





academic program. Auburn's undergraduate program is composed of 12 main academic units, including seven

colleges and five schools, offering degree options in 140 areas. The Graduate School administers 67 advanced degree programs at the master's, specialist and doctoral levels. Through its divisions of Instruction, Research, and Extension, Auburn daily touches the lives of every Alabamian and people throughout the nation and world.

Auburn's multi-million dollar plant on the main campus is composed of 67 main buildings located on 1,876 acres.

The city of Auburn, in Lee County, was incorporated in 1838. It is 50 miles east of Montgomery, 120 miles southeast of Birmingham and 125 miles southwest of Atlanta, Ga.

A branch campus, Auburn University at Montgomery (AUM), has been in existence since 1967 and has more than 6,000 students enrolled this year. AUM is located on a 500 acre tract in eastern Montgomery.

...Auburn fisheries geneticists have successfully incorporated growth hormone genes from rainbow trout into Asian carp, producing a fish that promises fast and efficient growth.

...Auburn recently topped the 2,100 mark in number of graduate students enrolled.

...Competitive contracts and grants for research at Auburn in 1987-88 totaled more than \$25 million.

...Auburn awarded over half the baccalaureate Engineering degrees in Alabama in 1987-88, and led the state in production of bachelor's degrees in Business and Education (by 330 and 198 degrees, respectively).

... Auburn's "Old Rotation" experiment, the nation's

oldest cotton study, was selected for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places in 1988. The experiment, which includes rotations of corn, cotton, and legumes, was established in 1896, just 13 years after establishment of the Alabama Agricultural Experiment Station.

...Auburn English Professor Pat Morrow has been awarded a Fulbright Scholar Grant for research in Oceania authors at the University of the South Pacific in Suya, Fiii

...Since its founding in 1856, Auburn has awarded over 130,000 degrees, and there are more than 115,000 Auburn alumni.

...Auburn's Air Force ROTC detachment recently received the Air Force's Organizational Excellence Award, bringing to four the number of times it has been so honored.

...Effects of atmospheric pollutants such as ozone and acid rain on pine tree growth are being determined in a unique Auburn research facility that manufactures the pollutants and pumps them into plastic towers where trees are growing.

"Ugly" Magic

Joseph adds dimension to Auburn offense

he Ol play "Josep seven.

he Ole Miss official play by play read, "Joseph carries, gain of seven."

But it was more than that. Much more. On that hot day in Mississippi of this season, James Joseph played football for the first time since the New Year's Day Hall of Fame Bowl. He had missed Spring drills, pre-season workouts and the Tigers' opener with Cal State-Fullerton due to a knee injury.

So, when he entered the game and lined up behind the quarterback, the fans in orange and blue leaned forward a bit in their seats; all eyes upon No.10. What would happen? Would the knee buckle? Would Joseph be as good as always?

His first carry was the play described above, and by the time the fourth quarter closed with the scoreboard flashing a final of 24-10 Auburn, there wasn't a doubt in anyone's mind. Joseph was back. He delivered in fine style that day, rumbling for 119 yards on 22 tries and one touchdown, earning Southeastern Conference Player-of-the-Week honors.

But, for this viewer, one who had never really seen Joseph run, that initial carry for seven yards told the story. It epitomized the style and attitude of the senior from Phenix City.

The moment he took the handoff, No. 10 breathed life into a Tiger offense that had seemed lacking in some way. He didn't do it with exceptional quickness, breakaway speed or fancy moves. No, Joseph does it with good old-fashioned running. Head coach Pat Dye might call it "hard-nosed."

"Someone once told me after a run I had that it was 'the ugliest 10 yards' he had ever seen," says Joseph. "I guess that's the only way to describe my style. I'm not flashy like 'Lectron (teammate Darrell Williams). I'm not overpowering. I just try to play smart. When I'm on the field my main concern is to achieve our



offensive goal and get four yards or more. And, I want to bring enthusiasm to the game and my teammates."

Whatever the label, Joseph's running is something special. His presence on the field is a combination of intensity, determination, and spirit — all the intangibles that separate the great players from the good. Junior guard Ed King says that when Joseph is on the field, "the whole game changes."

The man himself, however, is humble. "Our line is really the key to my game," says Joseph. "If the guys up front don't do the job, then I'm not going to be successful. It's the same way for the quarterback. If he doesn't get the necessary blocking, then it's all for nothing."

Joseph's career has been filled with games comparable to that of Ole Miss, yet, there have been down times, too. Injuries have plagued his career. As a sophomore, he suffered a broken kneecap in the third game of the season and received a medical hardship. After that came broken ribs and a sprained ankle, both with which he played. And most recently it was knee problems that held him out of play. But, in some ways, he

has learned well from his pain.

"Being injured has

made me more aware of certain things," says Joseph. "I've learned that it's very important to think about life after football. I've thought about what I'd like to do when my playing days are over, and I've decided that I'd like to continue with football, as a high school coach. I think that would be challenging for me. "

For today's game with Florida State, however, Joseph will be the Tigers' starting tailback. He'll take the field with No. 10 on his back and he'll work that magic — "ugly" as it may be.

"There's no one we'd rather have in the game than James," says Bud Casey, Auburn's running backs coach. "He's one of a rare breed that has the ability to walk into an offensive huddle and raise the productivity of all his teammates. He's a motivational leader and an inspiration. He's a full grown man. On top of that, he's a student of the game with exceptional ability. He's got a real feel for the game. You can tell that by watching him run."

JAMES JOSEPH ON:

The origin of his nickname, "Bo-Peep": "After my mother had me, she was recovering in the hospital. My great uncle Carter came in to visit her and he said, 'Where's that little Bo-Peep'. It just stuck — people have been calling me Bo-Peep ever since."



Destined for Greatness

Cromartie successful as student and player

et's examine an Auburn success story — a story that gets away from the football field and centers on per-

Tim Cromartie came to the Plains in 1988, after earning Parade and USA Inday All-America honors at Godby Figh School in Tallahassee, Fla.



I got bours under my belt school-wise, and I really matured as a person. I thought about what I needed to do to play again, and I went after it. Now, I feel like I've accomplished something, and I'm making something of myself."

Defensive coordinator Wayne Hall has seen the steady rise in Cromartie's confidence. "I think Tim came in here and always knew he could play football," says Hall. "He wasn't always confident academically, though, and that has changed. He's seen that he can succeed in the classroom with hard work."

Cromartie's victory in the classroom is a tribute to the hard work of which Hall speaks. When he got to Auburn, he expanded his discipline, making it twofold to encompass more than just football.



The same drive that makes him lift weights and push himself physically, also makes him read that extra chapter, and strive for intellectual strength.

"I've always worked hard," says Cromartie. "I really picked up the work ethic from my high school coach (Mike Battles). When he came down to my middle school and asked us to sign up for football, I had never played before in my life. He taught me and worked me real hard. It rubbed off, and I adopted that kind of discipline. I think it helped me during my qualifying year to continue to get stronger and to succeed in school."

As a sophomore, Cromartie had a fine season, playing in all but one game and recording 12 tackles. It was more than most rookies could ask for, as he demonstrated the potential to be a dominant player in the Southeastern Conference. However, we won't be seeing any of that play this season, for Cromartie, on the advice of the Auburn coaches, has decided to red-shirt his junior year. He's listened closely to Hall, who says that the red-shirt year is "a luxury that gives the player an opportunity to get ahead in terms of football and school."

"There are two reasons I decided to take the red-shirt year," says Cromartie. "The first is that I really wanted to major in management and I felt I needed to concentrate on that. The second is that I feel the time will

It is a mature outlook. Most would be anxious to don the pads, line up and play ball. But Cromartie wants to be the best he can be, as a player, student and person, and has the foresight to see that this move will only be to his benefit.

"I think Tim will be a great asset to this team in the future," says senior defensive tackle David Rocker. "He is built like the prototype noseguard and has all the tools to become a great Auburn defensive lineman. He has speed, quickness and strength, and I think he'll go a long way in this program."

In two years, Cromartie grew up and came into his own as a person. He achieved success in the face of adversity. Academics, once his adversary, are now his ally. He's headed for good things in the future as perhaps a businessman. Football, once all-encompassing, is now a dimension of Cromartie; one of many. And he'll be, to use his words, "the best he can be" in that area, too. There doesn't seem to be much doubt that Cromartie is destined for greatness as an Auburn Tiger — he's only a red-shirt vear away.

