



IT'S HISTORY

The two Sunshine State schools first met on the gridiron in 1958 with Florida posting a 21-7 victory. The Gators and Seminoles have met every year since that initial contest with Florida now holding an overall 23-11-1 advantage in the all-time series.

Florida State's first win in the series came in 1964, 16-7, in what was the first meeting between the two schools in Tallahassee. The first six contests in the series were held in Gainesville. Since 1964, the series has alternated between the two campuses with Florida hosting in odd-numbered years and Florida State in even-numbered years. Florida shows a 14-5-1 ledger in the 20 series games held at Florida Field and a 9-6 ledger in the 15 series games played in Tallahassee.

Since 1979 this game has been the regular-season finale for both universities. This series has been marked by streaks over the last two decades. Florida won nine straight from 1968-76. Florida State then won four consecutive games from 1977-80. Florida responded with six straight wins from 1981-86 and then the Seminoles put together wins in four consecutive contests from 1987-90. The two teams have split the last two games, with Florida winning 14-9 in 1991 in Gainesville and Florida State winning 45-24 last year in

Steve Spurrier is 1-2 against the Seminoles as a head coach, while FSU head coach Bobby Bowden is 9-8 in 17 previous meetings with the Gators. Spurrier was 2-1 versus FSU as Florida's QB from 1964-66.



GATOR TALES...

The 15 largest crowds in State of Florida history — collegiate games, professional games, bowl games, Super Bowls — have all occurred since 1991 at Florida Field. The all-time largest in Sunshine State history: 85,461, Nov. 30, 1991, Florida vs. Florida State...Florida and Florida State have combined to travel more than six miles in total offense this season...Florida is just the second school in NCAA Div. 1A history to have one quarterback (Danny Wuerffel) throw for more than 2,000 yards, have a second

quarterback (Terry Dean) throw for 1,000-plus yards and have a 1,000-yard rusher (Errict Rhett) all in the same season. The other school to turn the trick was the University of Houston in 1988...Six of Florida's nine victories this season have been in the come-from-behind fashion, including the largest road.

ion, including the largest road comeback in school history (-17 pts. at South Carolina)... Florida's defense has allowed just three points in the last six quarters of play...The Gators have established a new school record for points scored in a season. Florida has tallied 423 points this year, breaking the 387 points accumulated by the 1990 Gator squad. The SEC record is 454 points scored by the 1973 Alabama team.





THE UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA

UF Leads Information Revolution—From Electronic Mail to Library Catalogs and High-Tech IDs

he University of Florida is an interchange on the information superhighway of the future. UF is helping to build a new generation of data, voice and video networks which will link the world.

Access to the World

University of Florida students, faculty and staff can now communicate almost instantaneously via electronic mail with peers and colleagues across campus or across the globe through a complex web of international computer networks known as the Internet.

In addition to allowing the simple exchange of messages, the Internet offers access to a wide variety of computer databases, the best example being the State University System's library holdings.

Students cramming for a final paper can access LUIS, the Library User Information Service, at any hour and find out whether the library at UF or any of the eight other state universities has a book they need. Students can even use e-mail 24 hours a day to ask reference questions.

Another exciting service of the Internet is PROFNET, an international bulletin board where the media can seek sources from academia for subjects as diverse as archeology and economics.

Much of UF's computing takes place at the Northeast Regional Data Center, or NERDC, an \$11 million supercomputer housed in the Bryant Space Sciences Center.

A Cashless Society

Across the street from NERDC at its new home in the HUB, the *Gator One Card* office is part of another campus computer revolution. With an identification card produced in less than a minute, a University of Florida student can, or will soon be able to, do everything from opening a dormitory door to buying a soda from a vending machine or registering for a class. In addition to a computer-generated color photo of the student, the card contains a magnetic data strip and an optically scannable bar code.

Universities have long been testing grounds for new technology, and as the 21st century approaches, the University of Florida serves as a hands-on laboratory for the advancement of the Information Age.

A Distinguished University

The University of Florida—the state's oldest and largest university—is one of America's premier research and teaching universities. Tracing its roots to 1853, the university was officially established in Gainesville in 1906.

The University of Florida's broad curriculum of teaching, research and service is the basis for its membership in the prestigious Association of American Universities—the top 58 public and private institutions in North America.

With 16 colleges, 4 schools and 100 interdisciplinary research and education centers, bureaus and institutes, the university offers more academic programs on a single campus than all but two other American universities. There are 114 majors in 52 undergraduate degree programs. The Graduate School coordinates 123 master's and 76 doctoral programs in 87 of the 137 academic departments. Professional post-baccalaureate degrees are offered in law, dentistry, medicine and veterinary medicine.

More than 35,000 students from every county in Florida, every state in the union and more than 100 countries attend the University of Florida. This cultural diversity is reflected in significant populations of African-American, Hispanic and Asian students.

Advances in the university's academic prestige have been mirrored by increases in the quality of its students. Ninety percent of the entering freshmen score above the national mean on standard college entrance exams, and the university consistently ranks among the top 10 public universities nationally in the number of National Merit and Achievement Scholars entering each fall.

Students also lead a rich social and extracurricular life. They belong to more than 400 student organizations, attend

more than 200 campus concerts, art exhibits and theatrical productions a year, and participate in an average of two out-of-class seminars and lectures a day.

A distinguished faculty of 4,000 attracted \$230 million in research and training grants in 1991-92. The university's 55 Eminent Scholar Chairs total more than all the other state universities combined. More than two dozen faculty members have been selected to the National Academies of Science and/or Engineering, the Institute of Medicine or a counterpart in a foreign nation. One faculty member's process for producing alternative fuels was honored with the nation's five millionth patent in 1991, and the university is a co-developer of the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory in Tallahassee.

The Health Science Center, with its six colleges and Shands teaching hospital, is the site of expanding education and research activities, including a new \$40 million Brain Institute.

The Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences has cooperative extension offices in all 67 Florida counties. IFAS research and education programs bolster Florida's \$35 billion-per-year food and agricultural industry.

The university has been a national leader in garnering private support for its teaching, research and service missions. A recently completed fund-raising campaign attracted more than \$392 million in private donations, making it the third most successful campaign ever by a public university.

The intercollegiate athletic program consistently ranks among the nation's top overall programs, and the university's athletes excel off the field of play, earning recognition for their academic successes from the Southeastern Conference and the NCAA.

The university's 2,000-acre campus in Gainesville is the site of more than 800 buildings, including 142 classrooms and laboratories. Also on campus are the Florida Museum of Natural History, the Harn Museum of Art and the 1,800-seat Center for the Performing Arts.

Dr. John Lombardi

istorian, teacher, administrator, and author, Dr. John Lombardi became the ninth president of the University of Florida in March of 1990.

Born in Los Angeles in 1942, Lombardi comes from an education family. His mother worked as a college librarian and his father, a pioneer in the California community college movement, was president of Los Angeles City College. Lombardi earned his bachelor's degree from Pomona College and his master's and doctoral degrees from Columbia University. He also attended Universidad Nacional Autonoma de Mexico and the University of California at Los Angeles.

Lombardi came to the University of Florida from Johns Hopkins University, where he was provost and vice-president for academic affairs since 1987. From 1967 until 1987, he pursued an academic career at Indiana University, at the Southeast campus for a year and then in the history department of the Bloomington campus, where he became a professor in 1977. Lombardi held various administrative posts at Indiana University, including director of Latin American Studies, dean of International Programs, and dean of Arts and Sciences. He also served as a member of the board for Indiana University of the Mid-West Universities Consortium for International Activities (MUCIA), as the director of Foreign Area Fellowship Program cooperative project in Venezuela. Lombardi also taught at the Universidad Central de Venezuela.

