



hen speaking of legendary football coach Bobby Bowden, you face a rather difficult decision. Do you first speak of Bowden, "the man?" Or do you lead with Bowden, "the coach?" If you ask Bowden, he'll quickly tell you merable coaching records aren't important that, more than anything, speaks volume about Bowden, "the man."

Forda State's coach, now 63 years young, cuality seldom found in men or women of profession. He has it all. Piece together the and there you have Bobby Bowden. It's enough that his coaching numbers have legendary proportions. Bowden also his University a proud moral leader, a famman of the first order, a caring disciplinarian, and a calming voice in the face of the turbulence counding college football.

Perhaps the best tribute to the man is that he is not afraid to ge with the times — adapting brilliantly to new ways of wingames, as well as dealing with young student athletes. From internal control, to a bold switch to the no-back, shotgun or Break offenses, Bowden proves you're only as old as you feel.

I'm still having fun. I still love it," he says. "I plan to coach as as I feel good, and as long as my school will have me."


Like other coaches before him, Bowden has created something a monster that perches squarely on his back. He has coached his Forda State teams so very close to perfection that his fans expect moon. He has won 64 games in the last six seasons, including monumental wins over Miami, Florida, Michigan, Nebraska, State, Clemson and others.

Yet some say he can't win the "big one." He has not lost a bowl game in 11 consecutive appearances, and some say he can't win big one." He has led FSU to six straight top four national finates, and some keep saying he can't win the "big one." Bobby Bowden is the only coach in NCAA Division I history to win 10 more games in six consecutive seasons, and some say he can't win the "big one."

Isn't it amazing that this man has 227 career coaching victories in incredible seasons, and none of them was a "big one?" My eye! In way, the Seminoles win the "big one" — the one that truly counts — every day Bobby Bowden reports to work at Florida State.

In this fickle world of big-time sports, some forget what it is all about. Sure, Bobby Bowden craves a national championship. There a good chance he'll win one along the way. But as Bowden well anderstands at this stage of his career, there are things more important in life, and that's what makes him "our" Bobby Bowden.

He has time for charity and to give to his church. He has never alked past an admiring child without a wink and a smile. He recets total strangers as his best friends. He listens and he cares. He not a friend to his players — he is a father figure in the traditional sense. Some, still young and thinking they know more than they do, criticize Bowden's "distance" from his players. Those older and sizer recognize how his watchful eye nudged them through their time at FSU and made them better people to this day. They call



him to say thanks, and dozens come back frequently to visit.

Many were present at last season's Orange Bowl showdown with Nebraska, where the Seminole coach continued a bowl string unmatched in college football history. His Seminole teams have now won eight bowls in consecutive seasons — an NCAA record. The current 11-bowl streak without a loss began in 1983 and was marred only by a 17-17 tie with Georgia in the 1984 Citrus Bowl. Bowden's 12-3-1 record and .781 bowl winning percentage ranks first all-time. Only Joe Paterno (14) has won more bowl games.

And the Seminoles have been a fixture in the big bowls of late. Fifth-year seniors on the 1992 FSU team went to the Fiesta, Sugar, Blockbuster, Cotton and Orange bowls during his tenure.

The list of coaches who have won more games than Bobby is getting so short you might want to jot them down — on a matchbook cover. In 1991, he climbed to seventh on the all-time win list. By the end of 1993, he could break into the top five with a chance to pass or tie the likes of Bo Schembechler (234) and Woody Hayes (238). His 227 career victories rank second among active Division I coaches behind only Joe Paterno.

Just how impressive is Bowden's 27-year coaching record? He's joined the list of legends of college football, included with names like Bryant, Stagg and Warner.

When Bowden first arrived in Tallahassee in 1976, he described his relationship with the school as a marriage and was determined to let no man put it asunder. True to his word, he begins his 18th season at FSU in 1993.

What Bobby Bowden means to Florida State University off the playing field cannot be measured, even by the most sophisticated of supercomputers. Respect, sincerity, class, honesty, charisma, charm and humor. When they put that kind of data into the system, a giant replica of Bowden will appear.

As if his character isn't enough, his coaching style draws admirers nationwide. A wide-open, gambling style makes Bowden teams a treat to watch, a pleasure to play on and a delight to cover. Reverses, flea-flickers, laterals — you name it, here it comes!

A look at the record shows he's done it both ways. The flashy wins may get all the attention, but for every one of those, there are a dozen others spawned from sound fundamental football. This guy's not just a gambling magician, he can flat out coach!

By now it's been well-chronicled how the (continued on p. 9)

Teepee Talk

ne of the more refreshing aspects of my job with Florida State athletics is the opportunity presented to visit our various Seminole Clubs around the South and — for that matter — around the country.

The Seminole Club network, as you might imagine, has grown by leaps and bounds over the past few years and now must rank as one of the more vibrant aspects of our University's livelihood. In virtually every nook and cranny of our state, thousands of FSU alumni and friends gather to rally behind the garnet and gold. Many of these clubs meet on a weekly basis, some less frequently. From the flourishing Pensacola Club, through the massive Jacksonville group, all the way down the state and even out on the Keys, these Seminole fans are basking in the glory of FSU success.

As one who lives a life surrounded by the world of FSU and all it has to offer, I sometimes forget how those in the hinterlands beg for every morsel of information that trickles out of Tallahassee. Lately, these Seminole enthusiasts have flocked to the local club meetings, enjoying food, fun and frivolity with fellow Seminoles in their geographical area. Some of these FSU-ites, I might point out, never even attended the University. There is an ever-increasing number of folks who have adopted this program as their own. The only attendance requirement at these meetings is that you love the 'Noles and have been known to have a good time on occasion.

About a dozen times a year I have the privilege of serving as a guest speaker to these events. Starting in mid-August and running on through the football season it is not unusual for my wife, Dawn, and myself to jump in the car and take off for a visit to a Seminole club on a mid-week evening. It always makes for a long night as we choose to return home after the meetings so as not to lose any office time the following morning.