"There are no secrets out there..."



hen A offen Florid

hen Auburn scored on its last offensive play to defeat Florida, 10-7, a year ago, some people saw it as luck.

Others saw it as the culmination of all that Pat Dye believes in, as a man and as a football coach. And to Dye, the two, being a man and a football coach, go hand in hand.

Dye didn't see the touchdown against Florida as luck. Far from it. "I don't believe in miracles..." he said when asked about it in the post-game interview "...but I do believe in not giving up and having faith."

Not giving up, having faith and hard work have made Pat Dye the nation's fourth-winningest coach and Dye, in turn, has made Auburn one of the nation's premier football programs.

The victory over Florida was one of the biggest in a season in which Auburn won its third consecutive Southeastern Conference championship and its fourth in the nine years Dye has been head coach. Since 1982, no school has

more bowl games than Auburn. Auburn is clearly one of the nation's premier football programs, and Dye is clearly one of the nation's premier football coaches.

When he came to Auburn as head

When he came to Auburn as head coach in 1981, Dye made only two promises.

"We may not be the most talented football team in the country," he said, "but there is no reason we can't be the best conditioned and best prepared team..."

And, "We will give Auburn a football team Auburn people will be proud of, one that plays hard and plays with class and dignity..."

There is no doubt that the Pat Dye era of Auburn football has lived up to those early promises. It is the most successful era Auburn has ever known.


The Tigers have been to eight straight bowl games, six of them — including the last five — on New Year's Day. Auburn has been on television 53 times (36-15-2 record) during Coach Dye's tenure. In the

31 years prior to the Dye era, Auburn 32 times.

And fans are attending Auburn games before. Last season, 985,951 the Tigers play — 577,554 of coming to Auburn — an average of 2508 per home game. All three attendance figures are Auburn records.

When it comes to winning, Dye is say, "There aren't any secrets there." He knows that success comes good players and good coaches who the them better.

Dye's players are among the most mored in college football. He is one of coaches in history to have coached a Hesman Trophy winner (Bo Jackson, 1985), an Outland Trophy winner (Tracy Locker, 1988) and a Lombardi Award Rocker, 1988). Other coaches to that distinction are: Fred Akers Tetas), Woody Hayes (Ohio State), Tom Chome (Nebraska), Joe Paterno (Penn and Barry Switzer (Oklahoma).

Since coming to Auburn, Dye has content 19 All-Americans, 58 All-SEC players, 38 Academic All-SEC players and 57 of his players have been drafted play in the NFL, a number virtually matched in college football today.

Longevity has been a trait of many former Auburn football players in the professional ranks. Of the players drafted between 1981 and 1989, 35 are still on NFL rosters. More than half of those players still on active rosters have earned their degree from Auburn or return to school during the offseason.


Every player who has signed with Pat Dye at Auburn and has played at least four years has played on an SEC championship team. Dye is one of only four coaches in SEC history to win three straight SEC championships. The others are Paul "Bear" Bryant, General Bob Neyland and Vince Dooley.

Dye, the only active coach to have won three straight SEC titles, is going for his fourth consecutive this year. Only one coach and one school have ever won four straight SEC titles, Bear Bryant and Alabama (1971-75).

Pat Dye has always been a winner. He was an undersized All-America guard for Wally Butts at Georgia in 1959 and 1960 and he was an Academic All-American as a junior. He played on Georgia's 1959 SEC and Orange Bowl championship team and was an alternate captain of the 1960 Georgia team which played in Auburn for the first time.

His coaching career began at Alabama in 1965 when Bryant hired him to replace current Crimson Tide head coach Gene Stallings, when Stallings left Tuscaloosa to become head coach at Texas A&M. While at Alabama, Dye was a part of five SEC championships and two national titles. Dye's recruiting and his coaching of the linebackers contributed greatly to one of Alabama's most successful football eras. He coached four All-America linebackers at Alabama.

Dye became a head coach in 1974, leaving Alabama for East Carolina,

where he compiled a 48-18-1 record in six seasons and had the Pirate program on par competitively with traditional rivals in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

After one year at Wyoming in 1980, in which he led the Cowboys to a 6-5 record — their first winning season in eight years — Dye came to Auburn in 1981. The rest is a matter of record.

He has led — and is leading — Auburn to its most glorious moments in a long and storied history. Auburn tradition is being rewritten year by year.


Just as he believes there are no secrets to winning football games, Pat Dye believes there is no secret to success. There is only one way to succeed — work, hard work.

He learned the value of work growing up on a farm near Blythe, Ga., when he would get up before daylight to do his chores so that he could walk to school and practice football — work, hard work.

Auburn's values are Pat Dye's values. As it says in the Auburn Creed, written by Dr. George Petrie, Auburn's first football coach, "I believe only in what I earn, therefore I believe in work, hard work..."

Pat Dye and Auburn are a great pair, a matched set. Since they have been together, there have been many memorable Saturdays for Auburn football fans.

And there are more to come.

If you left home this morning looking for some of the best college football has to offer, you've come to the right place.


First of all, you'll be viewing

the game from your seat in the fifthlargest on-campus stadium in the country. On a football Saturday in Auburn, better than 85,000 people become your closest friends and neighbors.

Want more? How about watching a game between two of the top five winningest football programs in the nation over the last three-and-a-half seasons?

The Auburn special teams had a Vandy, scoring two touchdowns.

Since the start of the 1987 season, Miami, Florida State, Notre big game against Dame, Nebraska and Auburn — in that order — have piled up more victories



than any teams across the land.

Still not enough? Look toward the sidelines. Either one will do. Auburn's Pat Dye has the fourth-best winning percentage among active Division 1-A head coaches. Florida State's Bobby Bowden, who is going for his 200th career victory today, is fifth on that same list.

Since Dye arrived at Auburn in 1981 the Tigers and Seminoles have met six times. The split? Dye and Auburn three wins. Bowden and Florida State three

If you can't be moved by Auburn's Tiger Walk or Florida State's Chief Osceola and Renegade planting a flaming spear at midfield you've had your emotions surgically removed.







The Next Plateau

Auburn looks to reach new heights

urn on your television set on Sunday afternoons in the fall and chances are you'll see a former Auburn football player laboring for your favorite team in the National Football League.

By the same token, turn on that same television set just about any night during the summer and you'll either see or hear about the exploits of former Tiger baseball players.

Think a minute. Can you name the 1989 American League Rookie of the Year? How about the Most Valuable Player in the 1989 Major League All-Star

Frank Thomas earned *Baseball America's* Minor League Player-of-the-Year honor for the 1990 season.

Game? Both are former Tiger pitching and hitting stars, respectively.

A first-round draft pick after his junior season at Auburn, Gregg Olson zipped through the Baltimore Orioles farm system on his way to being named the American League's Rookie of the Year. Bo Jackson homered in his first All-Star at-bat, a 550-foot shot that led to his being named the game's MVP.

Players like Olson and Jackson, along with 1989 first-round pick Frank Thomas have taken the Auburn baseball program to what Coach Hal Baird calls the "plateau."

"Right n o w we're at a

plateau and trying to take that next step," Baird said. "We've become an upper division team, but it's time to become contenders for a title.

"Those first steps came with players like Bo Jackson, Gregg Olson and Frank Thomas," Baird said. "Those are the names that most frequently come to mind, but there have been a host of players who have been instrumental in getting us over the hump.

"Every time someone picks up a big-league baseball publication there's an Auburn player in it," Baird said.



Auburn baseball coach Hal Baird will be looking for his seventh-consecutive 30-win campaign on the Plains this year.

"You can't buy that kind of exposure and positive image for your program.


"It's nice when people relate the success of those guys with Auburn University."

In six years under Baird, the Tigers have notched six consecutive 30-win seasons, two 40-win campaigns, a Southeastern Conference championship and two invitations to the NCAA Tournament.

Last season, in spite of losing the top four pitchers in the rotation to injury, Auburn managed a 34-24 record and a fourth-place regular-season finish in what is fast becoming the toughest conference in collegiate baseball.

"We were disappointed that we didn't compete for a title last season," Baird said, "but looking back realistically we

"To finish fourth in the Southeastern Conference

without our top four pitchers was an accomplishment and says something about our kids," Baird said. "They just kept battling when a couple of times it would have been easier to fold the tents."

