## FLORIDA STATE vs. STANFORD

- Florida State heads west for its first matchup against Stanford in program history. The 10:30 p.m. ET kickoff will tie the latest scheduled start for FSU, matching games at San Diego State in 1973 and 1977.
- The Seminoles have topped 400 yards of total offense in each of their last five games, the program's longest streak since a five-game stretch in the middle of the 2023 season. Florida State gained 415 yards of offense vs. Pitt after reaching 404 yards vs. Miami, 514 yards at Virginia, 775 yards vs. Kent State and 729 yards vs. East Texas A&M. The Seminoles' total yards are the most allowed this season by Miami, Virginia, Kent State and East Texas A&M, and the most allowed by Pitt in regulation.
- FSU boasts one of the nation's most explosive offenses. The Seminoles lead the country in plays of at least 40 yards (14), rank 2nd in 30-plus yard plays (24), 5th in 50-plus yard plays (8), 7th in 20-plus yard plays (39), 8th in 10-plus yard plays (110) and 10th in 60-plus yard plays (4). The Seminoles are one of 26 teams with an 80-yard play in 2025.
- Florida State ranks 2nd in the country in rushing plays of 10-plus yards (55) and 20-plus yards (16) and also ranks 7th in 50-plus yard rushes (3). FSU ranks in the top 10 in passing plays of 30-plus yards (17, 3rd), 40-plus yards (10, 2nd), 50-plus yards (5, 4th), 60-plus yards (3, 5th) and 80-plus yards (1, 1st).
- The Seminoles lead the ACC in total offense (536.5, 3rd nationally), rushing touchdowns (21, 3rd), yards per completion (15.56, 4th), first downs (160, 4th), rushing offense (274.5, 5th), scoring offense (44.2, 5th), 3rd-down percentage (.544, 7th) yards per pass (9.89, 7th), yards per play (7.33, 8th) and passing efficiency (169.34, 13th).
- Combining 3rd- and 4th-down conversions, FSU's conversion efficiency rate of 68.4 percent (54 total conversions on 79 3rd-downs) is 1st in the ACC and 4th nationally.



## QUICK HITS

- FSU's 775 yards of total offense in its win vs. Kent State are the most in the nation this season and the most for any team since Dec. 12, 2020, when North Carolina gained 778 yards in a 62-26 win at Miami. The Seminoles, who gained 729 yards of offense vs. East Texas A&M, became the first team with back-to-back 700-yard games since 2015. Florida State boasts two of the four 725-yard games in the nation in 2025 and the only ones from the ACC.
- In records dating back to 1995, FSU is the 18th team nationally and third from the ACC with multiple 725-yard games in the same season. The Seminoles are the first ACC team and one of three nationally with back-to-back games of at least 725 yards of offense, joining Baylor in 2015 and 2013.
- Florida State broke single-game school records with 498 rushing yards, eight rushing touchdowns and 27 rushing first downs in the win vs. Kent State. The rushing yards total was the most in a game against an FBS opponent since Jacksonville State vs. Louisiana Tech in 2023, and the rushing first downs were the most since Air Force vs. Nevada in 2022. The rushing touchdowns were the most by an ACC team since Georgia Tech at Louisville in 2018.
- The Seminoles rolled up 729 yards of total offense vs. East Texas A&M and showcased incredible balance with 361 rushing yards and 368 passing yards. It was only the third time in program history, and first time since 1995, FSU recorded at least 350 rushing yards and at least 350 passing yards in the same game.
- Florida State is the only team in the country that has not allowed a kickoff return in 2025. The Seminoles have produced 41 touchbacks on 41 official kickoffs and also have four onside kick attempts with no returns.

## MICAH DANZY: SPEED, VERSATILITY LEADING TO BREAKOUT SEASON

For wide receiver Micah Danzy, speed has never been the question. It's what made the redshirt freshman an ACC champion on the track, and it's helping him make his mark on the football field.

Through the first half of the season, the Tallahassee native's mix of explosiveness and growing role on the team has started to click. His 133-yard, two-touchdown performance against Pitt marked a career best, showcasing confidence and strength from start to finish.

That power was on display even earlier in the season against No.8 Alabama, when he was named ACC Rookie of the Week for his breakout performance. "When I broke that tackle, I was like, 'Oh my gosh, I'm about to score,'" Danzy said of his 32-yard touchdown run against the Crimson Tide. "Trusting my speed and using my thighs for power just shows how strong I am in that moment." He followed that up with a 53-yard touchdown run vs. East Texas A&M, then made program history versus Kent State by becoming the first Seminole ever to record a 60-yard run and reception in the same game.

Originally committed to Florida State as a running back, Danzy later shifted into a wide receiver, a transition that demanded more than just his trademark quickness. His hard work has paid off and so has his growing comfort level. A year ago, he admits, he didn't always feel as confident as he does now.

