

THE KICKOFF CLASSIC BEGINS ITS SECOND DECADE WITH A STELLAR MATCHUP

The proud history of the Kickoff Classic at Giants Stadium continues as Kickoff Classic XI today matches preseason No. 1 Florida State against Kansas.

Kickoff Classic I, played 10 years ago tomorrow, Aug. 29, 1983, paired defending national champion Penn State against third-ranked Nebraska.

Over its first decade, the Kickoff Classic brought to New Jersey five defending national champions (Penn State in 1983, Miami 1984, Brigham Young 1985, Notre Dame 1989, Georgia Tech 1991).

As the Kickoff Classic enters its second decade, the New Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority (NJSEA), under the auspices of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA), brings together a Florida State team which ranked second at the end of the 1992 season and upstart Kansas, ranked 22nd by the Associated Press and 23rd by USA Today/CNN after whipping Brigham Young in the Aloha Bowl last December to complete an 8-4 season.

The Jayhawks from the Big Eight Conference have a touch of local flavor. Their head coach Glen Mason was raised in New Jersey and played scholastic football at Colonia High School in Middlesex County.

It's good news for college football fans from New Jersey and the surrounding area that the excitement generated by the Kickoff Classic will continue in the coming years.

The NJSEA and NACDA have extended their agreement for seven years meaning that the Kickoff Classic, traditionally the first game of the college football season, will be played at Giants Stadium at least through the year 2000.

"The game has been a tremendous success for college football, specifically the programs run by NACDA, the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame, the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) and the Independent College Fund of New Jersey," noted Robert E. Mulcahy III, president and CEO of NJSEA.

All of the organizations mentioned by

Mulcahy are beneficiaries of the Kickoff Classic.

"The fact that after 10 years we were able to negotiate a long-term extension signifies both the respect and strength of the relationship between NACDA and the Sports Authority that has grown from jointly producing this game," Mulcahy said.

Far more important is the fact that in the 10 year-history of the game, the Kickoff Classic has resulted in the raising of \$4.5 million for the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame for its scholarship program and \$1.5 million for NACDA and its program.


Mulcahy and his colleagues at the Meadowlands also are excited that ABC Sports, the network of college football, is televising this year's game as part of a multi-year agreement.

"This association will give increased national visibility and prominence to what we feel is already a first-class event. This is indeed a major step up for the game. I think it's going to be a major factor in our ability to project the game across the country," Mulcahy said.

"We are very happy to establish a relationship with the Kickoff Classic," David Downs, ABC Sports' vice president of programming said. "This matchup, showcasing two of the top teams in the nation, is a perfect opening to ABC Sports' coverage of college football in 1993."

Florida State, a perennial national power under Coach Bobby Bowden, is the heavy preseason choice to come through the 1993 campaign as the nation's top team, despite losing four key defensive players in the first two rounds of the NFL draft.

The Seminoles also went through spring practice without quarterback Charlie Ward, an All-America and Heisman Trophy candidate who was fourth in the nation in total offense last year averaging 286.5 yards per game as Florida State posted an 11-1 record and a No. 2 national ranking. The Seminoles had a perfect 8-0 Atlantic Coast Conference record in their first season in that league.

Bowden said he's "not really concerned" about his quarterback having missed the spring sessions. Certainly Ward doesn't have to prove himself to anyone, having completed passes for 2,647 yards and 22 touchdowns last

season, while rushing for 504 yards and another six touchdowns.

Bowden says Ward is "as dangerous a football player" as he's ever coached. Ward has all the attributes of a great quarterback, and the thing that his coach believes sets him apart is his elusiveness.

At tailback, Florida State returns Sean Jackson (6-1, 222) and Tiger McMillion (5-9, 180) who combined for 1,068 yards last fall, 579 by McMillion and 489 by Jackson as they each averaged five yards a rush. William Floyd (6-0, 245), who scored nine rushing touchdowns and one as a receiver, returns at fullback.

The Seminoles have receivers aplenty for Ward, including sophomore flanker Tamarick Vanover, the team's leading receiver a year ago (42 for 581 yards, 4 TDs) and the Atlantic Coast Conference Rookie of the Year. Vanover also is a dangerous kick returner and had a 96-yard kickoff return for a touchdown against Wake Forest.


Kez McCorvey, Matt Frier and Kevin Knox all played at split end last year with 91 catches among them for over 1,250 yards and 11 touchdowns.

In addition to the drafted defensive players, the Seminoles lost a couple of key performers on the offensive line with sophomores Clay Shiver and Forrest Conoly of Berlin, Conn., expected to fill the gaps at center and tackle, respectively.

Patrick McNeil, a junior, and Lewis Tyre, only a sophomore, are the returning starters at guard, Marvin Ferrell at the other tackle and Lonnie Johnson at tight end where last year he caught eight passes, two for touchdowns.

"This is about the third time in the last six seasons that we've been the preseason No. 1. Don't blink your eyes. We don't stay that way very long," joked Bowden. "But this is a milestone for us because it's the first time we've played in this Classic."

"Offensively, we have a bunch of them back," Bowden admitted. "We

lost a quick tackle and a center. Defensively, we've got hit pretty good. We lost six starters, we lost our defensive line. We lost what we thought was the best linebacker in the United States in Marvin Jones. We lost both our safeties. So we've got a lot of missing parts to replace."

"I worry about us early," Bowden said. "I think by the end of the year if we stay healthy we're going to be pretty darn good, but starting off we've got some question marks."

Tradition dictates that the Seminoles will be excellent by the season's end. Bowden has guided the school to six straight top 5 finishes and is the only Division I coach to have led his team to six straight 10-win seasons. Last year's 11-1 record included a 27-14 win over Nebraska in the Orange Bowl.

Outside linebacker Derrick Brooks, a 6-1, 220 sophomore, was second to Jones in tackles last season with 98 and should be the key figure in the defense this fall. Junior Corey Sawyer returns at cornerback where he led the team in 1992 with seven interceptions. Clifton Abraham is another experienced cornerback.

As if the Seminoles don't have enough weapons in their arsenal,



Bowden went out this year and recruited a kicker from Aurora, Colo., Scott Bentley, who he said "can kick the laces off the ball." Kicking has been a concern the last couple of years, especially in the two most recent games with state rival Miami, when the failure to convert field goals inside 40 yards spelled defeat.

As the favorite in today's game, Bowden admits, "You're reluctant to play. Yet we've gotten our program to the point now where we're ranked higher than everybody. That's the way it is and we'll have our boys ready to play."

Bowden is a veteran of post-season bowl play. His Florida State teams have been to bowls every season since 1982 and his overall bowl record is 12-3-1, including 11-2-1 at Florida State and a 1-1 at West Virginia. The Seminoles have won eight straight bowl games since a 17-17 tie with Georgia in the 1984 Citrus Bowl. They haven't lost a bowl game since 1980.