A long-term interest in international education involved him in committees and task forces related to international studies for the American Association of Universities and the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges. A past president of the Conference on Latin American History of the American



Historical Association, Lombardi serves on the advisory board of the National Foreign Language Center. The Venezuelan Academia Nacional de la Historia elected him a corresponding member for the United States, and he serves as a member of the Pan American Institute of Geography and History. His international studies interest also led to a chairmanship of an evaluation team on international and interdisciplinary programs for the Board of Regents of the Florida State Board of Regents.

Elected a senior associate member of St. Antony's College, Oxford, Lombardi has received a variety of fellowships and grants, including the Fulbright-Hays research fellowship, a National Defense Foreign Language fellowship, and grants from Fundacion Simon Bolivar and Fundacion Creole in Venezuela. He has also received grants from the Social Science Research Council, the Tinker Foundation, the Conference on Latin American History, and MUCIA.

A specialist in Latin American history, Lombardi is the author of seven books focused mostly on

Venezuela. His wife, Cathryn Lee Lombardi, coauthored one of his books and illustrated two others. Lombardi has contributed many scholarly articles, papers, reviews, and teaching materials to journals and conferences. In addition to history, he has taught courses in international business and participated in several executive programs as an instructor or lecturer. Considered an expert on small computers, Lombardi has served on many committees and task forces related to computer use, literacy, and product evaluation. He has reviewed software and hardware in various publications and currently serves as contributing editor for InfoWorld. For about two years, Lombardi's enthusiasm for automobiles persuaded him and a friend to operate Farmer's Garage, a specialty shop for older model cars.

John and Cathryn Lombardi have two children, John and Maryann. John graduated from Indiana University and is a graduate student at the University of Florida. Maryann is a student at the University of Michigan.

A Winner and Innovator

teve Spurrier's first three seasons as head coach at the University of Florida, his alma mater, resulted in the finest three years in Gator football history.

During this period the Gators have compiled a 28-8 overall record (19-4 in the SEC), while setting school-record standards which resulted in conference first-place finishes in 1990 and 1991 and the SEC Eastern Division crown in 1992.

In 1991, Florida captured its first official SEC Championship and earned a trip to the Sugar Bowl, while in 1992 the Gators participated in the first SEC Championship playoff game and finished the season with a Gator Bowl victory.

Spurrier is the first coach to lead UF to three consecutive seasons of nine or more wins and three Top 15 finishes in the final *Associated Press* poll (13th in 1990, 7th in '91, 10th in '92).

He was chosen SEC Coach-ofthe-Year in 1990 and 1991, bringing his conference Coach-of-the-Year string to four consecutive seasons, dating back to the 1988 and 1989 seasons at Duke University of the Atlantic Coast Conference.

His overall career collegiate head coaching record is 48-21-1 (.693 winning percentage) in six seasons, a mark which stands as the seventh-best in the nation among active Division IA coaches. His overall head coaching record, counting three years with the Tampa Bay Bandits of the USFL, is 83-40-1 (.670).

Spurrier's first Gator team went 9-2 in 1990, finished fifth in the nation on defense and 10th in offense while setting 14 single-season records. In 1991, the Gators won 10 games for the first time, beating seven league foes by a margin of 226-74, while producing the best league record of any school since 1977.

The 1991 Gator offense established seven new school records, three SEC marks and finished ninth in the nation in total offense and fourth in passing. Their 5,028 yards of total offense was a school record and only the second time in SEC



His accomplishments at the collegiate and professional levels provide solid proof that he is among the leading coaches in football at any level in the 1990s...His return to Florida brought back fond memories for Gators everywhere. history a team managed more than 5,000 yards in that category. Florida finished the '91 regular season ranked third in the nation but dropped to seventh after a Sugar Bowl set-back completed the 10-2 campaign.

In 1992, a young Florida team bounced back from a 1-2 start to win seven of its last eight games to advance to the first SEC playoff game. Florida finished the season with a 9-4 record, including a 27-10 victory over N.C. State in the Gator Bowl. The Gators broke five school and three SEC offensive records, while ranking first in the SEC and ninth in the nation in passing. In addition, quarterback Shane Matthews, a two-time SEC Player-of-the-Year, completed his assault on school and SEC records in 1992. Matthews threw for a league single-season record 3,205 yards, while breaking conference career records for passing yardage (9,287 yards) and TD passes (74). Florida was the lone Division IA school to have a 3,000 yard passer (Matthews) and a running back who rushed for 900-plus yards (Errict Rhett).

Spurrier, the 1966 Heisman Trophy winner, is still regarded as the most famous athlete in UF history. He came back to Florida after serving as head football coach at Duke from 1987-89. At Duke, his teams reached heights no Blue Devil squad had seen in nearly three decades. Their record-setting offense shredded ACC standards and resulted in a 1989 bowl appearance and conference championship—Duke's first bowl showing since 1960 and first conference title since 1962.

All three of Spurrier's Duke teams led the ACC in passing and total offense.

Spurrier offenses produced the same results at the professional level in the USFL from 1983-85 with the Tampa Bay Bandits, where he compiled a 35-19 record and two consecutive playoff appearances. The 1984 team was the first in pro history to produce a 4,000 yard passer and two 1,000 yard rushers in the same season.

Spurrier's coaching career started in 1978 as quarterback coach at Florida. In 1979 he served as offensive coordinator and quarterback coach at Georgia Tech. As an assistant coach at Duke from 1980-82, Spurrier's reputation as an exceptional offensive coach originated. The 1982 Blue Devils set ACC records with over 300 yards per game passing and 4,990 yards of total offense as QB Ben Bennett finished his career as the NCAA's alltime passing king with 9,614 yards in three seasons.

After his USFL head coaching stint, Spurrier's offensive scheme helped produce record-setting Duke quarterbacks Steve Slayden and Anthony Dilweg and NCAA TD-reception king Clarkston Hines, the 1989 ACC Player-of-the-Year.

Spurrier was born on April 20, 1945 in Miami Beach, Fla., son of Presbyterian minister J. Graham Spurrier and his wife Marjorie. The family moved to Johnson City when Steve was 12 years old.

In high school he was all-state in football, basketball and baseball and a prep All-American in football in 1962. His baseball team won two straight state titles and in three seasons of pitching he never lost a game.

After a difficult recruiting battle, head coach Ray Graves signed Spurrier to a Gator football scholarship, beating out Bear Bryant of Alabama and Johnny Vaught of Ole Miss. Why Florida?

"I chose Florida because of the passing, the weather, Coach Graves and the school," he says. "I fell in love with the state and decided that's where I would like to spend a lifetime, and you should go to school where you want to spend your lifetime."

The rest was history. He completed the first pass of his career, a 56-yarder to Jack Harper against SMU in 1964, and guided the Gators to two major bowls in three seasons, eight come-from-behind wins in the final quarter and a glorious period still remembered with fondness by Florida faithful.

The games still best recalled came against FSU in 1965 and Auburn in 1966—the game which put him over the top in the Heisman Trophy race against Purdue's Bob Griese.

The Gators had already been selected to play in the Sugar Bowl in 1965 when they faced FSU and found themselves trailing 17-16 with 2:02 remaining and at their 29-yard line.

In six plays, Spurrier drove Florida to a TD to take a 23-17 lead. A desperation Seminole pass resulted in a TD interception return to make the final margin 30-17.

The Gators went on to the Sugar Bowl where Spurrier set six passing and total offense records and became the only player from the losing team ever to be voted the game's MVP.

The Auburn game in 1966 was the ultimate in Spurrier's knack of being in the right place at the right time under pressure. Heisman Trophy ballots had gone out the previous week and were due back in the week following. A record Florida Field press corps was in attendance.

