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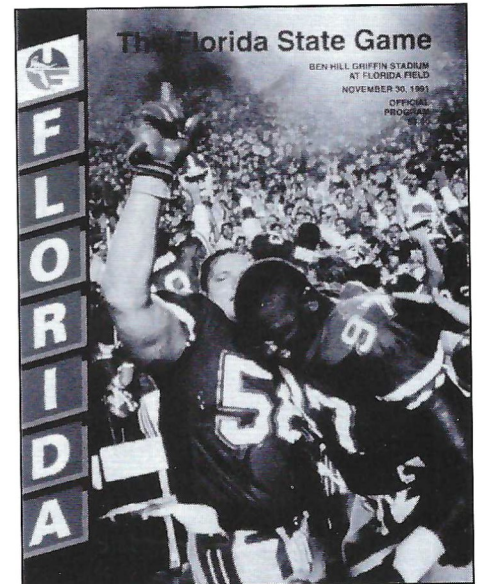

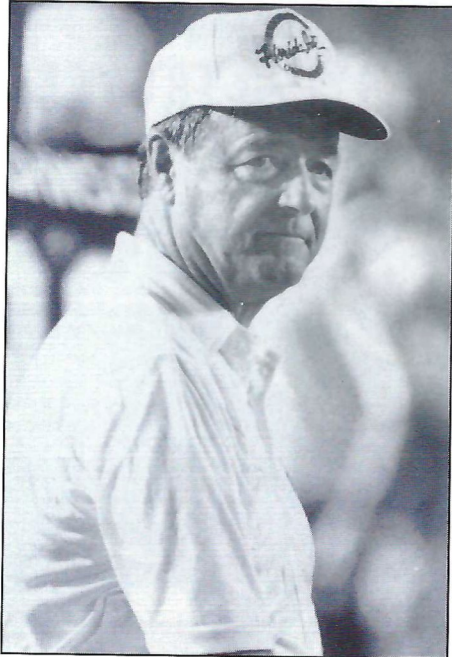

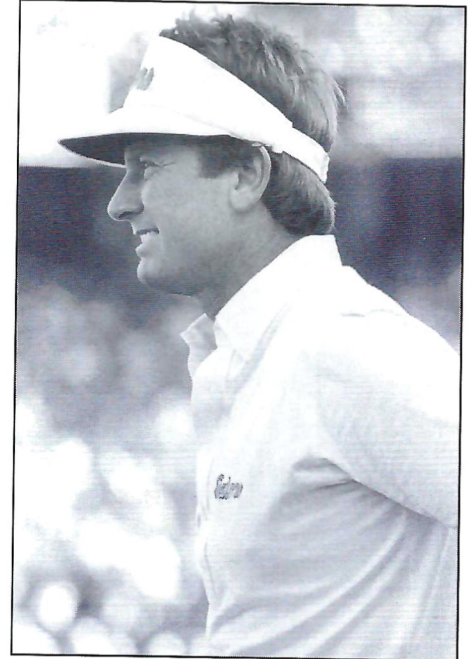

Just two days before the University of Florida was set to play arguably its most important game in history - vs. Kentucky to clinch its first official Southeastern Conference Championship—quarterback Shane Matthews and linebacker Gregg Diamond took time out to visit the Sydney Lanier School for the Handicapped in Gainesville. It was part of UF's "Goodwill Gators", a program which involves UF student-athletes taking part in a variety of community-related projects.

INSIDE THE NUMBERS

Florida looks to become the first Gator team in history to win 10 games...The 1991 Gator squad is looking to become the fourth team in school history to finish the regular-season ranked in the *Associated Press* Top 10. The 1983 (No. 6), 1984 (No. 3) and 1985 (No. 5) units previously finished among the nation's elite...Florida is the first Southeastern Conference school to post a 7-0 record in league play since 1977...In its seven conference games this season, UF outscored its SEC foes 226-74...Florida is 5-0 at Florida Field this season and has outscored its opponents 205-75...Since Steve Spurrier took over in 1990, UF is 11-0 at home and has outscored opponents 457-119...In 718 offensive plays this season, Florida has passed the ball 360 times and rushed the ball 358 times...Florida's defense has forced 29 turnovers this season, leading to 91 points over 10 games...RB Errict Rhett, who has rushed for 1,000 yards this season, has nine career 100-yard rushing games—all versus SEC opponents...QB Shane Matthews has been responsible for an SEC single-season record 29 TDs this season (27 passing, 1 rushing, 1 receiving)...DT Brad Culpepper enters the FSU game with 20.5 total tackles for loss this season, the fourth top seasonal total in school history and the best all-time seasonal total for an interior defensive lineman...WR Willie Jackson leads the SEC with 10 TD receptions this season.

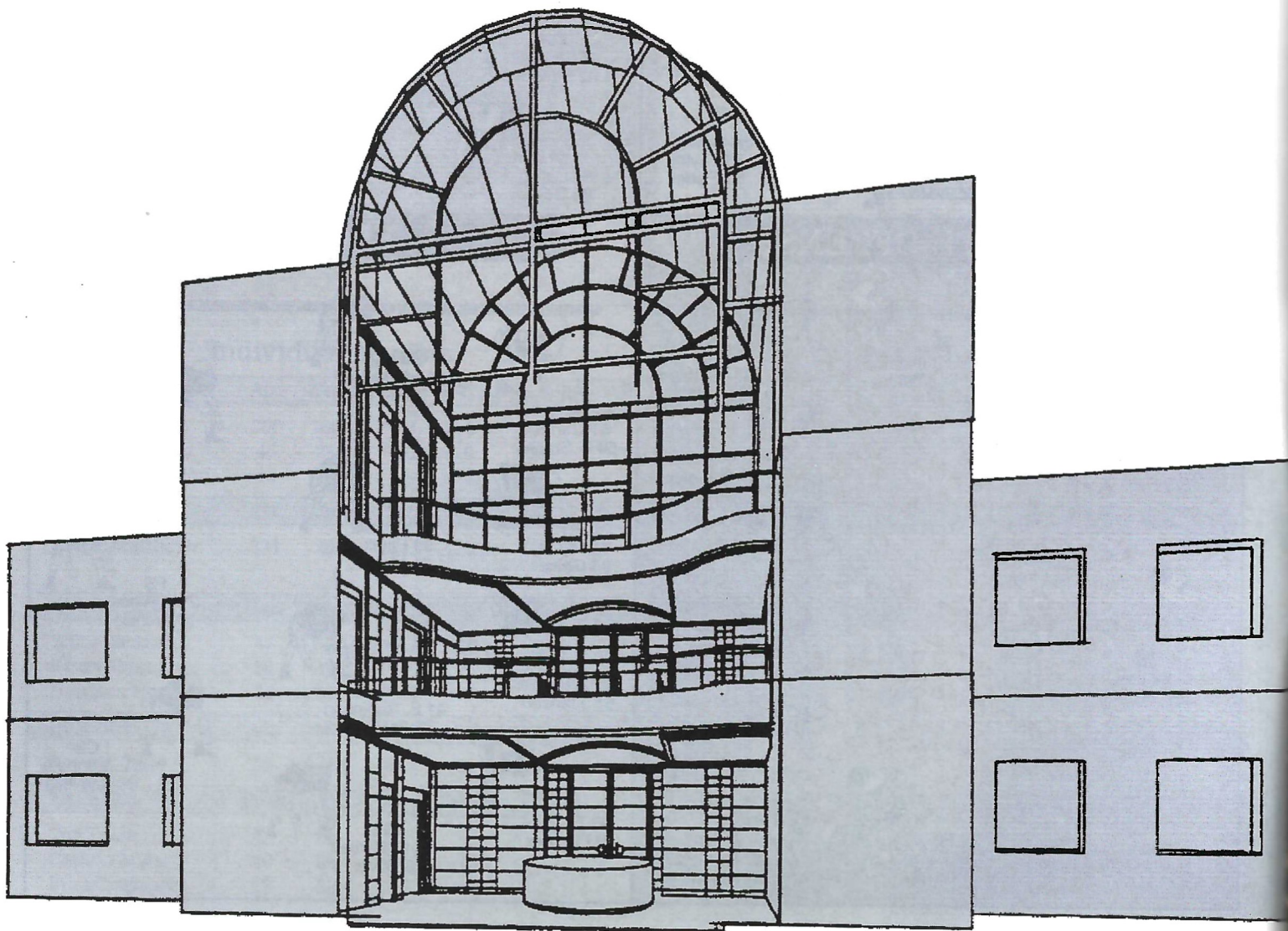
A Home for Gator Athletic Heritage

athletes, coaches and administrators whose efforts have brought the University of Florida to the forefront of collegiate athletics.