Conversely, when Kansas whipped BYU in the Aloha Bowl last December, it marked Mason's first coaching appearance in a bowl game and Kansas' first bowl in 31 years. Mason doesn't say he relishes the underdog role, but he does savor the knowledge that he has the Jayhawks' program headed in the right direction. Last year's 8-4 record was Mason's best in five years at Kansas and best at the school since the Jayhawks went 8-4 in 1981.

When he was hired in 1988, "the program was not where anyone wanted it to be," Mason said. After three losing seasons, the New Jersey native gave Kansas its first winning season in 10 years with a 6-5 record in 1991.

With a 4-3 record last season, the Jayhawks finished third in the Big Eight Conference and again this season are generally picked to finish behind heavyweights Nebraska and Colorado.

The top priority in Kansas' spring drills was to find a quarterback to replace Chip Hilleary. "This year quarterback is the big question, but there's no question we have some depth there that we never had before," Mason said.

Junior Fred Thomas started preseason drills as No. 1, pushed by sophomore Asheiki Preston and junior Van Davis.

Though experience is lacking at quarterback, Mason thinks, "We'll be more talented in the backfield because we have some young kids with more ability than we've had in the past."

One of these kids is sophomore L.T. Levine, who hails from the same hometown as his coach, Colonia, N.J. The 210 pound Levine will see action as a running back and kick returner.

Mason is very high on the Jersey product. "We really think he'll be the most talented running back we've had since I've been at Kansas," the coach said. "He has good size, good speed and is very durable."

The workhorse runner for the Jayhawks this fall figures to be senior tailback George White, who moves up from a reserve role the past two seasons. He's appeared in 23 straight games and was the squad's fourth leading rusher last year with 427 yards.

The Kansas receiver corps has the long and short of it with 6-6 Rodney Harris at one wideout and a 5-6 Ashaundai Smith at the other. Mason claims the depth, speed and skill at wide receiver are the best he's had in his six seasons with the Jayhawks.

On the front line, Kansas returns tight end Dwayne Chandler and guard John Jones, only a sophomore, to head up a veteran cast. Both were first team All-Big Eight last season.

On defense, the Jayhawks did not take the hit that the Seminoles did. In fact, Mason says, "On defense, we return just about everybody."

The starters include All-Big Eight safety Kwamie Lassiter, who had 77 tackles and four interceptions last season, his first with the Jayhawks after transferring from junior college. The veteran secondary also will have Robert Vaughn and Gerald McBurrows at the corners. Vaughn had 70 tackles and

three interceptions a year ago.

Keith Rodgers, a sophomore who played a great deal as a true freshman last season, moves in as the starter at strong safety. The Jayhawks have an impressive group of secondary recruits, including high school All-American Tony Blevins.

Up front the defense features ends Sylvester Wright and Guy Howard, tackle Chris Maumalanga, and outside linebackers Ronnie Ward and Don Davis. Inside backers Larry Thiel and Steve Harvey, who combined for 115 tackles last season, were question marks as preseason drills started because of injuries.

Unlike Florida State, Kansas did not have to go out and recruit a kicker. In senior Dan Eichloff, the Jayhawks have what Mason calls "the best placekickerpunter combination in the country, and he happens to be from Florida (Fort Lauderdale)."


Eichloff, the school's all-time scoring leader, has made 49 of 65 field goal attempts. As a punter, he has a 41.8 average, with 25 punts of 50 yards or longer.

It's a tough opener for both teams today and neither is going to have an easy time the rest of the season. In addition to its ACC schedule, Florida State takes on Miami, Notre Dame and Florida. If the Seminoles get through that schedule unscathed, they'll deserve to be the national champions.


Before plunging into its Big Eight schedule, Kansas will play Western Carolina, Michigan State, Utah and Colorado State. The Jayhawks' showdown battles with conference rivals Nebraska and Colorado come back-to-back on Nov. 6 and 13.





KICKOFF CLASSIC ALL-DECADE TEAM



Tom Osborne, Coach, Nebraska

As the Kickoff Classic enters its second decade today, we look back on the first decade and the great players who have participated in the game. The Kickoff Classic All-Decade Team was selected on the following basis: To qualify a player must have started or made a significant contribution in the game. The Committee's vote was primarily based on the player's accomplishment in the Kickoff Classic followed by his college and professional career.

There are 25 inductees including an offensive unit, defensive unit, kicker, punter and coach.

OFFENSIVE UNIT

Dean Brown, OT, Notre Dame

Played in KOC as a senior...started 25 straight games for Irish at right tackle to finish out college career... helped Irish as a team set record in '89 for most rushing TDs in a season...currently playing for Kansas City.

Harry Galbreath, OG, Tennessee

Two-time All-America selection... received the Jacobs Award as the SEC's top blocker...selected as a member of the UT 100 Years All-Time team at offensive guard...eighth-round pick of

Miami...signed with Green Bay this past off-season.

Pat Harlow, OT, USC

Among the nation's most dominating collegiate offensive linemen...All-America...winner of the Pac-l0's Morris Trophy given to the league's top offensive lineman...Hula Bowl participant... first-round pick of the New England Patriots.

Dean Steinkuhler, OG, Nebraska Outland Trophy and Lombardi Trophy winner in '83...one of the key figures in '82 offensive machine that led nation in rushing, scoring and total offense...Nebraska's fastest lineman ever...first-round pick by Houston... played for Oilers 1984-91.

Mark Traynowicz, C, Nebraska

Key element of Mike Rozier's Heisman Trophy season in '83...All-America and All-Big Eight pick...second-round pick by the Buffalo Bills (1985-87)...with Phoenix Cardinals 1988-89.

Scott Gieselman, TE, Boston College


Shares KOC record for pass receptions (9) with Quinn Early of Iowa...connected for team-high 79 yards...fifth on BC's career receptions list with 120 catches for 1,485 yards and 10 TDs... selected in fourth round by New England in '86 Draft.

Reggie Cobb, RB, Tennessee

Holds KOC record for rushing attempts (25)...came off bench as a freshman to gain 138 yards including 74 in the fourth quarter against Iowa...went on to rush for 1,197 yards and 17 TDs that year...ranks third on the UT career net yardage list with 2,360 yards on 445 attempts for a 5.3 average per carry...entering fourth season with Tampa Bay.

Alonzo Highsmith, FB, Miami

Holds KOC record for rushing yards (140) on 22 carries...also caught three passes for 32 yards...second on Miami's career rushing list with 1,914



Robbie Bosco, QB, BYU

yards...fifth in all-purpose yards with 2,935...tied for fourth in total touchdowns with 25...third pick in '87 Draft by Houston...currently with Tampa Bay.