These trips always seem to start out the same way. About 10 minutes out of Tallahassee I'll tell Dawn that I must be out of my head to be making this five- or six-hour round trip drive during the middle of a hectic week. Then I'll tell her that she must REALLY be loony to even consider coming along to keep me company. Soon thereafter, though, we discover how many

things you can talk about in the quiet of the car on I-10. With three kids around the house including a 2-year-old, jobs to juggle and the residuals of FSU sports, we don't



get a lot of quiet time. So the outward drive usually provides some needed solace.

Recently, we were asked to visit a group in Starke, Fla., about a two-and-half hour drive from Tallahassee. 

Three seasons after he walked on campus, he one of the worst football teams in the country to within the country to within

including a string of 11 in a row and seven New Year's Day trips.

In his 17 years, the Seminoles have been a mainstay in the AP Top 20. An incredible 110 times under Bowden, the Seminoles have been in the top 10 on a given week. What about a top 20 finish? Thirteen times in 17 seasons!

Last year, Florida State became only the third school ever to post six consecutive top five finishes. The Seminoles' Orange Bowl victory over Nebraska and No. 2



ranking in 1992 kept alive a streak that saw second (1987), third (1988 and '89) and fourth (1990 and '91) place finishes in succession. Only Miami and Oklahoma can match such a run.

Above all Bowden's coaching accomplishments, though, are his credentials as a man. Friendly and outgoing, he is a devoted Christian and family man. The Coach loves people. His personality and charm are bigger than life. He has become somewhat of a folk hero in the Deep South.

A polished speaker, Bowden is constantly in demand. His busy coaching schedule curtails many speaking engagements, but any free evening in the year will find him on the after-dinner circuit. Every free Sunday morning will find him in the pulpit of a church somewhere in the South.

Outside of football, Bowden has an intense interest in World War II history and reads countless books and articles on the subject. He traced his ancestry to parts of Germany and has visited the country several times.

Bowden was an outstanding player at Woodlawn High School in Birmingham, Ala., and went on to Alabama as a freshman quarterback, fulfilling a lifelong dream to play for the Crimson Tide. During one semester in Tuscaloosa, he found his childhood sweetheart, Ann Estock, and she was enough to lure him back to Birmingham. He soon married Ann and transferred to Howard College (now Samford University) in Birmingham.

Bowden was a Little All-American there and began his collegiate head coaching career there in 1959. His son Terry was the head coach at Samford until being named head coach at Auburn University last December. The four boys, daughters Robyn Hines and Ginger Madden, and their families, make up the Bowden clan, which numbers 24 and includes 14 grandchildren.

The University

Florida State University, nearing its golden anniversary as a coeducational graduate research

institution, is poised on the brink of joining the nation's academic elite.

A senior member of the 10-member State University System of Florida, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began operating in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

Today, Florida State's operating budget is \$401 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$100 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the university: the private, non-profit FSU Foundation, which raises millions in private gifts to support academics, the Seminole Boosters and the FSU Alumni Association.

The main campus is spread over 405 acres in Tallahassee; FSU, which has the smallest campus in the SUS, acquired about 58 acres in 1991-92 after many years of being landlocked at 347 acres. The university owns a total of 1,230 acres in Leon, Bay and Franklin counties.

Within the state, FSU maintains facilities at its 25-acre campus in Panama City, its Marine Laboratory on the Gulf of Mexico and the Appleton Museum in Ocala. The university's graduate theater and film professional-training programs, the FSU/Asolo Conservatory of Professional Actor Training and FSU/Asolo Conservatory of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts, are both located in the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed



Switzerland, France, Panama, Costa Rica and the Caribbean. FSU's study centers in Florence, Italy, and London, England, are considered by many to be the best American universities in Europe.

Florida State offers 275 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its eight colleges — Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University, a historically black institution); Human Sciences; Law; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the School of Public Administration and Policy) — and eight schools — Criminology and Criminal Justice; Library and Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 1,526 members, the FSU faculty currently includes five members of the National Academy of Sciences and eight of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and has included five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 2,837 adminis-

libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library is located at the heart of the university's main science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries, and the Mildred and Claude Pepper Library houses the personal and professional papers of one of Florida's best known political couples.

On the top floor of the Dirac Library is the headquarters of the Supercomputer Computations Research Institute, a multidisciplinary, multinational program established in 1984 that brings together some 50 scientists, engineers and technicians. SCRI is electronically linked to an off-campus research complex at Innovation Park and the university's two powerful supercomputers.

Also providing unique research opportunities is the physics department's tandem

Van de Graaff Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory, which houses two powerful atom smashers and is ranked among the top four nuclear research

centers in the nation by the National Science Foundation.

In its mission of excellence in teaching, research and public service, Florida State University is advancing boldly into the 21st century.



Florida State football players say that when two-a-day practices roll around, the days begin to run


together. It's August in Tallahassee and the temperature hovers around 100 degrees on the Seminole practice fields. Players dread this time of year. But this preseason, one player, Jon Nance, enjoyed his time in the FSU coaches' boot camp.

That is understandable as the senior noseguard had to clear many obstacles to be in Doak Campbell Stadium today.

First, he sat out his first season in Tallahassee under the NCAA's Proposition 48 requirements. Then, he was dismissed from the University following the Seminoles' 10-2 Cotton Bowl victory over Texas A&M on January 1, 1992. Nance spent the next two semesters at Tallahassee Community College and returned to FSU in time for last season.

"I should have been more dedicated to doing well in school. I just was not a very motivated person. At the time, I thought that being dismissed from school was a difficult thing to handle, and it was," Nance said. "But when you put things in perspective, it was nothing."