According to Baird, competing for an SEC championship in '91 will be the most challenging test to date for the Tigers. The league returns a national champion (Georgia) and two more College World Series teams (LSU and Mississippi State).

"I believe the SEC has been the best conference in the country from top to bottom for a while now," Baird said.

"The days when a team from the SEC wins 50 games in a regular season are about gone.

"Everybody in our league has full coaching staffs, outstanding players and good facilities. In fact, the balance of power in college baseball is probably turning toward the traditional South. Five of the eight teams in the College World Series last year were from our region."

So how do Baird and his staff gear up for the 1991 challenge? The answer lies in the return of three of those top four pitchers who were injured last season.

Right-hander John Powell was 5-0 as a true freshman when a broken ankle ended his season. Left-hander Scott Renner won nine games as both a sophomore and junior before shoulder surgery forced him to the sidelines before throwing a pitch in 1989. Jason Johnson, a 6-foot-5 right-handed freshman, underwent an elbow operation following fall drills.


"Pitching will be the most improved area on our club," Baird said. "Those guys coming back are going to be a big boost."

The biggest area of concern, however, will be finding someone to handle those pitchers. Tim Edge, an All-SEC catcher last year, was drafted and signed with the Pittsburgh Pirates in June.

"We feel very good about our situation in both the infield and the outfield, but replacing Edge is going to be a major task," Baird said. "We may have to go with a freshman behind the plate, and that's like having to win in football with a freshman quarterback."

But winning is something that Auburn baseball people have grown accustomed to, and if history tells us anything about the future, then "Baird's Boys" will be at the SEC Tournament in Baton Rouge





An Overnight Celebrity

Campbell gains stardom on one play

t's second down and seven for Alabama at its own 42-yard line. Auburn is leading, 7-0, in Jordan-Hare Stadium, on Dec. 2, 1989. Tide quarterback Gary Hollingsworth drops back to pass, is pressured by David Rocker and looks to tight end Lamonde Russell.

The pass is incomplete.

Now, it's third and seven. On the Tigers' defensive line are Fernando Horn, Walter Tate, Craig Ogletree and Mike Campbell. A play earlier, Campbell was virtually unknown to Auburn fans. Hollingsworth calls the play, drops back to pass, looks and...The Sack. No. 98 for Auburn makes The Sack, stands up and throws his arms above his head.

Campbell, a defensive tackle, on one play, etched his face and name into Auburn football history.

"Right now, everything looks in slow motion to me when I think about that play," Campbell says.

The Sack has been pictured a number of times since — in newspapers, in magazines, on posters and on the cover of Auburn's 1990 football media guide.

"It was kind of a surprise to wake up the next morning with that picture in newspapers, posters and programs," Campbell says. "What's so funny is that I still don't even know who took the picture.

"I don't even have a copy of it. My parents do, but I don't."

Campbell became a celebrity overnight.


"It's really kind of weird how it happened," Campbell says.

"People and fans started writing me letters for my autograph, and it was a neat experience.

"At first, it didn't hit me. But when we were at the Hall of Fame Bowl, I received a lot of letters, and then it really hit me that a lot of people knew. It's s o m e t h i n g every high school kid dreams about."

Although he has received much fame from The Sack, C a m p b e l l d o e s n ' t acknowledge that as his biggest moment as a Tiger.

"The Tiger Walk for the Alabama game is my biggest thrill," Campbell, a senior, says. "Seeing that many people supporting your team and supporting what you stand for makes it exciting."



"What makes this game more unique for me besides being from Florida is that Auburn and Florida State were my final two choices on where to go to school," Campbell says.

"I even visited Florida State and went to practice and then came to Auburn. It adds more to me playing against Florida State."

Campbell, whose 38-inch vertical jump is the highest on the team, is gaining a reputation as the Tigers' specialist at blocking field goals. He blocked one each against Tennessee and Louisiana Tech.

"It's not a difficult thing to do," says Campbell, who stands 6-foot-3. "I just jump straight up in the air and hopefully block the ball. You line the guys up front



to take out the "The Sack," and the man where photo, that made you're going to Campbell an overnight jump. If not, sensation. the offense will knock your legs

out from under you.

"Even if I don't get one, the field goal kicker may look up and see me coming and feel the pressure and miss it."

Campbell's switch to Auburn has been a smooth one, one that he's glad he made.

"Every one of the reasons I transferred for have worked out for me," says Campbell, who came to Auburn in 1988 after two years at Evangel. "I came first for the school and second for football.

Also, I knew that I would play for Coach (Wayne) Hall and for Auburn's defensive line and for Coach Dye.

"A few months after I arrived, all this tradition was a part of my life. Everything I thought Auburn was, it's been that and more."

Four Tigers Earn Heisman, Lombardi and Outland Awards

Heisman Trophy

he John W. Heisman Memorial Trophy Award is presented each year to the outstanding college football player by the Downtown Athletic Club of New York.

First known as the D.A.C. Trophy, the award was renamed in 1936 for John W. Heisman, the first athletic director of the Downtown Athletic Club, a football player at Penn and Brown — and a coach for 36 years including tours of duty at Auburn (1895 to 1899), Oberlin, Clemson, Akron, Penn, Rice, Washington and Jefferson and Georgia Tech.

The bronze trophy was sculpted by Frank Eliscu, with the help of some Fordham football players who posed as models. Since the inception of the Heisman Trophy in 1935, only 10 schools — including Auburn — have had more than one award winner. Two Auburn players have won the trophy — quarterback Pay Sullivan, now a Tiger assistant coach, in 1971 and running back Bo Jackson in 1985.

Auburn is the only school where John W. Heisman coached that has produced a Heisman Trophy winner.

Six Auburn players have finished among the top 10 in Heisman voting — Jimmy "Red" Phillips sixth in '57, Ed Dyas fourth in '60, Jimmy Sidle seventh in '63, Tucker Frederickson sixth in '64,





Lombardi Award

The Rotary Lombardi Award honors the nation's top collegiate lineman each year as a tribute to the late legendary coach, Vince Lombardi. One of Fordham's "Seven Blocks of Granite" in the late 1930s, Lombardi and his fellow linemen brought recognition to a sometimes overlooked position.

The Rotary Club of Houston, today the largest Rotary Club in the world, sponsors the award and dinner that benefits the American Cancer Society. The award winner is selected from a commit-


tee of prominent collegiate football coaches, sportswriters and sportscasters.

In 1988, Auburn's Tracy Rocker captured the honor and also became only the eighth player to win both the Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy since the Lombardi was first established in 1970.

Outland Trophy

The Outland Trophy is presented annually to the nation's top collegiate lineman by the Football Writers Association of America.

Having originated in 1946, the award became an actual trophy in 1988 when Professor James A. Ridlon of Syracuse




University designed a bronze sculpture to replace the original plaque that had been missing for two decades.

The trophy is named for Dr. John Henry Outland, who was a two-time All-America footballer at Kansas before the turn of the century and proposed an award for linemen to match the New York-based Heisman Trophy.

One of the more light-hearted moments in the award's history occurred in 1958, when Auburn's Zeke Smith accepted his Outland Trophy by saying, "Thank you gentlemen for this Heisman Trophy — I mean Outland Award." Smith did this twice within 30 seconds.

Jordan-Hare Stadium



ntering its sixth decade and 51st year as the home of the Auburn Tigers,

Jordan-Hare Stadium continues to offer one of the nation's best environments for college football.

In its first half-century of service, Auburn had an impressive .815 winning percentage in Jordan-Hare Stadium (167-36-5) against the best competition in America. In Coach Pat Dye's years at Auburn, the Tigers have compiled an .870 winning percentage (53-8).

Even more amazing is that since 1983 when Dye's program became established, Auburn sports a 43-4 (.920 winning percentage) record at home. From 1952-61, Auburn won 33 consecutive games in Jordan-Hare. Going into the 1990 season, the Tigers' home victory streak stood at 15, last losing to Florida State in 1987.

Jordan-Hare Stadium is the fifth-largest on-campus facility (cap. 85,214) in the country and on football Saturdays at Auburn, it is the fifth-largest city in Alabama. A crowd of 85,319 witnessed last year's SEC championship game with Alabama, won by Auburn 30-20.

More than 70,000 season tickets were

sold this year — one which features seven home games including powers Tennessee, Georgia and Florida State.