Eddie Brown, WR, Miami

Eight receptions for 157 yards against Auburn in KOC...second on career list in receiving yardage (1,754)...10th in career receptions with 89...first-team All-America as a senior...became first Hurricane receiver to surpass 1,000 yards in a season by catching 59 passes for 1,114 yards in '84...first-round draftee of Cincinnati.

Glen Kozlowski, WR, BYU

Holds KOC record for receiving yards (241)...chief beneficiary of Bosco's record-setting efforts...grabbed 10 passes for 241 yards and a TD...played in just five games as a senior (includes KOC) due to knee injury...All-WAC as junior after 55 catches for 879 yards and 11 TDs...drafted by Chicago in the 11th round of '86 Draft, retired in 1993 after a knee injury.

Robbie Bosco, QB, BYU

Holds six KOC records including pass completions (35), attempts (53) and yards (508), and total offense yards (470)...MVP of KOC III against Boston



College...threw for three touchdowns... led BYU to national championship in 1984...set 10 NCAA records...completed 338 of 511 passes for 4,273 yards and 30 TDs as senior...drafted in thirdround by Green Bay...currently assistant football coach at BYU.

DEFENSIVE UNIT

Jason Buck, DT, BYU

Nine tackles against Boston College in KOC... capped off college career by winning the Outland Trophy awarded to the nation's outstanding interior lineman...two-time WAC Defenive Player of the Year...currently with the Washington Redskins.

Kevin Fagan, DE, Miami

Five tackles against Auburn in KOC. . . leader in tackles for loss and sacks as a junior . . . currently in eighth year with San Francisco 49ers.

Mike Ruth, NG, Boston College

Holds KOC record for tackles for loss (5) and sacks (4)...also had nine tackles and one interception...number 68 was retired at BC...Outland Trophy winner in 1985...consensus first-team America...selected in the second round (42nd pick) by the New England Patriots.

Chris Zorich, DT, Notre Dame

Five tackles against Virginia in KOC... received Lombardi Award in '90 as toprated lineman in college game... two-time consensus first-team All-America...second-round selection of Chicago Bears.

Mark Donofrio, ILB, Penn State

Team-high 10 tackles against Georgia Tech...credited with 217 tackles for his career...shoulder injury sidelined him for final five games of senior season... Butkus Award finalist.

Bill Romanowski, LB, Boston College Eight tackles against BYU in KOC... starter since freshman season...chosen MVP in BC's Cotton Bowl victory as a freshman, recording 13 tackles, including 11 solos...currently with the San Francisco 49ers.

Chris Spielman, LB, Ohio State Shares KOC record for tackles (16) with Kelly Ziegler of Tennessee.. .MVP of KOC IV against Alabama...first defensive player and only member of a losing team to be chosen MVP... capped a brilliant career by winning the 1987 Lombardi Award...two-time consensus All-America...OSU's career leader in solo tackles with 283... finished career with 546 tackles... played four years for the Detroit Lions.

Todd Lyght, CB, Notre Dame

Holds KOC record for interceptions (2)...picked off Virginia QB Shawn Moore on third play of game and Ricky Waters went on to score for ND...twotime All-America including unanimous selection in '89...one of three finalists for '89 Jim Thorpe Award that goes to top defensive back nationally...currently playing for the L.A. Rams.

Stephon Pace, FS, USC

Made game-high 10 total tackles against Syracuse in KOC...career stats at USC — 246 tackles, 8 interceptions returned for 39 yards, 31 pass deflections.

Ken Swilling, FS, Georgia Tech

Three tackles, one assist and one tackle for loss against Penn State...finished career at Georgia Tech with 267 tackles and 13 interceptions...1990 first team All-America...Jim Thorpe Award finalist...currently with the New England Patriots.

William Thomas, OLB, Texas A&M

Thirteen tackles against Nebraska...249 career tackles at A&M...consensus All-SWC first-team selection...AP honorable mention All-America...selected by Philadelphia Eagles in 4th-round of NFL draft...went on to become Eagles' starting linebacker for the No. 1 defense in the NFL.

Phil Reich, PK, Tennessee

Shares KOC record for field goal attempts (4) with Greg Barrios of Nebraska and field goals made (3) with five others...final field goal came with three seconds remaining to beat Iowa 23-22...connected on 16 of 23 field goal attempts and chipped in 40 of 42 PATs in his only season of action...had a career-long field goal of 51 yards against Auburn.

Kevin Towle, P, BYU

Holds KOC records for average yards per punt (52.5) and longest punt (60), also a career best...a walk-on...punted 53 times for 2,185 yards for a 41.2 average...ended up No. 5 in WAC punting statistics for 1985 and 38th in NCAA rankings.

Tom Osborne, Coach, Nebraska

Only coach to win two Kickoff Classics (I; 44-6 over Penn State, VI; 23-14 over Texas A&M)...owns a career record of 195-46-3 for an .805 winning percentage...has led team to 20 straight bowl appearances and at least a share of nine Big Eight titles...has produced an unprecedented three consecutive Outland Trophy winners.

NACDA CELEBRATES 100 YEARS OF ATHLETICS ADMINISTRATION

This year, the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) is celebrating the 100th anniversary of the athletics administration profession. The very first athletic director, called "graduate manager of athletics," was employed by Harvard University in 1893.

NACDA has been around for 28 of those years, serving a membership that continues to grow and change. Individual membership tops the 4,100 mark, while institutional membership is close to 1,500.

We are proud to sponsor the two pre-season football games, the Kickoff Classic and the Disneyland Pigskin Classic, which annually feature some of the nation's top collegiate teams and benefit several outstanding organizations.

One of those organizations is our own NACDA Foundation, which provides educational opportunities to NACDA members through workshops, seminars and clinics. Workshops with the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA), National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA), insurance clinics, time management seminars, drug education seminars and internship opportunities for aspiring collegiate athletics administrators are all part of the Foundation's services.

Additionally, the Foundation has two scholarship programs to assist top student-athletes with postgraduate study. The NACDA/Disney Scholar-Athlete Awards program annually provides 10 of the nation's top student-athletes with \$5,000 grants, a total of \$50,000 in scholarships funded by the Walt Disney Company. Also, the Foundation funds four \$5,000 grants, a total of \$20,000, for one member of each team participating in the two pre-season football games.

We extend our best wishes to the Florida State Seminoles and the Kansas Jayhawks for a successful season, both on the field and in the classroom.

KICKOFF CLASSICS I-X:

KICKOFF CLASSIC I

August 29, 1983

The first Kickoff Classic featured the great Nebraska team of 1983, led by Mike Rozier and Irving Fryer.

The Cornhuskers, who were ranked No. 1 until being upset on New Year's night by Miami at the Orange Bowl, overran Penn State 44-6.