Nothing compared to what happened



and was removed during surgery in February. But the ordeal was not over. Nance went through 20 radiation treatments to prevent the tumor from recurring.

Nance spent the rest of the spring semester recovering at home in Bartow where his mother, Judy, spurred his rehabilitation.

"My mom instilled a fighting attitude in me," said Jon. "I want to thank my family and my mom for all their help.

"I was really scared when I found out (that I had a tumor).

I was thinking that everything was over for me." — Senior noseguard Jon Nance

"I now have an entirely different outlook on life. I am much more positive than before and I take each day one-by-one." Nance's new attitude has made an impression on both coaches and teammates.

One of the reasons for Florida State's strong defensive showing this year is the play of noseguard Jon Nance.

"At times, Jon wasn't always the hardest worker," said Chuck Amato, Florida State's defensive line coach. "It is obvious that he now has a much better outlook about things. Nothing he does will surprise me after all that he has fought through."

Seminole inside linebacker Ken Alexander added, "Jon goes after everything 100 percent now, where as before, he would do just enough to get by."

His courageous battle and hard work have paid off. It has changed his attitude toward life and he is back in school and playing football.

"I would have never believed this at first," said Nance, "but this experience has been a positive in my life."

next. Nance noticed a bump on his left shoulder last fall but ignored it. He played the rest of the regular season and the Orange Bowl with it. But the bump kept getting larger and the soft-spoken Nance could no longer be quiet about his problem.

"At first I did not want to deal with it. I thought it would just go away," said Nance.

A January trip to the doctor revealed a tumor the size of a tennis ball under his collarbone. Doctors worried that surgery to remove the tumor might damage his collarbone and surrounding muscle.

"I was really scared when I found out," said Nance. "I was thinking that everything was over for me."







The late Coach Bill Peterson's Florida State football teams of 1963, '64 and '65 are back on

campus today to celebrate their 30-year reunion. Many memories will be shared and most will focus on their beloved coach who passed away Aug. 5.

This group was very special to Coach Pete. Their success was the result of much hard work and dedication by the young men who served and played under Peterson.

Look back with me to some memorable incidents during those years.

emember 1963, when Steve Tensi Remonster 2,25, completed a pair of touchdown passes to Fred Biletnikoff in what Coach Pete called his greatest victory, a 24-0 drubbing of Miami? Symbolic of the work ethic of this team was the play of Dave Snyder who was named the squad's most valuable player. You could depend upon Charlie Calhoun who punted and played defensive halfback like a pro for three years. Remember Larry Brinkley, a fullback with great speed, and Bill Daly's brilliant play against N.C. State? Then there was Red Dawson's touchdown catch against Georgia Tech, and Maury Bibents' interception against Auburn. This is the stuff of which coaches dream, and you can bet that Coach Pete was definitely proud of his boys!

A Reunion of Pete's Boys

All FSU fans remember 1964 as the year the Seminoles reached one of their pinnacles. Many believe that it was Coach Pete's greatest year. The '64 Seminoles had matured into a truly great football team. Fred Biletnikoff pulled down nine passes, including two for touchdowns, in the season opener as FSU shutout the Hurricanes 14-0. The win in Miami was in front of a number of FSU fans who, for the first time in school history, char-



tered a train for the trip which they nicknamed the "Seminole Engine." Later that year, a highly ranked Kentucky team paid a visit to Doak Campbell Stadium. In front of a sold-out homecoming crowd, the Seminole backfield of Wayne Giardino, Lee Narremore and Ed Pritchett ran through the Wildcats for 187 yards and five touchdowns, and "The Magnificent Seven" and "Forgotten Four" stopped the Wildcats cold with great defensive play to lead the Tribe to a 48-6 romp. Steve Tensi was voted Associated Press Back of the Week after throwing a pair of touchdown passes in the game, and Peterson was named Coach of the Week.

FSU followed the win with a third

Georgia. The streak set up the "never say never" Gators' first trip ever to Tallahassee. Led by Biletnikoff's 55-yard touchdown catch, the Seminoles beat the Gators 16-7 for the first time in the school's his-

tory. The Magnificent Seven had another great day as Jack Shinholser was named AP Lineman of the Week.

After the game, Florida State was invited to play Oklahoma in the Gator Bowl. A record crowd looked on as FSU broke 11 Gator Bowl records. Tensi completed 23 of 36 passes for 303 yards and four touchdowns. Biletnikoff caught 13 passes, including an astounding four for touchdowns. Howard Ehler intercepted an Oklahoma

pass and with key blocks from his Magnificent Seven teammates, Terry Garvin and Coach Bill Peterson (center) with 1964 co-captains Fred Biletnikoff (25) and Red Dawson (83).

Dick Hermann, ran 69 yards for a touch-down. The defense turned in an outstanding goal-line stand holding the Sooners for four downs on the 1-yard line as FSU crushed the Sooners 36-19.

In 1965, the nationally ranked Baylor Bears came to town. The Seminoles, with great play from Giardino, Joe Avezzano, Phil Spooner and Pritchett, gave the Bears all they could handle. When Pritchett connected with T.K. Wetherell in the closing minutes, the Tribe eeked out a thrilling 9-7 win. Unbeaten Georgia came to Doak Campbell and it was a night to remember as the Seminoles subdued the Dogs 10-3, marking the fourth straight win over our neighbor state to the north. Winfred Bailey would end the year as the national leader in interceptions.

It was Coach Peterson's capable coaching skills, his ability to draw out maximum effort from the players, and his incredible talent for selecting good personnel that molded these teams into excellent representatives of the Florida State football program.

We salute Coach Peterson and the 1963, '64 and '65 football teams!





Strength Program



77hat do you get when you put a 235-pound linebacker in the Florida State weight

room? A big hurt if you're a Seminole opponent this year.