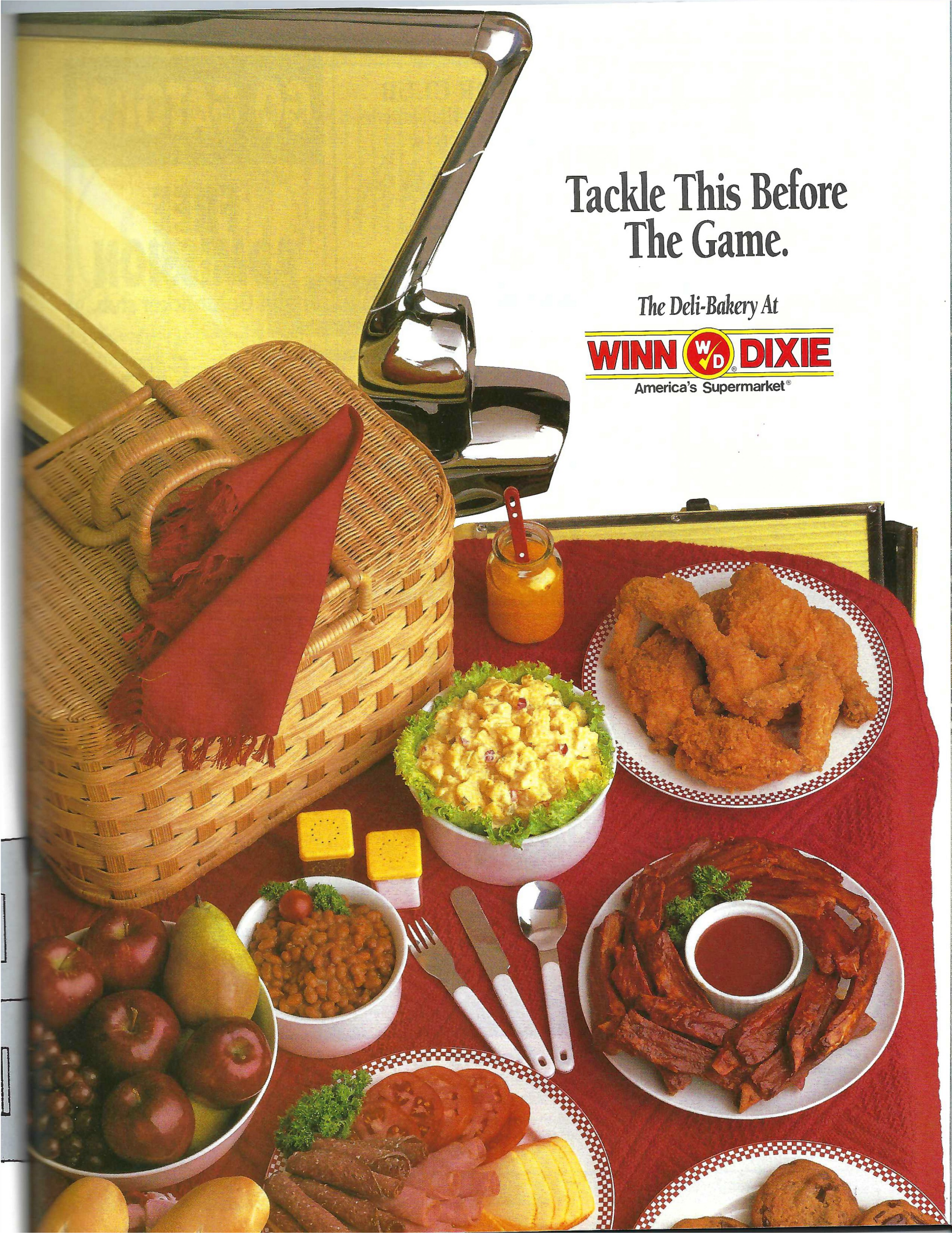

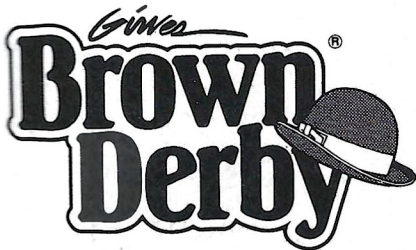
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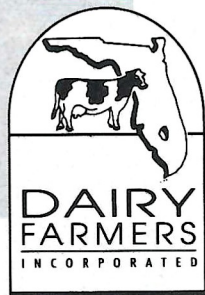
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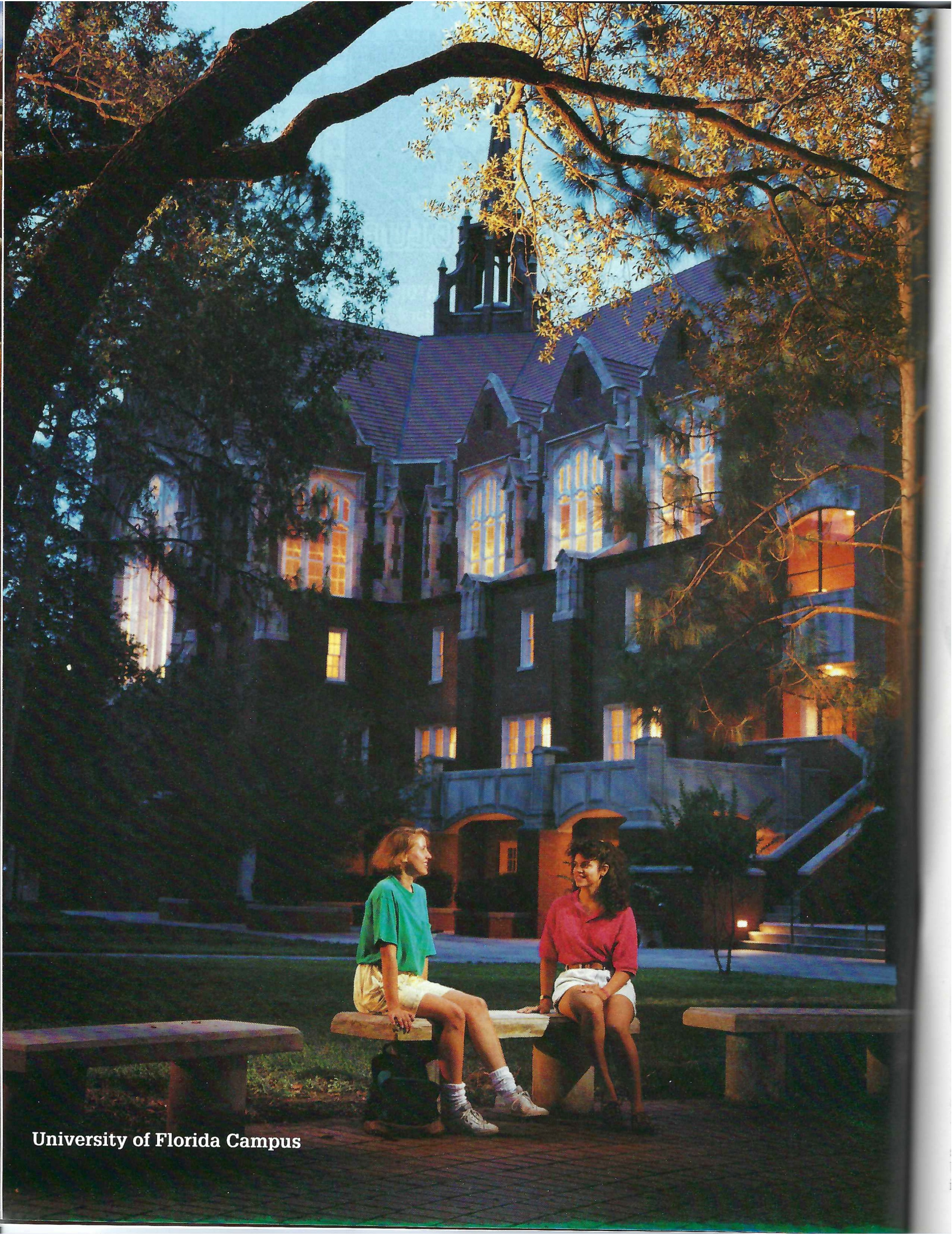
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"Humans try to discover order in their surroundings," said UF landscape architecture department chairman and professor Herrick Smith. "For all of us, this 'order' translates to 'comfortable space,' and experiencing it makes us more productive, efficient, focused and satisfied."

UF boasts nearly 35,000 students and almost 12,000 faculty and staff members. Established in 1906 and experiencing rapid growth since 1955, the campus has evolved in size and design without losing its comfortable ambience. Conscientious, long-range campus planning accommodates increased student and staff needs as well as construction of new facilities.

"The original idea for a classical education — dating back to the Greeks — included students and mentors 'walking and talking' together as well as seeking secluded spots for personal study and introspection," Smith said. "Open space should serve as areas for circulation, congregation and contemplation."

Florida's commitment to this classical approach is reflected in carefully planned open spaces linked by well-lit, tree-lined walkways. Central campus is designed with the pedestrian in mind — automobile traffic is not permitted during the day and parking lots are on the periphery of campus. Quiet spaces and personal places abound.

Comfortable space on campus is diverse, ranging from the urbane setting of the Norman Hall Courtyard and the multi-cultural setting of the Plaza of the Americas to the natural settings of Lake Alice and the Medicinal Plant Gardens.

Students personalize their campus space. Even though three-quarters of UF students live off campus, most are impressed with the "sense of place"

the campus has. In a 1989 study conducted by UF's landscape architecture department, 75 percent of students surveyed felt they had a "home base" on campus. Most lower-division undergraduates considered either Turlington Hall or the Reitz Student Union their home base. Upper-division and graduate students considered the buildings that housed their respective academic departments as their personal space. Most respondents' favorite campus space was near their home base.

"Even freshmen who are just learning their way around campus have a great opportunity to find their own space," said Smith. "And alumni visiting campus often return to their own space or home base to reminisce and share the 'magic' of the place with friends and relatives," he said.

Visitors attending conferences, cultural activities or sports events also take advantage of the "home-away-from-home" atmosphere on the UF campus. Many spend a few extra hours on campus just to appreciate the architectural and natural beauty present.

The UF campus is more than buildings and classrooms. Its bustling places and quiet spaces reflect the diversity of the University and at the same time affect the overall well-being of the students, faculty and staff.

* * * * *

A land-grant university with a distinguished record of developing Florida agriculture into a national leader through research and extension services, the University of Florida has become one of America's truly distinctive universities. With 16 colleges and four schools, UF is among the top three universities in the U.S. in offering more academic programs on a single campus than any of the nation's other universities — public or private.

In 1985, UF was admitted to the Association of American Universities (AAU), the most prestigious higher education organization in the nation and comprised of the top 58 public and

private universities in graduate and professional teaching and research.

UF's 35,000 students come from every county in the state, every state in the union, and more than 100 foreign countries. The quality of the student body continues to grow each year. Ninety percent of entering freshmen are above the national mean of scores on standard entrance exams taken by college-bound students. UF ranks 3rd in the nation among public universities and 8th among all in the number of entering National Merit and Achievement Scholars in attendance.

A distinguished faculty of more than 3,900 has been assembled from major universities throughout the world to provide instruction and counseling to UF students. Last year more than 1,800 faculty members were grant awardees and 70% of the faculty's grant proposals were successful, with more than \$180 million in research and training grants acquired. Twenty-two faculty members have been selected to the National Academies of Science and/or Engineering, the Institute of Medicine or a counterpart in a foreign nation.

The Health Science Center, with six colleges and Shands Teaching Hospital as a major referral hospital for the entire state, is the site of expanding education and research activities. The Veterinary Teaching Hospital is the state's only major referral center for large and small animals.

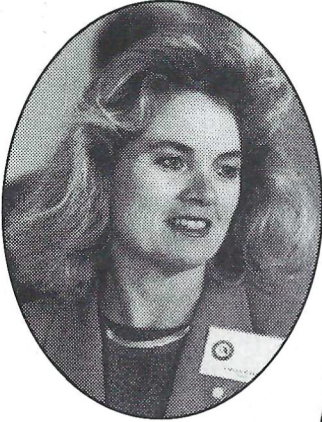
The Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences has Cooperative Extension offices in all 67 Florida counties and operates 22 Research and Education Centers from Jay to Homestead. IFAS research and education programs bolster Florida's \$40 billion-per-year food and agricultural industry, protect and enhance the state's natural resources and contribute to solving special problems of urban Florida.

Florida is continuing its role as a statewide resource, providing the best in teaching, research and service to the state's citizens, but seeking to expand its horizons as it functions in the "inner circle" of universities of national excellence.



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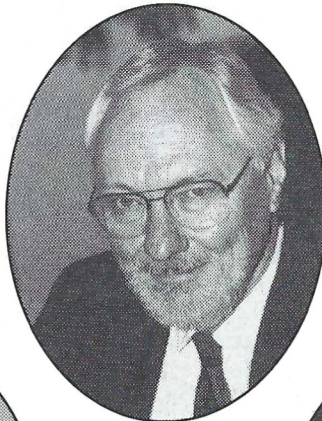
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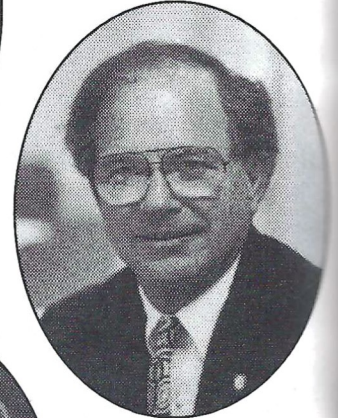
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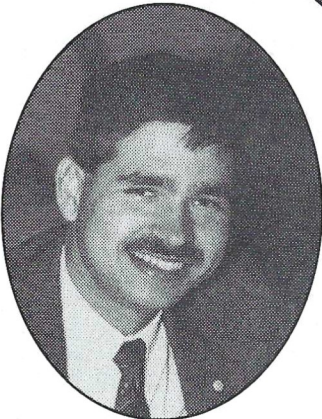
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Dr. John Lombardi

Historian, teacher, administrator, and author, Dr. John Lombardi became the ninth president of the University of Florida in March of 1990.

Born in Los Angeles in 1942, Lombardi comes from an education family. His mother worked as a college librarian and his father, a pioneer in the California community college movement, was president of Los Angeles City College. Lombardi earned his bachelor's degree from Pomona College and his master's and doctoral degrees from Columbia University. He also attended Universidad Nacional Autonoma de Mexico and the University of California at Los Angeles.

Lombardi came to the University of Florida from Johns Hopkins University, where he was provost and vice-president for academic affairs since 1987. From 1967 until 1987, he pursued an academic career at Indiana University, at the Southeast campus for a year and then in the history department of the Bloomington campus, where he became a professor in 1977. Lombardi held various administrative posts at Indiana University, including director of Latin American Studies, dean of International Programs, and dean of Arts and Sciences. He also served as a member of the board for Indiana University of the Midwest Universities Consortium for International Activities (MUCIA), as the director of Foreign Area Fellowship Program cooperative project in Venezuela. Lombardi also taught at the Universidad Central de Venezuela.

A long-term interest in international education involved him in committees and task forces related to international studies for the American Association of Universities and the National Association of State Universities



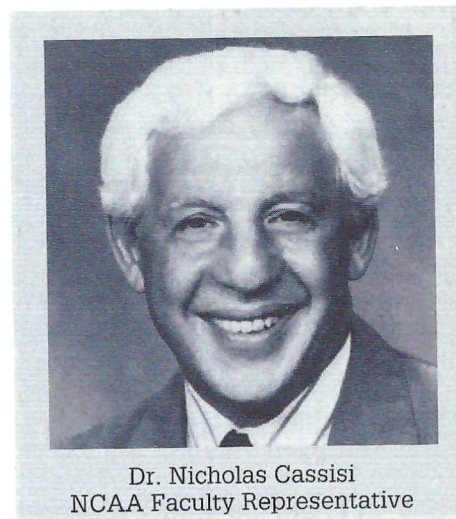
and Land Grant Colleges. A past president of the Conference on Latin American History of the American Historical Association, Lombardi serves on the advisory board of the National Foreign Language Center. The Venezuelan Academia Nacional de la Historia elected him a corresponding member for the United States, and he serves as a member of the Pan American Institute of Geography and History. His international studies interest also led to a chairmanship of an evaluation team on international and interdisciplinary programs for the Board of Regents of the Florida State Board of Regents.