Quarterback Turner Gill, named the game's outstanding offensive player, threw for one touchdown and ran for another as Nebraska took a 21-0 lead by halftime. Gill hit on eight of 10 passes for 111 yards in that half and the Cornhuskers coasted after that.

The Nebraska ground game rolled up 343 yards, while limiting the Nittany Lions to just 93. Rozier ended with 75 yards on 16 carriers and five Cornhuskers had at least 39 yards rushing.

There were 14 fumbles overall, including nine by Nebraska.

KICKOFF CLASSIC II

August 27, 1984

One of the most exciting Classics and one of the most starstudded, Kickoff Classic II saw defending national champs Miami squeak by Auburn 20-18.

Bernie Kosar led the Hurricanes, completing 21-of-38 passes for 329 yards and two touchdowns, while Bo Jackson, a year away from winning the Heisman Trophy, gained 106 yards on 20 carries.

However, Jackson was overshadowed by Miami running back Alonzo Highsmith, who rushed for 146 yards. Even Vinnie Testaverde, a Miami backup, saw action, completing the only pass he attempted.

Jackson's backup on Auburn, Brent Fullwood ran for 56 yards on 11 carries.

The lead changed three times in the final quarter, with Greg Cox hitting field goals of 45 and 25 yards to seal the victory.

KICKOFF CLASSIC III August 29, 1985

Robbie Bosco put on one of the best air shows ever seen at the Meadowlands in Kickoff Classic III.

The BYU quarterback connected on 35 of 53 passes for 508 yards—all Kickoff Classic records—and three touchdowns in the Cougars' 28-14 victory over Boston College. Glen Koslowski was the chief beneficiary of Bosco's efforts, grabbing 10 passes for 241 yards and a TD. Mark Bellini had nine catches for 111 yards.

Troy Stradford was BC's top performer, rushing for 104 yards and a touchdown. After Stradford's TD tied it at 14 late in the third quarter, Bosco marched BYU on scoring drives of 63 and 73 yards.

KICKOFF CLASSIC IV August 27, 1986

Alabama painted the Meadowlands a fine color of Crimson in Kickoff Classic IV, scoring 10 points in the fourth quarter to defeat Ohio State 16-10.

The Tide rolled for a 6-0 lead in the game's first 17 minutes on a pair of Van Tiffin field goals. But the Buckeyes rallied on a 26-yard scoring run by Jamie Holland and a 37-yard field goal by Pat O'Morrow.

Quarterback Mike Shula, son of Miami Dolphins' coach Don, engineered a 12-play, 73-yard drive which ended on a 3-yard

touchdown pass to Albert Bell. The winning drive took 13 plays and concluded on Tiffin's 28-yard field goal with 1:02 remaining.

It was almost too much time as OSU quarterback Jim Karsatos took his club 61 yards to the Alabama 18 on three passes and two pass interference calls. However, Karsatos' desperation pass for Cris Carter was broken up in the end zone.

KICKOFF CLASSIC V August 30, 1987

For the second straight year in the Kickoff Classic, a Southeastern Conference team rallied late to beat a Big Ten club. This time Tennessee got three field goals by Phil Reich—the last with three seconds remaining—to beat Iowa 23-22.

Tennessee's Reggie Cobb rushed for 142 yards— including 123 in the second half — playing in his first college game. Cobb was instrumental in setting up all three of Tennessee's scoring drives in the final quarter.

The Volunteers moved out to a 14-10 halftime lead, helped by a 96-yard fumble recovery and TD return by linebacker Darrin Miller.

However, it was Iowa who came out strong in the second half getting a Rob Houghtlin field goal and a Kevin Harmon 23-yard touchdown catch for a 19-14 lead.

Tennessee's winning drive featured four runs by Cobb and a 10-yard burst by Keith Davis on the way to Reich's 20-yard gamewinning field goal.

KICKOFF CLASSIC VI

August 27, 1988

Nebraska became the first team to return to the Kickoff Classic, and became the first team to go 2-0 in the season opening contest

with a 23-14 victory over Texas A&M.

The Cornhuskers had a much more difficult time in their second trip to Giants Stadium, outscoring the Aggie's 20-6 in the second half. Ken Clark led the way for Nebraska with 87 yards and a touchdown on 20 carries. Terry Rodgers added 66 yards on 10 rushes, while quarterback Steve Taylor added 55 yards on the ground.

Taylor also completed 11 of 22 passes for 125 yards and a 20-yard TD to tight end Todd Millikan.

Larry Horton was Texas A&M's top performer with 82 yards rushing on nine carries. The Nebraska defense held the Aggies to only five completions for 42 yards through the air.

KICKOFF CLASSIC VII August 31, 1989

Notre Dame began defense of its first national title in 12 years at Kickoff Classic VII against Virginia. The Fighting Irish lived up to their nickname, blitzing the overmatched Cavaliers 36-13.

It was essentially finished after one quarter, as quarterback Tony Rice ran Notre Dame around, through and over Virginia for three touchdowns.

Cornerback Todd Lyght, who had two interceptions, picked off Shawn Moore on the third play of the game and the Irish quickly cashed in for a Ricky Watters score. Fullbacks Anthony Johnson and Rodney Culver also had first-quarter TDs for Notre Dame.

The Fighting Irish ended with 303 yards rushing. Watters was the leader with 80 yards on 12 carries, while Johnson added a second touchdown to his 66 yards.

Raghib "Rocket" Ismail, Notre Dame's speedy sophomore, caught five passes for 121 yards, including a 52-yard strike from Rice which set up Culver's first-quarter TD.

Virginia scored two touchdowns in the fourth quarter, on Moore passes to Derek Dooley and Bruce McGonigal.

KICKOFF CLASSIC VIII August 31, 1990

Kickoff Classic VIII was dominated by two USC Trojans now starring in the NFL. Todd Marinovich, now a quarterback for the Los Angeles Raiders, lit up the Giants Stadium scoreboard for three touchdowns, while Ricky Ervins, rushed for 107 yards and one TD in the 34-16 victory over Syracuse.

After a scoreless first period, Marinovich got USC started with a 12-yard TD pass to Scott Lockwood and a 22-yard scoring strike to Ervins. However, Syracuse made it close on a field goal and a 30-yard TD from quarterback Marvin Graves to David Walker.

Marinovich had already put on a show by halftime, hitting on 13 of 17 passes for 149 yards. He got even better in the second half, leading the Trojans on four more scoring drives, including a 46-yard TD to Gary Wellman. Also, the USC defense, which gave up almost 200 yards to Syracuse in the first half, turned stingy allowing only 139 yards and two field goals the rest of the way. The unit also forced five fumbles by the Orangemen.