The strength and conditioning program is having a profound effect on Seminole athletics. FSU is producing results in the gym which have a direct impact on the gridiron. And as each coach concentrates on his specific area, so too does strength coach Dave Van Halanger. It has become a unit of which he's extremely proud.

Van Halanger enters his 11th season as Florida State's strength and conditioning coach. Yet in the gym, as on the field, it's not just a game of brute and brawn. "We tell our athletes, 'What my mind can conceive, my body can achieve,' " explains Van Halanger. "The strongest muscle you have is your mind."

team. He was also designated a team captain by then-Mountaineer head coach Bobby Bowden during his senior season in 1976.

The two would reunite in 1983 as Van Halanger was named to his present position. Van Halanger built FSU's strength program from a 2,000-square foot gym with 25 pieces of equipment into one of the finest in the country. Today, the Seminoles

work out in an 8,000 square foot facility with 115 state-of-the-art machines.

The benefits of strength training are as varied as the athletes themselves. "Strength training is important for two reasons," says Van Halanger. "First there is the injury factor. By developing sound training techniques, you reduce the chance of injury.

"Working out hard and developing my shoulder muscles especially, saved me from missing the year," says Frier. "Coach Van always works the receivers' shoulders real hard because he knows the type of pounding they take."

When Van Halanger first arrived at FSU, there were only two athletes who benched over 400 pounds. Today's Seminole squad boasts 31 players who have matched that landmark.

Yet Van Halanger, who heads the FSU chapter of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, finds pride not just in an athlete's physique, but rather in his spirit. "I love watching a young man make it in life. To see them mature into just great people. I especially get a kick when I get an invitation to their wedding."

Players also benefit emotionally and spiritually through their contact with the coach and among themselves. "Coach Van is a very special person," explains Frier. "We do a lot of talking with him. The type of workouts we have produce results but also bring us together as a family. Coach Van's door is always open."

A former Atlanta Falcons draft pick, Van Halanger preaches a simple yet resounding philosophy. "The way to get better is through hard work. If you follow a plan, you can reach your potential."

An offshoot of the strength program has been the number of Van Halanger's assistants that now run other programs. Ohio State, Syracuse, Auburn, the Milwaukee Brewers and the Florida Marlins now see their strength programs directed by Van Halanger's disciples.

Yet beneath the veneer of molded plastic and foam rubber, is, according to Van Halanger, the true meaning of "Seminole Power."

"To be truly powerful, you have to be well-rounded. You have to go out into the community and become a leader. Those are true forms of power."

And that's a strong statement.

The home of the football Seminoles since 1950, Doak Campbell Stadium is undergoing

makeover, and the changes are startling.

- Where wooden bleachers once stood, beautiful new south end zone has arisen.
- · A brick facade surrounds the new and zone and much of the east side of the andium, matching the architectural style many campus buildings.
- Construction on the east side of the www. University Center complex is in progress with a completion date set for spring. It will house the FSU School Motion Picture, Film and Recording es, classrooms and several campus sersizes and offices, including the registrar, admissions and financial aid.
- Inside Doak Campbell, the lowest er of field level seats has been removed, providing increased sideline space and wing lines for the first few rows of fans.
- · A matching brick wall has been constructed along the east and west sidelines, limiting field access, increasing safety and going the stadium a whole new look.

Next year, several new sky boxes will be completed, a new wing of the Moore Amletic Center will open and overlook



the history of the stadium. This year's capacity of 72,589 reflects an increase of 12,070 since the end of the 1991 season. And that number will change in each of the next two seasons, up to 74,655 for 1994 before dropping back to 71,717 for '95. The increase is due to the addition of a section to the northwest corner, as well as the changes in the north end zone. The drop for '95 reflects the enlargement of each individual seat from 16 to 18 inches.

It's hard to imagine the first Doak Campbell Stadium, with a capacity of 15,000, back in 1950. In 1954, the stadium grew to a capacity of 19,000, and 6,000 more seats were added in 1961. During the Bill Peterson era (1960-70),

installed in 1988 quickly alleviates drainage problems through a series of underground pumps. The field can go from seemingly flooded to merely wet in a matter of minutes, thanks to the pumps, which allow a deeper root system in the natural turf.

Seminole football games are always a media event and the press box at Doak Campbell Stadium features seating for nearly 100 writers, as well as broadcast booths for radio and television, Rising above the west stands, the box also includes

> separate president and operations levels, and a photo deck area outside of the top floor.

Both stadium scoreboards are new. The large scoreboard made its debut in 1992 and features the most technologically advanced computer animation system for a scoreboard in existence. The 160foot-wide structure will be raised to sit on top of the Moore Athletic Center in the north end zone following the '93 season. The newest scoreboard is above the new south end zone and clearly and conveniently provides all basic information.

With the changes already made since last season, Doak Campbell Stadium is growing and improving faster than ever before. Like its residents, the Seminole football team and its fans, Doak Campbell Stadium is well on its way to becoming among the best in the nation, and a fitting showcase for Florida State University.

stadium at the north end zone and construction will begin on the west side of the University Center, which will eveninclude a new press box and anothseating section in the northwest corner.

Since the stadium first opened on Oct. 1950 with Florida State taking a 40-7 story over the Randolph Macon Yellowackets, millions of fans have packed Doak Campbell to see the finest in colfootball action.

Last year, Florida State set a single seaattendance mark by drawing 376,784 in six home games for its highest merage ever, 62,797. The top two crowds stadium history saw Florida State take Florida (68,311) and Maryland (\$4,127) at the end of the year.

the stadium was expanded to 40,500 seats, and it remained at that capacity for the next 14 years. Between 1978 and 1982, there were three more additions.

Named for Doak S. Campbell, the first president of Florida State University, the stadium sits adjacent to the Moore Athletic Center on the edge of the main campus. The stadium seats, each one offering an unrestricted view, rise out of a Bermuda grass turf enclosing the field. Fans enjoy all the modern conveniences with spacious aisles, numerous concession areas and plenty of rest room facilities. A professional public address system, first aid booths and an effective security system operate at every Seminole home game.





