FLORIDA STATE vs. KENT STATE

- After its first open date of the season, Florida State returns to the field for the first time since matching the largest margin of victory in program history, defeating East Texas A&M 77-3 on Sept. 6, and hosts Kent State on Saturday.
- Florida State's No. 7 ranking this week is the highest in the Week Three AP poll for a team that was unranked in the preseason since the AP began ranking 25 teams in 1989. FSU is only the fourth preseason unranked team to reach the top 10 in the Week Three rankings in the AP's top-25 era.
- The Seminoles rolled up 729 yards of total offense vs. East Texas A&M and showcased incredible balance with 361 rushing yards and 368 passing yards. It was only the third time in program history, and first time since 1995, FSU recorded at least 350 rushing yards and at least 350 passing yards in the same game.
- FSU boasts one of the nation's most explosive offenses this season. The Seminoles lead the country with an average of 20.8 yards per completion, nearly a three-yard advantage over the next team from a P4 conference and six yards more than the next-closest ACC team, and rank in the top-10 nationally in plays of at least 30 yards (10, 8th), 40 yards (8, 3rd) and 50 yards (5, 4th) and are one of 13 teams with an 80-yard play in 2025.
- Florida State also leads the country in passing efficiency (260.24), and the Seminoles are one of three teams with a touchback on every kickoff this season. Their 18 kickoff attempts are seven more than the other two teams.
- FSU's five 4th-down attempts are tied for 2nd-most nationally among the 22 teams that are perfect on 4th-down conversions this season.



QUICK HITS

- The Seminoles lead the ACC in scoring offense (54.0, 3rd nationally), rushing offense (295.5, 6th), fewest penalties per game (3.50, 8th) and scoring defense (10.0, 14th). FSU is one of two teams, and the only team in a P4 conference, to lead its conference in both scoring offense and scoring defense.
- Florida State, which opened this season with a 31-17 win over No. 8 Alabama and also beat No. 5 LSU 45-24 to open the 2023 season, is the only non-SEC team with multiple regular season wins over top-10 SEC teams since the start of the 2023 season. The only other non-conference losses by a top-10 SEC team are No. 3 Alabama to No. 11 Texas in 2023 and No. 1 Texas to No. 3 Ohio State in 2025.
- Mike Norvell is the only head coach in the country with multiple regular season non-conference wins against top-10 SEC opponents since 2016.
- Over the past 10 seasons, Florida State's nine regular-season non-conference wins against the SEC are 2nd in the nation. Head coach Mike Norvell has six wins against the SEC since 2016, the 2nd-most non-conference wins against the conference in that span.
- Offensive coordinator Gus Malzahn's offenses are averaging 448.5 yards per game in his 19-plus seasons as an offensive coordinator or head coach.
- Defensive coordinator Tony White has produced a top-25 defense each of the last four seasons at two different programs (Syracuse and Nebraska). In his last 26 games, his defense has held opponents to 20 points or fewer 17 times. His defense has not allowed a rushing touchdown in nine straight home games.

DUCE ROBINSON PLAYER FEATURE

As Florida State prepares to welcome families back to campus for Family Weekend, junior wide receiver Duce Robinson is a great example of what it means to be part of the Seminole family, both on and off the field. Robinson, fresh off ACC Player of the Week honors after his historic performance against East Texas A&M, isn't just excelling on the field, he's carrying forward a family legacy while also making a name for himself.

Originally from Phoenix, Robinson's love for sports was rooted deeply in his family. "Florida State has always been a very special place to me," he said. "Growing up, my pops went to Florida State, my mom went to Florida...me and all my brothers were Florida State fans, so my mom got the short end of the stick."

His father, wide receiver Dominic Robinson, played football for Florida State from 2001-04 and baseball in 2002, while his mother, Mary Beth, was a swimmer at the University of Florida from 1999-2001. One of his earliest memories, the 2013 national championship game featuring Jameis Winston, still resonates with him today. "We were able to stay up late and watch the end of that game and it came down to the wire, but we ended up taking the dub. I just remember my pops lifting me up over his head and putting me on his shoulder after we won. That's one of my fondest memories growing up, and ever since then, I've always held a special place in my heart for FSU. Now that I'm able to be a Seminole, hopefully I'll be able to recreate a lot of those memories."

Baseball was actually Robinson's first love. He grew up watching the Texas Rangers win back-to-back World Series and he played competitively through high school and at the University of Southern California, even playing for the California Collegiate League Academy Barons in the summer of 2024. But football and the chance to follow in his father's footsteps was always calling his name.

After two seasons at USC, Robinson transferred to FSU. "Once I entered the portal, being able to speak to Coach Norvell, Coach Malzahn, just feel the excitement, that meant a lot," he said. He also credits quarterback Tommy Castellanos as a big reason for choosing Florida State. "Tommy is my person day in and out. When I came here on my visit, he was here as well, he made sure he was here and able to show me around. We do everything together... it's like a brotherhood."

As a young Seminole fan, Robinson idolized Kelvin Benjamin, Florida State's standout wide receiver from 2011-13, and tried to model his game after the big, athletic receiver. "I've always taken pride in just being athletic...I don't want to be athletic for my size; I just want to be athletic in general." Benjamin's intentional use of his size and speed left a lasting impression, and Robinson now utilizes that same athleticism to redefine what it means to be an impactful receiver at Florida State.