Named for Ralph "Shug" Jordan, Auburn's all-time winningest coach with 176 victories, and Clifford Leroy Hare, a member of Auburn's first football team and a longtime chairman of the Faculty Athletic Committee, the stadium was first opened and dedicated as Auburn Stadium at the AU-Florida game Nov. 30, 1939, with a capacity of 7,440 fans.

In 1951, Jordan became coach of the Tigers, and the stadium that was to bear his name began a period of rapid growth brought about by the success of his foot-

ball teams. Fourteen thousand seats were added in 1955, bringing the stadium capacity to 34,500. The south end zone stands were constructed in 1960, and the stadium became a complete bowl 10 years later with an increased capacity of 61,261.


Named Jordan-Hare Stadium in 1973, it became the first stadium in the country to be named for an active coach. Jordan-Hare Stadium was enlarged for the fourth time to seat 72,169 fans in 1980 with the opening of the west upper deck,

scholarship donor level and press box.

Construction of the east upper deck was completed July 1, 1987. The \$15.5 million project added more than 10,000 seats and provided additional seating for scholarship donors. The stadium expansion also included 71 executive suites along the club level, a recruiting lounge and a reception room for Auburn football lettermen.

Since Pat Dye took over the Auburn football fortunes, more than 3.6 million fans have come to Jordan-Hare Stadium to watch the Tigers. In 1989, Auburn set a single-season home attendance record by drawing a total of 581,554 fans.

GATE PROCEDURES

Student gates open two hours before kickoff. All other gates open one and one-half hours before game time. No food and drink containers nor hard surfaced materials of any type may be brought into Jordan-Hare Stadium.

Bottles, horns, cans, thermos bottles, ice bags, ice chests, food, drink and any object related to the articles mentioned are prohibited. Gate personnel are instructed to enforce this rule in the interest of safety.

ALCOHOLIC POLICY AND PROCEDURE

Bringing intoxicating beverages into Jordan-Hare Stadium on game day is prohibited. All individuals entering Jordan-Hare Stadium, along with *any* articles in their possession, are subject to inspection by gate personnel.

Gate personnel (game operations staff, university police, sheriff's department or

security guards) will stop all individuals with sacks, purses, beach bags, binocular cases, thermoses and any other containers.

These individual(s) will be asked to open any sacks, purses, beach bags, binocular cases, thermoses, or any other containers. If the individual refuses to open the containers, the individual will not be allowed to enter the stadium.

Gate personnel will not take purses or other items for inspection. They will ask for the containers to be opened by the individuals attempting to bring them into the stadium. If the individual opens the container and gate personnel see any type of alcoholic beverage, the gate personnel then requests that the individual surrender any and all alcoholic beverages including soft drink cans or bottles to be left at the gate. Auburn University will not be responsible for items left at the gate. If the individual complies with the guard's request, then the individual may enter the stadium. If the individual opens the container, but will not surrender alcohol and/or container, the individual will not be allowed to enter.

Should the individual wish to return to his vehicle to leave the item and return to the stadium, this is permissible.

MEDICAL EMERGENCY

Should you need medical attention, notify the white-clad individual on the nearest concourse inside the stadium. DO NOT LEAVE YOUR SEAT. Contact the nearest white-clad medical staff member. Remain in your seat. That is the quickest way to receive medical aid.

DOCTORS

Doctors on call should leave the location of their seat at the WILL CALL window, which is located on the West side of the stadium. A number will be assigned and you will be paged by that number throughout the season.

UMBRELLA POLICY AND PROCEDURE

The use of umbrellas inside Jordan-Hare Stadium is prohibited.

Individuals that come to gates with umbrella(s) will be allowed to enter with their umbrella(s). Once inside, should these individuals open their umbrella, stadium personnel (game administration, university police, or security personnel) will go directly to the individual(s) and advise them of the policy. If the individual does not comply with the policy, he

or she will have the choice to give the umbrella to stadium personnel or leave the stadium.

CROWD NOISE

Excessive and uncontrolled crowd noise can result in a five yard penalty against your team. Please observe quarterback and officials' signals for quiet.

GAME PROGRAMS

The official program, *Auburn Football Illustrated*, is on sale outside the stadium and at selected locations inside the stadium.

ARTIFICIAL NOISEMAKERS

Horns and artificial noisemakers are not permitted in Jordan-Hare Stadium, according to an SEC rule. Stadium personnel have been instructed to pick them up at the gates.

TELEPHONES

Public telephones are located beneath the North, South, East, West and Upper East and West Stands.

LOST AND FOUND

Report lost articles to the Auburn University Police Department on Monday following the game. All articles found in the stadium should be turned in to the first aid room.

RESTROOMS

Restrooms for men and women are located on the concourse level beneath the North, South, East, West and Upper East and West Stands.

PUBLIC ADDRESS

Messages for the public address announcer are acceptable only for emergencies and must be approved by the director of game operations.

A Source of Pride Entering the New Decade

s you look around the Auburn campus, some of the results of our \$150 million construction program will be

obvious, especially in the South College Street area.

We are proud of the magnificent new addition to the Draughon Library, the new chemistry building, AU Hotel and Conference Center, Alumni Center and Athletic Complex. There are other less obvious but equally impressive developments at the university that I want to share with you.

Did you know, for example, that one of every four baccalaureate degrees awarded in Alabama in 1988-89 came from the Auburn campus? The 3,571 baccalaureate degrees represented 25.1 percent of the statewide total, according to the Alabama Commission on Higher Education.

Including master's, professional and doctoral degrees, Auburn awarded 4,189 degrees in 1988-89.

Also noteworthy, I think, is the fine record established by our alumni as they go into business and industry.

A survey published recently in *Fortune* magazine shows that Auburn is among the top colleges and universities in the nation in the number of graduates who are chief executive officers of Fortune 500 companies. No other school in the Southeast, public or private, has more.

The study, which polled former and current CEOs on their alma mater, ranked Auburn in a tie for 18th in the nation with Duke and the University of Virginia, with seven AU graduates leading major U.S. corporations.

They are Kenneth J. Barr '47, Cyprus Minerals, Denver, Colo.; Roger R. Hemminghaus '58, Diamond Shamrock, San Antonio, Texas; John T. Hartley '51,

Harris Corp., Melbourne, Fla.; Dwight L. Carlisle, Jr. '58, Russell Corp., Alexander City; J. Tracey O'Rourke '56, Varian Associates, Palo Alto, Calif.; Sam L. Ginn '59, Pacific Telesis, San Francisco; and Jack Moseley '53, USF&G, Baltimore, Md.

Another recent report ranks AU fifth among the 95 colleges and universities in the U.S. named to this year's John Templeton Foundation Honor Roll for Free Enterprise Teaching.

The Free Enterprise Honor Roll identifies schools that have "an institutional commitment to the traditional Western political and economic philosophies."


All four-year accredited colleges and universities are eligible for placement on the Honor Roll, which is selected annually through a survey of college presidents and academic deans at more than 1,300 educational institutions.

We can also point with pride at Auburn's record in keeping a quality education within reach of those who are academically qualified. Several recent articles have identified Auburn as a place where a student can get a quality education at a reasonable price. The university has been listed as one of the nation's top college bargains in "Best Buys in College Education," a book by former *New York Times* education writer Edward Fiske, as well as in *Changing Times* and College Cost Planner, a newsletter for high school guidance counselors.

AU has also been included in the "Selective Guide to Competitive Colleges," "The Dollarwise Guide to American Colleges," "Rugg's Recommendations on the Colleges" and "How to Get an Ivy League Education at a State University."


An aerial view shows the changing face of AU, with the most visible aspect being the new library addition.

he members of the Auburn University Board of Trustees are a mix of government, business and educational leaders from all geographical areas of the state. They represent a cross-section of Alabama leadership that gives the AU Board the right combination to lead the university into the decade of the '90s.

A statewide perspective is brought to the board by Gov. Guy Hunt, who is the ex-officio president, and State Superintendent of Education Wayne Teague, another member by virtue of his office. Governor Hunt previously served as probate judge of Cullman County and as state director of the U.S. Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Teague is a former member of the AU faculty and former superintendent of Auburn City Schools.

Michael B. McCartney presides over the board in the absence of the governor. A member since 1979, McCartney is a 1957 graduate and owns construction and asphalt companies in Gadsden.

A former president pro tempore of the board, R.C. "Red" Bamberg of Uniontown has served since 1956. A 1940 graduate, he is a former director of the Alabama Development Office and former state commissioner of Agriculture and Industries.