Amato worked for three different head coaches at N.C. State — Al Michaels, Lou Holtz and the late Bo Rein.

A three-year letterman in football and wrestling, Amato earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from N.C. State. On the mat, he claimed a pair of Atlantic Coast Conference wrestling titles in his weight class and went undefeated in dual matches.

He and his wife, Peggy, are the parents of twin daughters - Lugina and Selena.



MICKEY ANDREWS Defensive Coordinator/Defensive Backs (Alabama '64)

Plorida State fans across the country breathed a collective sigh of relief when Mickey Andrews withdrew his name from consideration for the head coaching job at Houston this summer. Widely considered one of the top defensive coaches in the nation. Andrews has turned the Florida State defense into one of the top all-around units in college football over the past nine years.

Andrews' abilities as a defensive coach have not gone unnoticed. In 1991, children - Ronnie and Shannon.

Athlon's Southeastern Football Magazine named Andrews its Assistant Coach of the Year, and he is annually listed among the nation's top aides.

Under Andrews' direction, FSU is becoming renowned for producing top cornerbacks. Two of his pupils — Deion Sanders and Terrell Buckley — have won the Jim Thorpe Award, given annually to the nation's top defensive back. LeRoy Butler joined those two as a consensus All-America pick at cornerback in 1989 to give the Seminoles four consensus All-America choices at the position in the last six years.

Andrews came to Florida State from the Arizona Wranglers of the United States Football League, where he spent two seasons as the defensive coordinator. But he was no stranger to the college game, having previously spent 17 years coaching in the collegiate ranks.

Andrews' coaching resume includes stints at Eastern Kentucky, Livingston, North Alabama, Clemson and Florida. He has worked for two of FSU's 1993 opponents, as assistant coach at Florida in 1981-82, and as defensive coordinator at Clemson from 1977-80.

From 1972-76, Andrews was the head coach and athletic director at North Alabama. He also spent three years guiding the Livingston University program from 1970-72. During his tenure, Livingston went 24-7 and won the NAIA national championship.

Andrews starred in football and baseball for Alabama from 1961-64, earning second team All-America mention as a wide receiver and defensive back. During his career, the Crimson Tide won a pair of national championships (1961, '64) and played in three New Year's Day bowl games.

In addition to his football honors, Andrews was an all-Southeastern Conference choice in baseball. In 1964, he received the Hugo Friedman Award as the Tide's best all-around athlete.



In addition to working with the outside linebackers, Gladden is one of the best Seminole assistant coaches when it comes to recruiting.


Another of Gladden's responsibilities are the punt return and punt block units.


Heggins, an outstanding noseguard under Bowden in the mid-'70s, returned to his alma mater in 1986 as a full-time coach after a year at Southwestern Louisiana, where he tutored USL's defensive ends. Prior to that, he was running backs coach at Eastern Michigan for two seasons, and at Western Illinois for one year.

At Florida State, Heggins' students at tight end have included Reggie Johnson, a second round draft pick of the Denver Broncos, as well as 1993 starter Lonnie Johnson. During his time as noseguard coach, Heggins was instrumental in the transformation of Odell Haggins from linebacker into one of the top noseguards in the country.

The Salisbury, N.C., native began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at East Carolina in 1980. He filled the same role at FSU in 1981 and '82.

Heggins originally came to Tallahassee in 1974 as a freshman running back at Florida State. He was an all-state back in North Carolina as a high school senior after gaining 1,670 yards. A fullback his first two seasons at Florida State, Heggins made the switch to noseguard in 1976. At the end of that season, he was named the squad's outstanding defensive player. A year later, he helped Florida State to a 10-2 record and the Tangerine Bowl championship with a 40-17 win against Texas Tech.

Quarterbacks


(Miami '82)

After directing two top six Heisman Trophy vote-getters in the past two seasons, and sending three signal-callers to the NFL since 1989, quarterback coach Mark Richt is making his mark as one of the premier young coaches in the nation.

In his seven seasons as FSU's quarterbacks coach, Richt has tutored top quarterbacks like Casey Weldon, runner-up in the 1991 Heisman balloting, Brad Johnson and Peter Tom Willis.

Current Seminole quarterback Charlie Ward has also benefited from Richt's coaching as he finished sixth in the 1992 Heisman race and was named the Atlantic Coast Conference Player of the Year last season. After a rocky start in 1992, Richt helped Ward become one of the top QBs in the nation who is already being touted as the "frontrunner" for this year's trophy.

Richt has logged seven total seasons as quarterbacks coach at Florida State, although 1993 marks only his fourth straight season in that role. In 1989, Richt



BRAD SCOTT
Offensive Coordinator/Offensive Line
(Missouri-Rolla '76)

Entering his fourth season as offensive coordinator and his ninth year on the Florida State staff, Brad Scott is responsible for the direction of the tight side of the offensive line as well as handling all the coordinator duties. The tight sons — Jon and Jeff.

side of the line includes the tight ends, which will be directed by FSU graduate assistant coach Mark Salva.

Scott was one of the coaches behind the installation of the shotgun and one-back offensive sets to the Seminole repertoire during the 1992 season. These formations allowed the FSU offense to become one of the most dangerous and potent units in the nation by the end of the year. In the last four contests of 1993, the Tribe averaged almost 53 points a game.


Prior to taking over as offensive coordinator, Scott established himself as a master recruiter in five years as the Seminoles' recruiting coordinator and tight end coach. Three of his five recruiting classes ranked among the nation's top five. The recruiting successes of Scott's years now comprise the nucleus of the Florida State team that has accumulated a string of six straight top four finishes since 1987. The Arcadia, Fla., native is credited with laying the groundwork for current recruiting successes.