Elected a senior associate member of St. Anthony's College, Oxford, Lombardi has received a variety of fellowships and grants, including the Fulbright-Hays research fellowship, a National Defense Foreign Language fellowship, and grants from Fundacion Simon Bolivar and Fundacion Creole in Venezuela. He has also received grants from the Social Science Research Council, the Tinker Foundation, the Conference

on Latin American History, and MUCIA.

A specialist in Latin American history, Lombardi is the author of seven books focused mostly on Venezuela. His wife, Cathryn Lee Lombardi, coauthored one of his books and illustrated two others. Lombardi has contributed many scholarly articles, papers, reviews, and teaching materials to journals and conferences. In addition to history, he has taught courses in international business and participated in several executive programs as an instructor or lecturer. Considered an expert on small computers, Lombardi has served on many committees and task forces related to computer use, literacy, and product evaluation. He has reviewed software and hardware in various publications and currently serves as contributing editor for Infoworld. For about two years, Lombardi's enthusiasm for automobiles persuaded him and a friend to operate Farmer's Garage, a specialty shop for older model cars.

John and Cathryn Lombardi have two children, John Lee and Mary Ann. John Lee is a student at Indiana University, and Mary Ann is a student at Michigan.



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Steve Spurrier

An All-Around Winner And Innovator

Steve Spurrier was named head football coach at the University of Florida, his alma mater, on December 31, 1989. Less than one year later he was named "Southeastern Conference Coach-of-the-Year" after his Gators turned in a 9-2 record his first season. He was also one of four finalists for "National Coach-of-the-Year" honors.

This was the third consecutive season he was voted as a conference coach-of-the-year, a string which began in 1988 at Duke of the Atlantic Coast Conference and continued the following year with the Blue Devils.

His accomplishments at the collegiate and professional level provide solid proof that he is among the leading coaches in football at any level in the 1990s. His career collegiate head coaching record is 29-15-1 in four seasons, while his overall record, including three years of professional ball, is 64-34-1.

Spurrier's 1990 Gators had the SEC's top record at 6-1, the most league wins in school history. They finished fifth in the nation on defense and 10th on offense while setting 14 single-season records and becoming the second-most productive offense in SEC history with 4,978 yards.

Florida was the only team in the nation in 1990 to throw for over 3,000 yards, have three receivers with at least 35 catches and two running backs who each rushed for over 600 yards. Meanwhile, the Gator defense ranked in the nation's top five for the third straight year and set a new record for rushing defense, yielding an average of only 85.5 yards per game.

Spurrier, the 1966 Heisman Trophy winner who is still regarded as the most famous athlete in UF history, came back to Florida after serving as head football

coach at Duke from 1987-89 with his teams reaching new heights no Blue Devil squad had seen in nearly three decades. Their record-setting offense shredded ACC standards and resulted in 1989 in a bowl appearance for the first time since 1960, and a conference title for the first time since 1962. All three of Spurrier's Duke teams led the ACC in passing and total offense. His Florida team led the SEC in both of those categories in 1990.

Spurrier offenses produced the same results at the professional level in the USFL from 1983-85 with the Tampa Bay Bandits, where he compiled a 35-19 record and two consecutive playoff appearances. The 1984 team was the first in pro history to produce a 4,000 yard passer and two 1,000 yard rushers in the same season.

Spurrier's coaching career started in 1978 as quarterback coach at Florida. In 1979 he served as offensive coordinator and quarterback coach at Georgia Tech. As an assistant coach at Duke from 1980-82 Spurrier's reputation as an exceptional offensive coach originated. The 1982 Blue Devils set ACC records with over 300 yards per game passing and 4,990 yards of total offense as QB Ben Bennett finished his career as the NCAA's all-time passing king with 9,614 yards in three seasons.

Spurrier's first Gator team produced QB Shane Matthews, SEC Player-of-the-Year as a sophomore in 1990, who led the league in passing and set 11 school records. TE Kirk Kirkpatrick topped the conference in receptions with 55 and WR Ernie Mills led in TD catches with 10. Meanwhile, two Gator running backs each gained over 600 yards rushing.

Spurrier was born on April 20, 1945 in Miami Beach, Florida, son of presbyterian minister J. Graham Spurrier and his wife Marjorie. The

family moved to Johnson City, Tenn. when Steve was 12 years old.

In high school he was all-state in football, basketball and baseball and prep All-American in football in 1962. After a difficult recruiting battle, head coach Ray Graves signed Spurrier to a Gator football scholarship, beating out Bear Bryant of Alabama and Johnny Vaught of Ole Miss.

The rest was history. He completed the first pass of his career, a 56-yarder to Jack Harper against SMU in 1964, and guided the Gators to two major bowls in three seasons, eight come-from-behind wins in the final quarter and a glorious period still remembered with fondness by Florida people.

The games still best recalled came against Georgia and FSU in 1965 and Auburn in 1966—the game which put him over the top in the Heisman Trophy race against Purdue's Bob Griese.

Florida trailed the Bulldogs, 10-7, with 4:06 remaining in the final period and had the ball at its own 22. It took Spurrier two plays to pull it out, the first a 51-yard completion to Charlie Casey to the Georgia 19, followed by a 19-yard TD toss to Jack Harper for the winning score in a 14-10 game.

The Gators had already been selected to play in the Sugar Bowl in 1965 when they faced FSU and found themselves trailing 17-16 with 2:02 remaining and at their 29-yard-line.

In six plays Spurrier drove Florida to a TD to take a 23-17 lead. A desperation Seminole pass resulted in a TD interception return to make the final margin 30-17. The Gators went on to the Sugar Bowl where Spurrier set six passing and total offense records and became the only player from the losing team ever to be voted the game's MVP.

The Auburn game in 1966 was the ultimate in Spurrier's knack of being in the right place at the right time under pressure. Heisman Trophy ballots had gone out the previous week and were due back

in the week following. A record Florida Field press corps was in attendance.

Despite one of the greatest performances of his career, 26-of-35 passing for 349 yards and three TDs, seven punts for an average of 46.9 yards per kick, the Gators still remained tied with Auburn at 27-27 with just over two minutes remaining and fourth and long. Wayne Barfield was Florida's regular placekicker, but his range was short.

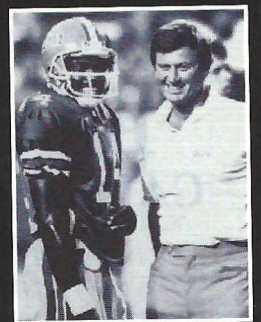
Spurrier took the responsibility for hitting the longer 40-yard effort, although he had not kicked a field goal since the opener that season against Northwestern. He kicked it through for a dramatic 30-27 victory.

Spurrier was the first round draft choice of the San Francisco 49ers in 1967 and played 10 years in the NFL, nine with the 49ers and one with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Steve and Jerri Spurrier met while UF students and were married just before his senior season at Florida. They have four children—daughters Amy and Lisa, and sons Steve Jr., and Scotty.

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ASSISTANT COACHES



JERRY ANDERSON

Assistant Head Coach,
Defensive Tackles Coach

Jerry Anderson enters his seventh season as a member of the Gator coaching staff. He joined the Florida staff in 1985 and coached the tight ends and special teams from 1985-89. In January of 1990 he was appointed coach of the defensive tackles and in April of '91 he was promoted to

Assistant Head Coach.

Anderson's tackles played an instrumental role last season, as Florida's fifth-ranked rushing defense yielded just 85.5 yards on the ground per game, the lowest average in school history.

A 1968 graduate of the University of Florida who holds a Master's Degree in Administration and School Management from Laverne College, Anderson lettered three years for the Gators (1964-66). A three-year teammate of current head coach Steve Spurrier, Anderson started at middle guard for Florida teams that received bids to the 1966 Sugar Bowl and 1967 Orange Bowl. A co-captain of the '67 Orange Bowl team, he received All-SEC and honorable mention All-America honors in 1966.

Anderson began his coaching career at Florida as freshman coach in 1967-68 before moving on to the youth and high school ranks in Miami for 10 seasons. He was head coach at Miami Carol High School from 1973-77. His 1975 team was the state 4A runner-up while his '76 squad went 14-0, won the state title and was the second-ranked prep team in the nation. Anderson's collegiate coaching career, which began in 1977, has taken him to Vanderbilt, Miami (Fla.), Army and Central Florida, in addition to UF. The 1991 season marks Anderson's 23rd season as a coach and 14th on the collegiate level.

Anderson is married to the former Mary Jean Weed. They have a son, Richard (25) and a daughter Jennifer (7).



JIM COLLINS

Assistant Defensive Co-Coordinator,
Inside Linebackers Coach

Jim Collins enters his second season on the Florida coaching staff. He was named coach of the outside linebackers and Gatorbacks in January of 1990. In February of '91 he was put in charge of inside linebackers and in April he was given additional responsibilities as Assistant Defensive

Co-Coordinator.

Prior to coming to Florida, Collins had previously coached at Duke University for six seasons (1983, 1985-89). Collins and Steve Spurrier have worked together since 1986. He was the Blue Devils' co-defensive coordinator in 1989 and helped guide Duke to its first ACC title in 27 years and a trip to the All-American Bowl. In his first season at UF, he helped put together a defensive unit that ranked fifth in the nation in total defense. His main pupil, Gatorback Godfrey Myles, was a first-team All-SEC selection and honorable mention All-America as well as a third-round NFL draft choice by the Dallas Cowboys.

A 1974 graduate of Elon College where he lettered at defensive back for two years, he began his coaching career with a six-year stint as an assistant at Page High School in Greensboro, N.C. His teams at Page H.S. won three conference championships and qualified for the state playoffs four times. In 1980, Collins became the defensive coordinator at Lees-McRae Junior College in Banner Elk, N.C. He coached the defensive backs at Appalachian State in 1981-82 before a one-year stint at Duke in '83. After serving as defensive coordinator at Jacksonville State in 1984, Collins returned to Duke where he coached from 1985 until he joined the Gators. His prize linebacking pupil, Mike Junkin, earned All-America honors at Duke in 1986 and was the fifth player chosen in the '86 NFL draft by the Cleveland Browns. Collins also coached Alvin Wright of the L.A. Rams and Dino Hackett of the K.C. Chiefs.

Collins is married to the former Geri Tarrant. They have one daughter—Jennifer (11).



DWAYNE DIXON

Wide Receivers Coach

Dwayne Dixon, who enters his second season as a football coach, is in charge of the Florida wide receivers. Dixon, a wide receiver as a player, was a four-year letterman for the Gators from 1980-83. Prior to joining the Gator football coaching staff in January of 1990, Dixon was working as an assistant in the UF's Office of Student Life.

In his initial season as a coach, Dixon assisted in putting together an offense which set 14 school records, including most passing yards (3,197) and passing TDs (25). Florida's total offensive unit ranked 10th in the nation and first in the SEC. WR Ernie Mills led the SEC in TD receptions with 10 and was a consensus first-team All-SEC selection and third-round NFL draft selection of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Dixon was also a first-team All-SEC selection in 1983 and was an Associated Press Honorable Mention All-American his senior year. The third-leading receiver in Gator history with 124 catches, Dixon was the 1983 Bluebonnet Bowl Most Valuable Player after catching eight passes for 106 yards and three touchdowns. He played for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1984-85 and 1987, and played three years in the Arena Football League. He was the league's leading receiver and scorer for Washington in 1987 and for Detroit in 1988 and was the winner of the league's "Iron Man" award in 1988. He played for championship teams in Detroit in 1988 and '89.

Dixon is married to the former Sandra Barclay. They have one daughter, Brittany who was born in September of 1989.