Emory O. Cunningham of Birmingham is a retired CEO of Southern Progress Company, publishers of *Progressive Farmer, Southern Living* and other magazines. Appointed in 1985, he is a 1948 graduate and received an honorary doctorate from AU in 1981.

John V. Denson of Opelika is an attorney and former U.S. magistrate. A 1958 graduate of Auburn, he has served on the board since 1980.

Bessie Mae Holloway, a retired Mobile County teacher and school system administrator, earned a doctorate from Auburn in 1983. Appointed in 1986, she is the first black and the second woman to hold a board appointment.

Robert E. "Bobby" Lowder of Montgomery, is a business leader in real estate and banking endeavors across the Southeast. A 1964 AU graduate and former president of the Auburn Alumni Association, he was appointed in 1983.

Opelika native W. James "Jimmy" Samford Jr., appointed in 1987, is a 1972 graduate, an attorney and a former presi-

dent of the Alabama Public Service Commission. He was also legal adviser to Gov. Fob James.

Morris W. Savage of Jasper is a past president of the Auburn Alumni Association and is an attorney in Jasper. A former Auburn football player, he is a 1958 graduate and was appointed in 1979.


James T. Tatum, appointed in 1983, received a mechanical engineering degree from Auburn in 1953. He later received a law degree and is an attorney in Huntsville.

Jack B. Venable, a 1961 graduate, was appointed in 1989. He is publisher of the *Tallassee Tribune* and has been a member of the Alabama Legislature from Elmore County since 1974.

From the Sugar Bowl to the Super Bowl

t is a fact, well documented, that Auburn Football is one of America's pipelines to the pros and a career in the National Football League.

Many of the players you see wearing orange and blue today are likely to move on to pro football and a career in the game they love, because, along with Miami, Auburn has had more players drafted by NFL teams the past seven years than any other college football program in America.

Auburn's current list of active NFL players is an all-star list of talent.

From Steve Wallace of two-time Super Bowl champion San Francisco to high-flying wide receiver Lawyer Tillman of the Cleveland Browns, to the versatile Vincent Edward "Bo" Jackson of the Los Angeles Raiders, Auburn is well represented in the NFL. More than 30 former Tigers play in the NFL.


Wallace, who predicts the 49ers to do what no NFL team has ever done, "three-peat" as Super Bowl champs, is the epitome of the successful football player.

Leaning on a work ethic learned at Auburn which he still reverts to when things aren't going well, Wallace climbed the ladder to the top of the Southeastern Conference in 1983 and was a member of the 1984 Sugar Bowl championship team.

Following that he earned a starting role on the San Francisco starting offensive line, paving the way for running back Roger Craig and protecting All-Pro quarterback Joe Montana on the way to consecutive Super Bowl titles.

"Auburn is a great school," Wallace said. "The people and the coaches gave me an opportunity to show what I could do, but don't think for one minute things were easy.

"My time at Auburn was wonderful, but the practices were tough and the drills were tough. Going through the program at Auburn, what they expect and demand of you, has helped me tremendously in

the pros both mentally and physically.

"I knew when I came to San Francisco that there was nothing I couldn't do," Wallace said. "I had made it through at Auburn, and I was prepared.

"The pro scouts and coaches feel that way, too," he said. "They have great respect for Coach Dye and the Auburn program.

Wallace came to Auburn with getting an education foremost on his mind and planned to take his football career one step at a time. Although he improved as a football player each day, he saw his grades slack off his sophomore year.

"When that happened, Coach Dye embarrassed me in front of the whole team," Wallace remembered. "From that point on I made sure to make the grades on and off the field."

Wallace recommends Auburn to any up-and-coming student-athlete.

"If you want to be a winner, Auburn is the place," he said.

"If you want to get the best out of your ability, go there.

"Coach Dye and his staff expect just one thing — your best.

"They always gave me a fair shot and that made me want to give my all every day.

"The things I learned at Auburn are so valuable. The principles instilled in me there I still throw back to when things

aren't going well. The things they taught me will always be in the back of my mind."

Wallace, who owns his own business, returns to Auburn to work on his degree when the 49ers aren't playing in the NFL playoffs or the Super Bowl. He is three courses short of graduating with a double major in mathematics and psychology.


When he retires from pro football, Wallace hopes to rekindle his love for football Saturdays on the Plains.

"I'm really looking forward to driving my RV motor home back to Auburn and being a big fan," Wallace said. "I can't wait to come out and tailgate."

Wallace is just one shining success story. There are more. Labeled as the "running back factory of the south" in the 1980s, Auburn processed backs like: James Brooks, a nine-year professional now with the Cincinnati Bengals; Green Bay's Brent Fullwood, the No. 4 overall pick in the 1987 draft who led Auburn to a 10-2 mark in 1986 and finished sixth in the Heisman Trophy balloting; and the explosive two-sport star Bo Jackson, entering his third season as a Los Angeles Raider after

War-r-r Eagle!!!

rom the dawn of recorded time, the eagle has been a symbol of power, majesty and myth.

In virtually every recorded civilization, from the earliest etchings of the cavemen to the modern day seal of the United States of America, the eagle has been used as a symbol of power and authority.

So it is with Auburn and its beloved and famed War Eagle.

Legend has it that football and War Eagle came to Auburn the same day, Feb. 20, 1892, when Auburn defeated Georgia 10-0 at Atlanta's Piedmont Park in the first real football game played in the Deep South.

According to legend, an Auburn student, fighting for Robert E. Lee in the Battle of the Wilderness, was left for dead in no-man's land, that stretch of earth between the two armies that belonged to neither friend nor foe. After the battle, all that was left alive was the Auburn student and a baby eagle — an eaglet. With the eaglet in his pocket, the wounded soldier eventually made his way back to friendly lines.

He later returned to Auburn and resumed his education, nurturing the eagle back to health and maturity. The man later joined the Auburn faculty and when the train departed for Atlanta that fateful day, the instructor and the eagle, known to all Auburn people, as "War Eagle" because of the circumstances which brought man and eagle together, were on the train.

As the game began, the eagle began to circle the field.

Looking skyward, the Auburn people said "War Eagle." Again and again, "War Eagle." Soon they began to chant it in unison..."-War Eagle." Then they began to shout it, "War Eagle!," and

college football has never been the same since.

At the end of the game, the old eagle, now almost 30 years old, collapsed and died on the playing field. War Eagle I may have died that day, but in the hearts and minds of Auburn people, he lives forever.

His name, War Eagle, is known around the world, wherever two or more Auburn men and women are gathered. His name is etched on Mount Sarabachi in Japan and on the Eiffel Tower in Paris, France.

His likeness resides on the moon, sent there by Apollo Astronaut Ken Mattingly, an Auburn graduate. It is said that wherever "War Eagle" is shouted around the world, another "War-r-r-r-r Eag-gull!" will be heard in response.

The spirit of that first War Eagle is embodied today by an eight-year-old

American Golden Eagle, nicknamed "Tiger," a female eagle which came to Auburn in 1986 from Land Between the Lakes, Ky.

Tiger weighs 11 pounds, has a wingspan of seven feet and the ability to grip with the power of 450 pounds per square inch. The average human has a grip of 20 pounds



per square inch.

Tiger lives in the second largest single occupancy aviary in the country, second only to the one at the world famous San Diego Zoo. She stays in her aviary adjacent to Jordan-Hare Stadium every day except on football Saturdays and during freezing rainstorms.

Monday through Friday, she is usually fed with Nebraska Brand Raptor Food, a mixture of horse meat, bone meal and grain. Saturday's meal consists of two live laboratory rats. She isn't fed Sundays.

Alpha Phi Omega, a non-profit service fraternity, takes care of Tiger. Contributions from alumni and the Student Government Association pay the annual cost of \$4,000 which is required to care for a Golden Eagle.

In addition to appearing at Auburn athletic events, Tiger makes hundreds of public and educational appearances each year in support of Endangered Species programs and of Eagle Restoration programs.

On any given day, as the sun rises in the east, Tiger may be found sitting on her perch with a gaze that seems to peer into the future as well as the past.

Her wings spread to greet the morning breeze. Turning her head from side to side, surveying her domain, she evokes emotions from Auburn people that mankind around the world has known for ages: pride, power, majesty and dignity—all elements of the Auburn Spirit.



From Heisman to Dye

The Auburn Tradition

ook around you.

