, returns as the lone player to start in all 27 games of the 1987-88 season.

There's more. Senior Robin Storey led the Lady Seminoles in three-point shooting last season, and is determined to improve on her efforts which saw her average 8.8 ppg. Sophomores Wanda Burns, who Meadors calls one of the quickest guards she's ever seen, and Kelli Test, a three-point threat, will be included in the rotation. Add incoming freshman Tanya Fowler of nearby Live Oak, who led the Big Bend in scoring, and it's an impressive cavalcade of guards.

At the forward position, Florida State will feature quick, jumping athletes who should make a difference in the pressing defense.

"We want to have the type of players on this year's team that will be able to rebound and be one of the first ones down the floor for a layup on the fast break," Meadors said.

Senior Aline Harvis is the epitome of that type of forward.

She was an integral part of the FSU defense last year. Starting in 19 games at center, Harvis was often outmatched in the middle. With the added height of the 1988-89 team, she

should be able to play her position

more effectively.

The rest of the forward troops are young, but have the perfect stature for the position. At 5-11, sophomore Karen Thomas has drawn raves from Meadors for her physical abilities, as has freshman Debra Collins, a former teammate of Thomas at Macon (GA) Southwest HS. Another freshman, 6-1 Tia Paschal will play the forward position now, but could be moved to a shooting guard in the future.

Thomas knows how big a part the forwards play in the FSU defensive efforts and knows there's always room

for improvement.

"We all must go a little bit further on defense," she said. "We all can shoot and score points, but the coaches stress there's always room for improvement on defense."

Following consecutive nine-win seasons, a number which Meadors is highly unaccustomed to seeing in the win column, the former Tennessee Tech mentor has finally assembled a group of players she is proud to present on the court.

"When a program is down, as FSU's was when I took over," Meadors said. "It takes four or five years to turn it around. My staff and I have worked to bring in the best players available, and we have signed 14 quality players in the last two years. Right now we have a good mix of players. They're awfully young, but that's the way I like to have it."

Team captain Burnett also sees the 1988-89 group as a different type of team compared to those of past seasons.

"I have seen much more cohesion in this group of players," said the Tallahassee native who is one of only eight Lady Seminoles to score over 1,000 points in a career. "This team is blending together very well. The cohesion will help us to be a better ball club."

The cohesion Burnett speaks of will come in handy when looking at the schedule Meadors has assembled for 1988-89. Besides twelve Metro Conference contests, three NCAA Tournament participants appear on the Lady Seminole slate (Alabama, Georgia and South Carolina). Intra-state games with Miami, Florida, South Florida, Florida A&M and Stetson are also featured. Florida State will compete in a pair of tournaments, opening the season at the Lady Sunshine Classic in Orlando on November 26. The following weekend, FSU will open its home season as defending champions of the Tallahassee Hilton Classic at Tully Gym.

In a bold prediction for the early 1988 season, Meadors has set a goal for her team. She wants them to match the nine wins of last season by the time Christmas break rolls around.

A bold statement by a team striving to excel.

freshman Casey Weldon, the question lingered though the 1988 spring practice and first few weeks of fall camp. Who would lead the '88 Seminoles against Miami in

the season-opener?

Bowden stuck with the veteran Ferguson against Miami, in what turned out to be a disastrous night in the Orange Bowl. Ferguson was the victim of most of the biting criticism of the team, with some state sports columns clamoring for his removal from the line-up. They unfairly compared Ferguson's performance in the first game of 1988 to his predecessor's success during 1987.

Bowden, sensing the wave to make a move, would have no part in the potential

controversy and publicly supported Ferguson.

Both Bowden and quarterback coach Mark Richt knew Chip has become a different player than the quarterback who led FSU to the Gator Bowl win four years

"There is no comparison between the way he has played this year and the way he played as a freshman," Richt said. "Now he recognizes a good play and makes more educated passes.'

Opposing defenses have made FSU beat them on the strength of Ferguson's arm, and the Seminoles have. He now ranks sixth in the NCAA passing efficiency

rankings, completing 64 percent of his passes.

Ferguson's performance has not gone unnoticed. In a crowded lockerroom after the Clemson game, Ferguson waited, patiently answering reporters' questions on how he had masterfully directed FSU's offense to a win in Death Valley. As he prepared to leave the lockerroom, a personnel director from the East-West Shrine Bowl approached him.

"Chip," he barked over the loud cheering in the FSU lockerroom. "I wanted to let you know you are one of my finalists to play quarterback on the East team in the East-West Shrine game. You played a great game today and I will keep in touch."

For Ferguson, it was all in a day's work — just his way of chipping in.







Public Telephones: Public Telephones are located on the ground levels of both the east and west stands.


Lost and Found: Items may be turned in or claimed at the police station, which is in the stadium's southeast corner.

The improvement has been noticeable. Hadley is the leading tackler among outside linebackers with 23 through six games in 1988. He currently ranks eighth on the team overall with eight solo tackles and 15 assisted stops. He has also interfered with three passes.