CARL FRANKS

Recruiting Coordinator,
Running Backs Coach

A six-year assistant under coach Steve Spurrier, Carl Franks enters his second season as running backs coach for the Florida Gators. In February of '91 he also took on additional duties as Florida's recruiting coordinator. A 1982 graduate of Duke University where he played three seasons at tight end and fullback, Franks joined Spurrier's staff with the USFL's Tampa Bay Bandits in 1985 and moved on to Duke University in 1987. Franks joined Spurrier and the Gator staff in January 1990.

In his first year on the UF staff, Florida was the only school in the SEC to have two running backs who rushed for at least 600 yards (Errick Rhett 845 yards, Willie McClendon 641 yards). Franks played a key role in coaching an offense which set 14 single-season school records, including most total yards (4,978) and most points (387).

An Academic All-ACC selection in 1982 and Duke's Outstanding Sophomore Player in 1980, Franks went on to play tight end and running back with the Bandits of the USFL in 1983-84. Upon returning to Duke as running backs coach, Franks was instrumental in improving Duke's running attack. In 1989, Randy Cuthbert became the Blue Devils' first 1,000-yard rusher in 17 years. Franks' backs at Duke were also vital members of the passing attack with the top two rushers in 1989 combining for 82 catches in addition to their 1,537 yards on the ground. The 1989 Duke offense led the ACC in total yards per game (501.7) and was fourth in the league in rushing yards per game (178.7). Despite the Blue Devils fame as a passing attack, Duke's two top runners were each among the league's top five ground gainers.

Franks is married to the former Deborah Lore. They have one daughter, Brittany who is two.



RICH McGEORGE

Offensive Line Coach

Rich McGeorge enters his second season with the Gators as offensive line coach. McGeorge is a graduate of Elon College where he was a two-time Small College All-America selection. A first-round draft choice of the NFL's Green Bay Packers in 1970 out of Elon College, McGeorge caught 175 career passes in nine pro seasons. He was the Packers' 1973 Offensive Player-of-the-Year.

In his initial season at Florida, McGeorge's line was a key element in an offense that was ranked 10th in the nation in total offense. Florida was the only school in the nation to throw for over 3,000 yards, have three receivers register 35 or more catches and two running backs rush for at least 600 yards. Two of McGeorge's players, guard Chris Bromley and center Cal Dixon, earned first-team All-SEC honors in 1990.

McGeorge began his coaching career as tight ends coach at Duke in 1981-82 and coached in the USFL before returning to Durham in 1987. He was an assistant with the Birmingham Stallions in 1983-84 and was offensive line coach with the Tampa Bay Bandits under Steve Spurrier in 1985. McGeorge joined Spurrier in their return to Duke for the 1987-89 seasons and helped guide the Blue Devils to an All-American Bowl berth in 1989. Present UF running backs coach Carl Franks was under his tutelage during his first stint at Duke and he coached first-team All-America tackle Chris Port in 1989. McGeorge's Duke line allowed just 15 sacks in 439 passing attempts in 1989 and Blue Devil runners averaged 4.6 yards per carry. Tailback Randy Cuthbert became only Duke's second 1,000-yard rusher and the Blue Devils averaged over 501 yards per game in total offense, an ACC record.

McGeorge is married to the former Bonnie Moore. They have two sons, Randy (19) and Jason (17). Randy is an offensive lineman at Duke.



JOHN REAVES
Tight Ends Coach

John Reaves enters his second season on the Gator coaching staff after beginning his collegiate coaching career in 1990 by coaching tight ends and assisting with quarterbacks, the position he played at Florida. As a player, Reaves was one of the greatest passers in college football. By the end of his UF career, Reaves had thrown for 7,549 yards, an NCAA record. He set 20 Southeastern Conference records, many of which are still standing. As a member of the "Super Sophs" in 1969, Reaves threw for 342 yards in Florida's opening game upset of top-ranked Houston. In 1971 he received the Sammy Baugh Award as the nation's top collegiate passer.

In 1972 he was drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles in the first round, the 14th pick overall. He was named to the NFL All-Rookie team and was one of five finalists for the NFL Rookie of the Year award. After leaving Philadelphia he played with the Cincinnati Bengals and Houston Oilers. From 1982-85 he played under Steve Spurrier with the Tampa Bay Bandits of the USFL. There he became one of four quarterbacks in pro football history to throw for over 4,000 yards in consecutive seasons. He was the second-leading passer in USFL history, behind only Houston's Jim Kelly.

In his first season at Florida, Reaves played an important part in assisting a Florida offense which set 14 single-season school records, including most points (387), most yards on total offense (4,978) and most passing yards (3,197). Reaves' prized pupil, TE Kirk Kirkpatrick, led the SEC in receptions with 55, a figure that set a new UF record for most receptions by a tight end in a season.

Reaves is married to the former Patricia Bohannon. They have two sons, John David (12) and Stephen (6), and a daughter, Layla (16).



BOB SANDERS
Assistant Defensive Co-Coordinator,
Outside Linebackers & Gatorbacks Coach

Bob Sanders enters his second season with the Florida Gators and his 13th as a collegiate assistant coach on the defensive side of the ball. He was appointed defensive ends coach by Steve Spurrier in January of 1990. In February of 1991 he was put in charge of the outside linebackers and Gatorbacks and in April of '91 he also assumed the role of Assistant Defensive Co-Coordinator.

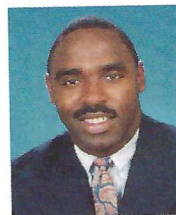
In his first year at Florida, Sanders helped put together a defensive unit that ranked fifth in the nation in total defense and fifth

against the rush. Florida allowed just 85.5 yards rushing per game, a figure that set a new school single-season record. Sanders' main student, Defensive End Huey Richardson, was named a first-team All-America and was a first-round selection in the 1991 NFL Draft by the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Prior to coming to Florida, Sanders had previously worked at Georgia Tech, East Carolina, Richmond and Duke. He was the co-defensive coordinator for Spurrier's ACC champion Blue Devils in 1989.

Sanders, a 1976 graduate of Davidson College in Davidson, N.C., also was head coach at Douglas Byrd High School in Fayetteville, N.C., in 1979, and was a three-year assistant coach at Southwest Onslow High School in Jacksonville, N.C. beginning in 1976. A three-year letterwinner at Davidson, Sanders will be working with Gator head coach Spurrier for the fifth season.

Sanders is married to the former Kathie Martin. They have two daughters, Lindsay (11) and Sarah (10).



CHARLIE STRONG
Defensive Ends Coach

Charlie Strong is in his third stint at the University of Florida. In 1983 and 1984 he served as a graduate assistant on the Gator defensive staff. In 1988 and 1989 he was Florida's outside linebackers coach and in March of 1991 he was named coach of the Gator defensive ends after serving as coach of the wide receivers at Ole Miss

during the 1990 campaign.

Strong has also had experience at Texas A&M (graduate assistant in 1985) and Southern Illinois (graduate assistant in 1986-87).

Strong was a four-time letterwinner at Central Arkansas State, where he was named All-Conference three times in football and twice in track. He earned his degree in education in 1982 from Central Arkansas State and went on to earn his Master's in physical education from Henderson State in 1983. He also received a Master's and Educational Specialist Degree from Florida in 1985 and has started work on a Doctorate Degree.

Strong was born August 2, 1960 in Batesville, Ark.



RON ZOOK
Defensive Coordinator,
Defensive Backs Coach

Ron Zook joined the Florida staff in February of 1991 when he was appointed coach of the defensive backs by head coach Steve Spurrier. In April of '91 he was elevated to the Defensive Coordinator post.

Zook came to UF from Ohio State where he had served as coach of the defensive backfield for the past three seasons. One of his players on the 1990 Buckeye team, Vince Clark, was a selection in the first round of the 1991 NFL Draft by the Green Bay Packers.

Zook's collegiate coaching career has taken him to Murray State (defensive backs, 1978-80) Cincinnati (defensive coordinator, 1981), Kansas (defensive coordinator, 1982-83), Tennessee (defensive backs, 1984-86), Virginia Tech (defensive coordinator and assistant head coach, 1987) and Ohio State (defensive backfield, 1988-90).

As a player, Zook was a defensive back at Miami of Ohio from 1972-75. He was team captain in '75 and a prominent member of Miami teams that posted a sparkling 34-1-1 record from 1973-75. Miami won Mid-American Conference titles each of those three seasons and made three consecutive trips to the Tangerine Bowl. Zook earned his degree from Miami of Ohio in '76 in Comprehensive Science.

A native of Loudonville, Ohio, Zook is married to the former Denise Baugh. They have two daughters—Jacquelyn (7) and Casey (4).



Bill Arnsparger

A man of success, integrity, leadership and expertise, University of Florida Athletic Director Bill Arnsparger began his fifth year at the helm of the Gator athletic program in 1991.

Over his tenure, which began in January of 1987, Arnsparger has instilled a philosophy within the Gator athletic program which places a premium on a proper balance between athletics and academics, with teamwork among athletic administrators, coaches, student-athletes and the private sector playing a vital role in allowing nearly 300 student-athletes on 16 Gator teams to compete effectively in the classroom and in competition.

"With 'back to basics' as our theme we are looking forward to the future," says Arnsparger. "We are working together to achieve a balance and provide an atmosphere that is conducive to the overall success of our student-athletes.

"We are helping our student-athletes earn their degrees, while competing effectively on the conference and national level," adds Arnsparger. "With the private sector, we are continuing to work toward permanently endowing all athletic scholarships and improving and adding new facilities."

Arnsparger has worked hard to see that the phrase "student-athlete" keeps its proper order and proper perspective at Florida. "We have an obligation to the student-athlete to provide him or her with the best of everything. Everything from academic guidance and personal care to the best coaching staffs and facilities. We want these young people to have the support needed to take advantage of their academic and athletic abilities."

Arnsparger's constant drive and perseverance has paid dividends.

In all a school-record 53 Gator student-athletes were named to the

Southeastern Conference's Academic Honor Roll in 1990-91. Florida had 52 athletes selected to the All-SEC Academic Honor Roll in 1989-90 and 51 were named to the academic achievement list during the 1988-89 year. The 156 UF student-athletes recognized over the last three years for achievement in the classroom is the best three-year total in Gator history.

Arnsparger and his staff have worked to increase awareness and success by Gator student-athletes concerning their commitment and dedication to academic and personal responsibilities. With his leadership, Gator coaches have recruited student-athletes that have been better prepared for college-level academics. In fact, the standardized test scores and grade-point averages of Gator recruits has continually improved.

Within the athletic arena, the Gator program's overall strength and depth has been solidly demonstrated during Arnsparger's time in Gainesville.

Florida's combined men's and women's athletic program has ranked among the 10 most successful in the nation, according to research conducted by USA Today, in each of Arnsparger's years, and among the elite of the Southeastern Conference. In three of his four years at the helm, UF has had the best combined (men's and women's) athletic program in the SEC.

Last year (1990-91) was another banner year, as five Florida teams won Southeastern Conference championships and 10 Gator squads finished their seasons among the top six in the nation.

When final national research for the 1990-91 athletic year was completed by USA Today, Florida was ranked among the nation's ten most successful athletic programs for the eighth straight year.

The facts do in fact tell the story of Florida's athletic success under the leadership of Arnsparger:

- In 1989-90, Florida won four Southeastern Conference team championships, while 10 Gator squads finished among the Top 10 in the country in their respective sport.

- In 1990-91, 1988-89 and 1987-88, Florida's combined men's and women's program ranked as the best in the SEC.

- In 1987-88, Florida was the only school in the nation to send its football team to a bowl game, its men's basketball team to the NCAA Tournament and its baseball team to the College World Series.

- A total of 16 University of Florida athletes representing four sports (swimming, track and field, gymnastics, tennis), earned a total of 10 medals at the XXIV Summer Olympiad in Seoul, Korea (in 1988).

When Arnsparger arrived in January of 1987 the athletic program was in the midst of a commitment to upgrade and build new athletic facilities. He has continued the push in that regard, and since his arrival new baseball, track and tennis stadiums have been dedicated, as has a new golf course clubhouse. The strength and conditioning area in the south end of Ben Hill Griffin Stadium at Florida Field, already one of the nation's largest when built in 1982, was expanded by nearly 5,000 square feet in the summer of 1988.

The north end zone at Florida Field was recently completed, an expansion that increased the stadium's capacity to 83,000 and gives Florida one of the eight largest on-campus football stadiums in the nation. In addition, plans are also progressing for a new student-life center.