When it comes to Southern Football, you are on hallowed ground. This is where it all began, a block and a half from here in the square between what is

now the student union building and Samford Hall on the hill.

Southern Football as we know it began here when Dr. George Petrie, an Auburn history professor, and Dr. Charles Herty, a professor at the University of Georgia who later pioneered the process by which paper is made from Southern pine, who were friends from their days at Johns Hopkins, challenged each other to a match in the new form of American soccer that was popular in the east and in the midwest.

The Deep South hasn't been the same since, certainly not during the months of September through December.


The team that became known as Auburn began preparation for that first game which was played in Atlanta's Piedmont Park Feb. 22, 1892 as a part of a celebration of George Washington's birthday. Auburn won, 10-0, and, for the most part, the team that became known as the Tigers has been winning ever since.

Auburn became one of fewer than 25 schools to win 500 games when it defeated Southern Cal, another of America's perennial football powers, 16-7, in the Citrus Bowl Jan. 1, 1987.

In becoming one of America's premier football schools, Auburn has developed a tradition, a spirit - a legacy -second to none. Some of the greatest names in college football have played for and against the Tigers, and Auburn fans are known around the world for their pride, dedication and loyalty to their beloved Tigers.

at Auburn from 1895-1899, and in 1971, the equally legendary Pat Sullivan became the first player to win the Heisman Trophy at a school where Heisman coached. The incomparable Bo Jackson duplicated that feat in 1985.

Bo knows football and like others before him, he chose Auburn. Bo knows.

Auburn players have won virtually every major traditional award college football has to offer: the Heisman Trophy, the Outland Trophy and the Lombardi Award. In addition to Sullivan and Jackson, guard Zeke Smith won the Outland in 1958 and Tracy Rocker, a defensive tackle, won the Outland and the Lombardi in 1988.

In the early part of this century, when



"Iron Mike" Donahue was coaching the Tigers, Atlanta sports editor Ed Danforth told the rest of the football world, "You are nobody until you have beaten Auburn...That is the place card at the head of the table."

Auburn has been at the head of the table many times during the last 98 years, in the Heisman era, the Donahue era, the Jack Meagher era, the Shug Jordan era


Terry Beasley (left) and Pat Sullivan were two of Auburn's offensive whizzes in the 1970s.

— especially in 1957 when the Tigers won the national championship, but the place card has never been more firmly entrenched at the

head of the table than it has during the Pat Dye era of Auburn football.

Dye's Tigers won four SEC championships during the eighties, more than any school in the SEC, including the last three in a row, 1987-88-89. No school has won more games, more SEC games, more SEC championships or been to more bowl games than Auburn has since 1982.


Auburn's first foot- 1937 when the Tigers played in the first and, to date, only postseason bowl game played on foreign soil, the Bacardi Bowl, also known as the

Larry says Auburn meant a lot to him then, and means a lot to him now. "It got me where I am now," Larry says. "I met a lot of good friends at Auburn that I still stay in touch with today. I'd tell anyone to go to Auburn. I'm just glad I was fortunate enough to play regularly at Auburn. I

still get chill bumps when I hear 'War Eagle.'"

This is a story about one of our own, Ron Stallworth. It is his story and his mother's story. As with most of us, this story of a mother and her son are so closely interwined it is as if they are one.

Ron Stallworth came to Auburn in 1984. Parade Magazine and USA Today named im National Defensive Player of the Year. He was a Parade and USA Today All-American. He had 60 tackles as a senior at Pensacola's Woodham High School, including three quarterback sacks and nine tackles for losses. He threw the shot and issues for the Woodham track team and he started at center on the basketball team. As a defensive lineman he was given credit for Woodham's 9-1 football season. In short, is was "All-World."

Ron entered a different world when he came to Auburn. The skills that had served im so well in high school, outstanding though they were, left something to be desired the college level. There was a lot of work to be done, and Ron Stallworth had to be one to do it.

There were some hard years and hard times, a redshirt year in 1984 and a less than ensational 1985 season when he made only nine tackles. Fans and the media were eginning to ask, "What's wrong with Ron Stallworth?" The term "bust" was being sed as in "Is he a bust?" Ron Stallworth had to hear the whispers, but he did the only he could do in order to succeed. He kept working and he never lost faith, not in meelf and not in his coaches. He just kept working and believing.

His sophomore year, 1986, was better — five starts, 61 tackles including 10 against Alabama. Potential disaster struck in the spring of 1987 when Ron injured a knee on the first day of spring training. Major reconstructive surgery was required, but by now, one at Auburn was writing Ron Stallworth off. They knew him too well. He was the right stuff,

He came back to have an outstanding 1987 season which included 13 tackles in the SEC championship game against Alabama. The next year was the same, another outstanding season, an All-SEC season, 13 tackles and four quarterback sacks against Alabama, one for a safety, the first in Auburn-Alabama history.

Ron Stallworth was a star on the football field, but he was a star in the classroom. He never made Academic All-SEC, but he was a star nonetheless. He did what student-athlete and every student should do — he took his classwork seriously. It tried, he worked, he learned and he progressed in the classroom just as he did on football field. He graduated with a management degree in five years, considered to mal' for a student-athlete.

On the day he was to have major reconstructive surgery, he surprised his professor by showup for a test hours before he was to check into the hospital. Stallworth was in pain and the sor was willing to make other arrangments, but Ron said, no, "This is too important."

Ron Stallworth, now a professional football player with the New York Jets, is a man. He was a good man long before he came to Auburn. Auburn only proved and refined the qualites that were already in his life, put there by his mother.

Maggie Stallworth never had the chance to get an education. From the time she old enough, she had to work in the cotton fields to support the family. From the grade on, she tried to go to school two days a week and work three, but it was exitable that she would have to leave school.

She may have left school, but she did not quit. In 1983, about the time Ron was beiding where to go to college, she enrolled in an Adult Basic Education Course.

For the next seven years, she went to school four nights a week and worked fullduring the day. This past June, almost 50 years after her dreams of an education areared to be over, Maggie Stallworth held a diploma — her diploma — in her hand. But she held more, much much more, in her heart.

ow important is a nickname to an athlete? Bo knows. His nickname is a household word these

days. Wouldn't it be hard to imagine "Vincent knows?"

"Go Bo go" was the word when Vincent Edward "Bo" Jackson was a Heisman Trophy winning tailback at Auburn. His freshman year at Auburn, *The Birmingham News* called him the sensational freshman running back Vincent Jackson.

That didn't last long. Bo was what he preferred, it caught on quick, and the rest is history. Whether he's breaking touchdown runs for the Los Angeles Raiders, slugging home runs for the Kansas City Royals, selling shoes for Nike or pushing AT&T, everybody knows Bo.

"I never really thought much about my nickname, because it's something I grew up with," Bo says. "Of course I would never take on a name just to make money. My nickname is special to me because it

is what my friends, my family and my fans call me."

Jackson admits that his short and catchy nickn a m e helped bolster his popularity.

" M y

name is Vincent, but I guess I'll always be Bo," Jackson says. "I want people to remember me for who I am and what I am, not for my name or the slogan, 'Bo knows.'

"'Bo knows' is a product of an advertising agency. Bo is a human being."

ball's most coveted award, the Heisman Trophy. When Auburn Sports Information Director David Housel asked what he wanted inscribed on the trophy, his reply was "Vincent Bo Jackson."

All nicknames are not as famous as Bo's, but Auburn football players still use distinguishing terms for each other.

Shouting "Bylsma," or "hey, Wayne," won't get junior linebacker Wayne Bylsma's attention as quick as "Clean" will.

Bylsma, who is bald, answers to Mr. Clean.

"I used to get called "Bald Eagle" all the time," says Bylsma, who has no hair due to a skin disorder. "When I started school here at Auburn, they started calling me Mr. Clean, and I think it's pretty funny. Sometimes I'll put a little earring in my ear and dress like him and talk like him. It makes all the guys

laugh."

Defensive back Alex Thomas says he earned his nickname.

"They call me The Hitman because I deliver furious licks on the field," Thomas says. "The fall of my sophomore year, the other defensive backs here gave me a name they thought would fit."

Thomas says his nickname was mainly a "team thing" until the fans started picking up on it and it hit the papers.

"It lets me know people notice what I'm capable of doing," Thomas says. "During the game, if I hear someone holler 'Hitman,' it really gets my blood going. I get that tingle."

Senior defensive tackle David Rocker inherited his nickname.