"John is improving at bandit," Gladden said. "It is a tough transition for him, but I really see him starting to come around. His attitude has always been good and he is an intelligent guy. The only way for him to get better now is to play. We are gong to let him do that."

Fighting off injuries, position changes and a difficult adjustment period. Hadley is coming into his own as the Seminole bandit.




Fall Convocation: The Revival of an FSU Tradition

radition is the lifeblood of academia.

Time-honored customs are the glue that bind the faculty, the administration, the students and the alumni of an academic institution.

Florida State University is steeped in traditions, the product of its 135-year heritage.



Florida State University President Bernard F. Sliger presided over the August 25 Fall Convocation, the first one held at FSU since the 1960s.

On August 25, faculty, staff, students, members of the administration, alumni and friends of one of Florida's oldest universities gathered at the Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center to forge and renew ties that will bind them together in the years ahead.

Fall Convocation, revived in 1988 after a 20-year hiatus, began in the 19th century. The purpose is to imbue incoming students and faculty with a sense of pride in their university.

The gathering continued until the 1960s, when student enrollment exceeded the

number of seats available at any auditorium on campus. The executive council of vice presidents advocated re-establishing the ceremony in 1988 to give students and alumni a

greater appreciation or FSU's academic and historic traditions.

FSU President Bernard F. Sliger presided over the 1988 edition of the fall convocation. He shared the podium with Dean Werner Baum of the College of Arts and Sciences; Dr. Leo Sandon, president of the Faculty Senate; and Tallahassee attorney Ken van Assenderp, chairman of the national FSU Alumni Association.

Speaking to an audience that included 140 faculty members in academic regalia, Baum received a standing ovation for his keynote address.



The difference. Baum said, is: "Wisdom means the ability to see connections among apparently nonrelated facts. Wisdom means the ability to analyze, to synthesize, to deduce and to infer. It is these competencies which will enrich your life in numerous ways, which will make you a thinking and thoughtful creature, which will make you self-sufficient."

Sandon, a professor of religion, newspaper columnist and self-described "humanist," spoke to students about their responsibilities in

the university community.



Ken Van Assenderp, chairman of the Florida State University National Alumni Association, spoke to students, faculty and alumni about the vast network of FSU alumni across the nation and the world.

"To be a responsible student," Sandon said, "is to recognize that freedom is the freedom of one who acknowledges one's responsibility to justice and public order; to oneself; to fellow students, their rights and interests; to the university, its rules, regulations and traditions; to parents and teachers, and any and all others whose support makes higher education possible; to taking advantage of sound training and continuing the process of education toward the end of self-fulfillment and social service."

Van Assenderp said entry into Florida State University plunges the student into a world-wide network of more than 140,000 graduates.

Being an FSU graduate, "has helped me in London, England. Being a Seminole has helped me in Tokyo, Japan, all over the United States and in every county in this state. It is an experience worth sharing," Van Assenderp said.

"People who hold major seats of responsibility in business, in the media and in government share what some of you are beginning to learn tonight, and that's the FSU tradition," he continued.

Dean Werner Baum of the Florida State University College of Arts and Sciences delivered the keynote address at the Fall Convocation, held at the Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center.

Interwoven among the addresses were arrangements by the Marching Chiefs and by a choral ensemble from the School of Music. The final touch was the presentation of an FSU medallion to Sliger by the Alumni Association, something the group will do for each of the current president's successors.

Susan Lazier, the university's special events coordinator, who organized the event, said, "Faculty response exceeded expectations."

Plans are already being formulated for the 1989 convocation.







an additional plus for great extra effort and one for intimidation. Four plusses is a perfect score."

Needless to say, all the players are striving for the perfect score. They also try to avoid penalties and any minuses. For each penalty, the offender is assigned five stadiums (sprinting the Campbell Stadium steps) and for every minus 10 up-downs (drills where players drop to the ground, do a push up and get to their feet again).

While playing for McDuffie is not easy, Kuipers has respect and understanding for his coach and his methods.

"I've always liked and respected him myself," the 6-3, 260 pound Kuipers said. "He's kind of a rough guy to play for, very demanding and intense. Some players couldn't adjust, but he does it to make you a better player and person."

In addition, McDuffie's style helps his players develop the mental toughness necessary for success in football. Few people question Kuipers' mental, or physical toughness. He has a reputation as a perfectionist who is his own worst critic.


"He puts enough pressure on himself without me putting more on," said his coach. "He's almost a perfectionist."

Kuipers has his own philosophy on what it takes to be a winner and to make it in the world of "big-time" collegiate football. He takes that philosophy into every game and practice.

"Games are won and lost in the third and fourth quarter, where desire, stamina, heart and conditioning make the difference," he said. "The best competitor will put out that extra effort late in the game and make the difference. There are some really talented guys who have a lot of ability, but end up getting beat late in the game because they don't have the mental toughness."

Although his senior campaign started slowly for the Winter Haven native, Kuipers used his mental toughness to play through his problems at center, willing to sacrifice his comfort for the team good. Now back in his familiar tight guard position, he is showing opponents how physically and mentally tough Seminole offensive linemen can be, while leading FSU back to the top of collegiate football.