Under Arnsparger, and the teamwork of his Gator athletic staff, Florida has attracted some of the best coaches in the nation

when presented the opportunity. Arnsparger hired Florida's "favorite son" Steve Spurrier to head-up the Gator football program and the young and energetic Lon Kruger to run the Gator basketball program.

Prior to coming to Florida, Arnsparger served as the head football coach at LSU from 1984-86. His stint at Baton Rouge, La., culminated a 36-year involvement with coaching. Arnsparger's coaching career began at his alma mater, Miami of Ohio, in 1950. He then served as an assistant at Ohio State from 1951-53, Kentucky from 1954-61, and Tulane 1961-63. He then moved to the National Football League with the Baltimore Colts in 1964. He remained with the Colts until 1970 when he joined Don Shula at Miami. In 1974 he was named head coach of the N.Y. Giants, a post he held until 1977 when he rejoined the Dolphins. Overall, Arnsparger has coached in five Super Bowls. In 1984 he took over the reins of the LSU football program, where he guided the Tigers to one SEC Championship, two Sugar Bowl appearances, and a Liberty Bowl berth in three years.

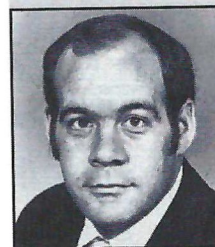

ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION BOARD

UNIVERSITY ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION, INC.

The University Athletic Association, Inc. is governed by an 18-member Board of Directors. That board has the final say on policies, procedures and the budget. Two-thirds of the UAA, Inc. Board of Directors is composed of University of Florida administrators and faculty members. More specifically, the Board consists of the University president, the provost, the vice-president for student affairs, the vice-president for administrative affairs, seven presidentially appointed faculty members, the athletic director, the chairman of the State Board of Regents or his designee, the Gator Boosters, Inc. president or his designee, two students and two alumni representatives. Of the group of 18 members, only one representative (the athletics director) is employed by the University Athletic Association, Inc.



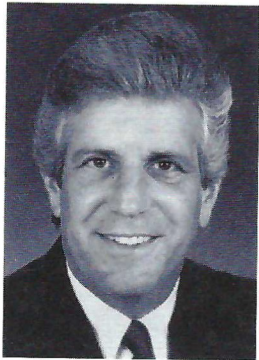

For the eighth straight year the combined Gator athletic program ranked among the nation's 10 best in 1990-91, based on research conducted by USA TODAY

- The UF men's program ranked as the third best in the nation, while the women ranked sixth. The overall combined athletic program placed fifth in 1990-91, according to USA TODAY

- The University of Florida and the University of Texas were the only two schools in the nation to have both its men's and women's athletic programs rank among the six best in the country in 1990-91

- The University of Florida claimed a school-record 53 Academic All-Southeastern Conference selections in 1990-91, bringing the total number of Gator academic honorees to 376 since 1980, the top total for a school in the SEC over the last 12 years

- Since 1980, Gator student-athletes have earned 1,121 combined All-America honors. Over that same time, Florida athletes have garnered 132 individual national titles

- Since 1980, Florida teams have won a total of 52 SEC titles, a total representing the most league crowns for a conference member over that time span. Florida has also claimed at least one national title in seven of the past 11 years. Since 1980, Florida has won nine national team titles

- In the last three Olympics (1980, 1984, 1988), Florida's had 57 representatives on Olympic teams. That contingent has earned 26 medals, including 15 gold medals.

NCAA Update



T

his is the era of academic reform, institutional control and compliance in intercollegiate athletics. Change is the order of the day across the nation. Additional revision of NCAA legislation is expected at the 1992 NCAA Convention.

Article 2.1 of the NCAA Constitution states, "It is the responsibility of each member institution to control its intercollegiate athletics program in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Association. The institution's responsibility for the conduct of its intercollegiate athletics program includes responsibility for the actions of its staff members and for the actions of any other individual or organization engaged in activities promoting the athletics interests of the institution."

In our effort to maintain institutional control of our intercollegiate athletics program and to remain in total compliance with NCAA and SEC rules and regulations, we need the assistance and cooperation of all alumni, boosters, fans, friends and staff members. This is a responsibility which belongs to everyone and not just the President, Athletic Director or the Compliance Officer. Responsibility for compliance has become a teamwork approach.

It is important that everyone has a clear understanding of the definition of a representative of the institution's athletic interests. An athletic representative is an individual who:

1. Has participated in or been a member of any agency or organization promoting the institution's intercollegiate athletics program.
2. Has made financial contributions to the athletic department or to an athletic booster organization of that institution.
3. Has been assisting or been requested to assist in the recruitment of prospects.
4. Has been assisting or providing benefits to enrolled student-athletes or their families.
5. Has been involved otherwise in promoting the institution's athletic program.

Once an individual is identified as an athletics representative, the person retains that identity indefinitely.

AREAS OF MAJOR CONCERN

Recruiting

In Division I alumni and representatives of an institution's athletic interest are prohibited from making in-person, on-or-off-campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic communications with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardian. Only institutional staff members are permitted to actively engage in a recruiting process with a prospect and new limitations are in place concerning in-person contacts, telephone calls and communications via mail.

Extra Benefits

An extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional

employee or an athletic representative to provide a student-athlete (relative or friend) a benefit not expressly authorized by NCAA regulations. Prohibited extra benefits include but are not limited to: 1) An employment arrangement for a prospect's relatives; 2) Gift of clothing or equipment; 3) Cosigning of loans; 4) Providing loans to a prospect's relatives or friends; 5) Cash or like items; 6) Any tangible items, including merchandise; 7) Free or reduced-cost services, rentals or purchases of any type; 8) Free or reduced-cost housing; 9) Use of an institution's athletics equipment (e.g., for a high-school all-star game); 10) Sponsorship of or arrangement

for an awards banquet for high-school, preparatory school or two-year college athletes by an institution, representatives of its athletics interests, or its alumni groups or booster clubs.

Summer Employment

No employment for a prospect shall be permitted prior to the completion of the prospect's senior year in high school. The UAA has a summer job program and efforts need to be coordinated through Jamie Speronis in the football office. No transportation to and from a summer job may be provided unless it is the employer's established policy to transport all employees to and from the job site.



SEC FOOTBALL

"The Standard For Excellence"

The first football game in the Southeast was played April 9, 1880, on the ground now called Old Stoll Field at the University of Kentucky. By 1895, 11 of the current 12 Southeastern Conference members were playing the American adaptation of the English game rugby, called "footballs."

Since that humble beginning 111 years ago, the member institutions of the Southeastern Conference have established an outstanding tradition of excellence. That legacy of achievements expanded to include two new successful programs as the SEC welcomed the University of Arkansas and the University of South Carolina July 1, 1991, marking the first time in conference history institutions have been added. The two will begin vying for the SEC football crown in 1992 when the league splits into an Eastern and Western Division with a championship game in Birmingham December 5, to decide the conference title.

In 1933 the 13 members of the Southern Conference, west and south of the Appalachian Mountains, reorganized as the Southeastern Conference. Since that time, SEC teams have won 11 national championships. The league is one of only two conferences to win three-straight Associated Press national titles as Alabama (1978 and 1979) and Georgia (1980) accomplished the feat. Overall six different SEC members have claimed at least one national crown. In addition, the conference boasts six schools in the all-time AP Final Top 20 Poll, not including new member Arkansas.

Through 58 seasons, SEC teams have won 71.5 percent of their games against non-



conference opponents, including an overall winning record versus every other league in the country.

The winning ways have attracted spectators in record numbers. Each of the last 11 years, the SEC has topped all conferences in total attendance, while also posting the highest average two-straight seasons. In 1990, 4.2 million fans witnessed SEC football first-hand as four schools ranked in the Top 10 attendance figures for the fifth-consecutive year.

Winning seasons are rewarded with bowl invitations, where the SEC has enjoyed unequalled success. Eight current members rank in the top 20 in all-time bowl appearances, and seven appear in the top 20 bowl victory listing. Overall member institutions have made 229 bowl appearances during their SEC seasons, including seven in the same year on three different occasions (1974, 1981 and 1983). The SEC also earned distinction as the only conference to send every member to a bowl game during the decade of the 1980's.

Through the years, only four college football teams have won all four major bowl games (Rose, Sugar, Orange and Cotton). Two of the select group are SEC schools (Alabama and Georgia), while a third (Georgia Tech) is a former conference member.

Success in the SEC has not been limited only to team cate-

gories. Individually, the conference has provided six Heisman Trophy winners, five Outland Trophy recipients and two Lombardi Award honorees.

A total of 54 SEC players have been inducted in the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame, along with 25 coaches. Consensus All-America accolades have been bestowed on SEC athletes 160 times and 88 standouts have received Academic All-America honors. The SEC has also provided the American Football Coaches Association National Coach of the Year eight times.

Florida State University, nearing its golden anniversary as a coeducational graduate research institution, is poised on the brink of joining the nation's academic elite.

Building rapidly from the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida, the university has emerged as an institution of national and international esteem, evidenced by a number of exciting recent additions to its record of excellence:

- FSU, selected over the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, attracted the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory to Florida's capital city in 1990. The National Science Foundation will establish the \$100 million, state-of-the-art magnet lab at FSU, which will be joined in the research by the Los Alamos National Laboratory and the University of Florida.

- At the forefront of super-computing since obtaining its first high-speed computer in 1985, FSU took yet another step in ultra-fast computing in 1990 with the acquisition of two new super-computers, the Thinking Machine Corp. Connection Machine and the Cray Y-MP. Both computers can be accessed from hundreds of locations in the United States and Europe.

- In 1991, Florida State ranked second in popularity nationwide among high school seniors, based on the number of students who request that their college-entrance exam scores be sent to an institution. FSU was one of only three institutions among the top 15 choices of both black and white college-bound students.

- FSU's high-tech program in structural biology in 1991 received the university's largest single foundation grant to date, \$4 million, to position it among the leaders in the field worldwide.

- Now the professional training

ground for one of Florida's fastest growing industries, film production, FSU graduated its first class of film students from its School of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts in 1991.

- Construction of the \$75 million University Center is under way adjacent to Doak S. Campbell Stadium. When completed, the University Center will provide 550,000 square feet of classroom and office space and a centralized location for student services. The three-phase project will include two eight-story buildings and three four-story buildings on the east and west sides of the stadium.

- And, in 1990, Florida State, after being courted by several national athletic conferences, joined the Atlantic Coast Conference, capping more than a decade of national prominence in intercollegiate athletics.

As this list attests, Florida State has begun the 1990s with exceptional strength, energy and vision for the future. And, under the new leadership of the university's 11th president, Dr. Dale W. Lick, FSU will continue to build on the foundation of its long history of excellence in scholarship, research and humanity.

A public university and a senior member of the State University System, Florida State was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began operating in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

The main campus is spread over 347 acres in Tallahassee; the university owns a total of 1,172 acres in Leon, Bay and Franklin counties. For many years, FSU has extended its reach far beyond Florida through international study programs in England, Italy, Switzerland, Yugoslavia, France, Panama, Costa Rica and the Caribbean.

These far-reaching programs are but a few of the 271 graduate and undergraduate degree programs offered through Florida State's eight independent colleges—Arts and

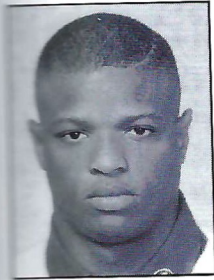
Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering; Human Sciences; Law; and Social Sciences (incorporating the School of Public Administration and Policy)—and eight independent schools—Criminology and Criminal Justice; Library and Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work, Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 1,533 members, the FSU faculty currently includes five members of both the National Academy of Sciences and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and has included five Nobel laureates. The main library faculty, the Robert M. Stozier Library, is linked via a computerized information system to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library places scientific resources close by the university's main science research complex.