Like five of the other FSU assistant coaches, Scott put his time in at Florida State as a graduate assistant. He coached the Florida State tight ends and junior varsity squad as a graduate assistant in 1983-84 before getting promoted to full-time status a year later.

A football standout at Missouri-Rolla from 1972-76, Scott played for Bobby Bowden in the American Bowl All-Star Game following his senior season.

Upon graduation, Scott returned to Arcadia as an assistant coach at DeSoto County High School, and then at Hardee High School in Wauchula. He started his collegiate coaching career as the junior varsity coach at The Citadel in 1981 and '82 and spent the following season as the head football coach and athletic director back at DeSoto County High prior to coming to FSU.

Scott and his wife, Daryle, have two sons — Jon and Jeff.



BILLY SEXTON *Running Backs*

(Florida State '74)

Billy Sexton has been a familiar sight on the sidelines of Florida State football games since 1973. The Tallahassee native started his career at FSU as a player for the Seminoles and went on to become a graduate assistant coach and then a full-time coach in 1977. This year marks Sexton's 11th as the Seminole running backs coach.

Since 1983, Sexton's running backs have become one of the most effective components of the FSU offense, averaging nearly six yards per carry and more than 10 yards per catch over those nine seasons. Florida State's backs have earned a sure-handed reputation and are renowned for their pass-catching abilities.

Sexton joined the Florida State staff as a graduate assistant in 1976, Bobby Bowden's first year as the FSU mentor. He became a member of the full-time staff in 1977 and worked with the Seminole quarterbacks for five seasons until 1982, when he became the head junior varsity



DAVE VAN HALANGER
Strength & Conditioning

(West Virginia '76)

In the competitive environment of college football, games are often won because of strength and speed.

Part of the reason for Florida State's success on the field is a year 'round weight-room program run by strength and conditioning coach Dave Van Matthew.

Halanger. The 11-year veteran of the Seminole coaching staff has helped hundreds of FSU athletes get stronger, faster and more flexible.

Under Van Halanger's direction, the average student-athlete gains 20-25 pounds, adds 100 pounds to his bench press and 200 pounds to his squat during his years at FSU. Each athlete can knock about two-tenths of a second off his 40-yard dash time and can jump four to five inches higher when he leaves Florida State thanks in part to the work of Van Halanger and his staff. In addition to work in the weight room, Van Halanger works closely with the FSU trainers to keep players in shape as they recover from injury.

Van Halanger spent five years as the head strength coach at his alma mater, West Virginia, prior to his arrival at FSU in July 1983. He is credited with starting West Virginia's first organized weight training program.

A four-year letterman under Bowden at West Virginia, Van Halanger was a cocaptain of the 1975 West Virginia Peach Bowl team. An offensive tackle, he earned All-East honors his junior and senior seasons and was an honorable mention All-America selection as a senior. He played professionally with the Atlanta Falcons in 1976 before returning to WVU as a graduate assistant and head junior varsity coach. He became the full-time strength coach at WVU in 1978.

Van Halanger is currently in the second of a five-year term as the North Florida state director and a member of the National Board of Ethics for the National Strength and Conditioning Association. He teaches several classes on strength training and conditioning to students and to the Tallahassee community. Van Halanger leads FSU's Fellowship of Christian Athletes group.

Van Halanger, a native of Turtle Creek, Pa., and his wife, Michele, have three children — Danielle, Julie and Matthew.



RONNIE COTTRELL

Recruiting Coordinator (Troy State '83)

If recruiting is a prerequisite to winning and the lifeblood of any successful college football program, then Ronnie Cottrell is seeing to it that Florida State stays healthy, and on top, for a long time to come.

In 1993, Florida State's recruiting class again was hailed by every recruiting expert as the top group in the entire country.

Cottrell is in his fourth season as recruiting coordinator at Florida State. He was promoted to the job as the Seminoles' top recruiter after assisting Brad Scott with the 1990 recruiting class as a graduate assistant.

A native of Brewton, Ala., Cottrell came to FSU after two years as an assistant at Troy (Ala.) State while attending school there in 1981 and 1982. He also held high school head coaching jobs in Alabama, at Kinston, Flomaton and East Brewton high schools. In 1986 and '87, he led Flomaton High to a pair of perfect regular seasons, the first in school history.






the last tick of the clock, nothing compares to the pageantry and excitement of Seminole football. On a warm September night or a sunny November afternoon, fall Saturdays in Tallahassee mean only one thing — Florida State football.

Empty, Florida State's Doak Campbell Stadium is just another college football arena. But fill it with more than 72,000 die-hard, garnet-and-gold clad, screaming Seminole fans, and the stadium is transformed into one of the most exciting places in the nation. On those six dates each year, it's easy to see (and hear) why FSU's football teams have posted an amazing 37-3 mark at home over the past six years.

Game-day excitement begins hours before the game, as pregame tailgate parties kickoff the fun. Friends and acquaintances, new and old, meet, greet and eat before entering the stadium. As game time nears, fans move to their seats. The Marching Chiefs entertain and the Seminole cheerleaders exhort the crowd to a fever pitch. The excitement is palpable.

Minutes before kickoff, every eye turns toward the north end zone. Suddenly, Chief Osceola and Renegade burst out of the tunnel onto the playing field, followed by Head Coach Bobby Bowden and the Seminole team.

An Appaloosa horse owned by Tallahasseean Bill Durham, Renegade gallops the length of the field. Astride Renegade,

Through their colorful presentations, the Marching Chiefs have earned international acclaim with their performances.



Campus Spotlight



For years, the state of Florida has built much of its reputation on its beaches, its oranges,

as a home for Mickey Mouse and as a great place to retire.

This year the state adds the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory at Florida State University.

The lab, a joint effort by Florida State, the University of Florida and the Los Alamos National Laboratory in New Mexico, is on its way to becoming the premier center for magnet research in the world.