Despite one of the greatest performances of his career, 27-of-40 passing for 259 yards and one TD, five punts for an average of 46.9 yards per kick, the Gators still remained tied with Auburn at 27-27 with just over two minutes remaining and fourth and long. Wayne Barfield was Florida's regular placekicker, but his range was short.

Spurrier took the responsibility for hitting the longer 40-yard effort, although he had not kicked a field goal since the opener that season against Northwestern. He kicked it through for a dramatic 30-27 victory.

Joe Durso of the New York Times called Spurrier a "Real-life Frank Merriwell." John Logue of the Atlanta Journal wrote, "Spurrier, with his hands tied behind his back and facing a firing squad would be favored to escape."

Spurrier was the first-round draft choice of the San Francisco 49ers in 1967 and played 10 years in the NFL, nine with the 49ers and one with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.



ASSISTANT COACHES



JERRY ANDERSON Assistant Head Coach, Defensive Tackles Coach

Jerry Anderson enters his ninth season as a member of the Gator coaching staff. He joined the Florida staff in 1985 and coached the tight ends and special teams from 1985-89. In January

of 1990 he was appointed coach of the defensive tackles and in April of '91 he was promoted to Assistant Head Coach.

A 1968 graduate of the University of Florida who holds a Master's Degree in Administration and School Management from Laverne College, Anderson lettered three years for the Gators (1964-66). A three-year teammate of current head coach Steve Spurrier, Anderson started at middle guard for Florida teams that received bids to the 1966 Sugar Bowl and 1967 Orange Bowl. A co-captain of the '67 Orange Bowl team, he received All-SEC and honorable mention All-America honors in 1966.

Anderson began his coaching career at Florida as freshman coach in 1967-68 before moving on to the youth and high school ranks in Miami for 10 seasons. Anderson's collegiate coaching career, which began in 1977, has taken him to Vanderbilt, Miami (Fla.), Army and Central Florida, in addition to UF. The 1993 season marks Anderson's 25th season as a coach and 16th on the collegiate level.

Anderson is married to the former Mary Jean Weed. They have a son, Richard (28) and a daughter, Jennifer (9).



JIM COLLINS
Assistant Defensive Co-Coordinator,
Inside Linebackers Coach

Jim Collins enters his fourth season on the Florida coaching staff. He was named coach of the outside linebackers and Gatorbacks in January of 1990. In February of 1991 he

was put in charge of inside linebackers and in April of '91 he was given additional responsibilities as Assistant Defensive CoCoordinator.

Prior to coming to Florida, Collins had previously coached at Duke University for six seasons (1983, 1985-89). Collins and Steve Spurrier have worked together since 1986. He was the Blue Devils' co-defensive coordinator in 1989 and helped guide Duke to its first ACC title in 27 years and a trip to the All-American Bowl.

A 1974 graduate of Elon College where he lettered at defensive back for two years, he began his coaching career with a sixyear stint as an assistant at Page High School in Greensboro, N.C. In 1980, Collins became the defensive coordinator at Lees-McRae Junior College in Banner Elk, N.C. He coached the defensive backs at Appalachian State in 1981-82 before a one-year stint at Duke in '83. After serving as defensive coordinator at Jacksonville State in 1984, Collins returned to Duke where he coached from 1985 until he joined the Gators.

Collins is married to the former Geri Tarrant. They have one daughter, Jennifer (12).



DWAYNE DIXONWide Receivers Coach

Dwayne Dixon, who enters his fourth season as a football coach, is in charge of the Florida wide receivers. Dixon, a wide receiver as a player, was a four-year letterman for the Gators from 1980-83. Prior to joining the Gator

football coaching staff in January of 1990, Dixon was working as an assistant in the UF's Office of Student Life.

In 1992, UF ranked as one of the nation's premier aerial

teams. The Gators led the SEC and ranked ninth in the nation in passing yards, averaging 286.7 ypg. WR Willie Jackson, a consensus first-team All-SEC choice, once again led the league with eight TD catches and 62 receptions (the third highest total in UF history).

As a player, Dixon was a first-team All-SEC selection in 1983 and was an Associated Press Honorable Mention All-American his senior year. Completing his career as the third-leading receiver in Gator history with 124 catches, Dixon was the 1983 Bluebonnet Bowl Most Valuable Player after catching eight passes for 106 yards and three touchdowns. He played for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1984-85 and 1987, and played three years in the Arena Football League. He was the league's leading receiver and scorer for Washington in 1987 and for Detroit in 1988 and was the winner of the league's "Iron Man" award in 1988. He played for championship teams in Detroit in 1988 and '89.

Dixon is married to the former Sandra Barclay. They have one daughter, Brittany who was born in September of 1989.



CARL FRANKS
Recruiting Coordinator,
Tight Ends Coach

An eight-year assistant under coach Steve Spurrier, Carl Franks enters his fourth season on the Gator staff. He was appointed running backs coach in January of 1990 and in February of '91

he also took on additional duties as Florida's Recruiting Coordinator. Florida's 1992 recruiting class was ranked as the nation's premier crop by Super Prep and the Blue Chip Report, while the '93 class was ranked among the nation's 10 best. This season, Franks takes over the tight ends, while maintaining his recruiting responsibilities.

A 1983 graduate of Duke University where he played three seasons at tight end and fullback, Franks joined Spurrier's staff with the USFL's Tampa Bay Bandits in 1985 and moved on to Duke University in 1987. Franks joined Spurrier and the Gator staff in January 1990.

An Academic All-ACC selection in 1982 and Duke's Outstanding Sophomore Player in 1980, Franks went on to play tight end and running back with the Bandits of the USFL in 1983-84. Upon returning to Duke as running backs coach, Franks was instrumental in improving Duke's running attack.

Franks is married to the former Deborah Lore. They have one daughter, Brittany who is four.



JOHN REAVES
Running Backs Coach

John Reaves enters his fourth season on the Gator coaching staff after beginning his collegiate coaching career in 1990 by coaching tight ends and assisting with quarterbacks, the position he played at Florida. He assumed the role of running

backs coach in June of 1993.

As a player, Reaves was one of the greatest passers in college football. By the end of his UF career, Reaves had thrown for 7,549 yards, an NCAA record. He set 20 Southeastern Conference records, many of which are still standing. As a member of the "Super Sophs" in 1969, Reaves threw for 342 yards in Florida's opening game upset of top-ranked Houston. In 1971 he received the Sammy Baugh Award as the nation's top collegiate passer.

In 1972 he was drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles in the first round, the 14th pick overall. He was named to the NFL All-Rookie team and was one of five finalists for the NFL Rookie-of-the-Year award. After leaving Philadelphia he played with the Cincinnati Bengals and Houston Oilers. From 1982-85 he played under Steve Spurrier with the Tampa Bay Bandits of the USFL. There he became one of only five quarterbacks in pro football history to

throw for over 4,000 yards in consecutive seasons. He was the second leading passer in USFL history, behind only Houston's Jim Kelly.

Reaves is married to the former Patricia Bohannon. They have two sons, John David (14) and Stephen (8), and a daughter, Layla (18).



BOB SANDERS

Assistant Defensive Co-Coordinator, Banditbacks & Gatorbacks Coach

Bob Sanders enters his fourth season with the Florida Gators and his 15th year as a collegiate assistant coach on the defensive side of the ball. He was appointed defensive ends

coach by Steve Spurrier in January of 1990. In February of 1991 he was put in charge of the Banditbacks and Gatorbacks and in April of '91 he also assumed the role of Assistant Defensive Co-Coordinator.