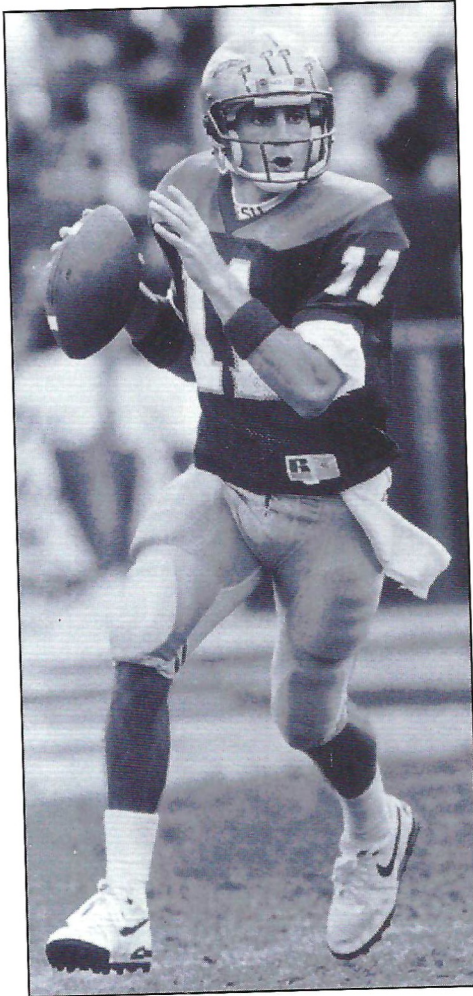
On the top floor of the Dirac Library is the headquarters of the Supercomputer Computations Research Institute, a program that brings together some 100 scientists, engineers and technicians. SCRI is electronically linked to an off-campus research complex and the university's two powerful supercomputers.

Also providing unique research opportunities is the physics department's Tandem Van de Graaff Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory, which houses two powerful atom smashers and is ranked among the top four in the nation by the National Science Foundation.

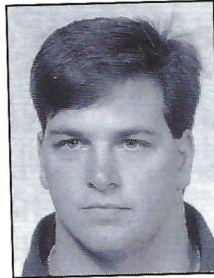
FSU places a high priority on its nearly 29,000 students, their needs and interests. The improbable rise of Willie Jackson, Jr. from the lower ranks of the Florida corps of receivers to all-star status comes as the result of many factors, not the least of which is his Gator heritage.

His father, Willie, Sr., joined with Leonard George as the first black football players ever to suit up for the Gators back in 1969. His mother, Delphine, is a graduate who still lives and works in Gainesville.

Those who were around the football team in the early 1970s remember little Willie Jackson tagging along to practice and games, often leaving the field perched on his dad's shoulders.

He grew up in Gainesville and attended P.K. Yonge High School, the UF lab school. He was a great all-around athlete at that lower classification school, and a stand-out in football and basketball.

Willie's skills led to positioning at wide receiver, quarterback, running back and defensive back in high school. He was the best athlete on the team and coach John Clifford, a former Gator standout defensive back, put him where he needed him most.

When he graduated there wasn't a scholarship offer forthcoming from Florida, but his dream was to be a Gator like his parents and he waited...and waited. Nat Moore and Lee McGriff, star Florida players in 1972, convinced the Florida staff to take a chance on young Jackson.

However, in his freshman season of 1989 he did little to attract the attention of the coaching staff. They even allowed him to leave the team in November to participate full time in basketball. He lettered as a true freshman in that sport, playing in 21 games and starting five times.

The running game featuring Emmitt Smith did not need many 175 pound receivers.

When Steve Spurrier took over at Florida and the passing game started to become very important,

An added attraction near the Gator bench was Willie Jackson Jr. of Gainesville, the 14-month-old son of Gator star Willie Jackson.

"Willie Jr. has been coming to see his daddy and the Ga-

tors play since he was just three weeks old," Mrs. Jackson said.

But Willie wasn't content to sit by his mother all the time and he provided plenty of exercise for those with him as he raced to get on the playing field, too.

Willie returned to football with an attitude that would lead him to the position he is in today.

His work off the field has often been cited by Coach Spurrier as the reason he has come so far so fast. He is up to a solid 192 pounds, is faster than ever before and has the excellent hands and coordination that the truly outstanding pass-catchers have. In 1990 he played in five games and a total of 17 downs. He didn't catch a pass all season.

Going into today's FSU game he is in a virtual dead-heat with LSU's Todd Kinchen and Tennessee's Carl Pickens for the SEC receiving title, and leads the conference in touchdown receptions with 10.

Jackson has 47 receptions for 690 yards and an average of 4.7 catches per game. Kinchen's season is over with 53 receptions in 11 games, an average of 4.8 per contest. Pickens faces Vanderbilt today and has 48 catches in 10 games, an average of 4.8 per game.

Willie, Jr. has the great Gator genes, he recruited UF far more aggressively than UF recruited him, and his success should bring smiles to everyone who supports the orange and blue.

Like his parents before him, the day will be coming when he will leave with a diploma and that's when this improbable story will have a completely happy ending.

In sharp contrast to the timely completion of the new north end zone this year, there were some taut nerves around the athletic department the week of the opening football game on September 4, 1982 as the construction crews rushed to finish the south end zone project.

"It was such a tight squeeze that we were out there with ticket office personnel the night before the opening game numbering seats with magic markers so we could use them the next day," said Gator senior associate athletic director Jeremy Foley. "There was a crane still poking up through one of the upper dormitories when we kicked it off against Miami in that opening game."

That addition at the south end of Florida Field included 17,587 permanent seats to bring the stadium capacity to 72,000, and housed a training center, including a new weight room, training room, dressing rooms, equipment room, meeting rooms and a sports medicine facility.

The south stand addition and training center were funded by a

variety of means. The state legislature appropriated \$6.8 million to get the project off the drawing board. This funding was generated by student fees for capital construction as approved by the legislature.

Financing was completed with bond funding of \$3.3 million, which was pledged and backed up by future Gator Boosters, Inc. funds, and a private gift of \$1.7 million from citrus magnate Ben Hill Griffin, Jr. to build and then expand the training center.

Official dedication of the new south end zone and Ben Hill Griffin Training Complex was held on October 30, 1982 when the Gators faced Auburn. Luxury skyboxes and expansion of the working press areas of the press box was completed in time for the 1983 season and this was financed through revenue generated by leasing the 28 skyboxes at \$30,000 each per year.

"At the time the construction of the new south stands, training complex, skyboxes and expanded working press section was the biggest project the athletic association had ever attempted,"

said Foley.

"Of course the north end zone project has now surpassed it but that was a major, significant step forward in our program."

Griffin, the major individual driving force behind the south end expansion, was present when the stadium was named in his honor and dedicated on September 9, 1989 at the Florida-Mississippi game.

The official name is Ben Hill Griffin Stadium at Florida Field.

In the dedication program Mr. Griffin said, "I didn't want 'Jr.' on the stadium. Ben Hill Griffin includes my father, me, my son and my grandson. If there are any more Griffins in the bloodline, it will be in remembrance of them all."

So the south end zone project was the fourth major step leading to today's stadium, now completed with the new north end zone. Each step was critical to the future growth of Gator football.

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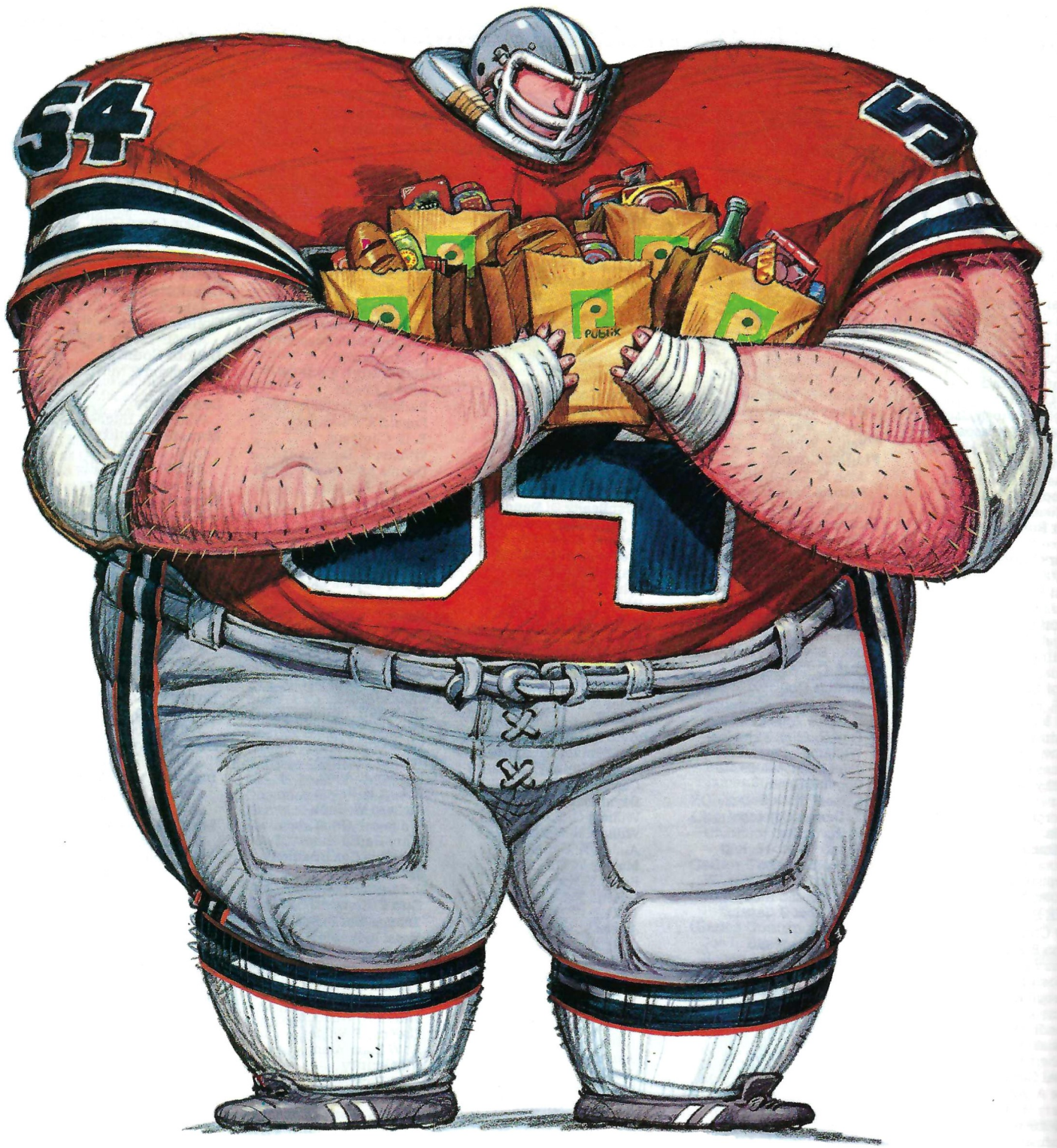
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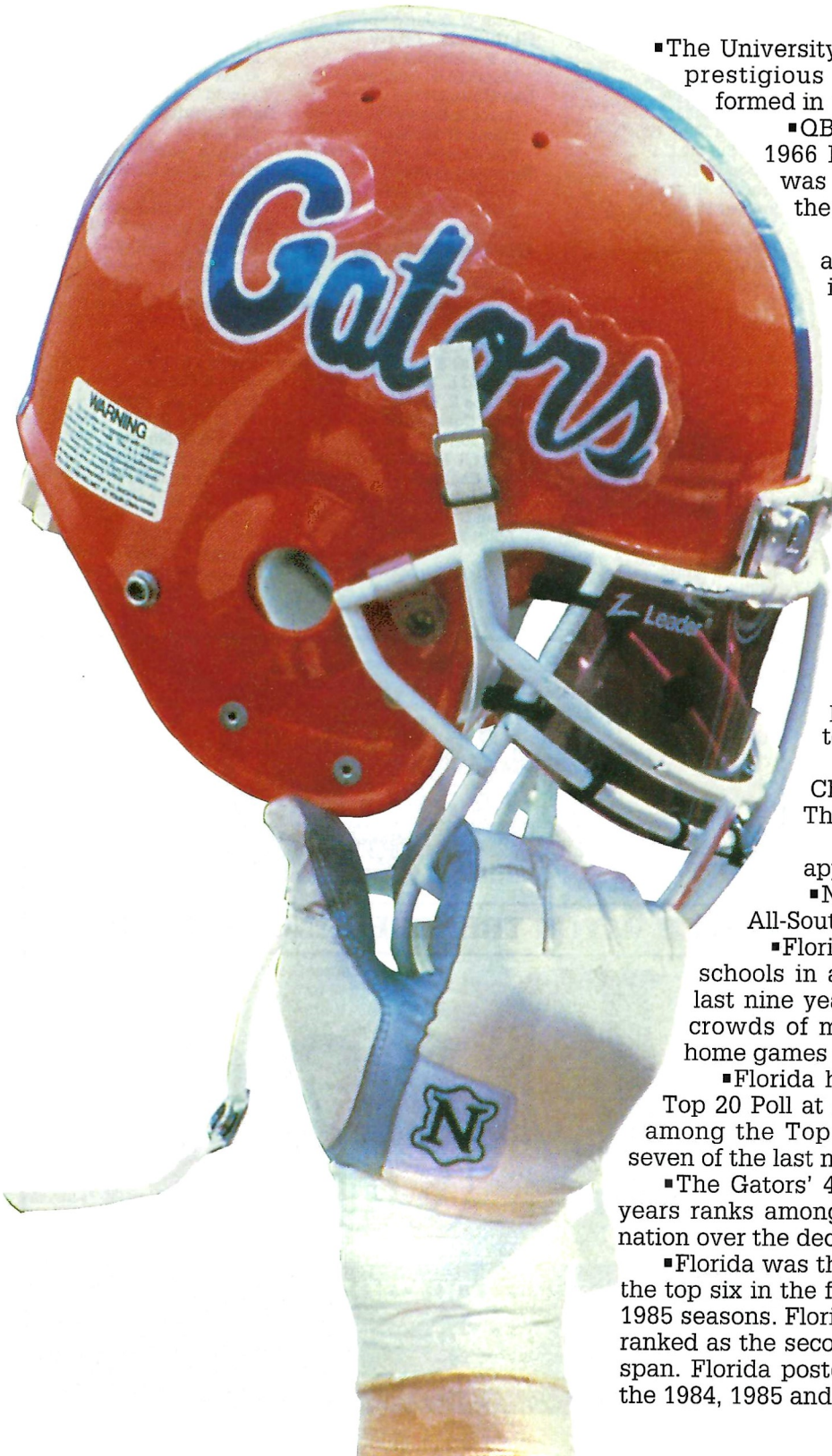
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A Proud Past, An Even Brighter Future