When Rocker came to Auburn, his brother, Tracy, now with the NFL's



Washington Redskins, was called "The Rock." David quickly became known as "Little Rock." Now that Tracy is in the pros, David is known as "The Rock" in Auburn.

"The same thing happened when we played high school football together," Rocker says. "It's a transition thing when I inherit the nickname

because it's such a good football name."

Little Rock was not David's first nickname at Auburn. He had problems getting his plays down as a freshman, and, in his words, "I kept messing up."

He was quickly labeled "Wrong Way Dave."

"Thank goodness that finally died out," Rocker says.

Florida State

At the dawn of a new decade, Florida State University is trailblazing toward a new century — exploring science through supercomputing, pioneering in Florida's growing film industry and scouting new avenues of cultural exchange in a world opening the paths of freedom.

Among the elite of supercomputing since obtaining its first high-speed computer in 1985, FSU took yet another step in ultrafast computing in 1990 with the acquisition of two supercomputers.

Expanding on its longstanding reputation in the performing arts and keeping pace with professional movie studios that have opened recently in Florida, Florida State is now the professional training ground for one of Florida's fastest growing industries, film production.

Florida State is a public, coeducational university and a senior member of the

State University System, founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by a legislative act.

The main campus is spread over 347

acres in Tallahassee; the University owns a total of 1,167 acres in Leon, Bay and Franklin counties. Within the state, FSU spreads west to its 20-acre campus in Panama City and south to its marine laboratory on the Gulf of Mexico and its film and theater professional training programs in Sarasota.

Florida State remains a growing institution — from its roots as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, through the early 20th century as the academically respected Florida State College for Women and its coeducational status as a university in 1947, to its modern development as an acclaimed research institution, a topranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and as a standard-setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts.

In all areas of teaching, research and service, Florida State University continues to be a pathfinder into the 21st century.

As long as he is willing and able, Bobby Bowden will be the head football coach at Florida State University.

Right after leading the Seminoles to their third straight New Year's Day victory and third straight top three finish, Bowden shunned any thoughts that he may leave Tallahassee by signing his name to a lifetime contract.

And that, ladies and gentlemen, sits very well with those who truly love the Seminoles.

Ironically, Bowden many years ago described his situation at Florida State as "a marriage." He was determined to "let no man put it asunder." True to his word, he is celebrating his 15th coaching anniversary this season with the tightest of all bonds with the school.

By the middle of this season, Bowden will become just the 11th football coach in major college football history to record 200 coaching wins in a career. With five victories he'll have 200; with six he'll move into the top 10 all-time; and with nine or more he will finish 1990 with just seven men in front of him on this list of legends that begins: "Bryant, Stagg,

Warner, Hayes, Schembechler, Paterno, Neely ..."

Only Penn State's Joe Paterno has won more games among active coaches.

Then there are the old sages of the game who say the true measure of a coach is how he fares in the bowls. "You give a guy a month to prepare and then you'll see what kind of a coach he is," they say. In that category, this man has no peers. He is the winningest bowl coach in

NCAA history by a mile. His 9-3-1 bowl mark and .731 percentage is light years ahead of every other coach who has appeared in 10 or more bowl games. Bowden's Seminoles have played in eight consecutive post-season bowl games without a loss over the span of 1982-90.

Bowden has proven through the years — starting with his assignment at FSU in 1976 — that he may be at his best when his back is to the wall. What all this winning has done for the coach is push his numbers into the realm of the legendary. Consider this:

Bowden's Florida State record is 122-40-3 (.748). That includes a 65-14-1 (.819) record in Tallahassee and a 57-26-2 (.682) mark away from home. He has built those numbers against some of the nation's toughest schedules. His road record alone includes a 5-1 mark at LSU, 3-1 at South Carolina, 2-0 at Ohio State, 1-0 at Notre Dame, 2-0 at Arizona State, 1-0 at Clemson, 4-2 against Nebraska and 2-0 at Syracuse.

Bowden and his wife, Ann, have four sons, Steve, Tommy, Terry and Jeff, plus two daughters, Robyn and Ginger.



Better Burgers

Researchers take fat out, keep flavor in

amburgers are as American as, well, football, but many health-conscious consumers have begun to replace this with lower-fat choices. But soon mburger lovers may be able to tackle a burger without a single twinge of

If that sounds too good to be true, just in the laboratory of Auburn profession. Dale Huffman, who is a meat sciening the College of Agriculture and a searcher with the Alabama Agricultural Experiment Station. He contends that

member Dale Huffman has led an effort to develop hamburger meat with ess fat and the same taste for consumers who want to hold back the fat not the flavor.

ground beef can be low in fat and calories, yet high in flavor and juiciness.

Huffman and Russ Egbert, a research associate, have developed a ground beef mixture that contains less than half the fat of normal burgers yet has the flavor consumers have come to expect.

"Typically ground beef at retail contains between 20 and 30 percent fat, and ground beef used in the fast food industry contains an average of 22 percent fat," said Huffman. He noted that many consumers want less fat.

Since the fat content of ground beef directly influences its flavor and juiciness, the development of a low-fat, highflavor hamburger is a highly complicated task.

Huffman and Egbert, supported in part by check-off dollars from the Alabama Cattleman's Association and the National Livestock and Meat Board, recognized the need for such a product and began developing a lean ground beef product.

Initial consumer studies showed that ground beef patties containing 15 percent to 20 percent fat had the preferred flavor, tenderness, juiciness and beef flavor intensity. These studies also found that consumers can detect differences in fat levels of as little as 5 percent and that ground beef patties containing less than 10 percent fat were too dry and bland.


Based on these results, the two scientists began to develop a ground beef product that contained less than 10 percent fat but still tasted good. Using a combination of low levels of flavor and texture enhancers (hydrolyzed vegetable protein and carrageenan) and salt, such a burger is now a reality.

"Fat gives meat flavor and contributes

to juiciness," said Egbert. He explained that carrageenan, derived from seaweed, has been used for years to add stability and texture to ice cream. It is used in the meat patties to hold moisture in the meat.

Hydrolyzed vegetable protein, a derivative of soybeans, enhances beef flavor, he added.

The burgers haven't hit the butcher shop yet, but they are receiving a great deal of attention. Since results of the research were released earlier this year, Huffman and Egbert have been inundated with inquiries from the meat industry and are actively working with meat processors to transfer this technology to the marketplace.

Auburn Astronauts

Toomer's Corner, The Universe...and Beyond

A

uburn University alumna Kathryn Cordell Thornton will remember last Thanksgiving less for the turkey she ate than

for where she was at the time — circling Earth in the shuttle Discovery.

NASA astronaut Thornton became Alabama's first woman — and the third AU graduate — to fly in space during her five-day mission beginning Nov. 22, 1989.

The Montgomery native, who graduated in 1974 with a degree in physics, was one of five crew members who flew the classified Department of Defense (DOD) mission.

"The best thing about my job is that I'm still learning things," Thornton says. "Every day is different and it's an exciting feeling to learn something new."

Thornton is one of four active-duty astronauts who have received degrees from AU among the 88-member NASA astronaut corps, ranking the university eighth among non-military universities in the number of astronauts who are graduates.

Active-duty astronauts besides Thornton include Henry "Hank" Hartsfield, formerly assigned to NASA headquarters in Washington, D.C. with the Office of Space Flight-Space Station and who recently returned to full-time astronaut duty at Johnson Space Center; Army Major Jim Voss, selected as a mission specialist for STS-44 on the space shuttle Atlantis in March; and Jan Davis, a mission specialist for STS-47, the Japanese Space Lab mission scheduled for launch in mid-1991.

Voss, an Opelika native who graduated with a degree in aerospace engineering in 1972, will be part of a five-member crew which will launch an early warning satellite on the unclassified DOD mission. Voss' responsibility on the mission will be to deploy the satellite, which will be used by the DOD to detect missile launches.

Huntsville native Davis, who graduated in 1977 with a degree in mechanical engineering, is one of seven crew members on the first primary mission with the Japanese government scheduled for

launch this summer.

The mission, nicknamed Space Lab J, will carry a Japanese model inside the payload area of the orbiter with materials science and life science experiments on board. Davis will be one of four mission specialists who will be working with the experiments.