Prior to coming to Florida, Sanders had previously worked at Georgia Tech, East Carolina, Richmond and Duke. He was the co-defensive coordinator for Spurrier's ACC champion Blue Devils in 1989.

Sanders, a three-year letter winner and 1976 graduate of Davidson College in Davidson, N.C., was also head coach at Douglas Byrd High School in Fayetteville, N.C., in 1979, and was a two-year assistant coach at Southwest Onslow High School in Jacksonville, N.C. beginning in 1976.

Sanders is married to the former Kathie Martin. They have two daughters, Lindsay (14) and Sarah (13), and a son Robby (2).

JIMMY RAY STEPHENS

Offensive Line Coach

Jimmy Ray Stephens, one of the premier head coaches in the Florida high school ranks, joined the staff at the University of Florida—his alma mater—in March of 1993. He had served as a student assistant coach at UF in 1977 and 1978

and as a graduate assistant coach in 1984.

Stephens' Fort Walton Beach High School team won the 4A state football championship in 1991 and he was 30-4 there from 1990-92, turning around a program which was 3-7 the year before he arrived. At Williston High School in 1987 he inherited a team that was 0-10 in 1986 and in the midst of a 16-game losing streak. His teams there finished 10-1 in 1987, 12-1 in 1988 and 11-1 in 1989. Stephens' six-year high school head coaching mark

Stephens played for the Gators from 1972-76. As a sophomore in 1973, he was a second-team All-SEC selection at center. He was redshirted in 1974 and was a starting inside linebacker in 1975 and a second-team ALL-SEC choice at tight end in 1976. Stephens graduated from Florida in 1977. He went on to become a 12th round selection of the Pittsburgh Steelers in the 1977 NFL Draft.

Besides Fort Walton Beach and Williston High Schools, Stephens' prep coaching stops have also included Ocala Vanguard, Union County, Buchholz and Gonzales Tate.

Stephens is married to the former Regine Gouge. They have two sons, Christopher (11) and Timothy (2).



CHARLIE STRONG

Defensive Ends Coach

Charlie Strong is in his third stint at the University of Florida. In 1983 and 1984 he served as a graduate assistant on the Gator defensive staff. In 1988 and 1989 he was Florida's outside linebackers coach and in March of 1991 he was

named coach of the Gator defensive ends after serving as coach of the wide receivers at Ole Miss during the 1990 campaign.

Strong has also had experience at Texas A&M (graduate-assistant in 1985) and Southern Illinois (graduate assistant in 1986-87).

As a player, Strong was a four-time letterwinner at Central Arkansas State, where he was named All-Conference three times in football and twice in track. He earned his degree in Education in 1982 from Central Arkansas State and went on to earn his Master's in Physical Education from Henderson State in 1983. He also received a Master's and Educational Specialist Degree from Florida in 1985 and has started work on a Doctorate Degree.



RON ZOOK

Defensive Coordinator, Defensive Backs Coach

Ron Zook joined the Florida staff in February of 1991 when he was appointed coach of the defensive backs by head coach Steve Spurrier. In April of 1991 he was

elevated to the Defensive Coordinator post.

In his first year at Florida in 1991, Zook's defensive unit continued the solid tradition of defense at Florida. The Gator defense allowed just 307.6 ypg., the third-best average in the SEC and 20th best total in the nation. Florida led the SEC versus the rush, allowing 100.3 ypg., the fifth-best effort in that category in school history. And, the Gators allowed just 13.8 ppg., a total that ranked second in the conference and 13th in the nation. Zook's defense posted shutouts vs. LSU and Alabama, the first time since 1972 that Florida had posted two shutouts versus SEC schools in the same season. Against explosive Florida State, the Gators held the Seminoles to just nine points and just 37 rushing yards. It was only the second time in 119 games that FSU had scored less than 10 points in a game and the 37 rushing yards was 165 yards below FSU's seasonal rushing average.

Junior free safety Will White, a first-team All-SEC selection (as were four other Gator defensive players), completed the '91 campaign with 13 career interceptions, the top total in school history. Cornerback Larry Kennedy was a first-team Freshman All-America selection as well. In 1992, Zook saw free safety Will White and ILB Carlton Miles earn first-team All-SEC honors and honorable mention All-America recognition. Several other Gator defenders earned recognition to All-Freshman and All-Sophomore Teams. As a unit, UF held six opponents to less than 100 yards rushing. Perhaps the highlight of the year was holding Georgia's Garrison Hearst, who finished third in the '92 Heisman Trophy balloting, to just 41 rushing yards, an average of less than three yards per carry.

Zook came to UF from Ohio State where he had served as coach of the defensive backfield for the previous three seasons.

Zook's collegiate coaching career has taken him to Murray State (defensive backs, 1978-80), Cincinnati (defensive coordinator, 1981), Kansas (defensive coordinator, 1982-83), Tennessee (defensive backs, 1984-86), Virginia Tech (defensive coordinator and assistant head coach, 1987) and Ohio State (defensive backfield, 1988-90).

As a player, Zook was a defensive back at Miami of Ohio from 1972-75. He was team captain in '75 and a prominent member of Miami teams that posted a sparkling 34-1-1 record from 1973-75. Zook earned his degree from Miami of Ohio in '76 in Comprehensive Science.

A native of Loudonville, Ohio, Zook is married to the former Denise Baugh. They have two daughters—Jacquelyn (10) and Casey (6).



Jeremy N. Foley

eremy N. Foley, who has handled virtually every aspect of the University of Florida's \$25 million athletic program during his athletic administrative career—which began with an internship in the Gator Ticket Office in 1976—was named UF's Director of Athletics in March of 1992.

A man with great leadership, vision and experience, Foley, 40, brings a die-hard dedication, never-ending enthusiasm and hands-on approach to the top athletic post at the University of Florida. Foley's philosophy involves the continued building of a comprehensive athletic program, with the goal of having the overall UF program ranked as the top athletic program in the nation.

Says Foley, who had served as UF's Senior Associate Athletic Director since 1987, "We have an outstanding academic institution and fantastic coaches, studentathletes, administrators, facilities and fans. With hard work, patience and a commitment to excellence and integrity, we will achieve the success this University deserves."

Thanks in great part to a tireless effort by Foley, Florida has ranked among the nation's 10 best total athletic programs over the past decade.

As chief financial officer for the University Athletic Association (UAA), Foley helped make Gator athletics profitable, eliminating a three-quarters of a million dollar debt. He was the driving force and directly responsible for nearly \$35 million in capital improvements as well, including two major expansions of the football stadium and new tennis, track & field, baseball, golf and swimming facilities. Also, in an era when the NCAA estimates 70 percent of Division I schools are losing money on intercollegiate athletics, the University of Florida Athletic Association contributed more than \$2 million in 1991-1992 to the

University to help fund various academic endeavors.

Florida has been equally successful on the field of play and in the classroom during Foley's administrative tenure.

USA Today has ranked the Florida athletic program among the 10 best in the nation in each of the last 10 years. In addition, UF's across-the-board athletic excellence has been further demonstrated in the fact that the Gators have captured both the men's and women's Southeastern Conference All-Sport

Trophies in each of the last two years—becoming the first institution to accomplish that feat. Florida won five SEC championships in 1992-93, raising its total to 65 league titles since 1980, the top total in the SEC over that span.

UF's commitment in the classroom is equally impressive. The
Gators had a school-record 74
student-athletes honored for
being named to the Southeastern
Conference's Academic Honor Roll
in 1992-93. It was the fifth consecutive year more than 50 UF student-athletes were honored for
academic achievement. Since
1980, Florida's had 512 studentathletes named to the SEC's Academic Honor Roll, the highest total
for any SEC school over that span.