Marinovich ended with 337 yards on 25 of 35 passing. Wellman finished with seven catches for 109 yards, while Ervins also caught

four passes for 43 yards.

Graves, starting his first game for Syracuse, completed 15 of 30 passes for 191 yards and a touchdown. He also led the team with 86 yards rushing.

KICKOFF CLASSIC IX

August 28, 1991

Penn State's second trip to the Kickoff Classic was a lot more satisfying and much more successful. Tony Sacca threw a Classic-record five touchdowns as the Nittany Lions routed co-national champion Georgia Tech 34-22 before 77,409, the biggest crowd ever to watch college football at Giants Stadium.

Neither team looked sharp early on, but Sacca began excelling in Penn State's non-traditional offense. The quarterback hit Terry Smith for the first of two touchdowns, a 4-yard pass just before the end of the first quarter. Smith added an 8-yard TD grab midway through the next period. Georgia Tech finally scored on the last play of the half, a Classic-record 5l-yard field goal by Scott Sisson.

The Nittany Lions really got going in the second half, rolling past the vaunted Tech defense — led by Marco Coleman and Ken Swilling — for three more TDs. O.J. McDuffie caught scoring passes of 5 and 39 yards, while Richie Anderson broke free on a swing pass for a 52-yard TD.

Sacca ended with 206 yards on 13-of-24 passing. The Nittany Lions still ran for more yards than they threw, but not by much. Sam Gash had the bulk of Penn State's 209 yards on the ground, with 80 yards on 11 carries.

Georgia Tech, which came in with an 18-game unbeaten streak, struck for three touchdowns in the game's final 4:40, but never really threatened Penn State. Shawn Jones, who led the Yellow Jackets to an 11-0-1 season in 1990 and a co-national championship, completed only 15 of 31 passes for 155 yards. He also ran for 52 yards and a TD.

Jeff Howard came on to throw Georgia Tech's final two scores.

KICKOFF CLASSIC X August 29, 1992

North Carolina State made the 10th Kickoff Classic live up to its name, scoring 10 points in the final quarter to defeat Iowa 24-14. Wolfpack quarterback Terry Jordan, the game's MVP, continually befuddled the Hawkeyes with N.C. State's option attack.

Jordan connected on 15 of 24 passes for 160 yards and the clinching 5-yard touchdown to Eddie Goines with under two minutes remaining as Iowa became the first team to lose twice in the Kickoff Classic.

N. C. State got first-half touchdowns from running backs Gary Downs and Anthony Barbour, while Iowa countered with a pair of scoring passes from Jim Hartlieb to star wideout Danan Hughes.

The third quarter was scoreless, but the Wolfpack broke out on top on Steve Videtich's 46-yard field goal with 6:50 left. On the Hawkeyes' next possession, Hartlieb was intercepted by safety Mike Reid, setting up the Wolfpack's last touchdown.

Barbour finished with 95 yards rushing to lead N. C. State, while Hughes caught 7 passes for 87 yards, including two touchdowns.



KICKOFF CLASSIC MOST VALUABLE PLAYER: THE WILLIAM J. FLYNN AWARD



William J. Flynn

William J. Flynn, the recently retired athletic director at Boston College, is honored each year at the Kickoff Classic when the Most Valuable Player award, named for him, is handed out.

Flynn, who led the BC program for 33 years until he stepped down on June 1, 1991, was instrumental in the effort which established the Kickoff Classic in 1983.

Flynn received many accolades during his tenure in sports administration. In 1984, he was the winner of the Distinguished American Award by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame. He won the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics' James J. Corbett Award in 1981 for outstanding achievements and contributions to athletic administration. In 1979, Flynn became only the second athletic director to serve as president of the NCAA. He also was president of NACDA from 1977-

Flynn will also be forever honored at Boston College since the school's recreation facility is called the "William J. Flynn Student Recreation Complex." A bronze casting of Flynn sits at the front of the building.

The Flynn Award is given to the top player in the Kickoff Classic, as determined by a vote of the media.






FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

Florida State University, nearing its golden anniversary as a coeducational graduate research institution, is poised on the brink of joining the nation's academic elite.

Located on the oldest continuous site

of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women the university has emerged over the past 46 years as an institution of national and international esteem. Its stature is evidenced by a number of exciting additions to its record of excellence since the decade of the 1990s began:




- In 1990, Florida State ranked second in popularity nationwide among high school seniors, based on the number of students who request that their Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores be sent to an institution. FSU was the only school listed among the top 10 choices of both black and white college-bound students.
- FSU's high-tech program in structural biology in 1991 received the university's largest single foundation grant, \$4 million, to position it among the leaders in the field worldwide.
- The Appleton Museum of Art in

Ocala, its vast and varied art collection and an eminent scholar chair were donated to FSU Community College in 1990. Valued at \$42 million, the gift is the largest ever received by Florida State.

• Now the professional training ground

for film production, one of Florida's fastest growing industries, FSU graduated the first class of graduate film students from its School of Picture. Motion Television and Recording Arts in 1991 and its first undergraduate class in 1993. The school offers a bachelor's degree program in Tallahassee and a master of fine arts



program in Sarasota. Students are already producing award-winning films at national and international levels.



• The Dr. Bobby E. Leach Center, a state of-the-art student recreation facility which houses an indoor pool, saunas, basketball and racquet sport courts, was completed in 1991.

• Construction of the \$82 million University Center got underway in 1991. When completed the Center will provide 550,000 square feet of classroom and office space and a centralized location for student services. The threephase project includes two eight-story buildings and three four-story buildings on the east and west sides of Doak Campbell Stadium, enclosure of the south end zone and expansion of the Moore Athletic Center.

As this list attests, Florida State has begun the 1990s with exceptional strength, energy and vision for the future. Under the leadership of the university's 11th president, Dr. Dale W. Lick, who took office in August 1991, FSU will continue to build on the foundation of its long history of excellence in scholarship, research and service. Indeed, President Lick has set the goal of placing Florida State among the top 25 public institutions nationally by the year 2000.

A senior member of the 10-member State University System of Florida, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began operating, in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

A relative infant on the collegiate sports scene, Florida State has distinguished itself as one of the top allaround athletic programs in the country.

And under the leadership of Athletic Director Bob Goin, it keeps getting better.

In just 46 years of competition in men's intercollegiate athletics, the Seminoles are becoming a household name – with the FSU football, basketball and baseball programs leading the way.

On the women's side Florida State is even younger. FSU's first organized women's teams are celebrating a

quarter century of intercollegiate competition this decade. Yet, the Lady Seminole squads have claimed five national championships.

Each year, Florida State teams strive to climb one notch higher on the ladder of national success. On July 1, 1991, Florida State joined one of the nation's most prestigious leagues when it entered the Atlantic Coast Conference. The move enabled Florida State's athletic program to reach new heights.