"Remember," said Jack Crow, an FSU physics professor and director of the \$100 million facility, "this lab put us on the front page of The New York Times and The Wall Street Journal. The football team hasn't done that yet. We hope they do it this year."

One reason for all the hoopla is that the magnet lab is the first major national laboratory to be located in the Southeastern United States based on peer review. That means the prestigious National Science Foundation listened to top scientists in a number of fields when deciding where to build the lab.

Politics didn't build the lab - good science did.

That science, under the guidance of such world-renowned researchers as Nobel laureate Robert Schrieffer and


fuel-efficient cars, faster computers or safer airplanes. These advanced materials will improve the life of all structures, from bridges to skyscrapers.

In medicine, researchers will improve their ability to look non-invasively inside complex living molecules through magnetic resonance imaging, or MRI. New imagining magnets, stronger than any now available, will make the lab a focal point for medical diagnostics, cancer research, genetic engineering and many other fields, including pharmacology and structural biology.

Work in superconductivity, in which electricity flows through a material without resistance, will save billions in energy costs by making motors, power lines, generators

and batteries more efficient. Huge municipal energy storage devices and super-fast magnetic levitated trains are just two of the benefits that will arise from work in superconductivity at the magnet lab.

These innovations will be made possi-

For example, better understanding of the physical properties of various compounds will lead to new and improved materials such as metals, ceramics and fiber optics. The results may be more

ble largely because the facility, which officially opens this fall at Innovation Park south of Tallahassee, will house the most powerful magnets ever made.

"One of our missions is to push magnet technology to its limits," said magnet lab spokeswoman Janet Patten. "Without bragging, we will be able to generate a magnetic field twice as strong as any in Europe and three times as strong as the Japanese do."

Of the 125 FSU players ever drafted, 71 have played under Bowden. Of those 71 Bowden draftees, 46 spent at least one complete season on an NFL roster.

Since the end of the 1987 season Lone, a total of 34 Seminoles have been selected in the NFL draft. True to form, Florida State produced another bumper cop of talent in 1992, sending six players the next league.

Those six were led by Marvin Jones, 1992 Lombardi and Butkus Award winmer, who surpassed all previous Florida State draftees when the New York Jets made him the fourth overall pick in the . He became the highest FSU selecever in the draft, replacing Deion and Terrell Buckley, who were selected fifth overall.

The two signed free agent contracts and have enjoyed successful pro careers. Marion Butts, who lagged in the shadows of Smith at FSU, was drafted in the seventh round in 1989, and has become an NFL Pro Bowl player for the San Diego Chargers.

In 1992, 12 of Florida State's 23 seniors were drafted or signed free agent contracts. Of those, six players spent all or part of the next season on a professional roster. The Tribe's entire 1991 starting backfield was drafted - tailback Amp Lee (San Francisco) in the second round, fullback Edgar Bennett (Green Bay) and quarterback Casey Weldon (Philadelphia) in the fourth. They were joined by former Seminole teammates Terrell Buckley (Green Bay), Howard Dinkins (Atlanta) and Brad Johnson (Minnesota) in making FSU's 1992 draft class one of its most successful. They brought the total of Seminole football alumni in the National

Without a doubt, FSU's greatest pro ever was Oakland Raiders wide receiver

Football League to 33.

Fred Biletnikoff, a 1964 All-American at Florida State who starred for 13 seasons with the Silver and Black and made the Pro Bowl four times during a five-year

span. Biletnikoff played in nine AFL/AFC title games and a pair of Super Bowls, earning Most Valuable Player honors in Super Bowl XI. In 1988, he became the first former Seminole elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

played receiver in the pros. There have been 11 defensive linemen and 11 FSU linebackers in professional football.

A total of 12 NFL running backs wore the Garnet and Gold, while eight offensive linemen went to Florida State. Seven tight ends and eight former FSU quarterbacks made it at least one season in pro football.

Entering the 1993 preseason, 29 former Seminoles were on professional rosters and several have had long and illustrious careers. Two former Seminoles who just concluded lengthy NFL careers are defensive back Bobby Butler of the Atlanta Falcons and Denver Broncos offensive lineman Ken Lanier, both of whom recently retired after 12 years in the league.

Over the years, nine former Seminoles have played in Super Bowls. Five former FSU stars, including two-sport stand out Deion Sanders, have been selected to the Pro Bowl.

In the history of college football, few programs can boast of six consecutive top five national finishes. Yet, nothing speaks louder of Florida State's success during this span, than the number of Seminoles who have "graduated" to the National Football League.

₹radition. When it comes to college football, the word conjures up images of Knute

Rockne, Bear Bryant, helmet-less players and the Army-Navy game. Schools celebrating their 100th year of football boast of a grand tradition.

But Florida State, in only its 47th season of football, has proven that it doesn't take 100 years to build tradition. All it takes is success. With success comes all the things that make up a great college football tradition - award-winners, All-Americans, classic games and legendary coaches.

Florida State doesn't match its rivals in years of tradition. But the Seminoles have matched and surpassed some older brethren in success. For example:

- FSU is one of only three schools to compile six straight top-four national rankings, a streak that is still alive.
- The Seminoles rank sixth all-time in bowl winning percentage with a 12-7-2 record.
- With eight straight victories, FSU owns the NCAA record for bowl wins in consecutive seasons. Florida State's 11 straight bowl games without a loss is also an NCAA record.
- Florida State Head Coach Bobby Bowden is the first coach in Division I history to compile six straight 10-win seasons.

two Jim Thorpe awards, two Butkus Awards, a Lombardi and a Unitas Golden Arm. Seminole players are regularly named finalists for these and other honors.

Just three Seminole football numbers have been retired. Those belong to College Football Hall-of-Famers Ron Sellers (34) and Fred Biletnikoff (25), and allstar noseguard Ron Simmons (50). Biletnikoff is also the only former Seminole enshrined in the National Football League Hall of Fame.