The Gator athletic coaching family, which Foley had a large part in assembling, saw eight of its members named SEC Coach-ofthe-Year in 1991-92 and five more named SEC Coach-of-the-Year in 1992-93. In addition, in 1991-92 UF became just the third school in SEC history to have both the basketball (Lon Kruger) and the football (Steve Spurrier) coach named as league Coach-of-the-Year in the same academic year. Gator mentors Kruger and Spurrier joined Bear Bryant and C.M. Newton (Alabama, 1974-75) and Pat Dye and Sonny Smith (Auburn. 1983-84 and 1987-88) in that exclusive club.

Born in Washington, D.C., but calling New London, N.H., home, Foley received his undergraduate degree in 1974 from Hobart College in Geneva, N.Y., where he also coached and scouted for the tradition-rich lacrosse program following graduation. He went on to earn his Master's Degree in Sports Administration from Ohio University in 1976 and then joined the Gator athletic program.

Foley is an avid sports and Boston Red Sox fan. He married the former Molly McCaughey in October of 1990.

For the 10th consecutive year the overall Gator athletic program ranked among the nation's 10 best in 1992-93, based on research conducted by USA TODAY. The following is a look at UF's national ranking over the last 10 years:











Point totals based on team rankings (from 1-20 with 20 points going to the national champion) in each of the 10 leading NCAA Division I sports (based on participation)





 After becoming the first school in SEC history to win both the men's and women's all-sports trophies in the same year in 1991-92, UF repeated that accomplishment in 1992-93. In fact, Florida's combined men's and women's athletic program has ranked best in the SEC in five of the past

- Since 1980, Florida has won a total of 65 SEC titles, a total representing the most league crowns for a conference member over that time span. In 1992-93, Florida won five SEC Championships.
- Since 1968, 70 Gator student-athletes have represented 14 countries in six Olympic Games, while staking claim to 48 medals—including 24 golds. Twenty-one Gators and one UF coach represented six countries in Barcelona, Spain in the 1992 Summer Olympics. Those 21 won 12 medals, including seven golds.
- A school-record 74 Gator student-athletes earned Southeastern Conference Academic Honor Roll status in 1992-93, the all-time top total in the SEC for one academic year. Both the University of Florida men's (38 selections) and the women's (36 selections) programs set UF records for SEC Academic Honor Roll selections in one academic year in 1992-93. Since 1980, UF student-athletes have accumulated 512 total SEC Academic Honor Roll honors—the top total in the conference during that span.
- Over the last two years, Florida coaches have been named SEC Coach-of-the-Year 13 times.

INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS



NCAA Update

NCAA



his is the era of academic reform, institutional control and compliance in intercollegiate athletics. Change is the order of the day across the nation. Additional revision of NCAA legislation is expected at the 1994 NCAA Convention.

Article 2.1 of the NCAA Constitution states, "It is the responsibility of each member institution to control its intercollegiate athletics program in compliance with the

rules and regulations of the Association. The institution's responsibility for the conduct of its intercollegiate athletics program includes responsibility for the actions of its staff members and for the actions of any other individual or organization engaged in activities promoting the athletics interests of the institution."

In our effort to maintain institutional control of our intercollegiate athletics program and to remain in total compliance with NCAA and SEC rules and regulations, we need the assistance and cooperation of all alumni, boosters, fans, friends and staff members. This is a responsibility which belongs to everyone and not just the President, Athletic Director or the Compliance Officer. Responsibility for compliance has become a teamwork approach.

It is important that everyone has a clear understanding of the definition of a representative of the institution's athletic interests. An athletic representative is an individual who:

- 1. Has participated in or been a member of any agency or organization promoting the institution's intercollegiate athletics program.
- 2. Has made financial contributions to the athletic department or to an athletic booster organization of that institution.
 - 3. Has been assisting or been requested to assist in the recruitment of prospects.
 - 4. Has been assisting or providing benefits to enrolled student-athletes or their families.
 - 5. Has been involved otherwise in promoting the institution's athletic program.

Once an individual is identified as an athletics representative, the person retains that identity indefinitely.

AREAS OF MAJOR CONCERN

Recruiting

In Division I, alumni and representatives of an institution's athletic interest are prohibited from making in-person, on-or-off-campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic communications with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardian. Only institutional staff members are permitted to actively engage in a recruiting process with a prospect and new limitations are in place concerning in-person contacts, telephone calls and communications via mail.

Extra Benefits

An extra benefit is any special

arrangement by an institutional employee or an athletic representative to provide a student-athlete (relative or friend) a benefit not expressly authorized by NCAA regulations. Prohibited extra benefits include but are not limited to: 1) An employment arrangement for a prospect's relatives; 2) Gift of clothing or equipment; 3) Cosigning of loans; 4) Providing loans to a prospect's relatives or friends; 5) Cash or like items; 6) Any tangible items, including merchandise; 7) Free or reducedcost services, rentals or purchases of any type; 8) Free or reduced-cost housing; 9) Use of an institution's athletics equipment; 10) Sponsorship of or arrangement for an awards banquet for high school, preparatory school or two-year college athletes by an institution, representatives of its athletics interests, or its alumni groups or booster clubs.

THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

"The Standard For Excellence"

roviding a balance between athletics and academics, the Southeastern Conference has established itself as a national leader both on the playing

field and in the classroom.

SEC schools began athletic competition with one another almost 100 years ago as members of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association, which was founded in 1894. The larger schools of the SIAA reorganized as the Southern Conference in 1920. The 13 members west and south of the Appalachian Mountains reorganized as the Southeastern Conference in 1933.

Since the conference's formation, the member institutions have built perhaps the greatest tradition of intercollegiate competition of any

league in the country.

The 1992-93 academic year will long be remembered as one of the most outstanding in the 60-year history of the SEC. Conference teams captured an SEC-record nine national team championships, breaking the mark of six in both 1990-91 and 1991-92.

All totaled, the SEC has won 21 national team crowns in the last three years for an average of seven

per season.

The 1992-93 national champions from the SEC included: Alabama football: Arkansas men's cross country, men's indoor track and men's outdoor track; Florida men's golf; Georgia women's gymnastics; LSU baseball, women's indoor track and women's outdoor track.

Overall, the SEC placed at least one team in the top six nationally in all 18 sports sponsored by the league. The 18-sport breakdown included nine national champions. three NCAA runners-up as well as a fourth and sixth-place NCAA showing. The SEC boasted an NCAA semifinal squad in each of the remaining four sports, as the teams posted one No. 1, two No. 2 and one No. 5 ranking in their final poll.

All totaled, the SEC had a team finish first or second at the NCAA Championship or their respective poll in 15 of 18 sports, and a 1-2 finish in three sports (women's

basketball, gymnastics and men's outdoor track).

On the gridiron, the SEC broke new ground in 1992 with the debut of divisions and the first conference championship game in Division IA history. The outcome was not decided until the final minutes when Alabama thwarted the chance of the first-ever Division IA tie-breaker by posting a 28-21 victory over Florida.

League teams capped the campaign with a sterling 5-1 mark in postseason bowl games to lead all conferences as at least half of the member institutions earned a bowl invitation for the 11th time in the last 12 years. In addition, the SEC celebrated its 60th season by winning its 12th national championship, attracting a national-record 4.8 million fans (13th-straight year to lead the country) and posting the best non-conference winning percentage for the ninth time in nine seasons.


The conference distributed approximately \$34.3 million to the 12 league institutions in the revenue sharing plans for the 1992-93 fiscal year. It was the highest total in SEC history and represented a 52.5 percent increase since 1989-90.