The 1992-93 school year marked Florida State's first season of ACC competition in all 16 sports. The triumphs nearly every FSU team enjoyed during the '92-93 season are unmatched in school history.

Athletically, Florida State claimed conference championships in football and softball, and finished in the upper division of nearly every league race. The softball team became Florida State's first repeat champion by winning the ACC title for the second consecutive year.

On the national scene, Florida State

also enjoyed unprecedented success. FSU vied for the title of NCAA champion in 12 sports. The warriors of the gridiron, after a convincing 27-14 drub-

bing of Nebraska in the Orange Bowl, secured the school's highest national finish by placing second in the final college football poll.

The Tribe men's basketball team made its best showing in the NCAA Tournament since 1972 (when it reached the championship game) by advancing to the Elite Eight. That success followed a second place finish in the ACC regular season race for the

second consecutive year.

In tennis, the doubles team of Laura Randmaa and Audra Brannon made FSU history by advancing to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Championship Tournament, the highest finish ever by a Florida State duo or individual. Brannon also qualified on the singles side of the tournament.

For the fourth straight year, the Lady Seminole softball team emerged as NCAA Regional champions to advance to the eight-team College World Series.


Florida State qualified one of its largest contingents ever for the NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships in 1993. Ten athletes qualified in 11 events, with Seminoles reaching the finals six times. Volleyball continued its run of success by appearing in the national championship tournament for the eighth time. The baseball, swimming and diving, and men's and women's golf teams also all competed in NCAA Regional Tournaments.

Academically, 70 FSU student athletes were named to the ACC's

Academic Honor Roll for 1992-93. These athletes maintained a grade point average of 3.0 or above for both the fall and spring semesters. The Lady Seminole golfers took top team honors among all FSU teams with a 3.14 g.p.a. in the fall and a 3.32 mark last spring.

The FSU football team equalled its on-field success in the classroom as 29 players posted a grade point average above 3.0 for the spring semester The team g.p.a. reached one of its highest points ever with a cumulative 2.44 mark last spring

With Florida State's vision toward the future, ever-improving facilities and the support of the University administration, athletic department staff and fans across the country, the successes enjoyed by Florida State student athletes in 1992-93 both on and off the playing surface, are sure to continue for years to come.



In 1993, Florida State's baseball team continued a string of NCAA regional appearances with its 16th straight, the second-longest streak in Division I.





FLORIDA STATE **Head Coach Bobby Bowden**

hen speaking of legendary football coach Bobby Bowden you face a rather difficult decision. Do you first speak of Bowden. 'the man?" Or do you lead with Bowden, "the coach?" If you ask Bowden, he'll quickly tell you his innumerable coaching records aren't important. And that, more than anything speaks volumes about Bowden, "the man."

"I'm still having fun. I still love it," he says. "I plan to coach as long as I feel good and as long as my school will have me."

Like other coaches before him Bowden has created something of a monster that perches squarely on his back. He has coached his Florida State teams so very close to perfection that his fans expect the moon. He has won 64 games in the last six seasons, including monumental wins over Miami, Florida, Michigan, Nebraska, Penn State, Clemson and others.

Yet some say he can't win "the big one." He has not lost a bowl game in 11 consecutive appearances, and some say he can't win "the big one." He has led FSU to six straight Top Four national finishes, and some keep saying he can't win "the big one." Bobby Bowden is the only coach in NCAA Division I history to win 10 or more games in six consecutive seasons, and some say he can't win "the big one."

Isn't it amazing that this man has 227 career coaching victories in 27 incredible seasons, and none of them was a "big one?" My eye! In every way, the Seminoles win "the big one"— the one that truly counts — every day Bobby Bowden reports to work at Florida State.

Many were present at last season's Orange Bowl showdown with Nebraska, where the Seminole coach continued a bowl string unmatched in

college football history. His Seminole teams have now won eight bowls in consecutive seasons —an NCAA record. The current 11-bowl streak without a loss began in 1983 and was marred only by a 17-17 tie with Georgia in the 1984 Citrus Bowl. Bowden's 12-3-1 record and .781 bowl winning percentage ranks first all-time. Only Bear Bryant (15) and Joe Paterno (14) have won more bowl games.


And the Seminoles have been a fixture in the big bowls of late. A fifth-year senior on the 1992 FSU team went to the Fiesta, Sugar, Blockbuster, Cotton and Orange bowls during his tenure.

The list of coaches who have won more games than Bowden is getting so short you might want to jot them down, on a matchbook cover. In 1991, he climbed to seventh on the all-time win list. By the end of 1993, he could break into the top five with a chance to pass or tie the likes of Bo Schembechler (234) and Woody Hayes (238). His 227 career victories rank second among active Division I coaches behind only Paterno.

When Bowden first arrived in Tallahassee in 1976, he described his relationship with the school as "a marriage" and was determined to let "no man put it asunder." True to his word, he begins his 18th season at FSU in 1993.

Bowden's Florida State record is 154-45-3. That includes an 82-15-1 record in Tallahassee and a 72-30-2 mark away from home. He has built those numbers against some of the nation's toughest schedules. His road record alone includes a 2-0 mark at Ohio State, 1-0 at Notre Dame, 2-0 at Clemson, 5-2 against Nebraska and 2-0 at Syracuse, to name just a few.

Bowden achieved some impressive numbers in his previous coaching stops



(31-6 at Samford University in Birmingham between 1959 and 1962, and 42-26 at West Virginia from 1970-75), but what he has done at Florida State is simply phenomenal. Nine times in 17 years, his Seminoles have won 10 or more games in a season Florida State had been to just eight bowls in 29 years before him. Since his arrival, FSU has been to 14 bowl games. including a string of 11 in a row and seven New Year's Day trips.

When Bowden earned his 150th win as the FSU head coach last year, he matched the win total of all seven Florida State coaches that preceded him.

In his 17 years, the Seminoles have been a mainstay in the AP Top Twenty. An incredible 110 times under Bowden, the Seminoles have been in the Top 10 on a given week. What about a Top 20 finish? Thirteen times in 17 seasons!

Last year, Florida State became only the third school ever to post six consecutive Top Five finishes. The Seminoles' Orange Bowl victory over Nebraska and No. 2 ranking in 1992 kept alive a streak that saw second (1987) third (1988 and '89) and fourth (1990 and '91) place finishes in succession. Only Miami and Oklahoma can match such a run.

UNIVERSITY OF KANSAS

Though nearly every college has a mascot, only the University of Kansas can claim the Jayhawk.

For Kansans, the Jayhawk symbolizes the fighting spirit and high stan-

dards of the state's earliest settlers. Use of the word dates to the days before statehood, in the early 1850s.