- The University of Florida was a charter member of the prestigious Southeastern Conference when it was formed in 1933

- QB Steve Spurrier was the recipient of the 1966 Heisman Trophy and LB Wilber Marshall was named the "National Defensive Player of the Year" in 1983

- Seventy-three Gator players have achieved All-America recognition, including 41 alone in the decade of the 1980s

- Twenty-two Florida players have been selected in the first round of the NFL Draft, 13 Gators have played in the Pro Bowl and 10 former UF Players have played in the Super Bowl

- In each of the last nine years, (1983-91), UF has had at least one player selected in the opening round of the NFL Draft, the only school in the nation to achieve that distinction during that span. In fact, UF's current streak of nine consecutive years with at least one first-round NFL Draft selection is the longest for any school since the NFL began its draft in 1936. From 1983-91, UF had 13 players selected in the first round, the top total in the nation for that nine-year period

- Florida was named the 1984 National Champion by both The Sporting News and The New York Times after its 9-1-1 season

- Florida has made 18 bowl game appearances

- Ninety-three Gators have earned first-team All-Southeastern Conference honors

- Florida has ranked among the nation's top 15 schools in average home attendance in each of the last nine years. The Gators have played before home crowds of more than 70,000 in each of the past 39 home games

- Florida has been ranked in the Associated Press Top 20 Poll at some point in 35 of the last 40 years and among the Top 15 at some point during the season in seven of the last nine years

- The Gators' 49-9-2 record at Florida Field the last ten years ranks among the five best home field records in the nation over the decade

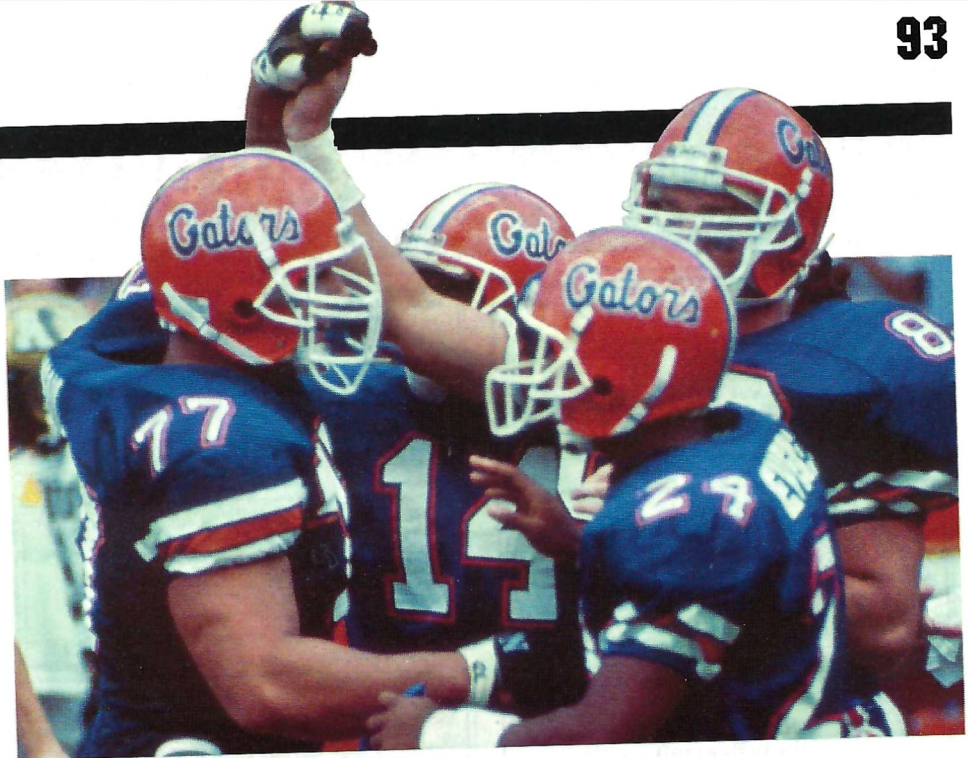
- Florida was the only school in the nation that ranked in the top six in the final AP Poll in each of the 1983, 1984 and 1985 seasons. Florida's 24-4-2 combined record from 1983-85 ranked as the second-best in the nation over that three-year span. Florida posted the best record in the SEC in each of the 1984, 1985 and 1990 seasons.

▪The University of Florida, the University of Texas and the University of Southern Cal are the only three schools in the nation that saw their football team ranked in the final AP Top 20 for 1990, had their overall athletic program ranked among the ten most successful in the nation in a 1990 ranking by USA Today, and are members of the Association of American Universities—the most prestigious organization of higher education in North America

▪In 1990, the University of Florida appeared on national television eight times. In its last 40 games, the Gator football team has appeared on national TV 24 times

▪Six Florida football players have earned Academic All-America honors, while former Gator great Carlos Alvarez was inducted into the GTE Academic All-America Hall of Fame. Also former Gator football player Bill Kynes was a Rhodes Scholar recipient and Gary Rolle was just one of 11 players in the nation selected for the prestigious National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete Award in 1984

▪Since 1980, 69 UF football players have been named to the Academic All-Southeastern Honor Roll. Huey Richardson, a first-round selection by the Pittsburgh Steelers in the 1991 NFL Draft, was a four-time Academic All-SEC selection

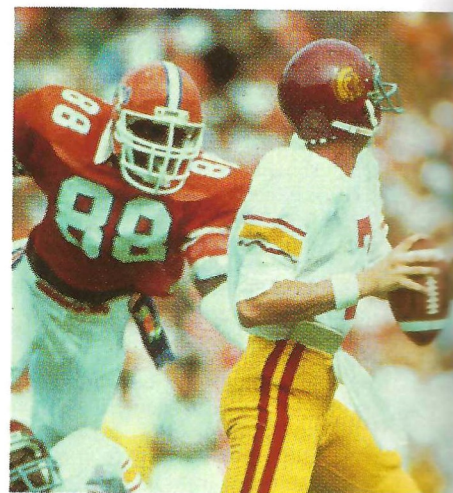

Gator Gymnastics Season Opens in January

The 1992 Florida gymnastics team wants to pick up where it ended the 1991 season. The Gator team used a strong team performance to move up to sixth at the 1991 NCAA Championships in Tuscaloosa, Ala. Florida Coach Ernestine Weaver feels this year's team is building on its success of last season and she is optimistic about the upcoming campaign.

"The team looks great," said Weaver. "I think we have a continuation of what was going on last year. There is a belief on this team that they can be in the top echelon. That was a missing ingredient, I think, before. They are building on the success of last year and we as a coaching staff are excited about this team."

Florida opens the 1992 season with the annual Meet the Team, scheduled for Jan. 10 in the Stephen C. O'Connell Center. Florida fans will get a preview of the team's routines, plus will enjoy the performance of Paul Hunt, a gymnastics comedienne.

Gator Gymnastics Season Notes...

- Two-time All-American Christina McDonald returns to the Gator squad in 1992. As a sophomore, McDonald was runner-up in the NCAA Championships uneven bars final. She matched the Florida All-Time Best uneven bars mark of 9.90 three times in 1991 and tied for top honors in the Southeastern Conference uneven bars competition.

- Florida's lone senior, Melissa Kutcher, is Florida's other returning school record holder. Kutcher matched the Florida All-Time Best vault mark of 9.85 last year in Baton Rouge, La.

- One aspect of this year's team that Weaver sees as a sign of their commitment to the team's success is that every member has learned new tricks during the off season. Gator fans should expect a strengthened Florida vaulting line-up in addition to new tricks throughout the event rotation.

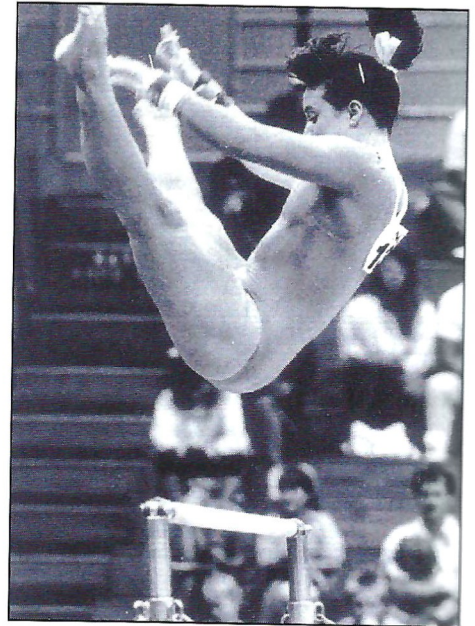
- Although Florida signed one recruit last spring (Colleen Johnson, a member of the 1991 Canadian bronze-medal Pan American team), Coach Weaver feels as if she has two more

new recruits in sophomores Lisa Panzironi and Kia Ellis. Panzironi, a former member of the U.S. National team, limited her contributions to balance beam as a freshman due to injuries. But Weaver says Panzironi is back to form and could break into the all-around line-up this season. Ellis ruptured a right Achilles tendon early in the 1991 campaign and sat out the rest of the season recovering from the injury. Ellis is back in the gym and should return to the Gator line-up in 1992.

Lady Gator Bytes

- The bracket for the 1991 NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship will be announced Sunday, Dec. 1 and Florida is looking for its first NCAA berth since the 1987 season. The 1991 Gator team is enjoying a highly successful campaign, earning a No. 5 national ranking—the highest rank ever by a Gator volleyball team. First-round action for the NCAA Volleyball tournament will be played Dec. 5, 6 or 7, while the regionals are scheduled for Dec. 12-14. The NCAA Championship is scheduled for Dec. 19-21 in Los Angeles, Calif.

- The Florida basketball team plays host for the Lady Gator Classic Dec. 28-29 in the Stephen C. O'Connell Center. The Lady Gators play New Hampshire Dec. 28 at 3

Q & A With Baseball Coach Joe Arnold

Q. THE STRENGTH OF THIS YEAR'S BASEBALL TEAM APPEARS TO BE THE PITCHING STAFF. JUST HOW GOOD CAN THIS UNIT BE?

A. "There is no question that we have a tremendous pitching staff. John Burke (junior), Marc Valdes (sophomore), Ron Scott (sophomore) and the return of Doug Brennan (junior) and John Pricher (senior) to the bullpen give us as much depth as anyone in the country. Of course the big plus is Burke returning to school rather than signing to play professional ball. That in itself is a huge lift. To have someone that can win 10-12 games return when we didn't plan on it gives us a new outlook on our situation. It will certainly take a lot of pressure off the newcomers. We feel confident that our pitching staff will be able to hold our opponents to a low score almost every time out. Now it boils down to scoring runs and playing defense behind them. To be successful, our defense will be a big key."