The SEC's financial support of its institutions ensures the continued quality of academic and athletic opportunities for student-athletes. The conference has developed numerous programs to better serve its membership, including: New Coaches Orientation Program (seminar to supplement existing programs and enhance professional development); Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (provides student-athletes opportunity to discuss current issues and is first of its kind on conference level); Summer Workshop (annual event to review conference administrative procedures including eligibility rules, financial aid and satisfactory progress) and Youth Clinics (provide children from host cities the opportunity to receive instruction from SEC and area coaches in conjunction with various league championships).

The 12 members of the SEC provide more than \$23 million in scholarships for approximately 3,300 student-athletes each year. In conjunction with the USF&G Sugar Bowl, the SEC annually awards post-graduate scholarships totaling \$70,000 to 12 student athletes. The top male and female nominee each receive the H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar Athlete Award and a \$10,000 scholarship. Ten additional student-athletes (five male, five female) are each awarded \$5,000 to continue their education.

In addition, the SEC television contract with Jefferson-Pilot for men's basketball and football guarantees at least \$80,000 distributed to the general scholarship fund of participating teams through the JP Player of the Game program.

Bedded in the ground of tradition, proud of its successful past proven in its present and excited about its promising future, the SEC is "The Standard for Excellence."

en Hill Griffin Stadium at Florida Field-the site of the largest football crowd (collegiate or professional) in the state of Florida history (85,461 Nov. 30, 1991 vs. FSU)—has moved into the national spotlight in recent years as one of collegiate football's best stadiums, from a player and fan standpoint.

The 1993 season marks the 64th year that Florida Field is the home of the Gators. Prior to the 1989 season, Florida Field took on the expanded name of Ben Hill Griffin Stadium at Florida Field in honor of Ben Hill Griffin, Jr., a life-long Gator supporter and fan who had been extremely benevolent and generous to several sectors at the University of Florida prior to his passing in March of 1990. Florida Field was originally dedicated on Nov. 8, 1930 when Florida met Alabama. Over the years, Florida Field has become a standing remembrance to all Floridians who have died in military service to our nation.

With the crowning jewel of Florida Field—the north end zone expansion project-completed just prior to the 1991 season, capacity now stands at 83,000, making Florida Field one of the eight largest oncampus stadiums in the nation. With the addition of the 10,000 seats, the 1991 and 1992 seasons saw UF draw the top 12 crowds (collegiate, professional, bowl and Super Bowl games) in state of Florida history.

The addition, which transformed Florida Field from a horseshoe to a bowl, cost \$17 million and involved no state funding. The structure added 18 skyboxes to the stadium, which now has 46 skyboxes. Also, the structure has 2,000 club-level seats, 1,300 covered chairback seats, 5,000 upperlevel chairbacks, concession stands and a gift shop. The structure is also home to Gator Boosters, Inc., which funds men's and women's athletic scholarships and capital improvement projects.

In August of 1982, the south end zone project was completed and raised the seating capacity of Ben Hill Griffin Stadium at Florida Field to over 72,000 and gave the Gator football program one of the nation's top collegiate stadiums. Since that time, Florida has ranked in the top 15 nationally in attendance for 11 consecutive years.

The 18,000 seats with the 1982 expansion, and the addition of a complete athletic training center located beneath the stands in the south end zone, were all part of a master plan to develop athletic facilities at Florida that are second to none. The Ben Hill Griffin. Jr., Athletic Training Center. the luxury skyboxes and a spacious and highly-functional press box combined to make Florida Field the premier collegiate stadium in the state of Florida.

The original stadium,

in 1930, consisted of the lower half of the current stadium. Seating capacity was 21,769. The entire stadium constructed below ground. In 1950, over 11,000 seats were added on the west side and another 7,000 were provided by bleachers on the east side. The additions brought seating capacity to 40,116. Additional bleacher seats were added during the 1950s, bringing capacity to 46,164 by 1960. In December of 1965, construction started again on further additions that added over 10,000 permanent seats on the east side and temporary bleachers moved from the east side to the south end zone, providing a total capacity of 62,800 (56,164 permanent seats). The south end zone expansion in '82 enclosed the south end of the stadium, and brought the capacity to 72,000. The north end zone transformed the horseshoe into a bowl and raised capacity to 83,000.

Also new for the 1990 season was the all-natural grass playing surface which was installed during the summer, shortly after the arrival of head football coach Steve Spurrier. The natural grass surface replaced an artificial surface which had been in place since 1971. Additionally, Spurrier has tagged Florida Field "The Swamp," as the Gator mentor enters the 1993 season 18-0 at home over his three years at the helm.

In the South End Zone, the First Aid Room will be located on the second concourse, directly behind Section In the North End Zone, First Aid Rooms will be centrally located on each concourse.










Final Thoughts

s today's game draws to a close and the battle for supremacy in the Sunshine State is settled in "The Swamp", you might want to take one long look at the Florida sidelines. Nineteen Gator players will be making their final home appearance in a Florida uniform. In their honor, we'd like to pay tribute to this outstanding class, who have made their mark on Florida history, both on the field and in the classroom.

The 1993 UF senior class ends their career today as the winningest senior class in school history, compiling 37 victories over the past four years heading into today's game. Included in their accomplishments are the school's first-ever outright Southeastern Conference championship, two SEC Eastern Division titles, an appearance in the first-ever SEC Championship game, three bowl

appearances (Sugar & Gator, TBA) and national rankings in the top 15 in the final *Associated Press* poll in all three previous years.

This season, the Gators will be making their third consecutive trip to a bowl game and should once again finish very high in the national rankings. Incredibly, the 1993 senior class has been ranked in the AP top 25 in 62 out of a possible 63 weeks (not ranked heading into first game vs. Oklahoma State, 1990). With last Saturday's victory over Vanderbilt, the 1993 class not only secured Florida's second straight SEC Eastern Division title, it also marked the first time in school history that the Gators have won nine or more games in four consecutive seasons. This year's crop became only the third in school history to win all four games against archrival Georgia. If you take a look back at the SEC standings, the Gators have finished first, first and second in the three previous years and have a chance to finish first again this season. More importantly, 17 of the 19 seniors are expected to graduate by this summer.

"It seems like we've been doing this for a while. Sometimes I think I want it all to be over, but at the same time, I know that I'm going to miss it more than anything. TE Charlie Dean



Michael Gilmore: Chiseled Out of the Ancient Mold


e stands in front of the inclining monument that marks his territory—a man of intellect, a time-tested athlete awaiting his next task. His profile conjures images of the ancient Grecian Olympians, well versed in developing mind and body.

While University of Florida junior Michael Gilmore is a man of the modern day, his mental and physical condition rival that of any ancient Greek hero as he stands before the towering structure that marks Gator territory. Ben Hill Griffin Stadium shadows Gilmore's playing field rather than the venerable Mt. Olympus, but no matter the arena, surely those ancient Greeks would have enjoyed seeing the Chipley, Fla. native in action.

Even though his lineage is Creek and not Greek (Gilmore's mother is a recognized member of the Native American Creek tribe, as is he and his sisters), this Gator still attempts to maximize his human potential like those ancient philosophers and athletes. Gilmore's latest quest is the coveted Rhodes Scholarship. Earlier this year, he began the official selection process. In fact, the actual Rhodes Scholarship application form reads more like a statement of Aristotelian idealism than a piece of required paperwork:

"Proven intellectual and academic quality of a high standard is the first quality required of applicants, but they will also be required to show integrity of character, interest in and respect for their fellow human beings, the ability to lead and the energy to use their talents to the full... The last of these qualities is best tested through participation and success in sports."