These are just a few examples of FSU's winning tradition, a tradition passed from team to team and player to player that builds with each passing season.

Florida State University may have one of the shortest traditions in college football, in years. But in terms of quality, success and excellence — in its All-Americans, its many bowl teams, its hall of fame selections and its national award winners -Seminole football boasts a tradition few schools can match.

25 FRED BILETNIKOFF

Wide Receiver, 1962-64 1988 National Football League Professional Football Hall of Fame 1991 College Football Hall of Fame

Fred Biletnikoff started catching passes in high school in Erie, Pa., continued at Florida State and went on to star with the Oakland Raiders.

> In 1964, Biletnikoff ranked fourth in the nation with 57 receptions for 11 touchdowns. The

Biletnikoff was selected by the Oakland Raiders in the second round of the 1965 draft. He went on to make the AFL all-star team twice and four Pro Bowls in a five-year span. He played in nine AFL/AFC title games, two Super Bowls and was MVP in Super Bowl XI.

When his 14-year professional career came to an end after the 1978 season, Biletnikoff had caught 589 passes for 8,974 yards and 76 touchdowns. The Raiders never had a losing season during Biletnikoff's tenure; he caught 40 or passes 10 straight years.

In 1988, he became the first See nole inducted into the Professional For ball Hall of Fame. Three years later. joined Ron Sellers as the only Florida State alumni in the College Football Hall of Fame.

Wide Receiver, 1966-68 1988 College Football Hall of Fame

In December 1988, former Seminole great and 1968 consensus All-American Ron Sellers became the first FSU player inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame.

The Palm Beach, Fla., native owned the NCAA receiving records for more than 20 years. From 1966-68, Sellers caught 212 passes for 3,598 yards for Florida State. He averaged 119.9 yards per game and caught passes in a record 30 consecutive games. He had 18 100-yard receiving days and five 200-yard games. He still owns nearly every Florida State receiving record. Sellers caught 13 or more passes in a game seven times during his career.

A Tradition EXCEPTED Seminoles' first consensus All-America choice, he capped a super year with four touchdown catches

• Four Seminole defensive players have finished in the top 10 in balloting for the Heisman Trophy.

Individually, Florida State players have earned consensus All-America recognition 12 times, including six in the past six years. Marvin Jones was the most recent FSU consensus choice, and the third twotime selection.

The Seminole trophy case is getting full, too. Florida State players have won The Seminoles played in three bowl games during the Sellers era. A player labeled "can't play, too fragile" by Coach Bill Peterson at first, Sellers was later called "simply the best college receiver I ever saw."

38 PAUL McGOWAN

Inside Linebacker, 1984-87 1987 Butkus Award Winner

Calling the Butkus Award for linebackers, "the Heisman of the Bad Guys," FSU inside linebacker Paul McGowan accepted the award from Dick Butkus himself in December 1987.

The 6-1, 230-pound McGowan won the award by a one-point margin over Ohio State's Chris Spielman. McGowan won the award based on a senior season in which he totalled 150 tackles, including 97 solo stops and 11 behind the line of scrimmage. He was named to the Associated Press, *The Sporting News* and *Football News* first team All-America squads.



2 DEION SANDERS

Cornerback, 1985-88 1988 Jim Thorpe Award

One of the best athletes ever to wear a

Sanders won the Jim Thorpe Award as the top defensive back of 1988.

Sanders collected the prize after a career which saw him gather 14 interceptions, and three more in bowl games. In his junior and senior seasons, FSU went 11-1 with a pair of New Year's Day bowl wins. In 1988, Sanders ranked in the top 10 nationally with five interceptions in nine games. He was the nation's top punt returner, averaging 15.2 yards per return.

The Ft. Myers, Fla., native ranks third on the FSU career charts in interceptions and holds most of the punt return records as well.

A three-sport star in football, baseball and track at Florida State, Sanders was the fifth pick in the 1989 NFL draft by the Atlanta Falcons. He became a successful two-sport pro — elected to the Pro Bowl twice in football and starting in center field for the National League champion Atlanta Braves.

27 TERRELL BUCKLEY

Cornerback, 1989-91 1991 Jim Thorpe Award Winner

In 1991, Terrell Buckley capped the ! the New York Jets.

best season ever by a Florida State cornerback by becoming the second Seminole to win the Jim Thorpe Award.

A junior, Buckley blew away the Florida State record for interceptions with 12 in 1991. He intercepted passes in eight of FSU's 12 regular season contests to lead the country in pickoffs. Against Michigan in Ann Arbor, his interception and 40-yard return for a touchdown on the game's first play set the stage for a 51-31 Florida State win.

A native of Pascagoula, Miss., Buckley also demolished the Florida State career record with 21 INTs in just three seasons. His 470 career interception return yards broke an NCAA record that had stood since 1974. Following the season, Buckley entered the NFL draft and was selected by the Green Bay Packers in the first round.

55 MARVIN JONES


Inside Linebacker, 1990-92 1992 Butkus Award Winner 1992 Lombardi Award Winner

The top defensive player in the nation in 1992, Marvin Jones became the first Seminole to capture two national awards in the same year when he earned both the Butkus and the Lombardi Awards following his junior season.

Florida State's third two-time consensus All-American, Jones tallied 111 tackles and seven tackles for loss in 1992 while leading the Seminoles to an 11-1 record. He made 10 or more tackles in nine games and finished fourth in balloting for the Heisman Trophy.

He left Florida State seventh on the career tackle chart with 369. His 28 tackles for loss rank third on the school's alltime list. A first team All-ACC choice from Miami, Fla., Florida State tailored its nationally-ranked defense to Jones' strength in 1992.

Jones left Tallahassee after his junior season for the NFL, where he became the highest Seminole draft choice ever when he was selected fourth overall by the New York Jets.