Historians think the term Jayhawk was coined in about 1848 as a combination of birds indigenous to the area from Texas to Illinois—the blue jay, a noisy, quarrelsome thing known to rob other nests, and the sparrow hawk, a

stealthy hunter, The underlying message was "don't turn your back on this bird."

When Kansas erupted as a battle-ground for pro- and anti-slavery forces in the 1850s, the Jayhawk moniker stuck to the free-state advocates, who often looted and attacked their political opponents. Lawrence, where KU would be founded in 1864, was a stronghold for the victorious free staters. KU's 1,000-acre main campus sits atop Mount Oread, about 40 miles west of Kansas City, Mo., and about 30 miles east of Topeka, the state capital.

In 1866, the bird appeared in a college cheer—the famous Rock Chalk chant—and when KU football players took the field in 1890, it seemed only natural to call them Jayhawkers. The first caricature of a Jayhawk appeared in 1912, wearing a pair of heavy shoes with which the mythical bird was supposed to kick opponents. The Jayhawk's appearance evolved until 1946, when KU student Harold Sandy drew the version used today. The Jayhawk went 3-D in the 1960s when

the KU Alumni Association provided a mascot costume.


Now, 129 years after its founding and fresh from a 1992 athletic season whose overall success was the best in

the country, KU and the Jayhawk are synonymous symbols of the state's fighting spirit, populist roots and high quality. KU's major sports teams made postseason appearances at the Aloha Bowl, the Men's Final Four basketball tournament, the College World Series and the women's basketball championship tournament.

KU success in the classroom is also

unparalleled. With nearly 30,000 students from all 105 Kansas counties, 49 states and the District of Columbia, and 100 foreign countries, KU is the largest university in the Big Eight Athletic Conference. And, according to the nation's most prestigious guide to colleges, the Fiske Guide, KU ranks as the conference's academic flagship. KU

campuses in Lawrence and Overland Park, and Medical Center campuses in Kansas City, and Wichita, provide structure for more than 32 academic programs ranging from accounting to urology, which are ranked in the top 10 of those at the nation's public universities.

ew people were surprised when the University of Kansas men's basketball team made its 10th appearance in the NCAA Tournament Final Four in New Orleans this year. Kansas has long been known for its storied basketball history, but look what else the Jayhawks accomplished in 1992-93.

- KU defeated Brigham Young, 23-20, in the Jeep Eagle Aloha Bowl on Christmas Day. The contest was the third-most watched bowl game when the television ratings were released. It was the Jayhawks' first appearance in a bowl game since 1981 and KU's first bowl win since 1964.
- In addition to the men, the Kansas women's basketball team earned an automatic berth in the NCAA Tournament by way of the Big Eight Conference Tournament title. It was the team's second straight appearance in the postseason event.
- Kansas made its first-ever appearance in the College World Series and finished the season with a 45-18 overall record. The Jayhawks made news simply by making the program's first Big Eight Conference Tournament appearance since 1983, but they didn't stop there. KU made its first showing in an NCAA regional tournament as the No. 3 seed at the Mideast Regional in Knoxville, Tenn. After losing its opening-round game, the Jayhawks won four straight and were headed to the College World Series.
- Despite losing six starters from the 1992 softball team that made it to the College World Series, Kansas came within one game of its second straight Series appearance losing to Florida State in the regional title game.
- KU's men's and women's swimming and diving teams both finished the season nationally-ranked. The women won their second consecutive Big Eight

Conference title, while the men placed second at the league meet. Seven swimmers earned All-America honors.

- The Jayhawk men's golf team finished 15th at the NCAA Championships after placing second at the Big Eight Championships only one stroke behind Oklahoma State. On the women's team, KU was represented by Holly Reynolds as she tied for 15th place at the NCAA Women's Championships.
- Both the men's and women's tennis teams at KU finished the year ranked among the nation's top 20. The women made their second straight trip to the NCAA Championships after winning the Big Eight Conference title.

Even with this kind of success, however, one thing Kansas athletics director Dr. Bob Frederick is even more proud of is the student-athlete's success in the classroom. As Kansas student-athletes have achieved record accomplishments over the last six years, Frederick has been instrumental in the development of one of the nation's strongest academic support programs.

A new, \$7.9 million athletics office complex, which will house an expanded academic support area, is nearing completion. The new facility, funded from private donations, will also include space for student-athlete lockers, team conference rooms, coaches offices and an expanded sports medicine area.

The Kansas athletics department budgets in excess of \$410,000 yearly for academic support. According to the *Chronicle of Higher Education*, Kansas ranks first in the Big Eight Conference in graduation rate among student-athletes who entered school as a freshman in 1984 and graduated within five years.

This year Kansas became the first school to have a team reach the men's basketball final four, the baseball College World Series and win a post-season bowl game in the same academic year.

HEAD COACH GLEN MASON

hen Glen Mason took over as head coach at Kansas, he talked about changing the perception of the Jayhawk program from loser to winner.

Six years later, Mason has no problem describing his team as a winner. That's not only a perception, but it's also a fact.

The Jayhawks' quantum leap from a 1-10 team in 1988 to a nationally-ranked bowl champion in 1992 represents one of the most impressive turnarounds in college football in recent years. Throughout the process, Mason has brought stability and improvement both on and off the field.

Mason, who became the 33rd head coach in KU history on Dec. 30, 1987, knew that Kansas would not immediately show success on the field. His first team in 1988 finished with a 1-10 record. The next season, in 1989, Mason's efforts began to pay dividends. The Jayhawks compiled a respectable 4-7 record with wins over conference rivals Kansas State and Missouri.

Prior to the 1990 season, Mason was well aware his young program was getting better. He also understood that with youth and a strong schedule facing him, the team's improvement may not be obvious.

With just three seniors in the lineup, Kansas demonstrated meaningful progress in 1990 by finishing fourth in the Big Eight standings — the school's first upper division finish since 1984. Playing against one of the most difficult schedules in the nation, KU closed out the season with a 3-7-1 record.

Five of KU's losses in 1990 came to teams that would later play in New Year's Day bowl games, excluding Oklahoma, which was ineligible for postseason play. There were several highlights to the 1990 season, including KU's first win over Oklahoma State in

18 seasons, a third straight win over Kansas State and a snapped five-game losing streak versus Iowa State.

The 1991 season represented a significant step forward in the Kansas football program. The Jayhawks posted a 6-5 record — the school's first winning season since 1981 — and came within a victory of being invited to a bowl game.

Four of KU's losses and one Jayhawk victory in 1990 came against teams that would play in bowl games. KU's win over Tulsa was a blemish on the Golden Hurricane's 10-2 record. In the season finale, Kansas defeated Missouri as senior tailback Tony Sands rushed for an NCAA record 396 yards.