Certainly Gilmore has shown his athletic integrity on the field as the Gators' starting free safety. Even more impressively, he has been recognized for his work as a



Zoology major enrolled in UF's Pre-Med program and in the community. Gilmore recently received a Toyota Leadership Award and was also selected to the All-SEC Academic Honor Roll last season. Despite the accolades, perhaps the stiffest test Gilmore has been forced to make occurred before he even enrolled in college. Seemingly ancient football rivals Florida and Florida State, the Athens and Sparta of the collegiate football nation-state, both extended offers to the All-State (2A) defensive back out of Chipley High School.

"It was one of the toughest tasks that I have ever been faced with," Gilmore admitted.

However, Gilmore's decision was not just an epic one for himself, but for his entire family. You see, three generations of women in Gilmore's family had all attended Florida State, while his father and grandfather both attended the University of Florida. In fact, Gilmore's sisters, Kim and Leanne, were members of FSU's Garnet and Gold Girls, a group the Gilmore sisters actually helped found to assist in the recruitment of student-athletes.

"My Mom and my sisters all wanted me to attend FSU," Gilmore stated. "Looking back, I'm now convinced that I made the right decision. Florida's academic reputation and their outstanding School of Medicine really convinced me to become a Gator. I can't imagine not having all the people in my life that I met because I chose to attend the University of Florida."

While Gilmore recants a list that includes everyone from UF faculty to his girlfriend and the Gator coaching staff, his first roommate at Florida also influenced Gilmore's quest-to-be-the-best, Gator quarterback and friend, Terry Dean.


"We had a lot of the same classes our freshman year," Dean said. "We would usually bet each other who could get the higher grade when we had tests. No matter what he does, Michael is a true competitor, but more importantly, he is a true friend."

"Terry usually got the better of me on those bets," Gilmore admits. "But after a while we both realized that our goals were a lot higher than just getting good grades."

"Now I'm at the point where I'm getting closer to achieving some of those goals," he continued. "My family and friends have really helped to mold me into the person I am today. They have helped me build a strong foundation of values and goals that I can base my life on. I learned that you can't let your goals and desires remain static, you need to keep building to reach a higher level as a person every day."

Gilmore does push himself to a higher level every time he enters a classroom at the University of Florida, or steps onto the turf at Florida Field. Just like the scholarathletes who exercised their bodies and minds at the base of Mt. Olympus, Michael Gilmore has been chiseled from the same ancient mold. Hopefully that mold is far from broken.

lmost every classic rivalry in college football is 60-70 years old, standing the test of time to create legendary games, teams and players.

Alabama-Auburn, Michigan-Ohio State, USC-UCLA, Alabama-Tennessee, Florida-Georgia, Army-Navy, Texas-Oklahoma and other great rivalries all fit this standard.

Then there is Florida-Florida State, a series which has seen only 35 games since its inception in 1958 and already ranks up there with the finest in the college game.

This one has all the ingredients to create the perfect mix for the classic rivalry:

- ☐ Fans and alumni of the two schools don't go away when the game is over. They are there all year to remind and needle fans of the losing school. You go to work in the morning and there they are. Stroll through your own neighborhood and you'll see a few of them.
- ☐ Players from both teams have usually competed against each other in high school and many were teammates.
- ☐ Controversial games have taken place and are still discussed.
- ☐ There has been off-field drama such as the attempted bribe of Gator fullback Jon MacBeth in 1960.
- ☐ Each school has had its share of superb players who have excelled in this rivalry and gone on to recognized greatness at the college level and often in the NFL.
- ☐ There have been many brilliant fourth-quarter comebacks; heartbreak for one side and total ecstasy for the other.
- ☐ The series even started in controversy with Governor LeRoy Collins virtually ordering the two schools to get together and start playing each other.

□ Some of the nation's best, most innovative coaches have taken part. Florida's Ray Graves and Steve Spurrier along with FSU's Bill Peterson and Bobby Bowden rate with any combination.

Graves and Peterson, both ahead of their time in teaching the wide-open passing game to college athletes, had more to do with putting this game on the national map than any other pair. Their flair for the unusual and dramatic enabled the series to grab the attention of fans and the media.

Comebacks?

1965—Florida trails 17-16 with just over two minutes remaining. Quarterback Spurrier takes the Gators 80 yards, scoring the winning TD on a 25-yard Spurrier to Charlie Casey pass with 1:12 left.

1966—Spurrier throws a 41-yard TD

pass to halfback Larry Smith in the final quarter to erase a 19-14 Seminole lead in Tallahassee. The Gators win 22-19 despite a last-second controversial non-catch (or catch, if you're an FSU fan) by FSU's Lane Fenner.

1967—FSU quarterback Kim Hammond, knocked out in the first half, comes back in the final period to throw a TD pass to wide receiver Ron Sellers, who outjumps Bill Gaisford in the north end zone of Florida Field for a 21-16 Seminole win.

1986—Gator quarterback Kerwin



Larry Smith (above) caught a key 41-yard TD pass from Steve Spurrier in the '66 clash.

Bell brings his team back in a driving rain storm at Doak Campbe Stadium and tosses an 18-yard Tapass to Ricky Nattiel in the dynamoments for a 17-13 victory.

The last time the two teammet here in Gainesville the 14-defensive struggle was one of the most pulsating games ever player in the series. It went down FSU's final pass attempt which was knocked down in the end zone before Florida claimed the win.

The rivalry is a classic in just 35 years. Imagine what it will be 30-40 years from now.

ention the name Jon MacBeth to a current Gator football player, even the one receiving a trophy

Rely to get a blank look.

The courage and character MacBeth displayed as a Florida fullback 33 years ago has long since faded from the memory of most and the younger generation has no idea who he was or what

MacBeth was a 21-year-old senior out of Pensacola when a Pi Lambda Phi fraternity brother approached him on August 22, 1960 with an offer that would

change his life.

Philip Silber, a 19-year-old native of New York City, was acting as the contact that day for a small-time New York gambler named Aaron Wagman, who had contacted him in Miami in the spring asking to be introduced to Florida football players.

On that day in August, Silber introduced Wagman to MacBeth. The pair of New Yorkers had decided MacBeth was a perfect candidate to bribe, a poor young man with virtually no income and only two pairs of trousers to his name.

Wagman offered MacBeth \$1,500 to "limit" the number of points in Florida's game that fall against FSU scheduled for Sept. 24 at Florida Field. He suggested that as a "safety valve" for gamblers, Jon could fumble early in the game, miss a tackle or two in key situations as a linebacker and miss a few blocks on important roll-out pass attempts.

Florida went into that game as a 13-point favorite over the

Seminoles.

MacBeth pretended to be interested in the offer; however, as soon as he left the meeting, he reported it to Gator head coach Ray Graves, who turned the information over to UF president Dr. J. Wayne Reitz, campus and local police.

Officials persuaded MacBeth to go along with the gamblers, take the bribe and help law enforcement officers catch them in an elaborate operation the night before the Florida-FSU game.

It turned out to be a comedy of errors although all ended well when both Silber and Wagman were arrested the following day. MacBeth thought he had the security convoy of police officers following him as he accepted the \$1,500 bribe but he was all alone when it happened.

The plan called for MacBeth to meet Silber outside the Murphree Hall dormitory room he shared with fellow gridders Vic Miranda and Sonny Giles. Plainclothes policemen were then to follow them across the campus to a prearranged spot where they would meet Wagman and complete the transaction.

Incredibly, the policemen didn't recognize MacBeth when he left the dorm room and he was totally on his own. Wagman was waiting to meet him and Silber in a parked car across campus and the three of them then drove around town before parking on SE 7th Street.

Wagman then gave MacBeth the \$1.500 in \$100 bills and talked to him about more money to come later if things worked out.