Robinson's production on the field has been immediate. After starting and catching two passes for 18 yards in FSU's win over No. 8 Alabama, Robinson made a name for himself nationally with 5 catches for 173 yards and 2 touchdowns - all in the first half - against East Texas A&M. Robinson and Castellanos connected on touchdowns of 82 and 42 yards - the second a one-handed catch while fighting off pass interference - as Robinson set career-highs in receptions, touchdowns and yards. Robinson and the rest of the FSU starters did not play in the second half as FSU beat the Lions, 77-3.

Beyond the statistics, Robinson is already making his mark on the FSU community. It's his combination of size, skill, and work ethic that sets him apart from others. As he continues to grow, Robinson is not only building upon a family tradition, but he is carving out his own identity and leaving his own Robinson legacy on the Seminole football program.

TOMMY CASTELLANOS

- Florida State's offense is led by dynamic quarterback Tommy Castellanos. In his first game as a Seminole, Castellanos was 9-for-14 for 152 yards and no turnovers against Alabama, connecting on passes of 64 and 40 yards in FSU's win.
- Castellanos added a game-high 78 rushing yards and one touchdown. Castellanos' seven games since 2023 with at least 75 rushing yards and a rushing touchdown are the 2nd-most for an ACC quarterback in that span. Three of those have come against ranked opponents, the most in the

ACC.

- Castellanos' nine-yard touchdown run tied the game in the first quarter against Alabama. He has 16 career rushing touchdowns.
- He began his FSU debut 7-for-7, with a 40-yard completion to Squirrel White on 3rd-and-11 before his touchdown run.
- Against East Texas A&M, Castellanos was 8-for-11 for 237 yards and three touchdowns. He connected with Duce Robinson on touchdown passes of 82 and 42 yards and with Gavin

Sawchuk for a 53-yard touchdown.

- Castellanos led FSU to touchdown drives on all six possessions against the Lions before being replaced late in the second quarter.
- Castellanos' 82-yard touchdown pass was a career-long completion and the longest for a Seminole since the 2019 Sun Bowl (91 yards, James Blackman to Tamorrion Terry).
- With 237 yards against East Texas A&M, Castellanos surpassed 4,000 career passing yards and enters the Kent State contest with 4,078.

DUCE ROBINSON

- Duce Robinson had a career day against East Texas A&M en route to being named the ACC Receiver of the Week. Robinson caught five passes for 173 yards and two touchdowns, from 82 and 42 yards. Robinson did not play in the second half.
- Robinson's 160 yards in the first quarter are tied for 2nd in program

history in a quarter and the most since 1968. His 173 yards in the first half were the most in a half for a Seminole this century and 4th all-time.

- Robinson's 82-yard touchdown from Tommy Castellanos was the longest catch for a Seminole since the 2019 Sun Bowl. Robinson's yards,

receptions, touchdowns and 82-yard catch were all career-highs.

- Robinson was FSU's first ACC Receiver of the Week since 2023. His 173 yards are the most in the ACC this season and the most for a Seminole since Johnny Wilson's 202 vs. Oklahoma in the 2022 Cheez-It Bowl.

LUKE PETITBON

- In first-year offensive line coach Herb Hand's first two games, Florida State has earned back-to-back ACC Offensive Lineman of the Week honors. The last time FSU won consecutive OL of the Week awards was in 2022.
- C Luke Petitbon was the ACC and National Offensive Lineman of the Week for his performance against No.

8 Alabama. Petitbon and the Seminoles did not allow a sack against the Crimson Tide while rushing for 230 yards and four touchdowns.

- RG Adrian Medley led the FSU offensive line against East Texas A&M as the Noles ran for 361 yards, passed for 368 yards and scored touchdowns on its first 10 drives of the game.

- Petitbon, Medley, LT Gunnar Hansen, LG Richie Leonard IV and RT Micah Pettus took all 65 offensive snaps against the Crimson Tide.

- Hansen, Petitbon, Medley and Pettus were offseason transfers. The group allowed just 3.0 tackles for loss and no sacks against Alabama.

EARL LITTLE JR.

- Florida State has held No. 8 Alabama and East Texas A&M to a combined 20 points over two games to begin the season. Defensive coordinator Tony White spent the 2023-24 seasons at Nebraska and has held 17 opponents to 20 or fewer points over his last 26 games.
- White's defenses have now gone nine consecutive home games without

allowing a rushing touchdown. Last season at Nebraska, the Cornhuskers became the first team nationally since 2021 to not allow a rushing touchdown at home. It was the first time Nebraska had accomplished the feat since 1939.

- Florida State held No. 8 Alabama to just 87 rushing yards and no rushing touchdowns, Alabama's fewest rushing yards in a season opener since 1975.

- Alabama gained 55 rushing yards on its opening drive but tallied just 32 rushing yards on 17 carries (1.88 ypc) the rest of the game.
- The Seminoles had two interceptions against East Texas A&M, FSU's first game with multiple interceptions since 2022.