Mason was named the 1991 Big Eight Coach of the Year, giving him the distinction as coach of the year in two different Division I leagues.

Last season the Jayhawks showed even more improvement. Not only did they compile an 8-4 record, marking the first time since 1975 and 1976 that KU had two consecutive winning seasons, but they also brought home a 23-20 victory over Brigham Young in the Jeep Eagle Aloha Bowl on Christmas Day.

It was Kansas' first bowl appearance since 1981 and its first bowl victory since 1961. The Jayhawks were ranked 22nd on the final Associated Press poll, which represented the first time a KU team ended the season nationally ranked since 1973.

Kansas, the only Big Eight team to post a bowl victory last season, also posted a 4-3 conference mark to place third in the standings. It was just the school's second winning conference record since 1976.

Once again Mason's work did not go unnoticed He was named the Kodak Region 4 Coach of the Year and was a finalist for both the Football Writers Association of America Bear Bryant



Coach of the Year award and the Football News Coach of the Year award.

Succeeding with programs suffering through hard times is nothing new for Mason.

Mason served two successful seasons at Kent State before coming to Kansas. In 1986, Mason led the Golden Flash to a 5-6 record and a second-place finish in the Mid-American Conference. In 1987, Kent recorded a 7-4 mark — its first winning season in more than a decade.

After being recruited by former Ohio State assistant and present Notre Dame head coach Lou Holtz, Mason began his playing career in Columbus, Ohio, with the Buckeyes.

After stints as assistant at Ball State, Allegheny College, Iowa State and Illinois, Mason returned to his alma mater in 1978, where he spent eight years under Woody Hayes and Earle Bruce.

Mason graduated from Ohio State in 1972 with a bachelor's degree in education. He received his master's degree in education from Ball State in 1973.

Mason and his wife, Sally, a native of Toledo, Ohio, have two children — a son, Patrick, and a daughter, Chris.

ABC SPORTS' COLLEGE FOOTBALL AUGUST/SEPTEMBER SCHEDULE

ABC Sports, the network of college football, will present the best of the CFA, Big Ten and PAC-10 Conferences during the 1993-94 season. This marks the 28th consecutive season that college football will air on the ABC Television Network.

From beginning to end, ABC Sports' college football schedule features blockbuster games involving key matchups of the nation's best teams. The schedule comes to a climax with five post-season Bowl games.

Most of ABC Sports' early-season schedule has been set. Coverage begins on Saturday, August 28 at 12:00 noon, ET, with the Kickoff Classic, featuring consistent power Florida State against a rejuvenated Kansas team. The Jayhawks are coming off a terrific 1992 season which concluded with an inspiring Aloha Bowl victory, their first bowl appearance in 11 years. FSU will

counter with Heisman Trophy candidate QB Charlie Ward.

On Sept. 4, at 3:30 p.m., ET, ABC Sports will present three important confrontations involving some of the country's premier teams. Miami, with four national championships including 1991, will be tested by Boston College; Washington State will battle Big Ten powerhouse Michigan, sparked by Heisman Trophy candidate RB Tyrone Wheatley; Conference rivals Stanford and Washington meet in an emotional PAC-10 clash; while LSU will face a Texas A&M team that will be in the hunt for the national title.

The schedule continues on Sept. 11 at 12:00 noon, ET, with an explosive national game between perennial title-chasers Notre Dame and Michigan. At 3:30 p.m., ET, ABC presents four intriguing regional matchups. USC will try to stop a Penn State team that begins

its inaugural season in the Big Ten; Texas A&M will play Oklahoma; Kansas will face Michigan State; and LSU travels to Mississippi State. In a prime-time national game at 8:00 p.m., ET, PAC-10 giant Washington will face the always tough Ohio State Buckeyes.

ABC Sports' schedule on Sept. 18 at 3:30 p.m., ET, features a fever-pitched regional lineup. Tennessee will face Florida in a game that could decide the eastern division winner of the SEC; Penn State will travel to Iowa; annual Big 8 contender Nebraska, led by Heisman candidate RB Calvin Jones, will visit PAC-10 foe UCLA; San Diego State, with Heisman Trophy candidate Marshall Faulk, will battle Air Force; while Syracuse, a preseason favorite to win the Big East, will take on Texas.

On Sept. 25, in a 3:30 p.m., ET, regional matchup, Miami will battle Colorado (other games TBA).

TODAY'S BROADCASTERS

Recognized as the "Voice of College Football," Keith Jackson is in his 29th year with ABC, having joined ABC full-time in 1964.

Jackson's enthusiasm is as keen today as it was when he started covering college football for the network in 1966.


Highly respected and admired by his colleagues in the broadcast and written sports press, Jackson became the only man to ever win five straight (1972-76) "Sportscaster of the Year" awards as voted by his peers.

Bob Griese, a Pro Football Hall of Famer, is currently one of network television's most respected football analysts. Griese is in his 11th year of broadcasting and his seventh year as the expert commentator on the Main Game of the Week with Keith Jackson.

Known as the "thinking man's quarterback" during his brilliant 14-year NFL career with the Miami Dolphins (1967-1980), Griese was renowned for his poised

leadership and ingenious play-calling during the Dolphins' dominance of the NFL in the early 1970s. Griese also appeared in six AFC-NFC Pro Bowls, two AFL All Star Games, and was a consensus All-Pro in 1971 and 1977.

Jack Arute, one of the top college football sideline reporters in the business, joined ABC Sports in 1984 as a pit reporter on the network's coverage of auto racing.

His auto racing assignments have includ-

ed the prestigious Indianapolis "500", IndyCar and the International Race of Champions.


Arute also serves as reporter on ABC Sports' coverage of college basketball and the Iditarod Sled Dog Race.

He has done reporting on cycling, tennis and soccer during the Pan American Games, and for Super Bowl pre-game coverage and the Tournament of Roses Parade.





BOX OFFICE/TICKET INFORMATION: 201-935-3900

SECURITY: The Event Safety Office is located at the east end of the Stadium on the Service Level. For assistance, notify the nearest Event Safety Representative or Usher stationed throughout the Stadium or telephone 935-8500, extension 2240 or 2241.

FIRST AID: Stations are located at the east end of the Stadium on the Service Level, and the Mezzanine Level adjacent to sections 201 and 221. For assistance, notify the nearest Usher, Event Safety Representative or/and Emergency Medical Technician stationed throughout the Stadium.

LOST AND FOUND: Located within our Event Safety Office or telephone 935-8500, extension 2240 or 2241.

RESTROOMS AND WATER FOUNTAINS

are located on each level at the 50 yard lines and end zones. The facilities adjacent to sections 117 and 125 are specifically equipped for the handicapped.

TELEPHONES: Public telephones are located behind the following sections:

Mezzanine tier – 211, 221, 223 and 239