"I was to get \$3,000 for shaving points in the Georgia game and a \$1,000 bonus at the end of the year if both games worked out as planned," MacBeth told the Gainesville Daily Sun. "Wagman also told me I could double my money on the FSU game by letting the gamblers bet it for me but I told him I wasn't a gambler and wanted cold cash."

After being dropped off at the Florida Student Union, MacBeth called Coach Graves and Dr. Reitz, who were waiting with police officials in the president's office. decided as a safety precaution he should spend the night in the president's house so MacBeth left a note for roomie Miranda saying he wouldn't be back that night because he was "spending the night as a guest at the Reitz house."

The next day Silber was arrested at his apartment and Wagman was apprehended in Jacksonville while attempting to board a flight back to New York City. Wagman, who was later charged with a basketball betting bribery, was eventually sentenced to 370 years in prison. For his part in the Florida point-fixing scheme he received five years in prison and a \$10.000 fine. Silber drew a five-year probation.

The Gators defeated FSU 3-0 and from that day forward the fullback from Pensacola, now Dr. Jon MacBeth and a university professor, has been hailed by those who remember his deed as "Honest Jon."

For over three decades the Orlando Touchdown Club has given the "Jon MacBeth Award" to a Gator player who best exemplifies MacBeth's courage and character. Last spring's winner-Bill Gunter—politely asked before accepting the plaque: "Who is Jon MacBeth?"

Easy. He is a hero who did the right thing when there was a great temptation to do otherwise.

Farrior Gift Funds Construction of Academic Advisement Center

inal plans are currently being made for construction of a \$3.8 million Academic Advisement Center at the University of Florida thanks to the generosity of the Rex Farrior family. Those plans will soon become a reality due in large part to Mr. and Mrs. J. Rex Farrior, Jr. of Tampa, who donated \$1.5 million towards the completion of this project. This new facility will house both the University Academic Advising Offices and the University Athletic Association's Office of Student Life on the University of Florida campus.

The building will be located on Fletcher Drive, west of Dauer Hall and south of Sledd Hall on the site of the former Johnson Hall. Construction on the facility is slated to begin in April of 1994 with a projected completion date of May or June 1995.

The funding of the new Academic Advisement Center serves as the crowning achievement in the storied Farrior tradition at the University of Florida. Rex Farrior, Sr. was a multisport letterman at Florida, serving as the Gator football squad captain in his senior year of 1916. He received his law degree from UF in 1924 and was later inducted into the University of Florida Athletic Hall of Fame. J. Rex Farrior, Jr. graduated from the University of Florida in 1949 with a degree in Business Administration and was selected to the University of Florida Hall of Fame. After obtaining his degree from the UF College of Law in 1951 he became associated with the law firm now known as Shackleford, Farrior, Stallings and Evans. As the senior partner of the firm, he is a respected trial and corporate attorney and serves as President of The Florida Bar. Farrior is also a member of the University of Florida College of Law's Board of Trustees. In addition, his son Rex Farrior III became the third generation of the family to graduate from the University of Florida Law School

when he received his degree in 1984. Two other sons, Hugh and Preston Farrior, likewise graduated from the University of Florida.

Farrior says that

the opportunity to assist the University of Florida in this endeavor was the fulfillment of a lifelong dream. "There is no way I can ever repay the University of Florida for everything this institution has given to me and my family," he said. "Because of the quality education I received at the University of Florida, I am now in a position where I can repay a debt of gratitude."

According to University of Florida President, Dr. John Lombardi. gratitude is the perfect term to express the University of Florida's reaction to Farrior's gift. "We at the University of Florida are excited by the opportunity Rex and Mary Lee are giving us to strengthen our academic advising programs," he stated. "We are proud and excited that the new facility will give us the chance to recognize the long and distinguished history of academic and athletic excellence the university shares with the Farrior family."

University of Florida Athletic Director, Jeremy Foley is also very pleased about Farrior's contribution and what it will mean to the institution. "This project will certainly benefit all students at the University of Florida," he commented. "The new Academic Advisement Center is simply another step in our ongoing effort to work hand-in-hand with the university. We have a very strong commitment to both academics and athletics, so I think it is only appropriate that we provide the best facilities possible in an effort to help students achieve their goals both on and off the field."

In addition to serving as the advising center for the entire university, the new facility will also be a boon to the UAA's Office of Student Life. The increased physical space of the Academic Advisement Center will increase study areas for studentathletes and more than triple the size of the current computer work area. In total, the new three-story structure will have a workable area of over 31,000 square feet.

The first floor of the building will house the Office of Student Life's administrative offices, as well as the University Academic Advising program. The second floor will feature expanded tutoring rooms in addition to the Pre-Med and Pre-Law advising areas. The top story of the facility will be home to a state-of-the-am computer lab and video viewing laboratory. On the exterior, the structure will feature red brick masonry, helping it to attractively blend in with surrounding buildings on campus.

The funding of the new Academic Advisement Center is simply another chapter in the Farrior legaco at the University of Florida, according to Gator Boosters Executive Director, John James. "The generos" ty of Rex and Mary Lee will impass the University of Florida and its stadents more than they will ever know," he commented. "This gift truly indicative of the tremendous commitment that the entire Farrier family has made to higher education at the University of Florida."

"It is truly a privilege to final" make all of these plans a reality. Farrior concluded. "This facility wall serve the entire University of Florida and its student-athletes for years come. I cannot think of a more worth while endeavor than helping contin ue the legacy of quality education that the University of Florida provides


The "Pride of the Sunshine"







UF Medical School Receives \$18 million Federal Grant to Build World-Class Brain Institute

he University of Florida Health Science Center has been awarded an \$18 million grant from the Department of Defense to build a brain institute, a feat university officials say is pivotal to plans to develop a world-class neuroscience research center at UF.

The university-wide brain institute will foster collaborative and interdisciplinary biomedical studies among some of UF's top scientists in the burgeoning field of brain and central nervous system research, said Dr. David Challoner, UF Vice President for Health Affairs.

"Obtaining this grant is the most significant event in a decade for the University of Florida Health Science Center," he said. "We are building on a strength. We already have people on this campus who rank near the top of their fields, and now we will have a state-of-the-artfacility to bring together these leading researchers and physician-scientists."

Work at the institute will include head, neck and spinal cord injury research and clinical studies involving a myriad of brain and nervous-system disorders, ranging from Alzheimer's disease and AIDS to paralysis and drug addiction.

The \$18 million federal grant was contingent upon UF coming up with \$36 million to put into the project. With help from Shands Hospital, UF's pledge turned out to be \$40 million — \$13 million from the College of Medicine, \$14 million from Shands and \$13 million already spent on the UF Health Science Center's academic research building.

The institute's 128,000-square-foot facility will be built on a site a few hundred feet northeast of the academic research building, which opened in 1990 and houses many of the medical school's existing brain-related research laboratories. The two-year construction project is tentatively scheduled to start in 1994.

The schoolyard ecosystem is an

ideal way to teach children about nature and the environment, said Les Linscott, another landscape architecture professor working on the project.

"These kids will be out there working with the plants and animals," Linscott said. "They'll be doing plantings and measurements of growth. They'll be seeing the animals coming into the area. It's something that you can never get from a book."

The ecosystems would have the added advantage of showing children the native environment of their area.

"Even when they do talk about the environment in books, there's no way for the books to know where the child reading it is and what natural environment they live in," Linscott said. "But if kids can go out and see the natural environment, then they can take it home with them. The ecosystem that they have on their schoolyard is the same one they are going to find in their own back yard or in the lot down the street."

The schoolyard ecosystems would start out with the planting of native plants. Once vegetation is established, wildlife will naturally gravitate toward the area.