Two other Auburn graduates have circled Earth and were the first two graduates of any one university to fly together. Alumni astronauts T.K. "Ken" Mattingly, a 1958 aeronautical engineering graduate (who has since returned to full-time duty in the Navy), and Birmingham native Hartsfield, a 1954 physics graduate, flew the fourth flight of the space shuttle

Columbia during a seven-day mission starting June 27, 1982.

Auburn's first astronaut was Clifton C. Williams, a 1954 mechanical engineering graduate from Mobile, who was selected for NASA's program in 1963. He died in a plane crash in 1967 while awaiting assignment to his first mission.

When she flew aboard the shuttle Discovery in late 1989, Kathryn Thornton became the first woman from Alabama and the first female Auburn University graduate to fly in space. She is one of four AU grads currently on active duty with NASA.

Auburn Basketball Outlook

Eagles Welcomes Back Four Starters

he revival of the Auburn basketball program began on April 3, 1989, when Tommy Joe Eagles became the University's 17th head coach.

When Eagles took over the Auburn program, he knew his mission wasn't an easy one. He inherited a ballclub which finished 9-19 in 1988-89, including a 2-16 mark in Southeastern Conference play. The prognosticators picked the Tigers to once again finish in the league cellar in '89-'90. But by season's end there were plenty of converts as Eagles fashioned a 13-18 worksheet against one of the nation's most difficult schedules. The Tigers climbed to sixth in the final SEC standings at 8-10 and Eagles' work earned him SEC co-coach of the year honors from the *Knoxville News-Sentinel* as voted on by his peers.


"Last year was the most satisfying season I've had in this sport," Eagles says, "especially when you consider what people said this team could and couldn't do. The players and my coaching staff had a lot to do with the progress we made because they were willing to pay the price. It was a very successful year, maybe not in terms of a positive wonloss record, but in terms of laying a foundation for the future."

This time around, the Tigers have greater expectations.

Eagles hopes a 78-76 win over 16thranked LSU in the SEC Tournament could have a carryover effect. A winning record and first-division finish could be within reach.

The Tigers figure to be nearly a carbon copy of last year's team. Nine lettermen, who accounted for nearly 80 percent of Auburn's points and rebounds a year ago, return. The small forward position ranks as the only vacancy to be filled in the starting lineup for '90-91, following the departure of Derrick Dennison (16.0 points, 4.4 rebounds).

Auburn's starting backcourt returns intact: sophomores Ronnie Battle and



Reggie Gallon.

Coach Eagles hopes Battle can pick up right where he left off last season. Battle became only the second freshman ever to lead Auburn in scoring after averaging 17.0 points in '89-90 (Eddie Johnson averaged 21.8 points as a rookie in '73-74). The 6-foot-1 shooting guard scored in double figures in 26 of 31 games, including 11 20-point games.

Gallon, a 5-10 playmaker, is the architect of the Auburn offense. As a rookie, he led the Tigers in assists (119, 3.8 per game), free-throw percentage (.773) and minutes played (35.1 per game). Gallon, who joined Battle on the SEC All-Freshman team in '89-90, scored in double figures on 15 occasions while averaging 9.8 points.

Yet another proven commodity in the backcourt is 6-1 junior walk-on Champ Wrencher (1.2 points, 0.3 rebounds).

Anchoring the Auburn frontcourt are returning starters Chris Brandt at power forward and Zane Arnold at center.

One of the unsung heroes last season was Brandt, a 6-6 junior who ranked as the Tigers' second-leading rebounder (6.5 per game) and third-leading scorer (11.7 points).

Arnold (8.2 points, 6.5 rebounds), a 6-6 senior, exerted himself during the second half of the '89-90 season. In SEC **Ronnie Battle** became only the second freshman ever to lead after averaging 17.0 points in 1989-90.

play, he averaged 10.7 points and 7.7 rebounds.

Robert McKie, a Auburn in scoring 6-5 red-shirt sophomore, must rebound from a knee injury if he's to unseat the incumbent center. McKie was sidelined

for 14 weeks last season with patellar tendinitis in his right knee. He started the first five games of the '89-90 campaign and averaged 11.6 points and 6.6 rebounds.

The small forward job is wide open with the loss of Dennison, Auburn's 14th all-time leading scorer with 1,070 career points.

John Caylor, a 6-6 senior, would appear to be the leading candidate based on his experience (39 career starts). One of the SEC's top sixth men in '89-90, Caylor (8.7 points, 6.8 rebounds) scored in double figures 12 times and had seven double-figure rebounding efforts.

Next in terms of experience are 6-5 senior Larry Patrick (3.5 points, 1.4 rebounds) and 6-3 sophomore Rod Joyce (1.1 points, 0.4 rebounds).

Other candidates include a pair of freshmen — 6-8 red-shirt Chuck Simms and 6-5 Wesley Person.

Simms averaged 13.9 points and 5.9 rebounds as a senior at Redan High School in Stone Mountain, Ga.

Person comes to Auburn from Brantley (Ala.) High School, where he averaged 33.6 points, 10 rebounds and four assists in '89-90.

The Tigers possess plenty of depth up front with 6-6 senior Richard Smith (0.6 points, 1.2 rebounds) and 6-8 freshmen Cameron Boozer sure to be added to the playing rotation.

Boozer averaged 26 points and 12 rebounds as a senior at Lanett (Ala.) High School while earning all-state honors.

"Depth could be a strength on this basketball team, but depth without performance doesn't mean anything. We need consistent bench production to compete for a first-division finish in the league. "







Women's Basketball Outlook

Lady Tigers Aiming For National Title Run

t didn't seem fair.

This was supposed to be a team of destiny, and the good fortune to which teams of destiny often cling had once again slipped through their fingers.

All-America guard Carolyn Jones sat in the visitors locker room at Thompson-Boling Arena in Knoxville, Tenn., at a loss for words. These Lady Tigers had survived an early season slump to win the Southeastern Conference Tournament and blast their way through the Mideast Regionals and into a third-consecutive Final Four.

Top-ranked Louisiana Tech proved no match on the first night in Knoxville and you could feel it around the Auburn practices and team hotel that Stanford was also going to fall. It was just supposed to happen.

A win over the Cardinal would make the Auburn Lady Tigers champions of the women's basketball world and put an exclamation point on a great comeback story. A team that had lost four of six games in December had a shot at being national champs.


Somebody forgot to tell Stanford. The Cardinal used a barrage of three-point field goals to beat Auburn 88-81 and make Joe Ciampi's Lady Tigers bridesmaids for the third-straight year.

Following the game, Ciampi struggled to find the words to soothe the hurt of young ladies who had left so much of their souls on basketball floors across the country, only to be denied again. It was there that the foundations for the 1990-91 season were laid.

"We've knocked on the door for threestraight years now," Ciampi told the troops, "and we're going to keep knocking and keep knocking."

Lowered heads slowly started to rise and teary eyes focused on the speaker.

"We've been here before and we'll be back again," Ciampi promised. "Next time it will be different, though. We've knocked on the door long enough. Next



time we're going to kick it in."

A sparkle started knocking on the to reappear in the championship eyes of four starters who would return to play another day.

The message had taken hold, and less than 10 minutes later junior point guard Chantel Tremitiere was heard repeating it

in front of a television camera. On November 24 the new season begins with the annual Auburn Dial Classic. Michigan, Grambling and Southern University will be guests in Auburn as the Lady Tigers tune up for another verse of the same song.

"To put the whole thing in perspective," Ciampi said, "our goal is to go to the top of the ladder and the national championship is at the top.

"To win it all continues to be our aim, but I'm very proud of our accomplishments up to now. Coming so close is what keeps us dreaming and working hard."

The 1990-91 climb toward the top starts with Jones. The Laurel, Miss., product returns for her senior season after a tour with the United States National Team that participated in the Goodwill Games in Seattle.

"Carolyn Jones had an outstanding junior season," Ciampi said. "Especially when you consider she was playing with all new players.

"She had to prove herself as a sophomore and made All-SEC. Then, after being left off every preseason all-star list, she had to prove herself all over again last year and did just that by being named a Kodak All-American. There's no doubt she has to be classified as one of the best players in the country."

The difference in last season and the upcoming one, Ciampi says, will be the three starters in addition to Jones who return to the Lady Tiger camp.

"What is going to help CJ, and the entire program this season, is that she has a supporting cast to go with her show. She understands that success is measured in wins, so she assumes the leadership role of a very talented team."

Forwards Kendall Mago and C.C. Hayden join Jones and Tremitiere in a lineup that is only a small forward shy of returning intact.