"Last year, I was still a little nervous," Danzy said. "I remember dropping it once and I'm like I've got to catch this. This year, my coaches believe in me and that's just building my teammates and I's confidence. When I see the ball in the air, I just go get it."

Danzy's track success has helped shape his mentality. Last spring, he ran 44.38 in the 400 meters, setting FSU, ACC, and ACC Championship records, and helped FSU's 4x100 relay take gold at the 2025 ACC Outdoor Championships. Before arriving at Florida State, he was a two-time FHSAA 2A state champion in the 200 and 400 and a silver medalist at the 2023 USATF National Junior Olympics. For him, football and track may be different, but that competitive mindset has always been there.

"Track, it's almost like I expect it. I'm confident I can run that 44," he said. "With football, you never know what to expect. It's just crazy, a lot of things running through my mind."

Balancing both sports requires constant communication with his coaches, and Danzy credits pass game coordinator and wide receivers coach Tim Harris Jr. for helping him manage that. During his collegiate career, Harris was a standout for Miami's track and field program and began his coaching career leading Booker T. Washington's track and field and football teams to state championships.

"He's been a big help, especially in spring ball," Danzy said. "Since I ran the 400, it was a lot of communication because the 400 is more endurance than skill. He didn't want to overrun me because I was still in track season. Him running the 800, he understood where I was coming from."

That guidance, along with his own determination, has helped Danzy find the balance between sports. And even as recognition grows, he stays grounded, focused on what's next.

"I don't try to listen to the talk. Like they say, I like to smell the perfume but not drink it," Danzy said. "I'm just trying to get better day by day."

With each catch, each sprint, and each race, Micah Danzy continues to prove that speed when matched with strength and discipline can take him just about anywhere.

**MICAHI DANZY**

- Micah Danzy is the ACC record holder in the 400-meter dash (44.38) and is using his speed on the field, totaling five touchdowns in the first half of the season.
- Danzy ranks 1st in the ACC in 20-yard plays (10, 6th nationally), 30-yard plays (8, 2nd), 40-yard plays (5, 3rd), 50-yard plays (4, 2nd) and 60-yard plays (2, 6th).
- Danzy set career-highs with seven catches, 133 yards and two touchdowns vs. Pitt.
- Danzy is averaging 48.0 yards per touchdown this season. He leads the ACC with 20.63 yards per reception this season (16 catches for 330 yards).
- Danzy had a rushing touchdown in FSU's first three games of 2025: a 32-yard run vs. No. 8 Alabama, a 53-yard score vs. ETAMU and a career-long 64-yard run vs. Kent State. Against the Golden Flashes, Danzy also caught passes of 47 and 65 yards.
- Danzy is the first player in Florida State history with a 60-yard reception and a 60-yard rush in the same game. His 64-yard run is FSU's longest of the season and was the longest for FSU since Lawrence Toafili's 73-yard scamper vs. Louisville in the 2023 ACC Championship Game.
- He was named FSU's first Rookie of the Week since 2021 for his game against Kent State.
- Florida State is the first P4 team to have different players record at least 170 all-purpose yards in a half in consecutive games since 2021.
- Danzy's 112 yards in the first quarter vs. Kent State are 8th-most in a quarter in 2025.



## JA'BRIL RAWLS

- Redshirt sophomore Ja'Bril Rawls made his first career start against No. 8 Alabama, finishing with six tackles and one pass breakup.
- At Virginia, Rawls had a career-high 11 tackles, his first career interception and his first career tackle for loss in the contest.
- Rawls was the first Seminole with at least 11 tackles, 1.0 TFL and one interception in an ACC game since current assistant linebackers coach Ernie Sims posted the same stat line vs. Maryland in 2005.
- Against Pitt, Rawls led FSU with 10 tackles - all solo - with a career-high 2.0 tackles for loss. He is the first Seminole since Jammie Robinson vs. Oklahoma in the 2022 Cheez-It Bowl with at least 10 solo tackles.
- Rawls is the first Seminole with at least 10 tackles and 100 percent solo tackles since Hamsah Nasirildeen also had 10 solo tackles at Clemson in 2017.

## ASHLYND BARKER

- Ashlynd Barker made his first career start against No. 8 Alabama, tallying three tackles and two pass breakups against the Crimson Tide. The pass breakups were the first of his career.
- Of FSU's five starting defensive backs against Alabama, four were making their first career start - Barker, safety Edwin Joseph, rover Earl Little Jr. and cornerback Ja'Bril Rawls.
- Barker had a team-high four tackles against ETAMU.
- At Virginia, Barker had 2.0 sacks for a loss of 10 yards, FSU's only sacks in the game. He entered the game with 1.0 sack for his career and doubled Virginia's sacks allowed for the season.
- UVA starter Chandler Morris had not been sacked in 2025 before Barker got to him twice.




## DARRELL JACKSON JR.