Q. THE OUTFIELD RETURNS SEVERAL EXCELLENT CANDIDATES FOR PLAYING TIME. WHAT CAN YOU SAY ABOUT THIS AREA DEFENSIVELY?

A. "We will be very strong in the outfield with good arms and great speed. You have to hit it a long way to get it past Brian Duva (sophomore) and Dave Majeski (senior), and Brian Purvis (senior) gets as good a jump on the ball as anyone. There are five or six we can put out there who are more than capable of handling the job."

Q. YOU WILL HAVE TO REPLACE TWO STRONG CATCHERS FROM LAST YEAR. WHO WILL BE READY TO STEP IN AND START FOR THIS TEAM?

A. "We lost two good catchers in Mario Linares and Jimmy Bell off our 1991 team. They were a great tandem which allowed us not to have to use the same catcher every day. We expect Kevin Lewis (junior) to come in and do a fine job for us, though, and feel we won't miss a beat with him in the game. He throws extremely well, blocks the ball and has power at the plate. He has all the tools, and if he puts it together he will be a pro player."

Q. IF THERE IS A QUESTION ABOUT THIS 1991-92 TEAM, IT

WOULD HAVE TO BE, WHO WILL COVER SECOND AND THIRD?

A. "Ted Rich (senior) is a key to our club. We aren't sure whether he will play second or third, but he will be in there. He is a steady player with the ability to hit 10-12 home runs. Kevin Polcovich (senior), who will be our starting shortstop, and Brent Killen (senior), who will start at first, are also important because they will provide that needed experience and leadership when working side by side with the newcomers. If Ted plays at second, we will use either Shane McGinnis (freshman) or Chris Kokinda (freshman) at third. If Rich ends up at third, Brandt Matthews (freshman) will most likely see starting time at second. Even though we are young at third and second, all three freshman had a good fall."

Q. YOU HAVE A TOUGH SCHEDULE. WHAT ARE YOUR FEELINGS ABOUT PLAYING SOME OF THE BEST TEAMS IN THE COUNTRY?

A. "We will have a marked club. It will be a big plus for a lot of teams to have a win on their schedule against Florida. The Gators seem to be marked every year in all sports, but it doesn't bother us. We always have to play against our top rivals such as Florida State, Miami, Tennessee, Georgia and LSU. It is tough, but we enjoy that kind of schedule."

Q. WHAT GOALS HAVE YOU SET FOR THE UPCOMING SEASON?

A. "Of course, our goals are to get back to Omaha and the College World Series to play for the national championship. But we must have someone step forward. Someone that you don't expect. On our team, we need a .380 type player who hits twice as many home runs than he did last year. Brian Purvis, Brent Killen, Dave Majeski, Bo Camposano (junior) all could have that type of year. If we have just one, we will be extremely tough, and my prediction is that we will have one step forward."

Q. WHAT WILL IT TAKE FOR YOU TO BE SUCCESSFUL?

A. "The season is week to week. If we have a three game series, we want to win three games. We can't afford to

look down the road too far, and we must guard against complacency. It is important that we instill that killer instinct in our young players. If all of this falls in place, we can be a very successful ball club."

Former Slaves Helped Seminole Indians

A University of Florida doctoral student has helped produce an award-winning documentary about free blacks who helped the Seminole Indians in the 1700s.

Doctoral student Denise Matthews won a Suncoast Emmy and a Florida Historical Society award for the documentary "Black Warriors of the Seminole." Matthews, also an independent television producer, shared the award with Dennis Gaston, a videographer, and Vinnie Jones, a producer/director, both with WUFT-TV, the campus television station and local PBS affiliate.

The program, which cost \$65,000 to produce, depicts the black Seminole Indians, a group of escaped and freed slaves from the Carolinas who lived and worked in Florida with Seminole tribes in the 1700s.

Matthews' talked with the Indians at Wewoka, OK., the Seminoles' headquarters about 40 miles east of Oklahoma City. Descendants of the black Seminoles in Brackettville, TX., near the Mexican border, also were interviewed for the documentary.

Matthews discovered that once the blacks escaped from their owners or were freed, they came to Florida, where they were allowed to share land with the Seminoles, although they lived separately from the Indians.

Since their masters had spoken Spanish, English and French, the escaped slaves picked up the languages and helped work out treaties for their Indian friends, Matthews said.

White settlers began coming to Florida in droves after the territory was acquired

by the United States in 1821. Because about two-thirds of Florida is wetlands, the white settlers fought Florida Indians for land they could farm. Whites also wanted the Indians out because they had let blacks join them as equals, Matthews said. The whites wanted to separate the blacks from the Seminoles and have them back as slaves.

In 1830, President Andrew Jackson ordered all Indians from the Southeast moved to "Indian Territory," in what is now Oklahoma.

"But the government totally underestimated the situation," Matthews said. "They didn't realize how intertwined the blacks and Indians were."

The Seminoles resisted the move at first, but when the whites kept coming, they eventually had no choice but to move west.

Once in Oklahoma, black Seminoles were continually harassed by slave-catchers, even though they thought they would be free there.

John Horse, a black, and Wildcat, an Indian — considered Osceola's right hand men — brought 300 black Seminoles to Mexico, where they knew they would be free because slavery had been abolished. There, the black Seminoles were called scouts and worked as border patrolmen against cattle rustlers and outlaws.

The blacks remained in Mexico as border patrolmen until the U.S. emancipation of slaves in 1863, when the American Army invited them to come work as scouts on the American side of the Mexican border. They lived on army land and patrolled the Texas side of the border for more than 40 years, receiving three congressional medals of honor, according to Matthews' research.

Versions of this story appeared in the *Florida Star* and other publications.

UF Links Horse Colic To Excess Of Protein

University of Florida veterinary researchers reported they have identified a protein in horses that may trigger some of the severe symptoms of colic and other life-threatening diseases in the animals.

Dr. Robert MacKay, who discovered the equine protein, said the finding may aid the development of antibody treatments against colic.

It also may be helpful in treatments against potentially deadly bacterial in-

fections and laminitis, which is characterized by swollen hooves.

The protein, called tumor necrosis factor, is produced as part of the body's natural response to invading bacteria. The protein, present in people and most other mammals, normally plays a beneficial role in the body's defenses against infection.

But MacKay found that when unusually high levels of the protein are

released into the blood, it becomes toxic by interacting with other parts of the immune system.

MacKay analyzed blood samples from more than 1,000 horses, detecting TNF only in horses sick with diseases such as colic, laminitis and severe intestinal infections. Healthy horses showed no trace of the protein.

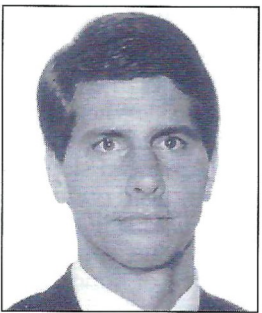

The governing bodies are the Board of Directors, the Executive Committee and the newly established Alumni Council.

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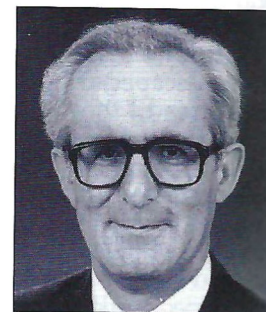

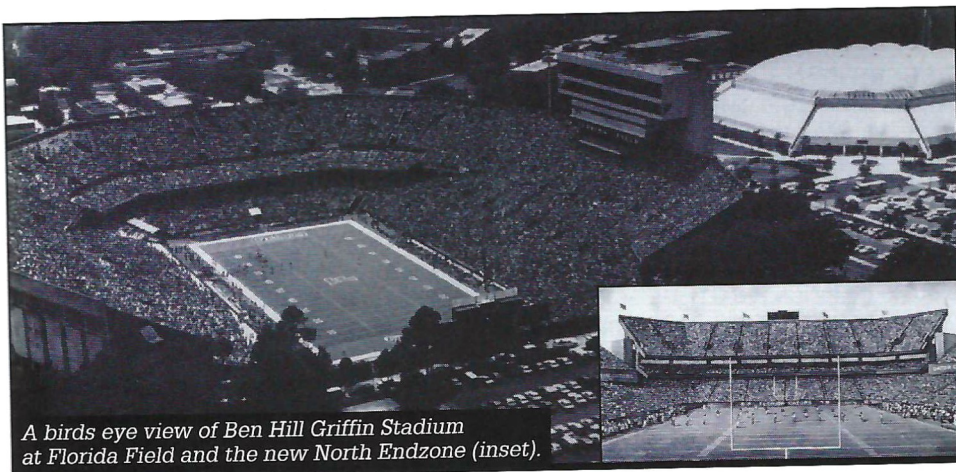
Ben Hill Griffin Stadium at Florida Field

Ben Hill Griffin Stadium at Florida Field has moved into the national spotlight in recent years as one of collegiate football's best stadiums, from a player and fan standpoint.

The 1991 season marks the 62nd year that Florida Field is the home of the Gators. Prior to the 1989 season, Florida Field took on the expanded name of Ben Hill Griffin Stadium at Florida Field in honor of Ben Hill Griffin, Jr., a life-long Gator supporter and fan who had been extremely benevolent

and generous to several sectors at the University of Florida prior to his passing in March of 1990. Florida Field was originally dedicated on Nov. 8, 1930 when Florida met Alabama. Over the years, Florida Field has become a standing remembrance to all Floridians who have died in military service to our nation.

and gave the Gator football program one of the nation's top collegiate stadiums. Since that time, Florida has ranked in the top 15 nationally in attendance for nine consecutive years.

The 18,000 seats with the 1982 expansion and the addition of a complete athletic training center located beneath the stands in the south endzone, were all part of a master plan to develop athletic facilities at Florida that are second to none. The Ben Hill Griffin, Jr., Athletic Training Center, the luxury skyboxes and a spacious and highly-functional press box combined to make Florida Field the premier collegiate stadium in the state of Florida.

The original stadium, constructed in 1930, consisted of the lower half of the current stadium. Seating capacity was 21,769. The entire stadium was constructed below ground. In 1950,

bowl, cost \$17 million and involved no state funding. The structure added 18 skyboxes to the stadium, which now has 46 skyboxes. Also, the structure has 2,000 club-level seats, 1,300 covered chairback seats, 5,000 upper-level chairbacks, concession stands and a new gift shop. The structure is also home to a new museum featuring Gator athletics.

In August of 1982, the south endzone project was completed and raised the seating capacity of Ben Hill Griffin Stadium at Florida Field to over 72,000

over 11,000 seats were added on the west side and another 7,000 were provided by bleachers on the east side. The additions brought seating capacity to 40,116. Additional bleacher seats were added during the 1950s, bringing capacity to 46,164 by 1960. In December of 1965, construction started again on further additions that added over 10,000 permanent seats on the east side and temporary bleachers moved from the east side to the south endzone, providing a total capacity of 62,800 (56,164 permanent seats). The south endzone expansion in '82 enclosed the south end of the stadium, and brought capacity to 72,000. The north endzone transformed the horseshoe into a bowl and raised capacity to 83,000.

Also new for the 1990 season was the all-natural grass playing surface which was installed during the summer, shortly after the arrival of head football coach Steve Spurrier. The natural grass surface replaced an artificial surface which had been in place since 1971.

RESTROOMS

Women: Under West stands opposite Sections 8 & 9, and at Northeast corner. Also, under East stands opposite Section 33 & 34. In the South End Zone, women's restrooms can be found at the East & West corner of each concourse level. In the North End Zone, at the East & West corners of each concourse level.

Men: Under West stands opposite Sections 12 & 13. Under East stands opposite Sections 39 & 46. In the South End Zone, men's restrooms can be found at the East & West corner of each concourse level. In the North End Zone, at the East & West corners of each concourse level.

LOST & FOUND/INFORMATION: Lost and found articles should be reported or turned into the INFORMATION BOOTH by Gate 2 on the West side of the stadium.

TELEPHONES: There are public telephones located under the West stands between Gates 2 & 3 and East stands between Gates 13 & 14.
